

"The Poet's Voice" Comes Alive on WNYC Radio

"A poem begins in delight and ends in wisdom...
(it's) a clarification of life...a momentary stay against confusion."

In the spirit of Robert Frost's words, *The Poet's Voice* aims to define the lives of 13 of this century's preeminent writers. From the arresting confessions of Anne Sexton ("To My Lover Returning to His Wife") to the passionate political declarations of diplomat, emigre, and Nobel Prize winner Czeslaw Milosz ("The passionless cannot change history"), these poets come alive on the air. With poetry experiencing a renaissance, WNYC and the Unterberg Poetry Center of the 92nd Street Y have created *The Poet's Voice* to bring great poetry to radio listeners in a stimulating and thought-provoking manner. These programs weave the live recordings of the poets from the Poetry Center together with commentary, interviews, anecdotes, and music to present an audio portrait of the lives and works of these poets. Varying widely in style but not in stature, the poets touch the mind and the heart. By hearing the rhythm, tone, and character in each poet's readings and by providing a historical and human context, *The Poet's Voice* makes poetry accessible and distinctive to radio listeners, revealing

nuances of tone and emotion that is a feast for the ear. Blair Brown hosts the series, which was produced by WNYC for broadcast around the country through National Public Radio, Listen to these January programs: January 7 and 8 W.H. Auden; World-famous by the age of 23, Wystan Hugh Auden was a seminal poet in contemporary literature. Urbane and witty, he was a master of form and the towering poetic figure for a generation. January 14 and 15 Robert Frost: The contentious Frost achieved fame late but became a consummate performer of his dark, yet hopeful, poems. A quintessential American voice, Frost reads "Mending Wall" and "Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening." January 21 and 22 William Carlos Williams: A New Jersey pediatrician, Williams shed conventions and fathered a new movement in American poetry. His verse, deceptively

simple and direct, is full of observations and expansive feeling.

January 28 and 29 Marianne Moore: "I am not treacherous, callous, jealous, superstitious, supercilious, venomous, or absolutely hideous," said the poet. Moore quietly broke all the rules and won every conceivable honor for her intricate, idiosyncratic work.

Future programs will feature Dylan Thomas, Pablo Neruda, Robert Lowell, Anne Sexton, Czeslaw Milosz, Gwendolyn Brooks, Octavio Paz, Adrienne Rich, and Derek Walcott.



National Public Radio special correspondent Susan Stamberg was honored for her work as host of All Things Considered at the Broadcasting and Cable Hall of Fame on November 7. She was inducted along with 16 other broadcast professionals, including Mery Griffin, Diane Sawyer, and the late Jimmy Durante. The former host of Weekend Edition is the recipient of every major broadcasting award, including the Edward R. Murrow Award from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, citing her as "the individual most responsible for increasing the image, audience awareness, and listenership for public radio." A native New Yorker and graduate of Barnard College, Stamberg was the first woman in the United States to anchor a national nightly news program.


Tribute to Weill


