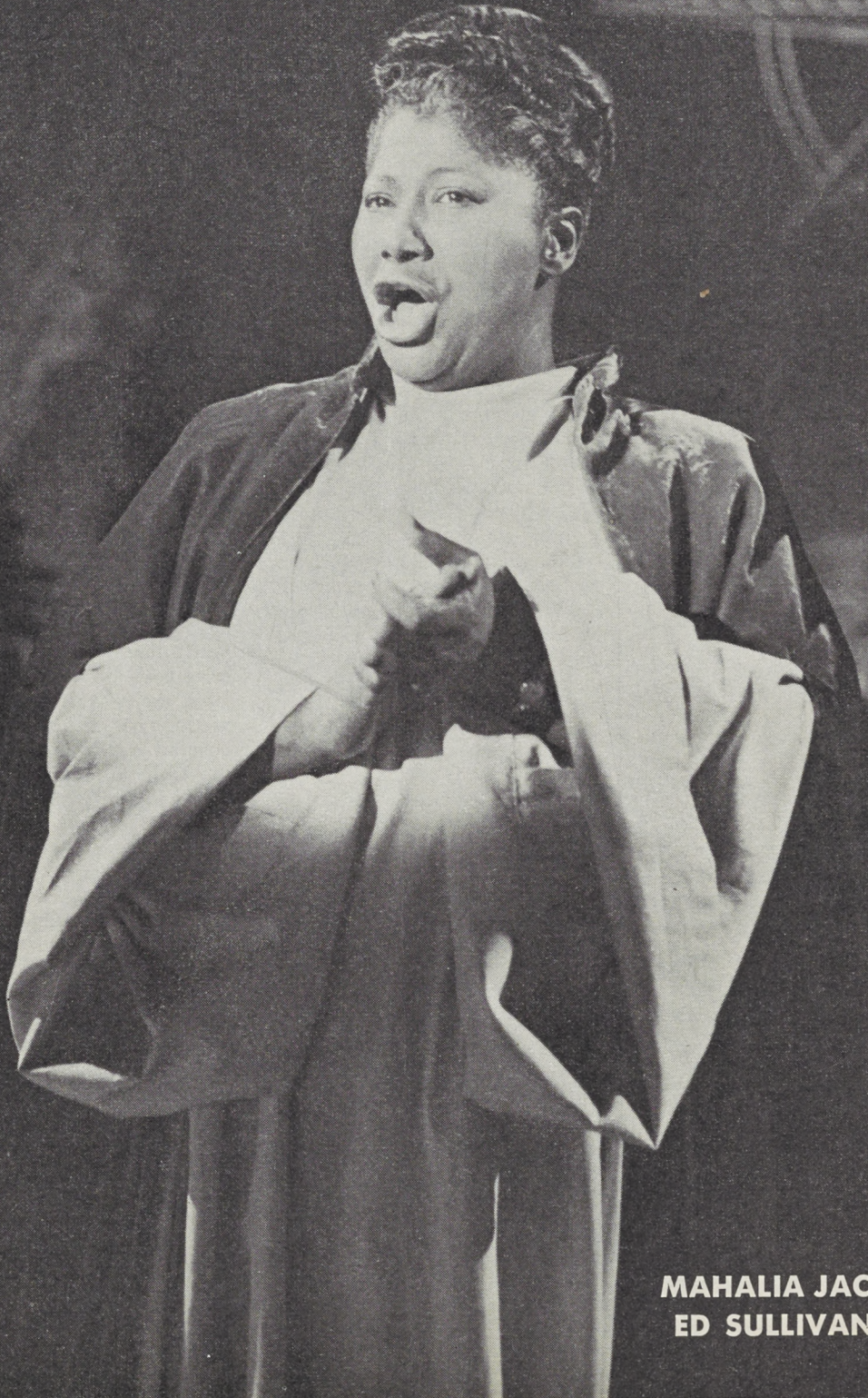

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The Notron

The last word on the investigation of matter, originally reported on "Post-News Talks" by JIM PARR of the University of Alberta

DR. FREIDRICH SCHMELTZER has, I'm afraid, been guilty of a number of scientific errors in past years, and indeed, most of his so-called discoveries have amounted to nothing. His name has been in the news again recently in connection with an astounding discovery of another new particle of matter, which I shall try to describe to you.

Perhaps you will not believe what Dr. Schmeltzer told me, and what I shall now tell you. Frankly, there are times when I don't believe it myself. Of course, the whole history of science is so interlaid with academic jokes and dubious facts that the public becomes wary of announcements of new discoveries. Indeed, the fact that Dalton's theory of atomic structure was almost predicted 2,000 years earlier by the Greeks (if you allow a liberal translation) is an amusing commentary on 20 centuries of science. And any qualms we felt about being told the scientific truth when we were at school were nothing compared to the hopeless confusion we now suffer in the hands of scientists who daily discover new little particles of matter. Not only the old stuff, like protons, neutrons, electrons and positrons, but new little devils — neutrinos, mesons, nylons, and other tiny bodies whose discoveries come so frequently that you and I have properly ignored them. Another new particle of matter, reported in the fillers at the end of the daily newspaper columns, has little more significance than the news of another husband for a famous Hollywood star, or the announcement of another projected pipe-mill in Alberta.

