

AROUND CBC...

YOU ARE INVITED to read inside information of what the CBC is planning for you . . . what your favourite radio and TV personalities are doing . . . and what is going on behind the scenes here at the busy Prairie Regional Headquarters of the CBC. Along with other odds and ends, it will all be here for you, in this column each week.

CHRISTMAS IS A-COMIN' and producers here have been hustling for weeks, working up special programs to mark the most joyous season of the Christian year.

WHILE MOST OF US are addressing our Christmas cards, several top public officials are getting ready to deliver a vocal Christmas greeting to everyone in Canada, on the *Northern Messenger* program Christmas night. Although the program usually is carried only on certain selected stations, beaming personal messages into the vast northland, this special program will be heard on the coast-to-coast radio network, and will be expanded to an hour in length. Top cabinet ministers, R.C.M.P., CBC and church officials will speak, and various radio stations in the north, at Churchill, Yellowknife, Fort Smith and other such remote locations, will report on activities in their communities.

SPECIAL MUSIC has become a tradition on radio and television during the Christmas season. The schedule will continue throughout Christmas week, climaxing on Christmas Day with so many programs that we cannot make mention of more than a few in this column. For serious music listeners, the Keetbaas Quintet, a woodwind ensemble, will return for a 15-minute interlude on radio following the special Armed Services Variety Show. And in a lighter, yet nostalgic, vein, a half-hour television show "Red River Christmas" featuring popular songstress Florence Faiers will originate from Winnipeg, produced by Jack Phillips. Eric Wild and his orchestra will provide accompaniment, and the James Duncan chorus will lend their talents to the show, to feature songs from the Gay 'Nineties. Settings and costumes will simulate a country farmhouse at the turn of the century.

KEEPING CHRIST in Christmas, Religious Period will present a special Christmas afternoon program with the Very Reverend W. Gordon Maclean of First Presbyterian Church, Winnipeg and choir directed by organist Stanley Osborne.

MAXINE WARE has returned to Winnipeg and the Prairie Region network of the CBC, after a two-year stint in the Toronto entertainment world. Already she has been heard on Rhythm and Romance, CBC radio. Other appearances are scheduled for her in such programs as a New Year's Eve special to be produced here.

Constance Takes a Boat Trip

Glamorous U.S. movie star Constance Cummings takes time out from her busy international career to take a leisurely cruise on a freighter—on "Ten Grapefruit to Lisbon," featured Sunday on "G.M. Presents"

"ALL MY LIFE I've been in too big a hurry to go anywhere by boat, but I've always wanted to take a freighter trip," actress Constance Cummings tells us. Sunday night she will - vicariously - when she plays a gay and mysterious passenger on a freighter bound for Lisbon.

The glamorous U.S. stage, film and TV star appears on General Motors Presents in a CBC-TV drama by Frank Gilroy called

"Ten Grapefruit to Lisbon." All the action takes place on a boat where Miss Cummings, as Irene Flack, has an unpredictable effect on her fellow passengers. Co-starring with her will be John Vernon and Larry Mann.

When she flew in to Toronto from her home in England at the end of November to start rehearsing for the show under Ron Weyman's direction, we had a brief chat in the studio canteen, while

she hurried through ham-on-a-bun and an Eskimo pie.

She was greatly surprised at the size of Toronto. Montreal was the only other Canadian city she had ever visited - to appear in a CBC-TV play with Franchot Tone. She was eager to know something of the history of the two cities, and how their personalities compared.

Seattle, she told us, was her first home, but she has spent a good bit of time in New York intermittently since she first arrived there at 16 and found a job as a chorus girl. She got her "big break" in typical showbusiness style, while understudying the leading lady in a George Kaufman play.

On one occasion the star took ill and Miss Cummings replaced her. She so impressed a Hollywood scout that he contracted her for a Sam Goldwyn picture. Two weeks later her rosy future looked grim when she was replaced by Loretta Young. But Columbia Pictures signed her up some time after, for the ingenue lead in a Walter Huston picture. That was the first of many films.

She was offered several stage roles on Broadway and in England on the strength of them. As soon as she could be released from her contract she headed overseas and scored a success in a Vincent Lawrence play called Sour Grapes. She made her Broadway debut in Samson Raphaelson's "Accent on Youth," and after that she was busy on both sides of the Atlantic in such plays as "Madame Bovary," "Goodbye Mr. Chips," "The Petri-fied Forest," "The Shrike," "Lysistrata," and "Romeo and Juliet."

