

# **SIMONE SIGNORET**

# - Love is for the Middle-Aged

ROMANTIC LOVE, popular myth will lead us to believe, is for the young. But Frenchmen and other Continentals have long insisted a woman doesn't begin to be really interesting until she is 40. And over here an older Frenchwoman who scorns make-believe and looks and acts her age, manages to be more alluring in an old coat than a brace of cute starlets clutching towels.

"I know I have not got a chance of looking pretty," says Simone Signoret. But she radiates a warmth and subtly sensual tenderness that can make pretty stars half her age look gauche and vapid. You think of most screen sirens as attractive actresses, says a movie critic who enjoyed her starring role in *Room at the Top*, but you think of Signoret as a woman.

On Sunday, April 16th, Simone Signoret will be seen on CBC-TV's Face to Face in an interview with John Freeman, filmed by the BBC.

When you meet Miss Signoret, say those who have, the first thing that strikes you is that she is so much smaller (a fraction over five feet) and slighter than she appears on the screen. Although she isn't willowy she gives the appearance of delicacy. She is a self-contained, perceptive person, highly intelligent, who makes no bones about her age.

"It's tiring for a woman to look young all the time," she says. "I'm not and never will be a star. A star has to work every single hour of the day. It's too much. I'm too fat, and I'm too lazy to lose weight. I would rather be an actress than a star. I know one big European star who spends 24 hours a day tending to her face, body and bank account. . . . What kind of a life is that for a woman?"

She says she never wears makeup except for eye shadow. "You see, I am always touching my face with my hands. When I would wear makeup I would be smudged all over in five minutes, One day my husband washed my face with soap. He ordered: 'No more paint.' I obey. . . . You see, it isn't good for an older woman to wear much makeup. It causes the lines in her face to show up more."

She was greatly surprised, she says, at the public reaction to her performance in Room at the Top, and the amount of fan mail she received. "It was largely from middle-aged people. . . . I think they were - how shall I say grateful to me for simply being mature, for being honest. . . . In all the ads, in all the stores, it is always the young who love. Youth and romance, youth and romance. If you buy this cream or wear this hat or use this soap you will stay young and men will want to marry you and you'll be happy. . . . I have noticed this about your (North American) women: They wish to be friends with men and to be worshipped, too. They wish to be respected and protected. I think this is impossible."

Of the part she played in *Room* at the Top — a lonely woman in her late thirties, unglamorous, not especially attractive, but generous, without self-delusion, and engaged in a last affair—she says:

"It was a good role. But it is dangerous to be so identified in people's minds with such a role. I have called it a poison of love and by that I mean I mustn't forget it is not really for me, all this love, but for the character I played. Women liked that role especially. I knew this from the mail. Of course men did, too, because they like the frankness of her. But the women knew I wasn't trying to look young or glamorous. I was just myself, a 39-year-old woman. To women who are not young or not pretty any more - or who never were pretty — the role reassured them that their lives can still be a love story."

She says she does not want to play younger roles. "From age 28 to 35 an actress has not such a good choice of roles, Too many actresses stay too long in young roles, which is not good. So I make the jump. I bypass the 28 to 35 group and play women in their late 30's. I think it is more clever to make the jump early."

She was born Simone-Henriette-Charlotte Kaminker in Germany, where her father was an officer with the French army of occupation. He had trained as a lawyer but never practised. When the Second World War started he left his wife, daughter and two small sons in Paris and went to join General Charles de Gaulle in London. Later he became chief of U.N. interpreters.

From her mother, who is pure French, she inherited her stage name, her social conscience and her tendency to get involved in causes. She discusses this in her TV interview, and how it has sometimes been misinterpreted.

When she was 19 Miss Signoret began to support her family by giving lessons in English and Latin, and typing for a newspaper called Le Nouveau Temps. In the evenings she used to toss on a coat made from an old English blanket and dash round to the Caffé de Floré in St. Germain de Près, to share hopes and conversation with a group of impoverished young people who were terribly serious about being actors. Soon she wanted to be one, too.

"The Floré was our club," she recalls. "No Germans, no cops came near it, because there were no prostitutes, no black-market alcohol, no music, only coffee with saccharin and talk, talk, talk. I met most of the people of my life, then. The war made us better. People truly loved each other and shared—all classes, all political parties—because of the common enemy."

