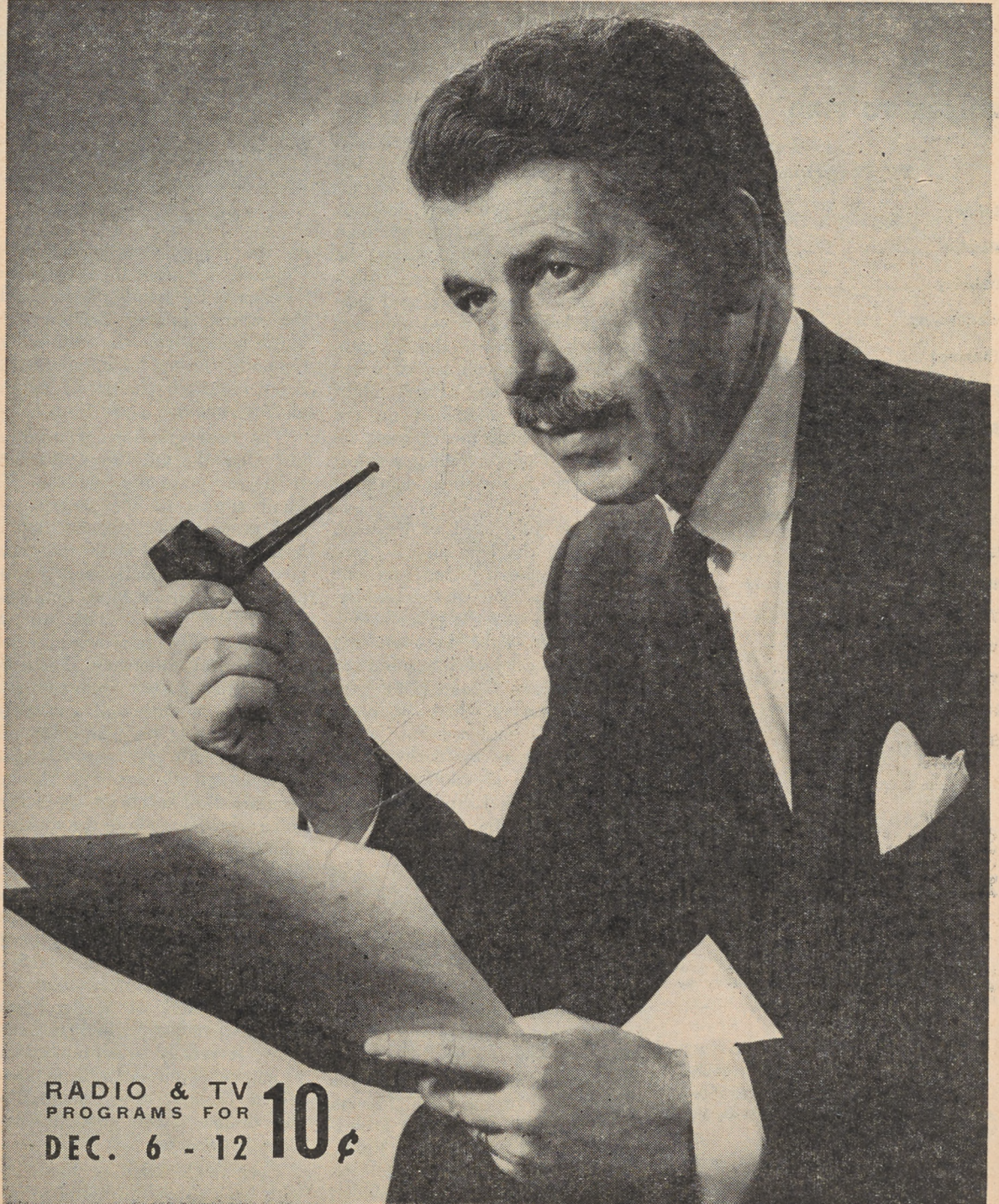

Love Story 1910

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Leslie MacFarlane describes the background of his play, to be seen this Sunday on "G.M. Presents"

SEVEN is an age of awareness. In 1910 I was seven years old; perhaps this is why the year looms so vividly in memory as one of notable events.

In April the newspapers all had pictures of a shaggy-haired old man with shrewd eyes and a big white mustache—a famous author named Mark Twain was dead. A few weeks later another old man gazed out of the front pages; he was bearded and he wore robes and a crown. Bells tolled and flags hung at half-mast as we mourned the death of Edward the Seventh. His passing was coupled with another historic event. Every night that week we stood out on the lawns of our little town gazing up at Halley's Comet, trailing stardust and mystery in the silent depths of space.

Early in July most of the men gathered in the bars and in front of the newspaper office late one afternoon to hear the round-by-round bulletins of the great heavy-weight prize-fight between Big Jim Jeffries and Jack Johnson away out in Nevada. Gloom hung over the dusty streets when the black man's fists hammered the white man to the floor; our derby-hatted sports talked of another White Hope and washed down their disappointment with whiskey sours and mugs of beer.