She has given Prokofief's "Peter and the Wolf" at London's Albert Hall, and was the first to play the long recitative part of Joan in the Claudel - Honneger oratorio, "St. Joan at the Stake."

Between her stage engagements she managed to sandwich in several successful films, including "Blythe Spirit," "John and Julia," "Into the Blue," "The Intimate Strangers," and "The Battle of the Sexes," with Peter Sellers.

When we asked how she liked working with Sellers she said "it was tremendous fun. He's a terrible giggler, but takes infinite pains with rehearsal and study to get a thing just right, so it's marvellous to act with him."

"My latest stage appearance," she tells us, "was in my husband's play, "Rape of the Belt." I played it for over a year in London and then we took it to New York, but it wasn't a success there.

"The future? Well, I'll likely be doing a play in England this winter. We'll start rehearsing the first of February, take it on tour for three weeks, and open in London in April. I can't say what it is, because plans aren't finalized."

That's the public Miss Cummings. What about the private one? Well, out of the spotlight she has the same alert, emphatic manner she has on-stage. She looks as if someone had just given her some good news and she was dying to tell about it. She's married to writer Benn W. Levy, they have two children, Jemima, almost 10, and Jonathan, 11.

"We live in London, and we're all terribly excited about the farm we've bought in Oxfordshire. We've been looking for one for years. It's a proper working farm, too, so we're all reading up madly about cows and chickens. Of course we have a bailiff running it, because we know absolutely nothing about farming."

Miss Cummings swallowed the last of her Eskimo pie and hurried back to the freighter tied up in Studio 30.

Duel in the Air

I think the duel to end all duels was fought on May 3, 1808, in France between M. Le Pique and M. de Grandprée, who fought it out in the air in balloons—both of them armed with blunderbusses. M. de Grandprée obviously had the "master mind" for he did not aim at his opponent but blew an enormous hole in his rival's balloon, which sent M. Rev. Dr. Bennett on Encounter

Should Christians Speak Out?

Rev. Dr. John C. Bennett, New York theologian, has some definite views on politics and religion. He will air them Sunday

on Encounter

THE REV. DR. JOHN C. BEN-NETT, Dean of the Faculty at New York's Union Theological Seminary, believes that, though separation of church and state is itself good, this certainly does not mean that ministers, theologians and Christian laymen should not speak out on social and political issues when ethical values and Christian beliefs are involved.

In a Saturday Review article, Dr. Bennett discussed a revival in religious questions in the U.S. which, he feels, has been mainly on the personal and subjective level "with more depth than form." This revival "may lead to a private rejection of many cultural values but it has not led to much public, prophetic criticism."

"The prophetic religious challenge to the complacencies of a culture has never been emphasized by the majority at any time," Dr. Bennett wrote. "The Biblical prophets themselves always moved against the religious stream of their own day. But we can hope that the churches may raise up within themselves more individuals and groups which keep asking the hard questions about their culture and which point to new possibilities of honesty and justice within the community. Also, it is not too much to hope that far beyond these minorities there will be a disturbed public conscience."

Sunday, CBC-TV's Encounter presents Dr. Bennett in conversation with Nathan Cohen. Dr. Bennett will state some of his forthright views in a conversation ranging over Christianity and the

Science - Mostly Fiction

IF YOU WANT to justify (or knock down) science fiction, you can do it at two levels: you can criticize it as literature; or you can criticize it as science.

Isaac Azimov is a godsend to those who want to justify science fiction on both grounds. He is an American scientist, distinguished in the field of biochemistry, whose books of science fiction stories have often been praised by literary critics.

This week, The Nature of Things, CBC television's weekly science series on Sundays, presents an off-beat program on Science Fiction. Dr. Azimov will be featured on the show as critic, discussing the merits and faults of a number of short science fiction sketches written by satirist, Rod Coneybeare.

Program organizer David Walker summarizes the theme like this: "Space Captain Rex Race with his dauntless band of astronauts forges through the firmament towards a planet populated entirely by beautiful women. The morale problem mounts. The scientific difficulties which Captain Rex faces are terrifying.

"Captain Race and a collection of robots, time machines, BEM's (Bug Eyed Monsters) and mutants are the common fare of science fiction," says Walker. "Where the science leaves off and the fiction begins is the theme of this program."

Some of Coneybeare's sketches are very funny, some very grim. And even though the program often treats the subject with humour, "Dr. Azimov will make a number of very serious points," said Walker.

Dr. Azimov was born in the small Russian town of Petrovichi in 1920 and was brought by his parents to the United States when he was three years old.

