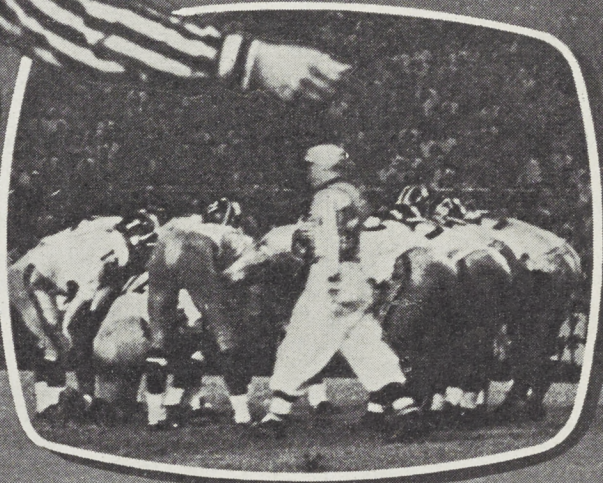

# STEVE DOUGLAS

*After thirty years in Radio and Television sports coverage, an assignment for his eighth CBC-TV Grey Cup telecast*



THIRTY YEARS AGO an Ottawa-born lad named Douglas Le Sueur, fresh out of high school, auditioned for the job of play-by-play hockey commentator with a Syracuse radio station. He got the job.

Later, because of the English-speaking public's difficulty with pronunciation, the lad dropped "Le Sueur," made "Douglas" his surname, and officially recognized his nickname of "Steve" (short for "stevedore," because as a youngster he used to lug ice around selling it during his summer holidays).

So: Steve Douglas. And this year he begins his 31st year in radio and TV sports coverage, marking the occasion with his eighth Grey Cup for CBC-TV.

Thirty years in the business have given Steve a lot of memories. At least two of those memories are not too pleasant. First lasted just two minutes — the two minutes immediately prior to his broadcast from the British Empire Games in Vancouver when he found himself locked out of his broadcasting booth. He now holds the record, he says, for the fastest inside-the-stadium dash to get a set of keys. He made it with not a second to spare.

The other memory that still makes him shudder was the 1953 college football finals between Varsity and Western. This was his first telecast for the CBC and the first game of Canadian football he had seen in 16 years. Night before the game seven inches of snow fell. "They still call it the 'Snow

Bowl Game,'" he says. And to make it worse, students had grabbed all but two of the wooden markers on the yard lines and were burning them under the stands in order to keep warm.

"Broadcasting a football game without those markers can be really tough," he says. But the telecast was good enough to get the CBC to sign Steve for five more games that year and the Grey Cup.

The most exciting moments he remembers? One was the "miracle mile" run by Roger Bannister and John Landy at the British Empire Games.

The other was the 1953 Grey Cup Game. The last play of the game saw Winnipeg, with six points, right on the goal line of Hamilton, ahead with 12 points. At that time, a touchdown and conversion would tie the game. Hamilton's defensive half suddenly had a hunch. On his own initiative he shifted his assigned position in order to cover Winnipeg's Tom Casey — and succeeded in batting down a pass to Casey from Winnipeg's famous "Indian" Jack Jacobs. "That," says Steve, "was the sort of moment you don't forget."

Steve Douglas has some provocative views on broadcasting. For instance, after covering every major sport during his career — except cricket — he finds football the most challenging, more challenging, for instance, than hockey. Reasons are: hockey has fewer men to be watched than does football

In CBWT's new week-day afternoon program, *Three's Company* (starting on CBWT Monday, Nov. 21, at 3:00 p.m. and going to the west network Tuesdays and Thursdays) Producer Ray McConnell of Winnipeg says he has something.

"Three's a lucky number," says Ray. "We come on at 3 each week-day, and we have a main company of three—Bill Guest, Jose Poniera, and Mary Liz Bayer—with others, of course. It's a good omen."

