### Music's Contributions to the "BRIGHT NEW WORLD"

Licensing agencies, individual music and record firms, bandleaders, singers and other music personalities are all participating in building that better world which was ballyhooed so strongly during the war . . . and for which all nations are now struggling.

a more harmonious (no pun intended) relationship between one country and another. First, of course, is the obvious economic factor. It was expected, and it developed that soon after the war's end, the American licensing agenices-American Society of Composers. Authors and Publishers; Broadcast Music, Inc.; Soicety of European Composers, and others-reopened with renewed vigor their negotiations with foreign organizations representing composers and publishers. Tho these dealings unquestionably have their "sharper" side, none can dispute the fact that their ultimate result is to bring about a greater interchange of international music and a greater feeling of neighborliness. This latter feeling is caused not only by an ever-increasing appreciation

HILE the Statesmen and diplomats (in whose hands rests at least the surface shaping of that bright new world we heard so much about during the war) battle over the BNW bluenrint, music continues to make its unobtrusive, at times imperceptible, contribution to a closer understanding between people and nations. It not only continues to make such contributions but thru the war has found new methods of participating in building a better world.

In the nation's schools, of course, almost concurrent with the child's progress in the fundamentals of reading and language, he is taught thru the simple, melodious medium of the songs he sings faith, kindness, generosity, unselfishness and other truly basic essentials for better living. And depending on geographical area and other conditions, this process continues thru most of the young person's early life.

### International Harmony

In the world of commercial music all factors tend to create

of each respective nation's culture, as represented by music, but perhaps even more by the fact that composers and publishers once again (with qualifications depending on various international financial agreements) find renewed and profitable markets for their wares in neighboring lands.

### U. S. and U. S. S. R.

Even Russia and America, who thru one international confab after another since the end of the war have failed to see eye to eye, are drawing more closely together on the musical level. Helen Black, American exec in the Preslit Agency (Russia's equivalent of ASCAP) returned from Moscow recently and told American publishers that it was the USSR's feeling that an international reciprocal copyright agreement would be worked out between the USSR and the U.S. before January, Encylcopedia of Music is printed such an agreement several other Yank publishers.

will have been worked out.) And it certainly cannot cause grief to any Russian music men to collect the American money which Leeds' Am-Rus has collected on American usage of Russian music in the past 12 months.

### English and Yanks

The international exchange. of course, has been developing not only on the licensing agency level but has seen much progress among individual publishers. Leeds (whose Russian relationship was just mentioned) also has French and English firms. Latter is called Peter Maurice, Inc., and the firm of the same name has set up a Leeds, Ltd., 1947. (Perhaps before this in London. Irving Berlin has an English operation, as do

And as this article is being written - Jack Robbins and Reg Connelly are laying the groundwork for new, hitherto untried English-Yank business reciprocity. The music industry confidently expects this marked trend to continue at an accelerated pace, and it must lead to closer understanding, a keener willingness to work together peacefully.

### Band Leaders' and Singers' Efforts

But perhaps the most encouraging facet of the continuing and spreading awareness of the music industry and its people to their responsibility for a share in making that better world of tomorrow is the increased attention given non-trade subjects by music personalities. Participation in domestic and international affairs on the part of music people has never been as marked as in the past year. There is little doubt that this is a direct result of the war and the new awareness of the importance of the contribution they may make, which the war so impressed on music's people. Bing Crosby's leadership of the Infantile Paralysis Committee is a good example. Frank Sinatra's House I Live In, prize-winning film short on tolerance, has been discussed time and again, and Sinatra's general and consistent efforts against intolerance are well known. Less familiar to the average person, but equally effective in their own fashion, are the efforts and monetary contributions of numerous band leaders who have donated proceeds of concerts and dances to various youth organizations (Woody Herman and Louis Jordan are good examples of this) and who generally preached and "sold" the bright new world

in its various ramifications to their fans.

The cynics may say that all these latter personalities are latching on to the domestic and international issues purely for the publicity, but regardless of the motive, their opinions and expressions carry great weight with millions of young Americans, and they consequently can and do play a part in shaping the country's and the world's future. And similarly, regardless of the motive of licensing agencies, individual publishers, or other commercial organizations, the greater interchange of music between one nation and another . . . and the greater exchange of remuneration for that music, the greater must be the willingness and the ability of each country to get along with the other. Music is, and will continue to contribute to a brighter new world.

### Telling Music's

Book publishers, fan magazine editors and columnists, and newspaper pilots all went to town in the past year to a greater extent than ever before. They discovered that music was a business full of amazing and wonderful stories, and told their public (and music's) about them.

NE of the most authentic yardsticks for increased popular acceptance of any industry is the amount of space devoted to it in the newspapers and general magazines and the number of fan magazines and books devoted to the subject. And using that yardstick on the music business quickly reveals that in the past year the industry has moved ahead by leaps and bounds in popular acceptance. While it has suffered (not only in the past year but for several years) from lack of sufficient new stars (they can be counted on the fingers of one hand), it more than made up for this lack by the phenomenal increase in interest in records. This frantic, revived interest easily continued during the past year.

### Book Line-Up

A quick look at the lists in this section show the number and scope of books about the music business published in the past year. This list will stagger even the most rabid music industry disciples.

### Lyric Mags Hot

In the magazine field the lyric books (put out by Lyle Engel, Richard Davis and John Santangelo) had circulations running literally into the millions. Engel was trying a new idea as this Encyclopedia went to press. He was increasing the newsstand price of his magazines from 10c per copy to 15c. This seemed to be a general newsstand trend, coming about the same time, for example, that Life jumped its price from

10c to 15c per copy. Engel, at press time, was still holding up his music fan magazine, to be called *Music Life*, pending a hoped-for pickup in newsstand sales of general books which were considerably off.

### Fan Mags and Columns

The straight fan magazines, however, continued healthy. Bandleaders s u b t i t l e d itself And Record Review and began to feature criticisms of scores of records in addition to the

"life stories" and regular fantype yarn carried. Hollywood Note continued on its stormy way, persisting in its "controversy" technique of discussing whether Joe Name was still the great musicker he used to be or whether he had degenerated into a corn dispenser. The music columns in general magazines rolled on, with editor Lester Grady, of Screenland; Lester Gottlieb, in Radio Romances; Jill Warren, in Movieland; Dixon Gayer, in Screen Stars and Seventeen; Pat Parks, in Miss America;

Leonard Feather, in Modern Screen, Lynn Duddy in Deb, and Joe Sasso, in American Girl, all batting out regular literary riffs about rhythm makers.

### Other Stories and Features

Esquire promoted more solidly than ever its jazz poll and concerts and engineered a pretentious RCA Victor album themed and named after its polls. Saturday Evening Post, Collier's, Liberty and other popular weeklies and month-


### Story to the Public

lies went stronger than ever for feature articles on music and its people. Satevepost, for example, carried stories on the Dorsey Brothers, Eddie Condon, etc. Liberty gave a big play to a Johnny Mercer piece and many others on bandleaders, singers, etc. Collier's carried articles on songwriters, music press agents and plenty of fiction built around the pop music field, latter material mostly by Richard English. All in all, the general magazine field discovered, to a greater extent than ever before in the history of the publishing business, that music was a subject in which the public was intensely interested, that it was a business full of amazing and wonderful stories and that there was big circulation in telling music's story to the public. Between the efforts of these magazine editors, music columnists on daily, weekly, college and high school newspapers and books on the business, music's story was told in the past year more effectively than ever before.

HE JOB of analyzing what secret underlies box-office success in the classical and concert field appears at first practically foolproof unless you know in advance the lucky set of numbers. Only in the music business nobody is told what the "open sesame!" is, because nobody knows.

Many another coloratura may be able to scamper dizzily on the heights of musical pitch besides Lily Pons. Not many, however, are able to live in a six-terrace penthouse with a studio living room big enough to house a specially built 14foot couch. In the youth brackets, Eugene List, 27, and William Kapell, 24, both of whom get \$1,000 or above for a concert, are not running around in multiples.

### What's the Difference

An Iturbi at the moment is a box-office meteor, but on the surface, many others would seem to have his qualifications. Melchior is big and husky and has passed 55. How does he rate being a "matinee idol"? These along with a few other musical names are currently drawing thousands to the box office whenever and wherever they appear. They are making

plenty of money for themselves and their managers. What divides these few musicians who skyrocket into the big money like one of those intricate from those other excellent artcombination locks which are ists who mosey along at a more or less even pace getting neither very rich nor sliding down to the point of really being poor? Why do many fine musicians who aspire to a concert career never quite make the grade?

### The Package Is the Thing

Dissecting an artist's qualifications is a revealing occupation. The artist with a big drawing power has a curious combination of qualities, peculiar to him, which in the aggregate make him an individual with appeal. His assets, some innate, some instinctive, some acquired-some personal, some professional—all add up to a package which interests the public.

Many gifted musicians undoubtedly could develop the combination, given the proper stimulation when it's needed. But the molding of a personality is an elusive task. Good training, sensible advice, proper handling, developing the ability to make friends and proper contacts-all of these help to build a personality and a career. Sometimes the help,

What makes RG **BOX-OFFICE** in the CLASSICAL AND CONCERT MUSIC FIELD?

By HARRIET JOHNSON

This article by the New York Post music critic shows that while analysis is revealing it hardly provides a formula for box - office success. Too many intangibles affect the picture.

whether it's teaching or advice, or any other stimulus, comes too late or at the wrong time. It's worth repeating that great talent alone doesn't spell a big box-office success. The package must jell.

Frequently some sort "break" lights the fuse which sets off the powder keg. In List's case it was his nowfamous Potsdam appearance where he played for the "Big Three." Immediately after, his

fee went up \$500 a concert. Recently in a joint appearance with the New York Philharmonic at the Lewisohn Stadium, he and his wife, Carroll Glenn, drew a crowd of 19,000 people. But-and this is important - before young List went into the army he was one of the finest young pianists currently in the concert field. He did not pay off at the box office as he is now doing, because thru Potsdam he has become of interest to the masses. But his brilliant pianistic gifts, plus his modest, unassuming personality which paradoxically adds up to a spontaneous charm, assured him of a solid success. His Potsdam break hurried things along.

### That Pons Personality

Lily Pons has wisely developed her natural personality according to a formula which her public likes, understands, has come to expect and which has enough appeal to make them buy tickets in droves. She has a model's figure and dresses not only in excellent taste but in the height of fashion. She sings command performances before royalty. She wears jewels which are the presents of kings. On the concert platform she is glamorous, gracious and charming.

She lives the kind of life which breeds excitement and makes good copy. She sings both artistically and brilliantly the type of music which fits her voice. Off stage she is honest, sincere and, being French, combines a practical sense with the volatility of the coloratura's temperament. Thus, her box-office appeal is based both on the personal and professional aspects of her personality. That subtle something which has been gathering momentum thru the years to make her such a big box-office draw is not based on accident or illusion,

### Traubel's Own Value

Such a background or buildup, however, wouldn't suit the nature of Helen Traubel, for instance. Personalities in the music world can't be manufactured with any great degree of success. Intelligent application, however, can make the most of natural tendencies. Miss Traubel, tall and statuesque, could never be a Lily Pons. She has her own value, however, and her price is high, but her name thruout the country is less of a general draw

than Pons or Iturbi Weighty prima donnas, even with the glorious voice of a Traubel, are not the musical idols of the movie public.

### Melchior & Iturbi

The movies have made both Iturbi and Melchior of much more financial value in the concert field than they were before making films. Of significance also is the fact that both of them being over 50, they prove that youth is no necessity for movie popularity. Melchior has proved himself an excellent movie actor and has made an asset out of his great bulk.

Iturbi's success in film assignments now makes his fee per picture around \$100,000. During a recent recital tour of three weeks, during which he played eight concerts, the gross receipts amounted to over \$100,000. The single high figure was Dallas, Tex., March 7, 1946, when the gross was \$15,-265. A recent royalty check to him from RCA-Victor covering six months' record sales added up to \$118,029.69.

### Those Combinations

A glance at the following gives a brief picture of the combinations which seem to ring a continuous bell at the cash register. If you sing or play, take the list as an unofficial questionnaire to see how you fit.

- 1. Brilliant technical and musical gifts combined with an attractive, appealing, on-and-off-stage personality, i.e., Lily Pons, Artur Rubinstein, Ezio Pinza. Eugene List
- 2. Brilliant technical and musical gifts combined with a personality which isn't necessarily appealing in the conventional sense, but which is provocative, peppery or thru some means manages to get itself into print. Sir Thomas Beecham, Grace Moore, Oscar Levant, Leopold Stokowski.
- 3. Brilliant technical and musical gifts combined with a personality which is at once attractive and peppery, i.e., Maggie Teyte, Arturo Toscanini.
- 4. An outstanding personality thru musical gifts of extraordinary caliber. This doesn't mean that the personality is either negative or positive. The boxoffice appeal is primarily a musical one and relatively removed from the artist's offstage personality, i.e., Vladimir Horowitz, Jascha Heifetz, Yehudi Menuhin, William Kapell,

previously solid box office but which have jumped into the big money thru movies and the radio, i. e., Melchior and Iturbi.

### The Teyte "Type"

Obviously none of the preceding categories is hard and fast. Maggie Teyte, for instance, sold out three recitals in Town Hall during the 1945-'46 concert season after being absent from the country for 25 years. Moreover, it's old news now but nonetheless startling that she sold out the hall for these events in each case the day after tickets went on sale. Her personality couldn't account for the business because she was unknown except as a singer who had made phonograph records of extraordinary artistic quality. She had also done a few spot radio engagements. Nonetheless, her engaging personality, combining a five-foot stature with a keen intelligence, afraid of nobody and determined to speak her mind no matter what -these are all adjuncts of a great artistry and an amazingly fresh voice for one who admits to 57 years. Her human qualities have helped her become a box-office draw thru-

out the country.

In all of the afore-mentioned categories, moreover, breaks have a great deal to do with who becomes a name and who doesn't. The so-called "breaks."

however, sometimes work in a subtle way. It's almost impossible to judge when a break is a break in the popular sense and when it comes about as the natural sequence of events. How to draw the dividing line could be argued indefinitely.


### Maryla Jonas' "Break"

Maryla Jonas is a good example. A Polish refugee pianist, unknown and almost pennilcss, she came to this country via South America in the winter of '45, having staked her last dollars on a Carnegie Hall recital. She played shortly after her arrival on February 25. Nobody knew who she was and the hall was almost empty. She awakened the next morning, however, to find herself the principal subject of conversation in musical circles. Her original critical acclaim in the New York press was repeated at a second Carnegie recital, tho her program was inadequate and indicated a basic lack of pianistic repertoire. The hall, however, almost sold out for her second appearance, and many musicians admitted she had an unusual quality. She is now under Columbia Concerts Management and looks forward to a big 1946-'47 concert tour, Is she a great planist? Were the critics under an illusion? Did she, above all pianists who gave debut recitals during the season, deserve what happened to her? Time will tell. Miss Jonas had what might be called a "break." Another night she might not have clicked.

### Full of Intangibles

So much can intervene to spoil what looks like a big opportunity. The person might prove momentarily unequal to the occasion. Superficial circumstances might prevent the event from coming off as it potentially could. The performing vehicle-concerto, opera or recital program - might be wrong. Thus, what could be an "open sesame!" frequently does turn out a boomerang.

Looking at the reality of the concert business, it would be futile to deny that the sequence of events which leads into the big box-office channels is something of a puzzle. Analysis of the factors is revealing, but it doesn't provide a formula. The art of music itself is full of intangibles. So is the art of making a musical career.



## THE INSTRUMENT PRODUCTION PICTURE

MORE musicians, both pro and amateur, will be blowing them louder, clearer and truer than ever before by the end of 1947. At least, that's the vision dreamed up by leading band instrument makers as they peer into their brass cauldrons and see an all-time production high for the coming year. Consideration of the horn makers' anticipated production figures and plans is basically important in any study of music's 1947 potential. For as one eminent jazz critic pointed out during the past year when a discussion of the Gillespie vs. Armstrong trumpet came up: "Remember that Gillespie's prolific trumpet wouldn't be producing all those finely tuned notes on the leakyvalved, poorly constructed cornets that Armstrong and Bunk Johnson cut their embouchures

Music today has reached the high peaks of quantity plus loads of quality due largely to the excellently fashioned instruments produced by manufacturers all over the country and available to almost anyone who has the desire to play. The availability of these superior performing horns has encouraged more amateurs to try


their hand at music where previously the hard-blowing horns of the past discouraged the scrawny amateur who didn't boast the Charles Atlas chest it once took to produce even a clinker from a brass instrument. The fact that more amateurs are entering the musical field means ultimately a field of better professionals, who are urged to peak work on their horns because of the large number of competing promusickers.

### Encourage Parents

Improved production facilities of today's band instruments have encouraged more and better musical performance by both amateurs and pros because volume production costs are way down and the horn which the amateur pays \$50 for today is equal in quality to the horn which name sidemen in the days of Goldkette and Whiteman were playing. Instrument manufac-

turers are now able to put out a B-quality, less expensive horn, strictly designed for the logical budding amateur trade. The lower prices of these horns today encourage parents to purchase a horn where before they pondered the purchase of the more expensive instrument, for the budding musician might tire of his tooting and the investment in the higher priced instrument might be lost.

Music instrument makers are viewing the coming year with optimism because in the majority of cases they circumvented the number one problem, mechanical reconversion, facing production in other fields and have only to iron out OPA adjustments of new prices on horns and new sources of the raw materials needed in musical instrument manufacture. Members of the band instrument manufacturing industry weren't impeded in post-war development by reconversion of their factory machines because they continued for the most part during the war to make musical instruments for the various branches of the armed services whose popular and military bands required thousands of new instruments. In some cases, portions of instrument makers'

factories were turned over to making devices entirely alien to the parts that go into a horn, but even in these instances, usually the machine which made the war product could be easily adjusted to go back into the peacetime production of band instrument parts.

### Price

### Problem

In attempting to straighten out the problems of prices on instruments and parts, representatives of the now defunct National Band Instrument Manufacturers' Association and owners of the member firms themselves have visited and been in continuous communication with Washington. Reports from various manufacturers indicate that the price situation is near solution and the raw material and parts price problem is also being clarified,

Manufacturers are hoping to settle their few snags in production as soon as possible, for even if the bulk of them have already reached normal prewar production figures, the long waiting list for all types of band instruments is continually growing larger because of increased demands from dealers who are flooded with requests for new instruments from both amateurs and pros. Manufacturers are hoping for hepped-up manufacture because at present they are putting out only the higher quality, more expensive horns because of the shortage of materials and machinery. When production facilities are loosened up, makers hope to be able to once again produce the less expensive instruments supplied almost exclusively to amateur and school musicians.

### Keep Interest

Requests for these B-quality horns have remained unanswered since 1942, but manufacturers have kept the interest on the part of aspiring young musicians alive by directing a wave of promotion and advertising at these prospective music-makers. During the war and now, firms in the industry are busy sending out material, ranging from the

holders used on music stands to elaborate musical history charts and booklets to keep young minds tuned to a desire for musical expression. Several companies supplied their local dealers with material to interest parents in the musical education of their children after the war was over and in-

struments were again available. Boys who pen the promotional literature for the band instrument manufacturers have also put plenty of words on paper directed to the high school bandmaster and his students. These books range in content from marching instruc-

(Continued from page 46) tions to proper tuning of all instruments. While schools haven't received their regular yearly quotas of musical instruments for the past five years, word from the front offices of the instrument factories indicates that soon schools will be receiving their first post-war deliveries of new horns.

### Aim for Million Pieces

Instrument makers are prepping for a series of new periodicals which will be mailed to those on mailing lists, dormant since 1941 and the end of the paper supply. Plenty of the band instrument makers had some type of house organ which linked dealer to maker during wartime and kept the dealer posted of any new supply developments, but now manufacturers and their public relations reps insist that these publications will be enlarged, increased in numbers and generally improved to get at new clientele. Boys who ink the checks for these promotional gimmicks say that they won't be satisfied till the distribution of these regular house organs reaches the thousands and then they'll still be aiming for the million - per - year distribution mark.

As in previous years, both normal and wartime, manufacturers predict that they'll advertise heavily in the magazines which deal in musical subjects or go to parties who may be likely targets for music propaganda. While mulling

plans for advertising, firm heads admit that they are doing plenty of brow-wrinkling over, whether or not to budget heavily in national publications of a general nature, rather than in specialized music publications.

### Dealers' Windows

Where once, before Pearl Harbor, band instrument manufacturers were among the top purveyors of ready-made window displays, they now rank relatively low in this type of merchandising, which they curtailed early in 1942 when lack of priviting curriers and facility. of printing supplies and facilities combined with the shortage of new civilian horns to shut off this type of sales pro-motion. Talks with promotional directors of major musical instrument makers indicate that the boys are ready to return to equipping dealers with the smartest windows out and are going all out for bigger, better and more colorful ways to draw the probable payees' orbs to the music dealers' windows. As was a pre-war custom, much of this advertising will be personal endorsements from major sidemen or name band leaders. One Elkhart (Ind.) manufac-turer has gone to such expense as having a special booklet made up to show dealers how

they may completely renovate their stores to get better sales results.

Another phase of promotion into which plenty of manufacturers indicate they are going big is newspaper mats, which will be supplied to dealers. Looks at these mats indicate a tremendous amount of study and some careful artwork to bring out the best points for retail sales. Several firms aver that they will cut down their advertising for national media to share the expense of local advertising with their dealers. Biggies in the band instrument industry feel that they will have to start pretty much from scratch in resurrecting the interest in their products and there isn't a better place than the family newspaper.

### Anticipate Record Output

While all these projected promotion methods loom as rather expensive, manufacturers say that they won't force prices any higher than wartime because of the anticipated record output which firms are shooting at. While some prices may be a bit higher, company execs say that these new instruments are tops in performance, being the result of four wartime years of research into improvements

on present horns. While these improvements have not yet been made public, manufacturers say they will be ready to pull off the covers on the new and better operating horns starting Sept. 1, 1946, and thereafter. Tho nothing definite has yet been announced about these new instruments, makers say that they are already receiving requests for the new horns from outstanding pro musicians. Firm officials from all over the U. S. report that musicians are in for a very pleasant surprise, occasioned by some of the finest changes ever for better quality and more easy performing instruments.

### Better Repair Facilities

And even if horns prove a bit more expensive because of the further cost of the new improvements, manufacturers are making certain that users of their horns get more years of better operation by expanding facilities for repair in their own home plants; by co-operating with the Affillated Musicians' Service, and in the case of the Conn Band Instrument Company, by operating their own band instrument repair school. For years, both pro and amateur musicians flooded band instrument makers' offices with letters complaining about bum repair jobs and questions about how they could be remedied. When these poorly repaired horns were sent in to the manufacturers, in the majority of instances, they were so badly damaged by the incompetent repairman, that

salvaging the delicate instrument was impossible. As a result many buyers shied away from the higher priced horns, figuring the life of the horn was short and a cheaper horn would prove a better investment.

To offset this philosophy, in 1945 Leo Cooper, Chicago repairman, received the co-operation of band instrument manufacturers in setting in motion his Affiliated Musicians' Service, a group of reliable repairmen scattered all over the nation, each of whom is well qualified to handle the repair of any type instrument. Mucians, especially traveling professional tooters, who were most sorely beset when they noticed a leaky valve in Ogallala, Neb., and had to take their horns to some strange repairman, are now supplied with a list of accredited AMS repairmen and they have no difficulty in obtaining reputable repair jobs most anywhere in the country.

### Conn's School For Repairmen

Conn has increased the supply of good repairmen with its own repair school, set up late in 1945, in Elkhart. This school ultimately will turn out 144 trained repairmen yearly, which, company officials say, will be sufficient to replace those who have left instrument repair for a different job or who have died thruout the nation. Tho this school is operated on a non-profit basis solely by Conn, no stipulation is made on the student that he go into a Conn dealer's shop and as a result the graduates of the six-month course are going into every State of the union and into all types of musical dealers' instrument shops.

while reports from instrument makers all over the nation indicate all-time production highs expected for '47, exact figures on how many horns of each type will be made are unobtainable. Execs report that such common instruments as tenor and alto saxes, cornets and trumpets and the other more easily recognizable types should be coming out for all users by the middle of 1947. The future manufacture of the more intricate and less demanded oboes, French horns, lutes and bassoons depends upon when the supply of raw materials for these instruments increases and when sufficient new workers can be trained to work on the more detailed machined parts for these instruments.

### '47 Looks Like Big Year

If providing the amateur and professional musicker with a good horn means an adequate basis for better American music, 1947 looks like a banner year both in excellence of music produced and amount of music produced. Manufacturers and public alike can look for 1947 to produce musical history that will go unchallenged for some time to come.

66T HERE hasn't been a new top name band built since Harry James," bookers and band pilots will tell you mournfully. And they're certainly right. It's true that orchestras like Frankie Carle, Gene Krupa and one or two others have come along since then and hit the near top, but none has climbed up to the stratospheric heights dominated for so long by the Benny Goodmans, Tommy Dorseys and a handful of others. When you ask these band experts why no new bands have made the top grade they shake their heads, mumble something about it being impossible to build a band today and stagger

Tough Job

Analysis of the facts show that it isn't impossible but, to say the very least, it's extremely difficult. To begin with, the American Federation of Musicians restriction on the amount of profit a financial backer of an orchestra may take out of a band's earnings (5 per cent) makes financing a band a lot less attractive a proposition for the money boys than backing scores of other more solid business ventures. And it's conceded that without a hefty bank roll behind him no new band can make the grade. Just this past season, for instance. one band which tried to make it over a period of a little

# THOSE NEW MAND BAND BLUES

The toughest trick in the music business: building a new band (no matter how good) into namedom. Here is an analysis of some of the reasons why it's so tough.

more than a year cost his backers \$50,000 and then found it necessary to fold.

When it's noted that musicians' salaries are at new highs, good arrangements cost more than ever before, competent press agents and other promotional and managerial talent get paid off in large figures, the reasons for the need for big dough backing become apparent. But that's only the beginning. To even start on the long, hard road to namedom a band has to have plenty of air time and/or one (preferably a few) good records. The latter is most important, of course. Disks have done the trick for a few music properties which have made any progress at all, while in recent years air time has meant practically nothing. The fact remains, however, that those are the two media on which the new leader must count. In order to get adequate air time in 99 cases out of 100 the band must play a location date at a figure which doesn't even meet the band's weekly expenses. Alvino Rey, who

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totes around a 27-piece outfit, including 10 vocalists. for instance, spent about twice as much money as he was earning during the band's last stay at the Astor Roof in New York. The Rey band is a good, solid entertaining band; it's had substantial amounts of air time; it's even had a click Capitol disk in its Cement Mixer (and there may be others before this article sees the light of day), but you could hardly say that the new Rey band had made the top name bracket.

### Major-Minor Problems

But even if the backers are willing and able to stand the gaff of hefty location losses in order to get the ork all the necessary air time, there's still the matter of getting on disks and getting enough production of a click disk issued. The major recording companies who are really the only ones who can assure a band 100 per cent coverage from production thru distribution, promotion, etc., are still letting some so-called "names" and "near names" out. They're still getting beefs from some of their top properties about the insufficiency of production, etc. And all this doesn't even take into consideration the difficulty a newer band experiences in getting to record the top hit tunes (if he is on a major label). There are always the alreadytop names on the majors who must get first crack at the new hit tunes. And if a newer ork is on a secondary disk label, where he does stand a good chance of getting to wax the current hits, he'll always be on those hits in competition to the top established name orks on the major labels. He'll also be up against the fact that the majors can throw many hundreds of thousands of copies more production behind their version of the hit than the smaller record companies can. And he'll have to realize that distribution-wise, the name band on the major label is going to have all the edges too.

### Some Exceptions

Sure, there are occasional Honeydrippers, by Joe Liggins, on Exclusive; or Cement Mixers, by Slim Galllard, on 4 Star; or even Artistry Jumps, by Stan Kenton, on Capitol, but for every such platter there are 50 by good, newer name orks which never get anywhere.





(Continued from page 51) There is no solution for this condition. All the newer ork can do is stay in there and keep punching. It is a sad fact, tho, that in many cases where the newer ork leader can do something about building himself, he passes up the opportunity. On those shortmoney locations, for instance, which he is playing just for the air time involved, many a newer leader will throw any old kind of collection of tunes on the air. Many will even permit their remote programs

to be determined by the timetested payola method. Which ever publishers pay most substantially will get their tunes on regardless of what kind of remote air show it makes.

### Fluff-Off Fellows

Again some of the newer leaders, while they desire the gold and glamour of top namedom, are apparently unwilling to put up with the less pleasant aspects of the job. Too many newer leaders, along about the middle or toward the end of a wearying onenighter trek, will start to push autograph-seeking fans around. These leaders seem to forget that one of the penalties for being a peak name is having to be nice no matter how tired you are.

Musically, the newer leaders have offered, and are offering fans just about everything imaginable, from the intricate, concert-jazz type stuff of a Boyd Raeburn to the infinitely more commercial, sweet the next year or so, the popuand smooth stuff of an Elliot lar band business as a whole Lawrence, with just about will begin to feel their lack everything in between. Whether

the Ray McKinleys, Sam Donahues, Ray Anthonys, Les Elgaros, Buddy Morrows, Buddy Riches, Saxie Dowells, Dean Hudsons, et. al., will be able to overcome the handicaps to namedom and really click in the next year is something all of the band business is watching. The popular orchestra field needs new blood, new names, and unless a few bright young men start to glitter in sharply.





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

## Music On Video During The Bom

THE Petrillo edict banning live music for television has had only one effect: It has taught program producers how to use recordings, transcriptions, music makers not eligible for union membership (mouth organs, etc.), choral groups and in some cases just plain non-union musicians. Federation of Musicians naturally can't be blamed for making the best of the matter. However, the stations with web or motion picture affiliations are not taking chances and the most that NBC, for instance, will do will be to use e.t.'s, commercial disks, harmonicas or choral groups.

#### Production Very Meager

Production on most musical numbers has been scant thus

far for two reasons. First, there's the question of television musical rights, which has yet to be cleared up. No one knows whether giving a pop song real production would make the rights involved "grand" instead of "small." In other words while ASCAP has the clear right to license the "small" rights it does not necessarily control the "grand" or production rights. This nevernever land is being cleaned up and many publishers have

signed their "television rights" over to ASCAP.

#### Music Hasn't Been Overlooked

Music on television must grow up with the new art. It would have been a shame if it had been left out of the planning of the producers who are training today to be key men of tomorrow. It hasn't. From the Hour Glass, the Standard Brands video experiment in variety scannings, to the three minute NBC "good-night," music has been and is becoming increasingly a factor. Whether live instrumental music will be available soon is anybody's guess-but AFRA, the performer's union, is talking "scales" now, and conferences held internally at International headquarters of AFM are said to have reached a basis upon which to build a television scale. Television has learned how to use tune stuff and the unions will come along, for entertainment without music is hardly worth the tuning

# The radio production director of J. Walter Thompson's Chicago branch presents here a decidedly orderly approach to the complicated and difficult task of song selection.

THE choosing of musical selections for a radio program involves a high degree of personal judgment as well as the use of whatever statistical guidance may be available. An orderly approach to the work brings more satisfactory results than does picking one song here and another there for little specific reason. In one plan of approach the first step is to decide the kind of audience, the type of listeners that the advertiser wishes to attract. In other words, to whom is the advertising message directed?

After this question to

After this question is answered it is necessary to select the kind of program which is most suitable to that audience and the kind of talent which is most suitable to that program. For instance, an assignment to sell chicken lice exterminating powder may call for a very informal and rural appeal to the farm wives who raise most of the chickens. Similarly, to sell banking and trust services to well-to-do persons may call for a program with a more formal atmosphere reflecting the conservatism and the substantiality of the banking institution. Choose talent which will be able to create the atmosphere and project the kind of personality that will attract and please the type of listeners to be sold.

#### Tunes Suited To Talent

After choosing suitable talent it is necessary to choose musical selections most suitable to the capabilities and style of that talent. No matter how desirable certain music may be in itself, it is better to omit it than to program music that the instrumentalists and vocalists cannot interpret effectively. Many a popular ballad singer cannot render a rhythm tune acceptably, and many a rhythm singer ruins a ballad

popular ballad singer camber ender a rhythm tune acceptably, and many a rhythm singer ruins a ballad.

Our informal program with the rural appeal may present familiar songs delivered in a hillbilly or otherwise very casual style, along with intimate banter. Our more formal program for the bank may also present familiar music, but it will be of a caliber and in a style that is in keeping with the dignity and reliability that the average investor expects of his bank; this necessitates a rare degree of judgment in deciding how much novelty and frivolity may be incorporated in the program: none at all would tend to lower the listener interest and too much would create an atmosphere that would not be consonant with the commercial.

#### Three Song Types

Let us assume now that we have defined the audience, chosen the program and suitable

talent, and studied the style, the capabilities (and the limitations) of our talent. At this stage in building our program we are ready to choose the musical numbers for our show. To facilitate the discussion at this point let us divide the music used in radio programs into (1) familiar music; (2) new popular songs, and (3) novelty material used for publicity values. Let us consider each division in turn.

Let us arbitrarily classify all familiar music according to

#### Put the Listener In a "State"

To sum up: In choosing selections from the fields of familiar music we use all the statistical guides available because these guides reveal the comparative popularity of any given musical number and make it relatively easy to select a program of wide appeal. Music from this first division tends to put the listener in a state

four categories: (1) standard popular and old popular favorites; (2) current popular favorites; (3) semi-classical and classical favorites, and (4) folk-tunes and traditional favorites. What to select from these four classifications will be partially guided by the cultural level and the age-span of the audience. Other valuable working guides are indications of preferences in music to be found in survey studies of phonograph record sales, of sheet music sales, of juke box operations and similar trade data. (Ed. Note: This material is published in The \*Billboard's Music Popularity Charts each week.) In addition, tabulations of "the most often requested numbers" based on the opinions of performers and producers in all branches of the

of reminiscence and nostalgia that is very useful in generating sentimental emotion, which is one facet of the psychological approach to conditioning the listener and making him more receptive to the commercial appeal.

#### How To Pick The New Ones

The selection from our second division—that of new popular songs, of favorites-to-beis an entirely different problem. Here there are no statistics to refer to. Again the selection will be guided by the cultural level and the age-span of the audience, but along new lines of analysis. First, the degree of melodic invention must be considered. Is the tune attractively different enough to interest and delight the lis-

teners? Second, the degree of reminiscence of melody must be weighed. Is there enough reminiscence or familiarity of melody patterns to make the tune easy to remember?

with regard to the lyric, one should consider these questions: Is there "commercial" attractiveness in the lyric story, that is, does it tell the kind of tale the listeners want to hear? What is the degree of reminiscence in the rhyme and lyric patterns, and therefore, how quickly will the public be able to memorize the lyric?

#### Pub's "Promotional Opportunities"

Another matter to be examined is the publisher's promotional opportunities. Is the song from a motion picture production or a legitimate theater production? Are there phonograph recordings? How many? By what companies? By what artists? A very important question is: What indications has the publisher given of his plans for spending effort and money to promote the song? If he won't work on a new song, the chances are against its being a hit.

