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"Experts Say . . . "

ONCE knew a man who claimed that he could read people's characters by studying the convolutions of their navels. I wasn't able to tell how accurate his divinations were, but he was very much in demand at late night parties. Either his aptitude was unique, or navel reading has died out, because I have never since met another practitioner of the art. At any rate, his pronouncements were listened to with great attention as, glass in hand, he diligently and solemnly read navels. It might have been that no one felt competent enough in the art of navel reading to be able to contradict him. It was an interesting example of the way we will accept the word of anyone who claims to be an expert.

This submission to "the experts" is a sign of a distressing mental docility that most of us would never admit to. We like to think that we form our own opinions, that we can't be led by the nose. But in fact we are quite willing to think exactly as someone tells us, provided we're approached in the right way. Nowadays, the words "Experts say—" have a ring of authority that was lacking in the most thunderous decrees of popes and emperors.

At the word of the experts we regulate our diets, alternately beat and pamper our children, and practice new ways of keeping our wives happy. All this on the say-so of remote men and women who have never sat at our tables, seen our children, or been called on to satisfy our wives.

Upon examination, we find that the experts are running our lives for us, from bookshelf to bedroom. We rarely, if ever, look for proof of what they say, but accept as gospel what is often nothing more than a set of opinions. The situation wouldn't be quite so bad if the status of expert wasn't so easy to come by. The white-coated scientist on TV who tells us about a new ingredient in toothpaste mightn't be at all sure what toothpaste is used for, but we believe in him, because he's wearing a white coat. The experts on marriage who add spice to the women's magazines have, more often than not, achieved their status from the number of times they've tried the experiment. The experts on child rearing reverse their opinions almost as frequently as do the experts on Russia.

There is a good deal of truth in the saying "An expert is someone from out of town," or "An expert is someone you haven't met." You can test this for yourself the next time you sit with a circle of friends. When the conversation turns to dieting, as it inevitably will, say to them, "Beer isn't fattening."

Just like that: "Beer isn't fattening."

Apart from one or two withering glances, no one will take any notice at all. But if you wait for a lull in the conversation and then say in a tone of quiet authority: "The experts nowadays all agree that the caloric content of beer is lower than that of buttermilk," everyone will sit up and take notice, as if the words "Beer is not fattening" had suddenly appeared on the wall, written in letters of fire.

You see, there's no doubt at all that people will listen with great reverence to any statement which they think has come from an expert. This may strike you as a sad situation, but there's very little that can be done about it; people aren't likely to change. The best thing to do under the circumstances is to preface your statements with the words "experts say" every time you want to express an opinion. This way you are sure to get the attention you deserve. If this seems a trifle dishonest, treat the whole thing as a joke. Using the same little artifice—"Experts say"—you can make

Racial Discrimination— What Can One Person Do About It?

IF you own an apartment building and a Negro family wants to move in but other tenants object strongly, what can you do about it? If the children on your street call "dirty Yid" after their Jewish playmates, what should be your attitude? Just what can one person do about racial discrimination?

A few months ago Citizens' Forum decided to get some really practical viewpoints and suggestions about how Canadian individuals can fight racial prejudice. Program planner Art Stinson invited a group of thinking, outspoken people representing different races and creeds to discuss the problem around a microphone. They did so in a forthright way, sticking to the little prejudices most of us encounter in everyday life, and avoiding the big issues. And they recommended such useful ways for men and women to deal with discrimination, without any frothy philosophizing and side-stepping, that the broadcast won a special award recently from the Ohio Institute for Education by Radio and Television. The citation read: "For mature, realistic, and thought-provoking commentary on the explosive issues of our day. Citizens' Forum is a rare example of the potential of public affairs radio broadcasting.

The broadcast will be repeated this Thursday night on CBC radio. You will hear panelists talking informally with Forum host Gordon Hawkins, discussing the feelings of both perpetrators and victims of discriminatory offenses, breaking off to argue about different points from time to time, and trying to come to terms with the problem.

