THERE is no entertainer in show business that the public feels it "knows" better than the lovable old skinflint, Jack Benny. Operating for some 17 years behind the opaque curtain of radio, Benny has created and fostered a character whose foibles and flaws everybody knows. The character of course is himself—the penny pinching, buffetted, mistreated 39-year-old with a motley assortment of friends, an ancient automobile and a pair of baby blue eyes.

Benny is an era. An era that the show world will seldom ever see again. He was only recently voted the outstanding entertainment figure in the last 25 years. Now, after bridging the gap from radio to TV, his in-the-flesh appearance in the new medium is like meeting an old pen pal for the first

time.


The theory behind the Benny success is succinctly summed up like this: "gags die, humor remains." Jack plays on the endless humor of a series of exaggerations and elaborations with characters who have been carefully drawn over the years.. The success of his theory has carried over to the famous supporting cast of the Benny clan. Already established as stars in their own right are Phil Harris, the bourbonized band leader with a consummate ego: Dennis Day, the gullible tenor; Rochester, the raspy voiced valet who knows his boss better than anyone; and Mary Livingstone, Jack's wise-cracking perennial girl friend.

Unlike conventional comedians, Jack is not, of himself, a funny guy. He could never stand on his feet, for instance, and publicily challenge a Fred Allen or a Groucho Marx to a battle of wits. The results would be disastrous. Either Marx or Allen would verbally thrash him into an early retreat. Once when actually getting the worst of it with Allen, Jack moaned, "If I had my writers here you wouldn't get away with this."

No ad-libber (he freely admits it), Benny was the subject of another of baggy-eyed Fred Allen's gems: "Jack Benny," pronounced rival Allen, "couldn't ad-lib a belch after a Hungarian dinner."

The department where skinflint Benny far outstrips his fellow comedians, however, is delivery. Give him a line

and if there is an iota of humor in it, Jack will milk it. He can wring a laugh—just by a masterful inflection—out of an auditor's report. His timing, probably the most essential element in humor, is flawless. Seldom has a line delivered by Benny been smothered by audience applause or laughter, a common occurrence among less skilled comics.

Perhaps the most famous case of Benny's uncanny timing was the incident of his "holdup" on his radio show few years ago, Trailed by two gangsters down a lonely street, he was confronted by one of the "stick-up" men who gave him the conventional underworld ultimatum of "your money or your life." The hoodlums were awaiting an answer. Then for 25 seconds (a lifetime of silence in radio) Benny said nothing, nary a word. It was an utterly masterful way of convulsing an audience by sheer silence. Here was a joke which required years of character building to bring off. Benny, the notorious miser, the penurious millionaire, was actually thinking it over. By the time his audience (which knew so well

his thinking processes) was almost sick with laughter, he threw them into higher hysterics by uttering a still undecided, "We-e-e-ell."

The subject of Benny's miserly reputation is something the comedian never ceases to fight when not in character. Although most people realize the skinflint pose is a gambit for laughs, Jack leaves no room for mistake. As a kind of calculated counterpropaganda he spends money like an Egyptian monarch. When entertaining the overseas troops he paid all his own expenses. At Christmas time, he lavishes expensive gifts on his friends. It is impossible to pay a check at bars or restaurants when he is present. And bellboys, porters and cab drivers rank him at the top of the list in the tipping department.

The opposite types of the professional Benny and the personal Benny stamp the comedian as another show business schizophrenic. In spite of his tremendous success he is forever seeking generally dictates a diet of fingernails and black coffee.

She is reported as feeling that after the video electrons work their magic, she won't appear very glamorous to her viewers. . . . Warmest sight on TV in a long time: the appearance of Met opera stars Roberta Peters and Robert Merrill on "Toast of the Town" recently, when Ed Sullivan announced their engagement to be married in April. Merrill, who was not scheduled to appear, stood at his fiance's side while she dreamily warbled Cole Porter's "So In Love With You Am I."

Who's Who in America has included in its first batch of stars who gained their fame through television. Sid Caesar, Imogene Coca and Burr Tillstrom are now listed with the greats from all other fields. . . . The "new" Faye Emerson is winning a larger audience than ever before. Currently holding down two network shows, CBS's "Wonderful Town" and DuMont's "Author Meets the Critics," Faye is somewhat less sensational than of yore, but her newly acquired charm is catching on.

Shoe-on-the-other-foot dept.: Dagmar, who began her "Canteen" show March 22, is in a peculiar spot. In a position to hire her old boss Jerry Lester (currently unemployed), she probably won't. Buxom Dag got her first big break from Lester on "Broadway Open House," but the comic allegedly resented the fact that she was getting the headlines and cut down her material. A private rift ensued and now Jerry is on the outside looking in. . . . Martin & Lewis, who will gross two million dollars this year, unhesitantly agree that TV takes the most out of them physically.

Joe E. Brown, subbing for Arthur Godfrey, played Cupid to the hilt on a "Talent Scout" program recently. Interviewing a scout, he found out she had her heart set on a young man in the audience. He lives quietly with his wife Mary Livingstone (who as Sayde Marks, a May Co. salesgirl, married Jack in 1926) and their adopted daughter, Joan, who is 16. His host of friends includes other career couples, among them George Burns and Gracie Allen, Mr. and Mrs. Danny Daye and Dr. and Mrs. Joel Pressman (Claudette Colbert).

His favorite author is the English satirist Stephan Leacock and in the line of comedians Benny claims George Burns is the "funniest man alive," with crony Danny Kaye following closely behind.

