

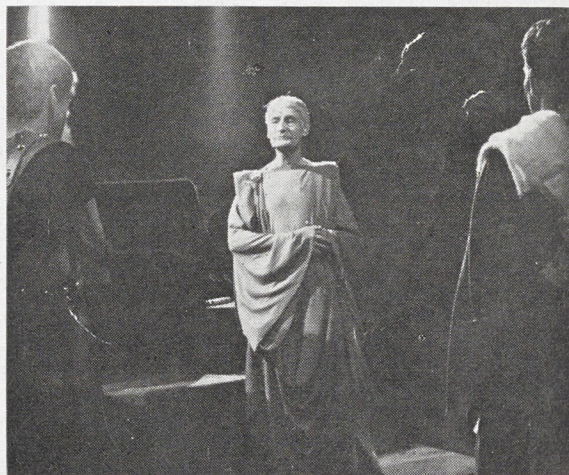

Name Acts and New Faces — On “Sit Back With Jack”

*A new CBC-TV network show from
Winnipeg emceed by*

JACK SHAPIRA

FOR many weeks now CBC Winnipeg producer Frank Rasler has been busy hunting out new acts to appear on a new network television series, *Sit Back With Jack*.

With the exception of certain well-known Canadian and U.S. performers, who will be guests on the show from time to time, almost all of the artists appearing on *Sit Back With Jack* will be making their TV debuts.

Sit Back With Jack will be seen “live” in Winnipeg on Monday nights, starting this week (April 11) and presented on film or tape to the full CBC-TV network the following Sunday.

Making their debuts on the first show will be Wally Keep, Winnipeg’s singing cab-driver; ventriloquist Bob Swarts and his dummy, Elmer; a new vocal group called Four Guys and a Doll; and Father Clayton Barclay, harpsichordist. “Big name” guest on the first show will be pops singer Tina Robin.

Others scheduled to appear on forthcoming programs are pops singers Lorraine West, Marilyn Keely, June Peckett, Johnny Woodson, Linda Hallock, Joyce Clark, Thelma Warren, and Miriam Breiman; calypso singer Leon Morenzie; 10-year-old pianist Emmanuel Ax; dancer Ray Webber; Staff Sgt. Bert Surtees, a cartoonist; and soprano Nona Mari, 1960 winner of the Rose Bowl, top vocal award of the Manitoba Musical Competition Festival.

Host of the new series is Jack Shapira, star of last summer’s series, *The Show That Jack Built*. Jack will also play the piano and lead the band, which will present special arrangements by Frank Lewis, who will appear from time to time as a saxophone soloist. Members of the band will also be featured as soloists (trumpeter Lou Pollock will play *The Very Thought of You* on the first program) or in small combos.

A regular feature of the show will be a *Shapira Symphonette* — a short film-and-music item on such things as Friday night shop-

Friday TV

"THE HILL" by Paul Almond "THE FACE OF GOD"

ON GOOD FRIDAY CBC-TV presents *The Face of God*, a graphic study of man's attempt to depict the face of God through various artists' interpretation of Christ. Manuscript illustrations, sculpture, mosaics, frescoes and paintings depicting Christ down through the ages will be shown. Among the artists represented are Rouault, Rembrandt, Bellini, Giotto, Botticelli, Durer, Tintoretto, Michelangelo, Leonardo Da Vinci, Veronese, Van Der Weyden, El Greco, Titian, Graham Sutherland, Henry Moore, and many others. The presentation will have a musical background, and there will be off-camera Scripture and poetry readings by actor Douglas Rain. The on-camera narrator will be Alan Jarvis, former director of the National Art Gallery and head of the Society of Art Publications.

Production will be by David Gardner of the CBC drama department. The program is based on an idea of Rev. Brian Freeland of the CBC religious department. Leo Rampen is in charge of the graphic presentation.

Discussing production plans Gardner reminded us that "there is no description in the Bible of what Christ actually looked like. There is a legend that St. Luke painted him, but no evidence supports it, and another legend says that Saint Veronica wiped the face of Christ with her veil on the way to Calvary and He left the imprint of His features on it. The fact that Christ was man justifies other humans attempting to express His face in art. The early artists depicted Him more as God than as man. We show this on the program. We show how the pendulum swung through the ages to the other extreme, with modern artists

humanizing Christ and making Him appear more man than God. And we point up a wonderful moment in the Renaissance when a balance was struck between the two interpretations. The modern age is confused. Today's depiction doesn't follow any one canon and

Wednesday Radio

"A SPARK IN JUDEA" by R. J. Delderfield "GOLGOTHA" by Frank Martin

CBC Wednesday Night this week includes a performance of *A Spark in Judea*, a moving religious drama by English playwright R. J. Delderfield, adapted for radio by Joseph Schull.