It was these new friends who urged her to leave her job on Le (Please turn to page 35)

WHEN SONG ALBUM presents a recital of Naylor's "Songs of Regret" Monday, April 17, on CBC Radio, the program will be something in the way of a tribute to an English composer whose name has been linked

with development of Winnipeg's musical arts for three decades.

Bernard Naylor, a member of the noted English family of musicians (his father and grandfather both were organists and composers) first came to Winnipeg in 1932, founding the Philharmonic and Male Voice Choirs. In 1934 he reconstituted the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, and was its conductor until returning to England in 1936 to become organist and director of music at Queen's College, Oxford. Back in Canada in 1942, he founded the Little Symphonies Orchestra in Montreal, conducting it until 1947. Then it was back to England, to become Lecturer in Music at Reading University.

Married to a Canadian (his wife is the daughter of Senator Crerar), Mr. Naylor has once again made Winnipeg his home for the past two years, although he still spends extended periods in England.

"Songs of Regret" are settings for low voice and piano of three poems by Mary Webb, an English writer chiefly known for her novel Precious Bane. In 1947, Bernard Naylor wrote about a dozen songs to Mary Webb's poems, including a set of five for high voice, and the three to be performed on Song Album.

# The Great Days of Rome

SHE NESTLES BESIDE the Tiber the warm, graceful charmer people in a history-drenched collection of stone, brick, tile and stucco in sunsoftened shades from terra cotta to beige . . . Rome, the Eternal City,

have been falling in love with for centuries. And a lady of intellect. She has a longer record of continuous political and religious impor-

tance than any other city. But the urgency of the 20th century leaves her spirit unruffled.

"It's 1961!" scream the scooters tearing through the Borghese Gardens, along the via Vittorio and off to the bikini-dotted lido. what?" answer the columns in the Forum, mulling over their memories among the cats in the shadow of the great white Victor Emmanuel monument.

And from the sidewalk cafés elegant Romans enjoying a leisurely apéritif turn amused eyes on the scurrying tourists. Rome-big but still cozy, enjoying the best of two worlds, where relics of ancient grandeur rub elbows with starkly modern architecture in a medley of time that is somehow not incongruous.

What can we learn about the personality of the ancient Roman civilization from the pieces of its art and architecture we inherited from it? Open House will help us find out on CBC-TV. Starting this Friday it takes us to Rome in three BBC documentary films with a distinguished British archaeologist, Sir Mortimer Wheeler, as guide. The Grandeur That Was Rome will be seen April 21, 28, and May 5.

Sir Mortimer Wheeler was professor of the archaeology of the Roman provinces at the University of London from 1948-55. He was director of the University of London Institute of Archaeology in 1943-44, led government missions to Iran and Afghanistan in 1945-46, and was adviser in archaeological matters to the government of Pakistan from 1948-50, He leaves this week to be one of several lecturers on an Hellenic cruise around the Mediterranean, with visits to antiquities in Greece, the Greek Islands, Lebanon and Turkey. Sir Mortimer is secretary of the British Academy and the author of several books and papers on European and Indian archaeological subjects.

# LAMPOONER OF THE LOFTY

Few stodgy areas of life have escaped the incisive pen of Sidney Joseph Perelman, whose business for the past 35 years has been garbling the traditional thought processes with well-turned phrases of wit and satire. Creator of the laughs in such movies as Around The World in 80 Days, he will unveil more of his witticisms Tuesday on Q for Quest

FOR ABOUT 35 years the irreverent pen of S. J. Perelman has been assaulting the follies of mass media with hilarious results which are intended, he says, to warm the cockles of the hardest heart.

But he is more than a purveyer of rapid-fire yuks and slow chortles at the expense of fashion magazines, Hollywood, politics, restaurants, foot-doctors, floor-walkers, dentists, etc. His funny writing has a definite point of view, and he digs it out of a seemingly bottomless vocabulary well that is full of surprises.

To observe our inanities at close hand in several languages and social levels, and gather inspiration for his parodies, Perelman travels all over the place, disguised, he says, as a weary but game bon vivant, and then with what Dorothy Parker describes as a "disciplined mind and a wild eye," knocks over smug people and things with a pen as weighty as it is witty.