I should introduce the subject of Schmeltzer's announcement by pointing out that the picture of the constitution of matter has recently become almost clear. In the science digest of our weekly magazines, in the pages of learned journals, even in the debates at

meetings of dignified scientific societies, the impression has been given of the completeness of contemporary theory. But this is not an altogether true impression. For in the laboratories, and over the South African sherry sipped at the social sessions that precede the special lectures, doubts and anxieties have been expressed about the sort of missing link of the atomic theory of matter. And now, it appears, that link has been found, and pressed snugly into place.

The announcement of the discovery of the *notron* was quietly made from the laboratories of Dr. Freidrich Schmeltzer during the past week. After years of patient research, Schmeltzer and his devoted colleagues feel that they have the evidence that proves the existence of this vitally new elementary particle, whose being puts new life into a sagging atomic theory.

Of course it would be unfair to say that the early failures of Schmeltzer and his colleagues have been of no benefit to humanity, or that the 15 years that he and his 43 co-workers devoted to the cause have been inefficiently used. During the course of their work—as is so often the way in scientific investigation — many other discoveries have been made: in the late '40's, Schmeltzer (or more correctly, one of his assistants) discovered a new antibiotic; and in the early fifties, many other valuable additions were made to scientific knowledge: five anomalies were discovered regarding the law of mass action; a slight revision was made to Newton's second law of motion; the first law of thermodynamics was, shall we say, brushed up a little. But the early failures—if I may use the word failures—did not end even there, for discoveries were made that have more directly benefitted mankind — discoveries that include ten tranquilizers, three missile metals and 41 detergents.

These however, were of little consolation to Freidrich Schmeltzer whose aim was, as I have said, to discover this elementary particle of matter that he felt so certain must be present. This — if I may

Drew Thompson

The law student who became "the funniest man in Canada"

OFFSTAGE Drew Thompson has the air of someone who's wondering where he left his hat. He looks as if he should be walking through a quadrangle with books under his arm. His large blue eyes wear an innocent, questioning expression. His manner is gentle, his voice low and soft. And according to CBC-TV writer-director Melwyn Breen, he's the funniest man in Canada.

Like most people who handle comedy well, he is fundamentally serious, but with an acute sense of humour that will bubble up suddenly and fill his eyes with tears of laughter. Kids love him — sense an immediate rapport. So do adult stage and TV audiences who enjoy a sensitive characterization, tragic or straight, or an extremely amusing interpretation of a comedy situation.

You will be able to see Drew Thompson twice this week on CBC-TV. Sunday night, November 6, he stars with Mavor Moore and Gillie Fenwick in *My Heart's in the Highlands*, a teleplay by Melwyn Breen based on William Saroyan's engaging fable about a self-styled poetic genius (Moore), and his boy (Nicky Austin) who worships him. Into their poverty-stricken but strangely happy household comes Jasper MacGregor, an old ham actor (Thompson) who plays beautiful music on a bugle, and whose heart's in the highlands.

Monday night, November 7, Thompson appears in the *Festival '61* production of *Lord Arthur Savile's Crime*, a satiric melodrama by Rita Greer Allen, based on a short story by Oscar Wilde. Just before his wedding Lord Arthur (played by John Colicos) is told by a fortune-teller that his destiny is to commit murder. He decides to get it over with before marrying. Thompson plays the cameo part of the librarian who suggests ways of doing away with his victims.

Thompson has a surprising lack of the egocentricity which makes some members of the acting pro-

fession hard to unscramble. He does not keep a scrapbook. He rarely gives an interview—not because he's trying to be difficult,

Perry's acting credits include work on CBC Winnipeg radio and television, Manitoba Theatre Centre and Theatre 77. He has spent the past two years in Toronto where he studied at the Royal Toronto Conservatory and appeared in major roles in such programs as "The Explorer" and "The Apprenticeship of Duddy Kravitz" on G.M. Presents.

Perry returned to Winnipeg to seek production work and while awaiting his opening at the CBC took a role in the Manitoba Theatre

but because he hates talking about himself.

But he has plenty to talk about. He was born in Ottawa, graduated from Trinity College, University of Toronto, and his family assumed that he would step into a law practice, run for parliament, and lead

Centre production of "Mr. Roberts." He suffered a bruised knee and tendons in an accident during the play which ended his acting career and delayed his acceptance of the production position at CBWT.

Ray McConnell was born in Ballymeno, Ireland, in 1936, and came to Winnipeg with his family in 1947. His father is the noted choreographer and dance school proprietor, Sam McConnell.

Ray joined the CBC in Winnipeg in January, 1957, as a stage hand and one year later was promoted to the position of studio director. His widely varied log as a studio director includes such telecasts as the Calgary Stampede, Happyland, Toes In Tempo, Red River Jamboree, several dramas and film documentaries. In addition, his experience as a dance instructor since the age of 14 has been valuable on many occasions, such as the Junior Hi-Lites and Calling All Children shows where he has helped young performers.

Ray's first assignment will be "Three's Company," a week-daily half-hour afternoon show which will premiere Nov. 21. Ray is anxious to combine the many talents of the program's three stars, Mary Liz Bayer, Jose Poneira and Bill Guest into an informative and entertaining series with something of interest to everyone.

a conventional life. They didn't reckon with the University's amateur dramatic society. Thompson got his first whiff of greasepaint there and loved it. "In a college

drama festival the play I appeared in got a terrible panning from the adjudicator, so that night I decided to do something about it, got hold of a brochure for the Banff School of Fine Art—it offered the only drama instruction in Canada at the time—and sent in my

application with a cheque." After a few rough edges had been smoothed off his acting in Banff he was signed up by one of the teachers there who was founding the Everyman Theatre in Vancouver. Quite a few actors now well-established joined him, including Arthur Hill, Ted Follows, Ed McNamara and Murray Westgate.