Apart from the one-day stand of the Sells-Floto Circus, an Uncle Tom's Cabin-show—with two real bloodhounds—at the Opera House, and a fire at one of the livery stables there were no events of importance that month until the Old Boys' Reunion. This brought brass bands, parades, horse races, lacrosse games and sideshows to the Fair Grounds on the edge of town. Every afternoon the gallant Professor Hutchinson, in purple tights, ascended magnificently into the heavens by balloon, descended leisurely to earth while cavorting

on the trapeze bar of his parachute. Every night there were fireworks and the bands played on. In the warm summer evenings the music floated from the distant Fair Grounds—the tender undulations of *After the Ball*, the jovial inquiry of *Has Anybody Here Seen Kelly?*

The next great event occurred just after the Old Boys' Reunion. It began gradually, with a few small stories in the newspapers, and grew bigger day by day as headlines bristled with the name of Crippen. Small boys heard echoes of Murder Most Foul. But merely the echoes. This was an event that only the grown-up world relished and understood. Small fry could only gather that the man Crippen was author of a crime so monstrous that his name was synonymous with evil beyond human imagination. One heard shocked references to a corpse in a coal cellar; the corpse bore the romantic name of Belle Elmore; over the back fences drifted the name of Ethel LeNeave, whose association with the Monster involved a breach of the Seventh Commandment. Whispers identified her as a Scarlet Woman, whatever that was. There was talk of Scotland Yard and a detective called Inspector Dew, feverishly mounting interest in a great Trans-Atlantic manhunt which brought the principals of the drama closer and closer to Canadian shores.

Even the smallest of small boys with eyes to see and ears to hear

WHEN Sir Adrian Boult was conducting a performance of one of Oskar Morawetz' works in Toronto, the composer went backstage to talk to him, and during the conversation a woman came up and asked Morawetz what sort of work he did. "I'm a composer," he told her. "Yes, I know," she replied, "but what's your profession?" "I'm a composer," he repeated. "Oh, she said, so you *don't* work!"

That sort of remark makes composers see red. Though Morawetz rarely shows his annoyance, he gets hopping mad inside when people hint that a composer has an easy life—jotting down a few notes when the mood suits him, handing his hieroglyphics to an eager conductor and enjoying the applause in the clover of his royalties. Nothing could be farther from the truth.

Not everyone realizes the expense involved in getting your work performed. Morawetz tells us that it costs him \$400 to \$500 to have the parts for a symphony copied, and after about 10 performances the parts start to break apart and soon there is the expense of more copying. Even if the work gets lots of performances, he says, it takes years before the composer breaks even with his expenses. The financial sacrifices he and his family must make to hear his work performed are endless. In Canada and all other countries in the world except the U.S.A., he says, the law ensures that the composer and his heirs will receive royalties for performances of his works until 50 years after his death. "But one of the greatest injustices I've ever heard of is the American law that provides for royalties to be paid to a composer or his heirs for only 50 years after first publication. So when the composer is old and badly needs the income from his royalties, it isn't forthcoming. A business man isn't required to hand over his business income when he's old. He enjoys its profits and then wills it to his family. In the States a composer has nothing to pass on to his heirs. Some people actually want to introduce the same law into Canada. It would completely

defeat the work of the Canada Council, which has done so much to help Canadian composers get their works performed."

We asked Morawetz if he had any tricks for courting inspiration when he sits down to compose. "I used to waste weeks and weeks in my early years," he told us, "believing that a composer has to wait for inspiration before he starts to work. I would sit down for ten minutes, and if I wasn't in the right mood by then, I'd quit. What changed my way of working was reading a book about Tchaikovsky. He always said it was the biggest mistake to wait for a creative mood—that way you'd never get anything done. Instead, he wrote whenever he got a free minute, whether he was in the right frame of mind or not, and often, after half an hour, he would suddenly find that far better ideas were popping into his head than on a day when the mood was right. I have found the same thing. Often when I'm frantically working to a deadline my compositions turn out better than when I have lots of time and feel inspired. I never

know before I start whether I'm going to produce anything worthwhile. It's more satisfactory to write all the time and hope for the best! Even if you have to throw it out, you have probably improved a little on your craft and writing facility."

A year ago Morawetz married pianist Ruth Shipman and they began looking unsuccessfully for a house with a separate studio where their piano would not annoy the neighbours or disturb each other. Finally the CBC solved the problem with some advice about soundproofing. They bought a little house and they fitted out an upstairs room as a studio with soundproof walls, and the piano can sing away for hours without bothering anyone. In this cozy little aerie Morawetz is hard at work on several commissioned works, and has just completed one for the CBC, *String Quartet No. 3*, which will have its premiere on *CBC Wednesday Night* this week on a program called *Music of Today*. Dr. Arnold Walter, principal of the Royal Conservatory of

in July of 1910 recognized the Crippen Case as one of the major events of his age and time. And so, nearly half a century later, while mulling over various ideas that might serve for a television play I recalled the impact which the crime and pursuit had upon the sober households of our town so long ago. But the Crippen affair had now become a classic of crim-

inal history. One might fairly assume that its details were so familiar to most people that interest had long since vanished. I set the notion aside and went on to something else.

