## Sailor's Song

A sea story by JAMES HANLEY, starring HENRY COMOR and produced by J. FRANK WILLIS

"IT'S an extremely atmospheric piece. From a novel about seafaring men by James Hanley, a British writer of great distinction. In fact, it's such a beautifully but ruggedly written tale that it's often referred to as a prose poem. We're presenting it on CBC Wednesday Night to honour the sailor's life and the unsung heroes of the merchant navy," said J. Frank Willis, prowling around his office as if he were pacing the bridge.

This deep-voiced generously moustached Maritimer has great admiration and respect for the sea, as many listeners know. Dozens of salt-flavoured programs have been planned in his bright office in the north wing of the old CBC radio building in Toronto, and it would surprise no one if he kept a peaked cap and a reefer jacket behind the door.

Because his interest in things nautical is deep and of life-long standing, his radio programs about the sea have an unparalleled authenticity. He has great understanding of the lure of the sailing life and what it means to the people who wait on shore. One of his most memorable sea stories is Days of Sail, a CBC radio highlight of 1953. And the same production team that lifted those dramas into the "special" class will undertake the Wednesday Night presentation of Sailor's Songs producer Frank Willis, composer Phil Nimmons, conductor Samuel Hersenhoren.

"We'll be turning to our marine sound effects section again," Willis said, "and listeners can expect some realistic background noises, because it's well stocked with authentic seagoing sounds that we gathered for Days of Sail—not only the sounds of ships and wind and waves, but also of the grog shops typical of all the water streets in the world."

"Briefly," he went on "Sailor's Song is about Manion, a merchant seaman, a stoker who survived both wars, but in telling his story we're really telling the story of all of them. When his ship is torpedoed he is badly smashed up in the stokehold, but is pulled aboard a raft by three mates. During their long travail on the open sea his past life comes to him in semi-conscious flashbacks. Through him we see the seamen of all time.

"Like so many ship's companies, his is almost a Tower of Babel in miniature, a strange conglomeration of accents, English, Scots, Irish, Welsh and many others, from the Clyde, the Mersey, and Southampton. I've cast Henry Comer as Manion because he has the most authentic Liverpool accent available and is also a most versatile actor. It's a demanding role, because he must sound like Manion as a boy, as a young man, and later as a weatherbeaten old tar past middle age." Other leading roles will be played by Jeremy Wilkin, Alan Nunn, Tony Van Bridge, John Drainie, Alan King, Hilary Vernon,

FRONT PAGE CHALLENGERS

JOHN AYLESWORTH got the idea for Front Page Challenge three years ago. He was taking a shower at the time. CBC put the show on as a summer replacement, and within just two months a TV newspaper critic could write, "After a long hard look at Front Page Challenge some of us think that disaster is not far off."

Two years later, in May, 1959. 1,275,000 Canadian homes tuned in to *Challenge* every week. And every week up to 500 people send in suggested challengers and headlines for the panel to identify.

CBC Times checked the CBC library files on Challenge, found over 250 feature articles and comments from leading critics, decided to look for a fresh new angle on the program.

Perhaps stories of some famous people who had appeared on Front Page Challenge would make an angle. Marie ("The Body") MacDonald, for instance, who arrived at the studio, heard the panel would inevitably query her on her famous kidnapping, and promptly fainted. Producer Jim Guthro had no alternative but to turn the game into a straight interview and ask the panel not to mention the controversial kidnapping.

Then, of course, there was "Wrong Way Corrigan," the man who took off from New York in a small plane bound for California, took the wrong turning, and landed in Ireland. Now he grows oranges in California and always travels by train.

There was Igor Gouzenko who defected from the Russian embassy in Ottawa. He insisted he be allowed to disguise himself on air with a hood, and to present his five point program for world peace. Unfortunately, his poor articulation prevented anyone hearing what he said and the cold war continues.

A panelist asked Joe Louis his toughest fight. Replied Louis: "With the Income Tax Department."

And there was the private investigator whose charges about the murder of Sir Harry Oakes in the Bahamas put *Front Page Challenge* itself in the headlines.

## No Fresh Angles On Front Page Challenge

—but it remains CBC-TV's most popular panel game—and one of Canada's most popular programs

In fact, Front Page Challenge has often made the headlines. All these and many other stories have put it there—all of which meant this was not the fresh new angle CBC Times needed. Maybe producer Guthro could think of one.