Among those taking part are: Sol Littman, a graduate of the University of Toronto who is working in Detroit as secretary to the Anti-Defamation League of B'Nai Brith, a Jewish organization, and who feels the children should be brought face to face with the discrimination problem at school and taught to deal with it there intelligently; Violet King from Calgary, the first Negro woman to be called to the Bar in Canada, who

is now concentrating her energies on citizenship work; the distinguished CBC radio and television actress Diana Maddox, who is white, and her husband, well-known jazz pianist Wray Downes, who is a Negro—they discuss the question of getting living quarters (Please turn to page 17)

A Late Note

Tom Mboya On "Portraits"

An interview with the young African leader July 23, on CBC radio

TOM MBOYA was born in 1930 of illiterate parents one of 12 children, on a sisal plantation in Kenya. By the time he was 25 he had included in his reading the 18th century radical Tom Paine and the 20th century radical Harold Laski, and was a leading figure in the important Kenya Federation of Labor. At 28 Mboya shared the international spotlight with Prime Minister Nkrumah of Ghana when the All - African People's Congress in 1958 elected him chairman; Mboya was just 29 when the vice-president of the United States feted him as a leader of erupting Africa; and in London he was leading figure in the conference on the future of Kenya, helping to get important political concessions for Kenya's 6,000,000 blacks, with the promise of future independence.

That was the situation early in 1960 for Tom Mboya, nationalist, politically on the left, but a proponent of non-violence and a man who, despite strong opposition from other officials, tried to steer African trade unionism into alliances with trade unionism of the western world. Mboya seemed a strong possibility for post of first Prime Minister of Kenya, perhaps before he was too much older than

Then less than three months ago it became obvious that Mboya had received a major setback. He returned to Nairobi from a triumphant tour of other African states to be greeted at the airport by hostile placards - "We don't like dictators" - and by his political enemies, aided by some of his friends, well-organized in a "let's-cut - Mboya - down - to - size" campaign. Now, the political future of Mboya is in doubt.

What caused the change? Much of his opposition seems to date

from the London conference early this year. Though he accepted its proposals Mboya himself was disappointed in them: "We had hoped to gain full independence. Well, this will be the next step, along with full universal suffrage." But apparently many of his compatriots, friends and enemies, are not prepared to wait; they consider the London conference a sellout to colonialism.

Possibly in an effort to stop further loss of influence, Mboya took a gamble. Though he had always sympathized with the sufferings of the Kikuyu people, his strong opposition to violence something commented on by his teachers at the Catholic school he attended as a child-kept him from any suspicion of supporting the excesses of Mau Mau; he was possibly the only major figure so exempt from suspicion. Nevertheless, just under three months ago Mboya issued a statement saying that unless the Kenva authorities released within three months Jomo Kenyatta, the man who is said to have organized Mau Mau, he, Mboya, would call for a civil disobedience campaign.

Presumably, Mboya made his threat to get back waning Kikuyu support. If so, the gamble seems not to have paid off. For one thing, he chose to issue the statement while he was visiting Monrovia, in Liberia. Hence the protests, "Who gave you permission to issue orders in Monrovia?", which he met on his return.

There were other results. The governor, Sir Patrick Renison, has refused to allow Kenyatta to return to Nairobi, particularly as the recent Corfield report on Mau Mau concludes that the charges against Kenyatta were true. Secondly, white settlers have seized Mbova's support of Kenyatta as evidence of his support of Mau Mau, a charge they could not before justify. And thirdly, Mau Mau diehards are allegedly using Mboya's ultimatum as an excuse for a violence which Mboya still deplores. In short, it is said that Mau Mau threatens again and that Mboya has helped stimulate it.

A CLASSIC OF CRIMINAL HISTORY

Behind "Love Story 1910," to be presented on ENCORE this Sunday on CBC-TV

SEVEN is an age of awareness. In 1910 I was seven years old; perhaps this is why the year looms so vividly in memory as one of notable events.

In April the newspapers all had pictures of a shaggy-haired old man with shrewd eves and a big white moustache-a famous author named Mark Twain was dead. A few weeks later another old man gazed out of the front pages; he was bearded and he wore robes and a crown. Bells tolled and flags hung at half-mast as we mourned the death of Edward the Seventh. His passing was coupled with another historic event. Every night that week we stood out on the lawns of our little town gazing up at Halley's Comet, trailing stardust and mystery in the silent depths of space.

Early in July most of the men gathered in the bars and in front of the newspaper office late one afternoon to hear the round-byround bulletins of the great heavyweight prize - fight between Big Jim Jeffries and Jack Johnson away out in Nevada. Gloom hung over the dusty streets when the black man's fists hammered the white man to the floor; our derby-hatted sports talked of another White Hope and washed down their disappointment with whiskey sours and mugs of beer.

