From Season's Griot

Season's Griot, AM820 Saturday, December 10, 10pm In African tradition, the Griot is part poet, part musician, and mostly narrator of communal history. Season's Griot is a seamless blend of word and music in the African Griot tradition, featuring stories delivered in the ageless and mystical Griot style. These traditional tales had their origins on the plantations of 18th century America.

Seasonings: December—A Season of Celebration, AM820, Saturday, December 17, 10pm; FM93.9, Friday, December 23, 8pm Vertamae Grosvenor, host of AM820's Horizons, presides over a series of special holiday programs on food. December is truly a season of celebrations, and Grosvenor offers a taste of all of them this month. She talks with Trappist monks in Kentucky who bake fruitcakes and chats with a plum pudding chef who prepares 7,000 servings each Christmas season for a taste

of a traditional meal. *Seasonings* also offers a humorous tale of preparing potato latkes at Chanukah and visits a New Jersey Kwanzaa celebration with cookbook author Eric Copage. Copage provides a historical backdrop for recipes from the African diaspora combined with thoughtful explanation of Kwanzaa principles, terms, and rituals. The program wraps up with celebrities toasting the New Year.

The Plot to Overthrow Christmas, AM820, Saturday, December 17, 11:30pm What happens when the denizens of the underworld decide to undo the human race by rubbing out Santa Claus? Roddy McDowell, David Warner, and William Windom star in a new production of Norman Corwin's classic from the golden age of radio drama.

December 18 The Savior is Born Morgan Freeman delivers a poignant retelling of the first Christmas according to the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. The score, performed by the Christ

Church Cathedral Choir of Oxford, England, dramatizes the power and beauty of the story of the birth of Jesus. *December 25 The Night Before Christmas*, told by Meryl Streep, with music by Sarah W. Neil, and *The Gingham Dog and Calico Cat*, told by Amy Grant, with music by Chet Atkins.
