Hollywood's Boy Genius

BERNARD BRADEN interviews ORSON WELLES February 25 and March 3

E VERYBODY knows about Orson Welles. As a boy genius he scared half of the United States with his realistic radio play *War* of the Worlds. Then he directed and starred in Citizen Kane which added startling new techniques to film production. And since then he has, artistically speaking, gone steadily downhill, still playing the boy genius (though now in his forties), still spreading his talents too thin over the entire field of theatre and film. Everybody knows all this.

One exception to this generalization is Welles himself. He feels he started going down hill artistically long before *Citizen Kane*.

"The first play I did (which was in Ireland) I made really the biggest success of my life. Everything since then has been downhill," he tells Bernard Braden in a Close-Un interview to be seen in two parts this Thursday and next on CBC-TV. "A newspaper came out to review the second play I did and said 'Well, Orson Welles is a bitter disappointment to those of us who looked to him to lead the Irish theatre.' I've been a bitter disappointment to people in showbusiness for about thirty years now."

Throughout the interview Welles shows a fascinating ability to ward off critical attacks upon his work by wholeheartedly joining the attackers. For instance, it has been said that the greatness of *Citizen Kane* was due more to the lucky meeting of various new film techniques, rather than to any contribution by Welles, who was almost entirely ignorant of film techniques. Welles agrees-almost.

"I'd never been on the set before my first day directing a picture. I simply didn't know, except theoretically, how it should be done... The first day I arrived I thought after years of directing in

the theatre that the lights were set by the director, since they are in the theatre, so I said this is where it will be, now let's move this light over there and so on, and I set the lights. Behind me the cameraman was motioning to all the people to shut up, let him go ahead. . . . I worked five days like that until somebody told me and I realized what a terrible thing I was doing, and the cameraman was furious that I'd been told. It's a great tribute to him I think. . . .

"Then I kept on asking for things which in my ignorance I didn't know were impossible to do. I didn't deliberately set out to invent anything. It just seemed to me, why not? That was the great gift I brought to Kane-ignorance."

The interview crackles with unconventional views which help explain the enigma of Orson Welles:

"I don't regard myself as fundamentally a professional, you know. I'm basically an adventurer. And those people who are serious and professional, truly and deeply serious at the expense of every other value in life, are probably the people who make the biggest contribution in art. I certainly wouldn't like to be one of them."

"Do you think that in dividing yourself in the way you have you are diffusing your contribution to art?" asked Braden.

"Probably, but that is not a bad thing for me. It might be a bad (*Please turn to page* 15)

On Project '60

The Sound of Rodgers and Hammerstein

At the risk of sounding absurd. I find it difficult to write about Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein because it is too easytoo easy to roll off a long list of compliments and so difficult to make any observations less than complimentary. I happen to like their work very much, as do millions of others, and now that I have spent some time with them putting together a double barrelled sound profile for Project '60 I like them as people. It would be difficult not to, both are gentlemen of pleasant manner and absorbing conversation.

The harshest thing one could say about Rodgers and Hammerstein is that they seem too good to be true. They both come from good families, they both have university educations, they both behave in a normal, respectable way and this shines through in their work.

The only thing the New York critics have found to criticize in their new show *The Sound of Music* is that it is all too nice and agreable. Each week at the Lunt-Fontanne Theatre on 46th Street, tens of thousands of people are discovering the critics to be right but not finding it a point to criticize.

These are supposed to be sick times, and Rodgers and Hammerstein are not sick. The upholders of the sick-nik creed have probably not tried to get tickets to see *The Sound of Music* or any of the other eight productions these gentlemen have supplied since 1943.

Add to the remarkable ease with which Rodgers and Hammerstein get along - professionally and personally - these coincidences: they are both native New Yorkers who a t t e n d e d Columbia University, they both have fathers named William, they both have wives named Dorothy (whom they met in the same year), and they each

have two children. The main differences would appear to be that the Rodgers children are girls and the Hammerstein children are boys and Hammerstein is seven years older and about one foot taller than Rodgers.

Another considerable coincidence is that they began their separate careers in the same year – 1920. Rodgers' first show, along with Lorenz Hart, was *Poor Little Ritz Girl* while Hammerstein's initial effort was writing the lyrics for the musical comedy *Always You*; Herbert Stothart did the music.