Set in the house of Pontius Pilate, Procurator of Judea, it describes his role in the crucifixion of Christ. Delderfield, like many historians, looks at Pilate sympathetically, explaining his actions as a matter of political expediency. Pilate, he maintains, is thinking only of the welfare of his province, of what is best for the common man. Lack of money frustrates his attempt to build an aqueduct to provide the city with fresh water.

He is a year overspent in the tax money, the workmen are complaining that they haven't been paid in ages, and, as the last straw, a payroll from Rome is stolen. Desperate now, Pilate borrows again from the high priests of Jerusalem. When they demand the death of Christ and Pilate hesitates, they are quick to remind him of his indebtedness to them. Christ, they insist, has offended religious laws, not the civil laws of Rome, and therefore it is up to *them* to decide his fate. Delderfield sug-



takes its lead from all the periods that went before."

Gardner is a graduate in art and archeology of the University of Toronto. During his university days (Please turn to page 32)

gests that when Pilate washes his hands of the whole affair he becomes guilty of the political error of appeasement, and so sets the stage for its tragedy.

Henry Comor will be heard as Pilate; John Drainie as Joseph; Ruth Springford as Procula; Joseph Shaw as Aurelian; Norman Ettlinger as Marius; Alan King as Annas; Norman Welsh as Theocritus; Barbara Alleyn as Nesta; and others in the cast are William Needles, Frank Perry, Leslie Yeo, Ann Moorish and Ivor Barry; production will be by J. Frank Willis in the Toronto studios.

A Spark in Judea will be preceded by a performance from Vancouver of the oratorio *Golgotha* by Swiss composer Frank Martin. It will feature the Cantata Singers directed by Hugh McLean, an orchestra conducted by John Avison, and soloists Joan Maxwell, William Reimer, Audrey Farnell, Roy Firth and Peter Koslowsky.

The Queen's Peace

A new play by ARTHUR HAILEY, this Sunday (or April 24, if pre-empted by N.H.L. Hockey Final) on G.M. Presents

"The writer who is wedded to his own words and cannot bear to see them changed, would be wise to stay clear out of television drama," says TV playwright-novelist Arthur Hailey.

"Co-operation plus a liberal seasoning of tolerance are prerequisites for the TV playwright."

These are two of many pointers Mr. Hailey offers the beginner in the preface of his recently published book, *Close-up on Writing for Television*. The book also includes the scripts of six of his previously produced TV dramas, five of which were first produced on CBC television.

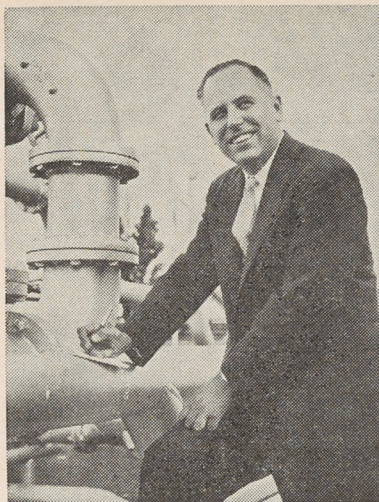
Hailey's fourth anniversary on television will be marked by a General Motors Presents production of his new play, *The Queen's Peace*, on this Sunday. The drama will star Patrick Macnee, Tony Van Bridge, Jeremy Wilkin and special guest star Neil McCallum.

The Queen's Peace is a story about the London Metropolitan Police. It concerns a police sergeant's efforts to help a boy offender re-establish himself in society despite opposition from the boy's family and his teddy-boy friends.

"It is unlike any of Hailey's earlier plays," says producer Ronald Weyman. "This is more a story of human relations than a story of suspense — the kind for which Hailey is noted."

In his book on writing for television Hailey discloses the spark that led to his now firmly-established writing career. At the age of 36, in January, 1956, Hailey was a sales promotion manager for an industrial firm.

"It was a well-paid job, fairly interesting, and my secretary was

an attractive redhead," says Hailey. "All the same, there were moments when I had a sense of something lacking, and one day, on an impulse, I dropped into a firm of industrial placement consultants.

"What I wanted was one of those psychological aptitude tests which nowadays are given to executives to see if they really have what it takes to become president of General Motors. The test was fairly complicated and cost me a hundred dollars, but proved money well spent."