Apart from the one-day stand of the Sells - Floto Circus, an Uncle Tom's Cabin-show-with two real bloodhounds—at the Opera House, and a fire at one of the livery stables there were no events of importance that month until the Old Boys' Reunion. This brought brass bands, parades, horse races, lacrosse game and sideshows to the Fair Grounds on the edge of town. Every afternoon the gallant Professor Hutchinson, in purple tights, ascended magnificently into the heavens by balloon, descended leisurely to earth while cavorting on the trapeze bar of his parachute. Every night there were fireworks and the band played on. In the warm summer evenings the music floated from the distant Fair Grounds-the tender undulations of After the Ball, the jovial inquiry of Has Anybody Here Seen Kelly?

The next great event occurred just after the Old Boys' Reunion. It began gradually, with a few small stories in the newspapers, and grew bigger day by day as headlines bristled with the name of Crippen. Small boys heard echoes of Murder Most Foul. But merely the echoes. This was an event that only the grown-up world relished and understood. Small fry could only gather that the man Crippen was author of a crime so

monstrous that his name was synonymous with evil beyond human imagination. One heard shocked references to a corpse in a coal cellar; the corpse bore the romantic name of Belle Elmore; over the back fences drifted the name of Ethel LeNeave, whose association with the Monster involved a breach of the Seventh Commandment. Whispers identified her as a Scarlet Woman, whatever that was. There was talk of Scotland Yard and a detective called Inspector Dew, feverishly mounting interest in a great Trans-Atlantic manhunt which brought the principals of the drama closer and closer to Canadian shores.

Even the smallest of small boys with eyes to see and ears to hear in July of 1910 recognized the Crippen Case as one of the major events of his age and time. And so, nearly half a century later, while mulling over various ideas that might serve for a television play I recalled the impact which the crime and pursuit had upon the sober households of our town so long ago. But the Crippen affair had now become a classic of criminal history. One might fairly assume that its details were so familiar to most people that interest had long since vanished. I set the notion aside and went on to something else.

A few days later, however, occurred the sort of coincidence which seldom astonishes a writer although he would never dare use anything of the kind in his own fictions. A random visit to a second-hand bookstore uncovered an old red book. It contained a complete account, nearly the entire transcript, in fact, of the trial of H. H. Crippen, with Photographic Illustrations and an Appendix containing a record of the trial of Ethel Neave, alias LeNeave. A discovery of this kind is an omen which a writer neglects at his peril. Here was the whole story. There would, it seemed, be little difficulty in writing a little play about the

trial. So I bought the book and went to work.

Almost immediately the task became troublesome. The material was there, all right. All the facts were on record. The trial was interesting enough. But much more interesting, it seemed, were the facts that weren't on record. I found myself speculating endlessly on the thoughts and feelings of the people, on the story that lay behind the known events. A drab affair, lacking in dignity and with apparently not the slightest element of classic tragedy, yet it had gripped human imagination in its day and still held power to fascinate the human mind after half a century. But the book gave only the cold facts.

For the broader background, for the vast mass of speculation and hearsay, for the colour of the time one had to seek another source the newspapers.

For more than a week, then, as patient attendants trundled up the cumbersome bound volumes to the

reading room of the Toronto Reference Library, the files of newspapers from July to December, 1910, yielded up the words that men wrote about the Crippen Case when its origins were obscure, its facts in doubt and the fate of its principals undetermined. Here were the very newspapers that had been read in one's own home nearly fifty years ago. But now a different story emerged. The old images that had peopled a nightmare in childhood melted away. Crippen, the Monster, and Ethel LeNeave, the Scarlet Woman, were not in these dry, brittle pages at all. Instead, one saw an insignificant little man whose home life was unhappy, and a timid little typist, not very pretty, not very well educated, who fell in love at the wrong time. One saw a shabby, commonplace crime that involved, apparently, two shabby, commonplace people.

But live long enough, write long enough, and you learn that there are no commonplace people. D. H. Lawrence said that he wrote novels to find out what his charasters were like. Now I was compelled to write a play to find out,

A Case For The Court

The opposition to Mboth is apparently well organized. Though Mboya was all-powerful in the political party he formed, the Nairobi People's Convention Party. the emergency regulations limited this party to Nairobi. While Mboya was negotiating with the Kenya authorities, however, on other matters, some of his colleagues formed the nation-wide Kenya African National Union KANU) with James Gichuru, Kikuyu school teacher and exdetainee, as chairman. Gichuru, a friend of Kenyatta, says he is merely waiting for Kenyatta's return. Mboya found KANU a fact, with no position of power for him. though he did manage a place as committeeman. It remains to be seen whether he can gain influence in KANU, or will try to reorganize his own party on a nationwide basis.

