EVER WONDER how some writers can continue to produce highlycreative work from year to year without ever seeming to run dry? The answer, according to successful playwright Marian Waldman, is quite simple.

"The more work you do, the more you are stimulated to do," she told us recently when she dropped into our office to give us some details of her new radio serial, *Kapitan's Fortune*. Once you have gained confidence in yourself as a writer, everyday events suggest to you ideas for more plays.

"For example, the basic plot of *Kapitan's Fortune* was suggested to me by the murder, about a year ago, of a second-hand store proprietor in Winnipeg's slums. Not that the plot is based on fact—but a murder similar to the actual one serves to get the plot rolling."

Central figures in the plot are Dave Hunter, a plumber in a midwestern Canadian city, and his wife Beth, played by Cec Montgomery and Corinne Langston. The couple inherit an old run-down house in a neighbourhood that long ago ceased to be stylish. The house is supposed to be unoccupied, but a surprise awaits them when they enter it.

"This locale, in a neighbourhood of mixed population, gives me an opportunity to mix international flavour into the plot," Miss Waldman points out. The flavour evidently is to the liking of many people, as the series, which started April 3, already has won an avid group of listeners.

Marian Waldman has had many successes in her career, which now spans a dozen years. For example, many will remember foully the TV series *Dancing Storybook*, a 13-week serial about a young couple who danced with the Royal Winnipeg Ballet. More recently, she and her husband, Mort Forer, were authors of the TV drama *Have One on Sam*, which received praise from many who saw it on CBWT.

Dozens of her radio plays have been produced on Prairie Playhouse. She was author of the special Christmas show, *Queen of Seasons*, and the hour-long drama on Summer Stage, *A World Transplanted*. Several of her plays have been heard and seen on the school broadcasts and telecasts.

Miss Waldman became a professional actress 14 years ago, with the CBC in Winnipeg. Then she moved to Toronto, where soon she began to write as well as act. First she sold one short drama to the CBC, and then really entered the field with an adaptation of *Huckleberry Finn* for Andrew Allan's Stage '46. That same year she wrote a one-hour family tragedy, *This Man Was My Father*, drawing on her rich knowledge of the Jewish people.

She continued to write for Andrew Allan's productions during 1947 and 1948, until her marriage to Mort Forer brought her back to Winnipeg, where her husband was editor of the Jewish Post. Four years ago Mr. Forer retired, and now both he and his wife are playwrights, with the CBC as their major market.

We asked Miss Waldman what her advice would be for young persons desiring to become playwrights. Her reply: "If you are unable to act, watch and analyze. Soon you will get to know what is required in writing a drama."

Of the contrast between TV and radio drama, she says, "Both have their advantages for the playwright, and both have their limitations. A radio writer, moving to television, has to become able to think 'visually.' And a television writer, moving to radio, must remember that characterization can no longer come from costuming and makeup." A View of the Mentally Retarded

THE CLOAK of ignorance 'surrounding the mentally retarded in Canada is slowly being removed.

Through publicity in newspapers, the work of government departments and the activities of organizations such as provincial and Canadian associations for retarded children, the general public is becoming more aware of the necessity and urgency of helping the mentally retarded.

Based on population and birth rate figures, there is a retarded child born in Canada every 25 minutes. Mental retardation affects about three per cent of the population-an estimated 535,000 of all ages throughout Canada.

A few years ago the attitude of the public in general was different to that of today.

"In fact there wasn't much attitude," says Dr. B. N. McNeel, chief of the mental health branch of the Ontario Department of Health. "These problems were just pushed off to the side and people didn't pay much attention to them.

"But if you go back even before that, I think there was quite an accepting attitude because there was a time when these youngsters were kept in their own communities and people accepted it, to a reasonable degree.

"Back 50 to 75 years ago there was a very small proportion of mentally retarded children who were in institutions. This increase became much more rapid as the years went on because a changing attitude of non-acceptance began to develop."

It wasn't long ago that parents were somewhat afraid to talk about children afflicted with mental retardation; they were afraid the neighbours or "friends" might neighbours or refer to them as the mother and

The Case of the Abominable Snowman

A case that even Perry Mason might find too challenging is to be investigated Sunday, April 9, on the new program "Venture"

WERE SIR EDMUND HILLARY and his Sherpa guide, Tenzing, the first men to reach the top of Mount Everest or were they beaten to the feat by the Abominable Snowman?

