

Sherlock Holmes

A new, authentic, British-produced series of radio adaptations of THE ADVENTURES OF SHERLOCK HOLMES starts on KFYRradio Sunday, Jan. 2, featuring two of Britain's most distinguished actors in the lead roles.

The new series of presentations of the immortal and original stories of the late Sir Arthur Conan Doyle will feature Sir John Gielgud in the role of Sherlock Holmes, and Sir Ralph Richardson in the part of Doctor Watson.

Each of the half-hour programs to be heard Sundays at 8:30 p. m., will, in addition, introduce a distinguished supporting cast chosen to lend authoritative re-creation of the period and atmosphere of the legendary Holmes adventures. For example, Orson Welles will portray the arch-criminal, Professor Moriarty, lending the resonance,

tone and authoritativeness of the Welles voice to the part. Val Gielgud, in real life Sir John Gielgud's brother, will portray Mycroft, Sherlock Holmes' brother.

The radio adaptations, while faithfully portraying the plot and intention of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, have been dramatized so as to use to the full, the resources of modern radio production. Towers of London have handled the adaptations with a view to pleasing the Sherlock Holmes fans who are "purists." Every possible effort has been made to re-create the stories in as unabridged fashion as radio will permit.

The incidental music for the series has been specially composed by Sidney Torch and features a theme written for the violin and played by the distinguished virtue. Alfredo Campoli.

Bob Hope's Own Biography

Book lovers across the nation are in for a delightful treat with the publication of Bob Hope's own story, "Have Tux, Will Travel."

The entertaining and penetrating personal Hope autobiography, as told to Pete Martin, is filled with the NBC comedian's brand of humor that has brought chuckles and laughter to world-wide audiences for many years.

The book gets off to a breezy start with the very first chapter during which Hope confesses: "I don't say that my mind is an orderly one. When I try to remember dates and names, I bang my forehead with my fists so hard I have to have my head re-blocked."

Hope reveals that his ski nose is real, explaining: "It's not true my nose is the way it is as the result of having been broken in an accident. It came the way it is from the manufacturer. My brother Fred's nose is even ski-snootier than mine."

The laugh-packed book is published by Simon and Schuster, and is profusely illustrated with amusing drawings by Ted Sally. It is also completely indexed with places ranging from the Dyker Theatre of Brookly to the London Palladium and with such varied personalities as Goodman Ace, President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Wilbur Zink (a former schoolmate).

The top-rated comic has been an NBC Radio highlight for the past 16 years, and is currently represented on KFYR with the BOB HOPE RADIO SHOW Thursday evenings at 7:30.

KFYR Boosts Heart Drive

A special, week-long KFYR radio show helped boost the 1954 "Open Your Heart" campaign in Bismarck, a drive to provide food and clothing for needy families during Christmas.

Eight KFYR employees, including television and radio personalities, donated their time and services as MC's on the special request record show, broadcast direct from the Guy Larson music store in Bismarck.

The hour and a half show was heard at 10:30 P. M. to 12 midnight, Monday through Saturday, beginning the week of December 13th. Persons in the Bismarck-Mandan area, including the surrounding towns, were able to call direct to the broadcast spot and request their favorite tunes. But to do so they had to donate something for the "Open Your Heart" drive. Donations included money, clothing, canned foods, and toys.

Cal Culver, KFYR television director, and master of ceremonies on such TV shows as Saturday Circus and TV Quiz, MC'd the charity show on Monday night. Sportscaster and announcer Dick Johnson took the microphone Tuesday; Disc jockey and announcer Gus Becker combined with TV announcer Clink McGeary on Wednesday's show; Sportscaster Doug Anderson was Thursday's M. C.; TV announcer Larry Kindle on Friday; and Disc Jockey and announcer Jim Backlin held the fort Saturday.

Other KFYR personalities donating their services were Mike Dosch with his accordion, the Farmhands and the Wagonmasters.

SPORTSCASTER OUTSPORTED





New Counciling Service

Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, whose "Power of Positive Thinking" has been the Number One best-selling book of non-fiction across the country for the past two years, will launch a new five-times-weekly program on KFYR starting Monday, Jan. 3, 9:05 A. M.

In the new series of Mondaythrough-Friday broadcasts, Dr. Peale will answer questions his listeners send him. On the air he will reply to those queries he believes reflect the "most typical" problems of large segments of the population today.