This latter aim, however, is still further complicated. For Mboya is not a Kikuyu but a Luo and the Luo tribe has been accused of making gains at the expense of Kikuyu during the Mau Mau emergency. Furthermore, latest reports from Kenya state that a new party, dominated by the Masai and Somali tribes, has been formed, claiming to represent 3,000,000 blacks.

The dilemma which faces African leaders like Mbova is acute. He has said, "You cannot have a country where 65,000 happy people (the whites) live in privilege, owning cars, having the best jobs, the best land, and a per capita income of £1,000-and contrasting that, 6,000,000 people (the blacks), all poor, illiterate and ignorant. Their life is full of nothing but disease, bad housing, a low standard of living, very little educational opportunity, very little opportunity for advancement."

White Kenya sees it differently. How can you have a happy country when these 6,000,000 people, "all poor, illiterate, and ignorant" suddenly have thrust on them the responsibility of self-government?

They must be educated first, say the whites, and that takes time.

Mboya argues that self-government is possible and now. He has said that Africans, literate and otherwise, are politically aware of opposing forces in the world to the extent that they affect their own local environment. It is up to their leaders to define these opposing forces for them. To the full-blown democrat, the reference to the role of the leader has a slightly ominous ring to it.

One thing is certain: co-operation of white Africa is necessary if black Africa is to be educated. Reginald Alexander, white representative of Nairobi in the Kenya Legislative Council, has said: "We have heard it said often that we want other races to attain our European standards and learn to behave as we do before being given responsibilities. Yet when the opportunities come forward these same (European) people say 'We want you to attain our standards but do not come near us to learn them.' We cannot have it both ways.'

The past few months have seen some forward strides in Kenya. Preparations are being made for the integration of whites, blacks, and Asians in schools, something inconceivable four years ago. And a Central Land Advisory Board has been set up to open to black farmers the White Highlands, 12,000 square miles of arable lands formerly restricted to whites.

Will this sort of measure be enough? Even a moderate like Tom Mboya does not believe so. He has said that no small minority, as the whites in Kenya, will effectively educate a poverty-stricken majority. The facts of history, he suggests, show that a people can only advance by their own efforts, under conditions of economic and political freedom.

The role of Tom Mboya, like the future of Kenya itself, is in doubt. Perhaps events there will go as events in the Belgian Congo now seem to be going. But a recent statement made by Frank D. Corfield on Mau Mau in Kenya does

if possible, what Crippen and Ethel LeNeave were like. Only by imagining that cluttered parlour in Hilldrop Crescent, supported by the knowledge that it was the perfect expression of Belle Elmore's abominable taste, only by imagining what Captain Kendall, of the Montrose said and did when he saw through the pathetic disguises of his two strange passengers, only by imagining what those two haunted and hounded creatures said to one another behind the closed door of their cabin could one's speculations be set at rest.

And so the play that was to have concerned itself with an old trial would have nothing in it of the trial at all. It would begin with the ringing of a doorbell in a house on Hilltop Crescent, in London. It would end with the blast of a steamship whistle in the St. Lawrence River. And when the play was done, a backward glance at the youngster in the small town in the summer of 1910 gave me a feeling that a wheel had come around full circle.

Members of the public are extremely unobservant, and when the police ask

for help it isn't that they don't want to come forward or won't come forward to help, it's just that they haven't seen it.—Colonel St. Johnston,

and the probable effect of discrimination on their baby girl as she grows up; John Seeley, of the Alcoholics Research Foundation and one of the authors of the controversial study of Canadian community life, Crestwood Heights, who disagrees with Littman-thinks children should be taught racial tolerance by example; Dr. Norma Ford Walker, the Canadian geneticist, who believes that the product of the marriage of people of different races is genetically likely to be more intelligent and physically stronger than of more interbred people of the same race, and, in fact, recommends mixed marriages; members of the three-man antidiscrimination board for the Department of Labour for Ontario, who are responsible for imple-

Included also is an interview, recorded last summer by producer Christian McDougall with Han Suyin, doctor and novelist, when she was in Canada to speak at the Couchiching Conference on *Changing Asia*. Dr. Suyin is probably best known as the author of *Love*

Is a Many Splendoured Thing, a novel based on her love for a British war correspondent. For Citizens' Forum she recorded her feelings about being a Eurasian (the daughter of a Chinese father and a French mother). She told Miss McDougall she felt that the world is becoming more Eurasian because of the ease of travel, that it is inevitable that it will eventually become all Eurasian, and that she thinks this will be a good thing.