The first big success of Rodgers and Hart was *The Garrick Gaieties* in 1925. From then until 1942 they wrote 23 other musical comedies for Broadway and three for the London stage, plus a number of scores for motion pictures.

During those same years Oscar Hammerstein was writing material for the stage and screen with a number of outstanding composers –Vincent Youmans, George Gershwin, Rudolf Friml, Jerome Kern, Sigmund Romberg. He even collaborated, in a sense, with Georges Bizet-on Carmen Jones, Hammerstein's deep-south version of the opera. The most successful of his collaborations were *Rose Marie*, *The Desert Song*, *Show Boat* and *New Moon*. He was also associated with many failures whereas Rodgers never knew anything but success or relative degrees of it.

When it was no longer possible to work with Hart, Rodgers looked for a new man and decided upon Hammerstein. They were no strangers; in fact they had even written a few songs together for amateur productions at Columbia some 25 years previously.

This new partnership came about in 1942. Hammerstein's career had been on a downward trend for several years and along Broadway there was the feeling that Rodgers wouldn't be able to adapt himself to a new and very different lyricist after all those years with Hart. After some months of doubt and negative pressure Oklahoma finally reached the boards. That was April of 1943. Seventeen years and a hundred songs later Mr. Rodgers and Mr. Hammerstein are still getting along beautifully.

A Declaration Of Love For The World

Program notes on Mahler's "Song of the Earth," by DR. HEINZ UNGER, who will conduct it this week on CBC Wednesday Night

A "Symphony for Tenor, Con-tralto and Orchestra" is Mahler's own designation for The Song of Earth. Thus the composer indicates that to him, this is not to be considered a cycle of six songs, but rather an entity carried by one underlying idea. What idea?

Not infrequently have listeners refused to accept the uplifting message of this work, because deceived by its moments of melancholy and resignation, they considered it to express a philosophy of pessimism. This is understandable if one considers nothing but the original texts of some of the poems which Mahler used. The Song of the Earth however has to be taken as a whole to be understood. Major and very decisive

textual alterations — omissions and additions — of the original poems by Mahler himself speak a very significant language, which together with his music should leave nobody in doubt as to what he meant to express.

The Song of the Earth is based on a selection of lyrics by a number of Chinese poets as it had become known to Mahler in its German version by the poet Hans Bethge. Mahler has chosen from this selection the seven poems underlying the six parts of his work in such a way as to give a bitter-sweet picture of life as a whole, with its ever contrasting moods changing as rapidly as life itself. There is drama, there is idyllic restfulness, youthful frolic, despairing loneliness, gaiety, admiration of prowess, frustration, longing for beauty and love, and, permeating everything, the spirit of the wise who embraces and accepts all of it with deepest understanding.

PART 1. Drinking Song to the Misery of This World. "Here sparkles wine in golden vessels." the singer tells his assembled friends. "but do not drink ere you have heard my song!" And he reminds them of the transforming powers of grief and joy alike. He tells them how earth and firmament outlast the life-span of man, and only after having made them intensely conscious of the fragility of human life, he challenges them to empty their cups, and drink to the sternal mystery of life and death.

PART 2. Lonely in Autuma. Singer and orchestra describe in telling colours all the beauty and all the melancholy of autumn: blue mists on the lake, the golden leaves which will soon be floating away on the water. After the most subtle and loving description of autumn in nature, the singer remembers her own loneliness, and the autumn in her own soul. In despair she cries out for the "sunshine of love to shine to dry her bitter tears."

PART 3. Of Youth A little lake, a little parlion in its midst, a little lake, a little parlion in its midst, a little bridge, arched like a tiger's back, leading to it, and in the parlion a host of young friends enjoying life, chatting, playing, writing verses, everything as fragile as china. Suddenly the narrating singer looks into the clear lake, and there, mystified, he sees everything standing on its head, the little bridge no longer like a tiger's back, but rather like a half moon, the pavillon, the friends, everything upside down. He wonders. So does the music.

PART 4. Of Beauty. A fine summer day. Young girls picking flowers and chatting at the water's edge, a gentle wind playing with their garments, and sunshine reflecting their picture. A sudden storm seems to break. A cavalcade of young horsemen passes by. Look, one of the horses is shying and carries its rider far ahead of the others i The eyes of the most beautiful girl follow him. What she feels, music portrays in most delicate tones.

