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More About Lord Russell

• A propos the comment by R. A. Nolan, who would keep Bertrand Russell off the air because he (Russell) thinks and believes otherwise than the possible majority: If "as a publicly-owned company you have an inescapable duty to safeguard the morals of your employers" then by analogy children have the same duty to their parents, and pupils to their teachers!  According to a letter in your issue for Feb. 8-14, unsophisticated faith is vulnerable to the attacks of Bertrand Russell, therefore our moral interests ought to be safeguarded against him. This attitude, generally accepted by official Canada, tends to drive anti-religious feeling underground, so that we find science and philosophy and other subjects presented with a subtle bias against traditional beliefs. We might reasonably insist that a speaker declare himself plainly if he is unable to avoid prejudice, but how can we demand this if at the same time we forbid the open profession of unbelief? We need a return to the medieval tradition that if an opinion is permissible at all it must be open to vigorous debate. Why is it that we can take sides on secondary questions, yet basic controversies about God and man and immortality are more often avoided or hushed up? We may justly attack Bertrand Russell for opinions that are specious and inconsistent and unfair, but let us not condemn him for speaking plainly where others are timorous or dishonest. Any faith, believing or unbelieving, that has to avoid open debate had better take stock of itself .- John Ross, Strasbourg, Sask.

• Anton Chekhov wrote a moving story some 70 years ago about the deterioration of a man's spirit. In doing so he anticipated with uncanny accuracy a present-day philosophical f ad - Existentialism. Chekhov, of course, did not believe he was living in a purposeless world, as a study of his work will show. But he saw the danger in such a belief and wrote Ward No. 6 to prove his point.

Mac Shoub's adaptation of this long (nearly 25,000-word) short story had little similarity with the original. The locale was the same, all the characters were there, and even the storyline was followed. What then was wrong? The characterization - sweepingly, completely, comprehensively, entirely wrong. There is little of plot and incident in Chekhov's work. For h im character dilineation is action. Consequently his theatre is more passive than active. Any attempt to condense a 25,000-word story into a 58minute play poses problems of some magnitude and I doubt it can be done properly.

Arthur Miller's Death of a Salesman some weeks ago on Folio is a good example of what I mean. As I remember, this play was presented in a two-hour production. And presented superbly. To watch the gentle but noxious disintegration of Willie Loman's character was at once moving and exciting.

But watching the negativist Dr. Andrey Ragin dismiss the harsh realities of life as illusions and irrelevancies was to watch a robot, not a man. The acting of Mavor Moore as Dr. Ragin was competent with the limits set by adapter Shoub. But the limits were too narrow to permit an understandable and finely-drawn Dr. Ragin as Chekhov intended. Jack Klugman, as the persecuted maldepressive who in his saner moments has a lively intelligence and a healthy zest for life, seemed unable to bridge the normalabnormal stages realistically. However, the production by Harvey Hart was excellent . . .-W. G. Clarke, Calgary.

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OUR COVER

George Murray

Our cover personality this week is versatile singer-actor George Murray, recently returned from Hollywood to emcee CBC-TV's new Talent Caravan.

Winnipeg-born Murray is known mainly as a singer; yet thousands of ardent followers of the eastern CBC farm broadcast family, *The Craigs*, mourned when he left for the U.S. and his part in the daytime serial was given to another actor.

Talent Caravan is telecast Friday evenings from various centres across the country. Local TV stations announce two or three weeks in advance how viewers can get on the show, and invite those who are interested to write in to the station for application forms. The applications are passed to producer Drew Crossan who acknowledges all letters and auditions the successful applicants. From these auditions he chooses five contestants for the show. On Feb. 27 the show will be aired from Winnipeg. On March 6 the crew heads east again, to Ottawa. The province of Quebee will be the scene of two shows next month with the March 13 edition coming from Montreal and a March 20 date in Quebec City. There will be no show on March 27, Good Friday.

On the February 27 show from Winnipeg the competitors will be the Neville Sisters, vocalists; Aubrey Tadman, vocalist; Bob Erlendson, vibraphone player; Georgi Pruden, vocalist; and Ray St. Germain, vocalist and guitarist.

