DW SETS SPRING SPECIALS

Governors Aid Moving Day Setup

Governor Dwight Griswold of Nebraska and Governor George A. Wilson of Iowa assued simultaneously identical proclamations re-

cently, calling attention to radio moving day, March 29.

On this day, more than 9 out of 10 radio stations changed wavelengths throughout the United States. The purpose of the proclamation was to advise listeners to reset the push buttons on their radio sets, so that they would not miss any of their favorite radio programs. WOW's wavelength remains unchanged—590 kilocycles. The proclamation issued by Governor Griswold was as follows:

wold was as follows:

"Whereas, The government of the United States of America has entered into treaties with certain sister republics in this hemisphere for the improvement of radio broadcast reception; and

"Whereas, Under such treaties certain radio broadcast frequencies must be reallocated among American radio broadcast stations on March 29, 1941, with Nebraska radio broadcast stations being assigned the following frequencies:

"Whereas, It is deemed by me important that the benefits of such reallocation be speedily made available to the citizens of Nebraska, in order that there be the least possible confusion in the reception of news, educational and public service broad-

casts and entertainment.

"Now, therefore. I proclaim that Saturday, March 29, 1941, be known as 'Radio Moving Day' throughout the State of Nebraska, and I urge our citizens to make any necessary adjustment of their receivers as promptly as possible.

Calling of Square Dances is the Newest Art

And now the traditional art of calling square dances has bowed to

the machine age.

Time was when the barn dance boss needed to know only five standard square dance calls, but those days are gone forever, and all because of radio, according to Arkie, the Arkansas Woodchopper, who calls the dances on the Alka-Seltzer "National Barn Dance" each Saturday at 8 p. m., Omaha time, over WOW and the NBC Red network.

Arkie, who has been calling square dances since he was 8 years old and was one of the first radio callers, starting in 1928, explains that in the old days the dancers themselves were the only ones to hear the chant and they were too busy dancing to care about variety in the callers'

rhymes.

That was when five standard dances were in vogue. They were the Ocean Wave, Grapevine Twist, Sally Goodwin, Bird in the Cage and Cheat or Swing. The conventional opening for every square dance went like this: "Lady right, gent on left, join eight hands and circle to your left; break and swing, form a line, reverse back, lady in form a line, reverse back, lady in the lead and gent behind; all eight dance as purty as you can, gents to the left with your left hand."

However, radio brought a vast audience, which does nothing but listen to the caller and the music. They want a change in rhyme each week. So Arkie himself has originated more than 150 different variations of the square dance routine, with such calls as "Call the cow to catch the calf, meet your partners once and a half," and "Back to your partner, right and left through, shuffle along like an old choo choo."



On April 27 (before you get your next News Tower) Daylight Savings Time will go into effect in the east, and network programs will come to you one hour earlier.

HARRY BURKE TALKS TO EDUCATORS

Radio is Proud of Record With Schools

Radio is proud to be sharing in the protection of the democratic way of life in the United States, Program Manager Harry



Burke of Radio Station WOW declared in a talk before the Missouri Valley Conference on Adult Education at Hotel Fonte-nelle recently. It was a part of a panel discussion on the subject of adult education and national defense.

Harry Burke "These are days when American institutions are the subject of attack both at home and abroad," Burke said. "The question is being asked, as it was in Lincoln's time, whether this nation or any nation so conceived and so dedicated can long endure. I believe it can."

Burke declared that the education of the masses is being greatly enhanced by radio broadcasting.

"Radio is a mass medium. It reaches both the rich and the poor. It reaches the leaders and the led. It reaches the literate and those who cannot read. It brings the treasures of education to all like. As David Sarnoff said, "The richest man in the world cannot buy for himself what the poorest man in the world gets free by radio."

Burke pointed out that approximately half of the network programs now on the air are definitely educational in character. These programs in no sense take the place of the teacher, he added. Teachers in kindergartens, all grades, high schools and colleges, he said, are using material heard on the radio for classroom discussions.