"Well," said Guthro, "we're the first Canadian show to outdraw the top American shows on the network." But this was a news item, not an angle for a feature.

The phone rang and Guthro picked it up. "Wherever he lands it has to be in North America," he said. "And we've got just 14 hours to get him here in Toronto for the show."

Obviously Guthro was talking about Tuesday night's mystery guest, apparently due on a Trans-Atlantic plane at Malton airport, near Toronto, at 6:30 a.m. the morning of the show. But a storm

threatened to divert the plane-to Montreal? Chicago? New York?

Outguessing the weather involved reservations on the Montreal-Toronto plane, reports on the icy roads from Buffalo and points south, plans and counterplans, all complicated by the necessary secrecy.

Finally Guthro and his henchman finished all they could do. Guthro sat back and sighed. "I'm afraid I can't think of an angle," he said.

For a starter the hazard of the weather on Challenge's plans would do; it might lead to a story of the race-against-time-on-icy-roads-in-the-worst-storm-since-Hurricane-Hazel type, just like the time Quentin Revuolds arrived in Toronto only thirty minutes before airtime.

## Good Music on TV-What Are Its Chances?

Critics, producers and musicians are all thinking \_but not agreeing\_ about it

PROBABLY of all the arts which have been adapted to television-set design, picture composition, acting, playwriting and so on -classical music poses the most difficult problems. The main contribution TV can make to the other arts seems to lie in the possibility of changing audience perspective. But what can this add to the effectiveness of music which is essentially to be heard and not seen?

Said Ron Poulton, TV critic: "It is not good enough just to have the cameras poking around the orchestra."

Said Daryl Duke, CBC-TV producer: "A symphony is meant to be heard as a unified whole," and he pointed out that cutting from section to section of an orchestra, or from instrument to instrument, is apt to destroy that unity; the visual fragmentation of the orchestra seems to fragment the music.

Said Walter Susskind, conductor of the Toronto Symphony: "I have seen a number of BBC televised classical concerts, and conducted one myself. But always the 'cutting' distracted attention from the music."

Only Franz Kraemer, CBC-TV producer was firm in his belief that TV could televise successfully a straight concert of classical music.

"If the viewer will give as much concentration to a musical performance on TV as he does in the concert hall," said Kraemer, "I-as producer, will provide him with camera shots and cuts which will not detract from and will possibly enhance the performance.

"The performance of music, the actual execution, is an important element in appreciation. Television in its own way, can show that execution, but it is a way different to the concert hall, but equally effective."

He, too, pointed out the mistake that Duke mentioned, that of cutting from section to section of the orchestra as it carried the theme.

"That is educational cutting," said Kraemer. "The producer (Please turn to page 7)

It seemed a good angle. But at 6:30 a.m. on Tuesday the mystery guest arrived at Malton on schedule and drove placidly to Toronto. No CBC Times story there.

How about security and secrecy arrangements for *Challenge?* someone suggested. Only once had these broken down completely. Georgina Moore, allegedly used as a standin for Princess Margaret's portrait, arrived in New York, told reporters she was *en route* as mystery guest for a Canadian TV panel show. Result: preshow headlines in Toronto newspapers.

Still, the half dozen people who knew the identity of each week's guests have done a remarkably good job of keeping them under wraps until airtime. Unfortunately, the day we decided to write a CBC Times feature on Challenge security, the Toronto evening papers announced that Hugh Gaitskill, Leader of the British Labour Party, would be a challenger on the show later that evening.

Last hope was to turn up an angle at the studio during rehearsals. For instance, the substitute panel which at 5:30 p.m. ran through the program with guest Hugh Gaitskill, just as if it were the real thing.

"Sometimes we identify headlines which the regular panel don't get," said actress Nomi Cameron. "In fact I think our score is about as good as theirs."

Afterwards, Mr. Gaitskill gave each of the three panel members—Miss Cameron, actor John Macklin, and Darlene Anderson (who is "Miss Toronto, 1959") an English sixpence as a souvenir.

"And you just told me," someone said to Miss Cameron, "that you never get anything for nothing from the Labour party." Mr. Gaitskill was still laughing when he left for his hotel.

