Brass Pounder from Illinois

IT'S always disappointing when a lion of a man turns out to look like a mouse. Not so Sir William Cornelius Van Horne, a big-thinkbig-hearted, barrel-chested bear of a fellow with a beard as thick as a mop, and a massive head well furnished with an elegant nose and piercing blue eyes. Herculean tasks were irresistible to him. He took on the toughest railroad job in history, and with imagination and two-fisted grit not only pushed the CPR through 2,500 miles of wild, unprotected territory, but did it five years sooner than his engineers' most optimistic estimate.

Van Horne snapped through masses of red tape with the energy of one of his own steam engines, drove himself as hard as any of his rail-heavers. Profanity, charm, bluff—he used them all. After a 10-hour day of back-breaking work in blistering heat one of his Irish laborers wrote home to his wife: "I thought (it) would kill me, but that damn Dutchman makes it all seem a great lark—and damned if he might not be right!"

Not bad for a man who had been a lazy hulk of a lad, the despair of his teachers, and whose main interest was eating. All his life he maintained that "good food is the cure for most ills," and delighted in ordering full-course dinners for two and then eating them both himself. When his lawyer father died and the job of family provider fell on the broad but reluctant shoulders of young William, he was drawn to the telegraph office in his home town of Joliet, Illinois-not because telegraphy interested him a bit, but because Illinois' finest continuous poker-game went on there with a rat-a-tat background of Morse Code, and what 14-yearold messenger boy could resist that? It wasn't long before his curiosity about what all those dots and dashes were saying got the better of him. Between running errands he learned Morse and within months had worked up such a speed that he was offered a telegrapher's job. Not satisfied with that he began to learn everyone else's job as well, and by the time he was 17 he could take over for anyone from dispatcher to roadmaster. The railroad bug had bitten him thoroughly, and he had to follow the steel lines stretching ahead towards the presidency of the longest railway in the world, wealth, power and a title.

But it was not dreams of these prizes that drove him on. It was the challenge of each new day. And for the next 20 years he made the most of them. Rising steadily in one mid-western railroad company after another, he eventually became general manager of the bankrupt Southern Minnesota Rail-

" $\mathbf{A}^{ ext{N}}$ OLD CODGER, rampant, but still learning."

If ours were still the age of heraldry, these are the words Aldous Huxley says he would choose for his crest and motto.

At 65 he has one of the roomiest contemporary minds, housing the most astonishing assortment of ideas and facts, which he chews on and draws out into provocative conclusions. He used to take a volume of the Britannica with him when he set out on a journey, and read it from cover to cover. He is a long (6' 4½") crane-like, skinny man with round shoulders and a wrinkled brow, straining through thick glasses on promenade decks and railway carriages in all sorts of outlandish places.

Failing sight has plagued and spurred him on for nearly half a century. "The most important single event in my life," he says, "was unquestionably the onset of eye trouble. This had the effect of isolating me during my years of adolescence, and of forcing me to live very largely on my own inner resources. I have never been a soldier, never indulged in bull fighting or lion shooting or rock climbing. Life, to misquote the title of a celebrated soap opera, can be uneventful. Uneventful. but still remarkably interesting.'

It began in Goldalming, Surrey, in 1894, in the reflection of illustrious ancestors - novelist Mrs. Humphrey Ward, an aunt; poetcritic Matthew Arnold, a great uncle; and biologist Thomas Henry Huxley and educator Thomas Arnold, grandparents. Aldous went to Eton on a scholarship, intending to become a doctor, but at 17 contracted keratitis, and within a few months was almost completely blind. He faced this crisis with spirit - learned Braille, concentrated on music and books, and studied with tutors. At 18 he wrote his first complete novel on a Braille typewriter but it disappeared in the shuffle of a lively family. After two years one eye had improved enough for him to read with the help of a powerful magnifying glass, so he went to Oxford and at 21 took his degree in English literature and philology.