A few days later, however, occurred the sort of coincidence which seldom astonishes a writer although he would never dare use anything of the kind in his own fictions. A random visit to a second-hand bookstore uncovered an old red book. It contained a com-

plete account, nearly the entire transcript, in fact, of the trial of H. H. Crippen, with Photographic Illustrations and an Appendix containing a record of the trial of Ethel Neave, alias LeNeave. A discovery of this kind is an omen which a writer neglects at his peril. Here was the whole story. There would, it seemed, be little difficulty in writing a little play about the trial. So I bought the book and went to work.

Almost immediately the task became troublesome. The material was there, all right. All the facts were on record. The trial was interesting enough. But much more interesting, it seemed, were the facts that weren't on record. I found myself speculating endlessly on the thoughts and feelings of the people, on the story that lay behind the known events. A drab affair, lacking in dignity and with apparently not the slightest element of classic tragedy, yet it had gripped human imagination in its day and still held power to fascinate the human mind after half a century. But the book gave only the cold facts.

For the broader background, for the vast mass of speculation and hearsay, for the colour of the time one had to seek another source—the newspapers.

For more than a week, then, as patient attendants trundled up the cumbersome bound volumes to be reading room of the Toronto Reference Library, the files of newspapers from July to December, 1910, yielded up the words that men wrote about the Crippen Case when its origins were obscure, its facts in doubt and the fate of its principals undetermined. Here were the very newspapers that had been read in one's own home nearly fifty years ago. But now a different story emerged. The old images that had peopled a nightmare in childhood melted away. Crippen, the Monster, and Ethel LeNeave, the Scarlet Woman, were not in these dry, brittle pages at all. Instead, one saw an insignificant little man whose home life was unhappy, and a timid little typist, not very pretty, not very well educated, who

Music of Toronto, where Morawetz teaches harmony, composition and history, will introduce the program. Producer Hugh Davidson describes Morawetz' new quartet as "charming."

"The four strings," he says, "are constantly on the move and their business creates quite a colourful and exciting musical texture."

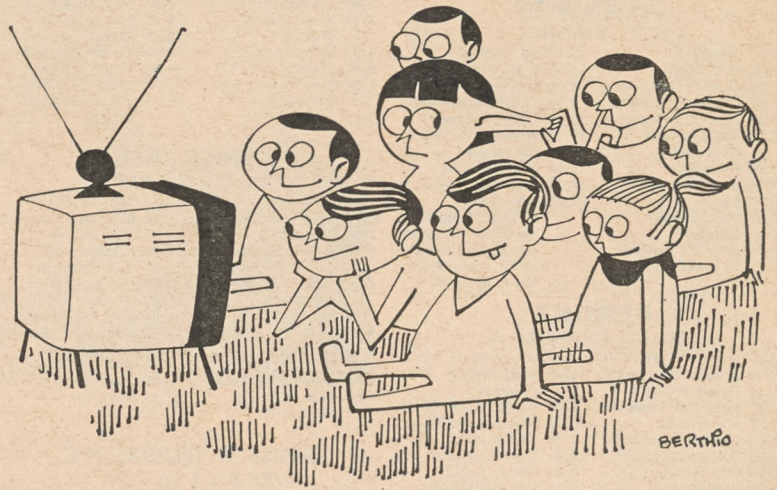
Morawetz says he never before worked so long on a score; with major interruptions it took him a year-and-a-half, but because he enjoys the string quartet medium so much it was a labour of love.

Early in the summer he accepted a commission from the Toronto Symphony Orchestra to write a symphony—his second—and has until the end of the year to complete it for a February 2 performance. This is the first time the orchestra has commissioned a Canadian work for a subscription concert. The Baroque Trio in Montreal has asked him to write a work especially for it, and a couple of weeks ago the Vancouver Festival commissioned him to write a song cycle for mezzo-soprano Kirsten Meyer and pianist Glenn Gould to perform at next summer's festival.

Morawetz is the only Canadian composer whose works Gould has played in public. When Gould was 19 he frequently included the Morawetz *Fantasy in D Minor*, written 10 years ago, and he played it again in San Francisco a couple of weeks ago, where it was well received. Soprano Lois Marshall and Dorothy Maynor have sung his songs in Canada, the States and Australia, and his orchestral works are not only in the repertoire of all Canadian orchestras but have been played all over the Commonwealth, the U.S.A., and 12 European countries. During the Royal Tour of 1951 his choral composition, *Keep Us Free*, was chosen to precede the Queen's speech at the state dinner in Ottawa.