One of the busiest ministers in the United States, Dr. Peale is pastor of its oldest Protestant church: the Marble Collegiate Church in New York. There each Sunday he preaches two sermons to congregations totaling more than 4,000 worshippers; a TV circuit carries the sermons to "overflow" rooms.

The Marble Collegiate Church Clinic, in which Dr. Peale is associated with Dr. Smiley Blanton and 12 assisting psychiatrists and psychologists, is a pioneer and widely known counseling service in personal problems. It occupies the entire floor of a Park Avenue office building.

Dr. Peale's weekly talks on "The Art of Living," broadcast on Sundays by NBC Radio, are heard by millions. His printed sermons go each month to a list of 175,000 persons throughout the world who have requested them. Dr. Peale al-

so is a syndicated newspaper columnist, a magazine columnist, editor of "Guideposts," an interfaith monthly magazine, and author of several of the most widely-read inspirational books ever published. His "Guide to Confident Living" is still very popular, as his series on KFYR-tv.

One of the country's best known lecturers, Dr. Peale appears before many state and national conventions, community mass meetings, business and industrial gatherings, chambers of commerce, dinneclubs, lecture course audiences, teachers' and bankers' associations, national and state trade associations, service clubs, women's clubs, and also religious gatherings.

Dr. Peale was born in Bowersville, Ohio. He grew up in various towns. attended schools, went on to Ohio Wesleyan University, and wanted to be a newspaperman. After graduation in 1920 he got a reporter's job on the Detroit Journal. Later, he studied theology at Boston University. His first church was in Brooklyn, N. Y., while commuting from classes in Boston. In 1927 he was called to the University Methodist Church in Syracuse, N. Y. He stayed there until 1932, when he answered a call from Marble Collegiate Church in New York.

Dr. Peale married Ruth Stafford in 1930. They have three children: Margaret, 21; John, 18, and Elizabeth, 12.

which the Bismarck Lodge has been awarded first place in the competition involving 1,700 Elks lodges in the nation. This year's observance included the presentation of a feature film on newspaper production and the handling of news in Bismarck and neighboring Mandan. Jack Swenson, KFYR-tv news director, was chairman of the Bismarck Elks newspaper week observance committee.

British Broadcasts Win NBC Thanks

Gratitude for wartime cooperation on the part of the British Broadcasting Corporation was expressed in London recently when Romney Wheeler, director of NBC's London offices presented a handsome plaque to the BBC in the name of NBC.

Sir Ian Jacobs, director general of the BBC, accepted the plaque.

The story behind the presentation took place during World War II, at which time the BBC generously turned over its facilities at no charge whatever to Allied radio correspondents.

All the Allies made use of the equipment, set up four floors beneath the ground in Broadcasting House, but the Americans used it most. And of all the Americans flashing bulletins about the progress of war, NBC foreign correspondent Merrill Muller made the most use of the BBC microphones.

So it is fitting that Mueller, now radio news executive for NBC, designed the plaque.

It is of brass and walnut, measures one and a half feet by one foot, and reads:

"Dedicated to the British Broadcasting Corporation for Supreme Services in the Cause of Truth and Freedom 1939-1945, in Grateful Recognition, the National Broadcasting Company, U.S.A.

Twenty-four hours a day, every day of the year, the United Press electrical teletype machines are on the go, telling the latest sports scores, international news, or of a disastrous fire in Sheboygan, Wisconsin.

The United Press bureau office is located right in the KFYR-tv newsroom. And veteran newswrit-

ers Bill Tillottson and Art McKinney are the UP newsmen for North Dakota.

Bill is the Bismarck bureau manager. The 25 year old newsman hails from Sioux Falls, South Dakota. He's married to a Sioux Falls girl, Collette, and the couple has a 10 week old boy, Jay William. Bill has been here about a year, but he's been with the United Press for four years, having worked previously in Des Moines, Iowa, and Sioux Falls and Pierre in South Dakota.

Art is 29 years old, and calls Chicago his home. He was transferred to the Bismarck bureau of United Press from the UP Chicago office last June, and he's been with the news service for two years. Previous news experience includes writing for the Cincinnatti Post, a daily newspaper in Cincinatti, Ohio, and with the International News Service (INS) in Chicago. Art is a bachelor.