He tried his hand at a number of things - as a tree-cutter, civil servant and teacher, and then found his niche in journalism as drama, music, art and book critic and essavist. When he had accumulated a little money he swept his wife, Maria Nys, a Belgian who had come to England as a refugee, and their son Matthew off to live in a warmer climate - Italy (1923-30) and the south of France (1930-35), and on side trips to India, the Dutch Indies, Central America and the U.S.A. They returned to the States in the spring of 1937, and spent seven months driving leisurely toward Los Angeles, where a series of lucky chances led to his hearing of a special method of evetraining devised by the late Dr. W. H. Bates of New York. Huxley worked with Bates' teachers and his sight improved greatly.

In Hollywood he met Sam Goldwyn, who saluted him with: "I understand you're practically a genius," and put him to work on a film version of *Madame Curie* for Greta Garbo. When it was almost finished Huxley told the story to an MGM producer, who cried in horror: "Jeeze, who's going to go for a dame who goes for chemistry?" and that was the end of the scenario. But Huxley got to

first base with others, among them his successful A Woman's Vengeance, a treatment of The Gioconda Smile.

Huxley fell in love with the west coast atmosphere, and he has been there ever since. Climb up to his airy home perched on a secluded height in Beverly Hills, with a magnificent view from the patio, and you will find him - a tweedjacketed, string bean of a figure, slouched in a deep arm-chair, restless feet swinging continuously, his long, slender hands punctuating his remarks, while his sensitive face flashes expressions like an eager schoolboy. Caustic wit darts through his conversation, and although he is an extremely friendly man, he also has the remoteness of the mystic, which gives his visitor the feeling that there is much more there to be plumbed than has been done so far in his 40-odd books-novels (10 of them still in print), essays, biographies, histories, poetry, and plays.

Many critics feel that his real genius is as an essayist. Huxley likes to quote his friend D. H. Lawrence on the novel versus the essay: "In the novel ideas can be expressed over the whole (musical) scale. The essay expresses things in terms of the top three notes of

an octave." But it was as a novelist that he first became well known.

His first novels-Chrome Yellow. Antic Hay, Point Counterpoint, showed him up as a romantic disillusioned with society. His disillusionment grew into acute disappointment in Brave New World, his novel about a particularly revolting Utopia, and eventually, in disgust, he went over to the camp of the Eastern mystics. His eclectic philosophy has elements of Buddhism, Christianity, and works of the great contemplatives; his visit to India whipped up his early interest and he took pains to explore many new channels of mystic thought, among them witchcraft, on which he is something of an authority. He plans a return visit to India in the near future, for research on extrasensory perception. Lately he has been doing scientific research on the effects of new drugs, with himself as principal guinea pig. He has written extensively on the raptures of hallucinations produced by the drug mescalin.

Susan Fletcher of the CBC's Project '60 staff had long wanted to arrange for an interview with Huxley. She has been hearing about the Huxley family for years - her father was at Oxford with Julian, Aldous' brother, and she is a close friend of another Huxley relativebut she had never met Aldous and wasn't sure how to approach him. She asked the advice of Dr. Humphrey Osmond, well-known Saskatchewan psychiatrist who had participated in an earlier Project '60 program. He has shared some of Huxley's experiments with mescalin, and knows him well, and he suggested she 'phone Huxley, which she did.

"We talked for an hour," she told us, "and Mr. Huxley was not only absolutely enchanting but delighted to oblige with an interview, because he thinks the CBC does some extremely intelligent work. He was a little worried about who would do the interview, because some American network had once sent 'an unintelligent man who knew nothing' to ask questions, and he had resolved never to grant a broadcast interview again. 'Life is rather short," he said, "and I must use my time to the best advantage." But he relaxed completely when I told him that Alistair Cooke, American correspondent for the Guardian of Manchester, would conduct the interview. He had wanted to meet Cooke for some time."