PART 5. The Drunkard in Spring. A philosophizing drunkard ponders on the thesis that life is nothing but a dream, a thesis which would make the mere thought of work and toll absurd: and drinking and singing the most justifiable of pastimes. A little bird wakes him and tells him that spring has come overnight, and as he converses with the bird he ponders about spring. In the end, however, he decides that spring is no concern of his and that it is preferable to get drunk again.

PART 6. The Farswell. Two different poems form the basis of this part, which is not only the longest but also the most conclusive of the whole work. Words and music describe an evening of superb beauty. Sunset behind mountains, evening

The Enemy That Never Was

A CBC Wednesday Night feature on Canada's Japanese communities during World War II

HE WAS a Canadian-born fisher-man working out of one of the small ports near Vancouver, a family man, indistinguishable from countless other hard-working fisherfolk except for the fold of his eyelids. The year was 1941, just after Pearl Harbour. The Canadian authorities were losing no time in rounding up Japanese-Canadians on the grounds that they might be a security risk. One day without warning officials with a naval escort boarded the fisherman's boat and ordered him to prepare to be towed down to Vancouver. When they arrived in Vancouver his boat

descending into the valleys, a gentle wind rustling in the pine trees, the moon floating up like a gondola of silver, the last birds going to rest, a brook whispering through the dusk, and the singer going to and fro on soft grass, lute in hand, expecting the friends . . The friend does not come. Here the original poem ends abruptly with a reproachful accusation of the faithless friend. This is one of the decisive moments where Mahler's way diverges widely from the Chinese poet. No reproach here. The evening and the whole world are so beautiful that the coming or not coming of an expected friend has become unimportant. Mahler's singer and his orchestra break out into a pacan to the "beauty of this world, drunk with eternal life and love" (Mahler's own words). After an orchestral interlude depicting tragedy and disappointment, the real "Farewell" part begins. The singer, ap-parently a different person from that in the first half, meets his closest friend to bid him the last farewell. He tells him that it has to be, and that he is going away into the mountains (a Buddhist are to going any life the boolitains (a Boolitains are pression for going its another incarnation). Fate has not been kind to him in this world, he says, and he is longing for home and rest. And then follow, replacing completely the resigned and tired words of the original poem, those incomparable words of Mahler's own: "Quiet is my heart and waiting for its hour. This beloved earth always will blossom up in spring and green anew. Always and everywhere will shine a blue light in the distance. Ever . . ever .

And with this vision of that which knows no limits "The Song of the Earth" fades away. A "farewell" symphony indeed, but a farewell in which the curtain goes up, not down, at the end, written in a spirit, which in saying goodbye, blesses the whole universe. Is this resignation? Is this pessimism? Is it not rather a most fervent declaration of love for this world and all it stands for, with all the joys, great and small, it has to offer, and in spite of all the sorrow and despair it causes time and again?

was taken away from him and that was the last he ever saw of it.

He was herded with other Japanese Canadians into a temporary camp, dazed, angry and worried about his family, and then was sent to work on a road gang in the Rockies. His wife, 18-yearold son and two younger children had no idea what had become of him until a knock came on the door of their small home and they were told to pack their personal belongings and prepare to leave. They were allowed 150 pounds apiece. Bewildered and frantie they bundled up their things, not knowing what to take and what to leave, and were carted off under guard to Hastings Park in Victoria, from which the older boy was sent to a road camp and the mother and small children to a ghost town in the B.C. interior.

Later the father managed to get transferred to a sugar-beet farm in eastern Canada, followed shortly afterwards by the boy, and later the rest of the family joined them. Their home, boat and all the possessions they had left behind were confiscated by the Custodian of Enemy Property, sold for a fraction of their value, and the fisherman was given a cash settlement. At the end of the war he and his family settled in Toronto, where they are now doing well and have become philosophical about their wartime experiences.

Their dramatic story, and others just as typical of Canada's Japanese communities during the Second World War, will be told in a 60minute radio documentary called *The Enemy That Never was* on CBC Wednesday Night this week. The interviewer-narrator with the Douglas Leiterman.