For 15 years Morawetz waited and hoped that some of his works would be published, and suddenly, three years ago, his luck changed.

Trans-Canada Matinee

Gordon V. Thomson published three of his songs. Last year Boosey and Hawkes published the full score to his *Overture to a Fairy Tale*, which had been premiered at the Stratford Festival by conductor Walter Susskind, and has since been played all over Europe; and his *Scherzo for Piano*, which Rudolf Firkusny premiered in Toronto recently. Ricardi, the famous Italian house that has published Puccini, Verdi and other masters, published Morawetz' *Divertimento for Strings* this fall. It made its debut at the World's Fair in Brussels last year, under the baton of Boyd Neel, and since then has had 22 performances. In the near future the Canadian Music Centre will publish another of his works, *The*

Dirge. Several of his works have been recorded by the CBC International Service; and he has written music for a number of films.

Morawetz emphasizes that the situation for composers in Canada is much better than in the States. "When I first came to Canada from Czechoslovakia 20 years ago," he told us, "I was offered a better position across the border than I was here, but I have always been glad I chose to stay in Canada, because there is not one city or organization down there that does for composers what the CBC has been doing here for years. The Americans offer far more bursaries and fellowships to music students than we do, but when they graduate and

**Duke Ellington
On Music '60**

EDWARD ELLINGTON, one of the all time jazz greats, first studied the piano under Miss Klinkscale, of Washington, D.C. (where he was born in 1899). Even as a lad he had a very ducal attitude to life: hence his nickname, Duke. His manner continued in the ducal tradition: his wardrobe in 1950 contained 47 suits and more than 1,000 cravats, he once ate 32 sandwiches during a high school dance intermission, and his favourite authors are: first, the patriarchs of the Old Testament, second Walter Winchell.

The Duke was a commercial art student with a side job as soda jerk at the Poodle Dog Cafe when he composed his first number: *Soda Fountain Rag*. He promptly gave up art for music. He got his big break in the early 1920's when offered a job in New York. Boo Hoo Huff, ranking Philadelphia gangleader, suggested that a nightclub owner in Philadelphia allow the Duke to break his contract to take the new job. The nightclub owner acceded and the Duke was a big hit in New York (according to a 1950 *Billboard* article).

Within a few years the Duke was making \$60,000 a year (says a 1958 *Observer* profile) "at which stage the fruits of victory began to pall. He got bored and the cure turned out to be the first European tour."

At a 1933 Command Performance in Britain Ellington turned down a request to solo the chorus of *Swamp River*, afterwards found he had turned down the Duke of York, who became George VI and "who owns the largest collection of Ellington records" (*Billboard*).

The Duke composes anywhere: "On the glass panels of recording studios and on overnight bus rides where members of his band stand by with lighted matches in order that the Duke's 'mental notes' may be transcribed on paper." The score (still according to *Billboard*

in 1950) stood at 1,200 compositions and 12,000 records which have sold 20,000,000 copies. Duke Ellington has written almost 1,000 songs including *Mood Indigo*, *Stormy Weather*, *Sophisticated Lady*, and *Solitude*, which he wrote in twenty minutes between recordings.

The Duke's sense of *noblesse oblige* remains: while in Britain he wrote a number, and made one recording which went to Queen Elizabeth. That reflects the impressions Her Majesty made on him: beauty, majesty, wonder and splendour (according to the *Globe and Mail*, 1949).

In 1943 Ellington gave a two-hour recital in Carnegie Hall where he was "hailed as the most original mind in American music;" and in 1947 the Liberian government commissioned him to write an orchestral suite marking the centenary of that country.

"Ellington plays the piano but his real instrument is his band," says his assistant and collaborator,

Marjorie Lord co-stars as Danny's wife, Kathy.

Billy Strayhorn. "Each member of his band is to him a distinctive colour, tone, and set of emotions which he mixes with others, equally distinctive, to produce a third thing which I call the Ellington effect."

While playing at the Stratford Festival in 1957 he remembered an old ambition; later he composed and recorded *Such Sweet Thunder*, a forty minute composition in the jazz idiom based on scenes from Shakespeare. The suite has one section titled "Hank Cinq;" of *Lady Macbeth*, Ellington says "We suspect there is a little ragtime in her soul."

The Toronto *Telegram* quotes Ellington: "You know that scene where Shakespeare is giving instructions to his players? Where he says, 'Don't mouth your words, Let them live.' Well, what he meant was, 'There's no script, but it goes like this.' That's jazz."

"It is questionable whether there is any real connection between Ellingtonian ideas and Elizabethan sensibilities," says the *Observer*. "What a work like *Such Sweet Thunder* does do is to suggest that Ellington is one of the most remarkably endowed composers alive today."

