
#### Colcannon/Celtic Celebration, Tuesday,

Woolf herself became a victim of the same "contrary instincts," festering with insecurity and falling into madness despite success and acclaim.

The Lives of the Children—A Good Hmong Girl, AM820, Saturday, March 25, 11pm Hmong traditions dictate that girls stay home and obey their husbands under all circumstances. This program focuses on Mee-Lor who has left her home to escape a cycle of violence. Her struggles and those of other Hmong women and the broader history of the women's movement are explored.

Breaking the Silence: Jewish Women Speak Their Truths, AM820, Saturday, March 25, 11pm Women have always contributed to the vitality of Jewish life, yet their voices have not always been heard. 