The proof for Hailey appeared in one paragraph of the psychologist's report: "The subject has a marked flair for the unusual and dramatic. He has a great deal of creativity which seeks expression and he needs an outlet for this either in the work area or avocationally. He would do well as a writer and may be wasted in industry."

"I remember smiling when I received this," says Hailey, "and, for several weeks, did nothing about it. Then, quite suddenly, the idea occurred to me of writing a play for television."

Within a few months *Flight Into Danger* was born and with it, a new career for Arthur Hailey.

Hailey's *Writing For Television* is his third book; his first two were novels, and he is now working on a third novel.

The Richest Man In the World

DOUGLAS LEITERMAN interviews J. Paul Getty on "Close-Up"

J. PAUL GETTY was born on December 15, 1892. Today he is worth somewhere between \$700 million and \$100,000 million.

"The higher figure is roughly equal to the total gold and oil reserves of the sterling area. Does that interest you?" Leiterman asked him on *Close-Up*.

Said Getty, "Well I suppose it's interesting but I don't think it has any practical interest insofar as the sterling area is concerned, or so far as I am concerned."

"You've no intention of buying out the sterling area?"

"None."

Getty did not move from rags to riches. In 1903 his lawyer father, George Getty, bought 1,100 acres of land for \$5,000. This was before geology had much to say about locating oil, and the land was several miles from the nearest successful well.

George Getty drilled 1,400 feet through sand and struck oil the first attempt. He drove 46 more wells on the land and every well came in. When he died in 1930 Getty, Sr., left an estate of about 15 million dollars.

Jean Paul was the only living child. He was well educated — studied geology and economics at the University of California and economics and political science at Oxford — and by 1930 had shown considerable ability in business.

By the time of his father's death, however, Paul had also been divorced. One story has it that his father, a strict man, disapproved. Anyway, he left Paul only \$500,000; the bulk of the estate went to Mrs. Getty, Sr.

It has also been said that Paul resented the implied slur on his ability, so decided to amass a mighty fortune, and that he is still

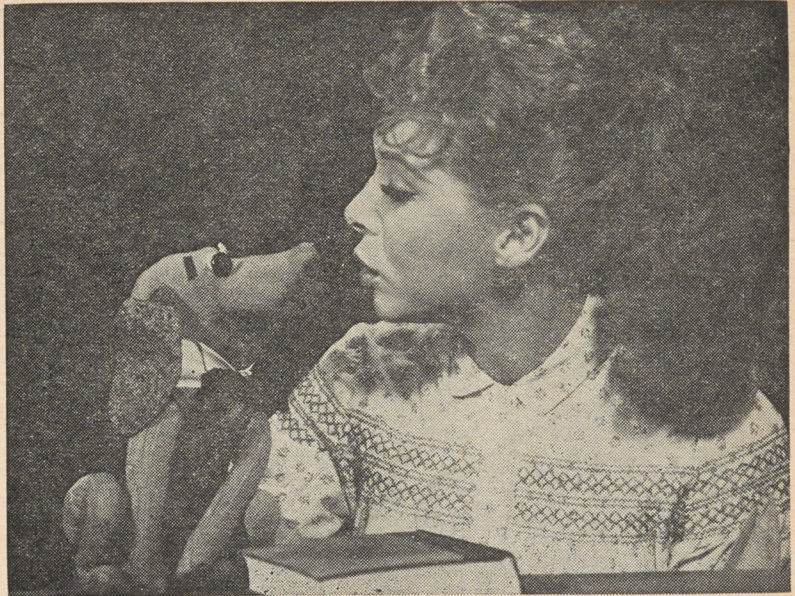

fighting his father's ghost. It seems equally plausible that George Getty thought his son well able to look after himself.

Despite the Depression, which was freezing business activity in 1930, and despite the advice of his mother's advisers who wanted her to invest the family money in safe securities, Paul took every penny he could get and bought stock in an oil refinery and distributing firms. Between 1932 and 1934 he invested \$8 million in such stock. And as the economy came out of the depression, Getty rode up with it.

It was after World War II that Getty got his big break. Between 1949 and 1953 he spent \$30 million acquiring oil rights and prospecting for oil in Saudi Arabia. That included over \$9 million to King Saud for the rights to explore, the guarantee to Saud of a million dollars in revenue annually, and in perpetuity, with three million dollars paid in advance. All this, when no oil had been discovered in the area and where there might very well be none. But there was oil. And Getty is now probably the richest man in the world.