Leiterman will present an historical examination of the Canadian-Japanese community in relation to the rest of the population from their early immigration to the present day, with special attention to the war years. To get a complete picture of the situation producer Del MacKenzie and program organizer Gordon Cullingham gathered between 30 and 40 hours of

This week — "Downrange." What happens to an ICBM after blast-off? Who feels its pulse as it rises 600 miles into space, and soars 5500 miles across the sea? Who listens to its electronic delirium? This program will take viewers on a missile-ride to learn how Downrange works. Viewers will see the beginning and end of a missile's career, from the launching at Cape Canaveral to the landing underwater, where the frogmen recover its nose cone.

Ibsen Updated

About Arthur Miller's modern version of An Enemy of the People

"E VERY Ibsen plays begins with the unwritten words: 'Now listen here!' And these words have shown me a path through the wall of 'entertainment,' a path that leads beyond the formulas and dried-up precepts, the pretense and fraud, of the business of the stage. Whatever else Ibsen has had to teach, this is the first and greatest contribution."

American playwright Arthur Miller was discussing his modern version of Henrik Ibsen's play An Enemy of the People. We haven't used the word "adaptation" because Miller said he finds it distasteful. It seems to imply, he explained, "that one writer has ventured into another's chickencoop, or worse, into the sacred chamber of another's personal creations and rearranged things without permission. Most of the time an adaptation is a playwright's excuse for not writing his own plays, and I am not yet with my back against that particular wall."

Miller has a number of highly original plays to his credit, including All My Sons, Death of a Sales-

man, A View from the Bridge, and The Crucible.

John Bethune has prepared Miller's version of An Enemy of the People for a 90-minute CBC-TV production on Ford Startime this Tuesday night.

Miller says he decided to work on An Enemy of the People because "I had a private wish to demonstrate that Ibsen is really pertinent today, that he is not 'oldfashioned,' and, implicitly that those who condemn him are themselves misleading our theatre and our playwrights into a blind alley of senseless sensibility, triviality and the inevitable waste of our dramatic talents." Miller admits, too, that he "wished also to buttress the idea that the dramatic writer has the right to entertain with his brains as well as his heart."

He has tried to make An Enemy of the People as alive to North Americans as it was to Norwegians, while keeping it the way Ibsen moulded it. He says: "I believed this play could be alive for use because its central thome is, in my opinion, the central theme of our social life today. Simply, it is the question of whether democratic guarantees protecting political minorities out to be set aside in time of crisis. More personally, it is the question of whether one's vision of the truth ought to be a source of guilt at a time when the mass of men condemn it as a dangerous and devilish lie.'

To set the plot straight for us Miller describes it as "the story of a scientist who discovers an evil. and constantly believing that he has done a service to humanity, expects that he will at last be thanked. However, the town has a vested interest in the perpetuation of that evil, and his 'truth,' when confronted with the interest, must be made to conform. The scientist clings to the truth and suffers the social consequences." Briefly, it shows that those who attempt to warp the truth for ulterior purposes must inevitably become warped and corrupted themselves. "This theme," he says, "is valid today, just as will always be, but some of the examples given by Ibsen to prove it may no longer be."

Miller tells us that "Ibsen wrote this play as a result of his being practically stoned off the stage for daring to present Ghosts. The plot is supposed to have come from a news item which told of a Hungarian scientist who had discovered poisoned water in the town's water supply and had been pilloried for his discovery. If this was the case, my interpretation of the theme is doubly justified, for it then seems beyond doubt that Ibsen meant above and beyond all else to defend his right to stand 'at the outpost of society,' alone with the truth, and to speak from there to his fellow men.

Because Miller found Ibsen's language in English "impossibly pedantic," he set out to transform it into contemporary vernacular. "Working from a word-to-word rendering of the Norwegian, done by Lars Nordenson," he says, "I was able to gather the meaning of each speech and scene without the obstruction of any kind of English construction."

We were interested to hear an example of what he meant, and Miller supplied the following: Ibsen's "Well, what do you say, Doctor? Don't you think it is high time we stir a little life into the slackness and sloppiness of halfheartedness and cowardliness?" now reads: "Well, what do you say to a little hypodermic for these fence-sitting deadheads?"

Miller notes, too, that "throughout the play I have tried to peel away its trappings of the moment, its relatively accidental detail which ring the dull green tones of Victorianism, and to show that beneath them there still lives the terrible wrath of Henrik Ibsen.

thing for art, but since I don't regard art as of prime importance I've answered your question. So the hell with posterity."