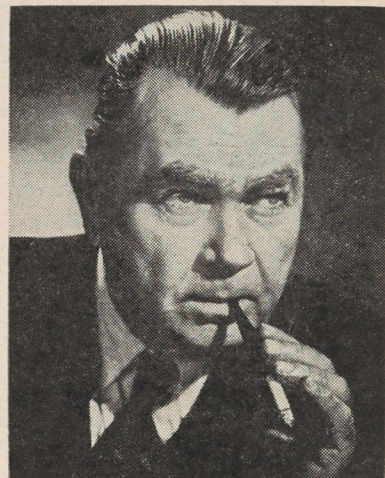

CBWT—Eye-to-Eye

This week most Winnipeggers will get their first glimpse inside the Winnipeg City Jail at the central police station on Rupert Street. Tonight's Eye-to-Eye originates "live" from the station's cell block for a special on-the-spot inquiry into the station and its jail facilities. The Eye-to-Eye cameras will reveal to the public for the first time the actual eating, sleeping, and living conditions of prisoners awaiting trial or serving time. For background information on the long-standing debate over facilities at the station, Warner Troyer will talk with Chief Constable Robert Taft, Mayor Stephen Juba (chairman of the Police Commission), and Lloyd Stinson (a citizen member of the Commission). Host Harvey Dawes and a police inspector will take a look at the new 999 emergency call system. Dramatic excerpts from emergency calls recorded by the 999 operators will be used to point up the value of the system in a human crisis.

Tonight's program is intended to answer many calls for public scrutiny of the jail facilities. Commissioner member Stinson has described living conditions as "crummy." Murray Fisher, the other citizen member of the Commission, has called for a series of "open house" inspections of the station by the public. The Winnipeg Tribune, noting reports of grim conditions for prisoners, has urged re-establishment of the grand jury system in Manitoba so the station and the prisoners' conditions would be the subject of periodic public inspection.

The program will be produced by Felix Lazarus in conjunction with Ken Black of the CBC Talks and Public Affairs Department.

fell in love at the wrong time. One saw a shabby, commonplace crime that involved, apparently, two shabby, commonplace people.

But live long enough, write long enough, and you learn that there are no commonplace people. D. H. Lawrence said that he wrote novels to find out what his characters were like. Now I was compelled to write a play to find out, if possible, what Crippen and Ethel LeNeave were like. Only by imagining that cluttered parlour in Hilldrop Crescent, supported by the knowledge that it was the perfect expression of Belle Elmore's abominable taste, only by imagining what Captain Kendall, of the *Montrose* said and did when he saw through the pathetic disguises of his two strange passengers, only by imagining what those two haunted and hounded creatures said to one another behind the closed door of their cabin could one's speculations be set at rest.

And so the play that was to have concerned itself with an old trial

start composing, where can they have their works performed? I would rather have one performance on a national network than by three isolated orchestras. You have a bigger audience, for one reason, and can make a tape-recording of the performance at home. Then you can listen to your work and make any changes you want, and you can play the tape for conductors, performers and others interested in hearing it. So few American orchestras broadcast that there are not many chances down there for making your own tapes. Newspaper clippings are all very well—if the critic is in the right mood!—but a tape recording speaks for itself."

Morawetz' *Carnival Overture* is one of the most frequently performed Canadian works, because, he says modestly, it is short and gay and there is a shortage of short, gay works among Canadian compositions. He dislikes naming his compositions. When Sir Ernest Macmillan was rehearsing the Toronto Symphony Orchestra for the premiere of Morawetz' *Carnival Overture* (then un-named) several years ago, Sir Ernest asked him to give it a title. Morawetz could not think of a thing, so Sir Ernest suggested *Carnival Overture*, and Morawetz said he didn't mind a bit. Since then listeners have written to tell him how well his music pictures the carnival scenes. As they were far from his mind when he wrote it, he has many a private chuckle!

We asked him if he championed any special school of musical thought, and he said he would not like to think he was tied down to either a romantic or a practical one. "Music," he said, "is like politics. If someone belongs to a certain school they are sometimes so blinded that they give credit to a very poor work which belongs to their school than to an excellent work belonging to another school." He does not want to fall into that trap. How does he feel about jazz, and so-called popular music? He

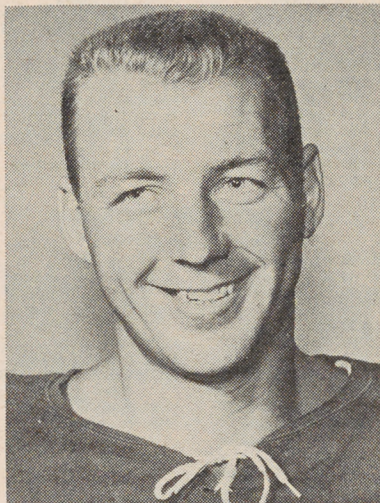

than 20 goals a year in his four NHL seasons, and last year scored an amazing total of 33 goals for a team that didn't even make the play-offs.