Today, Getty is taking still another gamble by building a fleet of super-tankers at a time when tankers are standing idly in port with nothing to do.

Perhaps strangest thing of all about Getty is that he built his fortune without selling one share of stock to the public. "I like to sleep at nights," he has said. "I shouldn't like to think I owed people that much money."

What sort of man is Getty? Here are some excerpts from the *Close-Up* transcript:

Leiterman: Do you ever wonder why you should be very rich and other people very poor?

Getty: I have often wondered about that, wondered why some people who apparently have very good ability, work hard, and still never seem to make a success of anything, and other people apparently less brilliant somehow seem

to make a success. Must be that some factors there are not too well recognized — probably a sense of timing and a sense of proportion never able to distinguish the possible from the impossible. If a man's going to be a success he must start with something that is possible for him to do.

Leiterman: You drilled oil wells where other people thought there was no oil.

Getty: That wasn't impossible; it was difficult.

This matter of fact attitude, this complete refusal to build up any sort of business mystique, is typical of Getty. He considers he was lucky to be 'born into' the oil business when the world economy was about to be based on oil, just as Churchill was lucky to be around just when his particular talents were suited to the crisis of 1940 and after. This matter-of-fact approach leads him to say things which for anyone else would be platitudes:

"I think a man should render a commercial service if he expects to get a commercial reward . . . If his business is rendering a good service to the public I think the profits will take care of themselves."

This is the principle underlying one billion dollars. And again, on the chances of the West staying in the Middle East—

"If we're welcome there they'll want us to stay. If we are not welcome there then it would be difficult for us to stay, and I think our welcome depends a good deal on the service we can render. If the people of the Middle East think we can render them valuable service, then they will doubtless want us to stay. If we take anything without service why they doubtless would hope we would leave."

It is this sort of remark that lead one commentator to compare Mr. Getty with the 18th century philosopher, Bishop Butler, who said, "Things are as they are and their consequences will be what they will be."

Getty disapproves completely of the so-called Organization Man, of businessmen complaining about labour unions, taxation, the Welfare

state—in fact complaining of anything when they should be, in Getty's view, accepting what is and building a business within it. He says:

"I think the welfare state is a fact in most of the western countries. I think that the days of the complete laissez-faire of the 19th century are a past chapter in history . . ."

Leiterman: Do you favour cartels and larger business monopolies?

Getty: No I do not. I think that the general cartels are not at all progressive . . . In the oil business itself I don't think that competition has ever been so fierce as it is today.

Then there is Jean Paul Getty, human being.

Leiterman: Are you ever tempted to throw your money around even a little bit once in a while? I mean, if you walk into a restaurant where the service is bad are you tempted to go and just buy the place?

Getty: No, that would be very bad form and ridiculous. I think that would be very *nouveau riche* indeed.

Leiterman: I believe Elsa Maxwell once said you were stingy with money?

Getty: Well I try to do things according to my lights. It's difficult for a rich man to spend money because he's generally accused either of being stingy or of splashing his money around.

Leiterman: Damned either way. You don't consider yourself stingy though you've been known to complain about the prices of a breakfast at a Paris hotel.

Getty: I imagine you would too.

Leiterman: I'm curious to know what happens when you and Mr. Onassis go to lunch. Who takes up the cheque?

Getty: Well, we both reach for it.

Leiterman: Well, who reaches fastest?

Getty: Well Mr. Onassis is a very fast man in reaching for a cheque. I think he more than holds his own.

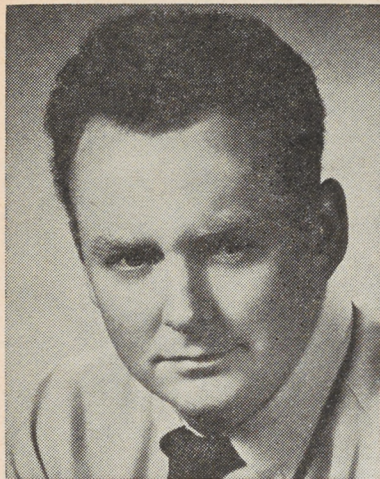

opera. The libretto was written originally as a film script by the late Georges Bernanos, who adapted it from the novel, *The Last at the Scaffold*, by Gertrude Von Le Fort. The novel, in turn, was based on a manuscript left by the sole survivor of the executions.

Reviewing the world premiere of the opera at La Scala in Milan in 1957, Christina Thoresby of the New York Times said, "This is magnificent material for music, and Poulenc has made full use of the possibilities, giving to the "dialogues" what will assuredly prove to be their ultimate expression. He has written a score of rare lyrical beauty which is clear, flexible and brilliantly manipulated. It is also frankly tonal and utterly sincere."