On his way home to Ottawa from Vancouver some time later he stopped in Toronto with messages from the Everyman producer for Dora Moore of the New Play Society, and she hired him on the spot. The following summer he appeared in stock with the International Players in Kingston, where the late Arthur Sullivan was producer. At the end of the season Thompson went into partnership with the company as actor-producer. He was with the International Players for eight years. The *New York Times* and *Herald-Tribune* called them the longest consecutive weekly stock company in North America (at that time). They had two companies going in the summer, playing split weeks along the St. Lawrence and in Kingston, and a winter company in Toronto.

There was very little legitimate stage production in Ontario then, and the International Players offered a practical training ground for a lot of actors who are now leading Canadian professionals. "We did 22 shows weekly in the winter for three years," Thompson recalls. "There were always four new shows in rehearsal, with everybody taking a hand. It was a very expensive undertaking, but we had the reputation of making more money than any other company in Canada. Our policy was "pay as you like"—we passed pie plates for a collection—and we certainly lost less money than anybody else."

We asked how his family felt about his career. He laughed. "It took a good five years before they thawed out. Now they're reconciled and have become experts on the theatre—they think!"

Five years ago Thompson had a season on Broadway and did a *(Please turn to page 15)*

Citizens' Forum Opens 18th Season

Defence policies first subject, Foulkes to speak

CITIZENS' FORUM opens its 18th season this week on CBC radio and television with the first of a three-part examination of Canadian defence policies. Program planner Christina McDougall says "the question looming through all three is whether policies developed in the '40's and '50's are adequate for the '60's. The first program will try to explain the basic assumptions on which present defence decisions are made, and to place them in historical perspective. The second program will offer critics of these policies a chance to have their say, and the third will deal with the effects of recent international developments.

"Getting General Charles Foulkes to take part in the first two discussions is a great feather in our cap," Miss McDougall says. "Until his recent retirement he was chairman of the Chiefs of Staff in Ottawa, and during his term of office the major post-war policies of Canada in defence were determined. This is the first occasion he has agreed to discuss these decisions."

The other speaker in the opening program will be F. H. Soward of the University of British Columbia, where he is associate dean of the faculty of graduate studies, head of the department of history and director of international studies. He is a historian who has been associated closely with international developments since the Second World War, in particular as a member of the Canadian delegation to the United Nations. He has written extensively about the reasons for our defence policies.

All *Citizens' Forum* discussions this season will be chaired by Gordon Hawkins, executive director of the Duke of Edinburgh's Commonwealth Study Conference, and he will act as host on the occasions when the topic of the evening is explored in documentary form.

Arguments against our defence policies will be put forward in the second program, and General Foulkes will answer them. Should

Canada withdraw from the nuclear race, devote her resources to working for peace, and not try to play the role of a big power? Asking this and other questions will be: James Eayrs, professor of political science and economics at the University of Toronto, who is writing a book on Canadian defence policies; Rosemary Hamilton of Victoria, B.C., who is interested in social welfare; and Peter Remnant, professor of philosophy at the University of British Columbia, who is on the committee for Canadian withdrawal from NATO.

The third broadcast will explore issues not fully covered in the

other two, give a wider number of opinions, and examine public reaction to Canadian defence policies.

Since it was introduced during the war years, *Citizens' Forum* has aimed at stimulating an interest in and discussion of current issues. (It is a joint project of the CBC and the Canadian Association for Adult Education.) A glance back at some of the topics in the first year or two shows that Canadians are trying to settle the same questions now as then.

"But now," says Miss McDougall, "we are hoping to get a new approach to them. We plan to probe deeper and in more leisurely fashion this season, by devoting

John will talk with prairie livestock exhibitors and will report in detail on the placing of nearly 30 carloads of prairie livestock. In addition to covering all events pertinent to prairie listeners for the farm broadcast, he will prepare a feature on 4-H activities at the Royal for the Saturday morning Farm Club shows on all three prairie stations. This CBC Farm Club will be heard on Saturday, Nov. 19 at 11:45 a.m. on CBW, 9:30 a.m. on CBK, and 9:30 a.m. on CBX. Each of the three prairie provinces has sent 14 young farm people to the Royal to participate in the National 4-H Club Week.

The Country Calendar TV program on Nov. 13 will be national in scope and will originate live from the grounds of the Winter Fair. John MacLeod will be the CBC representative for the prairie provinces. Back in Winnipeg Nov. 20 for the regular weekly Country Calendar series, John will show stills of the events and of prairie prize-winning stock.

Twentieth Century

"The White House Story." Tom Glazer, composer and folk-singer, has completed an original music score for "The White House Story." This program chronicles the history of the White House from the time the home of Presidents was designed in 1792. As a composer, Glazer has written music of wide variety. He created the scores for the Hollywood motion picture "A Face in the Crowd" and for many documentaries and art films. In the popular field, he wrote the Kingston Trio hit, "A Worried Man," as well as such other hits as "Melody of Love" and "Till We Two Are Young."