Lunatic as some of his material seems at first glance, it is often embarrassingly close to the truth. Who but Perelman would think of saying that reading a well-known movie gossip column is like sliding into a tub of lukewarm oatmeal?

Perelman's latest travels have brought him to Toronto to videotape a show for *Q for Quest. One Man's Peril* or *Everyman's Perelman*, to be seen Tuesday night on CBC-TV, offers a combination of Perelman talking to host Andrew Allan about himself and other funny things, and a dramatization of an hilarious Perelman piece that appeared recently in the *New Yorker: Portrait of the Artist as a Young Mime*, in which actor Drew Thompson will be featured.

The author of A Pox on You, Mine Goodly Host, Caution - Soft Prose Ahead, and Don't Bring Me Oscars (When It's Shoesies That I Need), etc., was born Sidney Joseph Perelman in Brooklyn on February 1, 1904. At Brown University, Providence, Rhode Island, he became a close friend of future writer Nathaniel West, and later married his sister Laura. When he left Brown he was already known as a satirist, and he lost no time in making it pay. In an introduction to Perelman's book Strictly From Hunger, his friend, humourist Robert Benchley, described Perelman's arrival on the literary scene this way:

"Together with several others of my ilk, I was making a decent living writing fugitive pieces for the magazines, pieces which, while not pretentious, we fondly imagined could be turned into thirty dollars here or forty there. It was a perfectly good racket, at any rate, and several psychiatrists were good enough to refer to it as 'free association' or Dope's Disease. Then, from the Baptist precincts of Brown University, wafted a cloud no bigger than a man's hams, who was S. J. Perelman. From then on, it was just a matter of time before Perelman took over the dementia praecox field and drove us all to writing articles on economics for the Commentator. Any further attempts to garble thought processes sounded like imitation-Perelman."

For a while Perelman was an artist-writer for Judge and College Humour. Then he began his long movie career, and in the early 1930's ground out gags for the Marx Brothers films. Off and on ever since he has helped to make funny films funnier, and satires sharper. His latest film work was for Around the World in 80 Days, which won him both an Academy Award and a New York Film Critics Award.





able to follow humour," he says. "There's far too much preparation of audiences. It applies in the theatre, too. There's far top much underrating of the audience. When I wrote for the Marx Brothers, Groucho always was concerned about the Barber in Peru, Indiana, whom he saw as the person he was trying to reach with his jokes. I think in his pictures he inhibited a great deal of his own humour by undue concern."

When people suggest occasionally that Perelman's wit is over the heads of the average Joe, he bristles. "I sometimes get letters from readers who tell me they had to look up some of my words in the dictionary," he says. "I think that's fine. I've had to look them up, too. If they get self-improvement with their laughter, that's good—it's a kind of lagniappe."

Perelman pieces always give fair warning in the first sentence or two that a familiar road is under reconstruction ahead, and the detour is going to be fun. A couple of samples from The Most of Perelman: "I am 38 years old, have curly brown hair and blue eyes, own a uke and a yellow roadster, and am considered a snappy dresser in my crowd. But the thing I want most of all for my birthday is a free subscription to Oral Hygiene." . . . "I guess I'm just an old mad scientist at bottom. Give me an underground laboratory, half-adozen atom smashers, and a beautiful blonde in a diaphanous veil waiting to be turned into a chimpanzee and I care not who writes the nation's laws."

What he calls his "sportive essays" and 'bits of embroidery" are as impeccable as a Bond Street model, but they sound as spontaneous as though he had tossed them off on the back of an envelope while waiting for a bus. His choice of just the right word—also the least expected—is not accidental. He takes great pains with his sentence-tailoring, and says "it's a pretty good day when I get a page done."



# CBWT-Wanted Dead or Alive

Josh Randall, asked by a ten-yearold girl to find her father, supposedly long dead, sets out on a mission of mercy. of the orchestra of a specially commissioned work by Paul Ruhland of Vancouver.

Ruhland, a 31-year-old native of Austria, is currently a string bass player with the Vancouver Chamber Orchestra and also plays in Vancouver jazz combos. He studied at the Viennese Conservatory of Music. The rest of the combo for the concert is made up of Toronto musicians—P. J. Perry, alto sax; Frank Wright, vibes; Archie Alleyne, drums; Bill Britto, string bass; Ed Bickert, guitar.