During their conversation Huxley mentioned that his biologist brother, Julian, was going out to visit him in California for Christmas the first time in years. Susan Fletcher mentioned this to Cliff Solway, producer of CBC-TV's Background, and the result is that Background will present a filmed interview between Cooke and the Huxley brothers, and, without duplicating more than one question, Project '60 will present an hour-long conversation between Cooke and Aldous Huxley, in which they run the gamut from art to eyes to relatives, friends, politics, sociology, writing (a comparison between Brave New World then and now), while avoiding what Huxley calls the American sort of question: What do you eat

for breakfast? In his gentle reflective way, Huxley roams all over his life, plucking out ideas here and there and discussing them and himself objectively. Miss Fletcher says "he makes many references to colour. Because his eyesight is so poor he has a powerful mental grasp of colour, and he speaks of it more as a painter would."

The interview was recorded in his California home and all the while, says Solway, who produced both radio and TV interviews "his blonde wife, Italian pianist Laura Archera (his first wife died some years ago) flitted gaily about taking pictures with a camera loaded with gimmicks, against a background of Huxley's deep remarks. It was quite amusing. I didn't have much time to look around, but I saw that the house was very tastefully furnished in a mixture of modern and classical styles, with pieces of European art work to add an international flavour."

At the end of the interview Huxley said: "I don't know if I gave listeners in Canada what they wanted to hear, but I did say what I wanted to say."

The filmed interview for Background was made in a Hollywood studio, with the two Huxlevs lounging in comfortable chairs. Both Huxley wives sat out of camera range, intensely interested in all that was going on. The conversation was less personal than for Project '60, concentrating on aspects of East-West problems. Julian took a dry, clipped, scientific approach to each subject. Aldous looked at them from a more philosophical angle. Yet Julian thinks Aldous is the realist in the family.

Whether realist or mystic, Aldous is bent on surviving the high pressure of modern living for many more years of study and experiment, and to this end was last heard from in a plush western health clinic where, amid mudpacks and calorie counters he was trying every concoction for long-evity except the carp intestines which he recommended in his satirical novel, After Many a Summer Dies the Swan.

Broadcasting

-A greater challenge than ever

(Conclusion of an address by CBC president J. Alphonse Ouimet to the Canadian Club of Toronto.—Continued from last week's CBC Times)

Freedom in Broadcasting

I HAVE outlined the four basic principles on which we in CBC base the scope of our service, but there is more to broadcasting than its scope. There is the absolutely vital question of *your* rights as listeners and viewers. Because you do have rights in broadcasting. You may not think so when frustration over some program brings about an urge to throw the broadcasting station, the set, and anything else handy into Lake Ontario. But you do.

I think you have the basic right to a freedom of choice from broadcasting, whether this comes from the CBC, any single station, or a combination of stations.

I am interested in maintaining your freedom of choice from the CBC. I am interested as an individual and as a member of the CBC Board of Directors, each of whom shares this interest in freedom and each of whom is, in essence, a trustee for the public.

And I am interested in the freedom of broadcasting as well as your freedom of choice.

I think they are very much the same thing in some respects, and I should like to explain what I mean by broadcasting freedom. It is something to which more and more attention is being given around the world.

I believe freedom in broadcasting means the basic right of the individual to receive all significant views, factually, without comment, and without bias or distortion.

It means the basic right of the individual to hear a variety of viewpoints about topics of current interest, to have the main points of view presented fairly, by a system or a service which is completely independent of control by any one element of our society.

I believe freedom in broadcasting also means that if a subject is of concern to a significant section of the population, the broadcaster should provide a platform for discussion of that subject, whether the subject is controversial or not. This was the subject of a recent public statement by the CBC Board of Directors.

In other words, within the limits of good taste, and cognizant of the responsibilities of the broadcaster, there should be no taboos, no sacred cows, no areas of discussion which are automatically blanked out as 'things we just don't talk about'.

With this freedom in broadcasting goes a tremendous responsibility for the broadcaster. We must not overlook it. Freedom does not mean licence. The broadcaster must be continuously aware that he has a responsibility in terms of time and method of presentation, as well as in program content. These responsibilities are not incompatible with broadcasting freedom—they just make the broadcaster's life more difficult.