Preparing Film for Television

Second article in a series by GRACE BROWN, film director, CBC Winnipeg

I had the honour of preparing the first syndicated film for presentation on CBWT. There was no time to screen the film, and there were no commercials to be "cut in," simply a fill added to the end of the program. Imagine my horror while sitting at home enjoying the play to find it interrupted by a five-second item which said PLACE COMMERCIAL HERE-three times in that half hour!

I died a thousand deaths on that occasion. But in the past five years we have gained a lot of experience and blunders like that one seldom happen.

The above example is given by way of introduction to this week's article in which I promised to answer the question we are so frequently asked: "What do you have to do to put a film on the air?" I think I have already shown one of the things we have to do!

Handling a "Kine"

Now, to get down to business, let's consider the easiest type of film first -a kine (kinescope recording) of a sustaining program.

Since this is an exact reproduction of a live program, we are reasonably certain it will run to the proper time. All films received through our television Film Service in Toronto are accompanied by a "cue sheet." This tells the film editor the title, the particular episode (if it is a series), the length of the film, and information as to its condition when it left Toronto. Most films arrive in a can, with a taped identification on the outside of the can.

When the film is delivered to the library, the film librarian records its arrival, makes up a card showing all details, and checks her program schedule or her shipping advice orders to learn what she is to do with the film. She also checks the schedule for the entire network, and from this makes up lists of titles channelled through CBWT by television station and by date. As CBWT acts as a part of the Television Film Service, films shown on certain private stations are shipped to us to be checked and shipped to the next private station. The microwave network extension has cut down on this to a certain degree, but the longer television day and the addition of new stations not connected by microwave still make for a great deal of handling of film by CBWT.

But, to get back to our editor and his kine. The kine is put in a film rack for checking, the editor checks the identification on the can against that on the film itself, puts the reel of film on a rewind and runs it through a footage counter. to make sure it is the correct length -1059 feet-29 minutes 25 seconds. At the same time, the editor checks the film for scratches, torn sprocket holes, and any irregularities. When he is satisfied the film is in good condition he rewinds the film, cleaning it with a liquid film cleaner and a soft lintless cloth, and checks off the cue sheet. If the film is to be televised on CBWT the editor removes the original "leader" and replaces this with a 25-second CBWT station break then makes up a new "cue sheet," showing the exact time the film goes on the air. Six copies of this cue sheet are typed, one for the files, one for the co-ordinating producer, one for the video operator, one for the telecine operator, one for the audio operator and one for the announcer.

As I mentioned, kines are the simplest films to prepare for the air. The next easiest are the complete commercial programs, which have to be checked, just as a *kine* is checked, but in these the exact time of the commercials must also be checked against the "cue sheet."

Syndicated Films

Next we have the syndicated film into which commercials are edited. For the most part, the editor screens the film, marking with paper the places where he can cut in the commercials. Sometimes these programs are too long, and a little judicial editing is required. Sometimes they are too short and a fill must be added. For, no matter what, a program must start exactly at the top of the clock, on the hour, quarter or half hour as the schedule indicates, and must end 25 seconds after the 14, 29 or 59 minutes mark. In other words, a film program must measure 519 feet for a quarter hour program, 1059 feet for a half hour and 2139 for the full hour program.

Feature Films

Of the ready-made programs the most difficult to prepare is the feature film. Most of these were made with no thought to television. They run various lengths and rarely have good spots where the editor can cut in a commercial. I realize that you may dislike certain commercials, but, don't forget, every time you see a commercial on CBWT, it means your television is costing you less as a taxpayer. The sponsor has helped. As a rule, we do not cut feature films at CBWT unless they have to be fitted into a certain time period. Only an experienced film editor can cut a feature as it must be done tastefully and so well that the viewer is not aware of the cuts. Occasionally, we have to shorten the Saturday Horse Opera and even this presents many problems to the editor. So we prefer to televize your features in their entirety.

