The Methodist church-one of the oldest and largest of the protestant denominations — has adopted the modern science of radio as a means extending and correlating its ot work.

The Omaha area, consisting of about 1,500 churches in Nebraska and Iowa, with a membership of 323,000, has purchased 52 Sunday afternoon half hours on WOW at

commercial rates. The guiding spirit in the series is Dr. G. Bromley Oxnam, resident bishop, who presides over Iowa and Nebraska Methodist churches.

"The purpose of this series of pro-grams is to unite the 323,000 Ne-braska and Iowa Methodists in one gigantic church service every Sun-day afternoon," said Doctor Oxnam. Announcements calling attention to the program have been made in each of the 1,500 churches in our area."

Doctor Oxnam has made recent visits to Spain, Russia, Germany, Italy, the Orient, France and Great Britain. He is one of the nation's leading churchmen. He has served beading churchmen. He has served as professor of social ethics at the University of Southern California, professor of practical theology at Boston university, and was for eight years president of De Pauw university at Greencastle, Ind. He is the author of many books on religious and social problems, including "The Mexican in Los Angeles," "Social Principles of Jesus," "Russian Im-pressions" and "Youth in New America." America

Wireless Net

Wireless Net The first "White Spot" program was presented February 6 from WOW's main studios, and was car-ried free of charge by a wireless network over stations KMMJ, Clay Center; KGFW, Kearney; WJAG, Norfolk; KGNF, North Platte; WAAW, Omaha, and KGKW, Scottsbluff. The Central States sta-tions, unable to clear the same time, tions, unable to clear the same time, prepared and are presenting a sim-ilar series over KOIL, KFOR and

KFAB. As far as could be determined, this is the first time in the history of radio that every radio station in the state has whole-heartedly united in a booster campaign.

National in Scope



W.O.W. Camps Start Drive For President's All-Member Campaign

March is an important month in the Woodmen of the World Life Insurance Society, which owns sta-tion WOW.

For it was 39 years ago, in March, that De Emmett Brad-shaw first became a Woodmen official. In observance of Mr. Brad-shaw's anniversary, a gigantic mem-bership campaign was launched and will continue until April 15. It is called "The President's All-Member campaign." campaign.

The society now has about 385,-000 members.

As an incentive to Woodmen to get new members, a series of beautiful and expensive premiums will be offered, ranging from an automatic pen to a 21-jewel Elgin watch. Local camp secretaries can supply details of the "All-Member" campaign.

Cash Refunds

During February the society paid out \$1,000,000 in cash refunds to 300,000 members of the society. The amount represented a savings made possible by efficient management by the society's officers and directors.

So great was the task of distributing the refunds that 60 clerks worked for five weeks preparing the checks and putting them in the mails.

As a part of the campaign for new members, the story of Mr. Brad-shaw's remarkable career is being retold in thousands of Woodmen camps all over the nation.

Studied Law

Mr. Bradshaw was born in a tiny Arkansas town called Rocky Bayon, in the foothills of the Ozarks. He attended rural elementary schools and eventually emerged with a bachelor of science degree from the National Normal university at Le-banon, Ohio. Still later he was graduated in law from the University of Arkansas. He was actively engaged in the practice of law until he moved to Omaha in 1916.

Elected President

It was in 1899 that Mr. Bradshaw was elected head consul for Arkansas. Louisiana and Mississippi, his first Woodmen executive post. He soon became general attorney, and in November, 1932, he was elected president of the society.

Mr. Bradshaw has been active in civic affairs. He served as king of Ak-Sar-Ben, a regent of the Mu-Ak-Sar-Ben, a director of the Mu-mipical university, a governor of Ak-Sar-Ben, a director of the Com-munity Chest board, and in many other civic capacities. He is also a member of the board of directors of the Omaha National bank and the Nabraska Power Co. Peccently the Nebraska Power Co. Recently he was appointed chairman for Ne-braska of the New York world's fair committee.

Three stations in the United States and 23 in Canada were added to the Benny network with the first broadcast of 1938.

"Wig Waggin" It's Never Too to be Sponsored Late To Learn

NOTE.-A clear, easy-to-understand speaking voice is a prime requisite of every person in radio. Such a voice would be an ex-tremely valuable asset to any man, woman or child. Not every person CAN have a good radio voice, but every person CAN IMPROVE his speech. Hence, the article here-with on "How to Talk," by Milton A. Rieck, well-known Omaha voice Coach, who has helped scores of WOW folks. Study and practice Mr. Rieck's speech aids and you, too, will derive a real benefit.—The Editor.