It may be argued that the sort of broadcasting I'm talking about constantly gets CBC into trouble with individuals or special interest groups. Of course it does. We are constantly hearing from people who do not agree with the views which other people have expressed on our networks. But

ada's most brilliant singers have been included in the cast.

Massenet and his librettists, Henri Meilhac and Philippe Gille, wrote Manon in the "operacomique" form, with passages of dialogue interspersed throughout the action. The opera therefore lends itself to producer Françoys Bernier's realistic play-with-music approach to TV opera, with which he hopes to achieve a Manon faithful to Massenet's romantic conception.

"We will try," says Bernier, "to give Manon the appearance of reality, to avoid the Grand Opera Style, and to transmit the real emotion and truth of Manon's story. Through the camera eye Bernier wll be able to delineate the action without the need for the broad operatic acting style, without many of the conventions of grand opera, and without the need to people an enormous stage."

The Story

To be blunt about it, in 20thcentury terms Manon was pretty much a juvenile delinquent; she

"But that was in another country, and besides, the wench is dead," and amorality, if it is highly placed, appears to gain in respectability as it retreats in time.

It is 1725. The Sun King has been in his grave for 10 years and his grandson, Louis XV, has been on the throne for two years. At the age of 15 he is presiding over an aristocracy of "exquisite corruption."

Into the sparkle and gaiety of 18th century France, its intrigues and amours, Massenet projects his Manon, a glamorous, impulsive, beautiful creature, thirsty for the wine of life, dazzled by the gaiety and gallantry around her. But Manon's pursuit of pleasure can end only in disaster.

On her way to a convent, to which she is being sent against her will, the 16-year-old Manon meets des Grieux in the courtyard of an inn. Des Grieux himself is pledged to the priesthood, but they fall in love and escape to Paris. Here they live happily until des Grieux's father abducts his son to break up the liason.

Manon is not unhappy at this, and she becomes the pampered mistress of Brétigny, a rich young nobleman. Two years later Brétigny has grown cold toward her, and hearing that des Grieux has returned to the church, Manon flies to the monastry and persuades him to go away with her.

It is too late for happiness, however, and des Grieux, in financial difficulties because of Manon's extravagance, takes to gambling. In the Hotel de Transylvanie he is accused of cheating at cards, with Manon as his accomplice.

The fifth act of *Manon* finds des Grieux freed from the police through the influence of his father. Learning that Manon is to be deported to New France as a dissiplute woman, des Grieux attempts to rescue her. Ill and exhausted by the life she has led, Manon arrives at Le Havre and dies in the arms of des Grieux.

MUSIC ON RADIO

by BOYD NEEL

BUSONI was one of the most interesting musical characters interesting musical characters of the last hundred years. Famous as a concert pianist at the begin-ning of this century, he regarded himself primarily as a composer, but, as to the worth of his compositions, the musical world at large has not yet come to any final decision. Busoni was a difficult and uncompromising person, a fact which did not help the propagation of his compositions, and a person who always said exactly what he thought. A certain pianist of undefinable nationality came and pestered him for a testimonial. She insisted on playing to him and chose a work of Albeniz. Rusoni's remark afterwards was that "if there is anything Spanish about it, it must have been the Inquisition."

Much of his composing life was spent working at his great opera *Doctor Faust*, and on Friday evening the CBC Symphony will play two excerpts from the opera — the *Sarabande* and the *Cortege*, both of which actually were performed in public long before the whole opera was finished. When Furtwangler conducted them in 1923 they had an extremely hostile reception.

Busoni died before the opera was completed and his pupil, Jarnach, finished the score. The work was finally produced at Dresden in 1925, but it was received with respect rather than with enthusiasm, and I think only about four performances were given.

The BBC has recently given a concert performance of it in London, but it is seldom seen on the stage and will probably always remain somewhat of a museum piece. The Sarabande and Cortege are quite often to be heard at concerts these days, but the rest of Busoni's music seems almost to have passed into oblivion. It is not

surprising that people think twice before performing works like his great Piano Concerto which takes an hour and a quarter to play and requires a male chorus in the last movement, but it would be very interesting if the CBC could let us hear a bit more of this strange man's music now and then.