For all we know, the Abominable Snowman, if he exists, could well have made the top of Everest his own private playground long before Hillary and Tenzing decided to climb the gigantic mountain.

Even Erle Stanley Gardner would have trouble matching the mystery surrounding The Case of the Abominable Snowman. First of all, is this "man" a human or is he just a big ape; or even part man and part beast? The puzzle has kept men guessing and searching for at least the better part of a century and about the only known fact is that if the creature exists it certainly wouldn't win a beauty contest.

If you want to believe the natives, the creature looks something like a man except that he is often bigger—as tall as eight feet and is covered with hair except for his face and hands. He has been "seen" doing all kinds of primitive things, such as bouncing around on his hind legs, occasionally using all fours; piling stones and pieces of wood into little mounds; sitting on boulders, eating rabbit; and even devouring humans.

There are conflicting reports as to when this creature first made tracks in the snow atop the peaks of the Himalayas. Some sources say reports of the elusive giant were traced as far back as 1427. Others set the time in the late 1800's.

The Sherpas, a mountain people of Tibetan stock who live high in the Himalayas, believe that the creatures, whom they call *yeti*, have been roaming the mountain peaks and sometimes wandering down to lower levels for hundreds of years.

These people honestly believe that the yeti is superhuman and to look upon it means death. That is

why for many years no good description could be obtained.

The Western (or civilized) world first became aware of this monster apparently in 1877 when a British mountaineer, Col. W. A. Waddell, discovered s o m e unidentifiable tracks while he was trudging across a 16,000-foot-high snow field in Sikkim. Waddell described them as the feet of a giant but they were in a place where no one would expect to find a human at all, let alone one walking in bare feet. In 1906, Henry J. Elwes, a botanist and Himalayan explorer, reported that he not only saw the yeti's tracks but also the hairy creature itself, racing over a ridge in the distance.

Fifteen years later Lt. Col. C. K. Howard-Bury, who was leading the first expedition to attempt the climb of Everest, told the world he spotted what appeared to be "an unclothed, hairy but human form walking slowly across a snow field

Publish Shakespeare Talks

SEVEN RADIO TALKS on Shakespeare form the subject matter of the latest book to issue from the CBC's Publications Branch in Toronto. The talks are by David Galloway, M.C., M.A., an associate professor of English at the University of New Brunswick, and were delivered in the CBC's University of the Air series late in 1960.

David Galloway, born in Ayrshire, was educated in Scottish and English schools and at Selwyn College, Cambridge (honours history and English). He served for five years as an officer in the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders during the Second World War, chiefly in the Mediterranean area. He has been a member of the department of English at New Brunswick University since 1948.

Professor Galloway's publications include short stories and articles on Shakespeare and the Elizabethan era, and he has been a frequent broadcaster on CBC. He spent a year at the Shakespeare Institute, Stratford - upon - Avon, with the aid of a fellowship from the Humanities Research Council of Canada.

The collection of talks, entitled simply "Shakespeare," deals with the dramatist and his environment under seven headings: *The Eliza*-

bethan Shakespeare, The Modern Shakespeare, Comedy, History, Tragedy, The Printers and the Text, and The Eternal Shakespeare. The fascinating talk on printing and text gives details of the operation of the Stationers' Register in 16th century London, the "pirating" of play texts and their unauthorized publication in quarto volumes, often extremely bad. The 1600 quarto of Henry V, for example, had only 1,622 lines, compared with 3,300 in the First Folio text edited in 1623 by Shakespeare's acting associates Heminge and Condell.

The enormous labour of textual criticism performed subsequently by Shakespearian editors from Rowe to Furnivall and Dowden and the Cambridge editors, caused largely by these many bad printings, is also discussed. Professor Galloway concludes: "There is still no text of Shakespeare in existence which scholars will wholeheartedly accept, and we are not likely to see a definitive text in our lifetimes. . . . But the work, in all its fascination and drudgery, goes on."

Professor Galloway has interesting observations on the work of the Stratford Shakespearian Festival in Canada. Page Six





father of that "idiot down the street. who should be in an asylum."

Fortunately, the people who looked disdainfully upon retarded children were in the minority and are becoming even more so as the result of the research and publicity programs by various organizations.