MUSIC ON RADIO

By Frank Haworth

THAT music should "run" in families is neither surprising nor particularly uncommon. The example of a musically enthusiastic parent, or older brother or sister, is the earliest and strongest stimulus to musical activity, and their informed interest is the best condition for the recognition and development of any talent that may emerge as a result. There are many cases of the mantle of a distinguished father falling on an equally, or yet more distinguished, son-the Scarlattis and the Mozarts, to name two obvious examples.

But it is a good deal less common for several members of a family to rise to eminence on the world scene, since talent (and still more genius) is a much rarer phenomenon than the competence that assiduous practice in favorable home surroundings can be fairly well counted on to produce. There are, however, several outstanding instances-the Bachs-and their French contemporaries the Couperins come to mind. Much better known than the latter to the world at large are the Viennese Strausses-father Johann and sons Johann, Josef and Eduard - who are to have a program to themselves on Wednesday night. Comparatively few people are acquainted with Soeur Monique or the Lecons des Tenebres; but fewer still are unacquainted with The Blue Danube, or Tales from the Vienna Woods. And while the latter may lack something of the aristocratic elegance of the former, the Strauss music has yet a rare quality, shared with that of only handful of composers, from Schubert to Sullivan—a combination of universal appeal with acceptability by the highest critical standards. It thrills the musically illiterate millions, while arousing the disciplined enthusiasm of such jujdges as Brahms, Wagner, Mahler, Liszt and Rubinstein. True popularity indeed.

A celebrated work to be heard in the two-piano recital of Margaret Parsons and Clifford Polle. on CBC Concert Hall on Sunday evening, is Brahms' Variations on a Theme of Haydn-now becoming known as the St. Anthony Variations" since it has become established that the theme, the St. Anthony Chorale, was not in fact by Haydn. Variations have been described as the musical equivalent of the literary essay, wherein the writer successively meditates on various aspects of his subject: and the comparison is particularly apt in the case of this composition (which was originally for orches-

The traditional "Theme and Variations" consisted simply of repetitions of the melody with "varied"i.e. more or less fancy-accompaniments. Many of us still remember them from the piano-practice of our school days, when we were required to cope with innumerable sets of variations, often on such ditties as "Home Sweet Home," by such erstwhile celebrities as Ascher, Kalkbrenner, Brinley Richards and Sidney Smith, which were once enormously popular-largely because they were much easier to play than they sounded (or could be made to sound), thereby enabling one to astonish the natives without undue exertion. Brahms, however, following the precedent

set by Beethoven and others. adopted a different procedure. Instead of repeating the whole tune he took particular features of it in turn - little groups of notes, rhythms, etc., occurring here and there in it - and used them as starting points for what amounts to a series of new compositions, short pieces of great charm and originality, though admittedly somewhat tenuous in their connections with the actual theme. They have, in fact been described as variations on its spirit, rather than on its text.

Though ancient Greece was the main source from which Western conceptions of art were derived, the country has long suffered artistic eclipse. There are few prominent Greek names in the history of music; but one recent figure shows some signs of enjoying a certain posthumous recognition — Nikos Skalkottas, whose short life ended in 1949. His Ten Sketches for Strings are to be played on Concerts from Europe, on Tuesday evening (Dominion Network).

A Walk in the Desert

SIXTEEN civilizations have flourished and then foundered in their own dust in the Near East. Because of man's neglect and selfishness, once verdant areas are now seas of billowing sand, blisteringly hot in the daytime, chilling at night, and offering very little protection to man or beast. But scientists are hard at work to make the deserts bloom again. Sunday afternoon CBC radio's Venture will tell how they are going about it, in A Walk in the Desert.

Mike Bevan of the CBC has taken a wealth of recorded material supplied by UNESCO and edited it down to an hour of informative entertainment. He will show that what modern scientists are up to in the arid regions of Lebanon, Syria, Iraq, Egypt and Sudan is as ruggedly adventurous, as ingenious, as doggedly determined as any tale of derring-do. And one of

the most interesting things about their work is the fact that they are combining modern scientific skills and equipment with the droughtfighting knowledge which ancient civilizations acquired and recorded on tablets and other relics discovered by archaeologists.