Winnipeg-born Andy is short (5 ft. 9 in.) but solid (182 lbs.) and very sound on hockey technique. Because of his lack of color Andy spent many years in the top minor leagues without being able to break in with the parent Montreal Canadiens. He got his big chance when Muzz Patrick took over as general manager of the New York Rangers and as his first official move, purchased Hebenton from Victoria where he'd spent five years with the Cougars. In his last year, 1954-55, he had scored 46 goals and set up 34 others.

In his rookie year Hebenton banged in 24 goals, then followed with 21 twice and 33 last year. In 1956-57 he won the Lady Byng trophy, which is awarded annually to the player who combines the most ability with clean, gentlemanly play.

In a recent Winnipeg television interview Andy claimed he was "robbed" of the same award last year. Alex Delvecchio of Detroit beat out Andy in the voting by one-half a point, 86.8 to 86.3. It was the closest race in history for any of the NHL's individual awards. The statistics showed that while Delvecchio had only 6 penalty minutes to Andy's eight he was less effective as a point-getter. Hebenton finished eighth in the league with 33 goals and 29 assists for 62 points while Delvecchio scored only 19 goals and had 35 assists for 54 points and sixteenth place.

Since it took the blond Scotsman so long to break into the NHL he may never rank with the great goal scorers in spite of an average of 25 goals per year. Because he plays right wing he may never make the All-Star team, but he's respected by all teams as one of the league's most consistent all-round competitors. Now 30 years old, Handy Andy is married, with two sons and a daughter.—Dennis O'Neill.

MUSIC ON RADIO

By CHESTER DUNCAN

THERE is so much contemporary music in the radio programmes this week that obviously the CBC has thrown Prudence (whom William Blake once described as "a rich, ugly old maid

courted by Incapacity") right back into the arms of Television. Though some of this music is more difficult to play than to hear (Villa-Lobos on Sunday's *Chamber Music* Concert, and Martinu

on Monday's *Vancouver Chamber Orchestra*) and can now (1959) be taken in an easy stride, there are certain other items which seem designed to remind us (as if we could ever forget it!) that we are living in a completely new era of art, not at all like the old familiar place where we could lounge and mosey.

I'm thinking particularly of the Wednesday Night program of *Music of Today* (introduced by Dr. Arnold Walter), in which the music of Armando Renzi, Cesare Brero, Olivier Messiaen, and Oskar Morawetz provides a number of quick stimulants not likely to be welcomed by those who buy records labelled "Music for Sleeping," or "Music for Remembering," or even "Music for Reading!" Messiaen, two of whose organ pieces are being played, is one of the most extraordinary and original figures in modern music, and we now need hours and hours of his music on the air in order to catch up with Europe in these matters. In addition, a dissertation on Electronic Music, with illustrations, will be given. Whether it will be taken remains to be seen. Most listeners,

like myself at this point, are most impressed by the ingenious techniques of the medium, without having much sense of its aesthetic value or indeed anything beyond sensory shock. But it's certainly an eerie business, shaking you out of the stock listening habits of your early world, which, like that before space exploration, had a different feel and sound.

To complete the week's concentration on significant contemporary music, Isaac Stern, with the New York Philharmonic under Leonard Bernstein, will play Alban Berg's great Violin Concerto. If there is any twelve-tone work which one would hope to be the means of carrying the pilgrim across the River of Atonal Dismay, it is this one, especially since the lyricism and eloquence of the piece elevate far above the merely clinical and clever, clever though it is. It is an elegiac work, written (very quickly) after the death of the young daughter of Alma Mahler, but it graciously lacks the ascetic grimness of the experimental mind, that quality that so often makes a grim pill out of a pilgrim. Perhaps it is the grace and graciousness of his control of technique that explains why Berg has so many followers among listeners as well as among composers.

On Friday the CBC Symphony, under Efrem Kurtz, continues its series of what has been so far a sparkling and vivid reading of the Beethoven Symphonies. This time it's numbers 4 and 7. It is a sign of the vitality of Beethoven's music that attitudes to it still differ quite markedly, although, paradoxically, people aren't nearly as frank about their opinions of the Great Masters, whom they know, as they are of the moderns, on whom they sometimes lavish all the contempt that unfamiliarity can breed. But on Beethoven one can still find opinions as different

as Miss Skinner's in *The Way of All Flesh* ("For me a simple chord of Beethoven is enough. This is happiness.") and Charles Lamb's remark in *Free Thoughts on Several Eminent Composers*:

The devil, with his foot so cloven, For aught I care may take Beethoven, And, if the bargain does not suit, I'll throw Weber in to boot.

Here of course Lamb, in his light-hearted philistinism, comes charmingly to the same conclusion as that of many tougher, more knowledgeable, and less attractive critics, namely, that he doesn't, deep down, particularly like *any* music.

Love in Russia

Short talks on the Soviet Union will be included in the Prairie Farm Broadcast on four consecutive Mondays beginning Nov. 30.