Citizens' Forum

First of a three-part examination of Canadian Defence Policies. This program will attempt to explain the basic assumptions on which present defence decisions are made, and to place these assumptions in their historical per-

spective. Taking part in this opening program are: *General Charles Foulkes* of Victoria, B.C. Now retired, General Foulkes has agreed to discuss the decisions with which he has been so closely involved. *F. H. Soward*, associate Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies, Head of the Department of History, and Director of International Studies, University of British Columbia. *Gordon Hawkins*, executive director of the Duke of Edinburgh's Commonwealth Study Conference is host of the program.

The Nature of Things

Twenty-four program science series, only series of its kind on TV in North America. Prof. Donald Ivey, University of Toronto, host. Magazine-type format, with major topic each week, supplemented with short features dealing with science news and seasonal information. Major topics include: causes of schizophrenia, space technology, the brain and how it works, and a study (now going on at the University of Manitoba) of controlled isolation of human beings. Writers are: John Irwin, David Spurgeon, Ben Rose, Leonard Bertin, Maurice Constant, Lillian Andrews and Fred Knelman.

The first program tonight introduces the series. Dr. J. W. R. Steacie, president of the National Research Council, reminisces about changes in scientific attitudes in the course of his career. Dr. Wilder Penfield of the Montreal Neurological Institute describes his work on the human brain, and Dr. Abram Hoffer of the University of Saskatchewan discusses mental disease.

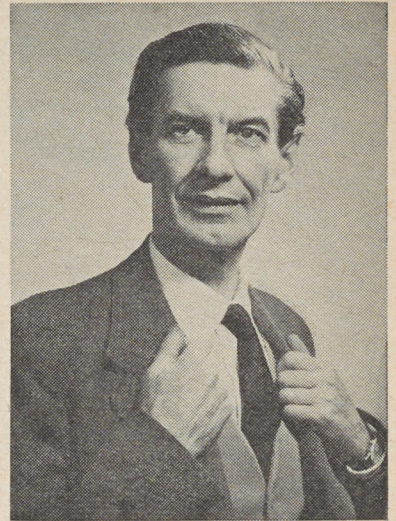
Walt Disney Presents

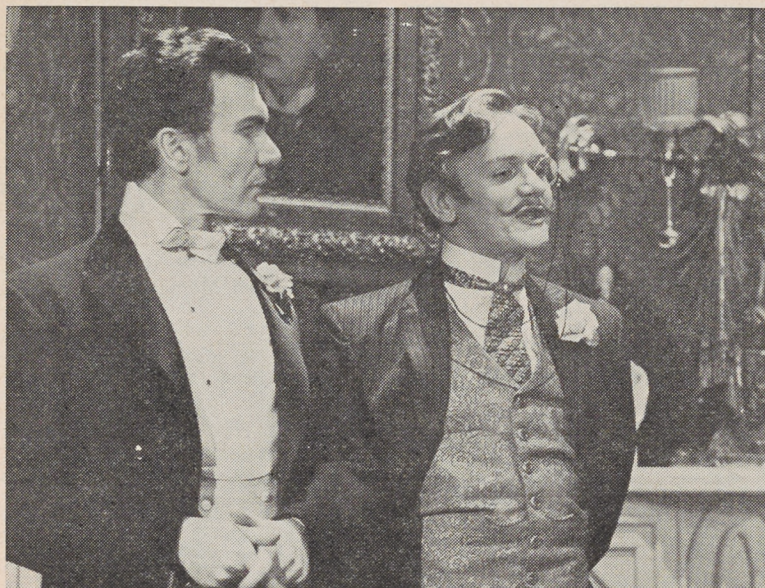

Shaken, but determined to fulfill his destiny before the wedding (thus protecting Sybil from possible scandal), he postpones the happy event—to the consternation of Lady Sybil and her domineering mother, the Duchess of Paisley. Choosing as his victim dear old Lady Clem, who suffers from heartburn and longs "to die," Savile approaches his unsavoury task scientifically. But Lady Clem proves harder than he had imagined.

U.S. PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION RESULTS

THE CBC national networks will cover the American presidential elections on Tuesday night starting at 8:00 p.m. (CST) on CBC Trans-Canada radio and at 8:30 p.m. (CST) on CBC-TV, and continuing till the result is known.

CBC radio will have available the resources of all the U.S. networks. "This should give us just about the most comprehensive coverage of the election in North America," says Charles Spraggett, editor-in-chief of CBC radio news.

In addition, three top Canadian newsmen, sitting in the NBC studios, will give the Canadian

viewpoint as the results come in. The newsmen are Stanley Burke, CBC correspondent at the U.N., Knowlton Nash, Washington correspondent, and Charles Lynch of Southam News. For about 20 minutes in every hour they will interpret the incoming results in the light of Canadian interests.

CBC television coverage of the election comes mainly from the NBC studios in New York. Chet Huntley and David Brinkley, who covered the presidential nominating conventions for NBC, will give the commentary.

A CBC-TV team, again giving the Canadian viewpoint for about five minutes every half hour, will be announcer Bruce Marsh, Norman DePoe, CBC national affairs reporter in Ottawa, James Minifie, CBC correspondent in Washington, and Blair Fraser, editor of *Macleans Magazine*.

Both radio and television will give their usual national news bulletin.