News Film

Editing news is a different proposition. We receive certain news items from various sources such as Canadian Press, British United Press, and other syndicated television news agencies. The balance is made up of voiced commentary on camera and local film items. A cameraman, in order to cover an event properly, might have to shoot 200 feet of film. This film is processed, printed, and then screened with the news and film editors in attendance. The news editor knows the story he wants to tell and the film editor selects the sequences which will tell that story best. The length of the item depends on its news value, on the number of items to be included in the news, and the length of time alloted to the entire newscast. The line-up editor advises the film editor how long a time he has for each story and the editor cuts the original footage to that time. Then the news editor measures each shot in the cut story and converts the footage to seconds and the news editor writes his commentary to fit each shot. He bases his script on 21/2 words per second, which allows the announcer proper breathing time. Three seconds before the end of each film item a small piece of tape is placed on the film to "cue" the producer to instruct the switcher to turn on the television camera in three seconds so the announcer will appear on your television screen at exactly the right moment.

Once the entire news package is lined up, the script assistant selects appropriate music, where required, and studies the items so she will be familiar with them. The announcer, producer, news editor, film editor, and script assistant screen the film package and the announcer runs through his script two or three times before going on the air.

The news editor, who is off camera, cues the announcer by means of a small light which flashes on the announcer's desk, so Page Five

he will know exactly when to read his script. With rush news, the announcer sometimes has to go on air with no rehearsal whatever.

Original Film

Original film forms part of live programs. For instance, if it is not practical or economical to set up live television cameras in remote locations or in private homes, a film camera is used. Then too, a film camera can be taken into many places where it would be impossible to take a large television camera. Film is used to good advantage on such live Winnipeg programs as The Mary Liz Show, Spotlight, How About That? Country Calendar, and The Warren Davis Show. And often that rain you see on a musical program is on film and is superimposed over the studio picture. Effective, isn't it?

In the next few months, you will see three *Country Calendar* programs done completely on film, one from each of the prairie provinces. Watch for these and let us know what you think of them.

The production of a complete film such as *City in White*, requires a lot of work and technical skill to bring it to your television screen. First, someone comes up with an idea for a film, then expands that idea into a story outline or "treatment." If this is approved by the Program Department, a complete shooting script is prepared.

This script is made up of several parts with the numbered camera shots, the lens to be used, the length of scene and the action described on left side of the paper and the proposed commentary or sound on the right side.

When the entire shooting script is ready, the director-producer and production assistant arrange for locations, actors, cameramen, lighting and sound technicians and all equipment. He then breaks down his script so that all sequences at one location can be shot together. If there is to be sound on film (synchronized sound), this is planned so that the sound equipment and technicians are required for a minimum number of days. By pre-planning locations and sound sequences, much time is saved and casts are kept to a minimum. The film taken each day is put into the laboratory at the end of the day, is developed and a print taken off so that the film crew can see the results of their day's work as soon as possible and know if any re-shooting has to be done or any equipment adjusted.

Tuesday on "Folio"

"The Master of Santiage"

A man strips himself of his worldly goods and retires into seclusion from a world he believes to be hopelessly corrupt. His transition from a fearless soldier in the service of Spain, to the life of a puritanical recluse, is the story of Don Alvare, The Master of Santiage.

Adapted for television by playwright Mavor Moore, from a play by the French writer Henri de Montherlant, The Master of Santiage will be televised on Folio March 3.

The play takes place in Spain in 1519, an era which Moore describes as "a time in history when

knighthood and chivalry were on the decline, being replaced by a spirit of adventure prompted by the discovery of America." "A great deal of work was required," Moore, "to convert the says French into something that could be said gracefully in English, without making it a history lesson."

Never one to back away from a fight, Lindsay came into the NHL 15 years ago as a cocky rookie eager to prove he couldn't be pushed around. Since then he has spent over 30 hours in penalty boxes, had a shoulder, instep and hand broken in separate incidents, and on the side established himself as the greatest left winger in hockey history. He is one of four members of hockey's select "300" club of great goal scorers, rating behind only Maurice Richard and Gordie Howe and slightly ahead of Nels Stewart.

In eight of his thirteen seasons with Detroit, Lindsay was chosen as left-winger on the first string all-



"We listen to others to discover what we ourselves believe." These are George Grant's words towards the end of this one-hour program presenting the views of eight distinguished Canadians on the most profound problems which have faced man since the beginning of time. To listen to others on matters of belief helps us in our own thinking, and in our own believing. This is the underlying purpose of the program.

