WNYC is the official radio partner of Carnegie Hall's 1996-97 season. We asked Judith Arron, Carnegie Hall Executive Director, for some insights on their upcoming season and mission.

Whenever we approach the start of a new season at Carnegie Hall, I feel, along with great anticipation, a renewed sense of amazement at the tradition of the place, and then pride in the new chapter of that tradition of excellence about to begin. I always think that each new year is the best one yet, and 1996-97 is overflowing with major events and exciting new projects. A Brahms festival, a Schubert focus, the best of the world's orchestras and soloists, the Carnegie Hall Jazz Band, intimate evenings in Weill Recital Hall – the quality of the concert experience here is unmatched.


On Your Mark, Get Set, Go!

"It's great to be back in New York. I love the smell of the subway. It takes me back to my youth... an electrical smell makes me feel like a kid again!" says Arthur Cohen, WNYC's new Vice President of Programming and Operations.

Born in Bensonhurst, Brooklyn, Arthur comes to WNYC from Minnesota Public Radio. "My father was a classical music listener," says Cohen. "As a teenager, I listened to everything but classical music. I rebelled... I listened to Cousin Brucie and Murray the K on my transistor

radio. As I grew older, my appetite for classical music returned."

At Minnesota Public Radio, universally recognized as a premiere member of the public radio system, Cohen oversaw two regional networks – one news and information and the other, classical music. At WNYC he directs all programming and operations for WNYC AM820 and FM93.9.

"Independence from the city gives us an opportunity to inject vitality into the station. It is a unique opportunity to connect with the community and to make present, on the air, the incredible culture of the city," says Cohen. "I am extremely excited to join WNYC at this time."

"I enjoy the two different hostings. To get up in front of our most wonderful live audience at Symphony Space is one kind of fun. Then it is a completely different kind of

joy to work with WNYC producer Sarah Montague and Kathy Minton, Symphony Space producer, and to assemble the live readings from all over the country and create a radio show.

"People just love listening to a good story. Selected Shorts is so popular because, I believe, there is still a hunger, a deep-rooted desire – maybe from childhood or from past generations of storytelling – for a story to be read to us. It is very soothing."


For Isaiah the audience is very much part of the show. "They listen attentively and they'll go with you, even with a subtle story that is not easy to 'get'. Someone once accused us of adding a laugh track on the radio series – they just couldn't believe how the audience responded," Sheffer says. "Ridiculous! That is just what this audience sounds like; we don't add anything!"