The speaker will be J. Russell Love, president of the Alberta Co-operative Wholesale Association, who recently took a 22-day bus tour of the Soviet Union. Officials of the Russian Co-operative Movement arranged for Mr. and Mrs. Love to visit rural co-operatives in the Moscow area.

Titles of the programs are *A Trip to Russia* (Nov. 30), *Collective Farms* (Dec. 7), *Co-operatives* (Dec. 14), and *Russia Under Khurshchev* (Dec. 21).

Russell Love was elected to the Alberta legislature in 1921, a year after he graduated in economics from the University of Alberta. The youngest member of the legislature, he was provincial treasurer until the defeat of the Farmers' Government in 1935. Mr. Love has been an active member of the co-operative movement in Alberta for the past 40 years.

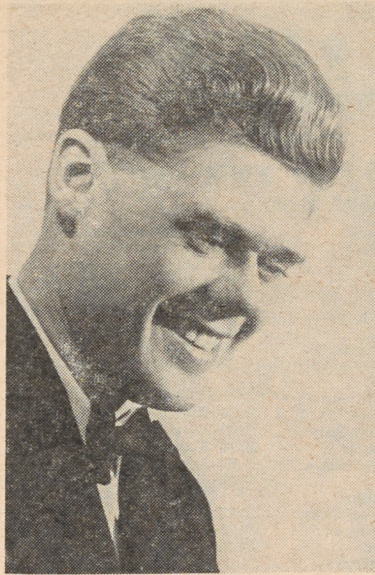

nourishment and body. Miss Skinner's "A simple chord of Beethoven is enough" pretty well misses the point, of course, because the whole meaning of Beethoven is bound to continuity, the long pull, the rope that slackens and tightens. Both the Fourth Symphony and the Seventh start in a way that suggests the dynamic power of a coiled spring. In other words, all the phrases that are so tensely stroked will have a happy and successful future. And one gets the impression that the loving attention showered on a few notes is a process of quickening them into life, as Zephyrus the West Wind was said to do to the buds at Springtime by his breathing into or "inspiration." In the opening measures of both symphonies the mood is one of creative joy in the infinite possibilities of simple materials.

In our enthusiasm for the direct lines and clear patterns of a Beethoven Symphony we sometimes forget the strange impact it undoubtedly made on the listeners of that time, who were nearly as prejudiced as we are. That is, they, like us, knew what they liked and,

above all, liked what they knew. There were the usual voices suggesting that Beethoven's work was certainly an enigma, and possibly a hoax. Tiresome as references to this early 19th century reaction to its contemporary modernists may be, it contains a lesson for us, a lesson which hurts us to read. Our easy pleasure which had once to be dearly earned, should leave us the energy to deal with the responsibility of being the fit audience though few by which genuinely valuable new works are appreciated. And whether it's the cocktail cleverness of the Brazilian Cesare Brero in his *Trio* (1935) for flute, bassoon, and clarinet, or the whimsical subtleties and wry good humour of the Italian Armando Renzi in his *Cinque Bagatelle* (1945) for flute, oboe, clarinet, and bassoon, it's the sort of challenge that takes ears uncluttered by stock expectations and sentimental memories, and a mind alert and innocent. It is amusing to read the vagaries of the musical criticism of 150 years ago, but it would be even nicer if we had the right to smile—for instance at C. F. Ebers' review of the Beethoven Seventh Symphony. "When Beethoven's Symphony in A major was heard for the first time it rather left the impression that this was the work of a madman; some people maintained that he aimed at describing the spirit of the age, while others interpreted the last movement as a description of a madhouse where the demented fight each other . . . In the last *Allegro con brio* the wedding guests appear to be inebriated. The theme is a vulgar dance-melody. All rules of decency are set aside . . ." Of course "nous avons changé tout cela." Well, at least we have changed the composers.

On the Cover

J. Frank Willis

Although it happened only by chance, it is not inappropriate that this week's cover story falls in the radio section of *CBC Times*. For even if he had quit radio when his television appearances began a few years ago, his radio and television careers would not be of equal length until he was over 80—in about 30 years from now.

And J. Frank Willis has by no means left radio; he still professes to be mainly a "radio man." He is heard weekly on *Nocturne* (the oldest network show in Canada), twice weekly on *In Reply*, and he produces many of the special programs on CBC Wednesday Night (the most recent—Joseph Schull's four-hour documentary on "The Fall of Quebec").

The host of CBC-TV's *Close-Up* was born in Halifax. He was expected to enter the family's piano manufacturing business, but he soon discovered that all his talents lay in other directions—music (he sang in church choirs and musical comedy), acting (he toured with Florence Glossop-Harris' Shakespearean Repertory Company), and art (he studied in New York,

became an Associate of the Academy of Oil and Water Colour Painters, and worked as an artist with Paramount Long Island motion picture studios).

While in New York he did odd jobs as an announcer with station WBAC. When he returned to Halifax to open his own art studio he did more free-lance announcing on CHNS, where in 1925 he had played banjo in an orchestra. At CHNS he also began writing, acting, directing, and reading poetry.