The early life of Benny Kubelsky, the young man from Waukegan, Illinois (now a show biz shrine), hardly augured the creation of a comedian. Benny was a musician, a serious-minded youth whose father—a haberdasher —had aspirations for him to become a well-known violin virtuoso. At eight he was giving local concerts. While still in his teens he played in small orchestras at school dances and policemen's balls. At 17 he teamed with another youngster in a duet that was described as a "dumb" act because neither of them spoke. The effect of the two silent performers was a numbing one on their audience except when Benny paused to "ham" up the act by sawing away at his instrument, the little finger of his bow hand extended affectedly while his eyes followed the action in mock curiosity. The laughs he got kept the act alive.

In 1918, when 22 (a crushing statistic for our perennial 39-year-old) Jack joined the Navy and discovered his potentials as a laugh-getter. Playing with the Maritime Frolice Revue at the

Great Lakes Naval Training Station, he included a little patter with his violin playing, poking fun at his ability and playing off key. His fellow gobs were a good audience and young Ben was encouraged to make entertaining a career.

Upon being discharged after World War I, Jack threw himself into the show world with added gusto. By 1921 he was playing the bigger theaters in New York. Having changed his name (which people confused with Ben Berfrom Benny Kubelsky to Ben K. Benny nie) and eventually to his present monicker, Jack was enjoying a successful career. Already a veteran of Earl Carrol's Vanities and having made a couple of Hollywood pictures he debuted on radio—the industry he was to revolutionize—in 1932.

Appearing as a guest of columnist Ed Sullivan (currently a top ranking TV star himself), Jack's first radio utterance was this classic opening line: "This is Jack Benny talking — now there will be a brief pause for everyone to say. 'Who Cares?'"

A short time later Benny landed his

own show—with a sponsor—and he has been among the top three radio personalities ever since. Today, making his swing to TV a gradual process, he remains as one of the few big names working steadily in radio. Partly from sentimental attachment, partly for hard business reasons, he has stayed in the older medium. As one of the remaining vestiges of great names in radio, Jack's laugh formula has been rushing thru "wireless" network veins like last-ditch plasma.

Next season television will fully inherit this "era" known as Jack Benny, Judging from his first four or five TV appearances, Jack will probably concentrate on situation comedy just as he has done on radio, but, naturally, the slant will be on action. The character he crated will remain unblemacter he created will remain unblemvanity, his shocking manners in society, his inept, but prideful violin playing will still be a part of the Benny makeup. The old crew, Mary, Don Wilson, Rochester, Dennis and Phil will make periodic visits. Many of the old standby props will be used-his famous basement vault, the home-installed pay telephone, his gabby parrot and, of course, his celebrated Maxwell.

For a man who a few years ago was satisfied with ending his career quietly in radio, Jack Benny has certainly had a change of heart. But as the old skinflint puts it, "You can't quit when you're just 39."

LET'S TALK TELEVISION: PRO and CON

By JOAN OSSEFORT

Television, for all its virtues, has one very bad habit. It is often inclined to ride things to death. If it finds a new type program which has proved a success, lo and behold, before another Monday has gone by, there are at least six more such productions on the TV channels.

It has done that with quiz programs, with variety shows and with drama programs. With mystery programs, it has gone all overboard. But there are a few outstanding programs which as yet, at least, have not been picked up and worked to death by each and every network.

There is, for instance, the Firestone Hour, which happens to be a program of semi-classical music. The only other venture that came close to approaching Firestone's parade of fine singers was the Ezio Pinza show.

Even that was a horse of a slightly



different color. Some sort of feeble plot was generally woven thruout the program, with Ezio spouting off melodically at short intervals, and usually a guest artist thrown in here or there to share the spotlight. The program was an enjoyable one—is, I should

say, for it is still on WOC on Friday night at 7. It is a pleasantly relaxing half hour which requires no serious concentration or draining of the tear ducts.

But RCA Victor, sponsors of the show, apparently decided Pinza was being overdone. The market for classical music, while there is such a market, is smaller than the popular music market. And the Pinza brand of humor is generally a little heavy-handed. So RCA played it smart and safe and teamed Pinza up with a fresh young tenor by the name of Dennis Day, who is not only a good popular singer, but also has a brand of humor

more apt to catch on with the general public.

Day made one movie once which did not go over very big with anyone, and he immediately and wisely abandoned that field. He was discovered several years ago by Jack Benny and is most famous, probably, in his role as a Benny stooge. But even without the well-known Benny name to back him, Dennis does very well.

In addition to having a pleasant voice, he has a remarkable talent for mimicry. And strangely enough, his imitations are not limited to James Cagney, Humphrey Bogart and Edward G. Robinson. He does Sir Harry Lauder very realistically, but he is not limited to a Scotch dialect. He is not, in fact, limited at all. He can even imitate the voices of women, such as Red Hot Mama, Sophie Tucker, quite well.

On his bi-monthly RCA Victor show, Dennis strings together a few songs, a few imitations and some remarkably funny sequences with Verna Felton, who portrays his over-domineering mother.


Possibly, if the networks are going to seize on any phase of the Dennis Day show to over-manufacture, that will be the phase. The psychology of motherhood has become a popular fad since Phil Wylie first started writing books on the subject, but up to now it has been a serious criticism of the over-protective, overly-domineering & overly-idolized Mom.

The Friday night show, innocuously titled A Day in the Life of Dennis Day, picks up the theme and turns it into a sort of burlesque of the too-muchmother idea.

Which is probably a fine thing. In this day and age we are inclined to become too rabid about a good many things and to look too hard for a scapegoat of some sort to pin all our troubles on. When we get too intense on any given subject, it is sometimes a good idea to hold it up, at least temporarily, in the light of ridicule. It's a good way to get the proper perspective back again.


