

Walt Disney's Daniel Boone

Rugged Dewey Martin not only bears a physical resemblance to Daniel Boone, whom he portrays in the Walt Disney series. He shares the legendary figure's wandcrlust, and has had experience trading with the Indians—but not trading shots.

DEWEY MARTIN was the personal choice of Walt Disney for the starring role in the "Daniel Boone" series.

Dewey is not unlike the real Boone in stature and build, according to historical data, and also shares a good deal of the wanderlust of the pioneer he portrays. Boone spent his life exploring the wilderness and opening up new lands for expansion. Dewey spends his free time travelling all over the world.

Born in Katemcy, Tex., Dewey was thrown virtually on his own at an early age. His father died when Dewey was seven; five years later his mother's health broke and Dewey and his younger brother, Jimmy, were separated. Dewey was sent to live with relatives in Long Beach, Calif.

Reaching teen-age, he felt called upon to support himself. For a time he traded with Indians, working out of Phoenix, Ariz.

Money earned at half a dozen other jobs enabled him to enroll for two years at the University of Georgia and Louisiana State Teachers College before he joined the navy. Rising through the ranks, Dewey became a fighter pilot in World War II, seeing action in the Pacific.

While in the service, Martin first became interested in acting. Following his discharge from the navy and a brief fling at ranching in Arizona, he sold his car and traveled by bus to Maine where he landed with a theatre group.

When a Hollywood talent scout offered him a film contract, Dewey declined, feeling the need for more experience.

After two summers of stock and two winters in New York, he was

determined to try Hollywood on his own. He appeared in several plays, and finally in his first movie, "Knock on Any Door," which starred Humphrey Bogart. His next movie roles were in "Battleground," "The Golden Gloves Story," "Kansas Raiders," and "The Thing." After co-starring with Kirk Douglas in "The Big Sky," magazine polls hailed him as the year's outstanding newcomer.

Dewey's many pictures since include "Men of the Fighting Lady," "Desperate Hours" and "The Proud and the Profane."

His numerous TV credits include appearances on "Playhouse 90," "Zane Grey Theatre," and ABC-TV's "Alcoa Presents."

Dewey uses his leisure time to pursue such sports as surfboarding, skin diving and skiing. His principal hobby, oceanography, has taken him to Tahiti this summer.

"Minuteman" Success Story On the 20th Century

"Minuteman," the success story of America's first "second-generation" missile, whose initial test flight early this year startled even the most hopeful rocket scientists, will be presented on *The Twentieth Century* Sunday, March 19, on CBC television.

That 4,200-mile shot, in which all three stages operated flawlessly, foreshadowed early operational status for an IBCM whose solid-fuel construction will eliminate all the danger and delay, and much of the elaborate fixed installation, needed to launch liquid-fueled Atlas and Titan rockets. Minuteman, with its 30-second countdown, will for the first time provide the West with an instant, mobile retaliatory weapon of nuclear or thermonuclear capability.

The Twentieth Century will follow the six-foot Air Force missile from the drawing board, through the plants of prime contractors, through preliminary tests in the Mojave Desert, to Cape Canaveral and Minuteman's historic arc down the Atlantic range. CBS News Correspondent Walter Cronkite, who covered key development phases and the first shot, will narrate.

"Minuteman" was written by Richard Witkin, aviation editor of The New York Times, and directed by Daniel Klugherz. The Twentieth Century is produced by Burton Benjamin. Isaax Kleinerman is associate producer. The series is sponsored by the Prudential Insurance Company of America.

CBC Awards

Up to and including 1959, the CBC had won 87 first awards, 75 honourable mentions, and 72 other prizes in various radio and television competitions. The international Italia prize for drama was won in 1959. In 1953, the year after TV began in Canada, CBC received a Sylvania TV award for its part in bringing the Coronation telecast from BBC in England to North America. A CBC science program won the Thomas Alva Edison award in 1960. CBC awards at the Ohio State Institute for Education by Radio and Television have been very numerous — 158 since 1942.