Regular features on the show include cooking, with Mrs. A. R. Gauer, sewing with Gerdine Crawford, community activities, cultural events, interior design, home-making and fashion ideas. Jose Poniera entertains at the piano twice a week.

Series planned for the next few months include *Costumes Through the Centuries* with designer Stanley Mujec; pre-Christmas book suggestions by Alice Poyser; the story of the building of Mr. and Mrs. Glen Booth's new house, and holiday hair styling.

The three main performers are all well known to western viewers. Mary Liz Bayer, descendant of Manitoba pioneers, hostess for four years on the *Mary Liz Show* on

CBWT, was born in Edmonton and educated at St. Andrews, Manitoba, Kelvin High School, Winnipeg, and the University of Manitoba. She was formerly executive secretary of the Winnipeg Volunteer Bureau, and public relations director for the Welfare Council of Greater Winnipeg and for the Winnipeg Community Chest. Three of her books of poetry have been published by the Ryerson Press.

Concert and night club audiences in Germany, Bolivia, Argentina, Spain, Switzerland and New York have acclaimed Jose Poniera, singer-pianist, orchestra conductor, accordionist, master of ceremonies and all-round entertainer. Last year on CBWT, he was host on the program *Ladies First* on CBWT. His repertoire for *Three's Company* will include keyboard and vocal arrangements with both Canadian and continental flavour.

Bill Guest, CBC announcer long associated with the *Mary Liz Show*, and known to many on both radio and television, hails from Sioux Lookout. Children remember him as the many-voiced Chasa Chipmunk, and lately he has been master of ceremonies on the *Good Deed Club*. The *Bill Guest Show*

on CBC radio has had a wide following among high school students and others, and during the past summer Bill also served on the popular *Manitoba Mirror* series. As m.c. on *Calling All Children* and on *Junior Highlights*, he has had an enthusiastic TV audience.

# National Farm Radio Forum

*Are high university costs depriving rural young people of a college education?*

Canadian farmers are leaving the land at the rate of 40,000 a year. Agriculture is changing rapidly, and thousands of career opportunities in the "agri-business" world between the farm and the consumer are opening up for rural young people, making a college education more important than ever.

This is underlined in a recent editorial in the *Farmer's Advocate* and *Canadian Countryman*, which advises: "If you have the chance and the qualifications to go to college, take it. There may be fewer actual farmers in years to come, but the field open to agricultural college-trained people is becoming larger and larger. Even if you are not exactly sure what field you want to enter, you guarantee your-

self a choice, and a challenging choice it is."

But the percentage of young people going on to college off the farm is far below that of urban communities. Why don't more farm boys go in for higher education? Is the cost too high? Are guidance services in rural schools inadequate? Are their parents holding them back?

*National Farm Radio Forum* will try to find out on Monday night at 8:30. Panelists will be Harold Baker, assistant director of the Centre for Community Studies at the University of Saskatchewan, and Harold Fry, retired editor of *The Country Guide*, who is doing a special study on the cost of a college education for the Ontario Agricultural College in Guelph. With

chairman Peter Stursberg they will examine opinions and statements of farmers and rural high school principals on the problems of college training for farmers.

How do university heads feel about the situation? A. Davidson Dunton, president of Carleton University, Ottawa, says: "In my opinion, young people from rural areas, indeed from all areas outside the main centres where there are universities, are under heavy handicaps in higher education. It usually costs at least twice as much to attend university away from home. The extra costs of living and travelling put young people from farms and smaller towns at a serious disadvantage. The result is that a considerably higher proportion of young people living in cities where there are universities are able to continue with their education. I believe that in Canada we are suffering a serious loss of mind-power because of the difficulties in the way of young people from rural areas and smaller towns attending university."

According to the universities, the lowest cost for a year at university in Canada has risen to just over \$1,200 for those living on campus, with the average being around \$1,350. And all the student earns to supplement his assistance is fully taxable, although a parent sponsoring a student is allowed to deduct \$500 from his taxable income.