Perhaps it is most useful to say first what this program is not. It is not an anthology of "credos." It does not contain a single speech which was prepared beforehand for delivery on an important occasion. It is rather a mosaic of edited conversations, filmed separately with our eight participants, in their homes or offices some weeks ago, in relaxed atmospheres in the spirit of casual, though serious, after-dinner conversations. This gives the whole program an informal character, far removed from the more carefully staged pose people so frequently assume when

common theme which was then worked into the final section: the theme that, whether your attitudes are dictated by religious or by secular considerations, the need we all have for each other - the theme of brotherly love-emerged as a major element in each of the conversations.

The decision to invite only "lay" people, not professional thinkers on matters of belief, was made first. The qualifications we were looking for were above all a high degree of thoughtfulness, of seriousness about serious matters, and the ability to express oneself with eloquence about subjects on which so many of us suffer from inhibitions.

We also expressed a preference for men and women of "distinction," people who have accomplished something in their lives, and whose accomplishments were the result, in some way or other, of their fundamental beliefs.

During the eight long filming sessions Allan Wargon was greatly helped by George Grant, who as a philosophical questioner followed the Socratic tradition, so that a great deal depended on the skill and charm with which he asked his often very personal questions. Whatever resistance there might have been to him was very quickly dissipated, since he is one of the most charmingly relaxing philosophers in Canada today.

As soon as enough film has been shot for the editor to start work, he takes his copy of the shooting script and, using it as a guide, assembles the film in the required sequences. He selects the best shots (or "takes," as they are known in film production) and carefully sets aside all the "outs" for possible use in that production or for use as stock shot material. When all the footage has been assembled in the proper sequence, it is spliced and screened. This is known as a "rough cut." Under the guidance of the producer, the film editor works on his rough cut, tak-

ing out bits here, adding a sequence there, shortening another, lengthening some, until he has the film cut to his and the producer's satisfaction. A good film editor (such as those we like to think we have at CBWT) can make a good film out of most film footage. When you have a team of a good producer, good cameramen and a creative film editor, your resulting film is generally an interesting and well-made production.

Adding Sound

When the "fine cut" is complete, the film editor has to match the negative to the edited print. He does this by matching the edge numbers, which appear on both the

print and the negative. If there are "sync" sound sequences, the magnetic film on which the sound has been recorded, must also be matched to the picture so the finished product will be in "lip sync." This is done on a specially constructed piece of equipment known as a Moviola.

At CBWT we make a kinescope recording of the fine cut print so that while the editor is matching his print, the production assistant and producer can be arranging for the music, which might be from discs or might be especially written to suit the actions and moods of the film. This kine is also used for selecting the sound effects to match the action. Some of these may have been recorded during the actual filming and some may be selected from our sound effects library.

As a rule, the music and sound effects are recorded on a special magnetic film track. Sometimes any synchronized voice is recorded at the same time. When the commentary has been written, the titles shot and cut into the print and the negative, we are ready for our "final mix." In large production centres, many sound channels are used in this final mix. There might be one for synchronized voice, one for sound effects, one for music and a fourth for the commentator. With stereophonic sound, many more are required, of course. But for our less complex type of production, it is our custom to use only the magnetic film with the music and sound effects and have this "mixed" onto the sound track which is recording the voice of the commentator.

The film editor then matches the sound track to the cut picture negative, cleans the negative very carefully and sends the negative and sound track to the laboratory where it is printed. A trial print is taken off first and when it is approved, the required number of prints are made up for distribution to the TV network.



Front Page Challenge-'Phony' or 'Fascinating'?

Front Page Challenge is, I think, one of the most sterile, phony programs on Canadian TV -a hodge-podge which mixes a coy guessing game with celebrities. warmed-over news, and brief pseudo-journalistic interviews that mock the name "Front Page." Yet viewers from coast to coast consider all this sufficiently diverting to rate the show No. 1. Decorative Miss Robins plays her pretty-girl role with perfect naivete; Mr. Sinclair is like a gruff but friendly bear, and Mr. Berton is boyish and bright. The trouble is, the talents of our favourite panelists and their friends are overwhelmed by one of the most pretentious formats in the annals of panels. Real newsmen, such as Pierre Berton, must shudder inwardly at the shallow, brief question period after the jolly game. At the beginning of the year Fred Davis promised viewers "bigger and better challenges." I couldn't help but wish the talented people of this show would stop playing games and meet the challenge of the TV medium. Now we come to a show that substitutes sense for celebrities-and succeeds: Fighting Words . . . Jan. 25 on "Critically Speaking."