After supper break the regular panl arrived: Pierre Berton, Gordon Sinclair, Toby Robins and guest panelist J. B. McGeachy, with moderator Fred Davis.

In this second "rehearsal" Miss Cameron and her colleagues stood

in as challengers representing some headline — other than those to be used in the real program, of course —and the panel went right through the game trying to establish the headline.

These two "rehearsals" allow Guthro and his team to get rid of production difficulties. But as a story angle the rehearsals flopped because many of the questions and answers in the second runthrough came close to libel of some famous international figures.

In the waiting room after the second rehearsal, Berton, Davis and McGeachy discussed this and that while the CBC Times sat quietly listening, hoping for an angle. The conversation had that slightly tense note of pre-show trivia.

"You know," said McGeachy suddenly, waving a hand in our general direction, "these people just sitting there silently remind me of those unexplained characters in a surrealist movie."

It seemed like a good time to interview Toby Robins who was being made up.

"Do you have a specific angle?" she asked hopefully. If anything unnerves a performer it is a reporter without an angle asking vague questions ten minutes before airtime.

Nevertheless, she good humouredly confirmed that back in 1957, prior to the first audition for *Challenge*, she had seldom read a front page headline, had a happy knack of blotting unpleasant memories out of her mind. She knew of only one disaster—the Cocoanut Grove fire—and that because a friend of her family was involved.

One story has it that at her first audition for *Challenge* a fellow panelist narrowed the event down to a disaster and Miss Robins blurted out the only disaster she know, the Cocoanut Grove fire. She was right.

Since then Miss Robins has done a great deal of homework on past newspaper headlines — all written down in her red notebook. All the same, she still uses her feminine intuitions.

"I think I get more from the reactions of Fred and the guests than the other panelists do," she said. "Women notice things more quickly than men." And though her intuitions have given her a great many successful guesses, they sometimes mislead her, as when she "identified" hidden guest Don Ameche as Jane Russell.

But none of this provided an angle for the CBC Times story. For that is one thing the delightful Miss Robins is not: an angle.

Then it was airtime. Fred Davis introduced the panel; Mrs. Ellen Fairclough proved to be the second challenger. Up in the control room producer Jim Guthro conducted his team like an orchestra leader—calling for camera shots, cuing the sound effects man, talking to telecine for filmed recreations of headlines and to the floor director by radio, and periodically jumping up to push the applause button for the studio audience, which button, he found out later, did not work.

At 9:30 p.m. it was all over. The guests departed, the panelists took off their make-up, the stagecrew began tearing down the seats for a commercial to be filmed later that night, and we left the studio to wander disconsolately through the snow on Yonge St., still trying to find a fresh new angle for a CBC Times feature on Front Page Challenge.

should cut artistically, according to the music and its mood, not just to show the dominant instruments."

"Kraemer is a sensitive and imaginative producer," said Susskind. "It might well be that he can successfully televise a straight classical concert—but I would have to see it to be convinced."

Currently on the CBC English network the Leonard Bernstein symphony programs come closest to a straight concert. But even here, it is difficult to disentangle the appeal of the music from the appeal of a Bernstein's personality.

With opera, the value of TV presentation was generally agreed on. Said Susskind: "Some operas can be done brilliantly by TV, even better than on the stage. For instance, Peter Grimes and Eugene Onegin—operas produced on CBC-TV—whose intimacy was perhaps actually better suited to TV than to the stage."

Said Poulton: "If I had to choose between a drama and a romantic opera on TV I would choose the drama. How can grand opera be compressed into a TV screen?— and the plots are too thin for television, But the strong storyline of Peter Grimes made it very good television indeed. Opera on TV must have the storyline as well as the music to be successful."

Franz Kraemer elaborated: "Of course TV can present effective opera. But it does change the order of importance to various elements that make up opera."

In the opera house, Kraemer argues, the order of importance is (1) orchestra and singing line; (2) the picture, of cast and set; (3) the intelligibility of the words. But in TV the order becomes (1) the picture; (2) singing line and intelligibility; (3) orchestra. These factors—which seem to embrace the intimacy mentioned by Susskind, and the storyline of Poulton—make an opera successful on TV.