The tongue is the chief organ of speech. It is composed of numer-ous muscles, each of which must be properly controlled in correct production of speech.

Enunciation is practically impos sible without the manipulation of the tongue. To demonstrate this fact, hold the tongue flat in the mouth and try to speak; that is, speak without any activity in the muscles of the tongue. For instance, without moving the tongue, try to sav the following sentence: "As say the following sentence: "As light as the tips of the drops of the rain."

Much thought and attention have been given to breathing, voice placing. etc., in speech formation and in the correction of speech defects, but the chief actor, the tongue, has been neglected. Thirteen of the 21 consonants in the English language; namely, c, d, g, j, k, l, n, q, r, s, t, various positions assumed by that

organ. We can, therefore, readily understand that the training of the tongue is fundamental to the production of correct speech.

To a great extent the finish and beauty of speech, as well as distinct articulation and clear enunciation, are dependent upon the strength and flexibility necessary in the diffi-cult and delicate feat of speaking must be gained by systematic training training.

A set of exercises for the development and control of the muscles of the tongue is here given:

(Sense the tip of the tongue as if you had a thread or a feather at the end of it.)

La, la, li, lo. Ta, ta, ti, to. Na, na. ni, no. Da, da, di, do.

"Twinkle homeward through the twilight."







PRESENTING WOW'S MIKEMEN Gillin Tells of **Opportunities** in Radio Arts

EDITOR'S NOTE. - Recently "The Gateway," student newspaper of the Municipal University of Omaha asked Mr. Gillin to describe the opportunities for young men and women in radio. The article aroused so much comment that it is herewith reproduced.

Every day in the week at least one young man or woman asks me some variation of this question: "Would you advise me to adopt ra-dio as my life work?" Sincerely, I wish I could answer that question "Yes" or "No," but it can't be done. Badio, at least in the broadcast

Radio, at least in the broadcast-ing end of it, is a business for spe-cialists. Every job in a radio station requires some special inborn talent or some exacting training. Most radio jobs require even a specialized type of personality. There are no

soft berths in radio. This is all important. Every phase of radio moves so swiftly that radio today has no time to stop or hesitate long enough to train anyone for any job. Apprentices get in the way in a modern radio station and are likely to be tramped on. If you enter any field of radio, be prepared

to step right in and carry on. Generally speaking, the radio art, or industry, if you choose to call it that, breaks down into six divisions, Viz:

- Technical. (1)
- (2) Talent.
- (3) Production. Commercial. (4)
- (5) News. (6) Administrative.

Not much need be said of the technical division except that any-one entering this field must have technical training, and special inter-est and enthusiasm. Part of this field is already unionized, and the pay starts at about \$35 a week—and the sky's the limit. Facsimile, tele-vision and a million and one other uses of radio waves are "new fields" and future possibilities.

For some strange reason, nearly everyone thinks he has radio talent. About 999 out of 1,000 are dead wrong in this respect. This is not intended to discourage anyone. If you think you can sing, act, speak or play some instrument to comof play some instrument to com-pete with the very best professional talent of the day anywhere in the world, then by all means arrange for an audition for yourself with the program director of some radio station. All talent in modern radio is professional talent. Arrangement of pay is from \$3 a program to \$10,000 a program.

"Idea" Folks

Perhaps the largest division in the entire broadcasting industry is in the field of production. Herein men and women think up, write and produce radio programs of all types. This division includes "idea" men and women, continuity writers, an-nouncers, dramatic instructors, etc. Radio is beginning to pay more and more production workers as their value is more and more appreciated.

The commercial department of radio is the department that brings in the money. Almost all radio stations are in business solely for the purpose of making money. An expert time salesman earns big money. usually from \$3,000 a year up. The radio salesman must know the lis-tener audience, the market he sells, and many, many other facts. Selling radio advertising is distinctly dif-ferent from selling any other kind of advertising. A comparatively new and in-trigning field in radio is the radio news department. Gathering and presenting of news for radio is an art in itself. Strangely enough, newspaper training is of little value. Today the correct art of radio news reporting and presentation can be learned only in a modern radio station. Like all news work, pay is comparatively small. Sooner or later the pay for the radio news worker must increase. Lastly, there is the administration side. This includes clerical help, (Continued to page 7, column 2)