For Women

Peace River Country On CBC Stage

A two-part adaptation of Ralph Allen's novel, Peace River Country will be presented on CBC Stage February 22 and March 1 (10:00 p.m. on CBW, CBK and CBX).

The story concerns a family which travels to the Peace River country in Alberta, a place which for them is a Canadian "promised land." The family is presided over by a hopeless – but harmless – drunkard. His wife, played by Jan Campbell, takes their children, a boy and a girl, away from their father to give them "a decent chance in life." This is the beginning of a trek across the prairies. The mother and children settle down in one town after another, only to be driven on by the arrival of the father, who periodically reaches the conclusion that he should be with his loved ones. But the trek is no aimless wandering. Every move takes the wife and children-followed by the father, one step closer to what had once been the family goal, the Peace River Country.

Ralph Allen, editor of Maclean's Magazine, is also the author of two other novels-Home Made Banners and Chartered Libertine. Adapter Charles Israel came to Canada from Hollywood in 1953. He has written documentary scripts for many CBC, as well as original radio and television plays, and two novels.

So they let it remain 'Mexico,' and we were determined to let it remain Mexico, too. We listened to artists enthuse about the blue water and snow-capped volcanic mountains; we let writers gush adjectives about the quaint and the picturesque; we let business men ramble on about the untapped mineral resources, the hydro-electric potential. Far too much sweetness and light. A kind of inspired travelogue. Determined to get beneath the surface, instead, and examine the beguilement of the golden haze of Mexico,' as somebody called it.

"Wiped a lot of tape, and moved to the Pacific Coast seaport of Manzanillo, which we happen to think is more or less real Mexico, old Mexico. The town is almost surrounded by mountains, as one observer has said, the mountains have kept the seaport from becoming 'Hispanized, Westernized, mechanized, and Americanized.' It is exotic, unsanitary, unspoiled, but rapidly changing. Recently, there's been a burst of promotion for the place, but only a trickle of tourists. The town has yet to be marred by excessive commercialism . . . hotdog stands, Coca-Cola signs, airconditioned bars, cabanas lining the beach. But when and if Manzanillo does get the Midas-touch from dollar bearing tourists, how will it change? Some of the planners, promoters, parasites, saloonkeepers, visionaries we interviewed offer their prophecies. We offer none.

"Our tape reflects the rhythm and tempo of the place; the early morning bustle, the late evening's hilarity and raucous entertainment; the church bells, the street sounds of vendors hawking their wares as buses thunder by. You will hear a basic sound that requires some interpretation . . . tortilla making. The town band was out in full regalia Sunday night. Monday we dropped in at the high school and listened to the hesitant children in an English class recite. Chatted with a number of touring Canadians who gave us candid opinions about life in Manzanillo; and we

It will be interesting for Canadian listeners to hear the Metropolitan performance of Un Ballo in Maschera on Saturday (Feb. 28). This opera was the outstanding success of the last Toronto Opera Festival and at that time was given a performance which would be hard to beat. The Metropolitan cast looks fine on paper and I see that our old friend Regina Resnik, who sang such a good Carmen in Toronto a few years ago, is to be the Ulrica. Later the same day Tossy Spivakovsky is to play the Sessions violin concerto with the New York Philharmonic. Roger Sessions is a New Englander who studied at Harvard and Yale and has since worked a great deal with Ernest Bloch. His output has not been large, as he is extremely self-critical, so that everything he produces is the work he feels is his best. The violin concerto dates from 1935 and has not been played as much as it should have, for it is an excellent example of this fine composer's music.

Wind music is having a large share of the programs just now and many delightful works have been heard in the last few weeks. His chamber music, however, is also of the finest quality and I would advise all music lovers to listen to the Quintet on Sunday morning.