J. D. MacLachlan, president of the Ontario Agricultural College, feels "that Family Allowance benefits should be continued beyond age 16 for those who satisfactorily continue their education through to at least the Bachelor's level. In addition, full income tax exemptions should be made on part-time earnings during all student years. Current interest in academically superior students will . . . mean that adequate provision will be made for them. On the other hand, the better-than-average students who do not qualify for the top awards are at the present time neglected; these constitute a group among whom many do not con-

# The Juvenile Court

*CBC-TV's "Open House" Looks in on Judge Arrell at Hamilton*

As they pass the stately old house on a main street in Hamilton, Ontario, few people are aware of the moving, real-life dramas being enacted inside nearly every day. The large front room upstairs is a courtroom—but with no jury, no prosecutor, no frightening formality. Judge Hugh C. Arrell, a warmly understanding man with a reassuring manner, wearing an ordinary business suit, sits behind a pedestal desk directing the rescue of people with domestic and personality difficulties, and preventing family problems from developing into major crises.

On Friday afternoon viewers will have an opportunity to meet Judge Arrell and hear interviews with people in trouble who have come before him for help, and with court officials who worked with them. CBC-TV's *Open House* will present an hour's visit in and around Hamilton's Juvenile and Family Court. The filmed sequences are a "package" produced for the CBC by Robert Crone Pictures, Ltd., with Christa Singer as writer-interviewer. Crone is a well-known Canadian film-maker whose work has taken

him around the world, and who has a deft hand with people in trouble. Mrs. Singer has been working in CBC-TV since it began, and is especially interested in basic social issues.

Daniel Coughlin, director of probation services for Ontario, tells of the differences between juvenile and family courts, how they came into being in Canada, the qualifications the judges must have (Quebec is the only province where they must be lawyers), how evidence is found, what sort of sentences the courts impose, the preventive work they do, and the duties of probation officers.

Helen Carscallen of the CBC women's interests department, who planned the program, says that juvenile and family courts vary from province to province—and within individual provinces—in their set-up and in the services they offer. Some courts have probation officers, family counsellors, psychologists and social workers at their disposal, who report to the judge so that he can decide what action should be taken. Other courts refer cases to community agencies for

specialized help. Miss Carscallen says, "We chose the Hamilton Juvenile and Family Court as an example of how a domestic court operates because Judge Arrell has the reputation of running an exceptionally good one."

Judge Arrell has been with the Hamilton court for eight years. (His father is the oldest acting crown attorney in Ontario—appointed in 1915 and active ever since.) Judge Arrell, Daniel Coughlin, and Detective-Sergeant Robert Collings, who organized Hamilton's new experimental Youth Bureau, will explain the functions and objectives of the court, and discuss the need for strengthening community services to make the court's work more preventive than rescue.

The program then gets down to cases—real ones that are highly dramatic and revealing. Christa Singer talks to Robert, a 13-year-old boy who was brought to the Hamilton Juvenile Court charged with breaking into a truck and stealing goods. Miss Carscallen says "he is very honest and frank with Mrs. Singer about how he came to be drawn into this escapade with older boys. Mrs. Singer also talks to his mother, who says she recognizes that a great many of his problems have grown out of an unhappy home situation."

Mrs. Singer then interviews a young couple who are having domestic trouble. The wife, who had been in juvenile court some years before, had charged her husband with assault, but later withdrew the charge. They tell how the probation officer of the Family Court helped their reconciliation, and describe how they have gone about trying to learn to make allowances for one another.

To preserve the identities of this couple, and of Robert and his mother, their faces are in shadow on the screen, and they use fictitious names. All agreed to take part in the program because they had been helped so much by officers of the court, and hoped their experience would help other people not to fear the court, but encourage them to go there for preventive help before charges are laid.

