

25 Years of Considering All Things

This month marks the 25th anniversary of NPR's *All Things Considered*, the program that revolutionized the way we listen to news on the radio. Every night for 25 years, listeners have turned to *ATC* for a calm, informative rendering of the day's news. We've gotten the lowdown on military buildups and government crackdowns, reports on medical break-throughs, and winds of economic change at home and abroad. We've gotten insights into artists and culture. And we've gotten the commentators who transcend the daily news with essays on everything from twilight dancing to the simple pleasures of milking a cow.

In the beginning we also got "moments of extreme terror" when broadcasts included the liberal use of

the "Panic Button," according to current host Linda Wertheimer, who started as a production assistant. "That device provided 30-second musical interludes that the director threw on the air when tapes and scripts were out of reach and things began falling apart. That button was used 18 times during *ATC*'s first month." After its shaky start, *ATC* went on to set new standards for broadcast journalism.



Some milestones:

1971 *All Things Considered* debuts on May 3, Robert Conley is the *ATC* host; Linda Wertheimer is director, and Susan Stamberg is tape editor.

1976 Susan Stamberg and science editor Ira Flatow venture with listeners into a dark closet to prove that Wint-O-Green Lifesavers actually spark when you bite into them.

Rene Montagne and Robert Siegel **1981** Noah Adams' award-winning documentary, *Father Cares: The Last of Jonestown*, is broadcast.

1989 Robert Siegel, Linda Wertheimer, and Noah Adams team up as anchors.

1991 Neal Conan is missing for a week during the Gulf War.

1992 Nina Totenberg wins numerous awards for her coverage of the Clarence Thomas/Anita Hill hearings.

1995 ATC expands to two hours and begins programming an hour earlier.

After all these years, *ATC* is still one of public radio's crown jewels – an enlightening, engaging (and sometimes eccentric) window on the world, which reflects both our commonality and our diversity. A Musical Garland

David Garland, who programs and pre-

sents *Evening Music* and *Spinning on Air*, has had a lifelong passion for music. "Growing up near Boston, I learned early on that public radio was the place to turn for the really interesting music," David says. Garland graduated from the Rhode Island School of Design, moved to New York, and has been a graphic designer and a

composer/performer. After working at WKCR, he came to WNYC nearly ten years ago.

"Evening Music is primarily a classical show, with occasional forays into jazz, vocal jazz, and world music," says David. Recurring features include a complete opera on the first Friday of each month and film music after 10pm each Thursday. "In the course of a month I'll give listeners the chance to get to know a group of works, such as the Reger cello sonatas, the Mahler symphonies, or Mozart's 'Haydn' string quartets."

Spinning on Air was recently cited by The New York Times as one of ten "bright

spots" in New York popular music radio. Each week the show focuses on a particular artist, genre, or conceptual theme.

John Schaefer, Director of Music Programming, comments, "Everybody's favorite *Spinning on Air* show seems to be David's infamous three-hour 'Hawaiian War Chant Extravaganza,' which got written up in *Honolulu Magazine* and *The Wall Street*

Journal. But I happen to like his interview with Jeri Southern, a distinctive but reclusive singer who has been out of the limelight. I still wonder how he pulled that together."

David says, "I'll always be grateful to public radio for introducing me to a world of music, so I'm delighted to do my part to ensure that there's great music-in all its variety and vitality-on the air."



A Peabody for Oscar

Longtime WNYC radio host Oscar Brand received the prestigious George Foster Peabody Personal Award in recognition of his outstanding contributions to broadcasting. Brand has hosted *Folksong Festival*, now heard every Saturday at 8pm on FM93.9, for 50 years. Only four Peabodys for radio were awarded, two of them to other public radio programs, *St. Paul Sunday* and *Wynton Marsalis: Making the Music.*

Coincidentally, Oscar shared a Peabody in 1982 with Laura Walker, then a producer at NPR, for *The Sunday Show*. This is WNYC's sixth Peabody. Congratulations, Oscar!