A 24-piece orchestra, under the direction of Mario Bernardi, will perform three works: Concerto Grosso, Opus 6, No. 9, by Corelli; Concerto Grosso, 1st movement, by Ernst Bloch, featuring Bernardi at the piano; and Brandenburg Concerto No. 2, by J. S. Bach. In this selection, Melvyn Broiles, first trumpeter of the Metropolitan Opera, will be soloist.

The Youth Choir, conducted by Elmer Iseler, will sing The Little Cantata, by Buxtehude, and a special arrangement of nursery rhymes, both unaccompanied and accompanied with a piano.

Aida on CBC Wednesday Night

# Reluctantly - Composed Masterpiece

It was "quite a job" persuading Giuseppi Verdi to compose Aida, one of the world's most popular operas. CBC Wednesday Night presents a special performance of it April 19

"NO!" SAID Giuseppi Verdi emphatically to an agent of the Khedive of Egypt. Verdi was 58, and he was tired. Still riding high on the crest of the success of *Don Carlo*, he had just thrown himself into writing and directing a revised version of his *La Forza del Destino*. He was not in the mood to begin writing another opera, and he did not need the money.

But the Khedive had plans, and he was a determined man. A new opera house in Cairo was opening soon, and, more important to the

rest of the world, so was the Suez Canal. To celebrate these two events, he could think of nothing better than the performance of a new opera commissioned for the occasion from one of the three leading operatic composers of the day: Gounod, Wagner, or Verdi.

We don't know whether he ever got as far as approaching Gounod and Wagner. But he did, through a representative, try twice to interest Verdi in accepting the commission. The sum of money he offered was extremely tantalizing, even to someone as affluent as Verdi. But the composer turned it down both times. Then, on the Khedive's behalf, Verdi's French friend and librettist, Camille Du Locle, made the fortunate move of handing the composer a fourpage summary of the suggested plot.

It told the colourful, moving story of a princess, her slave-girl, and the commander of the Egyptian armies whom they both loved. It included every essential for spellbinding theatre: mistaken identity, the conflict between love and duty, the jealousy of the scorned princess, the illicit love of captain for slave, and the condemnation of that love by priest and king. Verdi was so intrigued by the emotional possibilities of the story that he accepted, got down to work at once, and wrote Aida, which has become one of the most popular operas in the world, a cannily-built and cumulative drama in which action is always on the hop, emphasized by glowingly beautiful, descriptive music. Even people who have never seen or heard an opera in full are familiar with the opening tenor aria, Celeste Aida, and the resounding rhythm of the great triumphal procession.

Aida was premiered in Cairo on Christmas Eve, 1871, with great success. The opening night had been delayed because the Franco-Prussian war had held up the costumes in Paris. But the exultant Khedive, the audience and Verdi all felt it was worth the delay. Next came the Italian debut at La Scala, after long, careful preparation under Verdi's direction. Most operatic composers would have been thrilled with its spectacular success. Verdi took 32 curtain calls: the audience went wild. But he left Milan deeply depressed. In middle age he had dared to change his style, to write something more dramatic, dignified and spectacular, more musically developed and refined than anything he had done before. For him it was a period not only of fulfilment but of deep self-examination. He was anguished that no one seemed to have seen beyond the surface excitement over the opera to the more subtle triumph of his art. The tributes of critics and friends seemed shallow to him. "Stupid criticisms and eulogies stupider still: not one elevated or artistic idea; not one person who grasped my intentions . . . Not one who said to me: 'Thanks, dog'."

There was, and still is, a lot of mystery about the original author

# Are Canada's Railways Outmoded?

Despite the present struggle of our railways to compete, officials feel optimistic about the future. A special radio program Sunday, April 16, will examine the road ahead

THE MONOPOLY railroads once held on Canadian transportation has been broken by modern technology. Yet railway men insist that their future, though changed in pattern, may be bright.

For most of the first half of the century, travel by train was considered to be the most inexpensive and convenient method. Now, however, much of the passenger travel in Canada is by private automobiles; in fact, research by transportation experts shows that 75 per cent of all trips of 100 miles or more are made in motor cars.

The other 25 per cent of the "passenger market" is being sought by rail, bus and air services. In this group, railroads are losing money as more people turn to air travel. The airlines are able to turn operational methods into lower overhead, thereby decreasing the cost of fares.