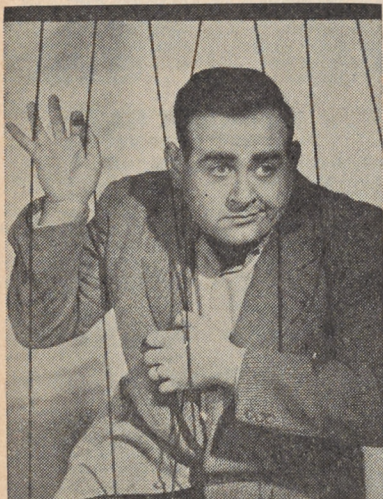

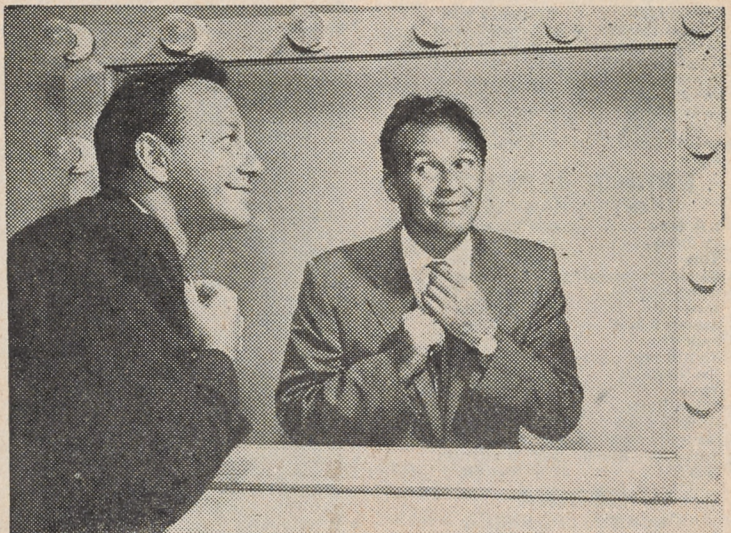

to university and who, through university training have the potential to make a very worthy contribution to the welfare of our country.”

How do the farmers feel about it? Some think college training is useless on the farm. They fear that if they send their sons to college they will never return to the land. But here’s the other side of the picture, from a man who attended agricultural college, and who still farms: “I feel that my college training has been helpful in analyzing my farm problems, choosing feeding programs, formulating a system of crop rotations and for analyzing the results of these different programs. Perhaps more important, my college training has helped me to become more active in community affairs, particularly in the marketing field . . . I believe that one reason for farm children not doing as well as they might in school is the attitude of their parents. They are allowed to stay home to help with farm work too often and develop the idea that helping at home is more important than their school work. Also, the parents do not instill the belief in the children that they themselves really want to spend the money necessary for college. I believe that a college education gives a farmer more confidence in the work he is doing and the decisions he continually has to make, and as a result a more useful and rewarding life.”

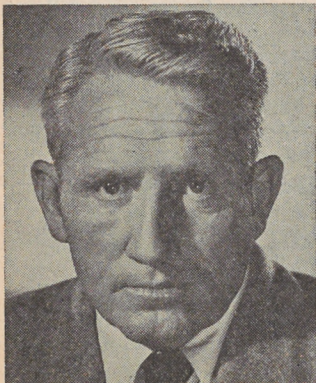

## CBC Wednesday Night

### The Unknown Haydn

*A program featuring lesser known works by Franz Joseph Haydn, prepared by H. C. Robbins Landon, with commentary by Harry Newstone*

H. C. ROBBINS LANDON, a 33-year-old, Boston-born musicologist who is regarded as an outstanding authority on Franz Joseph Haydn's life and works, aims to collect and publish everything Haydn ever wrote. For some years now he has lived in Vienna, which he finds a convenient centre for his researches. When his impressive book *The Symphonies of Joseph Haydn* appeared in 1955 he had already examined many original sources and innumerable documents of all kinds, from Haydn's autograph manuscripts to contemporary newspapers. Conductors and performers have found the book a great help in interpreting Haydn's music as it was played in the composer's own time. A second book, *The Letters of Joseph Haydn*, published last year, contains not only the letters and notes Haydn wrote in English (he lived in London for two periods between 1791 and 1795) but also translations of those written in German, French, and Italian.