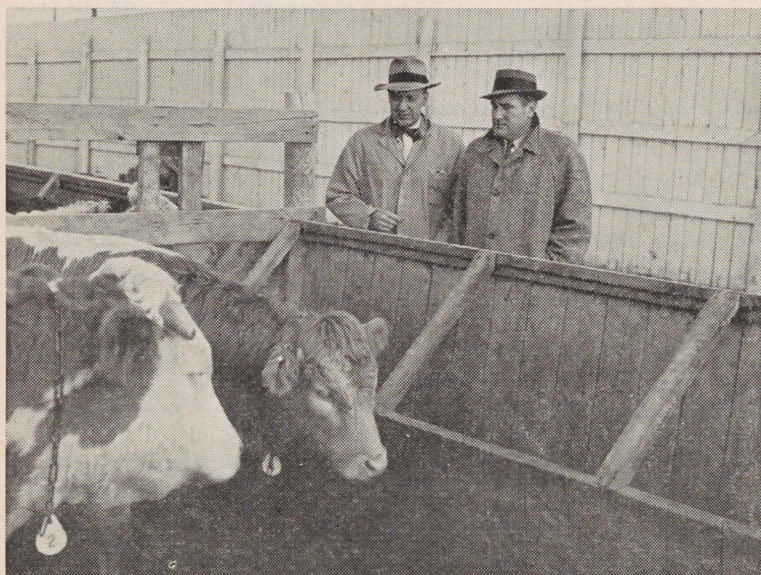

The Nature of Things

A new CBC-TV Science Series

The Nature of Things, is the title of a new CBC-TV science series (as it was of Lucretius' great poem 2,000 years ago). Dr. Donald Ivey, physics professor at the University of Toronto, and well known for the *Two for Physics* series on CBC-TV last summer, is the host.

The program subjects will range widely. *The Speed of Light* and *Relativity Testing* are two of several programs on physics in which Dr. Patterson Hume, the other half of the *Two for Physics* team, will join his colleagues.

Some of the programs will be away off-beat. *Venus and the Dolphins* examines the arguments of a man who says he has been to the planet Venus and the work of a scientist who talks with dolphins. *New Maps of Hell* asks: how scientific is science fiction? how do you distinguish between what is possible and what is impossible in science and technology?

Some programs emphasize the practical difficulties of science. *Engineering is a Science* shows that the man who wants to build a smaller, more efficient radio amplifier cannot just take earlier amplifiers as models, but must go directly to basic physics and chemistry. Other programs consider what has been called "the philosophy of science." *Observation and Experiment* asks whether the scientist is just a man with a notebook, jotting down what he sees, or whether he in some way reconstructs nature in his laboratory. Is he an observer, an experimenter, or a thinker?

Despite this diversity of subjects, the first program will present

The highlight of the program, and perhaps of the season as far as dancing goes, will be the presentation, by the Alwin Nikolais dancers, of a number of abstract, "new wave" ballet dances. Nikolais, who is known in the U.S. as one of the chief supporters of this form of dancing, likes to think that his dances are a form of complete theatrical composition where colour, light and form, sound and movement must be treated with equal respect and presented in a blend of reality and surrealism to create a proper effect.

"Why," says he, "must people always want to see things as they know things exist?" To Nikolais, a dancer is like a letter in the alpha-

Western Star

A new setting of Stephen Vincent Benét's poem, for speaking voices and ballad singer

TO ENGLAND came "a west wind blowing, the wind of the Western Star, to gather men's lives like pollen and cast them forth, blowing in hedge and highway and seaport town, a salt wind, a sea wind, a wind from the world's end, from coasts that have new, wild names, from a huge unknown." And when they felt the breath of it warmly tantalizing on their cheeks, the men with adventure and hope in their hearts picked up wife, child and chattels and went in little ships to Virginia and Cape Cod and sowed the seeds of America.

"Of the sea and the first plantings and the men, and how they came in the ships, and to what end," Stephen Vincent Benét wrote in a long narrative poem which was unfinished when he died of a heart attack at 44. The completed fragment was published posthumously under the title of *Western Star*. Toronto actor-writer Ivor Barry has arranged it for speaking voices and ballad singer, and it will be presented as a two-hour radio feature on CBC Wednesday Night. (See program note.)

In *Western Star*, says one critic, Benét "continued and prolongs the American search for a home and an emblem," capturing "the small, living, warm texture of the years of men, and over all the vast conception of the Western motive."

He was born in Philadelphia in 1898, the son of an army officer who knew and loved poetry deeply. Benét lived at various army posts, grew up in California, and graduated from Yale in 1919. "Poetry was from the first a bright valour in his blood," his brother said of him. He never wanted to do anything but write for a living, and never

did. At 17 he published six dramatic verse monologues, two more books while still an undergraduate, another a year after graduating, and his first novel, *The Beginning of Wisdom*, at 23. It was reviewed very favourably.

While doing post-graduate work at the Sorbonne in Paris he met his wife, Rosemary Carr, who was writing for the Paris edition of the *Chicago Tribune*. The early years of their marriage were lean—he depended on his short stories and novels for a living, ground out "formula" magazine yarns by the dozen, and yearned to write a long narrative poem based on the military records he had pored over in his father's library as a youth. The opportunity came when he was awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship in 1926. He took his wife and family to Paris and began work on *John Brown's Body*. The emotional patriotism that was to characterize many of his works, and his exceptional talent for the ballad form, combined in this poem to win him the Pulitzer Prize for Poetry in

1929. (A cast headed by Raymond Massey toured North America successfully in 1953 giving dramatic readings from it.)

