To My Fellow WNYC Members:

As WNYC begins a new year, I want to introduce myself as the new President and Chief Executive Officer of the WNYC Foundation, which has agreed to buy WNYC AM820 and FM93.9 from the City of New York. I am honored to be the first Foundation-appointed President and am enthusiastic about leading the stations into a new era of independence. Although I've spent the last decade at Children's Television Workshop and in the business world, I am in many ways a creature of public radio. I grew up listening to public radio, I had my first professional job as a producer at NPR, and I've been a longtime member of WNYC.

We face a historic opportunity at this time. Independence allows us--in fact challenges us--to dream about what these stations and this institution can be. I believe WNYC AM and FM can be nothing less than the best radio stations in New York and the flagship public radio stations in the country. (continued inside)

To achieve these goals, we will need to establish an even greater level of understanding and trust with you, our members, especially since we are asking you to help us fund the \$20 million purchase price for these stations.

Some of my goals are:

- to better understand WNYC listeners' views about the stations
- to produce and broadcast the highest quality music, news, and public affairs programming that combine substance and entertainment-programming that will be an important part of your daily lives and will keep you tuning in to the stations

• to plan for WNYC's Independence Campaign, raising the full purchase price for the stations.

Independence will matter only if it guarantees programming excellence and economic viability. In my eight years at Children's Television Workshop, I learned to combine business opportunity with creative inspiration to achieve results that were both greatly entertaining and financially sustainable. Now, as I return to my first love, public radio, I want to foster such results at WNYC.

A Decade of The Radio Stage

The Radio Stage celebrates its tenth anniversary this year. In the decade since its inception, The Radio Stage has presented more than 25 original works for radio by a wide range of contemporary playwrights whose diverse and passionate voices represent the complex inner and outer landscapes of our time. According to Sarah Montague, producer for the series, "Radio, the theater of the air, is a medium, both infinite and intimate, bringing the furthest reaches of a writer's imagination to the ear of a single listener. Radio plays transform time and space, break down barriers between waking and dreaming, and create new languages unifying sound and text."



John Schaefer, Director of Music Programming, is the producer and host of *New Sounds* and creator of *Around New York*. "I've spent virtually my entire adult life doing *New Sounds* at WNYC", says John Schaefer (left) who, in 1982, started the program at age 22. *Billboard* magazine calls *New Sounds*, "The #1 radio show for the Global Village." After thousands of hours listening to CD's, cassettes, and tapes, he's developed an instinct for discovering music that goes beyond the mainstream. He has written

numerous magazine articles, CD booklets, and liner notes, and two books. He lives in Brooklyn with his two

daughters, 5-year-old Saratoga and 6-month-old Isabella, and his wife Ellen Shea. Schaefer's passion for horse racing is a poorly-kept secret, and when he's not in the studio or at home, he can often be found at the racetrack. 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
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
