

The Christmas Story

For 23 years Holy Trinity Church, hidden among the tall buildings of downtown Toronto, has re-enacted the First Christmas each year at this time

HIDDEN AMONG tall buildings, warehouses and factories in downtown Toronto is the charming old Church of the Holy Trinity. When it was built in 1847 it rose majestically among green lawns and little cottages and sailors on Lake Ontario used its twin towers as a guide for making harbour.

Now it stands in a canyon of brick and granite, with only a tiny frill of grass around it, cut off from the world, but very much a part of it, especially in December.

For 23 years thousands of men, women and children have made their way into this little oasis, just a stone's throw from the commercial bustle of Christmas shopping, to see the story of the first Christmas presented in beautiful simplicity. Between 650 and 700 of them squash into pews, sit on the floor and stand jam-packed around the walls for each of the annual performances.

The remarkable thing about *The Christmas Story* at Holy Trinity is that its cast is recruited from all races and walks of life, and is entirely amateur.

Earlier this month the CBC took its cameras into the church and filmed a special performance of *The Christmas Story* without an audience. It was to be seen on *Open House* Friday, December 23.

We dropped in at the old rectory, just behind the church, to

get the story of the pageant from the rector's wife, Mrs. John Frank, who plans and directs it. She is a small, auburn-haired woman whose quiet manner belies the drive and organizing ability it must take to put a large-scale production like that together year after year. About 275 people are involved, including the unseen gallery choir.

She told us that *The Christmas Story* originated in 1929 at St. Martin in the Fields, the old Wren church in London's Trafalgar Square, where her father, the Rev. Patrick McCormick, was rector. Her parents and a woman in their congregation put the pageant together, using the actual New Testament verses as dialogue, supplemented by mime, carols, plainsong, costumes designed after old Flemish paintings, and unusual lighting effects. It was outstandingly successful.

Mrs. Frank met her husband, now Archdeacon Frank, when he joined her father's staff as a social worker. When they married and settled at Holy Trinity, they decided to introduce *The Christmas Story* to Toronto audiences. "Our first production coincided with my parents' last one until after the war," Mrs. Frank told us. "They had just acquired a new set of costumes, so they sent us their old


AROUND CBC...

The Music of Eric Wild is the straightforward title of the show, first to be seen on Wednesday, January 4, and alternate Wednesdays thereafter. Such favourites as Florence Faiers and Maxine Ware will lend their vocal talents, further ensuring the success of the series.

A question that will arise in the minds of many viewers is, Why can we not see a program such as *The Music of Eric Wild* each week? The answer: most members of the 24-piece orchestra also perform with the Winnipeg Symphony; the schedule of concerts and rehearsals does not permit them sufficient time to appear on television more frequently.

ON-THE-SPOT news broadcasts, usually considered a field dominated by radio, has been invaded in an impressive manner by CBC Television. Coverage of the recent tragic school bus-train collision at Lamont, Alta., was filmed and televised over the whole continent within a remarkably short time of the disaster. A newsman from Prairie Regional Headquarters in Winnipeg was on a plane headed

for the scene within 45 minutes of the time word of the accident was received.

Full of Grace

Painters', Writers' View of Christmas

AN ARTISTIC study of the life of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of events surrounding the first Christmas, as interpreted by some of the great painters and writers of the early Renaissance, will be presented on CBC-TV Christmas Eve.

Titled Full of Grace, the program is a blending of graphic art with prose, poetry readings and music. It will feature the off-camera voices of three well-known Canadian performers: Frances Hyland, Joseph Shaw and Henry Comor.

The program considers first the birth of mankind—Adam and Eve in the Garden, the Temptation, the Fall, and the prophecy of a new Adam who would redeem the world. The Annunciation of the Angel Gabriel leads to a description of the life and unfailing motherliness of the Blessed Virgin, seen through the eyes of artists and writers, particularly St. Luke, the most literary of the New Testament writers, traditional author of the Third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles.

Life of Rickshaw Puller

Close-Up Does The Impossible

ONE OF the great Indian film directors told the Close-Up crew that no one had made a film on the streets of India and that it was virtually impossible to do so. He said he had found it difficult to shoot even occasional street scenes despite his all-Indian crew, and the three Canadians from Close-Up already knew at first hand that Indian crowds understandably resent anything they consider - wrongly -an attempt to use their poverty as the basis of some sort of spectacular for entertainment of North Americans.