A few years ago the cost of flying was a luxury few could afford. Train fare was the cheaper of the two by a good margin. Now, however, it is actually cheaper in some cases for a businessman to use the airlines.

According to public relations branches of the airlines and railways, the average businessman uses first class when going by train and the economy class when flying, thereby making the difference even less.

Despite the use of motor cars and the trend towards flying long distances, however, railroad research men think that travel by train will become the cheapest and best method in medium and short distance travel.

According to Dr. O. M. Solandt, vice-president of the Canadian National Railways, the railways will attempt to obtain a larger share of the travel market in the high density intercity routes, particularly

for overnight and shorter day travel. He also foresees a "spectacular growth of urban and suburban commuter services by rail.

"These will have to be subsidized and probably most of them will be run by local transport authorities rather than by the railroads," says Dr. Solandt.

Since the railroads are losing money in passenger service, they have to depend upon freight traffic to make up for the deficit. And it's the freight which makes the money for the railroads.

But even here, the railroads are faced with high costs and intense competition from ships (during the summer months), trucks and airlines, which have entered the freight transportation field on a significant scale.

On top of this, the transportation market has not been growing in recent years. The total intercity transportation demand in Canada exceeded 140 billion ton miles in 1956. It was well below this level in 1957 and 1958, the last figures available. Nor are the 1959 and 1960 figures likely to show an increase.

The distribution of intercity ton miles between the various carriers has been slowly changing. Since 1938, the railways' share of the intercity freight transportation market reached a peak of 76.7 per

role of the Virgin Mary in a Good Friday procession. Convinced that the girl was responsible for a miracle, the simple villagers lavish praises upon her. The merchant, however, reveals her true identity as a call-girl and this modern Magdalene is stoned by the mob.

#### The Eichmann Trial

Adolf Eichmann, who masterminded the attempted Jewish genocide while serving with the Nazi army during World War II, will be the object of a special one-hour documentary on PREMIER PLAN, Monday, April 17th at 9:30 p.m.

Eichmann selected his victims, some 6,000,000 Jews, from 22 European countries and subjected them in prisons to torture, gas fumes and the firing squad. His trial is held in Israel, by the very same people he was determined to exterminate. The outcome will be particularly significant, whatever it is, and for that reason, host Gérard Pelletier will have as his guest a prominent journalisthistorian, Didier Lazard, who was a witness at the Nuremberg trial of German War criminals. The program will also present a special documentary by Alain Resnais titled "Nuit et brouillard" (Night and Fog) on scenes taken at the concentration camps at Belsen, Ravensbruck, Dachau and Auschwitz.

of the Aida story, some people even implying that the Khedive himself had written it. But the draft that reached Verdi through Du Locle was prepared by the noted French Egyptologist, Auguste Mariette. After reading it Verdi wrote to Du Locle: "It is well done: it has a splendid mise en scene and there are two or three situations which, if not absolutely new, are certainly very beautiful. But who did it? An expert hand (has been involved) in it, the hand of someone who knows the theatre very well."

Where Mariette got the idea nobody knows for sure. Certainly he did not know the theatre very well. A few modern authorities think the plot was based on an incident from ancient Egyptian history.

Sir Malcolm Sargent's choral version of Aida in English will be presented this week on CBC Wednesday Night by the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir and Toronto Symphony Orchestra, directed by their permanent conductor, Walter Susskind, with five distinguished solo-

The title role will be sung by American soprano Gloria Davy, whose Metropolitan Opera debut in the same role was a recent triumph. She has sung it, too, at La Scala and is a popular performer in other European and American opera centres.

Baritone Chester Ludgin of the New York City Opera, whose recordings with the Vienna Philharmonic are well known, will be heard as Amonasro. As Amneris: mezzo-soprano Frances Bible, known for her fine performances with the New York City and San Francisco Opera Companies and at England's Glyndebourne Festival. Tenor Charles O'Neill, who won the Metropolitan Opera Auditions of the Air in 1957, will sing the role of Radames, in which he made his Met. debut. And bass Jan Rubes, who is heard Monday nights on CBC Radio in Songs of My People, will be heard as the King of Egypt.

# ARE CANADA'S RAILWAYS OUTMODED?

(Continued from page 21)

cent in 1944. At that time, road transport carried 3.1 per cent of intercity ton miles, water 20.2 per cent and pipelines a negligible quantity.