Kraemer's experience at an international conference on opera and TV recently suggests that

## Famous Skier On "Open House"

WHAT is it like in the fire-lit lounge of a ski resort after a day on the slopes in the crisp brightness of a Canadian winter? Open House invites you to see for yourself Monday afternoon on CBC-TV. Guests of Anna Cameron and Fred Davis will be Fritz and Maryli Tschannen of Ste. Marguerite, Quebec, where Fritz directs a ski school.

In the lounge of the Open House ski lodge Fritz will talk about ski equipment and offer advice to would-be skiers, and then he will play the accordion while Maryli yodels. The Tschannens are Swiss, and their entertainment is the sort offered the tourists all over Switzerland-informally gay and colourful, including flag-throwing, which may sound uninspired to the uninitiated, but actually a breathtaking exhibition. Maryli will show how to make Swiss fondue, a delicious cheese after-ski dish.

Fritz has been skiing all his life. At nine he won the 115-foot jump, and at 17 was Swiss jumping champion in the Winter Olympics. From 1939-1951 he was a member of the Swiss national jumping and downhill team, ski instructor in the Swiss Army, and continued to win honours-he was the first Swiss to jump 328 feet, and was World Champion at vol-a-ski (393 feet). He also distinguished himself in rock climbing and gliding. On his first visit to Canada in 1952 he won 13 jumping contests. He coached the Swiss and Canadian teams at the Winter Olympics in Cortina and Finland, and this renewed his interest in Canada to such an extent that he brought his wife and young daughter, Heidi, to settle last year.

Fritz's musical career has run parallel to his sports activities. He studied at the Neutchatel Conservatory for eight years, and conducted an orchestra on Radio Basle, Switzerland, for seven years. He and Maryli have appeared several times on radio, TV and nightclubs in Montreal.

opera on TV is developing its own traditions. A Russian film of Eugene Onegin and a film of CBC's production of the same opera were shown side by side.

"The interesting fact to me was the great similarity in staging derived directly out of the music," said Kraemer. "For instance, in the scene where Lenski challenges Onegin, the Russian film ended with a close-up of Tatjana, so did we. Lenski's walk towards Olga and her mother before the beginning of the finale was taken at the identical moment and shot identically." On such comparisons, Kraemer sees the germ of a tradition, born out of the music.

Opera, ballet and straight concert have so far depended mainly on the adaptation of pre-existing works. "Television just has to develop its own writers and composers," said Duke.

Perhaps, too, the answer to music on television lies along completely new lines. Said Kraemer, speaking of an opera specially written for television and using electronic music: "There was no doubt as to the effectiveness of electronic music—it seems to fit much closer to the electronic picture than live music. Even the voices were manipulated in pitch—so that the whole sound-picture was unified."

Has Kraemer here destroyed his first argument? Will electronic music show up deficiencies of live music on television, and eventually replace it? Perhaps we can only experiment and see.—Brian Stewart.

Good poems have always been more or less difficult to read. In the

brought to Canada and adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Mikita in 1948.

Mikita began playing hockey in St. Catherine's Ontario, in 1953-54 as a bantam, then worked his way up throough midget ranks to the Junior Tee Pee's as a 16-yearold. He's been the main cog in the Tee Pee's winning the O.H.A. title for the past two years and many Eastern observers feel they lost their chance for the Memorial Cup when a shoulder injury sidelined Stan in the last three weeks of the 1958-59 season. At the time of his injury he was leading the league in scoring and total points. He scored 38 goals and had 59 assists in 45 games.

The cocky Mikita, who exudes confidence in his own ability, is also a strong skater and puck handler. Inclined to be almost overaggressive, Mikita has already been involved in a fist-fight with Montreal's Billy Hicke and stickswinging brawl with Henri Richard of the same club. Probably anxious to show he won't be pushed around in the big leagues, Mikita spent 59 minutes in the penalty box in the first half of the season.

A graduate of the Chicago farm system, he figures strongly in their youth movement along with rookies Billy Hay and Murray Balfour and established young stars like Bobby Hull. A centre ice player who shoots right-handed, Stan Mikita stands five feet, nine inches and weighs 165 lbs.



#### More About Dafoe

• To many former newspapermen who held Mr. J. W. Dafoe in deep veneration, last night's CBC Wednesday Night program must have been of great interest. Wonderful anecdotes were told of his life, and many intimate glimpses of his character were given, by Mr. Ferguson, Mr. Dexter, Mr. Sifton, Mr. Hutchison, Mr. Forsey, and others. They reminded me of three little incidents which, as one who knew him and worked for him for a time, I may perhaps recall.