Nevertheless, Allan King decided to go ahead shooting his film on the life of an Indian rickshaw puller. At least he tried to. First he had great difficulty finding rickshaw men who would consent to be filmed. Then, having found two suitable men, he and cameraman Rolf Blacksted spent seven consecutive days arriving on location at 4:00 a.m. to start filming, only to find some hold up: they needed permission from the central government, or from the state government, or from the Bengal Rickshow Owners' Union, and so on.

When finally they started filming and had completed two days shooting, one of the two main characters pulled out and they had to start again. By ten o'clock each day the sun was directly overhead so that in addition to the heat they

had a cameraman's nightmare: no shadows, with white glaring streets and walls in violent contrast to the dark faces of the rickshaw pullers, which on film could easily become just dark blobs.

But most difficult of all were the crowds. Even with the camera hidden as much as possible in the back of a truck, the crew no sooner started shooting than anything from 100 to 200 spectators gathered round to watch, making it very difficult to get the natural street scenes the film needed. So they used telephoto lenses, they shot from different angles and from rooftops, and they used very short takes, with a ride around the block between each take to let the crowd disperse. Even so, the crowds always collected and sometimes became hostile, once to the point of stoning the crew.

Why, then, did King insist on shooting? His own statement of his intentions in this film are enlightening. "I had expected to have the same reaction to poverty in Calcutta that I first did when visiting India three years ago," he wrote in a letter to Close-Up producer Ross McLean.

"In my outline I described my reaction of horror on first seeing Calcutta and I wanted to find just what happened when a person hits rock bottom, what level of humanity persists in a person when he is thus reduced."

"What we found," King went on, "was a kind of dignity which is manifest in Dukhan, our central character (a rickshaw puller in Calcutta.) He has had very very little from life."

He has worked forty years as a rickshaw puller. He has lost a wife and two children, the last of his land went to the money lenders long ago. He has had nothing, and is returning to nothing. With all this, he still has his dignity, his stature as a person, and it is written all over his face. We found as we explored these people that this was characteristic of most of them. . . .

"There were a few people who were in very bad shape, but these

What Makes Good TV Drama?

Conflict, story, technique . . . what is most important in making a high-calibre television drama? We polled top produceres, actors and critics and here are the answers they gave

WHAT ARE the ingredients of a good, one-hour television drama? We started by asking Charles Israel, author of many TV dramas.

"A writer gets many ideas," he said. "I ask of any given idea if it has basic conflict between characters. If not, it might make a good half hour drama. But the hour drama needs the three-act form, so you must have conflict."

CBC-TV producer Mel Breen was just closing a rehearsal of *The Long Road Back* for *G.M. Presents*. "First you need a strong story line. You can use TV drama to discuss world problems or prove the existence of God, but you must have a story line."

"It is impossible to be dogmatic about drama," said actor-writer Mavor Moore in his Toronto Crest Theatre dressing room as he set about the 90-minute chore of making up for the title role in King Lear. "There is practically nothing you can say that applies to all dramatic works except they must be audible, visible and they must relate . . . nol that's too strong a word . . . they must convey some sort of story."

Globe and Mail drama critic Herbert Whittaker, in an all-too brief telephone conversation, said, "TV will not successfully present drama so long as it continues to ape the values and shape of stage drama. Television must discover its own technique—perhaps a fragmentary, enquiring technique because its strength is in the youwere-there, reportorial style."

Said Ed Moser, executive producer for G.M. Presents, "Most 60-minute television dramas have only 50 minutes playing time, plus commercials. And of course each drama is broken into three acts with each act having its own dramatic climax and so on. If the form was an unbroken 50 minutes,

it might lend itself to different treatment."

As Mavor Moore sees it: "The most significant new technique on

TV is the 'combined operations;' for instance, a drama, partly live, partly filmed documentary, perhaps even discussion."

Can such programs be called drama? "You have to make your own definitions," said Moore. We have got to the point where practically anything that isn't a straight report of an actual event becomes a drama. Sports have a dramatic element and, in fact, sports has to some extent replaced the theatre, as they often do when the theatre grows as tepid as it is today, and as it was in ancient Rome."