At the beginning of this century there was a large number of Spanish composers living in Paris-men like Manuel de Falla, Turina and Granados-who formed a very interesting Spanish colony. They were attracted to the French capital by such men as Debussy, Dukas and Ravel, but although they became much under the influence of these French composers, the Spanish group remained Spanish and, when it was suggested that de Falla became a naturalized Frenchman, he refused. Returning to Spain at the beginning of the first world war he produced a series of works of intensely national character and it is interesting to note how, although he had absorbed all the influence from which he could benefit during his time in France, he could yet revert to the national style of his own country after his return.

Turina returned to Spain about the same time and was also very prominent in the forming of the Spanish School, although he never achieved quite the world wide renown of his contemporary. On Sunday afternoon (CBK and CBX only) we can hear his Piano Ouartet in A minor, opus 67, and on the same evening we can hear the Vancouver Symphony play what is probably the most famous work of de Falla: Nights in the Gardens of Spain. This is an excellent opportunity to compare the work of these famous compatriots.

The de Falla work is for piano and orchestra and one of the most interesting things about the writing for the solo instrument is the obvious influence of Dominico Scarlatti, who spent many years in Spain and was regarded as the founder of a Spanish style in keyboard music. This beautiful work, which recalls the poetical atmos-

In his first talk Mr. Stewart will give a general description of the developments in Soviet writing since the revolution. The second talk will deal with the writing of The First Decade - "formative vears in every phase of Soviet life." The third talk will deal with Regimentation and Stalinism, and with the works of Leonid Leonov ("a sensitive man whose aim has always been to tell the truth about life as he saw it") in particular. In his final talk, entitled The Thaw, Mr. Stewart will discuss "the novel which most critics believe is the finest work of fiction produced by a Soviet writer"-Mikhail Sholokhov's The Quiet Don.

Or we assume that anything Soviet is written in Russian-a language which looks prodigiously difficult. Both notions are inaccurate. To be sure, some Soviet writing is obtrusively propagandistic, but not all of it. A circumspect reader can find something of value in most of the books he reads.'

as long as these programs provide a fair balance for expression of opinion, as long as CBC maintains its integrity and remains unbiased, and as long as CBC maintains its program independence and responsibility, then I do not think we are very far off the right

If there should come a day when CBC programming of this kind does not raise differences of opinion, then something will have gone very wrong -either with the system, or with human nature.

There have been times during the last twenty-five years when the strong currents which eddy about our democratic life have seemed about to threaten some of the freedoms of our broadcasting system. Perhaps these unorganized and sporadic manifestations are inevitable in a democracy such as ours, human nature being human nature. I would be the last to say that 'it can't happen here'. And yet I think most Canadians, having seen what has happened in other countries, have realized that the freedom of their national broadcasting service is one of their most precious assets.

I know of no intentional efforts to dominate the CBC. Wilful threats to broadcasting freedoms are few and far between, and our national broadcasting service has never succumbed to political or commercial control.

From its inception the Corporation has felt that its mandate from Parliament was clearly intended to make it the right and the duty of the CBC to run its own business in the public interest. As a result, I am sure you will not consider me guilty of corporate immodesty if I claim that your

Canadian Broadcasting Corporation has a reputation for honesty, fairness, and impartiality in its programming. We intend to maintain that reputation.

I think there is a good deal to be said to the credit of our Canadian sponsors and advertising agencies who have gone along with us in our production policies. We don't always see eye to eye on details, but I think our understanding on principles is not only clear, but highly and mutually acceptable. They, too, contribute much to the success of our Canadian system.

This is the artistic freedom which prevails within our national broadcasting service. It has been responsible for greatly enriching our national life. It has brought international recognition to Canadian writers and artists, and to the CBC and its creative people.

It is a prime function of the CBC to encourage this creativity through providing opportunities for its expression. This is a responsibility which must be shared by all broadcasters.