The Ontario Department of Health has taken a step toward the education of the public about mental retardation in the form of a film which has received critical acclaim by those who have seen it.

The film, One On Every Street, was produced for the department by Fletcher Film Productions and will be shown on CBC-TV Sunday afternoon, April 9th.

Pierre Berton, in a recent Toronto Star column, said of the film:

"It is frank in two ways: It does not attempt to pretty up the decrepit buildings which caused headlines earlier this year; it frankly acknowledges that they are old and overcrowded. And it does not attempt to pretty up the patients nor hide their faces in the traditional fashion. "The message is implicit from the opening shot to the final frame. The film says simply that we all must face up to the facts about retarded children.

"This is a bold, face-the-facts film and any other kind of propaganda picture (which failed to reveal the facts) would have been shameful, nay, criminal."

The facts about mental retardation are startling. Of all the cripplers of children, retardation exacts the heaviest toll. The incidence of mental retardation is about 10 times that of polio at its height and about 15 times that of blindness, according to figures released by the Canadian Association For Retarded Children.

An estimated 30 out of every 1,000 children are mentally retarded. Of these 30, one will require constant s u p e r v i s i o n throughout life, but four can be taught self-care and 25 can become self supporting provided they receive special education.

Such education is available through various sources such as the the hospital schools operated by the government—there are four of these operated by the Ontario Department of Health plus a new diagnostic clinic which is soon to be opened at Cedar Springs—day schools operated by the retarded children associations and sheltered workshops where the less-handicapped children can earn a modest remuneration.

The film, which concludes with an address by Dr. Matthew B. Dymond, minister of health for Ontario, received its title because the number of retarded people in Canada amounts to "one on every street."

Mental retardation is not just a problem for the parents involved. It is a problem for everybody, because every family is vulnerable. More than half of the multitude of causes seem to have no connection with heredity, especially in the more serious cases. They are due instead to diseases or injuries that occur before, during or after birth because of chance circumstances. Any family can be stricken. Therefore it is everybody's problem. 0

far below." The Sherpa porters with him said this was no ordinary man but "an awesome *yeti* that killed unguarded yaks and even slew unwary herders."

After Howard-Bury told reporters of his experience, Henry Newman of the Calcutta Statesman interviewed the Sherpas, who fully confirmed the sighting. They called the creature a Kang-Mi, which means "thing of the rocky places." Newman apparently mistranslated the dialect term and the result was the term "Abominable Snowman."

As more and more attempts were made to scale the peaks in the Himalayas, reports of seeing the snowman increased and some of the world's most experienced mountaineers, and scientists of unquestionable integrity r e p o r t e d their experiences.

There have been all kinds of theories expressed as to what this creature is—everything from the Himalayan red bear to wild dogs, wolves and even the missing link between the prehistoric ape and man. Photographs of the snowman's tracks have been taken and a scalp, supposed to be that of a *yeti*, has been examined by leading scientists and anthropologists (who say the scalp is a fake).

Some scientists doubt that accurate accounts of *yeti* discoveries can be made because at great altitudes where there is a lack of oxygen humans get light-headed, the blanket of snow and intense sun are blinding and a drink of alcoholic liquor (if anyone dares take one) has very immediate and powerful effects.

Hillary recently offered an explanation for the large footprints of the *yeti's* track, which resemble those of a human with an oversized big toe. He theorized that footprints in the snow tend to expand in size when under the sun's rays for a period of time.

He followed a set of the strange tracks and when moving into a shaded portion of snow, the tracks

ceased to exist. In their place were the small footprints of a fox or wild dog, bunched close together as the animal bounded over the snow. When these small tracks were under the sun, the warmth melted them out, ran them together, completely altered their contours and made "as fine a yeti track as one could wish."

But even Hillary's explanation self-admittedly leaves many questions unanswered and the search for the Abominable Snowman goes on. No one knows yet whether this creature will be found or whether it's all a myth, a legendary monster evolved through the superstitions of the natives who dwell in the mountains.

Some of the experts who have gone on expeditions in search of proof which will either confirm or destroy the story of the Abominable Snowman will be heard this Sunday when CBC radio's Venture presents an hour-long BBC transcription on the subject. Entitled *The Abominable Snowman*, the program will be heard on CBC Trans-Canada.