"Television scriptwriters must try experimenting," said free-lance TV producer George McCowan, who will direct Henry VIII at Stratford next year. "I know the writer will ask, 'And who's going to buy my experiments? Neverthe-

Open House

Our Special Guest. Our special guest today on Open House is Dr. Lotta Hitschmanova, Executive Director of the Unitarian Service Committee of Canada. The USC is a voluntary non-denominational relief and rehabilitation agency which has been giving aid in areas of greatest human need since 1945, regardless of race, creed or nationality. The greatest assistance has always gone to the most helpless of all-the children. Each year, Dr. Hitschmanova spends four months travelling about 35,000 miles to visit each of the USC's projects overseas. Her travels take her to Korea, Hong Kong, India and Greece. She is interviewed on Open House on the eve of her departure for another such tour.

Film on Work of Unitarian Service Committee. When Dr. Lotta Hitschmanova last made a tour of inspection of USC sponsored schools and orphanages and other projects in Korea, Hong Kong and India, she was accompanied by cameraman Dennis Jukes. The film record of that journey is shown on Open House today and through it we'll meet some of the children and adults who are receiving aid through the work of the Unitarian Service Committee.

Interview with Dr. Wilfred Pelletier. Another special guest today on Open House is Dr. Wilfred Pelletier, one of the conductors with the National Youth Orchestra Association of Canada. The formation of the National Youth Orchestra Association of Canada started when Walter Susskind, the internationally famous conductor brought the success story of the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain to Canada four years ago. Mr. Susskind's idea was taken up by a group of interested citizens and culminated in the formation last

summer of the National Youth Orchestra Association of Canada. The aim of the Association is to teach talented young musicians to play in a symphony orchestra under professional conditions; thus assuring a constant supply of first class musicians to improve the standard of our symphony orchestras. We hear about the progress the association is making in an interview with Dr. Wilfred Pelletier who will conduct a concert of the National Youth Orchestra to be held in Massey Hall in Toronto on December 31st. Dr. Pelletier is Director of the Quebec Conservatoire de Musique. He is also distinguished as the founder of the Montreal Festival and is a former conductor of the Metropolitan Opera.

Family of Musicians. Four members of the Armin family of Windsor, Ontario, will be in Toronto to attend the meeting of the National Youth Orchestra Association of Canada. They'll visit Open House today to talk about their work with the orchestra and to play for Open House viewers. In their own family quartet, Otto Armin, aged 17, is first violinist, 15-year-old Adele is second violinist, 16-year-old Paul plays the viola while Richard, 16, plays the 'cello. They'll play music for String Quartet by Haydn, Raff and others.

Travel the World on Christmas Day



BBC'S CHRISTMAS DAY COMMONWEALTH FEATURE

UNDER THE TITLE "No Man Is An Island," radio listeners on Christmas Day will be taken around the world by the BBC's annual Commonwealth Broadcast. Actor Stephen Murray will be narrator of the program.

The title is taken from the famous passage in John Donne's "Devotions," which stresses that every man is "involved in man-kind" and that no one can live his life for himself alone. The BBC invited various broadcasting organizations throughout the Commonwealth to find speakers whose working lives were an illustration of this truth-quite ordinary and not famous people, the kind who might otherwise be known only in their own surroundings. They were recorded in their homes or the places in which they work, and extracts from these recordings will make up the program. Fifteen

countries, apart from the United Kingdom, have contributed to "No Man Is An Island."

Nigeria, the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland, India and Pakistan, are all represented by doctors. From Nigeria comes the voice of Dr. Christopher Okojie, who almost single-handed and with little money started a private hospital in Irrua, in the bush 70 miles from Benin City. He has been described as "the doctor with the spirit of Schweitzer."

Dr. Wilhelm Gilges is the speaker from Northern Rhodesia. He left Germany in the early years of the Nazi regime. After a number of years as a plastic surgeon in Johannesburg he gave up his practice to work among the African population in Northern Rhodesia.

From Pakistan comes the voice of Dr. George D'Cunha, and from

India that of Dr. Verrier Elwin, an Englishman who has worked for 30 years among the tribal people in remote parts of Central and North-East India.