The B.B.G. has told broadcasters that in two years their program schedules must have a minimum of 55 per cent Canadian content. This provides a welcome quantity framework for all broadcasters. I hope to see many broadcasters exceeding that minimum.

It is now up to the broadcasters to provide the *quality* factor. Canadian programming is not enough. It must be good Canadian programming, and it must provide for those programs in which we express our freedom to create

Speaking for the CBC, and I venture to speak in the same way for a great many private broadcasters in Canada, I say that Canadian broadcasters can do the job. Every season our Canadian television and radio get better. Today we are producing many top quality programs with a great deal of top quality talent which is Canadian. I believe we still have a great talent potential in this country. All it needs is the opportunity to develop. If broadcasting does not provide the opportunities, who will?

Having established the opportunity, the cardinal factor in the development of Canadian talent lies in the creation and preservation of a creative atmosphere in which talent can develop and mature. We have such a situation within Canada, and it is our job to maintain it.

way, and within three years settled it so solidly on its ties that companies were elbowing for position in the line-up to incorporate it.

Now his story switches to the sprawling, rugged land to the north, where British Columbia had joined Confederation on condition that a railway linking east and west should be completed in 10 years. The time limit was almost up, only 200 miles of track had been completed, and B.C. was threatening to leave the family group. Something drastic had to be done, and at once. Who was big enough to take on this pioneering job with nearly all the odds against him?

Someone suggested a shrewd, bold, railway wizard below the border, and Van Horne was offered the largest salary ever paid in the West. Chewing on a cigar and looking as determined as a bulldog, he tackled North America's most difficult building proposition on New Year's Day, 1881. He was just 37.

Five hundred miles the first summer, 800 the next, the double line of rails pushed through the dusty prairie, forests, muskeg, around lakes, the sweating workgangs thwarted by floods, icy snowstorms, the threat of sudden death through misplaced dynamite or slow death through dysentery. And then the mountains and gorges towered and yawned menacingly in their path. Still Van Horne pushed on, his mighty and evershifting army of picks and shovels encouraged by his good cheer and dogged determination. He could paddle a canoe all day, take a 10mile walk and then challenge younger men to a foot-race. Nothing fazed him-Indian threats, epi-

demics, political stumbling blocks, slander. He threw government surveys out the window and took his line north of Lake Superior, not south, and crossed the Rockies by the Kicking Horse Pass instead of the northern route recommended by a brace of top government surveyors. He fed and housed his men well and they bit into the wilderness like modern bulldozers.

There were still 300 miles of track to lay in 1884 when the company went bankrupt. With an election in the offing, the government was afraid to grant further loans, but Van Horne kept the news from his men and the railroad pressed on. The Second Riel Rebellion was their life-saver. During the first revolt in 1870 it had taken troops three months to reach the west. Van Horne guaranteed to get them there in two weeks, and did it, filling rail gaps with fast sleighs and the soldiers with hot turkey dinners. The revolt was quickly stamped out, and eventually the necessary railroad loan was forthcoming.

At Craigellachie, B.C., on November 7, 1885, Van Horne completed his gigantic task with little fanfare. He had announced that there would be no banquet and no golden spike. "The last spike," he said, "will be just as good an iron ore as any on the road," and if financier Donald A. Smith had not happened along at the right time to hammer it in, it would have been done by the navvy on the

In 1888 Van Horne became president of the line, amassed a fortune, was knighted by Queen Victoria in 1894, and after 11 years resigned from the CPR presidency because things were going too smoothly and he was getting bored. Off he went in search of a

Back home in Montreal other projects caught his eye-the more difficult the better-and he took time to indulge his great interest in art, both as a painter and collector. When his first illness killed him in 1915 his whole railway empire stopped for five minutes in his honour, and the Cubans declared a day of mourning.