The first was when Mr. S. J. Lotbiniere, now head of the BBC's television organization, came to Canada as the BBC's representative here. Mr. Lotbiniere's grandfather, Sir Henry Lotbiniere, had been premier of Quebec at one time, and when he travelled up through Quebec to his Toronto post, Mr. Lotbiniere had hoped to meet people who had known him. But he reached Toronto and spent several months there without having met anyone who had even heard of Sir Henry. When I took Mr. Lotbiniere around Winnipeg in the course of his first visit to the West, and introduced him to Mr. Dafoe, Mr. Dafoe's first remark was: "Why, I knew your grandfather!" I always remember "Lobby's" astonishment. "I travel through Eastern Canada, I visit a hundred places in Quebec and Ontario, and then I come out here to the West-and meet the first Canadian who knew my grandfather!" I think there were few people in the Canadian political world whom Mr. Dafoe did not know. We speak of him as a great editor, as indeed he was, but not so many know that he was also a great reporter.

The second incident occurred in the lobby of the Chateau Laurier in Ottawa, where I found Mr. Dafoe sitting alone after a long session of the Rowell-Sirois Commission, in which he played an important part. He seemed a little lonely, and when I sat down, he began to speak about old parliamentary days when he had

"covered the house"-I think for Mr. Ferguson's present paper, the Montreal Star. He spoke of Sir John Macdonald and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and of the old parliament building which had been burned down. Then I asked him: "What do you think of today's political leaders, Mr. Dafoe-do they measure up to the great men of Sir John Macdonald's day?" He took a long time to reply, and then said: "I don't think I'd better voice any opinions. You can't trust an old man's views on a subject like that. I was young when I first came up to the old House, and I had a young man's capacity for admiration and hero worship. I haven't that capacity to the same degree now, and so the less I say in the way of comparisons, the better."

And then-and this saddened me a little-one day I met him in the main branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Winnipeg (to which he had introduced me some time before), and when we had done our banking business we walked down the street together, talking about the war, then, in 1943, rounding toward its climax. It was at the corner of Portage and Main that we stopped for a moment, and Mr. Dafoe said: "Charlie, I was an optimist after the First War, but I tell you I'm going to be a pessimist after this one!" He had seen his great dream of a peace-giving League of Nations shattered, and for a moment he was crushed. But I know that had he lived, his great spirit would have revived again. His death was a great loss to Canada for a hundred reasons, but perhaps for none more important than the fact that good writing is so deperately rare in this country.-C. E. L'A., St. James, Manitoba.

### MUSIC ON RADIO

By BOYD NEEL

THIS WEEK is extremely interesting in that we can hear both the symphonies of Bizet on successive days, the second or "Roma" Symphony on Thursday afternoon from Ottawa and the first Symphony in C Major on Friday evening in the CBC Symphony concert. We are so accustomed to thinking of Bizet as a composer for the theatre that we are apt to forget his purely symphonic works, of which, it is true, there are very few. He wrote only two symphonies and one or two overtures or suites.

The first symphony is an astounding effort for a boy of seventeen. The only parallel that comes to mind is that of Mendelssohn, who wrote his Octet when he was sixteen. Shostakovich was nineteen when he wrote his first symphony. The Bizet work was lost for eighty years after its composition until D. C. Parker, a Bizet biographer, found it in the library of the Paris Conservatoire and showed it to Weingartner, who immediately performed it. It came as a revelation to musicians everywhere. It is a work of high spirits and wonderfully clear orchestration and shows the influence of the best classical masters such as Haydn and Schubert.

The second symphony became known as the Roma Symphony and is hardly ever heard today. It has nothing like the freshness and originality of the earlier work and had rather a chequered history. Bizet worked at it for years and was always changing the music and the order of the movements. In 1869 three movements were performed in Paris under the title "Fantaisie symphonique, Souvenirs de Rome." Nothing more was heard of it until 1880, when it was played in Paris under the title of "Roma, Symphonie en quatre parties."