An objective consideration of

An objective consideration of the preceding questions relating to the music, the lyrics and the promotional possibilities of a new song provide an acceptable basis for evaluation of new music. Usually, revived standard popular songs should be evaluated by means of the same analyses.

#### Publicity Only Consideration

The third division needs but brief consideration here. It comprises novelty material used solely for its publicity value. It may be of any type—classical, semi-classical, or popular. There is only one major basis for judgment in the selection of it: Will the use of this material bring enough publicity to make the listeners want to hear it or to warrant forcing them to hear it?

To repeat: The choosing of musical selections for a radio program demands a high degree of personal judgment as well as whatever statistical guidance may be available.

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## This Is A TRANSCRIPTION

By JOHN L. SINN

T ISN'T any secret in radio that good musical shows cost money. By the time you've assembled a good-sized orchestra, paid for enough rehearsal time, paid off the arrangers and copyists, hired a vocal chorus, soloists and a top-flight conductor and director, you've run up a tremendous bill. And there isn't very much you can do about it. It doesn't make sense to pay the cost of a big band and then try to save four or five hundred dollars on arrangements . . . or to pay for fine arrangements and try to get by with a few less men. There just isn't any way to do a musical show inexpensively.

Now that may be all right for the network advertiser. He has a large program budget that will enable him to do a fine musical show. But what about the LESS-THAN-NET-WORK advertiser . . . the local and regional sponsor with an infinitely smaller budget. How can he afford a musical show?

#### No Limited Budget Alibi

Now when you consider his problem you must remember this. This less than network sponsor is trying to reach the same listeners that the network sponsor is after. And these listeners have become a pretty sophisticated audience. They know what they like. Oh, it's true they can't tell an F sharp from a B flat, but they know what sounds good to them and that means special arrangements and not stock, it means orchestras well rehearsed, it means the right musical back-

grounds for soloists, it means music perfectly played and beautifully sung. And the local or regional advertiser can't say at the start of his show: "We ask your kind indulgence, folks, but we have a limited budget and the music on our show just won't be up to network standards." No. the listener doesn't care if the program he tunes to is live or transcribed, network or local . . . whether it's sponsored by a national advertiser or the bakery down the street . . . he only insists on one thing. The program has got to be good.

#### **Build With** Phonograph Records

Since our local and regional sponsor had no other alternative, he began to build his program from phonograph records. It seemed like a good idea. Here were top bands, star vocalists. arrangements and hit fine tunes. And it costs practically nothing. But gradually sponsor began to realize this

wasn't the answer at all. Bing regional sponsor Crosby made a new record and our sponsor immediately played it on his program. The only trouble was . . . so did every other local and regional sponsor on every station in the city. So many phonograph records were played on so many radio stations at so many times for so many advertisers that the listener lost all track of who was sponsoring what.

#### Complete Shows Wanted

So the best local and regional sponsors decided that phonograph records on the air just weren't for them. They decided . . . and who can blame them . . . that they wanted programs that could get sponsor identification . . . programs that could build audiences, complete programs with dialog and variety, not just a series of individual unrelated numbers; in short, programs that would sell merchandise and of which the local and proud.

#### E. T. of Network Caliber

#### Names Via E. T.

It is a matter of record that the local and regional sponsors met these programs with open arms. Most transcription producers can show long lists of satisfied customers and mail from advertisers and stations alike asking for more and better shows. Our own records show, for example, that the D. H. Holmes Company, New Orleans' leading department store, is now sponsoring 23 quarter hours a week of Ziv transcribed programs.

Yes, the less than network advertiser is now proud to say at the start of his show, "This is a transcription," for only by transcription can he sponsor programs featuring such network musical stars as Ziv's Wayne King, Kenny Baker, Barry Wood, Michelson's Phil Brito and NBC's Ted Steele and the Three Suns.



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# SETTING UP TRANSCRIBED "LIGHT" MUSIC SHOWS

By ALFRED SIMON

AS A YOUNGSTER I was probably one of the most persistent vaudeville fans to be found on the circuit. Little did I realize that this, of course, was priming me for the radio job I now have at WQRX—planning light musical programs. It was during those youthful days that I learned that constant variety is an extremely important factor in a good vaudeville show, and I have tried to make this my watchword in selecting the lighter music for WQXR's programs.

The various shows on WQXR require different sorts of planning, so it's hard to give an over-all picture of the programing. However, as much as possible we try to have a unified idea for each show rather than haphazardly pick anything that comes to mind.

As for the physical programing, I use a file of transcription cards supplied the station by the services which we use: Associated and World. These are arranged first according to type of music, and within each category by artists. Another set of cards is arranged in alphabetical order in case we want to find a certain number by title.

#### Show Case Histories

To give a better picture of the planning behind the programs, it would be best to describe by case history in outlining some of the WQXR shows and their formats. The Luncheon Concert, for instance, is confined to one orchestra for each dally program—such as Harry Horlick, Erno Rapee, Alfred Wallenstein, etc. This conveys the idea of an orchestra playing during luncheon instead of an unrelated series of orchestral numbers played by orchestras of various sizes and instrumentations. Also, we try to vary the tempo of each successive number so that, for instance, you don't get three waltzes in a row, or one slow number on top of another slow unber on top of another slow number on top of another slow number on top of another slow number on top of another

#### Standards Get

Constant variety applies to the Just Music program which has been one of our favorite programs for many years. The only exception here is that all kinds of orchestras are used to vary the mood, and appeal to as many tastes as possible. Since it is a late evening mood show, we avoid using anything too rhythmic or intrusive. Formerly we didn't use any popular music except possibly Victor Herbert or Rudolf Friml. Currently, however, we've begun using any popular songs (Rodgers, Kern, Gershwin, etc.) that have become standard or are likely to become standards. Since this is primarily a program for listening—it's an all musical show without interruptions for titles. Dance arrangements are out.

Here Are

The music best suited are those played by such orchestras as Al Goodman, Andre Kostelanetz, and concert and salon groups in transcriptions. These popular songs, to a large extent, have replaced such too-often-tried and true composers

as Delibes, Waldteufel, Chaminade, etc., which in the past predominated Just Music. Chopin, Rachmaninoff, Tchaikowsky and Kreisler still appear as frequently as they used to. Not that the former have been particularly neglected, but they seem to have stood the test of many performances eminently well. One issue which is of paramount importance in planning Just Music, or anything broadcast for that matter, is not to follow one selection with something too contrasting in character. An example of what I would consider bad programing would be following Wagner's Liebestod with Schwartz's Dancing in the Dark.

#### Theme is important

A theme is always a help in making up a program series—as

Mood, Theme, Time-Of-Day . . . these and many other factors must be considered in planning a successful transcribed program of light music. Here a veteran New York transcribed music director details some of the methods he uses.

evidenced by the Footlight Echoes program. The show is everything that the name implies, yet a theme provides better continuity in spanning the program into a broadcast period. We usually confine each broadcast to one musical comedy, or operetta, one composer, one era in theatrical history, or two sets of arists. An example: Al Goodman's orchestra may form the backbone of the show, featuring Dorothy Kirsten and Felix Knight in a few duets.

There's Music in the Air is a morning program slanted toward the women. On this show we use mostly nostalgic tunes played by string orchestras—yet since it is a morning program it must not be too sentimental in performance.

#### Time of Day A Factor

The time of day is an important factor in planning a program. There is, for example, Cocktail Time, a show which is broadcast during the would-be cocktail hour, 5:30 to 6. The music used on this show is of the type one might hear in the swankier East Side spots, featuring gently rhythmic dance tunes, an occasional salon arrangement and at least three piano solos by Carmen Cavallero, Eddy Duchin, Ted Straeter, etc.

These are but a few of the light music programs scheduled on WQXR but they tend to give an idea of our reasoning behind the selections. Those of us who are responsible for the recorded and transcribed programs realize that the more variety we provide in our musical fare along with the popular favorites, the more pleased listeners there will be.

Since all tastes are not the same, and since there are many musical prejudices, there is bound to be adverse criticism. Not all of it comes from the dyed-in-the-wool classic fans. we could play Gilbert and Sullivan all day and keep the G. & S. fans happy while others would complain that we gave them too much of it even in our two-hour weekly menu of this music.

But we welcome these criticisms from our listeners. Each phone call and fan letter is answered and acknowledged to the best of our ability. If we can please listeners by playing the music they like we feel that we are pleasing a cross section of our audience.

## PLANNING CLASSICAL

#### MUSICAL PROGRAM

F ALL the questions I am asked about WQXR the most frequently repeated is "How do you select the music?" My first answer is that we try to play the muisc which will please most of our listeners, at the same time endeavoring to balance the great works of the standard repertoire with interesting new compositions and rarely performed works. Every month on WQXR music lovers hear great music which may appear only once in two or three years in the concert halls of the city.

A noted New York educator, in speaking of WQXR, once said "It is a great deal to be able to tune in at breakfast time to Mozart, to listen to Beethoven after dinner; to retrace the movements of a beloved concerto before bedtime." Many, many thousands agree but it falls my lot to be sure that these listeners get what they want for breakfast, luncheon, dinner and between times, too.

#### Program Rotation

We know that each month most of our listeners will enjoy hearing the symphonies of Beethoven, Brahms, Tchaikowsky, Mozart, Haydn, Schubert, Mendelssohn and Schumann. The popular piano and violin concertos must also be played. However, we try to rotate the program so that one month Brahms' First will appear on Symphony Hall, our most popular night-time symphonic program, and the following month on one of the other WQXR symphonic programs.

listeners. headed the list with Tchaikowsky's Piano Concert No. 1 taking second place, the Tchaikowsky Fifth in third place and Beethhoven's works in the fourth, fifth and sixth positions. Seven compositions of both Beethoven and Brahms were listed as favorite works, altho requests for Brahms were not plentiful enough to be considered among the first 10. Schubert, Mendelssohn, Franck, Grieg, Schumann, Chopin,

came in for their share of popularity but it would be unfair to all of our listeners to give them a steady diet of only less to perform than another, it those compositions which had been voted upon. Hence we must use our judgment as to the best places to feature all of the works which make up a the featured work on Symmusic lover's manual.

#### Classical Disks as Tele Accomp

to listeners' preferences dates back to WQXR's experimental days when John Hogan, its founder and now its president, used records as sound accompaniment for his televised pictures. Mr. Hogan played records of the music he liked best, suiting the music to the picture when possible. He was not entirely a student of music but did prefer the classics and for this reason alone he used them for his experiments. In those days few people had television receiving sets and many radios were not adjusted to receive broadcasts at the high frequency of 1560 kilocycles; but the few who did pick up the sound programs enjoyed them and wrote to Mr. Hogan to tell him so. Literally, then, the listeners' acceptance of the classical music was the birth of WQXR. From then on, "classics" were the preference for WQXR listeners and they now receive 14 hours of serious music out of a 17-hour day.

#### Timing Is Top importance

There is no one I envy more than a conductor. When he sits down to make up his pro-Beethoven's Fifth Rachmaninoff and Sibelius grams he has only to consider which compositions will make an interesting program. If one work takes a minute more or doesn't matter to him. But that minute in radio is all important. If I have selected a 26-minute piano concerto as phony Hall. I know that I must have an overture and a concluding number which will run 22 minutes-not 19 or 25. The most significant guide Timing is all important and

each record at WOXR is timed to the exact second.

#### Triple Cross File

WQXR programs are planned six weeks in advance. Our library, which houses some 20,000 records and transcriptions, has three cross files, one by composers, one by artists and one by time. For each record in the library there is a card with the name of the composer, the performer, the timing and a space to enter the date of performance.

Different programs call for different kinds of music. While Petrouchka is an interesting feature for Symphony Hall. we feel most people wouldn't want it on the Breakfast Symphony. Of course the design of the program influences seelection, too. Since the Breakfast Symphony always has four numbers between 8 and 9 a.m. we can't play the longer works. An Hour of Symphony, which begins at 11 p.m., is hardly for modern experimental music. Many works which are played at 4 p.m. on the Symphonic Matinee will never appear on the night-time symphonic program.

#### Demand for New Disks

There are lots of other considerations in programing. Most people will want to hear the new records released each month by the record companies. As soon as these are announced the inquiries start about the dates of performances. We try to get everything new which will interest our audience; even if we have

several performances of a work a new one is always welcome.

Anniversaries are important in programing. We celebrate the birthdays of leading composers, conductors and artists. We do memorial programs. The 100th anniversary of the birth of Faure festival in 1946. Next April the 50th anniversary of the death of Brahms will be the occasion for a Brahms festival. Public holidays also influence our choice of music. I hate to think what irate letters would arrive if we neglected Parsifal at Easter or The Messiah at Christmas.

#### Mail Offen Confusing

Mail does play its part, but sometimes it is a little confusing, to say the least. On the same morning that there is a

much Haydn and Mozart, there is another letter asking us to play more. When we play a new work we're always interested to read the mail which will follow it. Not so long ago we experimented with an ultramodern work-Alban Berg's Lyric Suite. We asked the audience to write and tells us what they thought of it and whether they wanted more of letter asking why we offer so it in the future. The replies



were evenly distributed. Some wanted more, others wanted none of it.

#### 5 or 6 Minute Shortage

The problem of repetition is a great one. There just isn't enough music on records for us to play each composition

only once a month. It's amazing Matinee, Symphony Hall and how few musical works there are between five and six minutes long. There aren't enough symphonies, concertos suites and tone poems to feature a different one on our five major symphonic programs, The Breakfast Symphony, Midday Symphony, The Symphonic

An Hour of Symphony. That's why such popular favorites as the Mendelssohn Violin Concerto, the Beethoven Fifth or the Tchaikowsky Piano Concerto may be played more than once a month.

We try to balance our programs to provide a variety of

music, sacred and secular, ancient and modern. We know we can't please all of the people all the time. We strive for sufficient variety so that everyone will find the music he likes on some program.

themselves articulate to us have more influence in shaping our programs than many non-writing radio fans realize. People do search for what they want in our monthly program booklet which has now reached a circulation of 34,000. Recently a man phoned from Windsor, Mass., to complain that his program booklet had not been delivered. During the war years a soldier wrote from an army camp in North Africa to ask that we continue sending him the booklet at his APO address. The sight of the music titles on the book, he said, helped him to feel that he again was at home listening to WQXR. Many people write if their favorite composition is omitted for a month. And the constant flow of praises and criticisms from our listeners makes us feel that our job in planning the programs, is after all, worth while.

# THE SMALL STATION'S MUSIC PROBLEM ... And An Outline For A Solution

This brief but comprehensive analysis of the small station's music problem is the first such study ever published.

And the suggestions for the problem's solution are practical and authoritative.

music is a factor of major importance. It goes without saying that no small station can duplicate in its local shows the production possible for the larger outlets. He must achieve listener appeal by recourse to other far less expensive media. Of these, music is the most ready answer to a small station's programing needs.

On the basis of wisely arranged, carefully scheduled and diversified musical programs, the small station can build for itself a steady and growing body of listeners. The choice of music, the imaginative scripting and producing of shows, and indeed the whole manner in which the station handles its musical resources can become the prime ingredient in the personality that station presents to its public—a personality which is, after

all, the foundation of its listener appeal. left entirely in the hands of musically illiterate announcers.

Unfortunately, in all too many cases even today, hundreds of small stations thruout the country are failing to more than scratch the surface of the possibilities offered to them by music. It may even be said that for a sizable number of these outlets music is merely a convenient time-filler. This unfortunate attitude is reflected in the way these broadcasters handle their music.

#### Haphazard Programing

A recent informal survey uncovered for us an appalling degree of haphazard, prejudiced, unintelligently conducted music programing. In many of the small stations surveyed, choice of music aired, its arrangement and production was

left entirely in the hands of musically illiterate announcers. No attempt was made to insure the listener a well-balanced diet of music or to adhere to any particular standards of quality in the music played or the manner of its performance. The production of such shows as were aired was of the most thread-bare character, held together tenuously by the questionable ad lib talents of the announcer assigned to the chore.

The feeble attempts made to determine the musical tastes of listeners in the various areas were hopelessly inadequate, and in many cases no consistent use was made of any of the national indices of listener preference, nor was it possible to use them under the chaotic, disorganized conditions prevailing in the music departments

#### Solld Foundations

#### Rare

Intelligently planned record and transcription libraries, the indispensable foundation for any sound music programing, were the rare exceptions. Most of them were built in a hit-ormiss fashion suiting the whims of musically uninformed staff members, and in many cases no attempt was made to remove outdated material of scant program value. Cataloging of these libraries was generally rudimentary and almost invariably highly inefficient, where it existed at all. Carefully scripted and produced programs were rare indeed, most stations being content, insofar as any scripts were used at all, with the not always inspired products of the various national script factories, especially those associated with the

several transcription library services. More often than not these latter were by no means as well or as thoroly exploited as they could be

#### No Over-All Control

Finally, no over-all control of the music was in evidence, and such as existed was rarely in the hands of well-qualified personnel.

This sorry state of affairs can only be attributed to the hopelessly short-sighted attitude toward music held by the station's managements. It is certain that a sizable improvement in this attitude is in order. The time is long past when such neglect of the values of music can be in any way justified. A change for the better in this respect would have a decided dollar-and-cents value to the station. With the music fast assuming its rightful place as the backbone of small station programing, and with increasing discrimination on the part of radio listeners, a new deal for music on the small station is indicated. Those managers who first see the handwriting on the wall will be those who will profit most.

The film industry, which has its part in affecting the musical tastes and standards of the citizenry, devotes lavish funds, if not always wisely, to its music. With all its inadequactes in many respects, it nevertheless offers a challenge to radio.

#### Diskers' Efforts Wasted

Under existing conditions, the many and sometimes frenzied efforts of various record companies and other organizations seeking to exploit radio as a means of selling their wares to the public are being wasted. The general lack of organization apparent in the small stations' music departments frustrates these efforts to a considerable extent. Since the maintenance of cordial relations between recording company and broadcasting station is a sine qua non from both viewpoints, this, too, points to the need for improvement in the small outlets' use of music.

#### Possible Solutions

What to do about it? Effecting a far-reaching improvement presents certain easily defined problems, none of them insurmountable. The greatest of these, without a a doubt, is the scarcity of adequately trained personnel, and the difficulty which a small station would face in offering sufficient inducement to any such persons now available. For the key to an efficient music department is the well-trained music director.

His tasks are many, involving a thoro and wide background in music of every type. In the small station, it will be necessary that he not only control the programing of music but also have charge of the selection and purchase of recordings; the choice of suitable transcription services; the

building and maintenance of a complete and efficiently organized catalog; the supervision of production insofar as it affects musical shows, including the training of announcers in the proper handling of them, and the preparing and choice of scripts presenting the station's music in the best possible way. It will be up to him to set standards of music, programing, production and script, in the process of which he will determine the station's musical personality.

#### Objectivity A Must

Being responsible for all the stations' music, our music director must be able to see that every type of music for which there is a listening audience (and this will be determined by means of objective test, not by personal opinion) is represented on the station's program schedule, in its proper proportion and at the best available time. This will be by no means the least of his headaches, a task involving a thoro knowledge of and broad sympathies with music of every type.

Naturally, the building of the station's library will be largely determined by the overall music programing policy. It would further require that he keep fully advised of all new releases and the sources of information that pertain to them.

#### Card Index Catalog

Much of the success of his programs and his ability to get the most from the library will depend upon the catalog. A complete catalog, with card indices that can in themselves provide all the necessary information upon which programs may be built, in the simplest, most readily available form, will make possible a more thoro use of the library's resources and, once established, save many precious hours of mental and physical effort.

The satisfactory execution of

The satisfactory execution of his task demands that the music director be fully conversant with the principles and practices of radio broadcasting, especially as they relate to music. For it will be up to him to establish standards for the production of musical shows and to see that these standards are adhered to. This will require instruction and supervision of the announcing staff in its handling of musical programs.

#### Must Know Scripts

His knowledge of radio broadcasting will again serve him in the matter of preparing and choosing scripts. A knowledge of what constitutes good radio writing, as well as good production, is indispensable here. In addition, he must understand and be able to practice the different types of writing called for by different types of music. Scripts must be entertaining, intelligent and informative, and it is the music director's job to see that they are.

the above the bare outlines of the music director's work in the small station. Obviously, this requires specially trained individuals. It is extremely difficult to find persons whose knowledge of and interest in music alone is sufficiently broad, to say nothing of those who combine such knowledge with that of the principles of music cataloging for radio (a special field in itself) and adequate acquaintance with radio broadcasting technique. Once such an individual became available to the small station, it is doubtful if some stations

could afford to employ him. However, this would be by no means universally true.

#### Share-the Director

But for the many small community service stations in more or less rural areas, some other solution would seem to be indicated. This could involve the sharing of a single music director by several stations in a given area, tho in our experience the complete supervision of one station's musical programs is a full time job. As a minimum solution, a qualified

person could be employed for a limited time by the station to organize a department, establish a workable catalog and instruct personnel in its upkeep, inculcate correct production procedures, and find some means of providing script service.

This broadly is the scope of and a sketchily outlined solution for the problem which will confront the nation's small broadcasters more and more in days ahead. A means to a steadily improving standard in the broadcasting of music must be developed.

SUPPOSE every man has his own perspective of the listeners' likes and dislikes. In the course of giving with the chatter I take into consideration what type of people are within our coverage area. This is rural country, but these are not strictly rural people. The average farmer here is a college man and he knows music, drama, news and corn. Thus, with a somewhat abbreviated agricultural thought in mind, I dish out corn in a modified form. Commercials are delivered practically straight. Injections of "Hey, are you listening to this?"; "Cut out the kibitzing, I'm telling you something important," and "This hybrid corn won't cure your ills nor make you fabulously rich, but it is all that a good hybrid should be" enter into announcements on occasion.

You can't browbeat these people with shouting and coercion. It's a matter of kidding along, laughing at your own mistakes and generally trying to let them know you are human. There are occasions where I purposely make a mistake so I can repeat the thought. In so doing, they have a thoro knowledge of what has just been said. I first point out the mistake and make an explanation that "my contract explanation that "my contract will be canceled if I don't get this thing right... and please let so-and-so know that I got it straight." It seems to work. I run one of the Yawn Patrol jobs, and listener audience is indicated by the feet that dur indicated by the fact that dur-ing a blizzard late in the winter school principals called the station within 25 minutes to let the listeners know there would be no school that day. They tell me that was a pretty good indication. If I'm grumpy in the morning, I have an explanation for it. When I tell planation for it. When I tell the listener what the trouble is I get calls from people telling me their troubles and it gets a good laugh over the air. This thing of showing your pearly teeth every morning is all right for the ultra ultra. But all right for the ultra ultra. But when it comes to down-toearth folks they get the "hu-man" element if you give 'em plain turkey talk. I may have the wrong slant, but it pays the wrong slant, but it here . . . it SAYS HERE!

dependent on the style of the show, I would like to go into that a bit. First of all, the request angle goes over big, and by the simple expedient of soliciting request tunes you can build a program that you are sure is going to please a small group at least. As an audience builder, I'd rank request programs as a must, especially when you tie in a bit of homey chatter, along with the name of the person asking for a certain tune or artist. Everyone likes to hear the sound of his own name when it's over the radio, on a program maybe some of his friends are listening to—why then it goes double.

The particular neck of the woods my station serves covers the North Jersey coast line as well as Long Island. The mail pull proves that listeners are the same, whether they reside in Asbury Park, New Jersey with its large floating population in the summer months, or Southampton, L. I., where every other car is a station wagon and large estates are a dime a dozen. To appeal, by and large, to the part of the listening audience that goes for disk jockey shows, you must be hep to the current trend in music, this runs the gamut from sweet swing as exemplified by Charlie Spivak and Freddy Martin to the incantations of Slim Galllard doing a vocal nip-up such as Cement Mixer or Yep Roc Heresy.

No tune is going to please all your listeners, so try striking a happy medium and leaving well enough alone. I firmly believe your own individual personality sets the pace on your program, a certain know-how in arranging the record session is necessary, of course, the tunes change with the seasons, but your own style of presentation and delivery stays with you ad infinitum.

The friendly approach on commercials is the style most favored, for few have the ability to pan things right and left and still come out on top, altho a certain amount of truthfulness, even though it hurts, should be exercised when the occasion warrants. A good bet to follow is: Don't compro-



mise your own honest opinion. However, do it in a way that will reflect credit on yourself and the station you represent. All people are inherently honest, so present the facts, honestly and forthrightly, be it the sponsors' product you're talking about, or the latest in swing tunes, harmony quartets or crooners.

People respect your opinion when you have something to say, otherwise let the records do the work; go easy on the platter chatter, for plain talk can be downright annoying as well as boring. Try to leave the listener wanting a bit more information about a given tune, band or vocalist, instead of bombarding him with facts, while the anguished soul devoutly hopes you'll get around to playing what you have been running off at the mouth about for the past five minutes. That may be a slight exaggeration, but brevity is the soul of wit—and that can be applied to disk jockey spielings.

RE PLATTER spinning selling styles . . . you ask for an outline of my commercial technique. Well, not knowing the meaning of the word technique, since our dictionary has been lost for the past two weeks, and having been in radio long enough to realize that commercial means "alah" sponsor, I think I could say the style used on my programs is one which has been quite effective with both sponsor and listener, since I have had no tomatoes thrown at me recently. Some say it's music, some say it's personality that puts a recorded program over on the air, but be it platter or chatter it must be something that everybody wants. "Everybody" in this case is a term used rather loosely perhaps to describe both listener and the sponsor. "Something" in this case is just what the word implies. Call it ad lib if you wish, or ad rib if you don't. It's still that certain something that gets and holds the audience.

#### STUART WAYNE

The Musical Clocker

As FOR selling methods, well, I think that is a matter for each man to decide for himself. The only thing I can offer in this respect is "be yourself." Put your best foot forward. In other words, take stock of your assets. Know what you have that is saleable and sell it. Don't try to be a "Martin Block" or an "Arthur Godfrey." "Be yourself." That's what your sponsor pays for. If he wants those other fellows he won't hire you.

As for me, I use a sort of over the back fence friendly style that smacks a bit of New England. That's where I come from. I haven't anything special in the way of a "voice." So I make the most of having been a farmer, an auto mechanic and a salesman, and I talk to an audience as one of them and never go in much for "window dressing." My thought on sponsors (and I'm fond of them) is this. Most of them have lived with their business for 10 to 20 years. They can talk for hours about it and not get tired of hearing about it. So when an announcer steps up to speak for that sponsor, whether it's a 25-word spot or a full-minute commercial, he should make that sponsor feel proud of having him as spokesman for him. He must remember that it is a subject close to the heart of that sponsor. And if you do that you at least will be sincere in your presentation and the buying public will usually accept a sincere sales talk. But from the disk man's standpoint it is the sponsor who must be satisfied. He's the guy who pays the bill.



#### PAUL PRICE, Fort Wayne, Indiana

PERSONALLY I use the friendly commercial approach since the "Hoosier" State, for the most part, is made up of small towns and farms. Talking to the folks as a neighbor seems to me the best way of getting across a commercial. Altho Fort Wayne is the second city in population in Indiana, still the people here at one time got started in smaller communities or on farms. But they all like popular music. Last year at this time Fort Wayne had only one real record show that could come under the disk jockeys' art. Today there are four daily and each is going strong.

And speaking of commercials and "platter chatter" . . this I think should be reduced to an a b solute minimum. Just enough to get the thought, then music. "Say It With Music" was tops over any record show ever presented, simply because everything including station breaks and commercials was done in a sweet singing style. A listener never got tired of listening to that program.





#### **BOB DE HAVEN**

WE WON'T get anywhere talking about styles of platter talk any faster than we will by talking about styles of writing or acting. Each guy to his own, and if it works, it works.

My sponsor is beer and his motto for his beer is "Grain Belt, the friendly beer." My style is geared to that motto. I try to please. I don't argue, read nasty letters or make nasty remarks. That doesn't mean the show is "mickey mouse." We do play good jazz, call it that and make some intelligent remarks about the music, but by 10:45 p.m., the middle of the show, I want to be in the pleasant groove of music and chatter. It sells.

This nasty-pan-everything approach stinks. An entertainer is to entertain—the plumber to fix the plumbing and the preacher to marry you and preach your funeral. I feel the entertainer is making a cheap bid for attention when he deliberately runs down another guy's act. Honest opinion—yes. I'm dishing out some of it here. But a deliberate pitch for notoriety thru attacks on another artist tells me that the first guy is no artist. He's afraid his own act won't stand up so he'll go out and borrow a hunk of another act and bolster his own.

Maybe this is a croak from the hinterlands—but, brother, I know a lot of people like myself. They listen to the "crab artists" and suffer. And don't say "Well, they listen." That's not the answer. Hitler is famous, but who wants to be Hitler?



#### IRWIN JOHNSON, (The Earlyworm)

#### Station WBNS, Columbus, Ohio

S ONE who is congenitally opposed to getting out of bed early in the Amorning. I am constantly astonished that The Earlyworm program has been spinning more than 2,200 consecutive times. If it weren't for the ever-lovin' sponsors I doubt if I could do it. In fact, I'm sure of it.

The Earlyworm program seems to sell everything from potato chips to fur coats and has been doling it for six years. Many of the sponsors have been with the show since the beginning, national as well as local. Hopperatings have always been more than adequate (9.4 in the most recent report on the 8:15 section), but they don't tell the whole story.

I feel that The Earlyworm program has become an institution among

Central Ohio listeners largely because I have never taken the show nor myself too seriously. True, it takes a couple of hours a day to select the records Central Onlo listeners largely because I have never taken the show nor myself too seriously. True, it takes a couple of hours a day to select the records and handle the mail, but the actual conduct of the program is predominantly ad lib. Commercial announcements are not ridiculed in any way, but if a comic possibility arises in the copy I make use of it. Then, too, I insist on personalizing the sponsors. If I can call the manager of the department store Gus or Dick I do it. And if I can report on a particularly loud necktie that John was seen wearing the day before . . . that goes in. If one custonfer mentions it to John later in the day, it's worth a basket full of mail.

One other point should be mentioned. The Earlyworm program has always been in the forefront of charitable drives of all kinds. Blood donors, bond buyers and car poolers have all had their innings. And wherever possible, I tie in the sponsors with the campaign. If it's possible to buy tickets for a civic project I plug the fact that Moe's paint shop is selling them. Public service is a necessity in such a program as The Earlyworm, and if a disk Jockey fails to associate himself with such matters in the minds of the public he is missing a very good bet. Sure, it takes time which might otherwise be sold, but it's worth it in good will in the long run.

Finally I don't believe in forcing the advertiser's message into arbitrary limits. Easy transitions from small talk about the weather into the commercial message are essential. Then I give him as much time as seems necessary to sound convincing. If it takes 100 words, I don't try to do it in 50. The appeal of such a program as this one rests largely upon its accentance as a heakfast quest.

To sum up: I use an easy-going conversational delivery, unforced humor and a sincere appreciation of the early riser's foggy frame of mind. I don't

like to get up either!

Y TWO-HOUR platter session (sponsored by a beverage maker, Par-T-Pak) airs from 11 p.m. till 1 in the morning. I work on the supposition that my listeners are as tired as I am. Hence my 20-second commercials flow "quietly." Music is the thing and that's what I offer. I make occasional quips, but even these are built on the soft approach. After all, a boisterous emsee doesn't inspire romance. Hummmm? I'm sorry I haven't a respectable photo to enclose. If enough people mix their highballs with my product perhaps I can afford one by next year.

USE the informal, clowning. joking (occasionally dramatic) technique on introducing some of the disks I play as well as my commercials. have found that this informal, breezy style fits my own individual personality and that I do my best selling job by being myself.

FIND my listeners are happiest when they get their commercials slipped in with between record patter. I never make apologies for them—unless the advertising copy gets too ridiculous—because I feel everyone realizes the commercial side of radio is here to stay, so I just take it from there.

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# FILMS UP, LEGIT DOWN AS HIT TUNE-MAKER

Broadway Shows Hit New Lows in Turning Out Best-Selling Songs Until Irving Berlin Came to Rescue—Field is Wide Open for "Indie" Publishers, Songwriters

UE chiefly to capacity output, and also because they have the bulk of the country's songwriting talent, motion pictures again did a bigger job of producing song hits than the legitimate theater. Conversely, Broadway, with production of new musical shows reduced to a low level, actually established an all-time low in point of best-selling song numbers. This low was reached last December when If I Loved You was about the only stage tune to make the grade in the various popularity charts. At the same time,

motion pictures were treating the nation to such hits as Along the Navajo Trail, It Might as Well Be Spring, Just a Little Fond Affection, Love Letters, On the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe; Some Sunday Morning, That's for Me; Doctor, Lawyer, Indian Chief; I Can't Begin To Tell You and a few other entries, all of which added up to quite a formidable array in contrast to the stage showing.

#### Berlin To the Rescue

Broadway staged a little rebound with the arrival of Call Me Mister, which gave the popular song fans South America, Take It Away and Along With Me, while You May Not Love Me from the flop, Nellie Bly, also developed into a fair tune.

Then Irving Berlin came to the rescue with the production of Annie Get Your Gun in which three smash numbers, Doin' What Comes Natur'lly, They Say It's Wonderful and I Got the Sun in the Morning, as well as a few lesser hits, were presented to a song-hungry public.

The situation points up how much the Main Stem still is depending on the old standby brigade including Berlin, Oscar Hammerstein II, Richard Rodgers, Sigmund Romberg, Larry Hart, Cole Porter, et al., for its song hits. It also raises concern now that Jerome Kern is gone, Hammerstein and Rodgers are turning producers in a big way, and practically all the other established composers and lyricists are tied up in Hollywood, as to the future of Broadway from a musical show standpoint.

#### Less Hits, More Flops

Not only has there been a big decline in the number of musicals produced, but, what is economically more important, the percentage of hits is much lower and the percentage of flops correspondingly higher—a very serious matter in the case of productions whose costs run, as a rule, well into six figures.

Some relief has been sought by the revival of outstanding successes of the past, such as Showboat and The Red Mill, and as things look now a regular policy of such revivals may serve the theater in good stead.

Aside from the two revivals and the ice show, *Icetime*, Broadway at this writing has only six musical offerings, namely, Carousel, Oklahoma! and Song of Norway, all carried over from the previous season, and Annie Get Your Gun, Call Me Mister and Three to Make Ready. For a boom, era in the amusement business this is an exceedingly skimpy menu of musical entertainment to be offering the free-spending Broadway theatergoers. But there is not much else that can be done when, out of a dozen new productions for the season, eight or nine are flops.

#### Indies Doing Fine

So the field is wide open for free-lance songwriters and independent music publishers. Among the current top tunes that were published or recorded as originals are The Gypsy, Surrender, Five Minutes More, I Don't Know Enough About You, Prisoner of Love, Who Told You That Lie? and I'd Be Lost Without You. That's a pretty substantial showing and at the same time it lends encouragement to the expectation of a continuing output from this direction.

From a long-range viewpoint even Hollywood may eventually suffer a serious thinning out of the old reliable composers who have been providing a large share of the screen's song hits. The passing of Jerome Kern and Vincent Youmans were hard blows to both the motion pictures and the stage. Other losses are being felt in the increasing tendency of songwriters to turn film producers, writers and even actors.