A DAY WITH CHURCHILL

Michael St. Denis, Inspector-General of the French Theatre, recalls the day he spent with Winston Churchill soon after the fall of France in 1940. Sir Winston (then Mr. Churchill, Prime Minister of Britain), had prepared a message to the people of France, to be broadcast in French on the BBC program, Les Francais Parlent aux Français. St. Denis' job was to translate Churchill's message into French. St. Denis recalls that Churchill's accent was far from perfect. It was not French as a Frenchman would speak it. And deliberately so: "What I want is to be understood as I am, not as you are; don't make it too correct," he kept insisting to tonight's speaker. The translation was prepared over dinner and in an air raid shelter. phere of some of the most lovely of the famous gardens of the country, is in three movements. The first, bearing the title of "In the Generalife," evokes the masters of the ancient Moorish garden in Granada known as the Generalife, which, with its fountains, its ageold cypresses and lofty viewpoint. dates back at least to the early 14th century. The second movement, "Dance in the Distance," ends with a wonderful bit of orchestration: a long roll on a cymbal struck by a drum stick while muted trumpets and English horn echo the main theme very softly. In the third movement the scene changes to the hill gardens on the mountain slopes surrounding Cordova. Altogether this work is unique among the concerto-type compositions of the present century.

Peggy MacFarlane In Sports Debut

Interview with one of Canada's great coaches
—now Alberta's Lieutenant-Governor

Peggy MacFarlane, CBC's morning commentator in Alberta, makes her debut as a sportscaster this Saturday on Bob Moir's *Prairie Sports Final*.

Peggy will interview the Hon. Percy J. Page, the new lieutenant-governor of Alberta, who from 1914 to 1940 was coach of the Edmonton Commercial Grads, the greatest women's basketball team ever assembled. By the time the team disbanded (because of lack of competition) it had won 502 out of 522 games, including four unofficial Olympic championships.

Mr. Page coached the girls in more than basketball. "You're a lady before you're a Grad," was a favourite saying. When two Grads were divorced Mr. Page refused to have them at team reunions. Winnie Martin, captain of the 1924 Olympic champions, and now the wife of a British Columbia doctor, went on to win a typing championship as well. Her typing coach?—Percy Page!

In her first attempt as a sports reporter Peggy MacFarlane will talk with Mr. Page about many of his experiences as a teacher, coach, and now, leading citizen of his province.

About half of this week's *Prairie* Sports Final will be devoted to the interview. The program is heard at 6 p.m. in Manitoba, 5 p.m. in Saskatchewan and Alberta. David Cruickshank is producer.

In September, 1959, CBC's weekly average for the number of performers used in our programming was over 1,700. These 1,700 people included writers, actors and actresses, musicians and artists of various kinds, as well as commentators and discussion program participants, and so on. Some were excellent, some were fair, and some were not so good. Each of them contributed in some way to our national and cultural life.

In the seven years of Canadian television, for example, we have developed not only mature artists in the performing, production, and writing fields, but also experts in graphics, stage design, costuming, camera artisty, and the many talents which go

And this, in the eyes of the world, is a remarkable achievement. We have every reason and every right to be proud of our broadcasting, whether in English or in French. It has enriched our two main cultures.

And yet despite these achieves

And yet, despite these achievements, I believe the true dawn of Canadian television—of mature Canadian television—is just beginning to break. Why? Because of the surges of truly excellent programming—programs of substance—which are appearing with increasing frequency.

We have come far in seven years Yet we should remember that the first seven years of the CBC's national broadcasting service in radio took us just up to 1943. That was the year when Canadian radio really began to flourish, to grow up, and to stand on its own feet as something unique and outstanding in the world.

I know our people will do no less in television. More and more, I see Canadian television becoming more exciting, varied, and strong; more vigorous, more polished, more mature, and more sought after as a model for other countries—much as our Canadian radio has become a model in nany respects.

We have built a firm foundation. In our national broadcasting we have a complete service linking all parts of the country through programs and through physical resources; it is predominantly Canadian in content and character; it serves equitably the two main cultures; you, the audience, have a freedom of choice; there is freedom to create.

Let's keep it that way.