The world's outstanding authority on Near Eastern deserts, Dr. Kassas of Cairo, tells on the program about the sort of trees that grew in these areas, and in some of them not so long ago, either—say 700 years. During the Crusades, she says, the sacking of towns and burning of countryside destroyed the vegetation that held

On "Summerfallow"

The Dark One

A fantasy by R. S. JAMES

ONE bright Sunday morning in May a year ago, R. S. James of the CBC drama department sniffed the humid air of Toronto and wished it had the tang of the sea in it. He was lonesome for Newfoundland - any bit of the island's 6,000 miles of coastline, for he knows it all well. He went in his mind's eye to a little fishing village on the south shore - it could have been almost anywhere from Bay Bulls to Trepassey - followed its ragged pattern of houses up from the rough, boat-studded shore to a valley and beyond into the soft green hills hunched against the dark mountain in the summer sun. Into his imagination crept a group of shadowy characters that appealed to his sentimental mood. Quickly they took on substance, and before long a radio drama, The Dark One, was down on paper. Summerfallow will present it Monday night, with production by the author.

The cast features Hugh Webster as Christy, Larry Beatty as Michael, Ruth Springford as Mrs. O'Dell, and John Sturgess as the King of the Fairies. The role of a mermaid will be spoken by Ruth Springford and sung by Joyce Sullivan.

The Dark One is rather different from the usual Summerfallow production. You might call it a prose poem, a tender, warm, love story, deeply understanding of the men who sail away to fish and the women who wait for them. Worked into it are two songs James has written — Morris Surdin has set them to music — that sound as authentic as any folk songs to come out of Newfoundland.

The people James has created are of Irish stock, retaining the lilt and many of the colloquialisms of their forefathers, but having a dis-

tinct Newfoundland flavour their talk. "The southern shore of Newfoundland," James tells us, "is almost entirely populated by people of Irish descent. Most of them are shore fishermen who harvest the cod with hand lines and traps. But they have great affection for the land, and almost all of them have small farms-a horse, cow, a few sheep, pigs and fowl - in conjunction with their fishing interests. It's a very beautiful coastline, extremely rugged, with jutting rocks that can spell disaster in storms."

James was born in St. John's. Before joining the CBC in 1951 he worked for almost 20 years with the Department of Agriculture in Newfoundland, travelling 'round the whole island, on shore and off shore—even lived on a motor boat for three years, so he knows the fisherfolk well, and appreciates their love and fear of the sea. He brings out this dramatically and delicately in *The Dark One*.

the earth's moisture in and kept the top soil from blowing away. After that the sand had its way. Even today the nomadic Bedouins moving across the desert wastes thoughtlessly burn up what little growth there is to keep warm at night. Because in their culture animals (cattle, sheep, goats) are considered a prestige factor, they try to accumulate vast herds. These skinny, parched beasts eat up the scanty vegetation their owners have not burned.

Venture lets you meet some of these nomads who are living in their own misery and doing nothing about it, lets you hear their strange musical instruments and conversation, and the sounds of their animals (including the nubian goats known as the black locusts of the desert), and then the scientists working on the problem of the nomads and the desert tell what they are doing to help solve it.

The deserts in each of the countries visited has its own peculiarities. *Venture* describes each in turn.

One of the most surprising things the program reveals is the fact that underneath Egypt's Nile river runs another river with six times the flow of the Nile. The difficulty is to get this abundant supply of water up to the desert plateau 300 feet above the Nile. Egyptian oases are actually natural shafts through which this water is being forced by nature to the land above, allowing an island of vegetation to thrive in a sea of sand. In the Alamein area to the north

the Egyptian government and UNESCO are restoring the old Roman wells that were in use 2,000 years ago. You will hear sounds of this activity, too. And of particular interest is a recording made 19 years ago when King Tut-ankh-amen's trumpets were blown for the first time since they were sealed in his tomb 3,300 years ago.

Lebanon, Mike Bevan tells us, has a high rainfall, but its soil is too porous to retain the water, which quickly seeps down into underground lakes and flows out of the country to the sea. Scientists have sunk shafts to explore the size and course of this vast subterranean water supply, and to provide openings through which to bring it to the surface. The microphone follows them into one of the roaring caverns below. Another

In Syria the microphone takes listeners to visit Ur, the Sumerian city identified in the Bible as the home of Abraham. It is of unknown age-was flourishing as early as 3500 B.C. Also visited are Nebuchadnezzar's hanging gardens. Through Syria and Iraq flow the Tigris and Euphrates rivers which frequently flood, leaving a salt layer on the soil which kills vegetation. Archaeologists have found invaluable records on old clay tablets of what has been grown on the soil in that area through the centuries, layer by layer, and they are using this

nonsensical pronouncements, and have them accepted as if they were Holy Writ. This provides you with an amusing and harmless pastime, and serves as a useful stimulus for flagging conversations. Its chief value is that you acquire a big mental question mark that flashes on every time you hear the words "experts say."