Current Biography says of him: "It was his father, in fact, who gave him a copy of "Science Wonder Stories," thinking such reading

Festival '61 Presents

JULIUS CAESAR

VIEWERS who had their appetites whetted by the production last month of *Macbeth*, are in for another rich meal of Shakespeare. Monday, December 19, *Festival '61* will present *Julius Caesar*, one of the best-loved of the Bard's great classics.

Paul Almond directs a starstudded cast in the CBC television production. Douglas Rain plays Cassius and Fritz Weaver is Brutus. William Shatner takes the demanding role of the great orator, Mark Antony, while Gillie Fenwick is Julius Caesar, Bruno Gerussi is Casca, Frances Hyland is Calpurnia and Ivor Barry is Flavius. The cast includes 50 actors. A problem faced by makeup artists was that of providing a custom-built Roman nose for Douglas Rain (Cassius)

Anneke Franck, one of the make-up team working on the two-hour show for Festival '61, took a "positive" cast of Rain's own nose to the NBC make-up director, Robert Abradovitch.

Materials for the nose (sponge latex—a special composition from Hollywood) and equipment for the complicated baking process are unavailable in Toronto. Miss Franck spent two days in New York working with Obradovitch. They made three nose pieces, to fit

Peter Rabbit's "Father"

Thornton W. Burgess, who appears on Close-Up Tuesday, started with a few stories written for the amusement of his son, and in 50 years has published 70 books and 15,000 newspaper stories

IT IS 50 YEARS since Thornton W. Burgess wrote Old Mother West Wind. Since then he has had published 70 titles, of which 64 are still in print. About 7,000,000 copies of these books have been sold.

Furthermore, Mr. Burgess has written some 15,000 stories published in dozens of newspapers across North America. Many of the young readers (and some of their parents) can remember, word for word, their favourite stories about Peter Rabbit, Hooty

the Owl, Jimmy the Skunk, and all the others; about the Green Meadow, the Smiling Pool and the Laughing Brook.

Despite all this, Mr. Burgess himself cannot remember any of these stories, not even the titles. And if you ask him to repeat one of the 12,000-or-so couplets he has written (each with a little moral) he cannot do it, not even the one he wrote yesterday.

The famous singer has acquired his renown in the particular field of lieders and melodies, with his interpretations of Debussy's works. His concert appearances are numbered by the hundreds, and he is known throughout widelv world.

Gordon Hawkins, Citizens' Forum Host

"Intellectual Traffic Cop"

GORDON HAWKINS, host for Citizens' Forum, believes the role of host on a discussion program of this nature must be that of an "intellectual traffic cop."

"The host," he says, "has an obligation to see that the entire subject is covered, and must keep the conversation moving."

Citizens' Forum is telecast each Sunday at 4:30 p.m. EST, and the audio portion is repeated on the Trans-Canada radio network, Thursdays at 8:30 p.m. EST.

Hawkins believes that an important factor in covering the entire subject is to talk it out with the guests before air time. This way he knows how much they have to say, and how fast he has to lead them.

There are two types of guests on Citizens' Forum — the expert who knows the subject thoroughly, and the articulate non-expert who is closely associated with it. For instance, guests on a recent three-part series on defence included Gen. Charles Foulkes, former chairman of the chiefs of staff; J. B. Priestley, member of the British Committee for Nuclear Disarmament; two university professors; a columnist, and a social worker.

"Each type of guest is necessary," says Hawkins, "the expert with his sound knowledge, and the non-expert with whom the audience can associate themselves."

Hawkins was born in London 38 years ago, and has spent most of his adult life travelling throughout the world. "I'm a born traveller," he says, "and love every minute of it."

As an interrogator with the Royal Navy during the Second World War, he served in Australia, Ceylon, India, Burma and Siam,

interrogating Japanese prisoners of war and evaluating captured Japanese documents.

For the past eight years most of his travelling has been done in Canada, with an average of about six trips a year, back and forth across the country. After joining the staff of the University of Alberta in 1952, he lectured to Canadian servicemen for the current affairs branch of the department of national defence. His assignments took him to Whitehorse, the Hudson Bay area and Labrador, as well as to major centres from coast to coast.

This close acquaintance with Canada was intensified while he was with the Canadian Association for Adult Education, during which time he became host of Citizens' Forum.

This year Hawkins was appointed executive director of the Duke of Edinburgh's Second Commonwealth Study Conference, which meets in Canada in 1962 to discuss the changing industrial environ-

ment in the Commonwealth. He recently returned from a two-month tour of Africa where he met employer and labour organizations which will select delegates to the conference.

matter was educational." And one of his friends is quoted as saying that, after Isaac read the book, "he alas was not long for this world. At the age of nine, he became a science fiction fan."