IN THE SHORT HISTORY of the Canada Council (see last week's issue) practically every Canadian has felt the benefit of the millions it is spending to foster Canadian culture. CBC radio listeners will share these benefits once again on Thursday, March 16th, when the Dirk Keetbaas Players will be heard in the premiere performance of Leslie Mann's Woodwind Quintet. The work was commissioned by the Canada Council.

Composer Leslie Mann is a member of the Dirk Keetbaas woodwind ensemble. During 12 years as a composer, he has attained increasing recognition. A year ago, the Winnipeg Chamber Orchestra gave the premiere performance of one of his major works, the Introduction, Pastorale and Fugue on a French-Canadian Air. The composition subsequently was performed by the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra in its concert last November.

Mann's Woodwind Quintet, he says, "is perhaps a change from most woodwind quintets, which are light and colorful, in contrast with the more serious string quartet. I have tried to make my woodwind quintet a serious work."

P. V. KRISHNAMOORTHY insists that he knows nothing about television. But a few weeks ago he was appointed Director of Television for India, and nobody has any doubt that the slight, energetic man will make a tremendous success of the job.

Mr. Krishnamoorthy's appointment came while he was travelling in Canada under the Colombo Plan, studying the CBC's Farm Forum movement. Last week he stopped at CBC Winnipeg—he still has not been home since taking over India's 14-month-old television network—and we talked with him.

"Following recommendations by UNESCO, India founded a Farm Radio Forum much like Canada's," he told us. "Now, we have 1,000 Farm Forum groups in India — nearly double the number in Canada."

Radio and television in India, Mr. Krishnamoorthy pointed out, are not entertainment media. All stations are operated by the government, and are used to disseminate information, mainly to the rural areas.

"At present there are 60,000 radio sets owned on a communal basis in India" he said. "Our eventual aim is that each of the 600,000 villages in the country should have a set." By the end of 1963, there should be 93,000 villages served by radio.

Television broadcasting is only in the vicinity of Delhi, he told us. "At present, 260 high schools have sets, over which they receive instruction in scientific courses, the country's official Language (Hindi), and the English language. There is a great shortage of qualified teachers in these fields."

Bison

A half-hour film showing the American bison (buffalo) at Elk Island National Park, Alberta, and telling the story of propagation of the herd under the government-sponsored wildlife scheme. In 1900, the U.S. and Canadian governments established refuges to protect these animals, with the result that by 1957 there were 5,000 in the U.S. and 13,000 in Canada. The herds have multiplied to such an extent that in 1959 the authorities at Elk Island Park reduced the herd by 500.

Canadian Harmonica Player **Broadcasts for BBC**



TOMMY REILLY, the well-known Canadian harmonica virtuoso, is broadcasting regularly in BBC General Overseas Service programs.

Reilly's brilliant talent has won world-wide recognition through his hundreds of BBC broadcasts, concert appearances and arrangements for the harmonica; but he was virtually unknown when he made his first broadcast in 1948 in the BBC program "In Town Tonight," and started on the road to fame.

Like other dedicated musicians. he had put in a great deal of hard work before that. Born in Guelph, Ontario, in 1919, he won prizes in Canada for harmonica playing before coming to Britain with his parents at the age of sixteen.

He soon set out on his own to obtain concert and variety engagements, which took him touring through Britain, and later to France, Germany, Italy, Belgium and Switzerland. He was on his way to Leipzig when war broke out and he was imprisoned for the duration. He returned to England in 1945, and continued with concert and variety engagements until broadcasting brought him wider recognition.

REVISED LISTINGS-SATURDAY TV, MAR. 18

After last week's issue of the CBC Times had gone to press, sweeping changes were announced in the CBC network programming for Saturday, March 18. Telecasts of two major sporting events became available: The Canadian Curling Championships being played in Calgary, and the World Amateur Hockey Championships, Canada vs. Russia, being played in Switzerland.

To accommodate the new programs, the network broadcast of the Indoor Track and Field Championships has been cancelled, and Junior Magazine will be seen two hours earlier. 

On Farm Radio Forum

Are You Eating Poisoned Food?