#### Cleffers "Desert" Penning

Arthur Schwartz, Sam Coslow, Buddy de Sylva, Arthur Freed and Harlan Thompson are among the one-time prolific writers of popular songs who turned producers and thereupon sidetracked their songwriting activities. Hoagy Carmichael also has done very little in the song hit line since he was bitten by the acting bug.

Even musical directors, adapteps and arrangers, after a certain period of time in the Hollywood studios, seem to gravitate to production posts whenever the opportunity is presented. Nat Finston, for example, is becoming a producer in association with Barney Glazer, and a number of others are headed in the same direction.

#### Hollywood \$\$\$ Big Pull

The eventual result, unless adequate replacement talent is found to offset the defections, will be to reduce Hollywood's batting average in the creation of hit songs and scores. Whether this will, in turn, enable Broadway to make a better compara-

tive showing, no one can tell.

One thing to bear in mind is that the new generation of musical creators is more practical and commercial minded, as a class, than the easy going troubadors of earlier eras. They think more in terms of a permanent career, achievement and security.

So there is one thing you can be certain about: So long as the songwriting talent exists, anywhere at all. Hollywood always will attract the bulk of it because that's where the biggest opportunities and money are to be found. Even to songwriters money and opportunity are the most persuasive arguments.

WHEN audibility was added to the screen as a permanent fixture 20 years ago the main idea of the pioneers in this field was to utilize the new medium as a means of bringing good music to the populace at large. At that time there were still very few persons who believed that all-talking motion pictures could talking motion pictures could be made a commercial success except as a temporary novelty.

But a short time later the talkies forged to the front, and for a time the musical aspects of motion pictures received only the secondary attention of Hollywood producers. It wasn't until just about everything had been done for the screen in the way of developing and im-proving its talking qualities that the musical end began to come in for the serious attention that it deserves.

#### Cost Only Problem

The scope of musical opportunities in motion pictures is still considerable. It can be stymied by only one thing— unreasonably tough demands from union elements. Costs for music and musicians, not to mention the star singing and acting talent, already are up acting taient, already are up 300 per cent or more since pre-war days. A musical picture like *Night and Day*, for instance, which could be produced for \$1,000,000 or \$1,500,000 in 1936, called for a budget of \$4,500,000. So long as the box offices keep bubbling at the present rate, producers don't mind risking these multiple millions. But the minute business starts turning downward the first to get the ax are the high bracket pictures—and most of those musicals.

#### Four Basic **Functions**

Meanwhile, music continues to gain in use and importance on the screen. It serves four basic functions in the entertainment scheme, to wit:

- (1) Background and thematic music, to create proper
- audience mood.
  As song and dance numbers in a musical comedy or revue.
- For stories in music, as in
- the case of an operetta.

  To provide a title song, usually with an eye to exploitation tie-ups or a theme song for a drama.

ties presented in short subjects. Within this wide and diversified scope of activity, the composer, lyric writer, arranger and musician in Hollywood finds outlet for every facet of his talents. Newcomers with talent needing development and direction could hardly do better than to apprentice themselves to the music department of a motion picture studio in Hollywood, where most of ties presented in short subjects. in Hollywood, where most of the creative musical minds are now concentrated.

Taking the four principal music requirements of the screen in the order listed, the supplying of synchronized scores is by far the biggest and most diversified job. It is not most diversified job. It is not a hack activity, you may be sure, because the needs in this respect run all the way from simple notes to accompany the trotting of a cowboy's horse to symphony crescendos that will bring a suspenseful dramatic sequence to a smashing climax. Not infrequently, it is the music as much as the dramatic action that supplies the big action that supplies the big

punch in a screen climax. Tests have proven conclusively that a picture without a musical score, or with inadequate music, misses out very badly in delivering its dramatic punches and evoking audience response.

#### Bigger Studio

Improvement in synchronized screen music since the early days of sound has been so great that today portions of film scores frequently are presented as concert pieces by the best symphony orchestras. Which is no surprise, considering that Hollywood's musical composers and conductors include such names as Max Steiner, Franz Waxman, Victor Young, Kurt Forbstein, Nat Shilkret, Alfred Newman, Herbert Stothart, Erich Wolfgang Korngold, Dimitri Tiomkin, Edward Ward, Roy Webb, Edward J. Kay, Roy Webb, Edward J. Kay, George Stoll, David Snell, Emil Newman, Harry J. Salter, Wal-ter Scharf, Paul Sawtelle, Sig-mund Romberg, and many Romberg, and many without even touching

the popular song field.

Broadway at the height of its glory never boasted such an array of musical creators. And the outlook is for even greater intensification of music activities at the film studies calling. ties at the film studios, calling for expanded staffs.

Besides the realization that motion picture audiences are acquiring better musical taste and discrimination, foreign competition is acting as a spur to American producers. From the standpoint of synchronized scores, the pictures made abroad compare very favorably abroad compare very favorably with the Hollywood product. In thrilling melodramas particularly, where music can do a great job in pointing up suspence, terror and other dramatic qualities, the British, French and several other foreign movie-makers are crafts-men of the highest order. Two ourrent examples, both Britist productions, are *The Seventi* Veil, in which Rachmaninoff Second Concerto helps to supply a powerful musical back ground, and Henry V, which

also has attracted attention from music as well as motion picture critics. Melodramas like The Big Sleep, Notorious, The Killers and others are among Hollywood's outstanding current examples of sock musical scoring.

#### Song and Dance Stuff

The supplying of song and dance material for musical comedies and revues is another big-scale activity in Hollywood. Techniques employed on these productions are not much different from those of the Broadway stage, except for one important particular: A motion picture must have more movement and action than a stage production. Bridging the brief spaces where even a motion picture audience is apt to break out with heavy applause after a musical number, especially a whirlwind dance or spectacular production specialty, was a minor problem in early musical films. But this and other kinks have been ironed out smoothly in nearly two decades of experimentation.

In the course of turning out the tunes for filmusicals, many of the best-selling songs of the nation are produced. This is only to be expected, since scores of the country's leading songwriters are now located in

Hollywood. Tin Pan Alley, the mythical music thorofare that the public has always imagined to be in New York, actually has had its counterpart in Hollywood since 1930, when the "gold rush" of composers, lyricists, conductors, arrangers and musicians reached its peak and culminated in nearly 90 per cent of the musical creators who formerly worked in New York and Chicago migrating to the West Coast. That tide has never really been reversed and is unlikely to undergo any reversal in the future because Hollywood's musical requirements are increasing rather and diminishing. Besides the pay is high and regular.

#### Longhairs on The March

Operatic type musicals have not had a very big play on the screen up to now, but the success of A Song To Remember has given new impetus to productions in a more or less classical vein. Light operas, of

course, already have established a wide screen audience. The Desert Song, first operetta to be filmed after sound came in, was a big drawing card in its first release and in the subsequent remake three years ago. The extensive use of classical music for synchronized backgrounds in the past ten or fifteen years also has educated public taste to the higher forms of music and thus paved the way for the increased number of classical music vehicles planned by Hollywood for the coming season.

#### Oldies, Title Songs


Title songs, where it is possible for a motion picture to have one, have proved most advantageous in several ways. If the number is an oldie, and the picture to which it has been attached is a good one, the song is in for a profitable revival. Besides the usual radio, band, music shop, record and other channels of merchandising, the number benefits



from direct promotion to an extensive movie audience.

In the case of a film title song that is an original, if the number has any merit, the same exploitation forces are put to work in its behalf; and if the motion picture itself is above the average, the song is considerably aided by the prestige accruing therefrom. On top of this, popularity of film title songs is greatly stimulated by the more vivid and lasting impression they make on fans thru being tied in with a romantic screen story. This association often helps to boost what might have been a mild song hit into a top seller. To Each His Own and One More Tomorrow are among recent instances where title song and film story complemented each other. Sales of the numbers Rhapsody in Blue and Night and Day also have jumped as a result of the use of these titles for new filmusicals-and the other George Gershwin and

Cole Porter compositions used in these pictures likewise have enjoyed a new boom, some of it resulting from new promotion campaigns put on by RCA-Victor, Columbia, Decca, Capitol and other record companies.

#### Dramatic Theme

Inclusion of a theme song in a dramatic motion picture -the number sometimes being the same as the title song-has worked out very well in many screen productions and is becoming a more common practice. Here, again, it makes little difference whether the song is a new one or a revival, just so it is fittingly spotted in the action of the picture. The main considerations in proper spotting are to have the number fit naturally into the action of the story and to place it in such a way that it will register forcibly with the audience. Perhaps the best example of this was the set-up given As Time Goes By in the picture



Already definitely scheduled and either in production, preparation or recently released are no less than 75 musical biographies, musical comedies, revues and dramatic stories in which music plays a prominent part.

Biogs Lead The List

In scope and significance, the biographical musicals, as shown by the accompanying tabulation of 1946-'47 Musical Films, lead the list. There are 22 of these productions already on the schedules. In addition, arrangements for the filming

More than 75 Song-and-Dance Productions, Exclusive of Westerns and Shorts, Set by Studios-Biographies and Serious Music Are in For Biggest Play to Date of the life story of Vincent Youmans under the title of Sometimes I'm Happy are near completion at M-G-M. Blue Skies based on the life and music of Irving Berlin has been made and at least a dozen other music deals involving big names of the music world are in the discussion stage and may materialize into actual projects at any time. The story of the Witmarks, for instance, already published in book form, has attracted interest from several producers.

An interesting angle of the stress on musical biographies is the unprecedented attention being given to serious subjects.

New season's plans of the motion picture companies also show a considerable increase in attention to musical comedies and revues, with 35 already set and more on the way, and an increasing tendency to add a substantial repertoire of songs and other musical numbersabart from the customary synchronized score—in pictures of the dramatic type. The Man I Love, for example, a romantic drama using the famous Gershwin song for its title, has half a dozen popular compositions by the Gershwins, Jerome Kern, Oscar Hammerstein II, and other songwriters. The picture, however, is not classed as an outright musical.

Exhibs Don't

In the short subject department, on the other hand, the musical trend is downward. Principal reason for this is the fact that motion picture distribution. tributors are unable to get a sufficient increase in price from exhibitors to offset the higher exhibitors to offset the higher production costs. In the case of features, most of which are now played on percentage, bigger box office receipts mean bigger returns for the distributor and producer, thus taking care of the increased costs of production. But on shorts, though they cost 300 to 500 per cent more to make to. 500 per cent more to make to-day than 10 years ago, ex-hibitors still want them at the old prices and there has been no substantial hike—not more than 10 or 20 per cent—in the past 15 years.

76's to 356's

Biggest curtailment in musical shorts is among the band subjects. Before the war, a studio could make a band short for six or seven grand. Today the same subject calls for \$30,000 to \$35,000. In addition, an outlay of around \$12,000 is necessary for prints, and then there is the general expense of distribution. of distribution. Altogether, it runs into well above 60 grand, which is more than the average short subject can gross under present conditions. Which ex-plains why even Walt Disney

wants to quit making shorts.
This decline in musical activity in the short subject department is more than offset, how-ever, by the sizable set-up in the feature division.





## BIG PUSH ON

N THE last half of 1946 the major diskers, RCA Victor, Columbia, Decca and Capitol, began to show their productive power. Decca announced, in conjunction with the issuance of a financial statement, that they were producing some seven million records a month. At the same time as this statement was issued, Decca showed every indication of actively endeavoring to expand that production as rapidly as possible. Columbia, thru its president, Edward Wallerstein, shortly after, said they were turning out somewhere in the neighborhood of nine million records monthly. And the Bridgeport plattery, too, was working to increase its productive capability. RCA Victor, the reluctant to disclose overall production figures, did come forth, in September, with a staggering statement.

RCA Victor's Single 4 Million

Jim Murray, RCA Victor vicepresident in charge of the record division, said that the Camden diskery would press four
million records by a single artist in a single week. These
four million platters were to be
turned out on Perry Como
tunes, in connection with the
"Perry Como" week (September
2-9) promotion, which the publicity, exploitation and advertising boys were developing.
Capitol, tho far behind any of
the big three, was turning out
a highly respectable amount of
disks each month, and was
right in there swinging when
it came to acclerating and expanding productive facilities.

Beset by many problems, not the least of which was rising costs of everything that went into disk making, the manufacturers still pushed production to new highs. How they did it, how they plan for further expansion is told here.

## PRODUCTION

erating, or being rapidly readled for operation. (Decca had even made a deal with an indie plant.) All three also had substantial production in the Middle West and the East, with Columbia's Kings Mills, Ohio plant just beginning to hit peak production in September of this year.

#### Indies' Swaps & Other Deals

While the majors were on this production binge, the indies were having their production troubles. Some of them worked out deals whereby one manufacturer who had good East Coast manufacturing facilities would turn out disks for a West Coast manufacturer, and simply put the W. C. firm's labels on the disks. In exchange for this courtesy, the West Coast manufacturer would press disks for the Eastern firm, simply putting the Easterner's labels on his output. Some deals went even further. In at least one case where one indie manufacturer had fairly elaborate production facilities, but not too solid a distributor structure, he made a deal with another indie who had solid distribution but a poor plant set-up, to produce records for the latter indie in exchange for aid in distribution.

#### Further Complications in Picture

The entire production picture was further complicated by the continually mounting costs with which all manufacturers were faced. While some indie manufacturers in the earlier part of 1946 began to cut prices on their \$1.00 (retail) lines, and while the majors gave out statements about this time of the year that they absolutely would not raise their prices, the latter part of '46 found many of the indies regretting their price-cutting maneuver. And found such majors as RCA Victor and Capitol jumping the price on their 50c lines to 60c. Decca found it unnecessary to raise the price on its 50c stuff because it had wisely and gradually eased many of the erstwhile 50c attractions up to the 75c label. In most cases this was achieved by double-featuring the attractions, but in some cases the switch in price was carried out on disks by single attractions. Louis Jordan and Lionel Hampton are two of the most recent of Decca's in-



Lionel Hampton's Decca records went from 50 cents (retail price) to 75 cents, tax not included, as did many another Decca artist's. While many record manufacturers found it necessary to raise prices on their product, few achieved the production jump managed by Decca. Last reported turning out 7,000,000 disks a month, the figure now is probably closer to 10,000,000. With the Hamp in this shot is the child sensation, Sugar Chile Robinson.


demand ex-50c-ers who are now on the 75c label. As this Encyclopedia went to press, Columbia, thru prexy Wallerstein, was maintaining that it was not going to raise its prices despite mounting costs in almost every phase of disk production.

#### Player Production Didn't Materialize

And while production on the part of majors increased tremendously, there began to be signs (as 1946 drew to a close) that perhaps disk production,

amazingly enough, was going to outdistance disk demand. (This would be a condition hardly anticipated by anyone.) However, due to labor problems, strikes, etc., the expected boom production in other fields directly affecting phonograph record sales had not materialized. The radio-phonograph and phonograph manufacturers had hardly begun to put out a fraction of the millions of sets everyone was expecting, and the juke box manufacturers were still far from reaching anything near their peak

production. Until these two producers, among others, were able to increase the basic potential for disks by creating new buyers and users, it seemed as tho there would soon be more records made than people needed. But when the radio set and juke box manufacturers hit their stride, industry observers saw the pendulum once more swinging the other way, saw a never-before-dreamed-of demand for phonograph records and a masterful effort on the part of major and indie diskers to meet that demand.

## Talent Scramble

Old established names who are slipping struggle for a new foothold; hot-as-a-pistol names jockey for better deals; new bands and singers look for that big opening, that big chance to shoot to the top on a platter... and it all adds up to the most interesting and exciting talent scramble the record business has seen in years.

THE '45-'46 span saw-and the '47 stretch will continue to see-one of the most interesting and exciting talent scrambles in the history of the record business. The scramble is taking place on both sides of the fence. On the one side, the disk manufacturers, big and small, ever on the alert for salable platter personalities. are eyeing unsigned performers, but even more are ogling the talent lists of competitors, large and tiny. On the other side, bandleaders, singers, their managers and booking offices are scrambling for the best possible disk deal. For to talent, records today are a paramount factor which influences the performer's overall popularity as never before in show business's long history.

Let a rumor start to the effect that one of the major's top bandleaders is dissatisfied with the production, promotion or general co-operation he is getting from his diskery, and it won't be long before practically every other major, plus at least a half dozen of the smaller platteries are waving new offers at him. They don't bother finding out about the expiration date of the leader's contract first, or wait until

the pact runs out. Take the case of Duke Ellington, who was snared by Musicraft last summer even the his contract with RCA Victor didn't expire until November of 1946. While Musicraft was unable to record the Duke, they got his name on the dotted line-effective when his Victor deal ran out. The Musicraft-RCA Victor-Ellington deal, by the way, indicates the thoro feasibility of a so-called indie diskery, winding up with a valuable piece of property currently controlled by a major. In many cases, as a matter of fact, the cards are a little stacked in the indie's favor. The smaller company can go all out in a deal with a top artist, and not have to worry too much about any of its other (and not-near-top) talent screaming for a like deal. If a major diskery, however, should give one of its name attractions a super-deal, far out of line with what any of its other name attractions are getting they would soon have to raise the ante to the same kind of "super" deal for any of the names they wanted to hold

Raiding of names has taken place, and will undoubtedly continue to take place, not only

among indies and majors, but among the majors themselves. This season Columbia snatched Dinah Shore from RCA Victor, and Victor in turn snatched Betty Hutton from Capitol. When Lionel Hampton's Decca disk pact was up not too long ago, at least one of the majors and two indies were after him and were enticing him with "extraordinary" offers. Decca however, succeeded in re-signing the Hamp.

Changes in the talent picture take place, too, where one company, be it major or indie, has discovered that a certain performer (tho he might be great shakes in films, on the air or stage) can't sell enough platters to keep himself in cigarettes. When this happens, the company which happens to be stuck with the performer, suffers in silence till his pact expires and then drops him like a hot potato. The performer, and/or his managers, in the meantime, have carefully spread the word that the ABC Record Company doesn't know how to make or sell records and that they aren't renewing their pact. Generally, some other company, unaware of the true facts signs the guy, or some company, even tho they may know the facts, will believe that the first diskery flopped with the guy because of lack of know-how, and figure they can make a big hit out of the guy.

At the same time, too, artist and rep hands of practically all companies are always looking for that great new "discovery." It may sound corny, but the fact remains that a guy selling talent gets almost as big a kick out of discovering a smash hit piece of performer as he does making a pile of money. So Columbia is shooting to make its Elliott Lawrence a big name; Decca is playing along with Randy Brooks; Capitol has Sam Donahue and a couple of singers. RCA Victor has been putting the big push around Betty Rhodes.

Regardless of how many of the indies drop out of the record business, or how many of them merge, the fact remains that the upcoming year is going to be more competitive talentwise than any in the past. The Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Division will be rolling soon after the beginning of 1947. It is getting talent bids, and is considering some. It now has

Elliott Lawrence is one of the hottest of the newer bands to make his bid for fame via platters. He started out with a flock of unusually fine Columbia disks, and the diskery has high hopes for him. With Lawrence are vocalists Rosalind Patton and Jack Hunter.

Kate Smith (ex-Columbia), Johnny Johnson, Rudy Vallee and a couple of others. Before the next Encyclopedia of Music rolls around it is a safe bet to say that it will have a number of additional names, some of them now under contract to the major diskeries. And if MGM clicks as a plattery, Paramount, 20th-Century Fox and possibly one or more other film-makers might throw their hats into the record ring. A number of the indies will manage to stay in the battle, come hell or high water, and they'll be making their bid for performers. All, of which adds up to what was indicated at the beginning of this piece: The most interesting and exciting talent scramble in many a year.

From single stunts to national magazine and radio campaigns the record manufacturers (some indies and all majors) are really hitting on all exploitation cylinders. Here's a resume of their activities.

National advertiser tie-ups are neatly illustrated by the Dinah Shore photo and the Pat Kirkwood "No Leave, No Love" album display. Columbia tied up Dinah's "Who'll Buy My Violets" with Revlon nail enamel's new shade, "Ultra Violet," thus snaring some terrific free advertising and publicity. Here Revlon advertising manager, Helen Golby; H. K. McCann, president of McCann-Erickson ad agency; Charles Revson, Revlon prexy; Dinah herself, and Ted Wallerstein. COINCIDENTAL with its return to greatness as a separate and distinct entity in the entertainment business, the record industry (from the standpoint of the disk manufacturer) is beginning to carry on big-time show business, styled advertising, exploitation and promotion. This has been sadly lacking for some little time due to a number of factors, chief among which has been that promotional talent has been in the service, and competition was not keen enough to call for the heftiest kind of exploitation. Practically all disk makers were selling just about everything they could sell. Both these factors have now changed, however. Promotional personnel is back from the wars and working in the record business to an extent never known before, and competition is keener in the industry than it has ever been (and that includes its first pre-radio boom period).

All four of the majors, for instance, have launched national advertising campaigns utilizing top general magazines such as Life, Look, Time, The Saturday Evening Post, Collier's, etc., as well as newspapers of the caliber (circulation-wise) of The New York Daily News, New York Times, etc. In addition to the heaviest expenditures in their history for national black and white advertising RCA-Victor and Columbia are spending plenty of dollars promoting their labels via radio. RCA's network show has been on the air for well over a year, and Columbia's sponsorship of super-disk jockey Martin Block was one

a record. This kind of info includes general chatter, time of a side, etc., ad infinitum. Cosmo, ARA, Mercury, Musicraft and a few others have done outstanding jobs in this direction.

Cosmo, thru drive and aggressiveness of its promotion head, Eddie Heller, has probably pulled as many single stunts as any other indie, possibly more. For appearances of its band leaders at hotel and theater engagements, Cosmo has given away copies of the leader's latest Cosmo recordings to first couple of hundred customers gratis. Cosmo also promotes wide sponsorship of local disk programs by its distributors. Naturally on these disk shows, where the Cosmo distrib pays for the air time, only Cosmo records are played. In the Middle West by far the outstanding exploitation job on records by a small manufacturer was that done by Mercury Records. Mercury's promotion chief, Art Talmadge cooked up the idea of attempting to popularize the label name by hiring a midget, little Eddie, who was dressed as Mercury, the wing-footed Greek god, to make special promotional appearances for Cosmo. This was only one of the many stunts perpetrated by Mercury. Another notable exploitation device was the company's Audition Box, whereby dealers, operators, etc., had an opportunity to hear records before being required to place orders.

The majors didn't go in for single flash stunts the way

of the most talked of air stunts of the season last year.

On top of this air-time advertising the top-notch magazine and newspaper ad campaigns, each of the four majors, in their own fashion, are probably tossing more dough into direct mail than they ever have before. And their tradepaper advertising campaigns in the weekly issues of The Billboard have reached new highs too. For it is a generally agreed-upon maxim that to sell the public is one thing, but to tell the trade, from your own organization thru the distributors to dealers, disk jockeys and juke box operators is another and equally important matter.

The indie manufacturers (tho they don't have the financial wherewithal to go in for extensive national consumer advertising either thru newspapers, magazines, radio or any other outlet) have in a number of cases devised promotion and exploitation techniques which do great credit to the ingenuity and resourcefulness of their promotion men. A number of the indies, for instance, have come to the realization that radio's disk jockeys can be a most powerful factor in building label and artist acceptance. These indies therefore have gone to great lengths to service the jockeys with everything from plastic (nonsurface noise) platters, good for many plays, to house organs and mailing pieces with everything a platter spinner could want to know about

the Mercury-Cosmo school of indie did. They worked out more exhaustive deals tying up their product with motion picture distributor and exhibitor promotions, running special weeks for their artists (a stunt Victor tried with good success) and developing other such ideas. A few examples, however, of single-stype stunts worked out by the majors were: Columbia (in collaboration with Hal Davis, Kenyon & Eckhardt press agent), working on a 24hour plug for Benny Goodman on New York radio Station WNEW. Practically no 15minute span went by on Benny Goodman day on this powerful 50,000 watt station without at least one Benny Goodman plug. Columbia also worked out a tieup with Revlon, makers of nail enamels and other such beauty culture products, to promote Revion's Ultra Violet nail polish, and Columbia's Dinah Shore record of Who'll Buy My Violets. RCA-Victor's stunt My Violets. RCA-victor's stunt weeks for Spike Jones's "Musi-cal Depreciation Week," Perry Como week, Vaughn Monroe week, etc., were outstanding single artist gimmicks. And the company's terrific campaign in connection with its "billionth record," Serge Koussevitsky's Stars and Stripes Forever, stars and stripes Forever, backed by Semper Fidelis would rank with any promotion ever launched by a film company, radio network or anyone else. There is little doubt that the disk business, promotionally, is ranidly, coming of age. rapidly coming of age.



Many indie and practically all of the major platteries have exploited their wares thru the co-operation of disk jockeys by servicing the platter spinners more industriously, more efficiently than ever before. Here's a top name newcomer to jockey ranks, veteran sportscaster Ted Husing, whose heavy-money deal to spin 'em for Station WHN, New York, made radio and record history.



And tie-ups with Broadway musicomedies continued strong too. Here's a Decca Red Mill album display built around the Victor Herbert musical of that name.

# SALES

T IS my opinion that promotion of phonograph records should be creative of interest in music and records. It seems that most of us in the record industry are inclined to assume that our prospective customers are already educated and interested in music, and that our promotional job is simply to call their attention to records which are available. From figures resulting from surveys made by various publications, our greatest potential market lies among those persons who have had little contact with modern phonograph records and record reproducing instruments and who do not now own either instrument or records. It would seem to me that all of our promotional activities should be centered upon capturing the imagination of these thousands of future customers and interesting them in the value of recorded music to their lives.

#### Personnel Is Heart

At Bradford's, we have tried to achieve this thru promotional efforts both within the record departmen and thru our advertising. The heart of the dealer's successful record merchandising activities, of course, lies within the physical bounds of his record department, and the heart of his department is the personnel who contact his customers. Of utmost importance is the sincere interest of record department personnel in selling records. We have tried a number of ways to create this interest among our girls, some of which have been quite successful. One in particular has been quite effective. We have arranged with several professional shoppers to periodically shop our department and submit detailed reports as to their impression of the treatment they receive. We then have held meetings among the girls and frankly discussed these reports. We are considering carrying this idea a little further. in the future by establishing a contest among the girls, awarding a prize or bonus to the girl who has received the best shopper's report at the end of a specific period.

#### Suggestive Selling

Of great importance in connection with efficient sales technique is concentration upon suggestive selling. To accomplish this it is well to supply each sales girl with a list of items, in varied classifications which she may use to suggest Some 400 dealers at the '46

as additionel sales to her customers. This is also an excellent method of merchandising slow moving items as these can be included in the list supplied to the sales people. To augment the personal sales effort of the staff, attractive and effective displays, both within the store and in show windows and show cases is of the greatest importance.

I have personally never been completely sold on the socalled self-service system in record merchandising, but we have recognized the value of the various types of display racks created for self-service departments, and have found the use of them to be of value where they are scattered thruout the department and used for displaying albums rather than for the actual sale and stock of merchandise. It is obvious, of course, that timely tie-in displays associated with current events of musical interest are of value both within the department and for the show window

#### Audition

There is one place, however, where my personal opinion is apparently in disagreement with the general practice in record departments I have observed thruout the country, and that is the record audition room. I am firmly convinced that spacious, comfortably furnished audition rooms are of great sales value. We have installed audition rooms approximately five by seven feet in size, and have installed in these rooms the most comfortable furniture we could find. We have also installed high fidelity amplifiers and twelve-inch high fidelity permanent magnetic speakers on large baffles with the idea of flattering the tonal quality of records to the greatest degree possible. On one wall of each audition room is a fluorescent lighted bulletin board on which frequently changed displays of literature and items of musical interest are contained. In each room we have installed a single record merchandiser which acts as a perpetual silent salesman, By devoting as much space as we do to record rooms, it is our theory that the longer we can keep a customer in comfort in our store, the greater is the opportunity of selling him more merchandise.

#### Radio Top Medium

As to the advertising activities which have proven of val-

ue, we have found the most suitable the use of radio. The medium of radio broadcasting is, of course, ideal for merchandising music as it is the one medium thru which we can actually display our wares. Our most successful attempt at radio advertising was a concert program presented over our largest local station for nearly four years. The response to this was so successful that with the advent of the war and merchandise shortages. We found it necessary to discontinue it because we were unable to supply the demand.

Newspaper advertising, of course, has its value, but I believe that much of the newspaper record advertising has again assumed too much. There has been a tendency to run ads comprised of a list of records with the dealer's signature, assuming that readers of

the ad are just waiting for someone to suggest a musical composition by name, and forgetting the thousands who have little or no knowledge of music. It seems to me that both local and national newspaper and magazine advertising would do well to carry a message designed to create an interest in music, aimed at those who do not already have an interest.

#### Reviews To List

We have made constant use of a rather large mailing list to which we send one of the syndicate Record Reviews each month. This has produced constant results, tho I believe it is very necessary that extreme care be used in selecting and building a list. We have found that it is well to incorporate all of the names of professional men, particularly doctors and

attorneys. We also, of course, include on our list every new customer coming into the store, all charge accounts and every purchaser of a new combination instrument.

#### Enlisting Radio Set Salesmen

An obviously fertile market for records in large quantities is the purchaser of the new radio-phonograph combination. In order to stimulate record sales among this group, our radio salesmen are all instructed to make a conscientious attempt to sell a quantity of records with each new instrument, with the price of these records to be added to the conditional sales contract for the instrument, and paid according to the terms of the contract. This amount is then set up as a credit to the customer's account, against which he may purchase records.

We are also in the process at the present time of printing a booklet which will be attached to every instrument sold by our store. The booklet will be attractively designed in two colors and will contain a paragraph regarding the proper handling and care of phonograph records, another paragraph explaining the proper handling and care of the new instrument, and inside is a list of approximately 350 musical compositions of all classifications. This list is not an actual list of records and numbers, but rather of musical works which form an ideal nucleus for a record library. In the paragraph preceding the list, the customer is invited to use this booklet as a guide to assist him in building a wellrounded library.

#### Music "Show" For Clubs


Before the war, we found another idea that is working rather well and that is the supplying of an instrument, records, and a commentator to appear before such groups as church circles, women's clubs, music clubs, etc. We present a program of whatever length is desired, complete with interesting commentary regarding the music. We found this creates a great deal of interest in recorded music, in the records themselves and in the instrument we use, and almost invariably results in sales. We have found, however, that it is very necessary that the greatest of caution, be used in keeping the commercial aspect of such appearances at a very dignified level.

#### Individualized Suggestions


As a further service to customers we found it useful to especially design postcards containing suggestions of new releases which we feel might be of interest to certain customers. This is done by each sales girl for her own customers with whom she is acquainted. If the right suggestion is sent to the right customer it almost invariably produces results. I have not attempted here to exhaust all the possibilities of record promotion ideas, but only to offer a few suggestions which we have tried in our own business or have observed from the operations of others.





# Children's Records Hit New Popularity Peaks

Major record companies, as well as many independents, are doing the biggest job in their history with kidisks. New ideas, new names, new techniques all come in for a share of

THE "Kidisk" Klondike is on in earnest. While the take from tyke tallow has always been a neat item in plattery circles (many small outfits put out nothing else and don't ever intend to), the four major waxeries (Decca, Columbia, Victor and Capitol) and many a battling so-called indie are pushing moppet material to never-before-heard-of lengths. Most competent trade observers estimate that gross annual business on children's records now run somewhere in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000. Predictions on where the biz will go vary from guesses insisting that it will hit \$25,000,000 per annum by the end of '47, all the way to prognostications that it will represent a full one-third of the income of the major record companies.

the big boom.

#### Boom Is

On one point all agree: There's a definite boom in the brat platter field. Random sales figures on recent and current productions bear this out. Decca's Alice in Wonderland, with Ginger Rogers and other film players, has sold well over 200,000. Cosmo's Tubby, the Tuba, with a Victor Jory narration and a Leon Barzin

symph ork, has hit close to the 100,000 mark. Victor's Paul Wing series has been selling better than 100,000 per season each year for the past couple of years. Decca's Frank Luther K series has sold into the many hundreds of thousands per album and is one of the most successful pee wee package propositions ever cut. Decca has reissued Luther's Song of Safety album. Basil Rathbone's Christmas Carol and Treasure Island for Columbia have sold better than 100,000 each. Most platteries have a strong aversion toward releasing sales figures, but there is

no question that 100,000 album sellers in the "kidisk" field are quite common and that a number of the album jobs have hit well above 250,000. (Big difference, of course, between pop records and tot platters is that the latter are about 95 per cent albums and continue to sell year after year, while pops are, for the greater part, single disks and live a short, merry life.)

#### Big Payoff To All Hands


Talent-wise, the boom promises a big payoff to writers (both talk material and music), arrangers, narrators, actors,


comedians, singers and orchestras. Seemingly in for the biggest break are radio and picture names. Decca has probably done the biggest job in the past in utilizing the boxoffice value of film attractions, having used (in addition to Ginger Rogers) such pic names as Thomas Mitchell (Treasure Island), Charles Laughton (Moby Dick), Ronald Colman (Christmas Carols), Loretta Young (The Littlest Angel), Herbert Marshall (The Snow Goose), Donald Crisp (Children's Corner), Frederic March (The Selfish Giant) and Edna Best (Cinderella).

Best (Cinderella).
Columbia has used Basil Rathbone on Robin Hood (in addition to two packages named above), and scored a click last year with a Gene Kelly package on the little king who couldn't dance from the MGM film, Anchors Aweigh.
Capitol made a splurge in the moppet market last year with Margaret O'Brien telling the tale of the Three Billy Goats Gruff and other stories; the Great Gildersleeve (Hal Peary) doing Puss in Boots, Rumpelstiltskin and other tot tales; Fibber McGee and Molly in a Christmas album, and Tex Ritter in a kid package of cowboy stuff.

Victor hasn't gone in too heavily for film or radio names, but has plans which it refuses to disclose at the moment. These plans are believed to call for terrific acceleration in the "kidisk" field. Victor un-doubtedly will make use of some film and air names, tho heavy accent will continue to be put behind cuttings of Paul Wing, who is the company's number oner in this category.

Kelly With Special Material

Columbia, with Goddard Lieberson heading up pee wee Lieberson heading up pee wee platter plans, is cooking up a series of another six of eight Gene Kelly albums, all with special material (words and music) written by young American composers. Lehman Engel, Herbert Haufrecht and Wallingford Reigger are among the cleffers already contracted Columbia also has made a deal with Nila Mack to record several albums of her Let's Pretend, top CBS moppet air seg (Pretend has been winning No. 1 position as favorite kid program in The Billboard radio editors' poll, and other awards for years). On the *Pretend* platters, Lieberson will use Miss Mack's original material (words and music) as well as the orig-

inal Pretend cast.

Possibly most indicative of the majors' determination to dig beaucoup nuggets out of the "kidisk" gold mines is the activity in this phase of the biz around Decca. Firm has and has had for years the guy who is probably tops in the field in the person of Frank Luther. Luther's stuff has been a bestselling moppet perennial, and his latest plans are to record single disks, 12-inchers with a full 14-piece band.

9-to-16-Year-Olds To Get Workout

Decca has also decided to go after what it considers the sadly neglected kid market revolving around the 9-to-16-year-age bracket. To make the big push here, the firm hired Louis Un-ternieyer, poet, author and lec-Untermeyer's idea is to turer. turn out albums for the early



tinuing to develop packaged platters of great literature. His Moby Dick with Laughton and Treasure Island with Mitchell were first steps in that plan. Coming up are albums of Robert Browning's Pied Piper of Hamlin with Oscar-winner In-Hamiin with Oscar-winner Ingrid Bergman doing all the voices, and Stories of Edgar Allen Poe, featuring The Cask of Amontillado with film fatman Sydney Greenstreet.