Since its premiere in Italy, the opera has been performed in France, Germany, and the U.S. (San Francisco).

The central role in the opera will be played by a newcomer to CBC-TV, Cécile Vallée of Bonnyville, Alberta. Also singing a featured role is the world-famous Greek contralto Elena Nikolaidi.

"Science Review" Returns To CBC Radio April 14

ONCE upon a time many thousands of years ago, three travellers, hot and dusty, came upon a waterfall. The first man immediately began building a boat to take them downstream. The second man sat on the bank and removed his sandals and bathed his swollen feet in the stream. He watched the waters tumble into the pool, smooth into deep eddies, then into quiet clarity before quickening again into white foam as they shattered against the obstructing boulders. He watched the passing cloud shadows darken the pool and listened to the broken inanities of the falls and he delighted in the constant change and movement. The third man just sat and thought and thought, till finally he said, "This I have just discovered: that the Law of Hydrostatics enforces all water to find its own level."

Since that time mankind has been divided into three classes: practical men, poets and scientists. And the world would not have come very far lacking any one of them.

The parable is, of course, too simple. The poet must recognize that if nothing were constant but change, he could not pin the slippery moment with a word. And when he says, "This is so *because* that is so," the poet enters science. Shakespeare, referring to a comet seen shortly after the death of Caesar in 44 B.C. wrote:

"When beggars die there are no comets seen;

"The heavens themselves blaze forth the death of a Prince."

This is fine poetry, bad science. But Shakespeare the poet would laugh, and rightly so, at the scientist who remonstrated that: "one confirming instance cannot be regarded as substantiating the hypothesis that casual connections exist between the approach of comets to earth, and the death of heads of state."

The difference between poetry, superstition and science is often

blurred. For the astrologer, planets influence our daily life. Casting a horoscope involves finding the changing relations between planets and star constellations, thereby establishing their "moods." And by those moods a man can plan his actions.

All this involves three attitudes. There is a sense of awe and even

U.S. Award To CBC Radio Series

CBC radio's *Science Review*, which returns to the air this week, has been awarded a special citation by the Thomas Alva Edison Foundation.

The citation stated that the program had attained "high standards of excellence in keeping Canadians abreast of current developments in pure and applied science."

The award was made in New York by Kenneth A. Meade, director of the educational relations section of General Motors Corporation and trustee of the Edison Foundation.

In presenting the award he said, "The awards committee carefully

terror leading to religious mysticism which welled up in man as he gazed at the stars. Secondly, he attempted to organize what he saw into a coherent body of knowledge. Third, he tried to use this system to predict and thereby control future events. The first is, if you like, poetic; the second scientific; the third practical.

If the poet sometimes turns to science, the scientist often finds beauty in a mathematical equation and mysticism in an atomic pile. A mystic sense drove Einstein to seek some one physical principle underlying the infinite variety of what we see. And Sir Isaac Newton wrote:

"I do not know what I may appear to the world; but to myself I seem to have been only like a boy playing on the seashore, and diverting myself now and then in finding a smoother pebble or a prettier shell than ordinary, whilst the great ocean of truth lay all before me."

These words of Newton are the theme of *Science Review*, CBC's prize-winning (see story this page) radio series which returns to the air this Thursday, with poet-mathematician Lister Sinclair as host. Aim of the series, according to program organizer David Walker, is "to find the new and interesting

MUSIC ON RADIO

By BOYD NEEL

... about passion music, pianos, percussion, and "pops"

IT SEEMS TO ME that by far the most important musical event this week is Wednesday night's performance from Vancouver of Frank Martin's *Golgotha*. This is probably Martin's greatest work to date. It consists of seven "pictures" between which comes settings of meditations of St. Augustine. The recitatives from the Gospel are sung by the various soloists much as in the style of the Passions of Bach; in fact, we can find many similarities in the structure of this work to the great choral compositions of Johann Sebastian. It is interesting to note that in *Golgotha*, Martin occasionally uses the twelve-note system of Schoenberg, but the sound of his music is utterly different from the more severe works of the Austrian composer.

Golgotha, which is described as a "Passion Oratorio," was first performed at Geneva in 1949 and, at that time the composer, in an article, expressed his views on the setting of religious texts. The difficulty he found was the great gulf which has become fixed between the church and contemporary art and he notes that it is rare for present day composers to write music which is essentially for the church. There is no doubt that Martin is one of the most considerable figures in the music of our time and he has made his great reputation without sensation or the somewhat eccentric publicity indulged in by some other well known figures.