Burke gave a report on the recent Chicago convention, where educa-tors from throughout the nation discussed the use of radio broad-casting for educational purposes.

Although we are to take up in this chapter the mechanism of the voice, we must always remember the real foundation of the speaking voice is the THINKING.

Speech sounds are first thought before they are expressed by the voice. For example, a person may happiness, or big-heartedness are first in the person's character
his general thinking — before they can come forth in his voice.

Thinking First

You think about tones, you think about words, or the ideas for which the words stand. Never lose

much quicker progress in voice improvement, if, instead of working mainly from the standpoint of the mechanical, you work from the standpoint of your thinking.

You will have to consider, of course, the action of your lungs and the other organs of your vocal apparatus, as you study the voice mechanism. You will have to take exercises for the correct use in speech of your tongue and lips. But, after you have established, or fixed, the correct ways of using these organs, you must forget all about the exact ways of doing these things. Otherwise, you might become lip-conscious or tongue-conscious, or even tone-conscious. Such methods in speaking are considered poor, for they give a machine-like effect to speech.

The organs of speech that make up the voice mechanism are as fol-

We look forward to the warmth of spring after a long winter of cold weather, blizzards and many days of dreariness.

And along with spring, we have many occasions for our entertainment features . . . the post-Lenten days. This gives us a grand excuse for a party, a luncheon, or even just an afternoon tea. We'll let the refreshing color of

green dominate the decorations, and we'll find it quite a lift to our spirits after the heavier tones used in the preceding season's entertainments.

How about a luncheon? There's something so gay and festive about a spring luncheon. An interesting menu came across my desk the other day, and I'd like to pass it on to you. All of the dishes are easy to prepare, and even the suggestions for the table centerpiece are the kind that you can make up yourself. Here's the menu:

SPRING LUNCHEON Fruit Cup, Topped with Lime Ice Celery Curls Olives Celery Curls
Fish Souffle
Shoestring Potatoes
Buttered New Asparagus
Emerals Salad Shamrock Rolls
Pistachio Ice Cream Cup Cakes
Mints Coffee

Check that menu carefully. It's a simple one-to-serve. The fruit cup is all prepared and chilled in the refrigerator and the dip of lime ice added at the last minute... the shoestring potatoes can be made up shoestring potatoes can be made up the day before your party, then they need only to be heated when you're ready to serve . . . the salad is a molded salad — take grapefruit sections and diced cucumber, and mold them in lime gelatin in little shamrock molds . . . the shamrock rolls may be baking powder biscuits cut in the shapes of shamrocks, or you may buy the rolls and heat them in may buy the rolls and heat them in the oven to freshen them. I'll give you the recipe for the fish souffle, because that is the only dish that needs any preparation at the last minute.

First, let's have a few ideas for this table centerpiece. Table decorations for your luncheon table can be made at home easily and economically. If you want flowers as a centerpiece, you can make appropriate centrings by bellevites. priate containers by hollowing out nicely-scrubbed Idaho potatoes. A little wire doubled back and forth can be inserted to hold the flowers in place. Spring flowers are a good

Now, here's your recipe for the fish souffle:

Two tablespoons butter.
Two tablespoons flour.
One-fourth teaspoon pepper.
One teaspoon salt.
One and one-half cups milk.
One teaspoon grated onion. One teaspoon grated onion.
One tablespoon minced parsley.
One large can fish flakes.
Three eggs, separated.

Make a white sauce of the butter, flour, salt, pepper and milk. Add this to the onion, parsley and fish flakes, which have been separated with a fork. Beat egg yolks until light, then add the fish mixture. Fold in the stiffly-beaten egg whites. Pile in a buttered two-quart casserole. Bake 45 to 60 minutes in an oven preheated to 325 degrees. Of course, a souffle, to be its very best, must be served just as soon as possible after being taken from the oven.