Lectures For Promotion

Luther and Unitermeyer do many lectures, in the course of which they sell groups they address on "kidisks." Talks are delivered before parent-teacher associations, entire school bodies at assemblies, father and son banquets, national and regional music educators' con-ferences, etc. Luther estimates that he makes about 100 such that he makes about 100 such appearances each year, talking to audiences ranging from a couple of hundred (at PTA meetings) to several thousand at school assemblies. Untermeyer gives about 30 or 40 lectures a year to similar auditures a year to similar audiences. Luther also co-operates ences. Luther also co-operates extensively with department stores and other large retail outlets in doing personal ap-pearances in connection with sale of his albums. Yesterday, for instance, he made a per sonal appearance at Macy's here, tying up with the store's push on his reissued Songs of Sajety package. Luther was recently feature-storied in The Saturday Evening Post, and he has a piece coming up in the July (mother and child issue) of Mademoiselle.

Decca also has just hired

Simon Rady, who handled production on the Tubby, the Tuba album issued by Cosmo.

George Kleinsinger, who wrote Tubby, incidentally, has just sold his follow-up of it, Pee Wee, the Piccolo to Victor.

Puner Stresses Material And Its Presentation

teen-agers which will educate them painlessly and entertainingly. He has started and is consicraft's Red Robin series, written by Hecky Krasno and Phil Eisenberg, who are under ex-clusive contract to the plattery, has been a steady seller thru the years. Paul Puner, who heads up the "kidisk" division at Musicraft, says he has many new plans, but reiuses to dis-close them. Puner, by the way, scoffs at the big filmradio name technique being employed in the "kidisk" He feels that very few, if any, names have anything to con-tribute to kids, and believes the key to success with moppets lies in material and presentation, regardless of names.

Sonora has done fairly well with its *Uncle Don* playland package, and now such indies as Mercury, DeLuxe, ARA and others are flocking into the pee wee picture. Mercury recently pacted Jack Carson to do their kid stuff. DeLuxe has signed Jean Hersholt (who years ago cut an album for Decca) to do a Dr. Christian's Fairy Tales package. Same indie is currently after Thomas Mitchell for a Sinbad the Sailor album. ARA signed Martha Blair Fox, kiddy story expert, who has done much work in the field, including a stint on WLS, Chicago. ARA also has pacted Lionel Barrymore to do an albuin on his own Halloween, which he calls a fairy tale for music. This will probably be over the younger orats' heads, but will have decided appeal for older kids. Musicraft also for older kids. Musicraft also is dickering for a deal with Kenny Delmar (Senator Clag-horn) for an album which would have a combination kidgrown-up appeal.

Old Vs. New Stuff Mixed Trade Reaction

Opinion in the trade as to the type of material which goes best for the kids is mixed. Some believe that the best stuff is the traditional Mother Goose, Anderson and Grimm's Fairy Tales, etc., while others feel that the big market will be for specially created material. In the latter respect, there recent-ly developed another situation

which may prove an additional revenue builder for diskeries and the people who work for them. Harry Bank, Cosmo prexy, sold the film rights to Tubby, the Tuba to George Pal for one of his Puppetoon features. If the Tubby Pup-petoon is successful at the box office, Pal may follow with purchase of Pee Wee, the Piccolo.
Victor has done a big job in

kid material with its show piece sets, one and two disks to a package. They have sold not only the standard kid material, but have even used the moppet-appeal idea in packaging to hypo sales of some of their Red Seal longhair platters.

Considering tykes' tremendous interest in comic strips, dous interest in comic strips, the disk biz seems to have used little in the way of hook-ups with nationally famed comic characters. Years ago, Decca turned out a platter-package called Superman's Christmas Adventure. It was strictly a seasonal item, and didn't do too well at that well at that.

Disney's Pix and Longhair Sock Wax

Practically all of Disney's material (Snow White, Pinnochio, Three Caballeros, Saludos Amigos, etc.) has been sock kid stuff and practically all majors have put out stuff based on it, notably Victor and Decca. Longhair stuff, aside from the Red Seal case mentioned above, also has sold well on occasion. Peter and the Wolf is probably the outstanding example.

Among pop bands, Victor's Spike Jones, is about the only one ever to make a dent in the kid field, and Jones has made a solid one. His Nutcracker Suite has sold well over 100,000, and his single platter of Mother Goose Nursery Rhymes on one side and Old MacDonald Had a Farm on the other, has been one of those rare kid-adult appeal combinations, with resultant sales nudging the quartermillion mark.

Air "Kidisk" Shows In Embryonic Stage

Just beginning to come to life are radio shows featuring "kidisks." There are a scat-tered few around the country, the most recent and possibly the most successful of which is For Children Only, on WHN (50 kw. local indie). Children Only is written by Hal Davis and handled on the air by

Marilyn Cantor.
In attempting to analyze the reasons for the boom in the brat field, opinions vary. Most trade hepsters believe that it was due mainly to these three

developments:
(1) The general disk boom.

(2) Extreme scarcity of all other types of toys and items for children during the war.

Smarter packaging and merchandising of kid stuff on the part of record man-Smarter ufacturers.

Whatever the reasons, there are no trade dopesters who disagree with the idea that there's gold in them thar jills and jacks, and that the gold rush will continue for some time. A NY American who has spent any time in England is well aware that the British are better known for their fish and chips, milds and bitters (that's brew without the 3.2 ceiling) and tea (the kind one drinks) than they are for their music appreciation. While I was in England, being a nosy American and not being able to get along without my music, I found out for myself that Brother Briton, in his own little way, certainly had a keen sense of music appreciation. I found that he was a vigorous student of jazz music, and war or no war, somehow managed to keep track of his American favorites. His only complaint was that he couldn't get to hear all of that wonderful music in the flesh.

I have formal correspondences going with several of these British cats, and a lot of what they have to say will constitute the remainder of this article.

#### Grumbler Same

The old-line jazz lover, the one who doesn't believe that jazz ever got past 1930, is the most persistent grumbler over there as he is over here. These are the guys who holler bloody murder when somebody says something complimentary about Dizzy Gillespie, the Herman Herd or the Boyd Raeburn band. In the first place the English haven't heard more than a morsel of Gillespie and possibly one record of Raeburn's Who Started Love?, on a V-Disc. They have been getting Woody's stuff quite regularly. There is undoubtedly much that is bad about this bebop stuff and the superdynamic surrealistic big band jazz, but there is also much that is worth while in this music. The grumbler can't see anything, can't hear anything, in fact, he just doesn't give a damn. If it isn't Louis or Jelly-Roll or Bix, and if it doesn't

# A YANK LOOKS AT HIS HIP ENGLISH COUSINS

come out Dixieland or Chicago, they're not interested.

#### Sugar Guys Around Too

There's the other guy in England too. That's the guy who can't see what the old-line jazz lover can see. He likes to take his jazz with a coating of sugar. He's the guy who's hopped up about Woody and Stan Kenton and, would love to get his hands on some of the Raeburn recorded specials. He's the guy who's willing to compromise. He even can appreciate a British band led by Ted Heath that is trying something more advanced than the stuff that is usually dished out to the usually sedate English dancing public. He is cognizant of the fact that the world is moving forward and with its progress will move its music. There are a good many of this school in England as well.

#### Moody Likes Lawrence

Walter Moody, one of England's key record men, recently reviewed the American music scene for the English music publication, Melody Maker. He was quoted as being somewhat inclined to lean toward the hipper types of music rather than to the mickey stuff. On this visit the band that left him closest to heaven was the Eliot Lawrence outfit. He predicted international fame for the young maestro within the next year, and Mr. Moody was careful to further catagorize this fame into the dance music From there Moody went field. ahead and patted Woody on the back for sticking to his musical convictions, tho "his

music is a little too hot for the American public." Next he talked about Artie Shaw, whose work he admired. He finished by saying that the English could expect to hear a good deal of Artie on record in the near future. This was the first indication that Musicraft, who owns Artie's recording contract. was going to crack the international market by completing a pressing and distribution pact with Moody's Electrical Music Industries, Ltd.

Dizzy proved "distinctly refreshing" to the recording exec, while Slim Gaillard and his voutees by some quirk of fate sounded like a fine example of modern small band jazz (ugh!). He said, and for my dough he was right, there isn't a gal in the whole United States who could sing next to Billie or Ella, both of whom

sounded better to him than when he last heard them years before. He was impressed with Louis's durability, Eddie Heywood's fine piano, J. C. Higginbotham's great tram, the King Cole Trio's fascinating arrangements and Spike Jones's lunacy. That was what Mr. Moody heard over here.

#### Herman's Stuff Hot; Heath Too

A record dealer friend of mine writes that the biggest thing to hit the British counters since the war ended has been the stuff that Woody's rejuvenated Herd put on wax. Apple Honey was sensational, Northwest Passage slew them and Wild Root is hitting the jackpot.

Another of my friends advised me that Edgar Jackson is one of the key tub thumpers for



English sensation. When I heard the Heath hand in its first months, there was nothing that was unusual about it except that it was more musicianly than most of the other bands that were earning their shillings in English spots. That alone, the fact that it was a musicianly band, put the British trade people firmly behind it, and the band has been going great guns wherever it has gone. Perhaps there have been some changes made since the year or so ago that I heard them, but at that time Ted had a fine arranger doing his writing for him, a guy by the name of Sy Oliver who occasionally turns out some stock arrangements.

A Southampton cat wrote me that his bunch is really madder than blazes that nobody seems to be making any effort to get Capitol Records to establish a British beach-head. They aren't interested in much more than Kenton, King Cole, Peggy Lee, the Hawk, Benny Carter and a couple of the others.

There's no doubt about it. Brother Briton gets more hip every day. They're even dethe Ted Heath ork, the newest veloping be-bop degenerates.



# The DISTRIBUTION

Record manufacturers who came into the business planning to set the turntables on fire, but overlooked that little item, the distributing setup, are still going round and round. Here's a once-over on the current distribution trends.



Typical of the distributors who have long-established reputations with juke box operators and are rapidly building reputations with hordes of retailers are Earl Winters and Nat Cohn, of Modern Music Sales, shown here hugging a display set-up of their disk line, Vogue Records.

THE single phase of the record business which proved to many newcomers to the industry a fast-whirling merry-go-round was distribution. And many of these newcomers are still dizzy from the ride. In numerous cases they had a fair knowledge of music, a good conception of what made a salable record, and they were able to hire studio, engineering and manufacturing personnel, if not always superior, of usually adequate talents. When it came to getting the record to the customer, however, many of them began to go round and round.

Almost as many methods of distribution were attempted as there were new firms entering the industry. Some new manufacturers tried selling direct to dealers and operators. Some tried setting up their own branch distribution offices. Some made deals with distributors of other lines of merchandise. In late '43, thru '44, and all of '45 it made little difference what sort of distribution method they were following. People wanted, and couldn't get records. Late in '45 and thru '46, however, the pressure has begun to be applied. The record manufacturers who felt the pinch quickest and most severely were those with the poorest distribution structures.

Distributors, whether manufacturer owned and operated or independent, had gone thru the same war-time development as all other types of sales organizations. The distributor salesmen had gotten used to taking orders, had forgotten how to sell. And now that the pressure was on it became necessary—nay, urgent— that the distributors' salsmen go out and do a real selling job on records.

on records.

The vital need for this selling job will, in the opinion of sales executives in the industry, be intensified as merchandise of all kinds becomes more readily available. First the distributor's salesman will have the job of selling the dealer on devoting valuable floor space to disks, as against another line of merchandise, with possibly a higher profit margin. And having accomplished that little task, it will become necessary for the distributor salesman to sell his own particular label, against numerous other good labels. The job will be particularly difficult for the distributor of numerous indepen-

only one of the latest in a regular parade of radio and home appliance distributors who have taken on non-major disk lines. General Electric Supply Company, earlier in '46 was among the first in the field, taking on the Signature line. Majestic's distribution structure, of course, was one of the key factors in determining the Majestic Radio and Television mob on taking over the Classic Record Company from Eli Oberstein and Al Middleman and putting out a Majestic label. Sonora is another radio and phonograph manufacturer which distributes its own disks thru its own distributors who handle a long line of appliances of the same name, recently took

dent labels. There have been persistent reports that certain distributors for some major labels have been putting victous economic pressure on dealers by telling them that they would not be able to get more of certain top hits by top artists on the major label unless they threw out certain indie labels they were now carrying. Whether or not these reports are true, or regardless of how widespread they are or become, the distributor for the independent manufacturer is going to have to be smart, aggressive and an intelligent salesman.

The tendency among distributors carrying independent labels has been to take on many indie lines rather than just a few. One or another of the indie manufacturers always seems to have a hit running, and by raising such a hit disk, as a wedge, the distributor is often able to pave the way for sale of many other platters of other indie labels.

Car

By far the most successful distributors of indie labels, and in some cases major labels, have been firms who have long years of experience and solidly established customer-lists in the juke box field. These companies have done outstanding jobs for such indie labels as Exclusive, Musicraft, Cosmo and many others. Their job is mainly with juke box operators, of course, tho many of them are making steady progress building sales organizations aimed at dealer selling.

at dealer selling.

Having a long-established jump on most others in the field of dealer sales, however, are some of the radio and other electric home-appliance distributor set-ups. MGM Record division in September of 1946 announced that 30 of the Zenith distributors would handle the MGM record line. This 30 includes the three Zenith owned-and-operated distributors in New York, Newark and Chicago. Zenith is

on the Black & White label (Hollywood indie) and other radio, phonograph and home appliance distributors will no doubt continue to enter the picture.

Whatever developments, at any rate, ensue in the record business in the next twelvementh period, manufacturers from the largest to the smallest, are confident that distribution strength will prove a major factor in the success or failure of many record lines.

# WHAT NATIONS DISK OCKEYS WANT

In this symposium, a representative group of the nation's platter spinners tell the record companies, bandleaders, music publishers, et al, how they can help the jockeys make their programs more effective . . . and thus help diskers, orksters and publishers even more than they have in the past.



#### SAMMY ANDERSON Radio Station WSAN 'Allentown, Pa.

T HAS been my experience that music publishers and record companies do co-operate with us in the presentation of popular music material.

A proverbial "doffing of my hat" to the smaller record companies who are making noteworthy advances in the jazz field. But do you mind if, in good faith, I offer a suggestion?—cut a better platter—surface noise, cracks, etc., in some instances are so profound, so as to be on an equal basis with the musical content of the record, thereby working to disadvantage to the company and the performer.

CAN'T BE too sure about the rest of the nation's platter spinners, but this one would like several things. First on the list is more novelty tunes by top-notch performers; examples are Dinah Shore's Doin' What Comes Natur'lly and Dorothy Lamour's Personality. More Western or Folk tunes by musicians that can play and singers that can sing. Pet peeve is that there are too many good tunes ruined by three chord guitar players with a clothespin on their nose. The clothespins should be furnished the jockeys.

herein are only those of myself, I feel sure that most of my colleagues thruout the country will heartily endorse most of these suggestions:

Altho the publishers send thru a lot of publicity on the artists who perform the works they are plugging, they seldom, if ever, give out with the story of the music, and sometimes even fail to send along any information about the composers, arrangers, etc.

It is my humble opinion that we could all do a better selling job if this information was furnished on all new releases. In discussing classical music this information is never left out, and a great amount of time on longhair shows is devoted to the composer, why he composed the particular number, and also the things he intended to portray in the composition. This being the case in classical music, why not have the same thing for modern tunes? In other words, instead of always plugging the recording artists, let's turn some chatter toward the music itself.

When a disk jockey gets word that so-and-so will be in town on a certain date, he usually goes out of his way to get things worked out for a personal appearance of this artist on his platter show. Yours truly believes that it is the duty of this artist to make every effort to meet this obligation, once he has signified his intention to appear. Failure to show up for an interview of this type hurts not only the D. J., but also the artist, no matter how big or little is his reputation. After all, the main purpose of these interviews is to build the reputation of the show, and in the long run, do a better selling job. It is therefore peneficial to the artist to make this appearance.

AS A RECORD spinner I could use some real good chatter material, containing human interest, and humerous incidents about the artists themselves. Time limitations on the record sessions do not permit personal appearances. So, chatter is just the thing.

ISK JOCKEYS, in order to remain tops with their fans, must be in position to play popular tunes when they are popular. Too often announcers are faced with the handicap of being unable to secure new releases, because 10cal music-store outlets are themselves unable to get them. If manufacturers could allot supplies for radio distribution -even to the extent of earmarking complimentary disks for initial shipment to stations thruout the country-then the inajority of local stations could be assured of remaining on par with metropolitan stations in playing tunes while they are new and thus helping to promote tunes sufficiently to establish them as hits. Another thing we notice in the hinterlands is the reluctance quite often of dance band maestros to take enough time to drop in for our record sessions and send a "hello" to their listeners. It takes only 5 or 10 minutes here and there and, although some

of the stations are in the "yokel" class, they are beaming that maestro's music to thousands of his admirers in every section. Just because a station may be termed a "whistle-stop" is no reason for a big-name batoneer to give us the old heave-ho. Most local stations have to rely a lot on canned music. Unfortunately, a station music staff is often undermanned in the selection of music and the preparation of appropriate continuity. It seems fitting, therefore, that record companies might supply sample scripts containing tune topics. news of the industry, forthcoming releases and general jive chatter with weekly lists of the nation's favorites as determined by such polls as those in The Billboard. The boys who spin the platters don't mind work but they suffer in comparison with the big town fellows because most of them don't have the tools to work with. Give them a hand.

#### BILL WARREN Radio Station WITH, Baltimore, Md.

N ADDITION to my duties as night supervisor, I em-cee a nightly hour long Record Revue for Fred Walker's Music Store-one of the nation's largest independent retail record distributors. Since it is my job to "review" the recordings heard on the show I am forever searching for material to use. Needless to say, it would be appreciated if the record companies, band leaders and music publishers sent out publicity directly to the disk jockey -publicity that includes background material on the tune. the composition of the orchestra, solo chorus, and a word about the vocalists. It is apparent that the big name bands have a large turnover of vocalists and it would be to the advantage of the disk jockey if he had a word or two to say about the new members of the band. Incidentally, Columbia records have done a fine job in supplying such material but often their Columbia Record News arrives a few days after the records reviewed are received at the station.

Many of the record companies—especially the smaller and newer organizations would

have more success in getting their wares played over the air if the quality of the recordings were improved. While it is true that the average record buyer does not pay much attention to "surface noise," we in the radio industry are most careful in selecting records that reproduce well over the air. I recognize the fact that the new companies, unable to purchase their own modern equipment. are forced to use the facilities of other concerns whose products are far from perfect for radio use. Wouldn't it be a wise investment on the part of the record companies to put thru a "run" of special highfidelity plastic disks for direct distribution to the record jockeys who are instrumental in making or breaking a recording? Capitol Records have found it feasible to carry out such a policy-and with great success. My sponsor is particularly concerned about the "plugging" of lesser known artists and disks but our campaign has been held back by the continued poor quality of the disks made by several com-



## DEAN LANDFEAR Off the Record, 11:05 p.m. to 12 a.m. (Mon. Thru Sat.) Radio Station WMT Cedar Rapids-Waterloo, Ia.

OFF THE RECORD, airs six nights a week. That means it is my duty to assemble a well-balanced show of fourteen or more records six days a week. And brother, that's not easy. I like to open with a vocal of a familiar tune at "up tempo." We need more platters of this type. A good example is Sinatra's waxing of Saturday Night. That disk makes an excellent opener. The band has plenty of sock . . . the tempo is lively . . . the tune was a hit . . . and of course, there's Frankie. An ideal record to get a show off on the "right foot."

We need more instrumentals—both slow and fast—by such favorites as Les Brown, Woody, Goodman and others. Label credit by outstanding soloists would help. I am continuously delving into record reviews trying to find out who played "that fine eight bars on the last disk." Listeners are more and more becoming interested in side men as well as leaders.

Two companies — Capitol and Musicraft — are supplying us with vinylite pressings. This is an excellent idea and other firms would do well to follow suit. In any event the quality of many of the biscuits on the market today could be improved. Some (otherwise good) records cannot be used because of deplorable quality. Give us better surfaces and we can do a better job.

## ED STARR Radio Station WBIR Knoxville, Tenn.

AT THE outset, I want to explain that this opinion is necessitated by my working at a small station in a small town. I have worked in larger stations in larger cities and these instances and occasions have not arisen to such a degree. Also the section of the country I find myself inhabiting gives importance for the following statement.

I believe the disk jockeys of the South would like personal visits of the recording stars. The largest cities in the South, which are by far in the minority, are fortunate in being able to entertain said stars. I realize how difficult the situation is, but the smaller cities and stations are selling the same artists and their wares as are the larger stations. We need material to work with if we are going to make a record or transcribed show more than just another record show. The trade magazines, record companies, etc., offer a limited amount of promotion but what

is a fellow to do? I can't afford to subscribe to every magazine in order to glean from its pages material to use in order to try to make a record show a little different. BMI has a good system, but it is also limited.

## LARRY MORRELL Radio Station KTEM Temple, Tex.

THE THING that we could use more than anything else here would be information about the bands or the tune itself, if it has any interesting background. Since Temple is pretty well off the beaten track, personal appearances are just about out of the picture. However, a band leader should certainly be more than willing to appear on a record show whenever asked because it enables him to meet, over the air, a lot of people that probably never get to see him in person. Not only that, if he is co-operative with the platter spinner he naturally is going to get more of his records plugged in the future.

What I would like for our shows is more information about the bands, such as who takes the choruses, on what instruments, etc., any interesting facts about the sidemen as well as the leader, also anything out of the ordinary that might have happened during the recording of a particular song.

The main beef I have is that we never get much information about anybody's band. If we had more of that—our shows would be more interesting and the bands would get more plugging.

WHILE nobody ever expects to achieve Utopia, what I would like to get from the record companies, band leaders, et al., is only one thing. ... better records. Time was when the big companies, Decca especially, could be counted on for good surface quality, even to the exclusion of good content. Now they don't seem to care how it sounds on a turntable, as long as it looks good on the release sheets. With the number of small companies bringing out new labels each week, the quality should, logically, get better because of the stimulated competition. But it doesn't. And I hate to put a record on my show that I ballyhoo as a "new release" and have it sound like an old Edison cylinder.

Let the record companies stop worrying about what vocalists used to be with which bands . personally I seldom use that kind of patter anyhow . . all this disk jockey wants is prompt servicing with good records. And outside of ARA and Jewel and Continental there are far too few labels doing this.

### Radio Station KOAM Pittsburg, Kan.

BELIEVE a good summary of the men used in making a record would be a big help to us. People hear records and usually get only the band leader's name and that of the vocalist. Why not give the featured men more of a buildup, for without them there might not be much of a record.

Sometimes there is a good story behind a song that never gets out to the public. Let us know, we'll tell 'em. By the way, orchids to Doris Day and Ted Nash of the Les Brown crew for their fine work.

#### HANK MORGAN Radio Station WJHP Jacksonville, Fla.

AS FAR AS I know only one major recording company (and not any transcription service) sends out any comprehensive background and sidelight copy on latest releases.

Disk jockeys need ready info channels direct from the recording companies with regard to the particular releases as they come out, to avoid having to dig here and there for dope and depend mainly on hearsay and the many sometimes unreliable sources.

Listeners are artist conscious—they are constantly seeking new sidelight info on their favorites in connection with latest record releases.

### S. TURNER JONES Radio Station WDAD Indiana, Pa.

HERE'S a bouquet to Capitol Records for their monthly booklet. Other record companies could do the same type of publicity.

To tell the truth, I have so many requests for records that chatter becomes quite secondary. However, information concerning the recording artists is always welcome. I wish all the recording companies would list the title of the shows from which the number is taken on the labels.

As for personal appearances, I am in a small town and have no access to the great or even near-great. However, we did have Jimmy Stewart here on Christmas Day for a personal appearance and interview. Naturally, Jimmy was co-operative and gracious to the nth degree.

ISK jockeys want the record companies to continue emphasis upon better records, rather than more records! As a guy who has been spinning platters for the people on more than 2,200 consecutive programs. I've seen the steady production of records by three or four companies stop completely during the Petrillo panic, then gradually swing into good business again and finally have to fight for its life against the inroads of scores of companies, all scrambling for talent and distribution. I've seen record departments in stores double and triple their business. And I've seen gradual recognition of the disk jockey's importance to the record industry.

What more do we want? Sample records of good quality, information concerning the

artists, complete personnel listings on all labels where outstanding instrumentalists are featured, an occasional recorded statement by band leaders and vocalists, pitched to the disk jockey's audience, and occasional recognition during local appearances of the recording artists. Some band leaders, such as Spike Jones, are already going all out for co-operation with the platter spinners, but others might well steal a leaf from his book. They will find it greatly to their advantage.

And there you have it. There's no need to run on endlessly with recommendations to lessly with recommendations to record companies and artists. All we ask is whatever cooperation would also reflect credit upon the record producers and talent. It's good business for us to work together

HERE in Los Angeles, we of the disk profession enjoy the disk profession enjoy a "friendly rivalry." Like good newspapermen, we like to get "scoops." That is, each of us wants to be first with the new records. We want to get pre-releases if possible. Nothing pleases us more than to be able to announce, "You will now hear for the first time in Los Angeles-

So if there is anything I would like the record companies to do for me it is to send me exclusives for introduction in this area.

As I say, all the other boys feel the same way about it. But remember, it's Frank Bull who's making the pitch!

Generally, I don't use "hand-out" publicity material from record companies, band leaders, music publishers, etc., unless I happen to get hold of a good exclusive local news angle. We exclusive local news angle. We read *The Billboard*, and that gives us the dope on where the folks are and what they're doing. *The Billboard* keeps us up to date, also, on now records are doing in popularity thruout the country, and, of course, that reflects in the way we play 'em way we play 'em.

#### **DON MATHERS Radio Station KDAL**

AM DEEPLY convinced that our biggest need is a book that lists the birth, parents and history of hundreds of popular and showworld tunes that have entered this world since 1900.

In the case of new pop tunes, we usually can get enough dope from various sources that make for chatty intros. But when building a balanced record show we must include "oldies." All too often we can't recall correctly the year the tunes were hits, what pix or show they were in, who did the best selling job on the tune, etc.

We need more than a mere memory for cataloging.

Columbia is the only major record house that faithfully sends us pre-public releases. Consequently, we find ourselves doing a nice pre-sales job for them and incidentally, for ourselves. No other major house gets releases to us. Knowing sales are high I can't help wondering if they wouldn't be higher with our prodding! Practically all, except Capitol, need to get publicity blurbs about the artists, the new rec-ords, to the stations. We practically have to hunt it up without any help from them.

S ONE of the nation's disk Jockeys depending on Bill-board for the advance dope on the top tunes, I welcome the gets out to the public. Let us opportunity to use the media of your fine publication to suggest to the publishers, band leaders and record companies, the type of platters bringing in the best results for the sponsors of my disk shows.

With a half-hour morning show, Friendship Circle, and a two-hour Telephone Request in the evening, I cover almost every type of listener audience. And as has been the case in a great many localities I have found that the radio listening habits of the younger members of the household become the order of the day for the rest of the family.

Therefore I believe there's quite a demand for more stuff like One-zy, Two-zy; Pass the

Biscuits, Mirandy, and Phil Harris' Some Little Bug. For when junior or his little sister hear it on the morning show they tell Dad all about it at the dinner table that night and good old pappy calls in on the Telephone Request show to have the same number played.

Of course, we do quite a business for Dan Cupid by way of playing the lonely heart stuff so that erring love birds are reunited with the one and only who calls for stuff like Full Moon and Empty Arms, Some Day You'll Want Me to Want You, etc.

So all in all I'd say the industry is turning out just about what the customers want, with the above-mentioned suggestion that we could use more of the platters having listening appeal for each member of the family from junior to pappy.

#### WARREN QUADE Radio Station WCAP Ashbury Park, N. J.

WE WHO spin 'em for our own, as well as other people's pleasure, and get paid for doing it, get an assortment of kicks from the work we do. People look to us for the low-down on what cooks in the record industry; we who read reams of publicity on the latest novelty tune or vocal interpretation by the current singing sensiting try to present the sensation, try to present the tune and our personal opinion in an interesting manner.

All in all the record companies do a good job when it comes to furnishing good chat-ter material. They are likely to go a bit overboard in their superlatives, but that is to be expected. After all, it's their own opinion about their prod-uct and artists. It is the unen-viable job of the platter spinner to discern the wheat from the chaff, so to speak.

Record companies seem to realize the importance of disk

jockeys in the scheme of things, as witnessed by their complimentary records which they send to hundreds of our turntable maestros thruout the country. We can't play them all; now and then one is really all; now and then one is really a dog—but the spirit is there, as well as the realization by the recording outfits that we are trying to do a job. Furthermore, it's co-operation a spinner must appreciate.

Band leaders co-operate to a certain degree on recorded shows by making personal ap-pearances, but it is only nat-ural for them to be more interested in appearing on the larger stations with greater coverage. That leaves the small town local outlet out in the cold most of the time. Weighing in the band leaders' favor is the fact that one-night stands are tough. So far as I'm concerned there is no squawk on that

FIND there are many things the record companies could do for the radio stations. Some of the companies do their best, and some do nothing. Since radio is the best free advertising a record company or artist could possibly have, it seems to me that it would behoove them to send the radio stations known to use a great many recordings, at least one each of all their releases. The boom on sales will not be on forever, and there will be a time when the companies will wish they had ingratiated themselves a little more with the people who could give them such excellent publicity,

The new companies do send samples of their wares, but the more established companies do not. Only Capitol and Majestic have been attentive to us. Decca is the most unco-operative of all. They do not even

get sufficient releases to the retail stores in time for use while the tunes are on top. So much for the "gripe section on service."

Now, to discuss the material recorded.

It is unfortunate that many recordings popular on jukes boxes have lyrics so unsavory that we must ban them from the air. Our request program audiences are being turned down constantly because they request records we cannot risk playing if our bad taste permitted us to buy them in the first place. Good listening quality requires that we also ban the blaring brass of so many disks. It is not music, but just pure noise. Woody Herman and his orchestra are the greatest offenders in this. This orchestra has good men in it, but all Herman does is make the brass fight loud and noisily.

Too many vocals make a program just as monotonous as too many waltzes, polkas, et cetera. We would appreciate more instrumental arrangements. Paul Weston gave us a sample in an album by Capitol, but has not not followed it up.

N MY OPINION two mediums that would mushroom platter shows to an enviable pinnacle in radio business and at the same time accelerate the record manufacturers promotional efforts are:

(1) A more sincere effort by the nation's band leaders and recording artists to appear on local record shows when the "names" are on tour. Their personal appearance on smaller stations would do much to build and maintain their popularity and at the same time increase the record show's audience.

(2) Disk jockeys should be the first to receive new waxings. Many record manufacturers have become progressively more conscious of the influential disk jockey and are sending complimentary preview disks to the boys who spin their tunes. I say their tunes because "Mr. D. J." shows his appreciation by getting those "comps" off to a flying start in pop record sweepstakes. No top-notch radio show or cinema extravaganza can put a tune on the "honor roll of hits" as quickly as the guy who spins the platters day in and day out. So, band leaders, music publishers, recording artists and manufacturers, remember the disk jockey is your most ardent supporter and he likes it; but he needs your co-operation.

What I mean is this: composer, when composed, where, publisher, and any other thing of interest about the tune that we could build up for a good seller. A complete backlog of the tune history.

NE OF MY pet peeves is why recording companies do not list the publisher, which would save me a lot of headaches in trying to get professional copies of new recordings. This is because besides spinning records I play the piano and sing (my public may not trace) and my biggest cause of indigestion is in trying to get the song publishers to send me professional copies as soon as they are released. With few exceptions I have to wait until the song is recorded and has started the ladder of popularity before I can obtain copies. I give all publishers and recordings an even break, and the public can then be the pudge.

a bit of gossip about behind the scenes happenings while numbers are cut would help me immensely. Info about arrangers might be helpful, too.

## RED MUNRO Radio Station WRAL Raleigh, N. C.

THE DISK jockey is an important character around the radio station these days. He can't be a square Joe if he's going to keep on his toes and keep his audience interested—and increasing. The disk jockey knows this—but he also knows he can't stay on the ball if he doesn't get co-operation. Co-operation is what the disk jockey wants and needs most today—co-operation from the band leaders, the disk companies and all the others connected with the business of putting out records.

To keep one jump ahead of the cactus needle, the platterspinner must know his records. This means he must be able to remember the important things about a record worth playing. He must know how to ferret out new facts on platters, too. For example, if the Jocks were on their toes a few months ago, they would have caught onto a "scoop" on the Harry James recording of I Can't Begin To Tell You. It so happened that the girl who takes the mighty sharp vocal on that ballad was none other than Miss Betty Grable, who, as every self-respecting table-turner knows, is the little lady who blows the horn in the James' household. Now this little piece of info was slipped us by one of the boys about town whose job it is to find out such dope. If every jockey can have an "in" with such a reliable source, he's pretty well set.

The jockey who's up on the last minute data reads every trade mag he can cop. He knocks himself out to use bits of info that he grabs from between the lines. When a name band, or even an up-and-coming band, hits town, this untiring individual makes it his business to wangle an interview or a band remote out of the maestro—that is, if the union breeze is blowing in the right direction.

If the disk jockey does all this muscle work to help keep the bands before the public, he deserves a certain amount of help and co-operation from the band leaders themselves. Our job would be a lot easier if we had more Hermans, Kentons, Thornhills, Pastors and Mercers—to name only a few of the maestros who are always willing to oblige. We fully realize that there's a lot of strain and headaches attached to one-nighters, but why is it that some of the front men bend over backwards to help while others go so far as to disguise themselves in order to avoid us?



The disk companies could help the jockeys a lot if they tried. No matter how big they get, they're never too big to extend record courtesles to the platter-spinners where record playings count. Our biggest drawback today is the lack of interest and promotion the companies are giving the South. The company that deserves the bulk of congrats is "The House of Capitol." Messrs. Mercer and Wallachs have gone out of their way on many occasions to help out the jockeys. Sure, it took some extra time and trouble on their part, but they earned our respect and appreciation.

Here's a suggestion to Victor and Decca and the other companies who have been uncooperative and uninterested in supplying stations with gratis copies of their recordings. Set up a mailing list of one copy of each new release a month. Send these new releases to stations and ask the jockeys to plug the records whenever possible. Enclose an "option card" asking the announcer to state his own personal opinion of the platters. This would make for good feeling between jockeys and companies—and, more important, it would save the companies much trouble and money in the long run. There are too many bad records and too few good ones coming out these days.

The fellows who have been of most help to the conductors of the platter-chatter shows are the jazz critics—people like Leonard Feather, Frank Stacey, Barry Ulanov and Dave Dexter. It would be swell if we could have a better understanding with the entertainers, trade mags and everyone else who has a hand in turning out topnotch recordings for the buying public. Why not have some sort of reunion or yearly convention with a gathering of musical celebrities? The sooner people wake up to the fact that disk jockeys all over the nation are top salesmen in their own right, the better off the recording business will be.