Benét's next success was a prose work, *The Devil and Daniel Webster*, which is regarded as an American classic and has been made into an opera, film and stage play. There is great variety to his works, ranging from the deep feeling and intellectual approach in *John Brown's Body* to jingling verse. But it is in poetic ballads, or in stories in ballad form that he shines, with an unflagging, unashamed patriotism.

He was greatly concerned about the international situation in his last years, and during the Second World War devoted much of his failing strength to wartime jobs, including work (at the request of the U.S. Office of War Information) on a short interpretive history of the United States that could be distributed overseas in various languages. (It was published posthumously in 1945.) This had interrupted his progress with *Western Star*, but the completed portion is a moving memorial to a man who, in the words of American historian H. S. Commager, "loved his country passionately and gave his life to singing her beauty and her glory."

The Shakespeare Industry

University of the Air opens with seven talks on master dramatist

IN THE LAST decade Shakespeare has been getting around as never before. Aside from the three Stratford Festivals he is cropping up all over the globe. There were over 800 performances of Shakespeare in Czechoslovakia in 1957, and many more in other European countries. Peking audiences love *Romeo and Juliet*. *The Merry Wives of Windsor* is popular in Moscow.

"The Shakespeare Industry," says David Galloway, associate professor of English at the University of New Brunswick, "is enormous — as large as General Motors. Shakespeare now employs not merely actors, directors, stage hands, designers, costumers and electricians in the theatre and in the film and television industries. He is at least the partial means of livelihood for

critics, school teachers, university professors, editors, publishers, controversialists, cranks, souvenir manufacturers, and lecturers."

University of the Air begins its new season on CBC radio Monday night at 10:30 by taking a close look at Shakespearean productions and appreciation in Elizabethan times. It traces the growth of the "Shakespeare Industry" from then until now, with an appraisal of the various types of Shakespeare plays, and the probable future of Shakespeare productions.

In *An Introduction to Shakespeare* Professor Galloway offers seven informal talks, beginning with a colourful picture of English social life and London playhouses in Shakespeare's day. Some theatrical productions were sumptuous, he tells us, offering such atmospheric stimulants as one property list indicates: "One tomb, one Hell mouth, old Mahomet's head, Phaeton's chariot, the city of Rome, Kent's wooden leg, one chain of dragons, a rainbow, one chime of bells, and one cauldron for the Jew."

In his second lecture Professor Galloway takes a similar look at modern stage and film productions. But "neither the stage nor screen," he says, "provides Shakespeare with his largest audience. That is in the schools. Many people have complained that this is a reluctant audience and that the teacher is the enemy of Shakespeare . . . One thing is certain: if we do not teach Shakespeare in school, most children will have no opportunity of liking or disliking him . . . Apart from bad teaching, one of the reasons why more children do not appreciate Shakespeare is not that he is introduced to them too early, but that he is introduced too late."

And then he goes on to make a statement that will startle a good many people who stumbled over Shakespeare for the first time in their teens and did not enjoy the encounter. "Children could begin Shakespeare as soon as they are capable of listening to stories—that is at the age of three or four . . . To argue that young children will not understand Shakespeare is no argument at all. If taught well,

people can find something in Shakespeare to interest them at any age. Children sit with their eyeballs bulging at TV screens, while machine guns rattle, cars screech round corners and cowhands slug one another with bottles in mid-western saloons. Even by such primitive standards as these, children of four do not have a clear idea of what is going on, but they find it exciting. Shakespeare can be exciting, too."

In later talks Professor Galloway discusses Shakespeare's comedies, histories and tragedies, the different kinds of manuscripts from which the texts might have been printed, and offers opinions on whether scholarship has really added much to an understanding of the essential Shakespeare, whether there are depths to Shakespeare unrealized, and what the future of Shakespeare production and scholarship may be.

David Galloway was born in Scotland, educated at Cambridge where he took honours, first in history and then in English. His university career was interrupted by army service in the Second World War. He has been a mem-

ber of the department of English at the University of New Brunswick since 1948. During 1954-55 he spent a year at the Shakespeare Institute, Stratford-upon-Avon, with the aid of a fellowship from the Humanities' Research Council of Canada. He has published short stories, and several articles on Shakespeare and the Elizabethan period. His talks on *University of the Air* will be published in booklet form by the CBC. Details will be announced later.

the theme of the 26 programs. "The theme is that there is a unity in science," says program organizer David Walker, "that the doctor, the chemist, the physicist and the botanist all share an important way of looking at the world. This is not the only way of looking at the world, but for the man or woman who wishes to understand his own life, and the pattern of his environment, it is a necessary viewpoint to understand and use."

In the first program, Dr. Ivey will be joined by Dr. J. W. R. Steacey, president of the National Research Council, who will assess the present state of science. He will reminisce about the change in attitudes between scientists and society at large during the course of his own career as chemist, teacher and administrator.

Two more scientists will appear on the first program. One is Dr.