Only minor skills are required. The tone of voice must be reasonably authoritative, and the "expert" statement must have some connection, however remote, with the topic of conversation.

To run true to expert form, and for your own peace of mind, the statements should be ones which are not easily disproved. Prophetic statements are the easiest, and horror prophecies are very good for effect. For example:

"The experts say that in twenty years time we will all be living off algae and baby bees." Or this one:

"The experts say that after another ten hydrogen bombs or so, there'll be so much strontium 90 in the milk that you'll be able to see it if you hold the bottle up to the light."

Your statements will have an even more profound effect if you name your expert. It's as well to remember, though, that unidentifiable experts with odd sounding names carry much more weight than a familiar Dr. Spock or Blair Fraser. The interest is heightened for you if you make up your own experts, like this: "There's a scientist called Grauschwitz in East Germany who says that apricots make you sterile." Or perhaps this: "You know that top lawyer, Fiegelman, in the States? He says that even piano teachers have been getting payola.

There are one or two variations which can help you avoid a too repititious reference to experts. A good one is that old standby, the "reliable authority."

"I've been told by a reliable authority that Hitler has been seen working as a waiter in Winnipeg."

If pressed for your source of information, the best line of retreat is to hint that your authority is so reliable that he doesn't want his name to be mentioned.

Another good method is to put the gem of misinformation in the form

Commercials on CBC

ANNE BERGIN, Supervisor of Commercial Acceptance, is interviewd by—

J. FRANK WILLIS



J. FRANK WILLIS: Before we talk about the day-to-day work of your department I think we should perhaps make it clear that the basic regulations about radio and TV advertising come from the Board of Broadcast Governors, rather than the CBC. What sort of general rules does the BBG lay down?

ANNE BERGIN: Well, for example, BBG regulations control the length and frequency of commercials in proportion to program length, prohibit the advertising of anything contrary to law, require food and drug products to be approved by the Department of National Health and Welfare as well as by the Board itself, and set out the nature of advertising in newscasts. BBG regulations apply to all stations operating in Canada whether they be CBC- or privately-owned. Beyond this, acceptance standards of the individual station are up to the policy of the management. CBC's acceptance standards are laid down in its acceptance department. The program department determines what will be made available for sale; the sales department locates the advertiser and works in liaison with Commercial Acceptance as to the acceptability of the adver-

J. F. W.: What type of advertisement and what type of advertiser do you turn down?

A. B.: There are many products and services that we do not accept. For example we do not carry foundation garment advertising, advertisements for laxative preparations or for personal hygiene, derogatory advertisements and many others. Our standards require that all commercials must be in good taste.

J. F. W.: Patent medicines?

A. B.: Well, that depends. If they do not fall in the laxative or dietetic category we do.

J. F. W.: There was one phrase, Anne, that I'm not quite clear on myself—"derogatory advertising." Does that mean an ad runs down somebody else's product?

A. B.: That is quite right, Frank. Every opportunity is afforded an advertiser to present his commercial in a positive way, promoting the advantages of his product, not the disadvantages of his competitors'.

J. F. W.: What is the CBC's position on cigarette and liquor advertising?

A. B.: Liquor advertising is not permitted in Canada: but you may advertise beer and wine in some provinces. Under BBG regulations if it is permitted in a province they have specific regulations set out to control the advertising of beer and wine. This is limited to an identification at a stated interval that the program is being presented by the name of the brewery. We do carry such advertising, for example, in the province of Quebec.

J. F. W.: What about cigarettes?

A. B.: Since public health authorities have not seen fit to categorize cigarettes as a threat to health, and action has not been taken to restrict their production, distribution or consumption, except in so far as the sale to children is concerned, it would not be proper for the CBC to set itself up as an authority to decide what it, or is not detrimental to the national health. I think you would agree that this is clearly not our function. The CBC therefore does not feel justified in refusing to accept advertising for a commodity which is of a perfectly legal character.

J. F. W.: I get letters from wouldbe public benefactors, asking if they can buy a few minutes of silence to give people a rest from commercials. What's our answer to these people?

A. B.: The basic policy under which the Commercial Acceptance Department works is that we have time available for goods and services only, so that if someone wants to buy a few minutes of silence we must regretfully decline his application.