Is our food really the world's safest, or are nuclear fallout and insect sprays slowly poisoning us? The controversial question will be investigated Monday by National Farm Radio Forum

ACCORDING TO the Canadian and U.S. Departments of Health and Agriculture, the food eaten in Canada and the States is the safest, cleanest and most wholesome in the world. In spite of this, articles and advertisements continually warn us that we will lose our youth, teeth and health if we do not take vitamin tablets, eat specially enriched foods and avoid this or that type of food or method of processing.

Are our diets really producing ill health? Is our food as pure as we are led to believe? National Farm Radio Forum investigates this controversial question in a docu-

mentary program Monday night on CBC radio.

First it takes a look at the charges made against some of our food. A few of these have been cropping up for centuries, of course, some based on fact, others on old wives' notions. But recently, more serious charges have been laid against various foods. Some people claim that atomic fallout is becoming dangerously concentrated in certain food products and may cause types of cancer. But some scientists say that even if all nuclear testing was stopped there would still be some fallout from weapons already exploded for

about 10 years more. But tests this year have shown that fallout rates in Canada are down sharply from those of a year ago.

Animal fats, including butterfat, have been accused of causing high rates of heart disease, but the findings have not been conclusive. Some doctors claim that the saturated fats (which are solid at room temperature—butter, hydrogenated oils like margarine, lard, tallow, etc.) are more likely to cause the production of cholesterol in artery walls than the unsaturated fats, such as corn oil, which are liquid at room temperature.

Ups and Downs of the Stanley Cup

by Ron Andrews

THE STANLEY CUP is a piece of silverware which was bought in 1892 for the modest price of 10 pounds (\$48.67 in Canadian funds). Today money couldn't buy this prized hockey trophy.

The history of the Stanley Cup is one of humour, tragedy and incredibility. Millions of dollars have been spent in an effort to gain temporary possession of the Cup and men have gone broke in their vain quests to have their names etched on the base of the trophy.

It all started in 1892 when Frederick Arthur, Lord Stanley of Preston and governor-general of Canada at the time, donated "a challenge cup which should be held from year to year by the champion hockey team in the Dominion."

In those days professional hockey was non-existent in Canada, thus the Cup was strictly for amateur teams. For the last half century, however, it has been the property of professionals.

"Legend has it that the Stanley Cup was tossed into an Ottawa graveyard and later booted into the Rideau Canal by a celebrating member of a Cup-winning team in the dim past," says Jack Sullivan of The Canadian Press in his History of the Stanley Cup. "Luckily enough, the canal was frozen over and the Cup was found the next morning, a little nicked by its tumble but still intact.

"The Cup missed another burial in 1907 when an executive of the Kenora Thistles threatened to throw it in the Lake of the Woods. Miffed by a decision by Cup trustees over the eligibility of two players, he stormed out of a meeting with the Cup under his arm and was heading for the waterfront. A compromise was reached, he reconsidered and returned to the meeting."

This year millions of Canadians will watch or listen to the Stanley Cup playoffs. CBC-TV will televise all games in the semi-finals, airtime usually being one hour after the opening faceoff. Every game in the finals will be televised in its

entirety.

He Deals In New And Used "Worms"

DUMP HERMAN HERST in the middle of the Sahara with nothing but a pair of tweezers, a cellophane hinge and two "worms," and he is pretty sure he could make a living. "Worms" to him are as honey to a bee. He can't keep away from them. They started out as a hobby, but at the age of 26 he was up to the ears in "worms" professionally. He is one of North America's experts, a wily trader who has unearthed many rare specimens.

This busy, fascinating career has not been as strange as it sounds, for to Herman Herst, and to several of his friends, "worms" are stamps.

It happened this way. Herst was born in New York City on March 17, 1909 (and nicknamed Pat because of it) and grew up in Portland, Oregon, where his maternal grandparents had settled in 1850.

After graduating from Reed College in 1931 he headed back East and settled into a job on Wall Street with a bond dealer. His salary was far from princely, but he found he could add to it with sales from a stamp collection he had begun when he was eight.