Australia is represented by Father Kennedy Tucker of the Anglican brotherhood of St. Laurence, who has spent a lifetime waging war on the slums of Melbourne and is the founder of Carrum Downs near Melbourne.

New Zealand's contribution comes from the mother of an adopted family of eight, and Hong Kong is represented by Father Howatson, a Jesuit priest who has spent many years working among Chinese refugee children, organizing boys' and girls' clubs.

Two other social workers in the program are Mrs. Evelyn Tracey, who runs the Tacarigua Orphanage in Trinidad and is mother to 500 children, and Mrs. Ampofo of Ghana, an Almoner at Accra's Mental Hospital.

Two voices from Sarawak are heard in the program: James Sim, a cured leper who stayed on at the Rajah Sir Charles Brooke Memorial Settlement at Kuching to teach children suffering from leprosy, and Elizabeth Ulas, a young Iban woman.

Two other speakers, Edwin de Robillard of Mauritius and Miss Ariyaratne of Ceylon, devote much of their time to social service. Miss Ariyaratne is convener of the Shramadana movement. Shramadana means "donation of labour" and members of the movement give their spare time to helping the underprivileged. Edwin de Robillard organized groups of volunteers of all races in Mauritius to help people rebuild their homes, destroyed in two recent cyclones.

Song of a Road

"We built canals, we laid the tracks, Of railways here to hell and back. And now we're going to have a crack

At the London-Yorkshire Highway."

SO SING the men with picks, shovels and bulldozers in a BBC radio ballad about the building of the first 76 miles of Britain's first super highway, the London-Yorkshire motorway. Its story is told by the men who designed and built it, and set into song by Ewan Mac-Coll, with the help of Charles Parker and Peggy Seeger, the same team who produced The Ballad of John Axon, heard on CBC radio in September. Song of a Road will be presented on CBC Wednesday Night this week.

How did they hit on such an unlikely subject for san ballad as a super highway? Producer Charles Parker says: "As soon as we had completed The Ballad of John Axon, Ewan MacColl and I began casting around for another subject which would lend itself to the exciting method of blending reallife recordings, folk songs and jazz which we had stumbled upon in that production. But nothing quite caught alight until the head of the BBC's Midland Region suggested the building of the London-Yorkshire motorway as a subject.

"How were we to find a storyline as strong as that of John Axon's? As soon as we began to talk with the men who designed and built the motorway we knew that this civil engineering work would supply its own story against a vast canvas of 4,000 or more men, thousands of machines, and

Experimental scripts are a rarity, but writers feel that CBC television gives ample opportunity for experimentation.

less, I feel TV must find new conventions, a new format-though I can't say exactly what."

"I would like very much to try experimental dramas," said producer Mel Breen, "but experimental TV doesn't start with the producer. It starts with the script. And we just don't see many experimental scripts."

Said writer Israel: "CBC is a good place to experiment. Not as good as it once was, perhaps, but still very good."

"In the best period of TV drama," said McCowan, "producers like Fred Coe gathered round them writers like Chayevsky and Sirling and let them work out ideas and techniques without too much pressure. Producers had the same function as some of the great editors of the publishing houses."

"Like the stage, television has different phases through which its dramas pass," said Moser. "The Chayevsky phase was one; I'm not sure what it is now, but we'll have others. But because of the large number of plays produced in any one year, we move through these phases more quickly on TV."

Are there any limitations on TV drama compared with film and the theatre? In general, Breen, Moser and Israel think not.

"The same idea can work in several media," said Israel. In 1952 he conceived the idea of a novel called *The Mark* about the

return to society of a convicted sex offender. Instead of a novel he wrote a radio play, produced on CBC Stage in 1953; in 1955 he wrote it as a TV drama; the novel was finally published in 1958; and now the film based on the book is ready for release.

"Main difference between theatre and TV," said Ed Moser, "is the fragmented audience of TV. In general stage plays can be done on TV more or less successfully, but it is not always possible to translate TV drama for the stage."

"TV alters the ground rules of drama," said Mavor Moore. The fragmented audience, for instance, "rules out ritualistic drama which is essentially a shared experience. And TV, like all photography, finds it difficult to handle symbolism and, therefore, to handle poetry.