On Sunday evening Bartok's Sonata for two pianos and percussion is to be performed on *CBC Concert Hall*. This work exists in two versions, the one which we

shall hear on Sunday evening, and another which has orchestra added, and is known as "Concerto for two pianos with orchestra." In the orchestral version the piano parts are somewhat different, but the composer directs that the percussion instruments shall be seated near the two pianos as in the version without orchestra. In fact, it really amounts to a Concerto for Two Pianos, Percussion and Orchestra.

Bartok has been very careful to indicate with plans exactly where he wants the various percussion instruments to be situated on the platform and his attention to detail is amazing. For instance, he states that, when not in use, the pair of cymbals should be laid on cloth to prevent vibration. When in use they are suspended at times and struck with sticks, but at other times they are clashed. The percussion parts are possible with two very good players, but Bartok had evidently had difficulty in this respect and he states in his score that if there is any trouble, a third player may be needed for the xylophone.

The work dates from 1938 and was much played by Bartok and his wife in the years before the war, when it never failed to cause a sensation.

On Sunday afternoon we can hear, as usual, the "Pop" concert from Massey Hall. Just what is a "popular" concert? It would be interesting to have readers' views on the subject, because in perusing many programs of so-called "pop" concerts in different parts of the world, I can find very little similarity, and the term would seem to be rather vague and capable of many interpretations. It is the same with "light" music. What on earth is "light" music? If you question several people as to what they regard to be light music, you will get the most astonishing variety of answers and the term seems to be quite fatuous and meaningless.

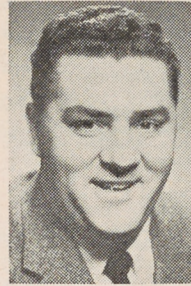

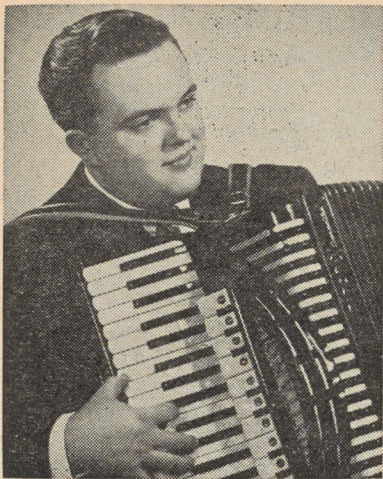

Festival Of Freedom

RABBI S. J. WALLIN, *spiritual leader of the Herzlia-Adas Yeshurin Congregation of Winnipeg, describes the background of the Model Seder to be presented on CBW at 8:30 a.m. this Sunday*

Passover celebrates the exodus of the Jewish people from Egypt and slavery to a newly-born freedom and nationhood. It recalls the trying years spent in Egypt amidst severe agony and cruelty as slaves under the mighty whip of Pharaoh's taskmasters. The miracle of the ten plagues as wrought by God upon the Egyptians is endearingly reviewed and applauded. It is clear that an all-embracing festival of this nature must of consequence be accompanied with varied and numerous symbols, all of which are most meaningful in the modern context.

The Passover Holiday is initiated with the festive family gathering ritually known as the Seder (or order, in that it follows a particular sequence). Children play an especially unique role during the Seder. The younger ones pose the "four questions" concerning the various Seder traditions and observances. Response to the queries from those assembled is essentially an exposition of the dramatic Passover story and exodus as elucidated in the Seder manual, "Haggadah."

The *matzoth* (unleavened bread) are eaten, symbolizing the bread of affliction eaten by the Israelites as they hurriedly left Egypt, lacking sufficient time for leavening of the dough. Each family member drinks four cups of wine, reminiscent of God's fourfold promise of redemption to the Israelites. Partaking of the *moror* or bitter herbs as a reminder of Egypt's bitter slavery is somewhat unpleasant, but never shirked by even the youngest. At one point in the Seder ritual, these bitter herbs are dipped into *charoseth*, a mixture of apples, almonds, cinnamon, and wine symbolizing the slave-made

mortar of Egypt. Its pleasant taste is concurrently a symbol of God's benevolence, even in times of hardship and struggle.

As Seder Time approaches on Passover eve the table is dazzling in white. The festival candles cheerfully cast a warm flickering glow, as the cups of wine revert from "at ease" to attention. Jewish families the world over ready themselves for virtually indescribable beauty and charm of the Seder.