He spent his noon hours and Saturdays prowling around the antique shops and stamp auctions, where he bought, sold and traded stamps. Soon his office pals caught stamp fever, too, and office conversation was almost exclusively about stamps—until the boss burst in one day and announced: "I don't want to hear any further mention of stamps. This is a bond office, but one would never know it from watching the activity and listening to the conversation."

Herst was equal to the occasion. "Very well," he said, when the boss was out of earshot, "we'll call them another name — let's call them 'worms'."

After that, if the boss thought his staff was taking a lively interest in zoology, he made no comment. Eventually Herst's involvement with stamps became so serious and profitable that he decided to set up

shop, and in 1935 he forsook bonds and opened an office on Nassau Street, the U.S. stamp mecca.

Eleven years later he had established himself so solidly in the profession that he could afford to move out to Shrub Oak, in northern Westchester County, where he still lives with his wife, who collects stamps, and his four children, who don't.

He says he still finds it convenient, sometimes, to refer to stamps as "worms," particularly when travelling with valuable specimens. "Never knowing when someone may be listening, especially in Europe where customs officials are alert for evidence of stamp dealing across international borders," he says, "the use of the word 'stamp' would cause many a raised eye-

brow, whereas the innocent 'worm' would be passed by."

It has not all been clover in the "worm" business, but Herst has had enough amusing and exciting experiences and met enough colourful characters to fill a book, which he did last year, and called it Nassau Street. (Publishers: Duell, Sloan and Pearce.) It is packed with hundreds of anecdotes, stories and memories, some of which he will relate Saturday on the CBC Stamp Club on CBC radio. He will be a guest by remote control - he recorded his part of the program in New York, based on questions sent down to him by CBC Stamp Club president Doug Patrick.

Not everyone, Herst says, appreciates the excitement and romance (Please turn to page 31)

The program, which comes to us only two weeks before Easter, has but one purpose: to let the worldbeginning with each individual tuned in-think a bit more seriously on the consequences of another war, as compared to the benefits of a longlasting peace. It was produced by Robert Séguin, with the help of Gilles Ste-Marie.

Orphee

Thursday, March 23 at 9:30 p.m., L'Heure du Concert will present Gluck's Orphée in a production by Pierre Mercure, with Léopold Simoneau, Pierrette Alarie and Claire Gagnier, a choir and dancers from the Grands Ballets Canadiens.

Marcel Laurencelle will direct the choirs; and Ludmilla Chiriaeff has staged the dance numbers.

Unlike most operas more commonly known, Orphée is sung by only three main voices. They are Orphée, tenor; Eurydice and l'Amour, sopranos. The opera will be presented in its 1774 transcription by Paul Vidal, a conductor with L'Opéra de Paris.

At some time after its original presentation, roles were added to the opera, which produced some admirable selections but somewhat hampered the main actors in their evocation of an intense drama.

The dancers, however, are welcomed, since their numbers not only serve to beautify an opera but are an integral part of the plot.

Producer Pierre Mercure will be ably assisted by Powys Thomas for the scenic direction, Otto - Werner Mueller conducting the orchestra, and Roger Morin who is in charge of technical direction.

The CBC Trans-Canada radio network will broadcast all Saturday and deciding semi-final games — ones in which a team might be eliminated from the series—with the broadcasts beginning half an hour after game-time. The playoffs are scheduled to start this week but when this article was written, dates of the playoffs had not been announced by the National Hockey League.

Cup matches were based on sudden-death games, a best-of-three series or two-game total goals series. Some years there were several challenges in a span of a few months. For instance, the Ottawa Silver Seven defended their championship six times in a space of two years. The Cup was up for competition 15 times between 1902 and 1908.

Because of the early system of deciding championship series there are names of 81 teams on the Stanley Cup although it has been in competition 68 years, including 1893 when it was awarded to Montreal AAA without a challenge.

Cup finals were played anytime during the hockey season—December, January, February or March. The matches took place on week nights because Saturday nights were reserved for league games.

In 1910 the professional National Hockey Association took over the Cup and from 1914 to 1916, Pacific Coast League champions met the NHA champions for the Cup. In 1917, the year the National Hockey League was founded, the winners of the NHL and PCL met until 1927 when the Cup became the sole property of the NHL.