"There are more bad film directors at work than people know, because it is the only profession in the world where you can be incompetent and go on being successful for thirty years with nobody ever discovering it. I mean really and truly incompetent. Because the only job a director can do in a film of real value is to do something more than what will happen automatically. . . Otherwise he is simply the man who says 'action!', 'cut!', 'take it a litle slower,' and no one will ever know he doesn't know anything.'

The discussion ranges over theatre, films, radio-and television. "I think television is a second-rate medium of entertainment. I think television drama isn't in the league of fine movies or theatre or radio. Television is basically in my view a medium of communication rather than of entertainment. You can expose a personality, deal with a subject; it's a medium of journalism, ideas and of information." 12:56 Headlines

About Wagner, concert halls, and conductors in bathing suits

SHOULD Wagner be performed anywhere but at Bayreuth? This may sound a silly question, but we must remember that Wagner himself never intended or expected that the "Ring" or *Parsifal* would ever receive performances elsewhere, and this accounts for much of the misunderstanding that has grown up concerning his music. How often have we heard the remark, "I love Wagner but he should have known better than to drown the singers with his enormous orchestra." Of course, actu-

Trappers' Festival On CBW, CBK

David Cruickshank of Outside Broadcasts at CBC Winnipeg and Marilyn Phillips, CBW's morning commentator, will be in The Pas, Manitoba, this Wednesday, Thursday and Friday to bring listeners in Manitoba and Saskatchewan daily reports on one of the continent's most colourful events—The Trapper's Festival.

David's reports will be heard Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at 5:00 p.m. on CBW, 4:00 p.m. on CBK. Marilyn's will be heard on CBW's Morning Comment (9:45 a.m.) Thursday and Friday.

Highlight of the event is the three-day World Championship Dog Race of 120 miles, with prize money of \$5,000. Among the other events to be described by Marilyn and David-ice fishing, old-time fiddling and jigging, rat skinning, street dancing, and the fabulous Trappers' Rendezvous, a midnightto-dawn dance sometimes called the Mad Trappers' Ball. ally, Wagner did nothing of the kind, and it is only when these works are performed in theatres built in the standard way, that the orchestra may overpower the voices. I think one can say with all possible truth that, if you have never heard the works in the Bayreuth Theatre, you have never really heard them as Wagner wrote them.

The great composer was no fool and knew perfectly well what he was about when he scored the "Ring" for 120 musicians. With this huge orchestra in the depths of the Bayreuth pit, half under the stage and hidden from the audience, the balance between it and the singers is quite perfect. The singers do not have to force their voices in the least and can sing in a perfectly natural and conversational tone, every word being audible all over the auditorium. To the singers appearing there for the first time, the experience is extremely unnerving because, to them, the orchestra sounds so loud from beneath their feet, that they imagine they are not being heard at all, and artists making their first appearance there are sent into the auditorium at rehearsal, so that they can be reassured that they are being heard perfectly. There is no other theatre in the world today possessing these almost supernatural acoustics and if you are interested in these things it is worth going 3,000 miles just to hear one chord played in this astonishing building.

It is remarkable that, with all the theorizing of the acousticians and architects during the last fifty years, the only really perfect building, as far as acoustics go, was designed by a mere musician in 1876. I am quite certain that Wagner didn't bother about reflected sine waves and logarithms when he conceived it. He knew exactly what he wanted and how it would sound, and that was the Program notes and station listings begin on page 20

way it was built. Mathematically, it probably violates every law known to the acousticians.

To sit in the vast cavern of the orchestral pit at Bayreuth is a unique experience and one forgets that the auditorium exists at all. The almost covered-in pit is as large as the avearage concert hall and the musicians, being hidden from the audience, play in T-shirts and shorts, the conductor even having been known to conduct in a bathing suit. It can get quite hot down there in the summer months.

What has, of course, changed in the course of the years, is the actual stage equipment, but there is no doubt that Wagner would have approved of the developments in that direction had he known of them. The stage, however, is the same and has not been changed, as far as its actual construction goes, since his time. It was his original intention that the theatre should be built in Munich and it was actually offered to that city, but the offer was turned down. Many years later when Bayreuth had become world famous, Munich regretted bitterly its decision and went so far as to build an almost exact replica of the Bayreuth theatre. This was the Prince Regent theatre in which Wagner

The Greek and Roman World

A new "University of the Air" series by DR. W. G. HARDY of the University of Alberta

WHETHER we recognize it or not, patterns set by the Greeks and Romans are woven into our everyday life. Their civilization forms the base of our own, and if, as educated people, we want to understand our own civilization we must understand something of theirs. The latest series in CBC University of the Air is designed to give us some of that knowledge.