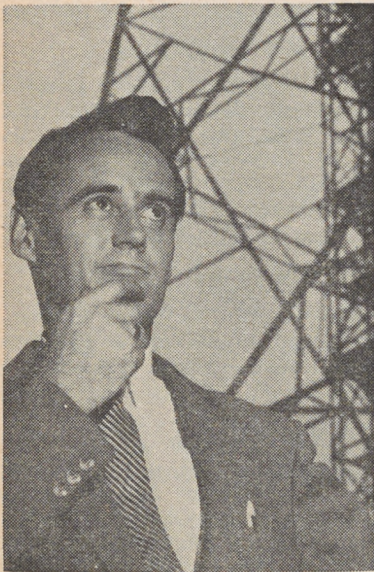

a hit on the U.S. *Steel Hour* with Red Buttons) but unlucky in that fate so often stepped in to, as he puts it, "make everything go flooey"—productions would be help up by one thing or another until his jobs conflicted and some had to be dropped. He has had to put off four trips to Europe, usually because enticing stage roles came up or shows ran longer than he expected, "The most difficult thing I've had to learn in life," he tells us, "is to live one day at a time."

Where acting is concerned he's a perfectionist. The only role he has been completely satisfied with on television was in *The Man With Two Hands*, written and directed by Melwyn Breen for CBC-TV's *First Person* a few weeks ago. A strange thing happened on that show. Thompson starred as a terribly British bloke who injured his right hand while opening a jar of preserves, and then discovered that his left hand was capable of all sorts of things. "Normally," he told us, "I can't write legibly with my left hand, but during rehearsals and on the show I found I could—could do all sorts of things with it which I normally can't. After the show my left hand went 'useless' again." Thompson is remarkably intuitive, but would rather not be, sometimes. "Some things," he says, "I'd just as soon not know in advance."

He has been asked to play at Stratford twice, but does not see himself as a Shakespearean actor, (Please turn to page 29)

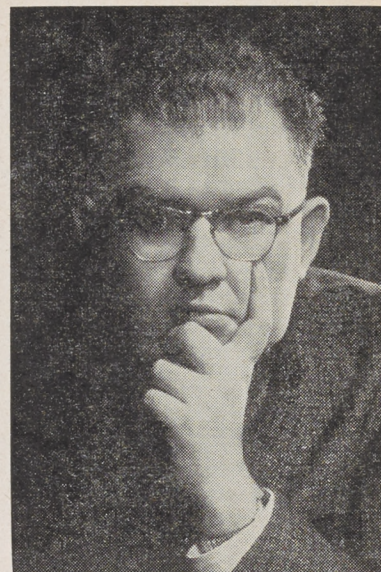

TRANS-CANADA MATINEE

Report on the Family Court—Second of two documentaries explaining what goes on in and out of Family Courts presented by Marjorie McEnaney, who recently prepared a study of adoption practices for Trans-Canada Matinee. Mrs. McEnaney spent a number of weeks visiting Family Courts in Alberta, Quebec and Ontario, tape recording interviews with those Canadians who use them, as well as with judges, probation officers and social workers. She found that Family Courts are not as formidable as many Canadians suppose. In fact, in many places they form a front line of defence against the break-up of the family. But in other places, court officials told Mrs. McEnaney that they are involved solely in a rescue operation, as they have neither sufficient funds nor staff to act in a preventive capacity.

two or three programs to controversial issues."

Beginning November 27th three broadcasts will look into the crises in municipal government, with special reference to the role of the individual citizen. Are some cities getting too big for their boots? Are others trying to settle problems of the sputnik age with the machinery their grandfathers used? How can we explain the confusion, economic problems, apathy, graft and corruption which sometimes bog down municipal government?

On December 18 and January 8 *Citizens' Forum* looks into family life. Is the family unit disintegrating? What is the ideal parent-child relationship? Later there will be investigations of employment, education, alcohol, highway slaughter, immigration, and other national topics of immediate concern.

* * *

Many delinquent youngsters have a deep inner conviction of badness.

Ultimately, treatment should always aim at changing that inner picture. If once they learn to respect themselves, then they are also on the way to respect others—and that is the road back to society. But this self-respect, this self-acceptance, depends in the final instance on their being accepted by others. And that is where we all come in.—Hugh Klare, delegate to the United Nations Congress on the prevention of crime, on BBC.

• The Kennedy-Nixon debate has, on two occasions, been denied to the Canadian audience, either through greed for the commercial dollar or through rank disregard for those who are interested in the personality of the next president of the United States. These debates transcended in importance anything the CBC could have produced.—M. N., *Winnipeg*.

The third Kennedy-Nixon debate was not denied to the Canadian "audience"—only to Canadian viewers: it was broadcast on the full CBC Trans-Canada radio network. The first and final (fourth) debates were carried on both radio and TV networks.

Pinafore-Renaissance

• I would like to thank you for two programs of outstanding merit, both broadcast this past week—H.M.S. *Pinafore* on Festival '61 and *The Age of Columbus* on CBC Wednesday Night. "Pinafore" was delightful; if future programs achieve such a high standard "Festival '61" will be a fine series. The program on the Renaissance was very interesting. The skilful blend of narration, reading, dramatization and music produced a most striking picture of the age. I believe that it has given me a much clearer con-

ception of that colourful and significant period in human history. Finally, I welcome the announcement that you are going to broadcast the final Kennedy-Nixon debate. It will be an excellent contribution to your consistently fine coverage of current affairs.—M. H. R., *Winnipeg*.

CBWFT Listings

• We make good use of the CBWFT listings in the CBC Times, but we notice that you still haven't found a way to put the accents on the French words. I wonder if it would be possible. Sometimes a word without its accents can have a different meaning—even a comical one. But be assured that we enjoy a great many of the programs on CBWFT.—M. D. B., *St. Boniface*.