This would have been all right had not Bizet's publishers in the same year published it as "Roma troisième suite de concert." We could have probably coped with all these changes had not the whole thing been further complicated by each movement being given a title at the 1869 performance, but at the

1880 performance all the titles were dropped, except that of the last movement which was called simply "Carnaval." The consequence is, that if we come across a piece by Bizet called "Une Chasse dans la forêt d'Ostie," we are hardly likely to know that it is the (Please turn to page 23)

## "Religious Music For Moderns"

Last fall, when Rev. Keith Clifford of Winnipeg devoted five local Morning Devotions broadcasts to a

Dr. Clifford

discussion of religious music, the audience response was loud and varied.

"What a shock!" said one listener. "I thought the CBC had cancelled another good old standby to cater to

the jukebox gang. You could have knocked me over with a feather when it turned out to be *Morning Devotions* after all."

"I found your talks most refreshing," said another listener in a letter to Dr. Clifford. "It has been a long time since I have heard anything from my church which made me stop and think."

Several women wrote in to say that they had discussed *Morning Devotions* during their morning coffee breaks.

The violent response to his programs was no surprise to Dr. Clifford. "I think it is the responsibility of the speaker on a devotional program to 'stab his listeners awake'," he said, "so I picked a topic about which people don't really do much thinking—music."

Dr. Clifford's idea is that "somehow the church has got to overcome its distinction between sacred and secular music and begin once again to express its faith in terms of the music of the people." To illustrate his point he played gospel songs by Mahalia Jackson, Rosetta Tharpe, and Della Reese, and Father Geoffrey Beaumont's notorious 20th Century Folk Mass.

Dr. Clifford will present a similar program this Sunday (January 24) on Church of the Air on the Dominion Network (see page 31 for list of stations, page 21 for program time). Entitled Religious Music for Moderns, it will include more songs by Mahalia Jackson, excerpts from Fr. Beaumont's folk mass, and some new recordings made by the Clara Ward Singers and the Back Home Choir this summer at the Newport Jazz Festival.

Keith Clifford was born in Transcona, Manitoba and educated at United College (B.A., B.D.) and the University of London (Ph.D.). During the first part of his college years he intended to become a professional musician and studied harmony, counterpoint, composition, and orchestration privately and at the University of Manitoba. He earned his way through United College by playing the trumpet in dance bands. Dr. Clifford earned his Ph.D. for advanced studies in Puritanism.

original title of the first movement of the Roma Symphony. However feeble the music may be at times, it is good to hear it now and then just to remind ourselves that even Homer occasionally nods.

Last week we heard the Rhansodie espagnole of Ravel on the Winnipeg Symphony broadcast and this week we can hear another of his best orchestral works-La Valse. This was a ballet written for Ida Rubenstein and produced by her in 1919. I can well remember her first production of this ballet and it will always remain in my memory as one or the most beautifully staged spectacles I have ever seen. At the rise of the curtain, all was shrouded in a kind of grey mist. As the waltz tune gathered shape in the music, fleeting glimpses of waltzing couples could be obtained through the fog. These became clearer and clearer exactly as the music became clearer and clearer and at the entry of the waltz tune fortissimo, shorn of all its cloudy harmonies, the whole stage suddenly leapt into a blaze of light, revealing a vast ballroom hung with huge chandelieres and filled with waltzing couples as far as eve could reach. It was one of the theatre's great moments and. once seen, never forgotten. It is a shame that these days few ballet companies can afford the expense of such a production. Ravel's Bolero was also written for Rubenstein and this was another of her wonderful productions. One is apt to forget how good a ballet the Bolero is, so coarsened and cheapened has it been by "popular' treatment.

Ruth Springford and Sandy Webster.

The play follows Manion from his first scared trip to sea at 14, so young and thin he "might be knocked down by spindrift," but determined to follow in the steps of his father, who "felt the ocean in his bone, dreamed about whales, walked with the heave and ho of a ship in his legs. Caught it off him when I was a nipper, watched him go, watched that sea from my window. Ten I was and he never came back. Then my mother started watching me. Never a word said and that sea started pulling. Never a word said and that silence like a key in a door and hands folded in a lap. Then it had me, and my eyes were full of sea. Those tall ships. Which was mine?"