All we platter-patters want is a chance to show how much we have to offer. If we can get the co-operation we need, we'll be able to give a lot more in return.

FEEL that closer harmony between record companies and we slaving disk jockeys can be achieved by better material from recording houses. By this, I mean a complete listing of personnel on all recordings, a few lines about composers, and anything else that would help us in getting better acquainted with the record. Secondly, I suppose it's impossible but I would like a limited number of recordings of tunes instead of the present abundance of available records. I would like also to have the "B" sides measure up to standard. It's rather discouraging to get a good side for the "A" and then find a "dog" on the other.

As far as band leaders go, we

wish that they would take a poll, somewhat in the manner your magazine does, to learn what tunes should be recorded and which ones should not be. Perhaps if the cost is not too exhorbitant, they could make sample pressings of tentative records and try them out. Then with comments received they could go ahead with it or toss it in the ash can.

Getting back to record companies, we would like a little more uniformity in advance releases. The companies now turning out Vinylites should receive a badge of honor for at last giving radio stations records of decent, playable quality. Let us hope that the rest of them fall in line soon,

Personally, I think the old cut and dried interview business has been overworked and just a brief greeting such as these suggested here would be far more effective.

#### WHAT THE NATION'S DISK JOCKEYS WANT

#### JOHN T. GRADY

Radio Station KFRE, Fresno, Calif.

THE disk jockeys across the country want a lot of things, if they're on their toes. Let's hope they all want something different, and get it! The average record show comes out of the listener's loudspeaker practically a carbon copy of any other record show being aired in his community.

The biggest problem facing the "canned" show and its man-in-charge is how to get more variety in his chatter. Naturally the tunes he plays will be pretty much the same as the other shows are plugging, for people want to hear the pop tunes of the day. But, they don't want to hear the same old story when it comes to intros and fill chatter.

Perhaps more background material would be the solution. For instance, info like what other hits the author has written, where the orchestra is playing "live" at present, where the song was presented for the first time and so on. A lot of good background could change some songs from "just another number" to real hits.

Of course, in these days of spot shows, the jockey also has to think about cutting it short enough to get in those things that help to pay his salary, and still keep it interesting to his listeners. What's needed in a case like that, of course, is short snappy intros, and yet, something with punch.

It boils down to something like this. How about a folder of info with each record? Not those for sale around the record shops, but something closer to exclusive mailed out by the record companies to all the outlets around the country.

Some companies do put out just such info sheets, but usually they lack most everything that would make them worthwhile.

Some record shows are long enough, although only a few, to really get in and plug for an orch leader by giving out with a brief biography every so often. Build up interest in a group by letting the people who can make or break a tune in on some of the real dope on their favorites.

It would be complicated. sure. But, unless something is done to pep up the average record spinner, people are going to get plenty tired of the whole thing.

Listen to any symphony music broadcast on any net. What do you hear between numbers? Practically a full length novel about what's to be played next. Well, there's a story to go with most classical music, opera or not. And, I dare say, with most all of the really good pop tunes of the day, if somebody bother to find out about it, there would be a story, too.

A good percentage of the listeners have record players in their homes. If we don't give them something more than they can get off the record label, they're just as apt to turn off the radio and spin platters for themselves.

Here's another thing. Let's have more good records, and less put up jobs. In a dozen new records you add to your library maybe two or three are up on the hit side and the rest

are stuff that has had no plugging whatsoever. If they later becomes hits, you're in on the ground floor. If they don't. you've got a pile of old wax.

If the composers, recording companies and ork leaders would put more thought into what numbers they pick to wax for us we'd have a lot better percentage turn up hits. This: obviously would be better for all concerned, the above mentioned especially.

Right now we get quantity. We want quality!

The public buys records for three reasons. They hear the orchestra play the number and like it. They hear it on the juke box and want it. Or, they hear it on the record shows and take a shine to it. Due to the gigantic number of record shows on the air, radio does as big or maybe even bigger job of selling than any other medium.

Then let's have more tunes we can really sell! Let's have disks with both sides having solid tunes on them. Usually one side has the so-called "punch" tune, the other side has something that is as useless to a record spinner as a hole in the head

Here's one more point. Some companies have started to give out with new waxings of old numbers that have been out of stock lo, these many moons. Let's have more of that. People have faith in the old numbers. Those tunes that have been good enough to last thru the years should be in stock on wax in every station's library. When the public hears an oldie on a show, they want to buy it for themselves. If the record companies want to increase sales, and have sure-fire hits, all they have to do is start putting out cuts that have already proved themselves.

Well, as I said before, it's complicated. However, something has to be done pretty soon to keep the standard record show from falling on it's face from sheer boredom.

A lot of platter spinners may disagree with this idea, but it comes thru in a lot of cases to add extra class to canned shows. An instrumental, preferably piano, fill-in disk, to spin in between records and under the intro for the next tune. It adds more of a semblance of a complete show to an ordinary recorded spot. On shows featuring all tunes by one ork it would keep things moving the whole time, instead of letting them sag between tunes.

If each of the pop orks of the day would put out just one disk like the above described, platter spinners would have fill-in material galore to keep up the interest between numbers. Just segue in the fill disk for the next ork coming up and really give the public a run for its money.

If a complete disk is too much to expect, how about starting every record with a short tempo fill by the ork? The spinner cuts in the record, has a short specified time to make his intro, and then the announced number comes thru

Juke boxes do fine without it, but radio record shows are competing with live talent.

DERSONALLY, I would like to see all the record companies sending out the new releases to the boys as a regular thing-so that we can build regular features built around the new releases theme. Of course, some of the companies are already doing this-but not all. As far as getting artists to appear on our shows-I think

this rests entirely in the jockey's hands-if his show is important enough and he uses sufficient ingenuity-he should be able to get the artists' cooperation-except if the artist is actually too busy, or one of those over-rope individuals who thinks he (or she) doesn't need any help to stay up there.

JACK DUNN Radio Station KRE Berkeley, Calif.

ALL I want from disk makers product on the air . . . mostly is a product that is worth because it arrives in one piece. hearing. Two "A" sides . . . (damn those also rans) . . . vocals that aren't drowned out by a 10-piece brass section . . . and decent surfaces. The best men in the biz don't sound well all gooed up in shellac. Distributors who send us cuffo copies on vinolyte get their

because it arrives in one piece. The boss doesn't like to spend a lot of dough for off-name brands, so the only off-brands that we play we get for free. We're more than grateful for the free disk and are usually disappointed to see a good side in quarters.



## AL TURNER Radio Station KVOP Plainview, Tex.

WE ARE the disk jockeys of America, those underpaid, over-worked slaves of Wax and Plastics. We are the boys who haunt you 24 hours a day, giving our all for a two and a half minute-disk. Do they have a Pulitzer or Nobel award for us? No. just three more commercials every 15 minutes when you attain 100,000 listeners. But do we ever beef? No, we love it. We do want recognition from the companies whose songs we put at the top of the hit parade, we want the hits sooner and we want something about the boys that write them. We think all platters should have a release date on all stations. so all the jockeys will have the same chance. We think there should be a jockey of the year, as well as a prize for records most plugged, but most of all we want to get out of the class of forgotten men. We want publicity.

COULD use some good chatter material about each band, vocalist, instrumental soloist, and a gag or two thrown in. I wonder if I could be furnished with some written material similar to transcription library copy, with each record donated or publicity released by the record company.

N RUNNING this show for over six years in this area, and "Jam for Supper" (the original one) several years ago in Cincinnati, I've picked up a few "wants" and gripes which I now take pleasure in presenting to anyone caring to read same. Personally I think the Capitol company is so far out in front of the other recording outfits (as far as servicing radio stations is concerned) it's not even funny. Columbia, recently, seems to have caught on, but the wax being sent tous from Capitol is still far the

best. If the other companies would wake up and send us the quality of records Capitol does, disk-jockeying would, indeed, be a much more pleasant task.

As to the co-operation of band leaders on interviews, I find most who have played in this area okay. I've recently had Stan Kenton and Vaughn Monroe on my show. Several months ago Nat Cole was out, and for a diversion, I've also had Lauritz Melchior and Alec Templeton. All were very co-operative and gave swell interviews.

## ED McKENZIE Jack the Bellboy Radio Station WJBK, Detroit, Mich.

T SEEMS to me disk jockeys have reached a place in radio where it would be well worth the record companies' while to make records for his par-. ticular use - preferably the more satisfactory acetate type. These records should carry two good tunes - not one good number and one "dog" tune, as is generally the case-even though it may be necessary to wax a time-proved old favorite on the flipover side. Further, these records could be stamped "suitable for broadcasting," so the poor downtrodden disk

jockey wouldn't have to audition every record to be sure it is "clean." Often an otherwise good tune has to be thrown out because of a single suggestive line or way of handling certain lyrics.

We have had fine co-operation from band leaders — and we feel they are doing both our program and themselves a favor when they appear on disk jockey shows. There is always a lift in requests for their recordings after such an appearance.

#### VICK ALLEN

#### Radio Station WAAT, Newark, N. J.

AS A disk jockey, I would like to have the music and record companies supply more information further in advance. Give me a little info on numbers when they are in the pressing stage-how they came to be written and recorded—what other hits have been turned out by the same authors -- what picture or show the tunes are from. Don't just take it for granted that we jockeys are going to plug your tunes because you are a big name in the recording or music field.

Our listeners want interesting notes on the band leaders and their men. Every band leader should assemble a complete guide on himself and his men and send it to the disk jockeys. Let this guide include info as to when and where each man (including vocalists) got started, what other instruments they played, how long they've been with the band, and nicknames and hobbies. Then when any new men join the outfit, a supplemental page can be sent out.

Above all we ask of the companies and the band leaders—don't try to soft soap us or pressure us with a lot of gab on a stiff tune. We've been playing 'em all—good and bad—for a long time, and we're pretty tough to kid when it comes to stifferoos. Give us the dope and let us decide how we like the number ourselves. If we like it and there is a demand for it—we'll plug it!



## TOM RODGERS Radio Station KYW Philadelphia, Pa.

BELIEVE the record companies, band leaders and music publishers are doing an excellent job of sending chatter material to disk jockeys but think the band leaders and singers should display better co-operation in making personal appearances on record shows because they are the "shows" that "sell" the personalities' names, day in, day out . . . the shows that set the scene for later-on swooning when the maestros and balladizers give out with one of their previous waxed hits that the turntable thespians helped make a hit. Catch?

### YVONNE DORAY Radio Station WAAT Newark 1, N. J.

YOU ask what we would like from the record companies for better programing. Well, it would be easier planning shows if all popular records, especially vocals, had introductions not exceeding 15 seconds and opened with the melody of the chorus. Many beautiful tunes are hard to program due to an ungainly intro and verse. This kills the listener's interest immediately.

We are very grateful for the rapid output of new releases which have served as a much needed adrenalin in all of the record departments of radio stations. And just in time, too. Platters were being played down to their last note. Not because of the tune or arrangement but simply because there was nothing else to play. Let's keep the records coming and with less surface noise.



#### WHAT THE NATION'S DISK JOCKEYS WANT

#### Radio Station WAGA, Atlanta, Ga.

FIRST, LET'S take the priwant better quality in genera in records. It's a great disappointment to receive a new release from "Such-and-Such" company, drool over the artists. lick your chops over the tune title, in fact, everything's fine until-until the needle gets "in the groove." There's the "rub." Along with a terrific tune, arrangement and artists, there comes a noise from "in the groove." The noise level is so high that it almost equals that of the music itself.

Well, there you have the situation. Now just what does it mean to the disk jockey, the record manufacturer, the artists involved, and most important of all, the public?

To begin with, the disk jockey can't possibly play the record, usually, because the noise level is so high he'll catch the devil from everyone from the program director on up to the station manager-not to mention the listening public. They expect too much more from the radio industry-and as far as that goes, they get "better," almost 95 per cent of the time their pilot light is "on"

The manufacturer-well, he gets the worst end of the deal. The jockey can't afford to spinhis release—he's spent money in the making of the platter, gone to the expense and care of promoting the artists, the tune, and taken the future of the artist's reputation into his own

What about the platter-chatmary point-QUALITY. I ter material? It seems that disk think disk jockeys as a whole jockeys could use not more written material on releases, but chatter material which includes not only information about the current release, also a little historical data on the artists. Something about their personal history, the history of the tune itself-and some of the fine points for the disk lockey to listen for while auditioning the platter. In this way he can be fully prepared for broadcasting the releases and be confident that he has the latest, the most accurate data about the record and the performers. And the written matter might include how the artists' names should be pronounced, if there is any doubt about them.

Now what makes the public take to liking a disk jockey? What makes them listen to his show regularly, when other good shows are "on the air"? The answer is the personal appearance of the artists themselves on his show. The reaction is that this fellow not only brings you the music on record, but the artists themselves. And it also makes the listener feel that the performers are behind the jockey 100 per cent, as they should be. There must be hundreds of jockeys who probably have called upon performers to appear on their shows, and what was the result-they received the reply that "he's asleep," or "he's not in, but we'll have him call you," or even "I don't know



where he is and don't know when he'll be back."

And in conclusion, who gets the benefit of the disk jockey's bother and work? The artists themselves, and the manufacturer. And it's about time some folks in the industry wake up to this fact. And all this adds up to this one result: the manufacturer loses money and the artists, disk jockeys and the public lose faith in his product. Savvv?

That brings us to the artists: His wax work isn't received with the receptiveness that if should, because its artistry isn't conveyed with the proper engineering skill and the proper high quality materials. He (the artist), therefore loses confidence in the manufacturer, and to some extent, himself . . . depending, of course, on the artist.

As for the public-they're both cheated and disappointed to say the least. They're cheated of thrilling entertainment from the standpoint of great jazz (that is if the waxing happens to be such) and also pleasant listening.

It would also be a great boon to disk jockeys if all record labels included the exact length of the tunes up to the second, as on transcription labels. This would save time and improve production from the standpoint of planning a record show to come out to the second insofar as timing is concerned.

# DBYBLOPING GREATER A BEBOX PIAAY

From local campaigns utilizing display posters of the nation's top tunes, thru extensive national campaigns (in which Wurlitzer is doing the pace-setting) locations' patrons are being sold more and more effectively on playing the jukes.

EEPING the nickels rolling regularly into the coin boxes of the nation's 400,000 tuke boxes is a tob of growing concern and importance for everyone associated with the music machine industry. Not a post-war idea, promotion to stimulate juke box play had its beginnings back before the war. What the juke box trade is doing now is building on those first promotional activities.

First attempts at reminding the public that juke box music is good listening were made as long ago as the mid-'30's by a scattering of forward-looking operators. Manufacturers likewise launched several campaigns, but none were sustained. Until recently promoting juke box play either locally or nationally has been spasmodic at best.

### Cleveland's Monthly Hit

One of the most notable campaigns to encourage juke box friends has been the "Hit Tune of the Month in Cleveland" idea originated by the Cleveland (O.) Phonograph Owners' Association. In February, 1941, Cleveland operators cast about for some way to hypo business. Jack Cohen, an officer of the organization, came' up with an idea for selecting one tune each month to be pushed on car cards, spot radio time and local newspaper publicity, both paid and free.

His idea caught on quickly and successfully, not only served to plug particular tunes -many of which later became national hits-but also called favorable public attention to the city's jukes. Every Cleveland citizen got to looking for the brightly colored posters on the front of streetcars and busses. Newspaper display space, featuring lines from the tune or pictures of an artist who had recorded it, received public attention. Decals, patterned after the advertising copy, blossomed on every juke box in the city.

### Store Co Operation

To cap the promotion, association executives worked out

### Wurlitzer's Big National Drive

On a national scale the set a fast pace early in 1946 with a full-blown advertising and promotion campaign to bring nickels into the jukes. Full-page four-color advertisements appeared in a number of general circulation magazines, including The Saturday Evening Post and Liberty. Using the same essential elements which appeared in the advertisements, Wurlitzer billboards were strategically placed along the nation's highways.



Meantime operators of firm's equipment were provided with decals for their trucks and for both machines and locations. Copy for the magazine advertisements, billboards and decals focused attention on a trade-mark symbol, "The Sign of the Musical Note," giving the public a distinguishing mark to remember. Unlike the Cleveland campaign, Wurlitzer's promotion was built around the juke box itself and was not tied in with specific records.

The surface of juke box play promotion has barely been scratched. Generally speaking, music machine men know that their promotion can be national or local in character, or it can be a combination of the two.

They know that this exploitation can take shope in mony. tion can take shape in many forms—decals, advertisements in national and local general interest periodicals, point-of-play promotion gimmicks like table napkins and cards.

### Disk Mfrs. To Tie In

Many music machine men are convinced that the most effective promotion would be a national campaign. The juke box men feel they can take a tip from vending machine operators who now have several of the leading cigarette makers advising their customers to look for their brand "in the cigarette vending machines." In the same way, the music ma-


chine industry might encourage manufacturers to remind the public to look for certain favorites on the juke boxes.

In many parts of the country juke box distributors and operators who also either dis-tribute or retail disks find it worth their while to do extensive local promotion thru the radio and newspapers. Where music machine men are also in the record business, both juke boxes and disks can be

THE juke box can be considered historically as the second electronic musical instrument to come into wide popular use. First was the radio, which paved the way for the modern coin-operated phonograph. It is doubtful that the coin phonograph would ever have achieved the popularity it holds today thruout the world without the introduction of electronic amplification. The modern juke, of course, is a combination of mechanical and electronic devices. Stripped to essentials, it is simply a record changer and an amplifying system. But the key to coin phonograph's rise as the No. 1 musical instrument of millions is its amplifier, which, in cases where operators are conscientious, is able to bring the customer a reproduction of orchestras and vocalists he can

seldom match even on the most expensive home phonograph.

### "Wheel"

### Still Turning

Even the earliest jukes dating to the times of cylinder records had workable record changers, altho they were a far cry from the compact, quick-action disk flippers of today. That the early record changers were sturdy and durable was evidenced by the display of a 1900 juke in good working order at a recent phonograph show. The big wheel-type changer was still doing the business.

But anyone who heard that phonograph play knew in an instant that delicate, accurate and powerful amplication was the heart of the juke's modern popularity. Of course there have been many other refinements over the years, including better needles, lighter and more

responsive tone arms and pickups, smaller, more efficient
power packs and constant
simplification of all mechanism that make up the complex
innards of a juke. But without precise amplication these
would have been only a hoarse
screech of sound from a rackety
gramophone horn.

Juke box makers, of course, didn't regard their machine as "an electronic instrument," and until the war, electronics was strictly a laboratory word, passed occasionally between students of what today is called "atomic physics." But phonograph manufacturers have been in electronics since they first hit on the idea of amplifying the sounds off records with vacuum tubes. The 6L6 and its cousins are simply electron tubes. It is the streams of electrons running thru those tubes that turns the vibration

of the tone arm into the music the customer buys.

### Vacuum Tube

### Magic

Electronics today can be defined as the science of using the vacuum tube to perform a given task. Before the war that science was chiefly limited to amplifying sounds and electrical impulses and generating radio waves. War and the needs of the military expanded use of the electron tube tremendously in a dozen different directions. Radar and radiocontrolled planes are just two examples. Makers of juke boxes and other coin machines had a big part in the expansion of the vacuum tube's use and the development of electronics as we know it today. But that science is in its crib still.

There remains the problem of applying the discoveries of the war years to civilian uses,

and that is not as easy as copywriters for the big advertising agencies like to tell the readers of the slick magazines. Main lesson of wartime electronics seems to be that the vacuum tube will do a lot of things that no one had imagined before, but adapting the tube to finding ships in a fog and using it, for instance, to detect slugs or turn records are very different things.

### No Technical Details

Some efforts have been made to adapt the electron tube to new uses on coin phonographs, notably in volume control and in obtaining more exact reproduction from the tone arm of a record player. One company has announced that it has a genuine "electronic" phonograph pick-up which apparently uses a vacuum tube in the head of the tone arm


to produce a varying voltage to be fed to the amplifying unit. Of course that is simply a guess since the company did not release any technical details of the device.

Use of an electronic device to control volume of a juke box pointed more directly to new jobs which the vacuum tube probably will do on the phonographs of tomorrow. Engineers in plants of juke box makers thruout the country undoubtedly are working on many such devices to make the juke a more perfect electronic instrument, but such efforts are bound to be kept under very heavy wraps until they are perfected and ready for marketing.

Already a patent has been granted on an electronic slug detector. It makes use of the long-known principle that a piece of iron or similar metal moving thru a coil of wire

creates an electrical current or flow of electrons. A piece the size of a nickel or dime, of course, creates an almost infinitesimal flow of electrons, so small in fact that it can only be detected by the supersensitive grid of an electron tube. But amplified by the tube, it can be turned into the energy that would operate a mechanism as big as a battleship if need be.

### Venders' Wider Usage

Widest use of electronics in the coin industry, of course, has been in vending machines, in the hot sandwich dispenser. There a stream of electrons sets up a heat-producing motion of the molecules of the substance which turns cold wieners into hot ones in almost the flick of a nickel. It may seem farfetched, but it is not outside

the realm of possibility that this principle may find some use in phonographs eventually.

In the first post-war models, however, juke box manufacturers were concentrat'.ig mainly on two things: First, production to meet the great backlog of demand that had built up during the four years of war when phonograph output was at zero and jukes on location were getting greater play than ever before, and second, upon improvements that they had worked out just before war shut down their phonograph assembly lines and refinements they had been able to work out in their spare time during the war.

### Cabinet Innovations

Main innovations of the new models are centered on the cabinets, with a view to making them easier to service and upon improvements in record changers and the amplifying systems. Strides have been made in simplifying the mechanism and its arrangement to such an extent that work of servicing phonographs should be eased considerably. Designers for all companies have given a great deal of study to the problems of the serviceman with the idea of making it possible for him to do the overwhelming bulk of the servicing right on location and without even moving the machine.

Great electronic improvements in the coin phonograph probably are in the making right now in the design and engineering test rooms of a number of manufacturers, but it is doubtful they will be on the market as soon as the glib forecasters of other big industries have led the public to be-

lieve. As every experienced coin machine operator knows, and as every coin machine manufacturer has learned by experience, acid test of any new devolpment in coin devices comes on location. But long before the location trial comes repeated laboratory tests by engineers. Thus it probably will be some time before the new ideas that manufacturers got in the war years actually go into market models

One thing, however, appears certain. Many new electronic devices will appear in the phonographs and music systems of years to come. Operators should be able to feel certain that as time goes on they will be able to deliver to the public more nearly perfect renditions of the music produced by the top orchestras and singers.

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

# JUKES' ENFLUENCE ON DISK SALES

As the newer jukes come on the market in greater quantities, record sales, over retailers' counters will be stimulated as they've never been before . . . The juke box, already proved the number one "showcase" for new platters, will win itself new laurels in that direction.

AS MORE and more glittering 1946 juke boxes come into operation, members of the music machine trade unabashedly are boasting that the handsome slice of credit claimed by jukes for pre-war phonograph record sales is going to grow wider and wider.

There are some sound arguments to back up this claim. Logically, they are based on continuance of the same two disk sales stimuli which jukes

provided before the war. That is, use of records by machines themselves, and creation of demand among millions of home phonograph owners—or would-be owners Now, however, the emphasis is changed.

### 75 Million For Jukes


Because of the tremendous increase of home phonograph and disk sales inspired by the introduction of record-chang-

ers—for which the juke box industry takes some bows, too —platter sales to the trade are expected to account for only 15 to 25 per cent of total sales this year. This is in contrast to an estimated 40 per cent in earlier years. The difference is in increased disk sales volume. With an expected production of 400,000,000 platters in 1946, according to these percentages, jukes still will take about 75 million, compared with 52 mil-

lion in 1942 when total output was only about 130,000,000. It is only against the increasing total production picture that proportions of juke record-buying appear smaller.

### Show-Casing Still Important

In the future, jukes are likely to be cherished by disk-makers less for the millions of records they play away every year, and more for the gigantic



show-casing job they will do in presenting new pressings to growing numbers of home consumers.

In making plans for new machines, however, juke box operators naturally are disk-buyers, not disk-sellers. They are counting on big increases of purchases - increases which may be hidden in skyrocketing total record sales volume, but which is nonetheless real.

What are some of the factors in this expanded use of records by jukes? Most important are sheer numbers of machines. Before the war, trade sources indicated that there were approximately 400,000 juke boxes in operation. During a period when no new machines were available, this total gradually shrunk as older models went out of service.

### 100,000 to 250,000 New Jukes

It is estimated that operators came out of the war with about 25 per cent fewer machines, or about 300,000. Now the trend is again upward. Trade surveys have shown that there is an immediate unsatisfied demand

for new boxes ranging from a conservative estimate of 100,000 to more optimistic figures up to a quarter million. At any rate, the number of machines on location under present conditions will continue to rise just about as rapidly as manufacturers can get them off production lines. And within the next few years the total may be double that of today.

### Faster Play. More Disks

Gaudiness of jukes, abhorred by the arty crowd, is precisely what brings in the nickels, and manufacturers have exploited this attention-getting device thru varied applications of color, lighting and shiny chromium on their new models. As they take in more nickels, they'll burn up more records, of course.

Design of the new models is based to a large extent on making play easier. Tune-selecting devices are enlarged and dramatized in much the same manner as automobile makers have dressed up their instrument panels. Clearer identification of tunes is possible with larger

-and in most cases-illuminated labels. Position of tune selectors has been shifted by some makers to avoid the necessity for patrons to stoop to read the labels.

### Reproduction

Advancements in the fields of radio and electronics achieved during the war have been built into the 1946 boxes, giving truer reproduction and improved acoustical effects, another influence toward increased play.

But the estimated 75 million disks which juke boxes will use this year will probably be small potatoes compared with their role as great demand creators for records to be sold in the consumer market.

Originally, the music machine trade believes, record production rose as a result of the impetus juke box popularity gave to home phonograph sales. It is pointed out that the phenomenal rebirth of the record business which reached a peak just before the war coincided pretty much with the inception and growth of the juke box industry. Now the expansion expected in post-war sales of record-changer phonographs-or home jukes-is creating the basis for half-billion annual record production. In the market developing, jukes can be counted upon to exert a powerful influence.


### **Buyers Hear** Jukes First

One leading Midwest juke distributor explained it this way: "The juke box is important in the record sales picture because it is there that most prospective record purchasers first hear the tunes they will eventually want to buy." Record companies' market surveys tend to substantiate the whole picture of the juke's importance. Best customers, according to these studies, are young people in their late teens, the swing crowd, the dance crowd and the same group which is most devoted to juke entertainment. They will account for approximately three-quarters of pop platters purchased in 1946. And their buying will continue to follow closely the juke box tune popularity charts.

## Who Is RESPONSIBLE Ror RUAD FLOPS?

T'S been going on for years and will no doubt go on for many more, but it can do no harm to hang the entire matter out on the line every now and then for a little airing. As a matter of fact it might do some good. We're talking about the question of who is responsible for band road flops.

We hear three groups screaming: "That's easy!" The promoter says: "The bands and booking offices, of course." The bands say the promoter and the booking offices are at fault. And the booking offices say the promoters and the bands are responsible. The probabilities are that an impartial investigation would show all three of them to be partially correct.

### Promoters' Complaints

Promoters say that bands and booking offices raise their prices so high that the promoter finds it necessary to charge exorbitant prices for his dances, and thus keeps his patrons away in droves. Not only that, says Joe Promoter, but the bands and offices don't co-operate when it comes to promoting the dance. All publicity material sent out by the offices is stale and uninteresting. The advance men they send into the town ahead of the ork don't know the score, antagonize the locals and do more harm than good-so the promoters say!

The bands and their personal managers and road managers and advance men say it's the promoters and the booking offices' fault. The office, they say, books them in the wrong place at the wrong time, books them in against impossible opposition, makes their jumps too long, etc., ad infinitum. The promoters, say the bands and

their reps, are still living in mobs to show up. When they the high-button-shoe era. Advance men come back off the road with stories about promoters who buy a band and promote it with a two-inch by one-column display ad in the local newspaper, six window cards judiciously spotted and maybe a couple of one-sheets. Having laid out this tremendous compaign, the promoter sits back and waits for the

A cursory glance at the road picture indicates once again that promoters, band agencies and the orchestras themselves are all partly at fault when a band flops on a date. If each of the three factions would ponder each others problems a little more studiously, they might all be helped.

### Agencies' Walls

The booking offices, course, claim that the bandleader and the promoter always has him (the booker) in the middle. On the one hand. the bandleader is always yelling that the booker isn't getting a high enough flat and/or guarantee for the band. On the other hand the promoter is always crying about how tough things are and about how the booker is trying to bust him. The booker says that between trying to service the promoter and trying to keep the bandleader happy he spends more time, energy and actual cash than the whole thing is often worth. He continues, however, to keep right on booking.

And the promoter keeps right on buying. And the bandleader keeps right on playing the date. The chances are, as has been pointed out, that more business would be done by promoter, or bandleader and booker if they all listened to one another's woes a little more sympathetically and tried to work out deals whereby all of them would make more money with less headaches and heartaches. But then it wouldn't be the one-nighter band businesswould it?

### SHOWBUSINESS

HE average man in the entertainment business cannot differentiate between deductible or nondeductible expenses for the purpose of preparation of his income tax return. In addihis income tax return. In addition, very few show business or music people have made a habit of keeping a systematic record of their expenditures, and as a result rely on estimated expenses in their return. The Treasury Department will allow estimated expenses in an amount which they consider reasonable. However, the en-tertainer who estimates his expenses is taking a chance that a substantial portion of such expenses may be disallowed. In addition, many expenses are incurred during the year which are easily forgotten and consequently lost for tax purposes. Experience has taught me to suggest that a systematic means of recording expenses means of recording expenses be kept during the year by the taxpayer. No particular form of record is necessary. The important thing is to recognize deductible items and record them (or assign to someone else the responsibility) either daily, weekly, or monthly so that they can be tallied at the end of the year and kept as a end of the year and kept as a permanent record to substantiate the expenses claimed on the return.

### Allowable Items

The next question is: What items are and are not deductible? It is impossible to list all the deductions here, but those listed in the box at right are representative of allowable deductions for people in the entertalnment and music business:

### General Items

There are, of course, various other deductible items which pertain to taxpayers in general.

Alimony payments, for instance, are considered income to the spouse who receives or is entitled to receive payments. The husband can take a deduction for the payments. There must actually be a decree of divorce or of separate maintenance and the payments made must qualify as "periodic payments" and must be received after the divorce or separate maintenance decree in order for this section to be applicable. Medical, dental, etc., expenses. A deduction is allowed if such expenses paid and not compensated for by insurance or otherwise exceed 5 per cent of taxpayer's adjusted gross income. The only amount deductible is the amount in excess of said 6 per cent and maximum is \$1,250 on returns on which only one surtax exemption is allowed and \$2,500 on joint returns of husband and wife or on returns where more

than one surtax exemption is allowed. Charitable Contributions. The maximum deduction allowable is 15 per cent of taxpayer's adjusted gross income. Where husband and wife file a joint return 10 per cent limitation is computed by using total adjusted gross income of both spouses. Automobile expenses. The upkeep for an automobile used for pleasure is not considered deductible, but the expenses incurred in operating a car for business purposes are deductible. Where a car is used for oth pleasure and business the expenses should be apportioned and only that portion which pertains to the business should be claimed as a deduction.

Taxes. Taxes are usually only deductible by the person on whom they are imposed. All State income taxes are deductible. All property taxes are deductible by the person on whom imposed. All retail sales taxes are deductible if the tax is separately stated and passed on to the taxpayer by the retailer. State gasoline taxes are deductible. Federal admission tax, telephone and

telegraph tax are deductible. Taxpayer may take credit for foreign income taxes paid.

### Non-Deductible Items

There are also expenses which the government does not consider deductible at all for tax purposes which the average taxpayer commonly mistakes as deductible. An example of these non-deductible expenses are as follows: Attorneys' fees for obtaining a divorce, preparation of a will, or handling of litigation which does not pertain to the earning of taxable income.

of taxable income.

Depreciation of property which is not used for the production of income but for personal use only.

sonal use only.

Salaries of domestics.

Non-business gifts, such as to wife, relatives or friends.

Marriage settlement in a principal amount. Medical and dental expenses which are less than 5 per cent

of the adjusted gross income.

Throat treatments for singers.

Traveling between taxpayer's personal residence and his

place of employment, such as carfare of a musician who travels from his home to his studio each day.

Taxes. Federal income tax paid is not deductible. The federal excise tax paid on furs, jewelry, etc., is not deductible by the consumer who purchases the article.

### Uniformity Desirable

The above resume is not complete and is only intended to acquaint the reader with some of the various items which are considered deductible and nondeductible by the Treasury Department. While no particular form is required for the maintenance of an individual taxpayer's records pertaining to business expenses, I have found it helpful in my own practice to recommend a uniform method of maintaining records for easy computation and for tallying purposes. For example, I have found it particularly useful to use a form which shows expenses daily but which can be totaled weekly. This form is used for tallying of entertainment expenses, hotels, meals and tips while on the road, also telephone and telegraph expenses and miscellaneous expenses.

### Orchestra Forms And Records

Similarly, for the purpose of maintaining the records of an orchestra, I have found particularly useful in my own practice a form which serves a twofold purpose, namely:

twofold purpose, namely:

1. The reporting of all income and expense pertinent to each engagement.

2. A check on the cash re-

2. A check on the cash remaining after each engagement.

Many band expenses which are incurred on the road cannot feasibly be paid by check. For example, the musicians in the band generally want to be paid by cash, as they experience difficulty in cashing checks out of town. Other expenses generally paid by cash are tips to stagehands, porters, taxicabs, telephone calls, telegrams, baggage charges, union taxes, entertainment, etc. The form shows the date and place of engagement, the contract price and privilege, and lists any overage collected on the engagement; the deposit taken by the booking agency in advance; the balance being the total cash collected on the engagement.

There is space provided for the listing of all disbursements which are paid by cash, which are totaled on the form. There is a cash summary statement showing the cash on hand at the beginning of engagement, the cash collected on the engagement as summarized above, and any other receipts, and from this total the total cash

disbursements for the engagement are deducted, leaving a balance of cash on hand at the close of the engagement which has to be accounted for by the manager.

Other information pertinent to the engagement can be shown on the form such as the mileage between engage-ments, the weather and other local conditions, the commis-sion due the booking agency for booking the job, etc.

### **Ork Deductions** Listed

The band pay rolls are pre-pared on a form which is col-umnarized to show the names and addresses of the musicians of the band, their social security numbers, number of exemptions, the total wages, the emptions, the total wages, the social security and withholding tax and the net salary. The form has a printed summary statement for the computation of the leader's share for withholding tax purposes and provides for deductions for transportations, local union dues, agency commissions and miscellaneous expenses attributable to the engagement, etc. ble to the engagement, etc.

### Suggestions At Random

So much for the matters of the taxpayer's knowing what expenditures are deductible and the importance of recording these deductions in some sys-tematic form. There is still another serious problem faced

another serious problem faced by too many music business performers: how is the taxpayer going to pay his tax?