Sunday is full of interest, and in the evening the CBC Symphony is to give us Stravinsky's Symphony in C. There is always some confusion as to the Stravinsky symphonies because, for some (Please turn to page 29)

The Reaney-Beckwith work calls for eight singers and a chamber orchestra and takes a little under an hour to perform. It is in three scenes and the action alternates between fast-moving dialogue sections and more developed "set numbers," such as arias, duets, and trios. A central musical motive occurs in varied form in each of the three scenes and is associated with the spirit of the rare and all important night - blooming cereus around which the opera revolves. Although there are two orchestral interludes - one depicting falling snow and the other the roar of a train passing by, the instruments are mostly an obbligato background to the voices. The libretto, concerned as it is with simple, good people, relies for the most part on simple homely language. Reaney says this was suggested in part by his admiration of simple, straightforward English lyrics such

as Wordsworth's Lucy poems. Beckwith has introduced, as a musical counterpart to this sturdy homespun flavour, some melodies suggesting the style of such 19th century North American hymns as What a Friend We Have in Jesus.

The night-blooming cereus is a cactus, native to the southwestern United States but often found as an indoor plant elsewhere, which blooms once a year, at night, usually in June. In the opera, by artistic license, it is made to bloom in early spring. Mrs. Brown, the central character, is a poor lonely old lady - good, simple, sturdy of character, but still lonely. On a snowy night in late March, her night-blooming cereus is about to put forth its delicate, highlyscented blossoms, and she has invited some of her neighbours in the rural Ontario community to come and help her celebrate the event.

In a prologue, two teenage girls relate this to a stranger, a young girl who has arrived by train and has asked the way to Mrs. Brown's house. The girls imitate how they sometimes make fun of Mrs. Brown; they tell how years ago

Mrs. Brown's daughter ran away with a man and how this broke the old lady's heart; and they give Alice (the stranger) confused directions to Mrs. Brown's little cottage. As they speak of the opening of the cereus plant, a vision of it appears, only to be swept away by the falling snow.

In the next scene Mrs. Brown is in her tiny, one-roomed cottage. A series of songs accompany her typical, every-day duties. Each action reminds her of her missing daughter for whom she has waited hopefully these many years. She takes her houseplants, including the cereus, away from the cold; finally she sits at a little harmonium and accompanies herself in a hymn. She is interrupted by the entrance of Alice. Mrs. Brown's reaction is one of disbelief. Alice is a ghost, she says, who will soon disappear. Alice chases her around the room in an effort to make her touch her and feel that she is real. but as the guests start arriving she retires to a corner. The guests one by one remark on her presence, but Mrs. Brown seems bound not to

reason, they have never been numbered as those of most composers. This particular work dates from 1940 and was commissioned by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra for its fiftieth anniversary. It is one of the most easily approachable compositions of this composer and has become part of the repertoire of most of the great symphony orchestras.

The Toronto Symphony concert this Tuesday night on the Dominion and French networks includes the Third Piano Concerto of Prokofieff, which is rapidly becoming as popular as the Tchaikovsky B flat minor. It is used as ballet music, and I have even heard it over the "Muzak" in snack bars. It certainly deserves all this success and we can do with another piano concerto in the popular field, so well-worn and hackneyed is this particular repertoire at the present time.

Wednesday night brings us the premiere of an opera commissioned by the CBC. This in itself is an event of major importance in Canadian music. The composer, John Beckwith, is well known to radio listeners, both through his music and his commentaries on special broadcast programs. The libretto is by the Winnipeg poet, James Reaney. The opera is called Night-blooming Cereus, which is a cactus native to the southwestern United States and which blooms once a year (see page 26).

On Friday afternoon the Ottawa Orchestra is giving a concert of South American music. It is not often we hear the music of Santa Cruz, one of the best known composers of Chile, where he is dean of music at the University of Chile. We are to hear his Suite for Strings dating from 1937. In the same program is *Estancia*, a ballet by A. Ginastera, a well known Argentine composer - an excellent program.

On Thursday evening the Vancouver Chamber Orchestra comes up, as usual, with something out of the ordinary. This is the Serenade for Violin and Strings by Leonard Bernstein's amazing versatility. There would appear to be no form in which he cannot excel as a composer.