J. F. W.: A great many of our television shows come to us from the



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United States and the advertising copy is written there and delivered by an American announcer. Do we exert any control over this at all?

A. B.: Yes indeed we do. In most cases the commercials are submitted to our department for review prior to broadcast.

J. F. W.: If we object to a piece of copy will they change it?

A. B.: Yes, they have been most co-operative in situations that have come up during the past years and we enjoy excellent relations with the American networks.

of a question. This is one of the more subtle tactics, since it implies that an expert is in the background somewhere, like this: "Did you know that the Soviet Field Marshal, Timoshenko, is descended from an Irishman called Tim O'Shay who had a hardware business in Russia under the name of Tim O'Shay and Co.? Did you know that?

The "Did you know?" method is perhaps the best one to use with people who are cynical and hard to impress. With a little persistence it can bring the victim near to lunacy.

Another variation worth remembering is the "Statistics show" method. Although anyone will tell you that you can prove anything by statistics, they seem to forget all about this if you lead off with "statistics show."

"Statistics show that if the beatniks in Toronto keep on increasing at their present rate, in ten years time they'll have taken over the city."

A more radical variation of the whole pastime of quoting imaginary experts is to take the opposite stance and be a negative expert. The method is to ask people for proof of some statement they have just made. If you ever have the urge to bring a pointless conversation to a jarring halt, there are few better ways than this. Pompous acquaintances can be brought to heel when they have to explain lamely: "Well, I'm just telling you what I heard."

Once again tone of voice is important. You have to ask for proof and make it sound as if you had a coldly analytical mind and not as if you merely wanted to start an argument. Next time we have hot weather, and someone is babbling away about it not being the heat but the humidity, you can make him feel even hotter by asking him for proof of this odd theory.

All these subterfuges can, with some modification, be used to great advantage in the fields of art and letters. On occasions, most of us are called on to pass comment on a painting over which some talented artist is supposed to have laboured. At one time, this didn't call for a great deal of thought on our part. All we had to do was to say: "Doesn't he do arms and legs nicely?" or make some such appropriate remark, and we had done everything that could be expected of us. Unfortunately, those golden days are past, and most often we are brought up against some lunatic canvas that defies comment. Under these circumstances, the normal reaction is to back away, murmuring indistinctly and shaking the head.

Instead of this rather negative attitude, it's better to use the expert technique. Walk boldly up to the painting and examine it closely. Then say: "Ye-es, but the Radzinsky influence shows through just a trifle too clearly, don't you think?"

In most cases you will find that you have cleared the hurdle and left your pursuer fumbling blindly on the other side. Modern sculpture can be tackled the same way. All too often, the average viewer is reduced to a baffled silence by those pieces of tortured rock with holes through them. This needn't be. Rather than hasten shyly through a gallery of this stuff, it's possible to saunter through, comment on each piece, and have someone admiringly ask for your autograph before you reach the other end.

You pause before some grotesque boulder and say: "This man Jorgensen's showing some promise this year, don't you think?" This, by the way, is as close to praise as it's proper for an expert to go.

Instead of averting your eyes from some catastrophic nude, you survey it with relish and then put your head on one side and say: "He's experimenting with opposed ellipses again, but he's not having the success he had hoped for." Should the work appear to be devoid of ellipses, the word "rectangle" will do just as nicely.

There are some people who seem to have nothing better, to do than read each best seller that comes on the market. Their next move is to go around and ask other people if they've read it yet. It's not really necessary to avoid these people. You can, quite happily, lie in wait for them. When they ask you: "Have you read the sequel to Painful Place yet?" be ready; try the expert technique, like this: "Personally I agree with Weisler's criticism, don't you? Now there's a man who really analyzes motivations."

In the whole course of these little enterprises, the height of achievement is reached when a nonsensical statement is made with such weight that someone goes to a lot of trouble to disprove it. For instance, during one of those perennial suburban discussions on how to grow a lawn, this sort of statement might provoke some reaction:

"There's this scientist called Friedhaus at Heidelberg who's found that grass grows twice as quickly if it's cut in the middle of the night."

The sound of a lawn mower being pushed furiously to and fro at midnight is only half the reward. Fulfilment comes a couple of weeks later, when the same enthusiast approaches with a triumphant air. He's tried a little experiment, and that scientist chap at Heidelberg is all wrong.

Of course, if enough people adopted this make-believe expert system as a hobby, the result might be a mild sort of anarchy. This could be a good thing, because when we came out of it, the words "Experts say" would have lost all their significance. We would be much more ready to think like individuals.