In the modern all-embracing perspective, we must recognize that Passover from its very inception evolved a new thought for mankind—freedom. Man's priceless heritage to a pure and democratic way of life—liberty and equality—was born in the burning sands of Sinai, just one day away from Egypt and slavery. Throughout the ages Passover has constituted an ever-present source of strength and inspiration to the banner of freedom and its principles.

In light of the above, a Model Seder will be presented by the Jewish faith on CBW this Sunday April 10, at 8:30 a.m., depicting the Passover Seder-Story, and Exodus.

May this Passover usher in that freedom which casts aside racial bias and prejudice, unfounded fears and dissension — bringing a living peace and contentment to all mankind.

in science, and to present it to those whose only scientific asset is curiosity." The series will be produced by Christina McDougall. Following are the programs:

April 14: *Meteors*.

April 21: *Why Plants Behave as Plants*. Plants respond to changes of climate and even move themselves to get more sun. The ingenious chemical instructions that prompt this form a frontier of biological science.

April 28: *Hail and Stormy Weather*. Why does hail form?

May 5: *Plasmas*. Not blood plasmas, but the physical process which produces fantastic heat at the surface of stars, and by which physicists hope to achieve a controllable nuclear break through.

May 12: *Bugs, Birds and Bats*. How they fly, and the lessons man can learn.

May 19: *Portrait of an Element*. Sulphur: good with synthetics, bad with bacteria.

June 2: *Animal Clocks*. How does a groundhog know when to wake up?

he helped prepare a showing of Canadian liturgical art, and has continued this interest. His drama experience includes many appearances as an actor in England and at Toronto's Crest Theatre, and he has been a CBC drama producer since November.

Also on Good Friday CBC-TV presents an unusual account of the events from the trial of Christ to His entombment, seen through the reactions of His friends, His disciples and other spectators. The figure of Christ is not seen, but His voice is heard. *The Hill* is an award-winning drama by Paul Almond, who will also produce it. Almond says: "The characters are strictly realistic, present-day types familiar to us all, but the sets will be totally unrealistic, with mood suggested mainly by the use of light and shadow playing on the actors' faces. As they talk and remember, the Easter story emerges." Some of the characters, such as Mary, mother of Jesus, Mary Magdalene, Peter, and John are historical, others represent people of today, such as a taxi driver, a suburban blonde, a keen businessman, and other perennial types of men and women who were doubtless among the crowd on Calvary.

Almond wrote *The Hill* especially for television. He first produced it for CBC-TV on Good Friday 1956, following which it won an Ohio Award. The citation read: "The style of production as typified by *The Hill*, the script and the performances all contribute to make this religious documentary a great achievement in religious television presentation." On Good Friday 1957, Almond produced it for BBC viewers. Writing in the *BBC Radio Times* at that time Canon Roy McKay, BBC head of religious broadcasting said: "Paul Almond is clearly aware of what he is doing. By his selection of events, by the way he presents them and, above all, by his sense of the effect of these events upon his characters, and, through them, on us whom

they typify, he shows that he means us to be involved in this story in the same way as the original gospel writers sought to involve their readers. The modern slant and idiom, which characterize the play, are not introduced for their own sakes, but because the theme of this story, once enacted in history in Palestine, is true for all times and all places. Some may be startled by this type of modern presentation of the Passion, as some were when the cycle of plays *The Man Born to Be King* was first presented. To be shocked is not always a bad thing. After all, the crucifixion of Jesus Christ was, and is, a shocking event."

As *The Hill* opens the following words are spoken to the viewing audience: "Try to forget for a while who the actors are and watch them, for they in turn will be watching Someone else who lives now only in their minds—and in their hearts. It is through their eyes that we shall see His Passion."

Almond has assembled a cast of 50, including Gwen Ffangcon-Davies, Kate Reid, Jeremy Wilkin, John Drainie, Sarah Davies, Jill Foster, Tony Van Bridge, James Doohan, Hedley Mattingly, Patrick Macnee, Murray Westgate, Larry Zahab, William Cole, Norman Welsh, Earle Grey, David Mann, Gillie Fenwick, and Donald Ewer. The off-camera voices will be those of Douglas Rain as Christ, Lloyd Bohner as narrator, and Henry Comor as the Angel Gabriel.