But the young Azimov not only read and wrote about science fiction, he also became a scientist, and took his Ph.D. in chemistry. He is now a researcher in the field of cancer. In collaboration with two colleagues he has written a medical text book, "Biochemistry and Human Metabolism;" his latest book "The Intelligent Man's Guide to Science," has just been published by the University of Toronto Press. And in a lighter vein, Dr. Azimov has written science fiction works like "Pebble in the Sky," "Nine Tomorrows," "Only a Trillion" and "The End of Eternity."

Rod Coneybeare, like Dr. Azimov, has been out of this world for a long time now too. His CBC Trans-Canada radio program of a few years back, *Out of This World*, featured Rod and his many voices in a number of roles in science fiction stories.

"The only rules of the show are that it should have a twist, or unexpected ending," he said at that time, "and it must be fantastic. I fasten on anything and put it in the realm of the fantastic."

The rule holds good on this weeks Nature of Things when Rod's skits are sometimes funny, sometimes gruesome, but always fantastic. Dr. Azimov has another role on this week's The Nature of Things — he wrote the songs that introduce Coneybeare's sketches. Perhaps Dr. Azimov is expounding the first lore of space-travel when he writes:

"Did you ever hear tell of the spaceships from earth?

"It is there you will find what bravery's worth.

"Through long lonely distances, icy and black,

"With just dead world's a-waiting, and not turning back."

state, communism, and Christian values in economic life.

Dr. Bennett's views on the question of the religion of Senator Kennedy, just prior to the U.S. presidential election, received considerable publicity. Newsweek quotes an article written by Bennett on Christianity and Crises in which the author concedes that electors are entitled to weigh all the beliefs and actions of a presidential candidate, But Dr. Bennett then makes three points:

First, if the American people should make it clear that a Catholic could never be elected president the implication that full participation in American political life is denied to 39.5 million Catholics "would wound our common life and damage our institutions more grievously than it would be possible for a Catholic president to do even if he chose to."

Secondly, Catholic laymen in America have long supported the American tradition of religious liberty and oppose any privileged position for the Catholic Church.

And thirdly, "many more speissues are handled by Catholic governors and mayors without danger to the Republic than ever comes before the President."

On Communism, Dr. Bennett told the eighth assembly of the International Congregational Council, "The churches should be sophisticated about communism. . . . They should not take so rigid an attitude that they cannot see that second generation communists in Russia may become concerned chiefly about building their own country, that they may become less fanatical believers in their ideology, and less of a threat to the freedom of their neighbours."

On economics, Dr. Bennett wrote in Saturday Review: "In the 1930's, there was much prophetic speaking and acting in the churches about economic justice, and this had some effect in preparing the American people to accept the changes that events forced upon them. Today the economic issues are much less clear. Churchmen could readily be champions of labour in the steel strike of 1919 when the 12-hour day was involved, but it has been difficult for them to know what to say about the steel strike of 1959. However there are many emerging issues in the economic sphere to which churches will be called to address themselves. Some issues are less obviousy points of justice; they are rather issues that affect the quality of life of the more privileged, their feeling for honesty and truth, their freedom from domination by economic organizations of their own making."

Dr. Bennett, who was born in Kingston, Ont., of American parents, has written, among other books. "Christians and the State."

I would unconsciously plagiarize from myself, and I know I would."

Mr. Burgess describes this aptitude of forgetting in a Close-Up interview to be seen Tuesday. Bill Walker, well known CBC-TV personality, interviewed Mr. Burgess at his home in Hampden, Mass., recently.

A recent story in Life magazine says, "His (Burgess's) mother was widowed when he was nine months old and he endured, as a matter of course, an existence which modern children might well consider one of demeaning hardship.

The Burgesses were taken in by an uncle who was a clerk. . . . His mother earned a dribble of money by making candy, and Burgess, dressed in hand-me-downs, worked at odd jobs almost from the time he could walk. He was virtually self-supporting at 12. In actuality, however, his life was little different from those of other children on the Cape (that is, Cape Cod), and he remembers it today with vast nostalgia."

In the Close-Up interview, Mr. Burgess denies that his childhood was hard. "No, no, I wouldn't say

my childhood was a hard one. I would say it was a very happy one because we always had something to do. We had to meet certain obligations—just because I had to work. I would say that was an advantage."

On leaving school he worked as a clerk in a Boston shoe store for \$7.00 a week. After two years he went to a small publishing house in Springfield, Mass., as an office boy—at \$5.00 a week.