"On the other hand," Moore went on, "TV shares with film the ability to play around with time and place more easily than on stage, and the varying perspective of close-up and long-shot make a vital difference in TV. The theatre can't claim any aesthetic priority over television except that in the theatre the audience is in the presence of the performer. But I'm not sure how important that is."

Of adaptation, critic Whittaker said, "TV suffers from the apparent need to tie up plots. You see this when TV tries adapting a novel; all you get is the narrative, and

millions of tons of rock and soil, cement and steel.

"And, of course, as we soon came to realize, here was an activity deep-rooted in the soil of Britain. The man manoevring the 20-ton bulldozer is the descendant of those early navvies who drove the first canals and railways across the face of Britain.

"But the most important of all for our purposes in preparing Song of a Road was the sense of being challenged to recapture a tradition of song."

In preparing the program they used 120 fifteen-minute reels of midget tape. Parker, MacColl and Miss Seeger (who is Mrs. Mac-Coll) worked for 10 weeks with miles of tape before the program was done to their liking. The range of those taking part is considerable. Sir Owen Williams, the engineer who designed the motorway, is heard, along with geologists, fitters, foremen, tractor-drivers. scaffolders and labourers, as well as farmers through whose land the road was cut, and folk, jazz and pop musicians.

MacColl is the son of a Lowland Scottish iron moulder and a Highland mother. He grew up among folk songs, and collected more during the 1930's when he "bummed around a bit" through Britain. Later he became a playwright (George Bernard Shaw hailed him as "the greatest writer in the English language-after myself, of course"), and was art director of the Stratford Workshop, the well-known London theatre founded after the war by a group of young people who pooled their service gratuities to do it. Later MacColl became interested in folk singing as a career.

He met Miss Seeger four years ago when they appeared together

on a television program. She was on a European tour following two years at Radcliffe College. She, too, had been steeped in a folk song atmosphere since childhood, as the daughter of an American musicologist Charles Seeger, and sister of famed balladeer Pete Seeger. She began sharing concerts with MacColl as both accompanist and singer, and they have given many joint recitals in Britain. Canada and the States, and made dozens of recordings. Miss Seeger specializes in North American folk songs, and MacColl in native British ballads.

seemed to be neurotic personalities. They were special cases, but psychological ones, not economic or physical. One intuited that these latter people were not destroyed by poverty but by other factors having little to do with this. To have made a film about them would have given a totally false impression. We would have made a film about psychotics, and not about poor people."

Scriptwriter George Robertson describes the story of Rickshaw like this: "An old man in his sixties has been coming to the city as a rickshaw puller for 30 years. He is tired and can no longer work as he once did. His son arrives from their home village, and the old man teaches him his trade as a rickshaw puller - they walk the streets together, the young man jogging alongside the rickshaw as the old man is working. They arrange for the boy to take over his father's shift on the rickshaw as soon as he gets his licence.

"A few mornings later," Robertson goes on, "the boy pulls the old man to the station, getting more hints and instructions on the way. At the station they part, and the old man looks back and sees his son getting his first fare. And then the train takes him back to his village" -where there is no more material comfort than in Calcutta, but which, at least, is home.

The script for Rickshaw contains few statistics. But perhaps some are pertinent here. There are about 12,000 rickshaws in the city of Calcutta, about half of them licensed, the other half illegal.

And there are about twice that number of rickshaw pullers, working in shifts. Soon, probably, all will be illegal as a recent World Health Organization report, finding many rickshaw pullers die of TB or heart disease, has advocated the abolition of the rickshaw in Calcutta. The Indian government has accepted the report.

But the problem becomes: what will happen to those 25,000 rick-

shaw men when their only means of livelihood has gone?

"Rickshaw people are looked down on by practically everyone else in the community," says Robertson. "They are harrassed by the police, jostled by taxi-drivers. Living solely on a bit of rice and a kind of pancake made of wheat called a chapattie, they do a humiliating and punishing job with very little expectation of anything better.

They have all left their families behind in the villages, and work for six to nine months each year, returning to the village when some money has been saved up, where they will work the land a little, beget another child, and leave for the city again."

Music behind the film is particularly striking, but here too director King had his difficulties. All the film was sent to England and processed there. The music, played by Indians living in London, was added to the soundtrack there.