The "pay as you go" plan which was put into effect in 1943 provides for withholding at the source from employees' wages. The withholding of tax is fairly representative of the employees' full tax liability where the total earnings are not in excess of \$5,000. If the 1946 earnings of the taxpayer exceed \$5,000, plus \$500 for each surtax exemption which can be claimed excluding his own, the claimed excluding his own, the law requires that an estimated income tax return be filed supplementing the withholdings.

Contractors, Etc.

Taxpayers who are in business for themselves, or are considered independent contracsidered independent contrac-tors, or who derive income from commission, royalties, interest, security trading, etc., where the total estimated 1946 income not subject to withholding exceeds \$100 and the total gross income from all source assesses. from all sources exceeds \$5,000, are required to file estimated returns and pay their income tax to the government in ad-vance in four quarterly installments. The estimated tax re-turns can be amended each

quarter.
On a "bureau" letter dated
February 21, 1944, the Internal
Revenue Department defines
operator as employer of mu-

sicians and entertainers who operates under a "Form B" contract. Variety performers who perform short engagements for different operators under contracts specifying only the time and the place of engagement, remuneration and duration of contract are considered independent contractors and not pendent contractors and not employees. Performers in a stage show or floor show (e. g. orchestra, chorus line, etc.) are definitely in the operator's em-

The expenses of variety entertainers who are performing away from home are not sub-ject to withholding, providing the employee furnishes the employer with an itemized state-ment of expenses claimed. Total expenses of not over 50 per cent of contract price may be accepted as a reasonable allowance. The foregoing is from a bureau letter dated September 8, 1943.
The sum of \$7 a day has

been recognized as a reason-able allowance for the expenses of orchestra musicians performing away from home.

### Withholding-and Then Some

Many entertainers or musicians who have taxes withheld from earnings are under the delusion that these withholdings will cover total tax liability. The withholding tax rates are only 19 per cent, and the entertainer with substantial earnings will be in a much higher bracket and consequent. higher bracket and consequently will have a substantial tax liability in addition to his withholdings at the end of the

### Earn \$5 To Keep \$1

There is also the case of the independent contractor or em-ployer in the entertainment field who either completely ignores income tax until the end of the year or substantially underestimates his tax during the year. It is quite common to hear that certain top entertainhear that certain top entertainers earning huge incomes are broke and can't pay their tax. This is caused by the failure to perceive that a major portion of their income belongs to the government. If the entertainer spends Uncle Sam's money he may find himself in a hole which gets deeper and deeper as he goes along. As an example, an entertainer in the 80 per cent bracket has to earn 80 per cent bracket has to earn \$5 in order to keep \$1, as the other \$4 belongs to the government.

Entertainers with foresight have budgeted their earnings and put aside their tax moneys. I have recommended to my clients the establishment of a special tax account and the deposit of an estimated amount to this account weekly so that the estimated tax liability can be fully paid up by the end of the year.

ONE-BAND town in pre-war years, Hollywood has leaped to the fore with a population upsurge which has brought about keen band buying competition and now supports more top paying and sought after band locations than any other city in the country, except for playing a close second to the band-building city of New

For years the Palomar was practically the sole name band spot, with the Palladium subsequently taking over six years ago after a fire destroyed the Palomar. A band prestige spot comparable to any in the land, the Palladium held sway with name bands playing Hollywood until some of the bigger names like Tommy Dorsey, Harry James, Charlie Barnet, Artie Shaw, etc., tired of playing for the short cash a prestige spot generally offers, started to angle with other ballroom operators in town for bigger payto the extent of buying Casino Gardens Ballroom with his brother Jimmy and others as a Hollywood showcase for their bands as well as for a more substantial financial take. Numerous other name crews have

played for the Dorsey's at Casino Gardens since then for weekly guarantees, plus occasional percentage arrangements far in excess to previous local engagement hauls.

More Spots More Names

The summer of '46 saw not only Casino Gardens with its lineup of names including Woody Herman, Tommy Dorsey, Louis Prima, Sonny Dunham, and Jimmy Dorsey offering powerhouse competition to the former lone location for names, the Palladium, but also the Meadowbrook with Xavier Cugat, Stan Kenton, Duke Ellington and Benny Goodman, and the Avodon with Henry Busse, Jan Savitt, Billy Butterfield and Bob Crosby. Even the Aragon is importing Eastern bands regularly with Lawrence Welk and Art Kassel included. Another important location is the Trianon Ballroom, where Lionel off deals. Tommy Dorsey went Hampton was one of the names featured.

Against this barrage of potent band names the Palladium offered Buddy Rich's new band, Sammy Kaye, Frankie Carle, Les Brown, Tex Beneke and Orrin Tucker. The Palladium lineup included only three of the ten bands who won The Billboard's College Poll of favorites this past summer whereas in prior years all ten would have been certain attractions at the Palladium. The top four winners in this same poll, Tommy Dorsey, Woody Herman, Stan Kenton and Harry James, are among the most avid advocates of names opposed to the playing of the Palladium

In the band booking competition fray, although not directly affecting the ballroomnight club combination, are the newly opened resort spots at Santa Monica Beach, including the Cabana and Del Mar Clubs, Catalina Island Casino and Arrowhead Springs Hotel. Meanwhile Freddy Martin goes mer-

Unique in the Hollywood band location competitive picture are the numerous big money ballroom operations where Western bands regularly draw capacity crowds. Riverside Rancho, with a capacity of 2,000 is open four nights a week with Deuce Spriggens' band. Spade Cooley's band at Riverside Rancho for several years, switched to the 10,000 capacity Santa Monica Ballroom. which Spade is operating himself. Another Western spot is





Where \$2,000 to \$3,000 a week was considered top-drawer money for a name band, figures ranging from \$5,000 to \$8,500 are not currently considered out of line for a band playing the Meadowbrook and Casino Gardens. ### A Factor

In the past an equally important reason for playing money-losing locations in New York and Chicago was the fact

that practically all recording was done there and a band had to get in town every so often to cut a batch of sides. With the increased music activity on the West Coast all the major diskers do a goodly portion of recording here now. Too, with Capitol centered in Hollywood and over 100 indie diskers hereabouts, recording sessions on the Coast by bands are daily rituals.

Strong rivalry in the Hollywood band location picture is all a bandleader could ask for, but necessary follow-up one-nighters of the type of the East has to offer are another story. However with the loot Hollywood locations are offering and seemingly will continue to offer, doubling in pictures and recordings and an ideal climate for laying off if necessary (with Hollywood home-owning maestri like Jimmy Dorsey, Carmen Cavallaro, Artie Shaw, Jan Garber, Harry James, Xavier Cugat, Les Brown, Jan Savitt, Charlie Barnet preferring an occasional lay-off) Hollywood, the home of motion pictures, apparently is destined for top honors in name band activity.

## MIDWEST ROAD'S BRIGHT OUTLOOK

Building of ballrooms is beginning ... concert dates are drawing sizable crowds ... sweet music seems to be in demand, and the old territorial favorites are clicking again ... All in all, a bright picture for the midwest music business on the road.

OOSENING of federal controls on prices and materials during this year seemed to spur a good number of Midwest operators out of the inactivity of theoretic planning and into the business of opening new and enlarging old ballrooms and night clubs thruout the Midwest. Midwest operators and bookers who have thus far enjoyed the post-war boom seem to have little or no fears for the immediate future, and almost anywhere that materials can be secured the hammers of carpenters can be heard busy at the task of redecorating, remodeling and constructing new edifices.

### All Over Territory

New ballroom spots that are being built are restricted to no certain locale in the Midwest. From Tennessee to Minnesota and from Iowa east to Indiana building is under way. In Nashville W. O. Dougherty, owner of the Colonial Club. one of the town's finer eateries and dine-dance spots, has architects drawing plans for a new ballroom where name bands are expected to hold forth just as often as they can be booked into the spot. Mary's, night club in Kansas City, which has long been a favorite of diners and dancers here, has added a \$40,000 cocktail lounge and will have entertainment in the lounge as well as the usual dance band that provides dance music for the supper crowd.

### Vienna to Fort Wayne

A. L. Winchester has invested \$90,000 in a club at Vienna, Ill., where good bands will be used exclusively. This spot figured to open in October. And in the Chicago area Tony Di Santo, owner of the Embassy Club, swing spot on the far south side, has purchased another spot outside the Chi boundary and will bring in sweet commercial bands in attempt to lure the dine-dance fans of Chicago's south side. Fort Wayne, Ind., will see the opening of a new ballroom later in the year or early in '47 by Johnny Apt. Apt has completely remodeled an old building that he bought and plans to give Fort Wayne plenty of top-flight dance music in his spot. Terp Ballroom in Austin, Minn., which was destroyed by fire in the fall of 1945, is being rebuilt by owner Carl Fox, and Fox is reported to be including bowling alleys and other sport fa-



cilities in addition to the dance pavilion.

### New Ulm Op Adds Mankato

Herb Martinka, owner of a ballroom in New Ulm, Minn., has built a new ballroom in Mankato, Minn., which should be completed in autumn of this year. In addition to the men who are either building for the first time or remodeling old spots, ballroom chains such as the one owned by Tom Archer, of Des Moines, Ia., are expanding.

### Archer's Heavy Plans

Archer announced to The Billboard that he is remodeling the Arkota ballroom, Sioux Falls, S. D., and when completed the spot will hold approximately 1,100 people, which is considerably more than it did before renovated. Archer, who owns spots in Sioux Falls, Sioux City, Omaha, Des Moines and St. Joseph, Mo., also announced the opening of a new spot in Sioux City which will be ready about September 15. Another Archer ballroom at

Marion, Ia., a suburb of Cedar Rapids, is skedded to be opened this fall.

Most owners either had the properties now being built upon before the war or wisely purchased them in the pre-boom periods. Materials, altho sometimes difficult to get, can be gotten if the operator is tireless in his attempts to get lumber and other materials necessary to construction and remodeling. Comments of many Midwest operators on the bandpricing situation could be boiled down to one conclusion: that the return of pre-war bands of sizable name and repute is going to allow them to purchase bands at much less than has been the case during the last few years. The Dick Jurgens, Orrin Tuckers, as well as several new bands being started by fellows who were prominent in the pre-war mu-

sic world, are now on the scene and the day when an operator must take whatever bookers could give him at fabulously high prices is over. Spokesman for the Midwest ballroom ops' association also felt that the music of today is definitely superior in quality to the music of the pre-war era. Swing bands as big attractions and money-getters are not bringing in half the coin that the sweet bands are luring, and in this operator's opinion, ballroom owners will be insisting on sweet music rather than swing in the future.

### Next Few Years Big!

None of the operators look upon the present economic situation as a bubble about to be pricked. Almost all of them feel that biz will be good for at least the next few years and

building and expanding moves seem to indicate that they are not just talking.

From the bookers' angle the picture is as bright if not brighter than the operators' since the opening of each new spot means business for one or more of them. Orgs other than MCA and GAC, who have had the lion-sized chunk of the one-niter trade for some time, are planning on real one-niter booking campaigns and are sending out more bands than ever before. Frederick Bros.' Chi office will have Sully Mason, Don Reid, Billy Bishop, Ray Pearl, Anson Weeks, Wilson Humber and others working the Midwest and adjoining territories.

Other small bookers, far too numerous to mention, who have one or two bands moving at all times are going all out to get their share of the one-niter business.

### McConkey's Smaller Units


Mack McConkey, owner of McConkey Orchestra Company, with offices in Chicago, Kansas City and Hollywood, revealed that band emphasis with his org would be concentrated on the six, seven and eight-piece groups. McConkey believes that a good line of this type unit will enable him to book better hotels and better clubs consistently and will allow him to offer the spots other attractions when his orks establish a name.

McConkey stressed that this size band is profitable when booked into miscellaneous spots for one-niter and organizational assignments. He said that this size unit can also be used in bigger auditoriums and ballrooms if it features ensemble arrangements. This org plans to advise and guide the

Some of the top stars such as Xavier Cugat, Tito Guizar, Dorsey, "Sugar Chile" Robinson, Hildegarde and Sammy Kaye were mentioned as MCA pop-concert probables. Other type shows such as one planned for Mandrake, the magician, are on the list.

GAC's plans included Allan Jones's tour of the Midwest and the Woody Herman tour in mid-November. All orks will be expanded and augmented with the necessary instrumentation for the proposed concert tours.

Independent bookers and promoters who have some towns tied up on the concert end are expected to continue dealing thru the bigger agencies in their plans to present the best talent in their balliwicks. Sid Page and Art Goldsmith, concert bookers

ture for bands may darken as a result of the battle. While the musicians got their 20 per cent jump in scales, they did not win one important point for which they were driving: they asked that no hotel be permitted to use less musicians from September 2, 1946, to September 2, 1947, than they had previous year. This point was not won, so that the hotels were permitted to use bands of any size they saw fit. Perhaps before the fall of 1947 rolls around, some of the hotels which formerly played name or semi-name bands will be down

to small non-name units. Some bookers and other trade observers, at least, fear that this will happen. Whether it does or not will most likely depend on how important the "name" bands are and continue to be to the attendance in the hotel rooms in which they appear.


### The Suburban Set-Up

You might think, to see the boys scrambling for the airtime in some of the shortmoney location jobs around, that the pile of remote shots might still have an effect in band building, as it used to in the old days. It is the one thing that's changed in the location picture and the one which seems to be least recognized.





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# THE QUESTION OF BAND BOOKING MONOPOLY

By Harold Jovien

KEG of dynamite was laid at the door of the music industry in general, and Music Corporation of America in particular, in early 1946 when ballroom operator Larry Finley was handed a favorable decision in his anti-trust suit against the important booking agency. In his \$3,000,000 anti-trust suit Finley, as operator of the Mission Beach Ballroom, San Diego, Calif., charged MCA with conspiracy to restrain trade and with operating as a dance band monopoly. Finley claimed he suffered a financial setback in his ballroom operation due to MCA's first refusal contract with the competing Pacific Square Ballroom and subsequent refusal to sell him name bands of which it reportedly controls over 90 per cent, plus attempts on its part to prevent other big booking agencies from selling him their nameband properties.

### Damages Too Speculative

An original jury award of \$55,000 in damages to Finley was later reversed by Judge Paul McCormick, who presided during the trial, in one of the several appeal sessions which MCA attorneys have instigated and which both sides are expected to continue to push for a long time to come. Award to Finley of court costs and attorney fees, however, was sustained by Judge McCormick when he reviewed the damage figure as entirely too speculative during which time he upheld the jury's conviction that there was ample evidence of conspiracy and monopoly on MCA's

part. The matter of human service (therefore bands) as a commodity in interstate commerce was established in a ruling handed down by Judge McCormick early during the trial.





### Far-Flung Effects


Effect and repercussions of the precedent setting Finley-MCA case are expected by authoritative tradesters to be felt in the entire music industry for years to come. Since MCA is figured to do as much band booking as all the rest of the important agencies, including General Artists Corporation, William Morris Agency and Frederick Bros.' Agency put together, having practically laid the foundation and been largely responsible for subsequent building up of the band biz to its current stature, any change in its method of operation due to government action such as Finley's anti-trust suit must reflect on all band biz.


After the original verdict in Finley's favor Jules Stein indicated that he would ask the government for a consent decree to clarify band-booking operation, but with the damages being cast aside at least temporarily and further appeals for reconsideration of the conspiracy and monopoly views, this move has been shelved. Meanwhile the Department of Justice investigation of MCA's possible criminal involvement in connection with Finley's anti-trust suit, which was heralded in the trade press, has simmered out. MCA's definite first refusal agreement with Pacific Square Ballroom has ceased since the trial, with bands being submitted to both Pacific Square and Mission Beach via mail. Altho Tiny Hill was the first MCA attraction slated to go into Mission Beach Ballroom after the trial, he later canceled out the date and MCA supplanted him with Sterling Young's band.

Unwilling to be quoted, some bookers at the other major agencies insist that many of the MCA booking evils, some of which were concerned in the Finley trial, continue to exist, such as pressure on operators serviced primarily by MCA not to buy opposition office attractions at all.

### No Follow-Up Suits Yet

Altho Finley's favorable decision was expected to be followed by similar suits brought by other ballroom-nitery operators and one-nighter promoters who frequently are reported to play second fiddle to competitive operators and promoters who have MCA and other booking office

"band firsts or exclusives" in particular territories or cities, none have shown up so far. It is felt any who might be so inclined are awaiting absolute completion of Finley's suit before taking on the wrath of any of major booking firms. Judge McCormick's reversal of damages awarded Finley originally is cited by some as indicative of what might happen to the entire case, altho they seem to forget that Judge McCormick still held MCA's actions monopolistic and considered them ample evidence of conspiracy up thru the time Finley filed his suit. It shouldn't be forgotten that subsequent appeals may bring Finley even greater damage award since only a small portion of time he has operated Mission Beach was considered in the \$55,000 damage figure.

### Higher Court Changes!

On the other hand, appeal to higher courts on MCA's part may bring even a further reversal for Finley. Finley's filing of his anti-trust suit against the booking firm only 45 days after he started operating the dancery, altho his lease for the spot ran for two years, was considered by many in the trade at the time a too-hasty move. Tradesters feel that the situation Finley charged may have continued indefinitely and the longer period of time could have meant much toward Finley's receiving a much larger and a more significant damage award. Thruout the trial the measure

of damages was a serious question mark.

With the case being dragged out in the courts, it may be some time before the repercussions expected actually take place. However, booking offices' 'mutually understood exclusives" with locations and forc-ing split commissions from other agencies is against American Federation of Musicians' rules (action is expected to be pushed even further on this score by the union following score by the union following its recently held annual con-vention in St. Petersburg, Fla., this year) and may become a thing of the past thru both court and union action. MCA's on numerous locations and bands which has apparently made it vulnerable at least as far as the West Coast Finley case is concerned with being charged as monopolistic may eventually be broken to a point where number of bands booked by the big four agency group or possible newcomers to booking set-up may be more evenly divided.

### More Choke or Dog Eating

Newcomer operators and promoters may find much greater choice and bidding for attractions in the eventual repercussions of this epic music industry trial with the elimination of "first refusals." Others feel an open market on band attractions may mean a dog-eat-dog situation with bids going sky-high.

Testimony during the trial revealed much heretofore unpublished (except *The Bill-board's* exhaustive coverage last February) figures, facts and charges covering MCA's West Coast booking activities.

Various music bigwigs testified, including bookers, operators, trade-paper personnel, etc., most of them subpoenaed by Finley, plus defendants, Jules Stein (MCA prexy), Larry Barnett (MCA band head), Eames Bishop and Hal Howard (MCA bookers), and plaintiff Larry Finley.

Charges against Stein personally were dropped midway in the suit due to lack of evidence, with the charges remaining leveled as a group against MCA, a Delaware corporation, and bookers Larry Barnett and Eames Bishop. Stein, following the verdict of the jury, told The Billboard that "The jury, by its decision, has in effect censored the efforts of our company in behalf of our clients in seeking the best places of employment for the maximum wages consistent with the furtherance of the

artist's career. The San Diego situation, out of which this lawsuit arose, occurred only because of our efforts in behalf of our clients."

### Jules Stein's Testimony

During his testimony Stein pointed out that MCA deals with but a portion of musicians, that out of 140,000 AFM members MCA handles only 4,000 or 5,000 . . . that the booking biz is extremely competitive and that keen competition even exists between various MCA offices . . . . that a top name band is not necessary to the financial success of a ballroom and cited danceries thruout the country as examples where the amount of biz done was not real indication of what is actually made financially . . . that when he

added that in 1941 when first refusal agreement was made with Pacific Square whereas they had 48 hours' time to decide whether they wanted band submitted them by MCA before anyone else could bid, Larry Finley was not in ballroom biz, not even in San Diego for that matter, and no one else was operating a major ballroom in San Diego then.

Finley during his testimony pointed out that in comparison to his situation in San Diego MCA booked bands into both the Casino Gardens and Aragon Ballroom (near Los Angeles), located just a block apart, yet Pacific Square received all of its bands in San Diego . . . that he lost \$122,000 during his 1945 operation of Mission Beach Ballroom due to sald conspiracy.

### Finley Claims MCA Does \$15,000,000 Annually

Final argument by opposing attorneys brought additional evidence as well as concluding summary of everything that had gone on in the court during the 13 days of the trial. Breaking down MCA's annual volume of biz to a daily figure, Finley's legal staff related to the jury MCA's handling of \$41,000 worth of bookings per day, close to \$15,000,000 annually. (Not revealed whether these figures concerned picture, band, radio, act bookings combined or bands alone, altho the former is expected to be the case.)

Tearing into the 48-hour first refusal set-up, Finley's legal man relayed info that since November 1, 1941, 217 MCA bands played Pacific Square, only 26 non-MCA orks were featured and that GAC, Frederick Brothers and William Morris Agency together had only nine names to offer Finley in 1945 and he played all nine. Finley's attorneys then cited bands, all MCA, playing all the major Los Angeles locations that very day, Harry James, Meadowbrook; Jan Garber, Trianon; Lawrence Welk, Aragon; Jan Savitt, Casino Gardens; Bob Crosby, Palladium; Gene Krupa, Orpheum Theater; Jimmie Grier, Biltmore Hotel, and Freddy Martin, Ambassador Hotel. He accused Barnett and Bishop of attempting to block Finley's direct booking deals with Tommy Dorsey and Charlie Barnet. Altho Finley didn't compute damages, he could see them coming when suit was filed and later statements proved it, his attorney said. He mentioned that after Henry Busse opened Mission Beach Ballroom for Finley in February, 1945, not another name played there until May.

Frank Doherty, MCA's legalist, wound matters up with a few pointed statements such as his belief that it was only Finley's inexperience that caused said losses, picturing Finley strictly as a promoter who spent thousands to make a show. Displaying a chart of

figures on comparative financial operation of Mission Beach in 1944, and when Finley took over in 1945, Doherty revealed that altho Finley's receipts were larger by about \$50,000, outlay for bands, executive salaries, advertising, gifts, plus traveling expenses, was extremely in excess of the 1944 operation. For instance, where \$94,000 had been spent in '44

for bands, Finley put out \$158,000: advertising-publicity for 1944 was \$17,000; for 1945, \$66,000; traveling expenses of Wayne Daillard, operator in 1944, were \$290;; Finley's, \$12,000 (explanation by Finley's attorney that greatest part of this amount may be attributed to costs in booking bands direct). Doherty asked the ladies of the jury if a store kept

nylons for established customers, not to exclude regular customers, why shouldn't MCA service Pacific Square, and since there was no testimony that the first refusal contract was illegal or improper and Pacific Square guaranteed that 75 per cent of bands used would be MCA attractions, it was a splendid outlet for employment of musicians.

It's been years now since remote airtime has been responsible for building a band into namedom, but leaders and their managers still take short-money location jobs to get that airtime. Here's a look at the picture as it was in the past year . . . and a speculative glance at the reasons why so few names were made.

# an Remote Airtime Be Effective Bandbuilder?

N THE past year there is evidence of only one new band making any kind of a dent in the public consciousness as a result of remote airtime. That band is the Elliott Lawrence orchestra, which zoomed out of a Philadelphia nowhere (Lawrence was house music director for WCAU, CBS station of which his dad, Stan Lee Broaza,

is manager) into third place (behind Stan Kenton and Tex Beneke) as the most promising newer orchestra in *The Bill-board's* Eighth Annual College Poll.

Since at the time of the voting in the college poll Lawrence had no records out, his recognition, on the part of the cap-and-gown kids could only

have come as a result of his steady CBS sustaining airtime. A further analysis of why Lawrence's band seemed to have been helped by airtime and practically all other bands with heavy remote schedules might as well have stood in bed appears to give a substantial part of the answer to the question of remote effectiveness.

#### Time Most Important

To begin with there is the question of the time the shows are broadcast. While practically all remote shots (ABC, CBS, Mutual and NBC) go out somewhere between 11 p.m. and 1:30 a.m., the Lawrence band had a hefty number of Saturday afternoon and early-evening shots. The Sam Donahues, Ray Anthonys, Harry Cools, Vic Lombardos, Blue Barrons and many others who have sent their music over the etherwaves in that stretch between just before and just after midnight seem to be reaching too few ears to matter. Remote time, it seems, won't mean a thing until somebody figures out a method for getting large numbers of people to stay up and listen to the radio from 11:30 p.m. on.

#### How Many Stations

There may be still another factor involved in the consideration of the shots themselves. While a band sitting in a New York hotel spot is told it has a CBS Coast-to-Coast wire on a given evening, there is no guarantee whatsoever that any appreciable number of stations on the network will pick up the broadcast. Records would have to be thoroly gone into to determine just how many stations on each web pick up the average remote broadcast. But if only a handful of stations carry the show, that is another strike against the ork leader who is counting on it to help build his band into namedom.

#### Bad Programing Common

Of course too many orks and their managers knock themselves out landing a location (at short money) just for

just going to get a bad impression of the band, and it's going to die before it has a chance to get rolling. The public doesn't care about whether or not the leader has enough time to plan and rehearse his remote shots or not - nor whether he needs that payola dough to get out of the red a little. The public just listens (and few enough of the public do to those midnight shots) and decides on the basis of what it hears whether a band is worth supporting or not. And maybe that's why so few new names have developed in the past few years - and practically none as a result of consistent airtime. Perhaps it is time for bandleaders, their managers and offices to take another look at the remote airtime picture and decide whither they are heading.

Elliott Lawrence came in third in the most promising newer ork category of The Billboard college poll last year and was topped only by Stan Kenton and Tex Beneke. One of the reasons for the Kenton band's popularity, chirp June Christy, is shown here, and Beneke himself tootles something silly for Johnny Desmond in the other pic.

(Continued from page 469) the airtime and then dissipate whatever effectiveness the airtime might have as a bandbuilding medium by bad programing. Sometimes the bad programing is due to sheer ignorance, laziness or a combination of both on the part of the leader and his management, and sometimes it is due to the fact that that leader wants to make \$100 or so out of the airshot by playing songs of publishers who'll give him \$25 per shot or thereabouts.

#### Public Just Listens

Leaders who do this are, of course, only kidding themselves about utilizing that airtime to help the band. Because if people hear a band playing a consistently uninteresting set of tunes, they're



# Simple and

One thing is so-called hillbilly and cowboy songs have what it takes as far as a hit tune is concerned. They have a simple and usually pretty melody that is easy to remem-ber and a simple lyrical tale that rings true. Earlier hits written out of the "hillbilly" class such as Kansas City Kit-ty and Sierra Sue show why songs like this season's hit Sioux City Sue were grabbed up from the folk Western ranks.

The public has always liked the hillbilly tunes but was ashamed to admit it for fear of being called hayseed or hick. The experience of Dick Thomas, writer of Sioux City Sue, is

illustrative of this. Before becoming a professional cow-boy performer Thomas was a night club entertainer, and he always found Western songs to always found Western songs to be popular with city folk. How-ever, he found he couldn't start with a cowboy chant, but after a few Tin Pan Alley bal-lads he would change into a yodeling bit and never fail to bring the house down. Once he appeared before the Fourth Estate Square Club which in-Estate Square Club, which includes the sophisticates of the newspaper, advertising and radio fraternity, and once he dio fraternity, and once he started with the hillbilly stuff they wouldn't let him go.

# **Public Now** "Educated"

Jesse Rogers, singing star of the WFIL-ABC Hayloft Hoe-down and a Sonora recording artist, thinks the rising pop-

ularity of folk music happened largely because the public has become educated to it principally via radio and records. In other words, "hillbilly" tunes have been taken out of the backwoods class. Tin Pan Alley writers, realizing there is plenty of gold in a Western song, have turned their talents to such songs with the result to such songs with the result there is better song material on the market. 

(Continued from page 523) Fence Me In is a notable example of this. Also there are better musicians playing the folk music. The days of broken-down banjo players and left-handed fiddlers are over. More and more musicians with good musical training have turned to the rich folk market. Result of this is when city folk hear Westerns today it doesn't sound like something from a cracked record.

## Good Regional Men Too

Another factor in folk music hitting the pop class is that not only are top singers like Bing Crosby promoting folk tunes but that good regional singers are turning to Western and mountain material. Today a cowboy singer can't yodel thru his nose and get away with it. Trained voices have entered the field and Western songs fall more pleasantly on the ears. Thus with good songs, good musicians and good singers, the popular appeal of folk tunes is growing and is bound to keep on growing.

Another singer who's sung the classical and Tin Pan Alley songs for many years is Florence Bendon. Recently she has turned to folk music almost exclusively and with good reason. Miss Bendon is convinced that one has only to listen to a Western or a mountain ballad to understand why it appeals to almost every class. She says: "People talk about swing. There's swing to every Western and hillbilly chant. They're all toe-tapping and typically American."

The war centered more attention on our native folk music and was responsible for part of the recent upswing in popularity.

More and more, the public is becoming conscious of true American music. The city boy serving in the armed forces found out, many of them for the first time, what hillbilly music was. Deep in the Heart of Texas started down South in the army camps. Folk music has made a lasting impression on many of the boys in service. Not only did many of them learn to like music, they learned to sing it.

It's a fondness which has spread across the nation and which seems to increase in scope and intensity year by year






First of all, the lifting of auto and tire and gas restrictions has meant that people can get to the parks and groves again. "And once autos become plentiful," Joyce explained, "crowds should be even bigger. Another factor is the public has hungered for its favorite type of entertainment. With the parks either closed down or running on short schedules because of war restrictions, it has been several

The SRO sign goes up almost every Saturday night at Cleveland's Masonic Auditorium for Pappy Howard's weekly WJW Barn Dance Jamboree. Pappy has played to an estimated 119,000 paid admissions on personal appearances during the past year.

BOX-office receipts for folk artist personal appearances continue to mount higher and higher thruout the country, and veteran showmen who used to sneer at folk shows back in the '30s are at last convinced the folk show is here to stay-but good! Not only that, but many of them are angling for a finger in the lucrative pie. The trend toward folk shows in the big cities continued unabated, with such big towns as Chicago, Hollywood, Philadelphia, Nashville and even New York going for folk artists in a big way. However, this doesn't mean the shows are any less strong in the rural districts-home of folk music. It means the city slickers are at last awakening to the simple appeal of folklore.

## Joyce's Eastern Reasons

Jolly Joyce, head of the Jolly Joyce Theatrical Agency in Philadelphia, one of the most active bookers of Western and folk talent in the East, says several factors account for the record crowds attracted by



their fill of such entertainment. In addition, so many boys have returned from the army and many others from city centers where they worked in war plants. They just can't get enough of their favorite Western entertainment."

#### Names Contribute

Another factor is the appearance of well-known names. Just as the kids in the city and Colleges turn out for the big name bands, country folk are just as loyal to their own

years since people could get big folk names. Folk radio, screen and recording names are finding it a lot easier to travel, now that restrictions are easing, so the parks and groves have big b. o. magnets to draw them in. Better radio shows and better recordings have further whetted appetites of those who crave to see their favorite stars in person, so p. a.'s have a stronger lure than before.


Physical improvements in the parks have also been made, since operators have spent some real dough in dressing up their sites. The next few

years should find a building trend for air-conditioned rural theaters so that the weather will not be an important feature in attendance. Further, many amusement parks with good theater facilities (Dorney Park, Allentown, Pa., for instance) are booking in Western shows to fulfill the growing demand for this type of entertainment.

# More's Big Gates

Frankie More, who books some of the biggest amusement parks around York, Pa., reports

a big increase in receipts. During the summer season More has played such stars as Rov Acuff, Ernest Tubb, Uncle Dave Macon, Curley Fox, Red Foley and Lulu Belle and Scotty to capacity crowds. Crowds are so big that parking facilities are highly inadequate for people who drive for miles around to see and hear their favorite performers. Over 4,000 stood in the rain at Valley View Park June 30 to watch Roy Acuff, while on July 7 Ernest Tubb hit the same place with close to 5,000 paid admissions.



P. a.'s on the West Coast have turned into a land-office business, with particular emphasis on ballrooms and square dancing. No one likes Western music as much as Westerners, and they filled the local ballrooms to hear and dance to music by Spade Cooley, Foreman Phillips and others. One reason for the tremendous increase in folk p. a.'s in the California region is that a sizable chunk of the U.S. rural population was attracted there during the war to work in aircraft plants, shipyards, etc. These people, plus the local folk music lovers, thronged Western and "hillbilly" ballrooms, resulting in a boom for these locations.

# Permanent Following

Many of the out-of-towners, won over by California sunshine, settled there, thus giving the locale an even stronger permanent following for folk music. Bands like Bob Wills, for example, have topped b.-o. figures made by some name aggregations. Spade Cooley, who operates his own ballroom in

Santa Monica, draws crowds of 5,000 to 6,000 every Saturday night. Riverside Rancho also lays in the chips. Other ball-room locations doing top biz in this area include Redondo Beach, with Texas Jim Lewis's Band, Painted Post, San Fernando Valley, 97th Street Corral and Palace Barn Dance with Tex Williams band.

# Colby's 65,000

In the Midwest, number of people attending roving Guy Colby, of WLS' Square Dances, totaled around 65,000 this year. He gives three a week and the Merry Garden Ballroom in Chicago, site of many of Colby's dances, packs in more than 800 persons per performance.

The country's big radio folk shows really draw customers both for broadcast and for touring p. a.'s. It's here that the city dwellers' mounting interest in folk music and folk personalities is most evident. Jack Steck, producer of the WFIL-ABC Hayloft Hoedown show which has 2,300 persons crowding in the Town Hall

every Saturday night, says:

"It's no show business freak that tix are at a premium even where the draw is almost entirely from the Philadelphia city dwellers. First of all, hillbilly music and entertainment, thanks to records, radio and movies, are more popular with city folk than many people in show business will ever dream about. There are many who came mostly for their amazement. only to find here was real amusement. They found the Western style wholesome and thoroly enjoyable entertainment. A show to which they could bring their children or their staid aunt from Peoria. Then there are the city folk who came originally from rural sections and were hungry for that down-home feeling which they find at the shows."

# Square Dancing In Schools

Increased popularity of the folk shows is shown in that square dancing is now taught in all the public schools in Philadelphia. The youngsters are hep to the Virginia reel and the do-see-dos as they are



to the jitterbug steps. As a result, the kids, dragging their parents along, sometimes swell the crowds every Saturday night.

Yet not only on Saturday night but every night of the week is this increased popularity of folk shows felt. The hoedown show plays to private parties and other shows at least two or three times a week. Popularity was proved when the hoedown performers toured the city factories and offices at the request of the

Routine

WLS National The Barn Dance, the country's oldest bigtime radio show, plays to a packed Eighth Street theater in Chicago every Saturday night. Main fault of the theater is that it seats only 800 persons and there are usually that many outside wanting to

Treasury Department in the get in. Performers, however, interest of War Bonds get around the Midwest, East and South in response to calls from fans, and during 1945 appeared before 618,715 persons.
The Barn Dance alone has played before 172,650 theatergoers during the six months of 1946.

Another big-time radio p.-a. show is the Grand Ole Opry, which is housed every Saturday night in Nashville's Ryman auditorium. The auditorium seats 4,000 people, and long lines outside during the four-hour performance attest the S. R. O. conditions inside. Each summer the *Opry* splits into traveling tent shows, touring all the South and raking in the b.-o. shekels.

The WLW Midwestern Hayride is another fabulous (to those who don't know the popularity of the folk artists) air

show which sends entertainers to crowded p. a.'s thruout the East and Midwest. Show itself is broadcast from station's biggest studio which seats 1,000.