The Greek and the Roman World begins on the CBC Trans-Canada Network this Monday night. Dr. W. G. Hardy, head of the department of classics at the University of Alberta, will give the course. Dr. Hardy graduated from the University of Toronto, and gained his Ph.D. at Chicago. He has several times visited the chief classical sites in Greece, Crete and Italy. In addition to his publications in academic journals, Dr. Hardy is the author of six novels. The first, Son of Eli, was serialized in Macleans in 1928-29, the latest The City of Libertines (1957), currently being translated into German, is set in Rome in the first century B.C. The CBC has also broadcast four radio dramas and about a hundred radio talks by Dr. Hardy. He is an executive member of the Classical Association of Canada, a Council member of the Canadian Authors' Association, and a life member of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

In this radio series Dr. Hardy will describe the world the Greeks

and Romans lived in, the ways in which they dressed, ate, and were housed, their thoughts about government, and even more important, their ideas about the riddle of the universe and man's place in it.

Following are the details of the ten lectures (the dates in brackets indicating the repeat broadcast of each lecture):

February 22 (April 5): The Greeks Step on Stage-More than half of the words we used are derived in one way or another from Greek or Latin. In general too, the ideas expressed by those words come from classical civilization. The Greeks, who were the first to step into the limelight of history, are more important here than the Romans. The first lecture will describe how this people occupied the Aegean world and then scattered their colonies around the Black Sea and westward along the Mediterranean.

February 29 (April 12): Life in Fifth Century Athens (Part 1)-In the fifth century before Christ Athens became the centre of the Greek world. By modern standards a small city, it yet achieved an empire, and its explosion of art and literature and ideas is still felt today. To understand the Athenians themselves, as people, we look at the classes in their society, their treatment of slaves,



building. It was used only for opera during the summer months when the regular opera house in the city was closed. During the last war the Bavarian National Opera House was destroyed by bombs and the only large theatre left in Munich was the Prince Regent. which became the temporary opera house. The problem then was how to adapt it for the performance of other kinds of opera, since the Wargnerian orchestral pit was naturally unsuitable for the ordinary kind of opera making up the general repertory. There was, therefore, no alternative but to reconstruct the pit and, in so doing, ruining, once and for all, the acoustics, which was a tragedy. Bayreuth, therefore, remains the only one of its kind in the world today.

These musings on Wagnerian performance were prompted by the broadcast of Die Walkuere from the Metropolitan in February 20. Over the air, of course, we shall hear an excellent balance and no doubt in the theatre the conductor will have seen to it that the voices are well heard, but it will have been, as always in these cases, a matter of adjusting Wagner's dynamics to suit the conditions, and the singers having to work much harder than they would at Bayreuth.

Wagner operas to be presented on the Metropolitan matines broadcasts this season—Die Walkuere (Feb. 20), The Flying Dutchman. (March 5), and Parsital (April 9). The other operas to be broadcast this season—Verdi's Il Trovatore (Feb. 27), La Forza del Destino (March 12), Otello (March 19), and Simon Boccanegra (April 2), and Puccini's Andrea Chenier (March 26), and Madame Butterfly (April 16).



tape-recorded interviews and commentary, by politicians and ordinary citizens who were prominently identified with one side or other in the controversy over treatment of Japanese Canadians, and with Japanese Canadians themselves professional people, businessmen, an artist and workers of various kinds, all articulate, and all looking at their experiences as objectively as possible. From these accounts a selection was made to give an accurate picture of what happened and an understanding of its historical importance.

MacKenzie told us that when all the Japanese Canadians living within a 200-mile radius of the coast were rounded up, their anger was stimulated by the fact that many of them knew little or nothing of Japan, could not speak Japanese, and were completely Occidental in their thinking. They felt they were Canadians and resented being singled out for alien treatment - treatment different from that accorded people whose national origin was other countries with which Canada was at war. After the war Prime Minister Mac-Kenzie King noted that there had never been grounds for suspicion of any of them - not a single instance of espionage, sabotage, or other disloyalty.