ANDY DEVINE

with either the good guys or the bad guys (he prefers the good guys, so he is rarely a villain) and has survived more gunfights than you could shake a Stetson at. Now, after careers in silent films and talkies he has branched into television and the stage. The younger generation knows him best as Jingles, the carefree sidekick of *Wild Bill Hickok*, and star of *Andy's Gang* on TV. Three years ago he made his stage debut as Captain Andy in Guy Lombardo's production of *Showboat* at Jones Beach in New York, and he has repeated the role in St. Louis and Flint, Michigan.

In interviews on the first half of *Assignment* each night this week (CBC Dominion Network stations at 8:00 p.m.) Andy talks to Gordon Howard of Toronto about himself, his family, his career and the colourful people he has worked with. And he tells how he feels

when he sees a younger, thinner Devine in old movies on TV.

Andy's normal voice went "that-away" back when he was five. He tripped and fell with a stick in his mouth and injured his palate. Later, at Santa Clara University, he yelled so much at football games as a sideline heckler that his voice took on a permanent rasp, and the frog in his throat has made his fortune.

Andy was born in Flagstaff, Arizona, in 1905, the son of a hotel proprietor and grandson of Admiral James Hermon Ward, one of the founders of the United States Naval Academy. At Harvard Military Academy in Los Angeles Andy got the idea that he would like to study for the priesthood, and enrolled at St. Benedict's College in Atchison, Kansas. Later he changed his mind and transferred to Santa Clara.

During summer holidays he was lifeguard on the beach at Santa Monica. One day he wandered into Hollywood wearing his college letterman's sweater. A talent scout from Universal studios spotted him, and Andy was signed for a series of two-reel films called *The Collegians*. Because of his physique, good looks and personality, the studios decided to groom him for romantic leads. Then sound came in. Andy's gravel voice whispering sweet nothings into the heroine's ear? Ouch, said the directors, and Andy was out. In disgust he enlisted in the United States Light House Service and sailed off to the Bering Sea to deliver supplies to isolated beacons. After a year he came back with \$1,200 and renewed determination to crash Hollywood. He did another serial called *Danger Island*, and then the depression and his unusual voice seemed to close every door to movies.

Fortunately one director with a sense of humour decided to try him in a comedy role in *The Spirit of Notre Dame*. He clicked immediately. And the distinctive Devine brand of humour has brightened hundreds of films since, including *The Michigan Kid*, *A Star is Born*, *Stagecoach*, *Romeo and Juliet*, *Never a Dull Moment*,

Canyon Passage, *New Mexico*, *Around the World in 80 Days*, and *Slaughter Trail*.

Meanwhile, back at the ranch, Andy keeps pretty active for a husky (six feet two, 290 pounds) 54-year-old. He skis, hunts, skeet shoots, manages his tavern in Big Bear, California, raises orchids and Labrador retrievers, and takes part in special events like *The Sportsmen's Show* in Toronto, which he emceed last month.

His slim, attractive wife Dorothy (Doagy) accompanies him on all his jaunts. Will Rogers introduced them, and they were married 27 years ago—started out for a football game and wound up saying "I do." They have two sons: 25-year-old Tad, a frogman in the U.S. Navy and currently in Japan, and 21-year-old Dennis, a student at the University of Southern California.

For nearly 20 years Andy was honorary mayor of Van Nuys, California, where he had a small ranch. For his executive mansion he used a ramshackle shed on a sidestreet, where he used to swap stories, whittle, settle local arguments, put on more weight, and carry out a one-man publicity campaign for putting Van Nuys on the map. He not only made the whole nation aware of the town, but tripled its population.

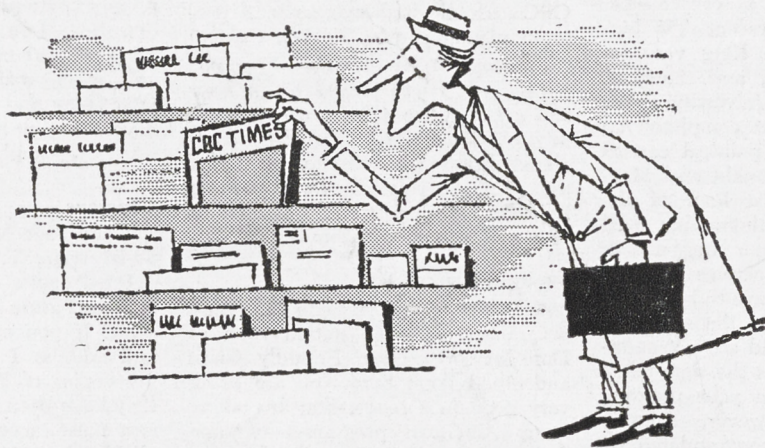