Thus from parks, theaters and station studios the conclusion is the same: folk artists really packed 'em in this year, city as well as country folk, really packed em in this year, city as well as country folk, and the desire to see the artists in person is riding the crest of a box-office tidal wave.

Riley Shepard, sometimes known as Dick Scott, has been preaching and working on building a federation of folk artists for several years. In this article he tells why he feels such a federation is necessary.


SOME of us folk artists are Westerners, others of us are from the East and big towns, but our devotion to our kind of entertainment is no less sincere than those who hail from the South and the West. In order to identify the various types of songs we sing by one name, we call them "American folk songs." Our organization, therefore, is titled: "The Federation of American Folk Artists."

#### Not a Union

The reasons for such an organization are many. However, I'd like to make it clear from the beginning that FAFA is not a trade union. We think there are already enough unions. We think that another union would harm more than aid our cause. Show business is strongly organized into separate factions. All entertainers have a special organization to represent their interests, but the folk artist had no such organization. His is a most peculiar position. First, he must belong to AFM because he plays an instrument; second, he must belong to AFRA because he sings on the radio; third, he must belong to AGVA because he makes personal appearances in theaters and night clubs. All these things. singing, talking and playing an instrument, are essential to the folk artist. He must do all of them to be "a hillbilly." Paying dues to three different unions somehow seems unfair. We don't object to unions, because we know the great job they have accomplished for entertainers, but why should we pay three of them for the same service.

# Other Special

Aside from this, we face problems over which no union has jurisdiction. We have problems which require special and organized attention and representation. For instance, take the songs we play and sing. As a rule they are composed by entertainers themselves. Less than 11 per cent of the total number are written by songwriters who are not entertainers. But the legitimate songwriter has many ad-



vantages. He is close to the publishing business and has first-hand knowledge of what goes on. Also he has the Songwriters' Protective Association to protect him. But the folk artist-composers are scattered over the nation, and a great many of them have never met a publisher face to face. So far as I know, no publisher has bothered to sit down and write any of us a letter explaining the advantages of SPA. But that's all right. We're catching on rather well by ourselves. We know that air plugs and recordings are the backbone of the publishing business.

We know, too, that taking a song from a folk artist who has his own radio program and who also records is as good as having money in the bank. Some song publishers have taken undue advantage of the situation. Indeed, some of them have amassed fortunes, but the party is just about over. When a publisher accepts a folk song, the song, in a great many cases, is allowed to struggle along under its own power. If it begins to step out and become a hit, then the publisher condescends to give it a little attention. What can he lose? He spends almost nothing, so everything is profit. In fact, he is always amazed when one of these songs become a nationwide hit, for he knows he had little or nothing to do with it. We have reason to believe that if presented properly a good folk song will

sell the same as any other kind of hit song.

#### Diskers' Field Day

Recording companies have also enjoyed a field day. They have recorded and sold millions of "hillbilly" records which cost them practically nothing. The general practice is to take a trip to far-away places, find a folk artist who enjoys local popularity and pay him \$50 a side to make records. If he has original songs, all the better, take those also. After all, it's smart business to pay nothing instead of something. I know one current big shot in the recording field who has made nearly a quarter of a million dollars in this manner.

#### Those Artist Bureaus

Last but by no means least is the treatment accorded folk artists by many radio stations. They set up "artist bureaus"; that is, an agency to book jobs for the talent that is heard on the stations. For this service the agency sometimes takes as much as the traffic will bear. I know of cases where the agency got more for answering a letter than the talent got for working the job. But 10 and 15 per cent must be often paid to the agency whether it had anything to do with securing the lobs or not.

One case in particular will serve to show what I'm talking about: an artist hired his own personal agent to whom he paid 10 per cent of his net earnings from personal appearances. On top of this he had to pay to the station over which he broadcast 15 per cent of the same net earnings. Believe it or not, but this artist paid the station more in a year than it paid him in salary for any two-year period. On a smaller scale this is going on at far too many stations. We think it is very unfair and intend to do something about it.

# To Promote Folk Music

However, we did not organize merely because we have complaints. Our main purpose in organizing is to promote folk music and talent in America: to win for both the recognition and respect they so richly deserve. We are already winning the general public. Every day more and more people buy "hillbilly" records and sheet music. Today the folk artists of America are packing them in everywhere, and it is now big business to be "a hillbilly." But big or small, we're in business to stay-and we know that a much larger number of people than anyone suspects has been won over to our kind of entertainment. It is these people who see to it that a good folk song never dies. That is why we call hillbilly and cowboy songs "AMERICAN FOLK SONGS." To preserve this music and to improve it, if possible, is the fundamental purpose of the FEDERATION OF AMERICAN FOLK ARTISTS.

More companies in the past year made more and better folk disks than ever before with the result that in stores all over the country, in juke boxes in big cities and small folk records got the biggest play in their history.

# Radio A Reason

One reason for the big upsurge in folk disks is fact that with more and better folk shows on the air, tunes get around the country more extensively, creating a demand for both disks and sheet music. It's axiomatic that when a song gets plugged widely on the radio the wax boys will be following thru. Heretofore folk tunes were neglected by big-time commercial programs, but now since all major networks have big-time commercial folk shows, plugging of folk tunes has become much easier. That's how songs like Sioux

City Sue reach the popular class almost overnight so that the big popular bands pick them up.

# Philly Ops' Opinions

Two of Philadelphia's biggest record shop and music machine dealers, Irving Newman and Sam Lerner, have definite opinions about the rise of folk-tune records. Folk records are selling big in Philly this year, they say, when in earlier years if a dealer carried any "hill-billy" records at all they were usually hidden behind the counter. Today they are displayed alongside those of Frank Sinatra and Harry James, taking a prominent place on counter displays and in store windows.

One of the biggest factors in mounting sales is that so many people from the country settled in the city at the start of the war—attracted by the big play at the war plants. These folk bought nothing but "hillbilly" records. Also they were in better position to buy more records than they formerly could when they lived and worked in the small towns or on the farms.

Heavy sales of folk records was also due to the newly-come-to-the-city-folk's failure to find their favorite entertainment in city spots, so they turned heavily to records. Important sales factor was also that more Westerns and folk recordings were available on wax. Before, buyers had little to pick from. Today there is plenty of choice. Result: customers wind up buying twice as many records.

#### Big Juke Play Continues

Today juke box ops are having trouble keeping enough

Western sides in the machines to meet the demands of the location owners and patrons. Here, too, the biggest factor lies in the influx of rural folk in the community because of war jobs—and staying after the war. Second most important reason for unprecedented sale of folk records is that servicemen learned to like folk tunes while training down South.


"Musical and singing quality of hillbilly records today are so much better and pleasanter than in the old days," declares Lerner. "Today some of them sound better than a lot of the hot jazz ear-blasters. Good singers and excellent musical backgrounds make the hillbilly records sound big time, and juke box fans, even those who didn't know much about folk music, find them a welcome relief from the ear-splitting stuff."

Mercury Records, of Chicago, is typical of a new company which is finding a lucrative market in folk disks. Berle Adams, head of the company, is very emphatic about his faith in waxing more and more stars like Rex Allen, Deuce Spriggins, Ken Curtis, the Prairie Ramblers and others.

"Altho we're just starting in the folk field," says Adams, "returns indicate a great future for folk-artist records and we're going to play them up big."

Another enthusiast for folktune recordings is Joseph Gerl, president of Sonora Records.

Gerl, also president of Sonora
Radio and Television Corporation, is pleased at the way
folk-tune albums and recordings have been selling the past
year.

"Folk-tune records of all kinds have been selling at phenomenal speed," he declares. "We're certainly going to have to increase our tempo in production during the coming year."

Sonora issued four folk-tune albums during the past six months: Country Dances, by Ed Durlacher; Hilbilly Tunes, by Fred Kirby; Cowboy Saddle Serenades, by Jesse Rogers, and Old-Timers' Album, by the Ben Yost Singers.

# Folk Tunes' Longer Life

Outstanding folk disk of the 1945-'46 season is Dick Thomas's Sioux City Sue. It cropped up in the folk juke box hits in the fall of '45 and stayed there until it "graduated" into the big-time pop hit class in the spring of '46. Thus it can be seen composer Thomas reaps a double and long benefit from having written a popular as well as a folktune hit. No pop song lasts a year of continuous popularity in any field except a folk song which is picked up.

Tex Ritter has clicked on Capitol, as has Jack Guthrie. Bob Wills, working for Columbia, stuck in there and pitched with Silvery Dew on the Blue

Grass Tonight, while Ernest Tubb, via Decca, was selling It's Been so Long, Darling.

## Top-Selling Folkers

Al Dexter on Columbia came up with Guitar Polka and the Hoosier Hotshots gave forth with a plenty salable rendition of Someday You'll Want Me To Want You on Decca. The Hoosier Hotshots were also hitting the top with their rendition of Sioux City Sue, as was Zeke Manners on Victor. In fact, it was Sue in several versions from November thru May that copped most of the honors on the juke folk parade, but for a single, Al Dexter's Guitar Polka hit plenty of firsts.

Gene Autry's Silver Spurs on Columbia made the grade in the early spring of '46 and Bob Wills again copped honors with his New Spanish Two Step on the same label. About the same time Merle Travis came out with Cincinnati Lou via Capitol. Spade Cooley followed up with You Can't Break My Heart on Columbia. Gene Autry again hit it with I Wish I Had Never Met Sunshine on the same label.

# Fifteen Coast Companies

A special survey made by *The Billboard* on the West Coast, where a great portion of Western folk music is cut, showed that there are 15 major companies putting out folk-tune disks, with the vast majority planning to cut even more this year.

Taking a few samples: Melody Moderne (Memo Label) cut Terry Fell on 8 sides and Curt Barrett on 12. Each disk has sold about 30,000 copies. This company does pop tunes but states folk tunes outsell everything, including race, hot jazz, ballads, novelties and Latin American.

San Antonio Label sold plenty of Frankie Marvin's Guitar Polka and It's a Sin as of the beginning of July. ARA cut Judy Canova with 12 sides; Smiley Burnette, 16; Cass County Boys, 8. Bel-Tone Records cut Tin Ear Tanner's I Used To Work in Chicago and the novelty came to be a big juke box favorite, with a good percentage of the sales dollars coming in from the Chicago area. Black and White waxed the Westernairs in San Antonio

Rose. The firm also cut eight sides for a square dance a bum which was beamed especially for Southern sales. Four Star sold thousands of copies of Home in San Antonio, made by Texas Tyler. Company thinks Western tunes will be bigger than ever this coming year. Merle Lindsay is taking blues numbers and adapting them to Westerns, while Tyler's new Guitar Boogie Woogie is a boogle tune dressed up in Western garb.

Superior Records was surprised to find Westerns it cut in May selling better than anything in its catalog, with reorders coming in all the time. Talent cut was Stuart Hamblen, Betsy Gay and Covered Wagon Jubilee orchestra with Susabelle.

Atlas Records, featuring Red Murrell, claims hillbilly tunes are even better sellers than Westerns and plans to stay in the folk-music field altogether.

Coast Records has such folk stars on its roster as Ozie Waters, the Plainsmen, Jimmy Walker, Idaho Call, Boots Faye, Walt Strum, Dick James, Cal and Buddy and Ed Moody. Fifteen to 20 per cent of this firm's catalog is Western and hillbilly disks. With all reports from every section of the country it's very evident that in the field of records as well as in every field of entertainment, folk music is making great gains.

# FOLK AIRSHOW ONCE-OVER

PROOF of the fact that folk shows have not only hit their stride on airwaves but are steadily climbing in the big time was seen this year when dozens of new shows and talent were aired. Biggest newcomer on the national scene was Mutual Broadcasting Company's Opry House Matinee, which took WSM's Grand Old Opry stars and put them on every Saturday afternoon over the Mutual network. All the major networks now have big folk programs.

The days of the old informal catch-as-catch-can "hillbilly" shows are over. Main reason is that most program directors realize that folk shows must be put together on a professional basis. According to Bill Klein, exec at WLS, the trick is not to get too "slick" and lose all the spontaneity the folk artists are capable of and at the same time keep the production from sounding too amateurish.

Jack Steck, producer of the WFIL-ABC Hayloft Hoedown, thinks along the same lines:

Today all the four networks have at least one big folk show, and stations in every key city, as well as in the rural areas are putting on more folk shows of one kind and another. And in most cases production is handled with as much care as any other show on the air.



WLW's "Midwestern Hayride" is also piped to Station WTAM in Cleveland and WSPD, Toledo, for rebroadcast. It's one of the Midwest's most popular folk airers.

"In the old days a hillbilly troupe would wander into town, drop in at a station and immediately be put on the air. The station gave the troupe a quarter of a half hour and let it go at that. If the troupe failed to show up some morning the station knew the gang left town and merely waited until the next troupe showed up."

#### Early-Morning Days

Hillbilly shows were always spotted in the early-morning hours because program directors figured the shows would be reaching only those who got up with the cows. Today program directors know better. Today even local shows are usually produced with the same care as any other big-station show. Talent must be rehearsed, better broadcast periods are assigned and care is also taken in song selection so listeners won't hear same song every day of the week or sometimes two or (as used to happen) three times during the same program. Consequently a greater listening audience is developed for not only the big network shows but the smaller locals.

#### Compelition Is Keener

Another factor in better programing of folk shows is that so many good ones are already on the networks that competition grows ever keener, and unless a great amount of care is given to production, listeners will tune out.

Steck, for instance, spends an entire week auditioning, rehearsing, seeking new talent, devising new types of presentation, selecting songs so when show does go on the air it's with the same precision as a Broadway production. The same is true of all the big folk shows. Producers feel that a well-produced well-cast show, whether it be mystery, dramatic, comedy or folk, will attract listeners from both city and country.

One of the biggest and best folk shows in the country is WSM-NBC's Grand Ole Opry, which runs for four hours every Saturday night. More than 4,000 persons file in to Nash-

ville's Ryman Auditorium to hear such stars as Red Foley, the Duke of Paducah, Ernest Tubb, Eddle Arnold, Minnie Pearl, Rod Brassfield, Wallie Fowler, Bradley Kincaid and many others

Great success of the Opry is due to good performers and good promotion. In the latter category falls the recent feat of the Opry broadcasting for the first time by short wave from the river steamer Idlewild in the Cumberland. Two special planes flew more than a score of New York newspaper and magazine representatives over to cover the event. When a folkshow can pull attention from the country's leading publications it shows it's really on the ball.

#### Good Performers, Ditto Promotion

Another big-time folk show which is growing year by year is WLW's Midwestern Hayride, which was formerly the Boone County Jamboree. Another show on Sundays, the Circle-Arrow, features 12 Negro singers, is also classed as a folk show and is also carried by two

NBC stations in addition to WLW. Hayride stars the Good Sisters, the Buccaneers, Lafe Harkness, Ollie James, Max Condon and many other luminaries in the folk-artist world. '46 Version of

#### Folker


Success of this show is attributed by station executives to its being "a 1946 version of a folk show" in that there is more novelty and more comedy, with a few popular tunes mixed in with the folk stuff. The show is greatly pepped up to suit city as well as country folk. Ollie James, a Will Rogers type of comedian, supplies the humor, while Max Condon does some of the vocals. Altho show can't play to more than 1,000 persons while broadcasting, since "Nation's Station's" studios are used and no admission is charged, people all over the Midwest and East get a chance to see the entertainers in person because they make many personal appearances during the year.

The oldest network show in America is the WLS National Barn Dance, which started back (Continued on page 544)

George Ferguson, of WLS Talent Bureau, reports a great increase in the sale of song folios, another indication of the increased popularity of the show.

#### Toppers

Another show drawing a lot of attention in the Midwest is WOWO-ABC's Hoosier Hop. Show crowds 2,300 people in Fort Wayne (Ind.) Quimby Auditorium every week to hear stars like Nancy Lee, the Hilltoppers, the Black Hawk Valley Gang, Judy and Jim, Kenny Roberts. The WWVA (West Virginia) Jamboree is back playing before audiences after a wartime layoff. 



Clevelanders, like others across the nation, have overflowed theaters and filled radio studios whenever they can see and hear good homespun entertainment with a frontier flavor. They have a good chance in WJW's Cleveland Clambake. Program has been on the air ever since station first went on in November, 1943, and since its ever-expanding success has reached the point where in regular surveys it has kept the needle at one of the best all-round listener ratings ever achieved for a show at this time of day (2 p.m.) in Cleveland. In a recent poll conducted by Stanley Anderson, of The Cleveland Press, Clambake was voted best daytime show and Judy Dell, songstress, was named top vocalist.

Truly one of the granddaddies of all folk shows is WLS's "National Barn Dance," on the air since 1924. Paramount made a film of the same name last year. Untold millions have heard the show since its inception, and hundreds of thousands tune in every week.

survey made by The Billboard shows that of 12 stations in the Hollywood vicinity 11 used one or more programs of folk music. In most cases it was many more than one and in the case of KXLA, Pasadena, no fewer than 11 folk-artist programs are aired each week, with all being sponsored. This station is a good example of how a radio station gets propagate American folk tunes and reaps a handsome bit of money for it. Another production emanating from Hollywood is Columbia's Gene Autry Show. While this show is mainly dramatic, several songs are used on each week's program. Another Columbia far-Western air folk show is Hollywood Barn Dance over CBS's Pacific network on Saturdays.

Thus, not only in the Far West but in the East, Midwest and South as well, air folk shows are steadily rising both in number and popularity. Americans everywhere are coming to realize the merits of folk music, and when they're handed well-produced shows they don't twist the dial.

Those characters who are affianced to girl singers and don't like the customers looking at her are always a problem.

The life of a cocktail lounge

booker is hardly a bed of posies. Perpetually



lot is a hard one, for they must keep both the operators (business men) of the cocktail lounges and the acts (talent) satisfied, and according to most 10 per centers, the job of doing this alone is worth their fee. Not a day passes, say the book-

ers, without some new or old

either gold or applauding payees.

#### That Old About Face

In other words, bookers have to convince the ops what wonderful acts they're getting so cheaply, and then do a neat vaulte-face to convince talent what a glorious place the so and so cocktail lounge is to work in. Sam Honigberg, Chicago publicity man for both bookers and acts, declares bookers are gradually taking on the servant role because both the talent and the ops feel the bookers should do more for their 10 per cent than just get the two signed up.

#### Extra-Added Duties

"For instance," Honigberg says, "Nowadays a booker is expected to find hotel rooms, get suits of clothes for the acts and make a big deal for liquor for the ops." Another gripe of the bookers is that new guys are muscling in, without any experience, who are promising ops the moon and sixpence with such acts as USO units at cheap prices, and then not being able to fill the bargain. Nevertheless, the op, with his head reeling at the thought of cheap but good acts, reacts unfavorably when told he has to shell out for good talent.

Some bookers have kicks against building up names. They say they go to a lot of trouble, time and expense building up John Jones, and Jones, after he's built, doesn't remember who did it, and is dissatisfied with practically everything he gets; money, dates, etc., etc. More often than not he goes highly on the temperamental side, thus adding to the booker's list of pet peeves.

#### Those Last Minutes Holdovers

Another aspirin-inducing pain of bookers is hotels and lounges who keep a tight-laced policy of booking for only two weeks at a time regardless of the act. When the act proves a terrific drawing card, the hotel or lounge immediately reverses its policy and demands the act indefinitely. But meantime, the booking office, knowing the policy of the particular place, has already booked the act elsewhere, so the gripes and groans and threatened end of friendships and possibly contracts begin for the luckless booker.

#### And One Night Decisions

Also the bookers are very fond (joke, son) of those ops, particularly new in the game, who base their opinion of the act on the basis of the first night's results—the increase in biz, etc.—and call up with long harangues about how they've been gypped into paying too much dough for a lousy act which brought in only so much cash.

The ops of the kind that insist on a fixed price no matter how good the act is also take







And then there are the small unit band leaders who audition with a first rate orchestra and get a first rate contract at a top spot and show up with a second rate band. This doesn't put the booker in too solid with the ops, and incidentally doesn't do the band fronter any good either.

Or, another instance which happens fairly often: A lovely girl single turns out to be married to what's known as a supe, and the guy hangs a ound continually, threatening patrons he figures are too forward. This calls for fast cancellation of the gal's contract, take it from several of the Midwest's prominent cock tail bookers.

#### A Call From

Bookers love instances when contracts are all sealed and signed and bands are skedded to open that night—and then the union calls and says price is below scale and must be convinced it isn't. These little in cidents happen much too frequently say the harassed 10 per centers.

To sum it up, as one leading idwest booker puts it:

"You're dealing with two yes of personalities, the introirtic business man operators terested primarily in cash recipts, and the extrovertic exlibitionist acts, which usually the temperamental. You have be both."


**OUTSIDE** ...

We get a look at the slightly quieter external build ups for Les Paul at the Rounders, drummerman Ray Bauduc at the Susie-Q, Roy Milton at the Cobra Club and the Mills Bros. (Whose Florentine Gardens neon is getting plenty competition from the "Laff Riot" of the Marx Brothers film) Just pause for a minute to recall how many of the units just named were hot disk bets. The Mills Brothers, of course; Gaillard, ever since his "Cement Mixer"; Roy Milton, since Juke Box Records built his Boogie; Les Paul on many a Decca disk, some with Bing Crosby; Art Tatum with any number of classic singles and albums. Disks rate top importance with units as with other musical attractions . . . but let's go inside and see these units in action.

At the Rounders, owners Ev Wallace (who also emcees) stands by while Les Paul and his guys go thru their paces . . . The Mills Brothers (3 around one mike, 1 at the other) keep the Zanzibar room's patrons listening . . . and the Roy Milton group take a high, hot brass and reed ride, while Ray Bauduc plays to the patrons lined up at the Susie-Q bar. Coast lounges have been paying good prices. There are plenty indie diskers out there who might be interested in cutting a good small unit, the sunshine is beautiful . . . and who knows, you may even grab a spot in a picture.

To make the big-time radio grade a unit must have plenty on the ball. Musicianship, versatility, mike-know-how are just a few of the requirements. Strangely enough some units rule themselves out by building a reputation for not being reliable. Here's a bookerradio man look at the problem.


HERE'S a big field in radio many others. But what isn't and television for good, cocktail acts. there are plenty of hurdles to be leaped and a lot of opposition to be overcome before any cocktail unit or single can cash in on the top dough coming for those who perform for the ether wave audience. Examples of cocktail acts who have made the radio grade in the past, particularly in the past year, prove that the dough is there and will continue to be there in the future in what is expected to be ever larger amounts. But the expressions of radio execs and intelligent bookers indicate that only the best will be able to make the grade.

The list of former cocktail acts which have made the radio grade is long. Case histories of some of the better known among those who have made the mike market is old stuff to the trade by now. This group includes the Milt Herth Trio. the Three Suns. Billy Blair and

new is the realization among the radio trade and bookers that just because the act or unit has a name doesn't mean that automatically it will be good radio material. Some radio producers have had disappointments with cocktail acts. Some bookers have worked hard to get an act an audition and then have found out that the act, maybe tops in a lounge, just didn't have the stuff that made good radio entertainment. Judging from the consensus of the radio and booking trade, 1946 was the year in which some real sound thinking was done as to what acts have a future in radio and television-and why.



Whereas, in the past the bookers were thinking of the radio future of cocktail acts being primarily in the guest appearance department, now they are thinking of and trying to get acts that can handle shows of their own. They are not thinking in terms of guest appearances, a la the career of Art Tatum and Maurice Rocco. Now they are angling for special shows, as has been worked out for Dick (Two Ton) Baker on WGN, Eddie Wiggans on WCFL and the Fontaine Sisters on WMAQ-NBC. But to sell gressive program managers like Jules Herbuveax, of NBC, who gave the Van Damme outfit its break. The program manager can't be the kind who thinks in terms of soap operas, news and drama only. He must be the type that thinks in terms of giving listeners a new kind of entertainment, a programer who can see that a small unit often can give as much entertainment as a full orchestra. Given this kind of program manager with whom to deal, and given acts that are tops, and, most of all, versatile, the bookers say they can sell a lot of talent to radio

### Many Acts Unreliable

In the ranks of the radio chiefs, however, there is still plenty of feeling against putting cocktail acts to work in radio. The objection, however, is directed against only the

have the co-operation of pro- lesser names, the less reliable acts managed by agents who don't try to give their acts close supervision. For example, there is E. J. Sperry, radio director of the W. E. Long Company, outfit that acts as advertising consultant and program preparer for bakeries thruout the country and also does transcribed programing. Sperry a couple of years ago was spending well over \$20,000 a year for cocktail acts to make one and one-half minute musical spot announcements. Now he will use only the reliable standards. He finds many cocktail acts too unreliable. Acts break up just before a recording date, others come late for a recording session, still others don't know how to work with a radio mike. These are just some of Sperry's complaints, which he, like so many others, direct against only the

### Program Mgr. Progressiveness

It all seems to boil down to the fact that there is a future in radio for cocktail acts, but there are a lot of "ifs" attached to any optimistic prediction about that future. Program managers must become more progressive for one thing and must begin to realize that a good cocktail act can give as much, if not more, entertainment. Acts must become versatile. They must learn radio techniques. They must develop special material for radio that is entirely different from what they do in lounges. Then maybe they can get into the lush radio dough. All these "ifs," it is agreed, are worth overcoming for that dough, for the chance, for example, to earn as much as one cocktail unit that pulled down \$32,000 for about four months' work here making a series of transcribed programs. And then, of course, television lies just over the horizon. How much that will pay nobody knows yet. But everyone is guessing that it will eventually be at least as much as radio, if not more. All of which makes it worth while for any cocktail act to begin polishing itself for radio and video.

### MCA's Unit Try

One other office that is seriously making a try to work small units, the type usually used as lounge entertainers, into radio is the Chi branch of MCA. There Raoul Kent, who is in the office's radio department, is trying to get four of the org's small musical units into radio work. These four are the Notables, four musicians and a gal vocalist, headed by Chuck Cavallo; the Chicagoans, four-piece musical unit headed by Joe Di Salvo; the Estollitas, four-piece musical unit fronted by Jimmy Nuzzo, and the Adele Scott Trio, outfit consisting of Hammond organ played by Miss Scott, guitar and piano.

Kent, like so many other bookers who have spent plenty of time analyzing the requirements of radio, is concentrating on only a few units because he believes only a few (the best) can make the radio grade. To him the best means the most unusual, the most versatile, only the all-round top musicians. He points out, as an example of unusualness, the

work of the Scott Trio, which plays classics with a rhythm beat-something that he claims should have universal appeal. The Chicagoans, he points out as being an unusual group of top musicians who chalked up a good record during their long stay at the Ambassador West in Chicago. Members of this outfit can double on various instruments, have unusual arrangements and are all top musicians-the kind of things that make for good entertainment on any radio program as well as in any nitery.

### Offer Best

Kent also is of the opinion that it is foolish to take just any lounge act or small unit and try to sell it to radio. He believes bookers should search for the best, for the acts most adaptable to the radio medium, and then try to sell only these.

While the biggest hurdle to be leaped by cocktail units attempting to get into radio is that only the best can enter the magic portals, there are other obstacles too. Principal of these is the AFM rule which states that in large cities, where there are the most radio openings for musical units, certain requirements must be made before an act coming in from another town can be a member of the local where he wants to get on the air and that until he has a card in that local he can't play on radio programs (sustaining or commercial), for auditions or for the making of transcriptions.

### AFM "No-Work"

This rule says that a member of the AFM international coming into another town must do one of two things to get a card with the new local. (1) He must not work for 90 days at any musical job in the territory governed by the local. Then he must work for another 90 days. during this time paying 10 per cent of his salary (instead of the usual 4 per cent) to the local from which he is trying to get a card. (2) He can start working as soon as he gets in the town. But in this case he has to work for full year before he can get a card, and during the full year he has to give the union 10 per cent of his salary.

Most owners, bookers and agents are optimistic about the future of the cocktail lounge business.

A great deal of money has already been spent to decorate exteriors and interiors, and a great deal more will be spent. Operators are advertising more extensively than they ever have, and are buying more acts, and more expensive units.

All these are signs of the operator's belief in the healthy business ahead.



COCKTAIL lounge ops thruout the nation last year expressed the view that 1946 would be a banner year as far as grosses and profits were concerned thru a nationwide survey conducted by The Billboard, results of which were first published in last year's Encyclopedia of Music. The boys who tally the cash register figures after closing in the lounges are seeing their predictions come true, but they're meeting such biz-denting factors as drop-off in the lush G.I. trade, strikes and other community biz recessions with

some of the smartest planning that any facet of the amusèment industry has even been credited with.

### Easy Dollars Disappear

When lounge managers and owners answered The Billboard's queries concerning 1946 prospects during the summer last year, the war still made headlines, and tho V-J Day was imminent, the war dollars, both from civilian workers and the G.I. trade, were boosting lounge bank accounts to record highs. Ops were enjoying a field day,

just counting their shekels and doing very little to entice clientele thru the swinging doors, except maybe a little bickering with agents on what units to use which would strike the particular fancy of their regular customers. But with the war's end all the easy lounge dollars disappeared, and with the wave of returning vets, ops prepared for some major changes, altho for a large part

they did stick with their previously planned attack, making minor changes where necessary because of the drop in war worker and armed services' patronage.

patronage.

Whils ops have been making these revisions, bookers and the units and singles they rep, have been caught in the whirlpool of change. Tho percenters and their attractions admit it took a little time to regulate to

the swerving trends on the part of lounge hosts, all are on the ball now and making with ops' demands concerning salary changes for entertainers and new requirements in the type of work which cocktail musikers must present to draw the postwar patrons.

### Exit Officer Clubs

First change noted by ops and bookers was the disappearance of the n. c. o. and officers' clubs from army and navy bases when the demobilization started. These soldier and sailor clubs had been an important source of sale for the best in units and singles for bookers. Especially during the first six months of 1945 (the last six months of World War II) these clubs started to spend money lavishly from their clubs' overloaded coffers when members saw an end of the conflict in sight. As boys in khaki and blue didn't know exactly when the Jap surrender was coming, but knew it was nearing, their club treasurers decided to spend the money which had accrued in these clubs in the previous three years of existence. As a result plenty of the best units and singles picked up terrific salaries and a nice additional hunk of moo in tips while playing summer dates in these camp recreation clubs.

### Other Changes Evident

In plenty of instances the heavy outlay for talent made by these soon-to-fold base service clubs, cut heavily into neighboring lounge ops' grosses for their G.I. customers were sticking close to camp when the base n. c. o. clubhouse had entertainment that rivaled and often outdid the civilian bistros' fare. In many areas, such as thru the more westerly States of the Midwest, where B-29 bases packed the arid plains and the soldier-airmen's presence set up a false entertainment biz prosperity, plenty of cocktail ops' phones were busy giving bookers the word that they were dropping their entertainment policies completely, for with the war over, normal civilian trade from a city of 10,000 to 15,000 could never pay for the type of entertainment the op had used when nabe camps swelled the town's week-end population to perhaps 10 times that number when c.o.'s were generous with the passes.

The closing of the n. c. o. and officers' clubs caused several other changes in business for (1) with so many sources for talent closed, the law of supply and demand started to lean a little more in favor of the op and prices in certain regions, once heavy with military installations, went zooming down, and (2) plenty of the boys who acted as public relations officers or officers of the service clubs in camps got the management fever and decided to take their chance in putting the money they had saved in service into buying or leasing space for a cocktail lounge. Several national periodicals, such as Forbes and Nation's Business, running elaborate stories surveying the field of

(Continued from page 636) biz opportunities for ex-G.I.'s, stressed heavily the smaller amount of capital necessary for a former vet to get started in the cocktail field, where theaters, niteries and other facets of show biz required greater investments.

In plenty of areas return of G.I.'s and their assumption of the title of lounge op as their new post-war endeavor caused establishd ops to try their utmost to beat out new competitors, while the new vet op was also doing his darnedest to corral the townspeople into his new establishment. Especially in the larger cities a trend toward lounge size expansion was noted. This trend toward enlarging physical facilities, forecast in last year's Billboard Encyclopedia of Music, became a reality in many localities

as soon as ops could get the OPA and later the CPA to okay purchase of necessary materials and contracting firms. During the war, when they had to turn trade away from the doors because of inadequate seating capacities, ops had learned that the best way to corral trade was to provide the higher priced vaude type units, and the only way to pay salaries of these much-sought-after and higher priced entertainers was to do volume type biz, with chances being the more covers available on the busy week-end eves the more profits in the till for that week. All over the country ops reported increasing their drinking and eating facilities any-where from 15 to 200% and and making the new additions pay for themselves in the first four to six months of expanded operation.

### Outside Face-Lift: Too

While ops were putting more money into the insides of their drinkerles, they weren't forgetting about the outside of the lounge. In order to attract the transient trade or the city dweller out for an evening of fun with no definite goal in mind, lounge managers peeled off plenty of money to work over old fronts, buy new ones, fix lighting, provide more picture and shadow boxes for fronts and in general make their places more attractive to the passer-by. This trend toward fixing up fronts was very widespread for ops of established spots who were cramped during the war by supply edicts in attempting to fix up the outside of their bistros, and when supplies and labor became available there was a

mad rush to get the painter and electrician to work on a renovation of the lounge's front,

### Heavier Advertising


Together with their improvements upon the lounge itself, ops, as was noted also in the Encyclopedia of Music last year, became more promotion conscious. Besides trying to pull in biz thru fixing up fronts, ops in many cases hired promotion agencies to handle accounts, which included both advertising and publicity. More and more in the past year newspaper amusement sections have been pulling extra space from cocktail lounge advertisers all over the 48 States. In many metropolitan areas, where there are a number of night life publications, cocktail advertising is taking a larger percentage of its pages. In the case of Chicago dailles, two of the five local papers have included cocktail lounges in their advertising, where previously these spots were tabu on the salesmen's routes. These dailies made the changes, noting the fine type of entertainment available in these spots, and decided the upped talent budgets gave these ops as much right to advertise as major nitery owners. In other papers lounges have been able to get off the Saturday and Sunday restaurant pages and are now occupying space on the night club and theater pages.

### Act-Conscious Public

With rising operational costs, ops have still geared their entertainment policies which are just as high or higher than in wartime. Feeling on the part of the more progressive ops has been to go whole hog in every bit of their operation. If they are going to renovate fronts, expand facilities, up promotion costs, they must as a basis obtain the best and more higher priced musikers to work their lounges. Especially in the crowded lounge areas, where every other doorway is a lounge, ops have been using the best in vaude-type units realizing that the public is wow entertainment - conscious when they do their lounge choosing. While this trend toward the better units is most widespread in metropolitan areas, small city lounge owners are also getting hep to the better units and drawing bigger patronage with the more showmanlike and better musical aggregations. Plenty ops in smaller cities, which once depended upon military trade, have recouped civilian trade by offering a better type unit to the more discriminating customer, who doesn't have to wait for a week-end pass to enjoy himself.

### Vocal-Novelty Talent Wanted

While the majority of the better lounges even last year were peeling off extra dough for the 20% amusement tax that's applied when talent sings and uses the public-address system for announcements or provides music for dancing, an even larger percentage today want the vaude-type units and singles that have plenty of vo(Continued on page 640)



(Continued from page 638) cal and novelty talent within the group. Bookers thought that return of ex-cocktail lounge musikers from the armed forces would alleviate the wartime shortage in this type of entertainment, but there's no end to the shortage yet, and ops are forced to bid plenty to get the name units that make with the gags and songs.