Because there was no radio at the turn of the century, and interest in Stanley Cup hockey was as great as it is now, fans had various ways of following their favourite teams.

In Toronto, thousands of fans would stay up late at night, especially if the team was playing in the West, and wait to hear blasts from the whistle stop of the Toronto Railway powerhouse. Two blasts told the fans that their team had won, three meant defeat.

In Montreal a platform was built outside a newspaper office and a man with a megaphone would holler out the score to the throng which gathered around.

One of the most unusual challenges ever put forth by a team was the one Dawson City Klondikers made in 1905.

The Klondikers left Dawson City on December 19, 1904, and travelling by dog sled, ship and train, covered the 4,400 miles to Ottawa in 23 days, arriving at their destination January 12, 1905.

As Boyle found out, he wasted his money as far as winning the Cup was concerned. Dawson City lost the first game of the best-of-three series 9-2 and were trampled 23-2 in the second game, in which centre Frank McGee, reported to have sight in only one eye, scored 14 goals, an all-time Cup record. The series was over four days after the courageous crew from Dawson City arrived in Ottawa.

fornia. They also helped edit the texts of the books. Madame Baillargeon and Mills will return California in April to work on the third and fourth volumes of the series and to record the two LP's that will go with them.

The Idyllwild Foundation learned of Helene Baillargeon through her recordings on the Dominion, Folkways and CBC International Service labels.

It was not the first time that her recordings had served as a kind of advance calling card for her. When she attended the International Folk Music Congress in Rumania in 1959, as the Canadian delegate, she was greeted as an old friend by the director of Radio Zagreb (Yugoslavia), who said that the 16 Canadian folk songs she had recorded for CBC were played frequently on his station. When she visited New York recently, one of the "egghead" FM stations called on her for an interview. They, too, knew of her through her records, which they play frequently. The interview was recorded for broadcast later on other FM stations in the U.S.

Radio listeners in the Latin American countries also know Helene Baillargeon through the CBC International Service series of some years ago, Cancions del Canada, in which she was featured with Alan Mills and guitarist Gilbert ("Buck") Lacombe.

Madame Baillargeon is least known to English-speaking Canadians as an actress, but she has taken part in plays on French radio and television in Quebec for many years—and still does when she can find time in the five-day-a-week schedule imposed by Chez Helene.

But English-speaking Canadians—and Americans—may soon get to know Helene Baillargeon as an actress. She has been asked to play the role of a French-Canadian woman in a Walt Disney film to be shot in Banff and Hollywood. The role, if she accepts it, will not be her first in films (she has played in National Film Board produc-

tions), but it will be her first in English.

One of the results of the proposed Disney role would be her introduction to people who are neither very young nor very old. "Most of my English TV fans seem to be one or the other!" says Helene. The situation is not difficult to explain, with Chez Helene scheduled at an hour when almost everyone from six to sixty is working or at school. There are exceptions: One doctor in New Brunswick arranges his lunch hour so that he can watch Chez Helene while he eats, and many mothers claim that they watch the program as enthusiastically as their children, which they report is very enthusiastically.

But no one is more enthusiastic about *Chez Helene* than Helene herself. "I think the method used is a wonderful one," she says. "It's so logical, and I know it works. As a mother, I know that a child of 12 months *understands* what I'm saying even if he doesn't try to *express* himself much until later.

"For men," she says, "Chez Helene is much more than just TV. I love everything about it."

Helene Baillargeon was born in St-Martin, Quebec, and educated at Laval and McGill Universities. She also studied music (piano as well as singing) in Quebec City, Montreal and New York. She is married to a Montreal lawyer and is the mother of three children.

Among the many interesting things Madame Baillargeon did before starting her singing career was to serve for three years as secretary to a Quebec City lawyer called St. Laurent who later became prime minister of Canada.