Appearing on the program are Prince Peter of Greece, Sir John Hunt, Ella Maillart, Odette Tchernine, Professor C. von Furer-Haimendorf, Dr. W. C. Osman Hill, Ralph Izzard, Eric Shipton, and C. R. Stoner. Gerald Durrell introduces and moderates the program, produced by Terence Tiller.



Vegetarianism Again

• Re "Why I'm a Vegetarian," by Wm. Stratford:

... It does not seem practical for me, Mr. Stratford, to become a disciple of yours, but you have touched me to the extent that next time a mouse-that "wee beastie" which I've always had a soft spot for-strays into my pantry, instead of killing it, I'll send it to the sanctuary of your home. House flies (too) Mr. Stratford must strain your conviction that it is wrong to destroy life. Have you discovered how to live with them?

You use eggs and milk in your diet, I notice. As a practical farmer, I have a special interest in this matter. A hen has a profitable laying life of two or three years, but they continue to live for years after that. Shall we have homes for aged hens? . . . (Also) cows don't always give birth to heifers, you know, and bull calves don't give milk. If we let every bull calf live until it dies of old age, farm women would never dare to leave the house. (My wife is scared to death of my one herd bull, though he is a peaceful old boy, and also a vegetarian.)

It would be expensive to raise sheep just for their wool. Please forgive me, Mr. Stratford, but it seems that your thinking is very woolly in spots.

. . . I'll take your word for it that we have 30 feet of intestine. After all, we should agree on something, although I have not measured mine yet. But you may be surprised to hear that it is still going strong after 77 years of service. -J.W.G., Bashaw, Alta.

University of the Air

A TRIP TO OUTER SPACE

FIRST, MAN SHRANK the world down to size with ships, trains and planes that could take him everywhere, and then with radio and television that could bring just about everywhere to him. Now he is developing powerful new equipment for probing the wonders of the fascinating universe of space. Almost every week newspapers report some development or discovery in the field of astronomy that adds to our knowledge of the heavens.

In the last couple of years, in addition to such exciting discoveries as what the other side of the moon looks like, and the fact that there is water vapour on Venus (the planet most like the earth in size, mass and orbit, and the third brightest object in the sky), another surprise was reported. Astronomers in Britain and California stirred up controversy by publishing papers indicating that the Milky Way galaxy, of which the sun and earth are a part, is possibly much older than was thought, which would throw many scientific calculations out of kilter.

These new discoveries and theories are all the more thrilling to the layman when he has more than just an aesthetic appreciation of the twinkling sky on a clear night. To provide radio listeners with a background of g e n e r a l information about astronomy and help them understand the significance of each new step in our growing knowledge of the heavens, the CBC's University of the Air will present a series of eight lectures on This Universe of Space. They will be heard Monday nights beginning this week. Each program will be repeated two weeks later on Tuesday morning. The program organizer for the series is Lewis Miller, and production will be by Ed Reid.

The speaker will be a distinguished Canadian astronomer, Dr. Peter Millman of Ottawa. Presented in not-too-scientific language the average listener should have no difficulty in understanding, the lectures will cover the significance of new radio telescopes, imaginary visits to the better-known planets, meteors, the sun, stars of all sizes, dusts and gases of space, galaxies, and the history and prospects of the whole universe we live in.

In a newspaper article two years ago Dr. Millman said that the biggest thrill for him since he began studying astronomy as a boy was seeing a picture of the other side of the moon for the first time. "It is as if you had lived in a house for 30 years where one room was locked and could never be entered or even looked into," he said. "The presence of thousands of other unseen rooms in the city does not diminish one bit the unique excitement when at last you are handed a key to the locked room and told: 'Now you can look!'"

For many listeners to this series it will be a first guided tour of the universe, and Dr. Millman will make it a fascinating one. It is a subject that has absorbed his interest for well over 40 years.

Born in Toronto in 1906 he grew up in Japan, where he graduated from high school. He studied astronomy and physics at the Uni-

versity of Toronto, and after graduating in 1929 went to Harvard for further study in astronomy. He obtained his Master's degree there and then his Doctorate in Philosophy in 1932.

He has worked at three of Canada's large research observatories: the Dominion Astrophysical Observatory in Victoria, B.C., the David Dunlap Observatory at Richmond Hill, just north of Toronto, and the Dominion Observatory in Ottawa. Now he is head of upper atmosphere research at the National Research Council in Ottawa. He is national president of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada, belongs to several national and international scientific societies, is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada, and a research associate of the Harvard College Observatory.