### Disks Build Demand

Growth of many small record companies during the last year, which nationally mean little but in certain areas mean a great deal thru their limited but good distribution in that region, have caused customers to call heavily for certain recorded groups, and though prices are way up because many ops in this area are submitting their bids, boys are pulling out extra dough to get a unit that pleases their steady disk-listening trade.

Because certain agencies and independent bookers have a corner on certain types of such popular units, ops are more and more making exclusive booking contracts with percenters. While such an exclusive pact usually costs the op 10% for booking services rendered, the lounge managers who use the booking pacts point out that they are able to get first call on some of the top units and don't have to wrinkle their brows as hard about getting the cream of the crop when some booker is getting paid to bring the proper units and singles into their spots.

### Exclusives on the increase

With the additional 10% tagged onto purchase prices, bookers too are going all-out in their efforts to snag exclusives. for it not only means additional revenue but they can be more certain of obtaining work for their units when they have an op inked to their exclusive skedding of talent. As a result exclusives in cocktail lounge operation have proved manna for both the ops and bookers.

While there's been plenty of conjecture on whether or not the cocktail lounge biz will hold up under the ever-threatening biz drops envisioned by economic experts, ops and bookers alike are optimistic. Their logic is that the cocktail biz is still the least costly of all major entertainment industry segments. The nut involved is smallest, so the lounge is able to offer the payee more for his (Continued on page 646)

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
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

Even if biz does drop off heavily for the amusement industry, cocktail ops feel, and so do bookers, that they'll be the last to feel the pressure because when the boys who like their evenings out haven't got a 10 or 20 spot to cover the tab at a night club or theater, they'll still be able to walk over to the nabe lounge, have a couple of drinks and fork over a fiver to take care of the evening.

### Talent Rush To Continue!


Even tho ops have been putting plenty of their revenue back into their businesses since the war is over, they again feel they can expect normal business to hold up for several years yet. With the present-day norm still way over a regular peacetime norm, boys who operate behind the log insist that their profits will cover the investments they have been making.

The above signs indicate that the rush for top talent will go on for several years if ops' outlooks are correct. Boys who run the bars are today still haggling with bookers for the services of vaude-type units; even if they have to add the 20% to the customers' bill. Nothing has come from Capitol Hill in the past six months to indicate a veto of the amusement tax, and boys in lounge biz, both as operators and bookers, aren't too worried, for they've run almost three years with the tax on and they've been mighty lush days.

### Vaude Plus Music Pulls

Plenty of ops during the past year have gone into a modified Helsings' Vodvil Lounge policy, bringing in individual vaude acts to supplement their usual fare of vaude type musical units. All ops who have tried this deviation from standard type lounge operation judge it successful and a fine crowd getter. As a result cocktail bookers look for more and more call for vaude acts for lounge work and plenty of them are putting in act departments.

While the future is extremely unpredictable these days, boys in lounge trade, both from a percenters' and an ops' viewpoint, see good days ahead for the next year. Optimism is reflected from both small and large centers, and all feel that 1946 has been the toughest year as far as changes go, but has paved the way for several more good years to come.



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
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

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## PUBLISHER-WRITER RELATIONSH

L IKE employer-employee re-lationships in almost every other American industry, music publisher-writer business dealings seem to be undergoing a kind of revolutionary change. As this issue of music's Encyclopedia goes to press-certainly before it has served its full year of usefulness - the new standard agreement between the Music Publishers' Protective Association and the Songwriters' Protective Association will have been agreed

## **Proposals** Beyond Reason

As this is written, however, the negotiations are at a stalemate. The publishers felt that the cleffers' original set of proposals were so far beyond reason that they did not even form a basis for negotiations. Regardless of the eventual settlement of the agreement, the writers' proposals, and the attitude of the penners toward the early stages of the negotiations are significant. There is increasing resentment not only at what the writers claim is a stand-offish, condescending, arbitrary attitude on the part of the publishers, but even more (tho it may be subconscious) bitterness on the part of the writers over their own lack of real strength. It is this latter deep-rooted feeling which is responsible for the efforts of some key writers to attempt to affiliate with a bona-fide, strong labor group, whether CIO or AFL, whether

as a songwriters' union or as a group to be absorbed by another union such as the American Federation of Musicians.

## Publishers'

Farsighted publishers are admitting in private sessions that an improper approach toward writer relationships may eventually result in forcing the cleffers to find new means of strengthening their hands. A few publishers even go so far as to say they would be happy to accede to some of the writer demands considered exorbitant by the majority of publishers.

## No Additional

In these times of economic uncertainty, however, the publishers are wary of cutting the writer in for so heavy a share of the take that it will eventually hurt the publisher seriously. While music publishers have faced rising costs in every phase of their operations (as have virtually all industries), the publisher has been unable to work out price increases on his merchandise or find vast new markets for it (as have most other industries). Toward the end of 1946,

many publishers were considering raising the price of sheet music, but with sheet sales far from satisfactory they feared that an increase would cut volume even more. Also late in 1946, Broadcast Music, Inc., strongly indicated at a convention of the National Assoclation of Broadcasters in Chicago that they would hardly sit still for an increased fee to ASCAP in 1950. Record sales toward the last part of 1946 had begun to level off with not nearly as many tunes cut in the latter half of the year as in the previous six-month period.

## Sound Deal

A "Must"

There is much reason, then, for publishers to proceed with caution in working out a writer agreement which is likely to double or treble their payments to the tunes' authors. But on the other hand, the writers can hardly be expected to be sympathetic to a stance which seems to indicate a willingness on the publishers' part to cut up the jackpot with everyone but the guy who creates the song. There is no one in the music industry today who can accurately predict the course of writer-publisher relationships, nor the end to which the course will lead. Only one fact seems certain: A sound agreement for both sides must be reached if the music industry is to continue to prosper.

## THE COURSE OF A SMASH HIT SONG

## by John G. Peatman

THE value of a listening audience, as against simply a radio "plug." in the popularization of new songs received industry-wide recognition with the adoption last year of the Peatman weekly audience survey as the yardstick of radio exploitation. Radio audiences replaced plugs alone, and some of the payola evils of the industry were subsequently eradicated.

## Peatman's Audience Index of Impact Value

The Peatman Survey, described in last year's encyclopedia of Music, takes into account the difference in the impact value on radio audiences of a song heard by millions of listeners as against a song heard by only a few thousand. The advertiser measures the impact value of his radio commercials not in terms of the number of times it is plugged each week, but in terms of the size of the audiences hearing them—in terms of the program's Hooperatings. The Peatman Survey of popular music broadcast over the national networks lists each week the 50 songs which had the greatest radio audiences. The greater the number of listener-impressions a song has received the higher its ACI (Audience Coverage Index) in the Peatman Survey.

## The Peatman Rating and Hooperatings

The ACI is computed each week by the Peatman research organization for all songs that have had seven or more different program performances over the local outlets of the

Two charts accompany this article, both illustrating courses followed by two songs. Here's how "They Say It's Wonderful" developed.

It shows up first on the Peatman Audience Survey, showing radio listener impressions it has had. Then the disk jockeys voted it into The Billboard's "Records Most Played on the Air" chart. A week later it had made The Billboard's list of "Best Selling Sheet Music". Then it made The Billboard "Most Played Juke Box Records" list, and the same week that it made the juke list, it finally landed on the Hit Parade. Three weeks after that retail record purchasers bought it in enough numbers to enable it to crash The Billboard "Best Selling Retail Record" list.

The chart fully illustrating "They Say" appears on the following pages, as does another chart for "Oh, What It Seemed To Be."

four national networks in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles and other West Coast stations. A song receives one ACI point for roughly each 20.000 listening homes. The total number of listening homes for a program is estimated from its Hooperating and the potential audience total of the station or network over which the song is broadcast. If a broadcast goes out over a single station with an audience potential of 1.000.000 radio homes and the Hooperating of the program is 10.0, then the song has 10 per cent of 1.000.000, viz., 100.000, listening-home impressions.

## Same Hooper, Different ACI

In terms of the ACI of the Peatman Survey, these 100,000 listening-home impressions are equal to 5 ACI points, since the unit of the ACI yardstick is one ACI point per 20,000 listening homes. If, on the other hand, a song is broadcast over a network of stations with an audience potential of 10,000,000 radio homes, and the Hooperating of the program is again 10.0, then the song receives 1,000,000 listening-home impressions, or a total of 50 ACI points (since 1,000,000 divided by 20,000 equals 50). Thus, two programs with identical Hooperatings may have very different ACI, or audience, values because of the difference in the audience potentials of stations and of networks.

### Commercials and Sustainers

There are considerable varia; tions in audience potentials of both commercial and sustain-

ing programs. Two commercials may have identical Hooperatings, but one may be broadcast over a full national network and the other over only the originating station, or over a partial network of 20 or 30 stations. Most of the evening commercial programs with high Hooperatings are, however, broadcast over an entire national network. Sustaining programs, on the other hand, are rarely heard over an entire network. This is the case because each station affiliated with the network usually exercises the right to take or reject the sustainer being piped out from the originating station in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, or in some other city. Very often an affiliated station does not take a sustaining program because of its own desire to develop programs of its own or because its own radio time may be blocked out for a local commercial show.

There are thus differences in the ACI values of programs broadcasting music analogous to the difference between a full-course dinner and a tomato juice cocktail.

## Variations in ACI's on the Weekly Survey

The total ACI points of the 50 songs heard most each week over the nation's network and listed in the Peatman Surveys, range from as high as 3,000 or 4,000 points to only a couple of hundred. This range is greatest during the winter months of peak listening audiences. During Christmas week of 1945, for example. Berlin's White Christmas, with 118 different program performances, was the No. 1 song on the Peatman Survey with an ACI of 3,702, equivalent to about 75,000,000 listening-home impressions This was an average of about 31 ACI points per "plug." On the other hand. Paramount's To Each His Own had 111 different program performances for the survey week ending August 15, 1946. It was the No. 1 song on the survey, but its total ACI was 1,340 because of the usual summer slump in radio listening.

## The Familiarization of a Song

In order for a new song to become popular it has to become familiar to a large number of people. In the exploitation of a tune this process of familiarization is attained today thru radio and recordings, and in the case of show songs, thru motion pictures and the stage. All of these media may contribute to the familiarization of the song. Generally,

however, radio is the most rapid and effective medium for the popularization of a song. Radio is an ubiquitous messenger with the power to usher a new tune immediately into millions of homes under conditions of prestige and showmanship which are also effective in the popularization of a new song. "Bing sings it. Bing, therefore, must like it, and so do I."

## ACL Strictly Quantitative

The Peatman Surveys take directly into account the extent to which the radio networks are contributing to the familiarization of a song. This is the case since the ACI is directly related to the number of listener-impressions a song receives. The Peatman Surveys do not, on the other hand, attempt to evaluate the quality of the artist or orchestra performing a song. The ACI is a strictly quantitative measure of radio exploitation.

Most of the song hits of tomorrow are first heard over the air where the process of familiarization is rapid and can be effective under prestige conditions. The songs are not only heard by millions of people but they also have the additional importance of performance by well-known artists and orchestras. Even the Fibber McGee and Bob Hope do not The radio popularity of a song generally anticipates public demand for and sale of sheet music. Sometimes a song first becomes popular thru a recording that gets into the coin machines or thru a motion picture that is widely shown. But generally a song doesn't become a nation-wide hit and sells hundreds of thousands of copies of sheet music unless it is highly popular on the radio networks.

One of the biggest hits of the 1946 spring and summer seasons was They Say It's Wonderful, by Irving Berlin from Annie Get Your Gun. Beginning in May, this song held first, second or third position on Peatman Surveys for 15 consecutive weeks, being at the top eight The actual trend during the first 20 weeks it was on the Peatman Survey is portrayed in the accompanying chart. The trend line is based on the ACI rank the song had from week to week, the dates of which are given at the bottom of each chart. The actual ranks are shown in the scales at each side of the chart.

## On Peatman List First

The Say It's Wonderful first appeared on the Peatman Survey of April 11. and in 29th position. This was prior to the opening of the show Annie

Get Your Gun in New York City, which occurred on April 25. And on April 25 They Say made the "Top Fifteen" in the Peatman Survey, being in 11th posi-Then in only two more tion. weeks, May 9, it was the No. 1 song. As indicated on the chart, events which marked the nationwide development of this song as a big hit followed in close order. It showed up in The Billboard's list of Records Most-Played on Air for the first time for the week ending May, this song held first, second It turned up on The Billboard's list of Best-Selling Sheet Music for the first time the week ending May 17, being in 8th position. It then appeared for the first time in The Billboard's Most-Played Juke Box Records for the week ending May 24, in 15th position. And on Saturday night of May 25 it was broadcast for the first time on the Lucky Strike Hit Parade. Three weeks later, week ending June 14, They Say It's Wonderful turned up on The Billboard's list of Best-Selling Popular Records-in 9th position. On July 6 it had climbed to the No. 1 position on the Lucky Strike Hit Parade, having been continuously on this weekly broadcast of the nation's hit songs from the time of its first appearance there on May 25. By July 6 They Say had been in No. 1 position on the Peatman Survey six times and held the following positions in The Billboard lists:



The accompanying chart for They Say It's Wonderful does not give the actual ACI figures attained from week to week. but rather the rank of this song in the Peatman Survey from week to week. During these 20 weeks the total ACI points ranged from 408 to 2,092. They Say received a total of 25,656 ACI points over the 20-week period, equivalent to more than a half billion listenlnghome impressions.








## ASCAP and BMI The "Ancient Battle" Continues

IN HIS speech before the BMI session of the National Association of Broadcasters in Chicago in October, 1946, Sidney Kaye, BMI vice-president and general counsel, said that he had hoped not to find it necessary to revive ancient battles, and then proceeded to point out a number of strong dollar-and-cents reasons to the radiomen why BMI must be continued and made stronger. And while leaders of ASCAP and the radio-controlled licensing agency (like the good business men they are) will attempt to run their respective business as successfully as possible with as little energy wasted on "battles" as possible, the fact remains that the "battle" continues, and is likely to continue for a long time.

For the stronger BMI becomes, the greater threat does it become to the Society. And BMI has no intention whatsoever of becoming weaker. Kaye pointed out to the broadcasters, for instance, that while BMI had never asked stations to pay the full fee they could be asked to pay under the BMI license, it definitely intended to ask for the full fee in the future. The reason, as given by Kaye, was that during the period of excess profits, the radio-owned licensing organization could not keep enough of the money it took in to carry out any of the costly and important plans the organization had in mind. Kaye didn't say what those plans were, but fundamentally they must be aimed at making more and better music available to American radio stations than they have ever had before.

While no one disputes the obvious fact that ASCAP still controls the vast majority of America's greatest music, and conversely, that BMI in its six years of existence has not created even a fraction of music of comparable quality, it must be remembered that BMI was spending a good part of those six years "learning" the music business. Even the staunchest ASCAP supporters concede that BMI has learned a little in those six years. And while it is also true that practically ev-

ery important music publisher (Edward B. Marks excepted) is affiliated with ASCAP, as are practically all of the nation's greatest writers, contracts do have a way of expiring. And BMI, while watching those expiration dates, is unquestionably planning to get itself in a position whereby it may make some publishers and writers some quite attractive offers.

Obviously, BMI toppers are not talking about the how and why of their efforts to build bigger and better catalogs for the radio stations which pay their salaries, but industry observers insist that ASCAPublishers who sit back on their laurels and flatly state that it is impossible for BMI ever to build a real catalog are blinding themselves to reality.


The radio-controlled licensing agency will spring some of its new plans in the coming year... and ASCAP will be putting its best foot forward to make its music and services more indispensable than ever to the radio industry.

The next twelve months will see a number of the BMI plans put into operation. Before the next edition of the Encyclop of Music goes to press all the industry will know more about the effectiveness or lack of effectiveness of those plans. In the meantime, ASCAP natural-

ly will be seeking ways and means of tightening their hold on their writer-publisher members, and of servicing the radio industry with their overwhelming array of fine music in the most aggressive manner. In the meantime, the "ancient battle" continues.



T WAS generally accepted there would be an amount of somewhat uncomfortable adjustment in the immediate postwar period, and this has, to some extent, affected music business in Great Britain during 1946.

The public probably found the number of good tunes to sing and dance to as plentiful as ever, for it is in volume, sales of individual songs have fallen off, and not in degree of popularity. Maybe some of the reasons accounting for this condition are the same both sides of the Atlantic, but local observers feel the responsibility rests very much with the broadcasting authorities.

For the public has proved by its increasing interest in light and classical music that if good fare is presented to them intelligently and attractively, they are not slow in responding. The publishers specializing in standard music have little to complain of and those popular catalogs which include also a sprinkling of serious publications have found the sales of such music a pillar of supporting strength.

The trend toward locally written popular music in recent months which started last year has gained much momentum, and as many as five out of the first 10 top selling songs have been of British origin at one time. Of these,

## TUNE TAIL

Cruising Down the River, by unknown writers, was easily the biggest. Others high on the list of local products were Mary Lou, Primrose Hill, Let Bygones Be Bygones and There's a Harvest Moon Tonight. This year also saw the unusual development of a couple of hit U.S. songs which meant virtually nothing in America—Bless You and Kentucky.

Noteworthy, too, was the starting of some songs to popularity thru broadcasts of records. Down in the Valley, Into Each Life Some Rain Must Fall and Too Many Irons in the Fire all got their initial drive from this source, a strong indication of the powerful impetus to pop music business the appearance of "juke boxes" in this area will undoubtedly prove to be. Another potent factor has been the American Forces Network broadcasts from Radio Frankfurt. Some publishers found an unexplained demand for certain songs, and inquiries traced the interest to admirers tuning in from Great Britain on these Continental broadcasts. This should give considerable encouragement to the rather hesitant commercial radio program sponsors. If they can provide punchy modern programs, similar to those the American Network offers, they will not lack for listeners and customers.

A thoughtful, comprehensive picture of the music business in England today by one of Britain's industry leaders.

Film production has become a field offering real encouragement to new composers and authors in this part of the world, the amount of ambitious local productions in work being on a considerably larger scale than ever before. The J. Arthur Rank enterprises naturally play a large part in this scheme of things, altho curiously, the first big technicolor musical, London Town, featured a score by America's Johnny Burke and Jimmy Van Heusen. This is exceptional, of course, and there are a number of first-class writers busily engaged both on dramatic scores and film songs. Hans May, a resident in England since the early '30's, has distinguished himself with a group of good film scores, and other well-known writers' names that have graced the local screens are Eric Maschwitz, George Posford, Stanley Black, Richard (Warsaw Concerto)' Addinsel and Benjamin (Seventh Veil) Frankel. Our finest composers of classical music, too, are increasingly active in this medium.

The hoped-for developments in the field of record production have not progressed far as yet, for even the materials are less scarce, labor appears to be more so. The Decca Company has released one pop album to date, and for the most part, fans are still eagerly awaiting the anticipated flood of these luxuries. A few U. S. album sets have found their way into the country, the owners becoming objects of admiration mixed with envy.

Naturally, there has been much speculation as to when the output of the newly successful U.S. firms will become available in Great Britain. There have been the usual crops of rumors and reports. but to date only the smallest proportion of the profuse talent in the more important American catalogs is heard on records over here and as a result the old names are still the big popular favorites. The Dorseys, Miller, Shaw and Herman among bands, while Bing and Frankie have it all to themselves as vocalists, Perry Como having had only a couple of titles released to date.

To summarize the situation, music business in Great Britain has arrived at a point where wartime boom conditions have slowed up, while post-war developments have yet to get started. There are plenty impatient to see this come about, however, and its advent will be the signal for the entry of the publishing industry into an era of really Big Business.

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# BRITAIN'S MUSIC NEMESIS

The managing director of the Peter Maurice group of English music firms (World Wide, MacMelodies, Leeds, Ltd.) lashes out at the broadcasting system which is throttling the development of popular music in the British Isles.

Y E HAD a recent murder proved the songwriting spark in which the victim faded away over a long period of time. When they finally nabbed the culprit they discovered he had been feeding his lost love poison in such delicate doses that she herself scarcely knew that she was slowly but surely slipping right off this world of woe into eternity. I regret to say that popular music in England is in the sad position of the lamented lady in the murder case above. It is being killed, slowly it is true, but just as surely. We all know the villain in the piece, the British Broadcasting Company, but so insidious is the campaign and so artfully conducted that the public which stands to lose most by what is happening can't imagine what might be wrong. If things go on as at present I'm afraid there will be scarcely a tear when popular music stages its final collapseon a bier of sheet music of the hits that might have been.

(That is, except from such loyal mourners as the publishers and writers on both sides of the Atlantic and the continent who stand to lose businesses and royalties.)

It's not easy for me to write this because I have always been intensely nationalistic on the prowess of the British songwriter. There are few publishers who have fought and struggled to produce homegrown hits as hard as I have. This glorious island pioneered the popular song, yes, long before Stephen Foster or his predecessors. The Girl I Left Behind Me was a "hit" in every sense of the word even to being plugged more than 150 years ago. But centuries before that there were folk tunes which, with very little modernization, can defy detection from the best current product of Tin Pan Alley.

And I think that I and several other British publishers can truthfully claim that we

case in this ancient island was still in our people-to an extent. But just when we most need help to keep alive and nurse this ember into the bright flame it should be we not only get no aid at all from the only medium which can succor us (the B. B. C.) but we find an extraordinary effort underway to quench the spark. If there is no outlet, there will be no songs written. This is elemental, simple, fundamental -so true its practically a cliche. But the music business cries on deaf ears for help.

> When I left for an American trip last summer the trend toward the dire condition I have mentioned was evident but none of us dreamed it would ever work so far, along to its logical - and desperate - conclusion. The war was only just over and all through it we had seen what songs could do to inspire the fighting man to help the workers in the factories, to solace the home front. No one argued about the power of the popular song (that's a phrase I want to come back to) during the war. Yet suddenly we are being informed that the people do not want popular music.

> Don't want popular music, indeed! Since when have the people of the free world forgotten how to sing? For all our legendary reserve what British audience will not rise to a song? It was not a lyric writer who wrote: "Two with a new songs measure can trample an Empire down!"

> That brings me back to the "power" of a song. It was the most striking difference I noted between music biz here and in the United States. In that lucky land everybody gives a song the value it deserves. Over here. . . Well, take an imaginary hit and let's see what happens. In the United States radio companies, recording companies, band leaders, artistes, etc., etc., would be fighting for performance. Both the artistes

and the bands know a good song can make them professionally. Columnists mention the tune, the writers of the song may even be interviewed or get other journalistic notice of their efforts Sponsors ask their producers to include the number in the show, etc, etc. . . but why keep torturing

Now let's assume the number is British. First it must be submitted to the BBC "slush" committee which decides whether the lyric is not overly sentimental and whether the tune is suitable. Then there is the question-I mean problem — of getting the song played. Gradually the B. B. C. has been working popular music programs off the air so that even if the song were spotted in every show it would hardly get the kind of plug needed to fix it into the memory of the public. BUT-it can't be fixed that way. Some of our best variety shows have a rule that a song may be done only ONCE during the ENTIRE series (say 13 weeks). Thus if our imaginary song is fixed in such a top show as "Stand Easy" it cannot again appear on that show. That cuts 13 weeks or more of the best time right out. Ditto for the other big shows.

Then it can appear only with stated infrequency in the dance band shows. These are deliberately spotted at minimum listening hours (11 p.m. to midnight, for example) because the BBC insists its research departments poll shows popular music way down on the list of what the people want. About that poll: I'm afraid that the listener research department is right when it claims pop music is declining in popularitybut it neglects to lay the blame where it belongs namely on the frigid doorstep of the BBC which has rarely done anything as well it has engineered the slow death of our business.

The question of why the BBC is doing this naturally

arises but there I am at somewhat of a loss. Maybe band shows are too expensive-the BBC must get along on the \$4 a year license paid by about 10,000,000 set owners. On the face of it, it does seem to be cheaper to play a few old records, or have someone read some scraps of poetry or pipe in provincial comics irreverently disinterring gags long since laid to eternal rest everywhere else in the world. That does seem cheaper-and yet is it? We British are presently taking a shellacking (as you Americans say) in international sports. It does seem a pity to have to take it also in a field where on a proportional basis we are perfectly capable of holding our own.

Maybe too the BBC forgets. Pop songs have helped to change the mentality of a nation for example, Who's Afraid of the Big Bad Wolf? How about my firm's We'll Hang Out the Washing on the Siegfried Line? Not many people know that this song was so troublesome to the Nazis that they had a recording made and played in all occupied countries (which I preserve) in which four apparently British voices sing the song and are horribly blotted out by the crash of machine gun fire. After which a German youth choir sang a parody deriding the original. How about Lili Marlene? German? Sure it was. But so deep, so ingrained is the will to sing that when our gallant Eighth Army had no song of its own they promptly took it from the enemy. And considered it a rightful conquest.

I think the moral there is that if we British don't give our own people songs to sing they will pick them up elsewhere-American Forces Network, to mention only one, and the commercial stations which soon will start again in Luxembourg, Athlone, Normandie, etc.

Popular songs have made an

entire nation happy, they've made great stars and great shows. Lambeth Walk springing out of the show Me and My Girl not only threw the show into the big hit class by its own lilt but was sung all over the world, including the Chinese. But this is all primer school stuff to you and I know I don't have to rehearse it. Only to add that everything we know is true about the business is being forgotten or pushed aside here.

It's sad . . . very sad. When The Billboard asked me to do a piece for the number way back I thought I would compose something gay. I never thought it would be a dirge. But the warning is clear and its there for all to see including the American and continental firms who have profited from England's love of song.

There'll always be an England (I guess the BBC's forgotten how much that title meant

to us during the war), but will it sing? If it weren't that a lot of us love the business the way we do the answer might be no. But I know that we will go on fighting and somehow I susspect that we will muddle thru (England always does) and produce the hits you fellows over there have come to expect from us. But I can't help envying you lads sometimes—imagine a utopia where radio stations actually like to play popular music. Amazing!

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
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

The chart for They Say It's Wonderful is based on the rank of its ACI for each week over a period of nearly five months. The actual ACI trend for this song is unusually smooth; that is to say, it quickly reached first position on May 9 and maintained first or second position until the end of August. A somewhat more irregular ACI trend is presented by the second chart for Oh! What It Seemed To Be, which was as big a hit during the first of this year as They Say It's Wonderful was during the summer months. Two trend lines are shown on the chart for Oh! Shown on the chart for Oh! What It. Seemed To Be (published by Santly-Joy). The broken trend line represents the ACI rank from week to week. It will be observed this fluctuated somewhat, particularly leave to the chart for the chart of larly late in January and again in May. A better index of its basic popularity trend is revealed by the solid line graph on the chart which is the ATI (Audience Trend Index) of this song from week to week. ATI is based on a moving average of a song's ACI for three successive weeks, including the ACI figure of the current week. It is for this reason that the ATI trend line does not begin until the weelr ending January 24, this being the third successive week that Oh! What It Seems To Be was on the Peatman Survey.

Oh! What It Seemed To Be Oh! What It Seemed To Be first appeared on the Peatman Survey, in 49th position, for the week ending January 10. Three weeks later, on January 31, it first appeared in The Billboard's list of Most-Played Juke Box Records (11th position). A week later, on February 7, it first appeared on The ary 7, it first appeared on The Billboard's list of Records Most-Played on the Air (10th position). The week ending February 14, exactly six weeks from the time Oh! What It Seemed To Be first appeared on the Peatman Survey, this song appeared among the "Top Fifteen" in this survey (10th position); it appeared for the first

time on The Billboard's list of Best-Selling Sheet Music (7th position); it appeared for the first time in The Billboard's list of the Best-Selling Retail Records (8th position), and on the evening of February 16 Oh! What It Seemed To Be had it's first broadcast on the Lucky Strike Hit Parade (in 8th position). A month (in 8th position). A month later, on March 14, this song was No. 1 on the Peatman Survey and two nights later, on March 16, it was No. 1 on the Lucky Strike Hit Parade.

As indicated by the ATI graph on the chart, Oh! What It Seemed To Be was in No. 1 position in Audience Trend in the Peatman Survey for five successive weeks. March 21 thru April 18. It was No. 1 on the Lucky Strike *Hit Parade* for eight successive weeks thru May 4. By the end of April Oh! What It Seemed To Be held the following positions in The Billboard's music popularity charts:

During the period of nearly six months that Oh! What It Seemed To Be was on the Peatman Survey, the ACI figures varied from a low of 222 on its opening week of January 10, to a high of 2,618 for the week ending March 21. The total number of ACI points which this song received over this period was 28,484, again, as in the case of They Say It's Won-derful, equivalent to more than a half a billion listening-home impressions.

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
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
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
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


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









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


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







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














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
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
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

ASCAP is not a trade union or a trade association. It is not connected with the American Federation of Musicians. It does not publish or buy or sell music, records, transcrip-tions or any other physical property. ASCAP is America's pioneer and foremost performing right society.





A contract with the late ARA diskery helped spread the group's ability around until they wound up with their own radio show on the ABC network. Their Saipan disk release is still drawling the project of the statement of the stateme drawing the praise of customers in the record shops.

Cavanaugh started his musickings in high school, abandoned them for a short spell in college and finally went back to his first love. In 1939 he went with Ray Steel-well's ork as featured vocalist and pianist and stayed with Steelwell until Bobby Sherwood, who was forming his own band at that time, offered him the 88 spot. From Sherwood to the army was the next step, but Cavanaugh used his GI time usefully by forming his own three-piece combo. It is this same bunch—after dis-charge—which is coming up fast today.

Leonard Jacobson, director of the concert division, introduced the prominent "Fun With Mu-sic" concerts. Also helped familiarize audiences with native folk culture of national minorities thru the medium of international variety concerts.

Among International's projects for '47 are a revue, another concert of the American Ballad Singers and the introduction of several new personalities at Town Hall concerts.

Nobody summed it up better than Carl Sandburg, the poet, when he called Burl Ives the "mightiest ballad singer of any century." For no previous purveyor of authentic American ballads - catalogued in Ives prodigious memory are over 200 of these—ever attained the national success, commercially and artistically, of this famed radio, record and screen performer.

Born in 1909, in Hunt Township, Illinois, Burl Ives took his Midwestern schooling like any ordinary home lover. College, however, was too much of a bore to a natural troubadour and before long his guitar and and he were wandering over the countryside. Thousands of miles were worn into his foot-soles when he settled down in Terre Haute, Ind., for a twoyear airing over the local radio outlet. Then came the wan-dering itch and off Ives went.

Eventually he came to New York where he found his first professional experience in theater playing straight character roles in such shows as Ah, wilderness; Flight; I Married an Angel and others. In none of these did he sing. It wasn't until 1940 that his ballad voice got its proper share of the limelight on a national broadcast. Progressing to a CBS sustainer, Ives won his now famous label as "the wayfaring stranger." Success and national reputation drifted in easily. Sixteen weeks at Cafe

In 1942 a guy who loved to ring washbells and toot auto horns b-b-r-racked right in Der Fuehrer's Face and split the gut of the nation. Folks all over the country talked it up big—"Who are these City Slickers? They're great, we want more"—and they formed patient queues before retail record counters, hoping to get a copy of such imperishable satire.

All the tumult was caused All the tumuit was caused by one Spike Jones, who started his City Slickers band as a hobby and watched it grow into so great an institution that lately RCA Victor has seen fit to commemorate Spike Jones Music Depreciation Week. And that about describes Spike's talentsknows how to rip into standard favorites, such as Chloe, That Old Black Magic, Siam, and depreciate them—something awful al-ways happens to the melody, but the audience effect is inevitably convulsive.

The City Slickers play all known instruments and constantly devise new ones. A 10-man group, they dabble in orchestral curiosa that would have Stokowski's hair turning black over-night. Washboards, cowbells, bottles, flit guns, auto horns, doorbells — Spike's boys use them all and the weird cacophony they produce ties up the fans like a threshing machine.

Spike started off like so many other maestri-he led his own ork in school. From this he graduated to littleknown drum spots on top radio shows, including Burns and Allen, Eddie Cantor and John Scott Trotter. In '42 he formed his own group with the idea of playing novelty stuff just for kicks, figuring to earn more laughs than money. But was he ing to earn more laughs than money. But was he surprised! First the outfit won an RCA Victor contract. Then off the presses came Barstool Cowboy; Clink, Clink, Another Drunk; Pass the Biscuits, Mirandi; Siam and Der Fuehrer's Face. The last side did it—within 48 hours side did it-within 48 hours Spike was signed by Warner Brothers to appear in Thank Your Lucky Stars. This was followed by MGM's Meet the People.

In the past year Spike has been heard prominently over the Chase & Sanborn show, Kraft Music Hall and Endorsed by Dorsey. He has appeared in two major films, Paramount's Bring On the Girls and RKO's Breakfast in Hollywood, and has broken the back of every vaude record set for the Strand Theater, New York. Managed by GAC, personal rep is Beau Lee.

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



One of the songwriting elite, Jimmy McHugh began his music career as an office boy for the Boston Opera House. Longhair was the wrong hair, however, and in short order he transferred to Irving Berlin where he stayed for a while as staff pianist. In 1921 he shifted to New York and settled down to write the historic Cotton Club shows. This lasted eight years and then Jimmy plunged into the music biz for real. First he became a partner in Mills Music publishing enterprises, then in 1928 he teamed up with Dorothy Fields. gether the talented pair turned out the music for The Black-birds of 1928, Ziegfeld Midnight Roof Show, International Re-vue and Hello, Daddy. In 1930 the Fields-McHugh combina-tion answered MGM's call, the Fields-Merringh combina-tion answered MGM's call, dashed out to Hollywood and remained for five years while writing the famous Cuban Love Song, My Dancing Lady and others. Then it was back to Broadway for McHugh where he authored Singing the Blues, Palais Royale Revue and Riviera Revue. Introducing Phil Harris and his band to Broadway, Jimmy started them off with the hit song Thank You For a Lovely Evening. Finally, he returned to Hollywood. Some of his best known song hits include Don't Blame Me, I'm in the Mood for Love, I Can't Give You Anything But Love, Baby; Lovely to Look At and a zillion others.

A very respectable citizen is James McHugh! Known as the "Mayor of Beverly Hills," he belongs to the Rotarians, sits on the Chamber of Commerce exec board, is enrolled in the Philharmonic Orchestra Asso-ciation of Los Angeles and holds a lifetime card with the Amateur Athletic Union. Also dabbles in fine art as a hobby. One of ASCAP's bigwigs. McHugh goes right on turning out new pop hits every year.







Soon, she added another radio commercial on NBC, making her, at the time, the only songstress with two sponsored weekly programs. In 1940 she was voted the outstanding new radio star by over 600 radio editors and every year since has won one or more similar polls con-ducted thruout the coun-try. Married to movie star George Montgomery, Dinah spends most of her time in Hollywood where her active cinema and radio com-mitments keep her estab-lished as First Lady of the music world.

For an original and animated program of the peak in pianistics, Step Wharton's brand of jive, sweet, classical 88-ing is bound to hit the spot. Wharton's particular blend of black and white ivories is appealing, for he works up all his own library. 

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