Herst says the stamp profession is quite small - there are around 6,000 dealers in the States, only 2,000 of them full-time. Most of them are pretty shrewd and know the value of their stock down to the last cent, but sometimes a real bargain can be picked up. Herst tells of the time he chanced to go into a novelty shop that sold stamps, greeting cards, etc., and asked what was being offered in United States stamps. He bought three or four for a modest price. When he got back to his hotel and referred to a catalogue he found that one he had paid \$3 for was worth \$4,500. Back he went and told the dealer it was worth more than \$3, but the dealer said he had paid only \$1 for it and was happy with his profit.

In his CBC Stamp Club interview Herst tells of some unusual stamp moguls he has met, of a famous collection he saw go up in smoke before he could get his hands on it, of a romance between two of his friends which began with stamps, and of a man he knows, serving a life sentence in the U.S. who had a new world open up for him when he became interested in stamps in prison. This man is a regular contributor to a weekly stamp magazine, has designed covers for two others, and plans, if his sentence is commuted, to become a stamp dealer on the outside.

Are You Eating Poisoned Food?

Other doctors disagree. Sir Hennage Ogilvie, well-known English surgeon, believes that coronary disease is due to "simple lack of exercise." Dr. Howard Sprague recently told the Canadian Heart Association that "cholesterol is synthesized in every body tissue except the brain. We cannot draw too many conclusions on aortic fat as a cause of disease."

Not long ago it was discovered that pectin, which makes jelly jell, lowers cholesterol, levels in the blood, and the American Medical Association suggested that people who want to avoid heart disease should eat two ripe apples a day to provide their bodies with enough pectin to fight the formation of excess cholesterol. Perhaps there is more wisdom than we realize in the old saying that an apple a day keeps the doctor away.

Some people feel that one of the biggest threats to the purity of our food is insecticides, which are sprayed in dairy barns, on vegetable fields, orange groves, etc. Many of the marvelous new additives and sprays must be used, agriculturalists believe, to control disease, fungus and blight on our field crops.

"These chemicals," says the Department of Agriculture, "are as essential for efficient production of foods on the farm as tractors, improved varieties and better breeds. They play as great a part in assuring customers a continuing supply of nutritious and appetizing foods as do our modern methods of food processing and marketing. Abandoning their use would result in immediate decline in the quantity and quality of our food supply and cause a rapid rise in food prices."

But each year insects become more resistant, and more and more toxic sprays must be used. How dangerous are they? Farm Forum reports on various experiments made to determine any harmful effects they may have, and the steps the government has taken to control their use and safeguard the consumer.

Dr. Pickett, entomologist with the Department of Agriculture at Kentville, N.S., believes, with numerous other conservationists, that the natural controls of nature can be brought back into play to take care of the insect problem. He has managed to do this with careful and limited use of just a few orchard sprays. Natural predators take care of most pests, he says, and occasional spraying maintains the balance.

At least one American nutritionist, Dr. Frederick J. Stare, director of research at Harvard University, believes that there is really no grave pure food problem.

"A lot of people are running around the country trying to scare us about our food," he says. "To hear them talk, it's a wonder we aren't all dead or at least sick . . . We have the best and finest foods in history—also the safest."

Is he right? Farm Forum will try to find out Monday night.

Travels of a Folk Singer

French folk tunes with an historical significance were the object of a search conducted by noted folksinger Jacques Labreque. They form the background music for "La Survivance," the two-part radio documentary about Louis Joseph Papineau and the rebellion of 1837 on CBC Wednesday Night March 15 and 22

JACQUES LABREQUE was born on a farm near Saint Benoit, Quebec, in 1917, and he went back there at the end of February to poke around for some authentic folk material and songs—circa 1837. This was in connection with two CBC Wednesday Night programs of folk songs he will present as an introduction to Joseph's Schull's two-part radio documentary about Louis Joseph Papineau and the rebellion of 1837. (See story in last week's issue.)

Labreque says there are not many French Canadian folk songs composed for a particular event—the British and Americans lean more towards recording history in song—but he hoped to be able to find a few around Saint Benoit, because it is in the region where some of the 1837 rebels made a memorable stand in a bitter little battle that cost 70 lives and ended the rebellion.