Accents are not available in the particular five-point type used in all the TV listings, both French and English, in the CBC Times. As the CBWFT listings are useful only to some of our readers it would not seem fair to set them in type larger than that used for the English network listings, which would be necessary if the accents were to be included. Nevertheless, M. D. B.'s point is well taken. For example, the movie "Mariage Forcé" ("Compulsory Wedding") was listed as "Mariage Force," which could mean either "The Marriage is Straining" or "Vigorous Wedding." Again, "Du côté de chez Lise" ("Down by Lise's Place") becomes "Concerning the Value of 'Chez Lise'" when côté becomes cote. We can only trust readers to use their own imagination in translating such a title as "En amour on peche a deux," which could be "In Love People Sin (pêche) in Pairs" or "In Love People Go Fishing (pêche) in Pairs!" Similarly, most people will assume that the restaurant which Suzanne Avon visited recently

on "Pour Elle" was called "The Fishers" (Les pêcheurs) and not "The Sinners" (Les pécheurs).

Town Above

• Why can't you bring back *The Town Above*? I know by reading the CBC Times that a lot of people complained about it, but a lot of people also praised it—especially in today's issue. I saw it on CBWFT on October 12, and luckily I have French neighbours who kindly let me watch with them and translated for me, but I would certainly have enjoyed it more if it had been in English. If you ever conduct a poll to see how many people are for it I can get about thirty votes.—Mrs. P. W., *Norwood, Man.*

• So *The Town Above* is back on the French network. What about its many English fans? It seems terribly unfair that you can give us eight westerns in one week and no more of a favourite such as *The Town Above*. If it came on at midnight I would stay up to see it. 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THE NOTRON

use the term again — this missing link. And a few weeks ago the break-through came, with the discovery of the notron.

The notron, like all elementary particles of matter is assessed by its mass and its electrical charge. The proton we know weighs almost two thousand times as much as the electron, and has a positive electrical charge while the electron has a negative charge. The neutron, with roughly the same mass as the proton, has no charge at all. It is by these concepts, of mass and of charge, that the elementary constituents of matter are distinguished. And the notron is as distinctive, in its own way, as its brothers and sisters: for it has no charge and no mass. And, of course, it is almost safe to assert that it has no size. We are not sure, however, about its temperature.

I had the privilege of interviewing Dr. Schmeltzer, and asked him a number of questions about his discovery. "Could he explain in simple terms, the significance of the notron?" Schmeltzer reproduced for me (with a few corrections made by his assistant) a series of equations that appear to make everything quite clear. I asked Schmeltzer (who, by this time I was able to call Freidrich) if a more physical explanation could be given. Was it possible, I asked, to convey in words that depicted physical things, the idea of this little particle of no mass and no charge and (possibly) no size. Schmeltzer replied that he thought it was; matter, he explained, has been known to consist of atoms

that themselves have consisted of little particles. Now he said, as soon as we get a picture of the little particles, we automatically get an image of the little spaces between them. These, he concluded, are the volumes that are filled with my new particles, the notrons. "Are the spaces exactly filled?" I asked. "We don't know yet," he replied. I next asked Schmeltzer (who by this time I was able to call Fred) whether it would be true to regard the notron as a little, but discrete, particle of what the layman would call space. "Not quite," he replied. "But if you can imagine evacuated space as a divided continuum, devoid of time, turned, as it were, almost inside out—but not entirely so—then, I believe, you have it—nearly."

What practical evidence is there for the existence of the notron? Schmeltzer allowed me to listen to the response of an instrument — a sort of Geiger counter — and I was privileged to record the effect on tape. Listen! (Pause). Nothing. What better evidence, Schmeltzer asked, could I expect?

Dr. Schmeltzer's laboratories were tidy. Indeed, they were almost empty. Contrary to the general public impression of vast machines and costly equipment that are popularly supposed to fill the 20th-century laboratories, Schmeltzer conducts his work in as little space, and with as little equipment as 43 young assistants allow. He graciously showed me through the building that had been donated to him by generous industrial and government grants. Humbly, he pointed out to me the actual spot on the floor where he—or more correctly his assistant—was

standing when the final break-through came. "There," he said, "is the small place on this earth where the smallest particle on this earth was reborn: a particle of no mass, no charge, and I venture to suggest, of no size." There was a catch in his voice.

Later in the day, Schmeltzer insisted that I visit his home. Sparsely furnished, his home reflected the economy of his own thought and the physical concepts of his own ideas. We sat down to a dinner which, had I not known Smeltzer's generosity, I would have been inclined to call mean. Schmeltzer gazed into space throughout the meal, thinking, I would like to imagine, of his elementary particles of a sort of inverted nothingness. I asked his wife if he had hobbies by which he was able to relax. Music, it appeared, is his principal pastime. And during the evening three friends with their instruments arrived, to indulge with Schmeltzer in his favourite medium, the wind quartet; or it was possibly a quintet. Removing the reeds from what appeared to be clarinets, and peering carefully at music sheets that were composed entirely of rests, they silently blew, making a quiet music whose equal I never quite heard before, or even then. I understand that the music they played was written by none other than Schmeltzer. The syncopation of the pauses, of which the music is entirely composed, shows an unparalleled musical brilliance.

As I left Schmeltzer, I could not help having mixed feelings. A great man: a great discovery. But what now? For I felt that here was a prematurely worked-out man, a man who having discovered the ultimate in nothingness, could hardly hope to discover more.

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