During the Second World War he served in the RCAF, first as a navigation instructor and later in operational research. One of his last service duties was planning the research reporting procedures on winter exercise Musk Ox in 1946.

Through his career Dr. Millman has taken an active interest in acquainting the public with the facts and philosophy of science. He has lectured extensively, and back in 1929 began writing a weekly newspaper column about facts and mysteries of the heavenly bodies. For the past 10 years he has written an astronomy column for the Toronto *Telegram*. In addition to these and other popular articles he has published more than 100 papers on scientific subjects.

Chiefly, his research has been in the field of meteors and spectra.

Frequently he presents the results of his research in lectures to learned societies on this continent and abroad.

We asked Dr. Millman what he thought the biggest news in astronomy would likely be this year. "As far as I can guess," he told us, "one of the most interesting things probably will be the use of even bigger radio telescopes and the knowledge we will gain, through their use, of the most distant parts of our universe. There's a limit to what we can now see—in round figures it's about 6,000 million light years away.

"The other area in which I think there will be a large advance in knowledge this year is through the use of astronomical telescopes and instruments mounted on artificial satellites and operated by remote control. These will enable us to make observations in the ultraviolet region of the spectrum and x-ray wave lengths, types of light which are absorbed by the earth's atmosphere and don't reach the surface of the earth. They cannot be studied when the instruments are mounted in observatories on earth."

Dr. Millman went on to say that "a further extension of this will be the ability of space probes to carry astronomical equipment close to the moon and planets. The first and outstanding example of this technique was the flight of a Russian space ship to the moon and the photographing of the far side of the moon. This technique will be developed further, but of course the most significant developments in the close-up phase will be a little longer in coming."

ONE OF THE OLDEST arts, in the world is storytelling—and one of the most entertaining. When a good yarn finds new dimensions through the voice of a competent narrator, it has special appeal, as listener response to the CBC's many series of short story readings on radio has shown over the years.

Last year the CBC invited a few well-known Canadian writers to submit new work for a series of short story readings on CBC Wednesday Night. They responded eagerly and some interesting and strikingly individual stories were turned in. They were read by professional actors and actresses on various Wednesday Nights last year.

The stories were of such high quality that McClelland and Stewart Limited of Toronto agreed to publish a collection of 10 of them this spring, under the title of *Ten* for Wednesday Night, with an introduction by Robert Weaver of the CBC, who edited CBC radio short stories. Six of the ten stories are being presented again on CBC Wednesday Night this spring.

Ethel Wilson's From Flores was to be heard on April 5. Miss Wilson is a Vancouver writer who won international acclaim a few years ago for two short novels published under the title of *The Equations of Love*. Her other published books include *Betty Dorval*, *The Innocent Traveller*, and *Swamp Angel*. The CBC has broadcast several of her short stories, and some have been published in English and Canadian magazines.

Morley Callaghan's The Doctor's Son will be read this Wednesday, April 12. Callaghan is a law school graduate who has had a 30-year career as a novelist, short story (Please turn to page 31)





writer, newspaper reporter, dramatist and radio and TV personality. His novels include Such Is My Beloved, More Joy in Heaven, The Loved and the Lost and The Many-Coloured Coat (which won a Maclean's fiction award). Recently the Macmillan Company of Canada published a collection of his short stories under the title of Morley Callaghan's Stories.

Alice Munro, whose A Trip to the Coast will be read April 19, sold a story to the CBC in her student days at the University of Western Ontario, the first of many to be broadcast on CBC radio. Several of her short stories have been published in Canada and now she is working on a first novel. She lives in West Vancouver with her husband and family.

W. O. Mitchell's Patterns, scheduled for reading on May 3, is another of his well-loved tales centered in the imaginary Saskatchewan town of Crocus, which also figured largely in his drama series Jake and the Kid, a popular feature on CBC radio for years. Mitchell taught school until his first novel, Who Has Seen the Wind?, was in print and his second novel won the Maclean's fiction award several years ago. For some time he was fiction editor of Maclean's. Several magazines in Canada and abroad have published his short stories. Most of his writing has a mid-western, small-town flavour. He lives in High River, Alberta.