During his clerical days he also wrote some commercial jingles. Life quotes one, a paraphrase of Longfellow, advertising the Miles Standish Spring Water Company: "Kneeling there beside the water, "Long he quaffs the laughing rill, "Feels with each refreshing swallow."

"Strange new life within him thrill."

General reporting, including a column of humour which the publishing company later put out as a book, followed. But Mr. Burgess discovered the field that brought him fame quite by accident; he wrote some stories for his young son, and on *Close-Up* he tells how these finally got published.

GLOBE-TROTTING CAMERAMAN

SIR BERNARD and Lady Docker invited him to spend a day aboard their yacht after they were "banished" from Monaco.

A Polish official in Warsaw left him cooling his heels while the plane he wanted to board took off -and crashed-killing nine persons.

King Hussein granted him an interview in Amman, Jordan, a year before the Middle East crisis.

In South Africa, two years ago, he was shadowed by the police.

All this, and more, has happened to 28-year-old movie cameraman Bob Crone in his 'round-the-world travels for such CBC-TV programs as Close-Up, Background and CBC Newsmagazine, all in the course of five years.

Crone, the son of a clergyman, caught the camera bug during his high-school days in Peterborough, Ont., when he produced his own sound movie of one of the school's cadet inspections.

"I don't really know how I got into this business, and now I don't know how to get out of it," he says.

A list of the places he has visited in the path of duty reads like the index of a world atlas: Europe, Scandinavia, Russia, Indo-China, Laos, Cambodia, Viet-Nam, Iran, Iraq, Turkey, Lebanon, Jordan, Israel, India, North and South Africa, the Canadian Arctic.

Crone went to Africa twice last year and is vitally interested in the current South African crisis. "The situation was explosive, even then," he says.

A recent assignment took Crone to Memphis, Tenn., to cover the "sitting in" strike of coloured people at lunch counters.

"I like this kind of assignment," he declares. "I guess most of us

are partial to the underdog." Crone met Negro ministers and missionaries when they visited his home during his boyhood years and, when his father's calling took him to the southern United States, Bob attended school there for a year.

Although Crone is away from his Toronto home for several months of the year, he often takes "home" with him. His wife, Violet, herself a professional photographer, accompanies her husband occasionally. Their six-year-old son David remains behind in the care of his grandparents.

Of his many assignments for television, Bob says one of the most depressing was a visit to a

huge refugee camp near Amman, Jordan, where thousands of displaced Arabs "just sit, crying in the desert."

His most fascinating encounter with a famous person came when

he filmed Elaine Grand's interview with Lord Bertrand Russell for Close-Up last season.

"Deep-thinking people somehow have a great deal of time for you," he says. "The bigger they are, the easier to work with."

Most of Crone's camera subjects are hardly aware they are being photographed. He keeps his movie equipment to an easily-handled minimum, and dispenses with the familiar "clap-stick" that signals the beginning of a scene. He has replaced the stick with his own device—a gadget allowing him to "dial" the scene number much as he would a telephone number.

In the midst of a much-travelled career, Crone has come to one major conclusion:

"Canada is the most blessed country in the world, bar none," he says. This may be why he's now thinking "of staying home more." At least until his next assignment to faraway places.

"I never know where I'm going next," says Crone. "That's what keeps it exciting."

Most of us "elder citizens" would wish to be independent: and in spite of rather loose talk about "children not taking their old parents to live with them," my belief is that the majority of old parents don't want to live with their children anyway-if they can have a reasonable alternative, which they should have. See them, yes; and particularly the grandchildren, who in my opinion are more likely to treat grandparents with real respect and affection if they are not continually with them. - Mrs. Dora Taylor, speaking in a BBC program. MINCE TARTS

Pastry:

1 lb. lard

5 cups sifted flour

1 tbsp. salt

10 tbsp. cold water

Blend lard and flour until size of pea. Add water. Mix. Refrigerate. When time to bake, fill tarts with mincemeat and bake in 400 degree oven for 15 to 20 minutes.

Mincemeat:

1 lb. seeded raisins

I lb. apples

34 lb. mixed peel

I lb. currants

1/2 lb. cherries

I lb. brown sugar

2 cups apple cider

I tsp. mace

½ tsp. cinnamon

1/4 tsp. cloves

½ tsp. allspice

14 cup brandy

I lb. suet

1/4 lb. almonds

Place all fruit through coarse blade of food chopper. Add suet, cider and sugar. Simmer for about 1 hour. THEN add chopped almonds, spices and brandy.

Place in sterile jars and seal. This mincemeat will keep for one year or more if desired.