Landon's latest work is a series of radio programs of Haydn's music which he arranged and introduced for the BBC under the title of *The Unknown Haydn*. One of them featuring the composer's choral and orchestral music, will be presented on CBC Wednesday Night this week at 7:45 p.m.

Every attempt has been made in these programs to retain the authentic atmosphere and sound so that, as far as possible, listeners may enjoy the experience of hearing Haydn's music, much of it for

the first time, as he intended it to be heard. Landon explains the origins and background of each item. Included are *The Storm*, *Litania De Beatissima Virgine Maria*, and *Te Deum*. They are performed by the BBC Symphony Orchestra conducted by Sir Adrian Boult, the BBC Chorus, and

soprano Ilse Wolf, tenor David Galliver, contralto Pamela Bowden, baritone Thomas Hemsley, and organist Charles Spinks.

Commenting on the series, Harry Newstone, Winnipeg-born British authority on Haydn and founder of the Haydn Orchestra in 1949, says: "It is never difficult to make up programs of little-known music by great composers, but in the works of Bach, Mozart, Beethoven or Schubert little remains to surprise us. With Haydn, however, it is different. The more we come to know of his vast output the more impressive does it appear, for so much of his recently discovered music is of

## "THE MATCHMAKERS" on CBC Wednesday Night

*Rupert Caplan presents Mac Shoub's adaptation of Thornton Wilder classic*

"THERE ISN'T any more coffee; there isn't any more gingerbread, and there isn't any more play—but there is one thing more we have to

do. . . . I think the youngest person here ought to tell us what the moral of the play is."

"And so, at this request from Mrs. Levi, the Matchmaker in Thornton Wilder's farce of the same title, young Barnaby Tucker reminds the audience that the glorious romp which they have just witnessed did have a moral after all. He says:

*Oh, I think it's about . . . I think it's about adventure. The test of an adventure is that when you're in the middle of it you say to yourself, "Oh, now I've got myself into an awful mess; I wish I were sitting quietly at home." And the sign that something's wrong with you is when you sit quietly at home wishing you were out having lots of adventure. So that now we all want to thank you for coming tonight, and we all hope that in*

*your lives you have just the right amount of—adventure.*

CBC Montreal will present Mac Shoub's adaptation of *The Matchmaker* this week on CBC Wednesday Night at 8:30 p.m. The production will be directed by Rupert Caplan, and a special musical score evoking the atmosphere of New York and Yonkers in the early 1880's has been composed by Neil Chotem.

*The Matchmaker* is about an old Yonkers merchant, Horace Vandergelder, who is so rich that he decides to take a wife. ("Marriage," he says, "is a bribe to make a housekeeper think she's a householder.") To this end he employs a matchmaker who subsequently becomes involved with two of Vandergelder's menial clerks, assorted young and lovely ladies, and the headwaiter at an expensive restaurant where the action runs headlong into an hilarious climax of complication.

Although *The Matchmaker* has been tremendously well received in its present form ("Better jump in front of a subway than miss *The Matchmaker*," said one New York critic), this success came only after many rewritings. It is Wilder's revision of his own play *The Merchant of Yonkers* which Max Reinhardt directed in Boston and New York in 1938. *The Merchant of Yonkers* was taken by Wilder from an 1842 Viennese comedy by Johann Nestroy—*Einen Jux will es sich Machen*, which was in turn based upon an 1835 original, John Oxenford's *A Day Well Spent*.