MacKenzie pointed out that most of these internees were segregated, the men and older boys being sent to road camps or sugarbeet plantations in Alberta or Ontario, but fathers and sons not always to the same place, and the

The evicted families were told their goods would be held in trust for them until the end of the war. Instead, their bits and pieces were sold, often for only half their value, and the proceeds sent to their owners. "If I had only known, I would have left a sweater out of my pack and put in mother's picture!" was a familiar cry when news of what h a d happened reached the camps.

After the war there was a movement afoot to give Japanese Canadians their choice of remaining East of the Rockies or of going to Japan, but the program never got off the ground. Before the war there were only a few dozen Japanese in Toronto. Now there are 7,000.

MacKenzie and Cullingham pointed out that the post-war adjustment of these people has been good, and their acceptance by other Canadians is high. The Japanese groups regard their wartime experiences as something passed and not worth being bitter about. But have we any guarantee that such a thing could not happen in the future to another Canadian group? The Enemy That Never Was looks into this question from several points of view.

at what the schools taught and at the clothes the Athenians wore.

March 7 (April 19): Athens (Part 2)-In this lecture we stroll through the streets, houses and shops of Athens, consider the occupations of the people, the methods of production, the wages, the living conditions and so on. Then we follow a middle class Athenian through the routine of the day.

March 14 (April 26): The World's First Democracy – The Athenians were the first people to establish a true political democracy. But this democracy was a direct or "town-meeting" type of government. This lecture will ex-

plain how such a system could run a city and an empire with reasonable efficiency. We will glance at the Athenian courts where mass juries operated, and finally draw some lessons for us from Athenian democracy.

March 21 (May 3): The Greeks as Writers and Athletes - The Greeks believed in "a sound mind in a sound body." It did not seem strange to them that the dramatist, Aeschylus, was both a writer and a soldier, or that Sophocles was a "Steward of Hellas" and also a poet. In this lecture we look at the amazing literary achievement of the Greeks, emphasizing its qualities and its major types. But for the average Greek, athletic festivals were probably more important than literature, so we look at their athletic ideals, the events they favoured, and the records they made. For athletics of today also owe much to Greece.

March 28 (May 10): The Torch of Greek Thought – It has been truly said that the Greeks founded western philosophy and science. We glance very briefly at the pre-Socratic thinkers, the first exponents of the restless, enquiring mind. We will then concentrate on Plato and Aristotle, the giants of Greek philosophy, following that with a brief summary of Epicureanism, Stoicism, and Cynicism, three philosophical systems which made a strong impact on the Romans.

April 4 (May 7): The Roman World - A century-long struggle for survival forged the Roman world. But with the principate of Augustus (31 B.C.-14 A.D.) the Pax Romana began. For roughly two centuries there was security and physical comfort such as the world has seldom attained. This lecture describes the size of the Roman Empire, its roads and seaways, its methods of travel, and its trade. We will look at the recent discoveries at Pompeii and Herculaneum, and examine the housing, plumbing, and general conditions of living.

April 11 (May 24): The Romans at Work and at Play – Rome, then as now, was an "Imperial City" and its narrow streets, tall tenements, and huge palaces were crowded with citizens, freedmen, slaves, foreigners, and visitors. To understand the Romans as persons, we will look at their social classes, occupations, the status of women, the details of a Roman wedding and the like. We will also look briefly at the method of government and the law-courts.

April 18 (May 31): Roman Lexury and Poverty. We look first at the living conditions of those Romans who were "on the dole," and then at the almost unly tryable luxury of the wealth. We look at one example of state expenditure, the Roman Games, those spectacles presented at the theatre, the circus, and the amphitheatre with such prodigality that here we can find one factor in the fall of Rome.

April 25 (June 7): Why Rome Fell. We summarize the various factors which appear to have contributed to the collapse of the seemingly impregnable R o m a n Empire. We conclude with a brief statement of the more important contributions of the Graeco-Roman world to western civilization.

When it comes to buying fruit and vegetables in Paris, one is *expected* to pick and choose and prod. These people are still specialists (you find very few chain stores in France—it is still the land of the

craftsman, the little shop-owner, the family business) and they want to show that they are better at knowing what is good than those others

in the shop round the corner.—Leslie Keating, on BBC.
