Listener support is the foundation for the future of public radio. City funding for WNYC will end on June 30, 1996. Governor Pataki has proposed no state funds for WNYC next year. Proposals for future federal funding of public broadcasting funding are grossly inadequate.

Who will fund public radio? Right now it's squarely in the hands of all of us who are loyal listeners. But if we can enlist more than 10% of our listeners as WNYC members and if those who give will increase their gifts, I believe we can meet the challenge.

Many of you called us with "stories" describing how WNYC is a part of your life. One listener quit smoking by refocusing the urge for a cigarette to a craving for WNYC. Another exercises with *Fresh Air*. Many, including Beverly Sills, listen in the kitchen. Others, like Itzhak Perlman, listen in traffic. Your audio stories showed the richness and diversity of the WNYC community.

In this house of blues and cold creeps stealthily upon us. I do not dare to do what I fantasize doing. With time the blue congeals into roomlike purple that takes the shape of alcoves, landings... Everything is like something else. I should have waited before I learned this.

Around The World in 60 Minutes

Weekends are quieter. I concentrate with the listeners on the music. I can really sink into the rhythm and flow of the program. I confess I miss the fast pace of producing the weekday live performance segment. We have a terrific team at *Around New York*. Our technical director Mike DeMark is astounding, and our engineers are perfectionists. And, Fred and I have a great time."

Morton Gould Remembered

John Schaefer, WNYC's Music Programming Director, remembers the man and his music. "Gould was a preeminent American composer; equally important, he was a longtime friend of WNYC and a really swell guy. One of his best-known works, "Spritiuals for Orchestra," was written for one of WNYC's first American Music Festivals more than half a century ago.

In 1994, when we were putting together the gala concert to celebrate FM's 50th birthday, I asked

Morton to write a song for the occasion. Typically, he got into the spirit and wrote a little ragtime piano piece for us as well! Both works were premiered at our Alice Tully Hall event, with Morton introducing them, and the audience got a glimpse into the humor and warmth that made Morton such a beloved figure in the music world.

Two weeks before he died, I was in San Francisco at a music conference for which Morton gave the keynote address. Part of his address was a very funny bit about how lucky we were to have him there, given that two major musical reference books said he was already dead! That seems ironic and sad now. We will all miss him."