"To me, those were the great days of broadcasting," says Willis. "Everything we did broke new ground. Those of us fortunate enough to be in the front rank will never forget the wonderfully satisfying sense of adventure and achievement."

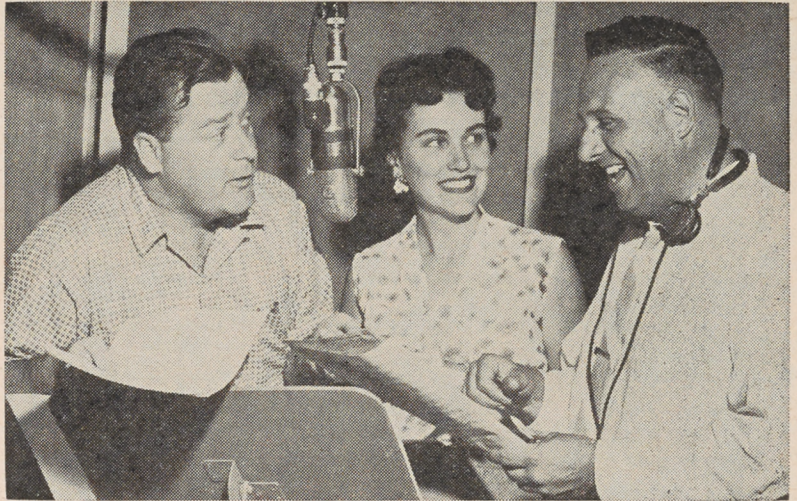

says he approaches it more as a subject of study. Even if the music does not appeal to him particularly he can always learn new harmony effects from its strikingly mixed colours. On a trip to New York last spring he went to see Leonard Bernstein's *West Side Story* and was greatly impressed. "Bernstein has popular music on the tips of his hands," he says, "but at the same time he has all the craft and knowledge of the musician trained in the classical tradition. I was so amazed at some of the colours and rhythms he used that I went round the next day and spent \$10 on the score—the first in a light vein in my library of 1,000 books!"

"One thing I never do," he says, "and I've often discussed this with other composers, is lecture about my music. Too much analysis strikes me as self-defence. I like to hear music and enjoy it before I study it. You can't force appreciation through study. It's the same with literary works. Mind you, I've nothing against explanation, but music should not be explained to *make* you like it, but only *in case* you like it."

How early did Morawetz discover that he liked music? He is amused by the fact that he was a dud when he started to study piano at the age of six in his native village of Svetla, Czechoslovakia, where his father owned a large estate. Local teachers, embarrassed by and envious of the fact that he had perfect pitch, taught him practically nothing for three years. Neither parent had any musical ability (his father claims that he cannot recognize the national anthem and has to be nudged to stand up when it is played!), but they predicted that his elder brother Herbert (now professor of chemistry at the Brooklyn Polytechnic) would be the musician in the family. When Oskar and Herbert began to study with a new teacher, Oskar went ahead with such speed that he was soon at Herbert's heels, and Herbert announced: "If the shrimp catches up to me in the book, no more piano

for me!" Shortly afterward Herbert had to go to Prague to have his glasses changed, and when he returned a broadly grinning Oskar welcomed him with the news that he had caught up with him in the book. Herbert refused to take any more music lessons, but Oskar continued to forge ahead. When the family moved to Prague he was accepted as a private pupil by the director of the State Conservatory. He found he could read very easily and soon had a knowledge of a great many orchestral scores. George Szell, then conductor of the Prague Opera, was interested in his progress and gave him helpful advice in his studies. (Incidentally, Szell's assistant was Walter Susskind, now conductor of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra.) When Szell left the Opera he recommended Morawetz to its director as a junior conductor, and Morawetz says he would be there now if he had not had to leave the country suddenly following the Munich Pact—earlier he had been arrested by the Gestapo in Vienna.

He studied music in Paris for a few months, and then joined his parents who had preceded him to Canada. (All the relatives on both sides of the family and many of their friends who could not flee were shot, hanged, tortured to death or put in the gas chambers.) Morawetz had not been able to make up his mind whether he wanted to be a pianist, conductor or composer. En route to Toronto he visited Szell in New York, who persuaded him to concentrate on

composing. He obtained his doctorate in music from the University of Toronto, joined the staff of the Royal Conservatory of Music in 1946, and later became professor of music at the university.

From the time of his graduation, his mature, arresting style began attracting attention that soon became international. He has ex-

plored the fields of works for full orchestras, string orchestras, piano, voice, violin and string quartet with great success. He is an extremely painstaking composer, and is enjoying the challenge of his current commissions. In fact, composing is so much a part of his daily life that although he enjoys travel he always has a feeling of relief when he is closeted in his studio again, combining musical colours this way and that until another dramatic melodic tapestry is created in the tensely brilliant Morawetz style.