The first performance of *The Matchmaker*, at the Edinburgh Festival in 1954, was directed by Tyrone Guthrie, who also directed it the next year in New York. Both productions were designed by Tania Moiseiwitsch.

CBC Wednesday Night listeners will quickly discover, as did a New York critic on opening night, that Wilder's lines are "often brilliant, sage and witty." Although most of the brilliant talk comes from the matchmaker, Mrs. Levi ("Money, I've always felt, is like manure; it's not worth a thing unless it's

German and French composers, featuring German baritone Fischer-Diskau, and Polish conductor Paul Klecki. This is a recording of the program given earlier during a tour of France by the Tokyo orchestra. Selections include a few lieder by Hugo Wolf, and the "Suite in F" by Albert Roussel. Hugo Wolf, who is renowned especially for his lieder, has written some 230 of them. They are in the 20th Century post-romantic fashion of which it is said "their pessimistic but unconceited themes close the doors to salvation."

Of Albert Roussel's *Suite in F* it can be said that it is three parts: Prélude, Sarabande, Gigue. In it, the composer respects the classical cast (mould?) but does not exclude a modernistic touch in the orchestration and harmonic presentation.

Following a long-established tradition, the concert will end with the 4th movement of Beethoven's *9th Symphony* to be followed by *Ode to Joy* by the same composer. Eugène Ormandy will conduct the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra.

the Temple University choir of Philadelphia and four world-renowned soloists: soprano Gloria Davy, from Brooklyn, contralto Elena Nikolaidi, from Greece who has made several appearances at the Metropolitan Opera in New York, the young Canadian tenor Jon Vickers whose immense success of the last few years has brought him to Covent Garden in London, and Chinese basso Yi Kweisze whose superb voice and repertory have lowered all international barriers.

Thus, it seems that once a year at least, the world as a whole finds time to relax and build up its friendship, in this United Nations Concert. Watch for it on *Concert Hour* this Thursday (Nov. 24) at 9:30 in the Thursday night Spectaculars series.

### Town Above on Channel 6

A good number of English speaking CBWFT viewers have inquired about the French version of the program *Town Above* (En haut de la pente douce) which continues this year on the French network only. the finest quality. Not all the music in *The Unknown Haydn* is entirely new to us, but while some of it has been played occasionally in modern times, much has not been performed at all since Haydn's day. Most of it is played from manuscript parts which have been copied from originals in libraries and archives throughout Europe and America—the Esterhazy Archives in Eisenstadt and Budapest, the Austrian National Library, the Library of Congress in Washington, monasteries, churches and private collections . . . What is astonishing is not only the quality and variety of this music, but also the evolution of style that can be traced through the years.

"Most of the CBC Wednesday Night program is choral, consisting of the *Storm* chorus (Haydn's first setting of English words), and the magnificent *Te Deum* of 1799. His last six great masses were composed between 1796 and 1802, and midway among them comes this *Te Deum*, fusing the elements of jubilation and devotion as only Haydn could . . . Above all the idea behind the program is a concern with the living music rather than with its unfamiliarity. Robbin Landon's aim is to give a representative selection not only of the unknown Haydn, but of the *great* unknown Haydn."