By 1958, the last date for which complete figures are available, the railways' share of the transportation market had dropped to 52.3 per cent, road was up to 11.1 per cent and oil pipelines to 13.4 per cent. Water transportation's share has for the last 10 years remained relatively constant at 23 to 26 per cent of the total market.

Another problem, and a major one, for railways is that of workers being put out of work by increasing mechanization. This is a particularly touchy area when the companies and unions sit down at contract time.

Despite all these seemingly dark clouds, railway men aren't taking a pessimistic view of the future. They are carrying out giant research programs and are hopeful that the future, although probably changed in pattern, will be bright for rail-

What is being done? What will the railways be like 10, 20 or 30.

years from now? These questions will be examined Sunday April 16th when the CBC Trans-Canada Radio Network presents a special hour-long program entitled Whither the Railways?

The program was prepared by CBC's outside broadcasts department. Produced and narrated by Robert Brazil of Montreal, the broadcast will contain interviews with leading railroad executives and with representatives of the trucking and airline industries.

Union leaders will also give their views on railroad problems, including the one of workers and auto-

# Simone Signoret: Love is for the Middle-Aged

Nouveau Temps. Although it provided her only steady income, she did. Her mother went to live in unoccupied France, and Miss Signoret settled into a Left Bank garret and concentrated on working her way into the movie industry, playing mostly tough women.

The first time she played a prostitute she did it so convincingly, she says, that she was typecast from then on. By the end of the war she was established as a film extra and her first major performance, in Jacques Feyder's Macadam in 1946, won her the Prix Susanne Bianchetti.

The following year she began to get star billing and married Yves Allegret, a director who had encouraged her in her first films.

A couple of years later she was divorced from Allegret and married Yves Montand, a handsome music hall artist.

She persuaded him to drop his cowboy act and concentrate on the chansons populaires - little songs about the joys and sorrows of ordinary people-which have since made him a highly popular stage, film and recording artist.

Miss Signoret continued to make films and in 1954 she and Montand appeared together in a long-run stage production of Arthur Miller's play The Crucible, later co-starring in the film version called The Witches of Salem. Earlier she had had a starring role in the mysterythriller Diabolique, which was one of the most successful foreign films shown in North America in 1955-56.

She played her most sympathetic role in Room at the Top. It won her an Oscar last spring as the outstanding actress of the year-the first actress to receive the top Academy Award for work in a British film. She is extremely proud of succeeding in her profession, but shrugs off press adjectives like "terrific" with the remark that "A human being is made up of all the meetings he has had, good and bad. It has been my good fortune to be surrounded by intelligent and brilliant people and something of them may have rubbed off on

She really likes acting. It's much more than a job to her. She says she isn't unhappy when not acting, because she has many interests, but she is very happy when she is acting. She allows herself just one picture a year, because she wants to spend as much time as possible in the "real" world with her family, which includes her daughter Catherine, 15, by her first marriage, with whom she has a very close relationship. She talks about this on the program.





# CORNUCOPIAS OR CALA LILY COOKIES

3 eggs
34 cup granulated sugar
1 cup sifted cake flour
1 tsp. baking powder
14 tsp. salt

1 tsp. vanilla

Sift flour, measure and sift with baking powder and salt. Beat eggs until very light—about 5 minutes. Gradually add sugar, Then told in

vanilla and flour mixture.

Grease and flour a cookie tin well. Drop a dessert spoonful allowing 6 per large cookie tin, as they will spread. Bake for 5 to 6 minutes in a 350 degree oven. Loosen and roll into cone shape. Cool on rack. When cool, fill partly with a favourite filling and top with a teaspoon of whipped cream to which has been added 2 thsp. icing sugar and ¼ tsp. almond flavouring. Top with a bit of grated orange peel.

# CREAMY ALMOND FILLING

<sup>1</sup>3 cup butter

4 thsp. icing sugar

1/4 cup flaked or chopped almonds

18 tsp. almond flavouring

Cream butter and icing sugar well. Add almonds and flavouring. Use as desired.

Hardly "deplorable" history — although perhaps a little nautically

askew—or grammatically elliptic? I'm glad you enjoyed the "Ozark music". We hope to do further shows on the Fraser and I'll look forward to hearing from you again.

Hockey Crowds Out Favourite Programs