On May 31 Mordecai Richler's The Summer My Grandmother Was Supposed to Die will be read. Like many of his stories, this one is set in Montreal. Richler is one of the busiest and also one of the most

controversial of the younger Canadian writers. He has written four novels - The Acrobats, Son of a Smaller Hero, A Choice of Enemies, and The Apprenticeship of Duddy Kravitz; short stories that have been read on CBC radio and published in Magazines here and abroad; magazine articles, and radio and TV dramas. He returned to Canada recently after having lived abroad for some years in Spain, Paris and London.

One of the most colourful writers represented in the series is Hugh Garner, whose Hunky will be read June 28. During the Depression, Garner rode the rods, later served with the International Brigade in the Spanish Civil War, and in the Royal Canadian Navy in the Second World War. His novels have included Storm Below and Cabbagetown (he's working on another on a Canada Council fellowship). 

bowling hour) and Abat de Rigueur (also on bowling) telecast each week on CBWFT. L'Heure des quilles which will end with the June 25th program, is a province-wide (Quebec) competition involving the 35 best players who had been selected at the end of September 1960 from a roster of 240. These compete according to a preset schedule permitting the elimination of all but the top two who will then be featured in a special final on the last program.

L'Heure des Quilles is seen every Sunday at 4:00 p.m. on Channel 6.

Abat de rigueur seen Friday evenings at 10:45 p.m., is a special champion's competition, in which players are awarded a grand prize of \$200 if they manage to make five consecutive strikes. The player with the most points is called upon to return the following week. Although the \$200 prize is not always won, nobody goes home unhappy since even the losers take home \$25. If more than one player gets his five consecutive strikes, the money is divided equally between them.

The Days of Whisky Gap

The days of Canada's Wild West were short in duration, thanks to the watchful and efficient scattet-tunicked mounted policemen who rode west from Toronto in 1874. But the lawless era of our history which gave rise to such picturesque names as "Fort Whoop-Up" and "Whisky Gap," although spanning only a few years, still lives in the memory of a few hardy pioneers. These old-timers will be interviewed on a program April 19, another in the Exploration series.

REMINISCENCES of the early Canadian west and exploits of the North West Mounted Police will be featured by CBC-TV's Explorations on Wednesday, April 19, in a half-hour National Film Board production entitled "The Days of Whisky Gap."

Settlement of the Canadian west was achieved with a high degree of law and order in comparison to the wild west era south of the border. Legends accentuate the difference. In Canada, storied legends



Over on the American side, on warm afternoons in Montana, old John Bannaman and his cronies still get together . . . and they talk of the days when a man had to be quick on the draw, And when they remember the old days, they think with ungrudging admiration of their counterparts in scarlet tunics, who brought law and order to the Canadian west. It was a Montana newspaper (The Fort Benton Record) which said, "The Mounted

Police don't scare worth a cent."

speak of brave lawmen in scarlet tunics; in the United States, deeds of outlaws highlight stories of the pioneer west.

Much fact and some fiction surrounds the epic stories of the Mounties who made the famous trek from Toronto to the west in 1874. Two hundred and fifty men travelled 800 miles, bringing the Queen's law to the western plains where whisky traders and horse thieves were the cause of much trouble between the Indians and the first white settlers.

Forts built by the Mounties still dot the western plains, and so do most of the colourful names given some settlements. "Whoop-up" is

Place a pan in hot oven and add a chunk of butter. Let heat until about to turn brown. Place fillets of fish and turn over (to butter on both sides). Sprinkle with salt, pepper, thyme and minced onion. Poach about 15 minutes. Remove onion and place on heat proof platter. Put under broiler to brown after brushing with oil. Sprinkle with parsley. When fish is poached, the oven should be at 350 degrees.

SCALLOPED POTATOES

6 medium potatoes 6 tbsp. flour 2-3 cups skim milk 1 large onion (thinly sliced) Salt and pepper

Peel potatoes and slice. Alternate a layer of potatoes, onion, salt, pepper and 2 tbsp. flour until ingredients are used up. Pour over heated skim milk to cover. Dot with butter and bake at 275 degrees for 2½ hours or until top is nicely browned. Remove from oven and let stand for about ½ hour before serving.

TARTAR SAUCE

¹/₂ cup mayonnaise ¹/₄ tsp. tarragon 1 thsp. chopped capers 1 thsp. chopped olives 1 thsp. green cucumber relish ¹/₄ tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Mix all ingredients and serve with broiled fish.