It follows him through the early days of his marriage, the First World War, and the births of his children, through the lean years, when 21,600 sailors were hardbound in one port, collecting their dole and yearning for the arms of their true love, the fickle, possessive, beguiling, vicious sea. And then through the Second World War, when the voice of the sea warned: "Look out for a fish that's new to the sea, sailor. Typhoons, trade winds, any kind of squall or hurricane. Lost mountains of ice. All proper to a sea. This fish is grey, with wheels in belly and a bright eye looking for a sailorman."



ship's stokers reeling up the ladder to safety, dragging the badly wounded Manion with them. Lashed to a raft he drifted in and out of consciousness for days, reliving his past with an intensity puzzling to his three mates. But for the CBC Wednesday Night audience it should explain much about the call of the sea, a love story ages old.

Its author, Iames Hanley, has been described by fellow novelist Henry Green as "far and away the best writer of the sea and of seafaring men since Conrad, and indeed in my opinion is much superior to him." This would please Hanley. He disliked Conrad, who saw the ship from the officers' deck. Hanley writes from first - hand knowledge of the dirt, sweat and rough courage of the stokehold. Born in Dublin of poor workingclass parents, he left school at 13 and took to the sea. From 1914-24 he saw the best and the worst of the sailor's life. Then he became a landlubber, as butcher, cook, railwayman, clerk and postman for several years, scribbling down his experiences and recollections in his spare time, and finally breaking into journalism.

His first novel came out in 1930, and after that he managed to live by his writing alone. At first his books were rather formal and stilted, but gradually he developed his well-known lean, roughewn, unaffected style, concentrating on simple action, naturalistic settings and ordinary people with great understanding and imagination.

"The more insignificant a person is in this whirlpool of industrialized and civilized society," he says, "the more important he is for me." He has a special gift for exciting pity and terror, but no matter how mad the setting, he is always reasonable.

Hanley married a niece of the Earl of Ancaster, and now lives and writes in a Welsh cottage by the sea that has dominated his novels, his characters and him too.

If and when we are advertized, expertized, democratized, togetherized, and deodorized into a race of happily quacking machines . . . then indeed poetry will be out of date. Machines not only don't need poetry; they don't deserve it."—Ian Sowton of Edmonton on "University Talks."

## CAMEOS

Some notes on a unique drama series and on this week's program

Chambers' Encyclopedia defines a cameo as "an engraved gem in which the figure or subject is carved in relief." Translated into the spoken word, a cameo becomes a small dramatic portrait of a person, a mood, an event, an attitude, exquisitely raised against a delicate background—a producer's, writer's and actor's dream.

Friday nights on CBC radio Sandy Stewart produces *Cameos* with the assistance of top actors, writers and musicians who, he says, are scrambling for the opportunity to contribute to this vivid little show, which began lan. 1.

It isn't the money that attracts them, for Stewart's budget is small. It's the extremely high writing and performing standards he has set, the opportunity to contribute to a series of dramas that mean something emotionally or socially. But don't get the idea that this series preaches, or tries to prove anything. Its only purpose is entertainment, but it has things to say of great beauty, importance and urgency.

Stewart is working with a definite format, and consequently some top-flight scripts by wellknown authors have been turned down because they did not fit. Others have been returned to their

authors for improvements to make them conform exactly to the intimate style of *Cameos*.

"All are first performances," Stewart says. "We're giving writers a medium of expression they can't find anywhere else and in dimensions not available in any other radio or TV series. They aren't limited to cameos of people. Their portraits can cover fear, loneliness, a storm, a cloud — the horizon is wide. Three out of four of our scripts are by Canadians."

In his background music composer - conductor Morris Surdin uses few instruments — maybe just a trombone and a guitar, to complement the small casts which Stewart is insisting on so he can devote more time to direction, to developing characterization and mood,

Occasionally, he tells us, he lets the cast run the show, and the result is fresh, stimulating and often surprising. This is only possible, of course, because he works with performers who are not hired just for their voices or acting experience alone, but because they bring a special bonus to the show. "With Tommy Tweed it's his rich sense of humour," Stewart says. "He can make the most casually amusing line seem uproariously funny. With John Drainie it's his painstaking conscientiousness. And there are other special qualities available only in such actors as Barry Morse, Lloyd Bochner, Mayor Moore and others."

King and Stewart have some mystifying and entertaining moments in store for the Cameos audience, in the form of a portrait of a compulsion.