Recently Labreque had a taste of what winter travel must have been like back in 1837, when he spent 17 days zipping along the snowy byways of Quebec in a sleigh drawn by two strapping Percheron horses, stopping to give frequent concerts of folk songs along the way. He says it was a wonderful experience, out in the fresh air all day, and singing his heart out practically all night.

He tells us he got the idea for the trip last year. "I have a friend who writes songs with an authentic Canadian flavour," he says, "and I suggested he write some about the province of Quebec, the Quebec Winter Carnival, and, of course, the girls of Quebec, which he did, and I recorded them on an LP disk. One of the songs gave me an idea for a gimmick to launch the LP on the market. I decided to drive from Montreal to Quebec City in a sleigh, sold my idea to a sponsor, and off I went, arriving on the opening day of the Carnival. It was such fun that I decided to do it again this year, but without a sponsor, so I would have more freedom.

"Sterling Simon of Hudson Heights, Quebec, rents me the horses and drives them for me. This winter we drove south-east from Montreal through Sherbrooke in the Eastern Townships to Richmond, Asbestos Victoriaville, Plessisville, Thetford Mines, and on through the Beauce country. It was really hard wintry weather, 25 below, sometimes, but we enjoyed every bit of it.

"At Levis we crossed the St. Lawrence to Quebec City by Ferry, arriving two days after the Carnival had opened, and found 6,000 people waiting to greet us, including the Premier, M. Lesage—he's not always at the conferences, you know—and the Mayor of Quebec. The whole trip was of great sociological interest to me. It's become something of a tradition, now, so I guess I'll have to do it every year."

Labreque is planning another trip farther afield—to Europe in the fall. For how long he can't say. "The last time I went for three months and stayed seven years."

That was in 1949, when he represented Quebec at the International Folklore Festival in Venice. After that he went to England, where he appeared on BBC radio and TV, at the London Hippodrome, and made two films. He wanted to know more about the country of his ancestors so he went

to France, where, after a single appearance at the Sorbonne he was mobbed by autograph hunters. Then, under the patronage of Canadian Ambassador Jean Desv, and M. Berthoin, French Minister of Education, he toured France for three months, giving 84 concerts and lectures, and later made concert trips to neighbouring countries. In a Pathe album called Canada Sings for You he recorded some ancient Norman folksongs which have largely disappeared from France but are still thriving in Quebec.

After five years in France Labreque returned to Canada to give a series of 53 concerts in Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick for the Jeunesses Musicales du Canada, and two recitals at the Stratford Festival with another Canadian folk singer, Emma Caslor.

In his next trip to Europe he intends to tour England, France, Belgium, Switzerland, and he says "I'd like to go to Moscow if it can be arranged. I'm planning to make more recordings — that's what I'm doing mostly now—under the London label." Up his sleeve are other plans which may include a publicity film to boost Quebec's tourist trade.

MIDWINTER BRUNCH

Broiled Grapefruit:

Half grapefruit. Remove centre. Put ¼ tsp. butter, ¼ tsp. sugar and a dash of bitters into the centre. Place on cookie sheet and broil for 5 minutes.

Sausage Pudding:

Make balls of sausage and saute in oil or butter. Place in baking dish with 3 tbsp. dripping. Make a batter of 3 eggs, 1½ cups milk, ½ tsp. salt, pinch of thyme and 1½ cups flour (pinch of cayenne may be added). Place casserole in hot oven for a few minutes then pour batter over sausages in casserole. Bake in a 375-degree oven for 15 minutes—decrease heat to 350 degrees and bake another 15 minutes.

Sausages:

To 1 lb. lean pork minced, add 1 tsp. salt, ½ tsp. sage, ½ tsp. marjoram, ¼ tsp. ground pepper, ½ tsp. brown sugar, ¼ tsp. thyme, and 1 tbsp. minced parsley. Mix well with hands and form into sausages.

Fried Apples:

Cut 4 red apples—remove core and cut into wedges. (Do not peel). In a skillet, place 3 thsp. butter and ½ cup brown sugar. Blend and add ½ cup water. Add apples and cook slowly turning with a pancake turner until tender and well glazed. A drop of red food colouring may be added.