Difficulty is, Indian music of this kind has considerable extemporization (though within rigid framework). Result was that any two rehearsals by the Indian musicians yielded different music. On film, of course, music and film must coincide practically right down to a chord-for-frame basis so that King had great difficulty getting the Indian variations dubbed in accurately.

Despite the many difficulties at virtually all stages of production, Rickshaw technically shows no sign of the strain. But more important, it is emotionally a very moving document.

In that, it fulfills a criterion which Allan King once expressed: "It is much more satisfying to exalt than to damn; to find the spark of life and dignity, and to cherish it."

TV in India

There is no TV set manufacturing in India, and all sets have to be imported. Plans are now going forward for the establishment of factories. All India Radio has distributed 20 community sets in rural and urban areas, at community centres organized by State governments, where audiences of 150 to 200 can view educational pro-

the narrative is often the weakest

part of a novel." "We would rather do originals than adaptations," said Moser, "but we just don't get enough originals.

For that matter, there aren't enough properties left to adapt either.'

Will tape and film, with the possibilities they offer of editing and of outside locations, be an advantage or an artistic drawback to TV? "In five years there probably will be no live television drama,

said Israel, "and I for one will not much regret it. The so-called spontaneity of live TV is little more than the possibility of the audience seeing the actor trip over a cable. Anyway, live TV never was spontaneous; the needs of the cameras made detailed planning essential."

Israel sees tape and film offering the advantages of escape from the restriction of studios. But producer Breen sees little artistic advantage in this. "The use of tape and film will only expand the medium in the sense that we can get outside locations and, in that way, we can get greater realism. But I didn't see that as a broadening of TV but rather it's a restriction. I would like to see television get away from the realism of films and move on to something much more imaginative."

What is the major fault of the scripts Moser sees? "One fault is too many words," he said. "Because of the nature of TV, drama scripts need fewer words than radio or even the stage. The picture must tell a lot of the story,

STUFFING

6-8 cups day old bread crumbs

1/2 cup chopped onions

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped celery -1 chopped apple

1/4 lb. butter

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon pepper

1 tbsp. sage or poultry dressing

1/4 tsp. thyme—1/4 tsp. oregano

1 tsp. celery salt, 1/4 tsp. savory

ones. One of them is still going strong."

We wanted to know if the Holy Trinity production was the same as it had been originally.

"I have changed the wording," Mrs. Frank said, "but for the last few years I've assigned all the speaking parts to the narrator, my husband. The rest of the cast performs entirely by mime, which is very difficult to do beautifully. Of course we make improvements in production and this year we have some really lovely new music written by Catherine Palmer, our music and choir director. I couldn't do the pageant exactly the same each year—it would just die."

We learned that Mrs. Frank has two complete casts of 53 who alternate. They include negroes, orientals, people from a dozen or more countries. Some are from well-to-do families, others are down-and-outs. Many of them have been in *The Christmas Story* for years—one or two from the beginning. "I don't audition," Mrs. Frank explained. "I just look around through the years and note people who might be suitable, and when an opening comes I ask them to take part."

The smoothness of their performance is not the result of long rehearsal. Mrs. Frank said: "I like to start private rehearsals with just a few performers no later than September, but I find it's better to limit full rehearsals to just three, with one 'dress.' That way they don't get stale."

One of the most impressive of them is the Red King, who is always a negro, accompanied by a retinue of small negro children. For years they were played by a plasterer, a direct descendant of an Ethiopian chieftain, and some of his six children. Coming down the aisle in his splendid robes he looked every inch a king. He died a few years ago, but members of his family still take part. The current Mary was an angel for many years. An earlier Mary became a Church of England missionary in India, where she has produced another edition of *The Christmas*

There are numerous children in the pageant, and we were curious to know how Mrs. Frank manages to keep them out of mischief through the long performance. She smiled. "We have helpers stationed all over the place to keep an eye on them." And she added that backstage it's not unusual to see a small angel with his nose in a comic book, waiting for his cue.

As we were leaving Mrs. Frank said that *The Christmas Story* is best described in a newspaper editorial that appeared in the pageant's early days, and applies still. She produced a scrapbook and we read: "The great merit of this particular Nativity Play is that the simplicity and humanity of the ideas are not obscured. The place is still a church, not a theatre, and the beauty of the production is meant as, and has the effect of, an act of worship."