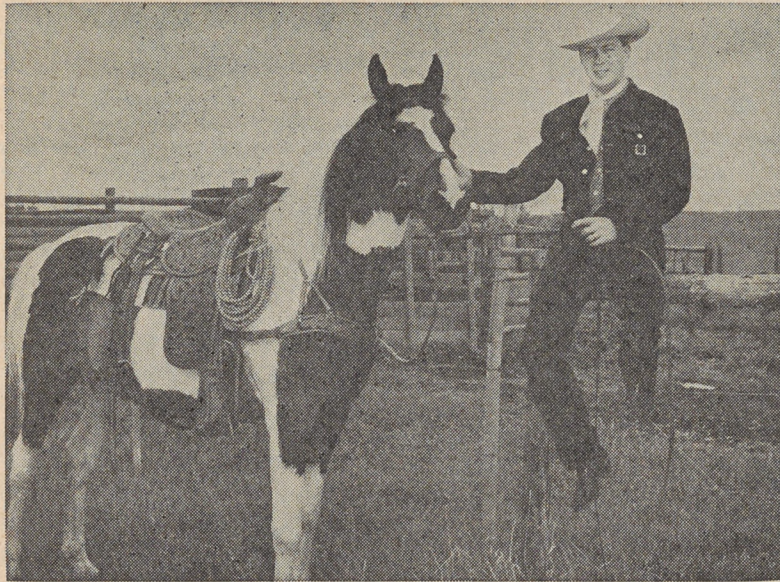

spread about encouraging young things to grow") Wilder has assigned much of it to minor characters. From a drunken apprentice, for example: "If a man has no vices he's in great danger of making vices out of his virtues. We've all seen them: men who were monsters of philanthropy and women who were dragons of purity. No, no—nurse one vice in your bosom. Give it the attention it deserves and let your virtues spring up modestly about it. . . . And never support two weaknesses at the same time. It's your combination sinners—your lecherous liars and your miserly drunkards—who dishonour the vices and bring them into bad repute."

If this glittering talk reminds some listeners of the verbal *tours de force* of earlier English playwrights (Congreve, Sheridan) and still earlier French ones (Molière, for example) their comparison is by no means far-fetched. Wilder himself wrote into *The Matchmaker* two passages which are lifted straight from Molière's *L'Avare*.

And naturally, the sparkling language of *The Matchmaker*, as

well as some of its highly stylized techniques, such as the now seldom-used soliloquy, make it an ideal play for radio presentation.—*K. Murphy, CBC Montreal.*

"Benet's story allows for good use of the TV medium," says Orenstein. "We've used no flats at all. The bank is represented by the use of money symbols, the home by love symbols. *The Gold Dress* is the sort of story that allows for the creation of mood, over and above reality."

The dress, designed by Suzanne Mess, is a sheath of gold lamé under pale peach chiffon, studded with gold sequins.

# BBC Cable Film Narrows the Atlantic Gap

Cable film, a method developed by the BBC of transmitting short pieces of film on the Transatlantic cable, provided some striking illustrations of the speed with which international news stories can be screened on television during the memorable United Nations speeches and debates of September-October. Almost every evening BBC Television News included short filmed extracts (transmitted by cable film) of events in New York which had taken place on the same day. This method requires about an hour to transmit thirty seconds of film and in this way it is possible to show film in Britain many hours earlier than if it is shot and flown across the Atlantic in the more conventional way. For example, when an unexpected meeting took place in New York between Mr. Macmillan and Mr. Krushchev at 6:30 p.m. (London time) on October 4, the use of cable film made it possible for interviewers in Britain to witness this meeting in BBC Television News at 10:00 p.m.—only three-and-a-half hours after the meeting took place.

(12 players and three officials, as against 24 players and five officials); and identification of players is easier in hockey because the commentator and his spotter are closer, and the contrast between bodies and ice is better.

(Talking of spotters: also doing his eighth Grey Cup this season alongside Steve will be his regular spotter, Hal Walker, sports editor of the *Toronto Telegram*.)

It is ironic, however, that the BBC which developed cable film and uses it exclusively in Britain, is on the losing end of any American story, as Britain is five hours ahead of New York. In the other direction — for example when the BBC supplied North America with cable film of the Paris Summit meeting—the time factor works in the American's favour.

The time difference handicap made the speed with which news from New York reached BBC television screens all the more remarkable. The majority of important new items shown happened in the late afternoon by London time and transmissions across the Transatlantic cable often did not begin until the middle of the evening. This meant that the BBC news team at Alexandra Palace in London had only about two hours in which to receive and develop the film before the main news bulletin at about 10:00 in the evening. On one occasion they processed and synchronized sound in twenty minutes.
