











Left: A few of the more important pier of equipment used in today's Telecastu





This is an artist's sketch of one of the main studios (looking towards its control room) in one of the Nation's largest television studio plants.

In 1947, after many difficult and gruelling years of research, television sets began to roll off assembly lines and into American homes; applications for video stations swamped the Federal Communications Commission. In the first months of 1948 the manufacture of sets began to mount and station after station took to the air-waves and brought to tadio audiences all over the Nation the long-awaited miracle!

Today there are just 22 Television Stations in this country and over a quarter of a million receiving sets. And those figures are, day by day, mounting by leaps and bounds.

Television — only a dream yesterday — has at last become a reality!
