"GOOD MORNING . . . will you join me in Family Worship?" have become some of the most familiar words heard on radio in the Prairie Provinces. The quiet, dignified voice of the Very Rev. M. L. Goodman has spoken this invitation 3,000 times on CBC Radio, effective with the broadcast of September 21. That is almost ten full years of broadcasting, six days a week.

Family Worship, heard Monday through Saturday at 7:55 a.m., is a uniquely inspiring five-minute program that has reached out to hundreds of thousands in an unobtrusive but effective way. With tersely-worded, quietly-spoken messages of guidance and philosophy, in a setting of recorded hymns, it has a remarkable way of penetrating the early-morning din of the busy household, bringing activity to a momentary halt while spiritual refuelling takes place.

The Very Rev. M. L. Goodman is dean and rector of St. Matthew's Cathedral, Brandon. When he started the program, he was living in Winnipeg, but for the last three years he has driven 135 miles into Winnipeg every two weeks to record a series of broadcasts.

A collection of scripts from the series was published two years ago, and the entire 3,000 copies sold out in a very brief period.

TIME OUT FOR MUSIC, a bright half-hour of variety entertainment from Winnipeg, is one of the programs returning this week to the CBC Television network. Seen 5:30 p.m. on Mondays, for the first seven weeks it will feature singer Doug Crosley with the Mitch Parks Quintet and the Neil Harris Singers. Frequent guests will be the comedy team of Jimmy Blendick and Marni North.

The light-hearted script by the husband and wife team of Marian Waldman and Mort Forer, will include skits and, as well as standard popular numbers, one original song each week. Producer is Neil Andrews.

Effective with the eighth program of the series, plans call for singer Georges Lafleche to take the spotlight.

SOMETIMES THE programs heard by Canadians from coast to coast on the CBC networks are only a part of the overall broadcasting picture of a particular event, such as the recent Anglican World Congress held in Toronto. All language sections of the CBC International Service covered the Congress in their regular transmissions, and to provide more extended coverage to specially-interested areas the International Service provided on tape special reports, interviews, talks, round-table discussions and speeches in English by some of the leading delegates to broadcasting organizations in North America, Europe, Africa, Latin America, Asia, Australia and New Zealand. At the close of the Congress, a half-hour documentary highlighting the main points discussed was sent to some thirty-five networks and individual broadcasting organizations.

ON TUESDAY, October 1, 9:30-10:00 p.m., *Country Holiday, Part 2* will consist of the first half of an hour-long show under the title *CBC Folksong Party*, which will be presented before a student audience in the new Riddell Hall Auditorium of United College, a University of Manitoba affiliate in downtown Winnipeg.

Singing host of the show will be the well-known folksinger, Reg Gibson, who, in addition to singing some of his own favourite folksongs, will join Jim Pirie in vocal duets.

Supporting Reg and Jim will be the Neil Harris Singers and an instrumental group. As added attractions, the cast will include guest soloists Miriam Breitman and Henry Enns.

The same cast will be heard on October 8 in the second half of the show recorded at United College.

RED SKELTON:

His Purpose:

*To Bring
a Smile*



Monday, September 30,
the hour-long Red Skelton
Show comes to
CBC-TV

IN THE LONG, lonely stretches of the night, Richard Bernard (Red) Skelton, plagued by insomnia, often fills in the time writing short stories and painting. The stories, bound in dozens of red morocco volumes but never published, are said to be exclusively about red-headed characters. The paintings are always of clowns. In both cases, Skelton might be said to be picturing himself, for Red Skelton is without doubt the world's best-known clown.

¹⁾ Since he is usually compared to such comedians as Bob Hope or Sid Ceasar, rather than Emmett Kelly or the Russian, Popov, some may question the term "clown," but not Skelton himself. "I never try to say or do clever things, because I wouldn't know how," he has said.

"At the supermarket, on the street, on television, all I am is a clown."

That seems to be quite enough, for, while platoons of more sophisticated comics have been decimated in the harsh battles of television competition, Skelton has gone ambling on to greater triumphs, bigger ratings, and the longest-running (10 years) regular comedy show on TV. This year, his hour-long program will be seen on CBC-TV once a month, replacing *Playdate* every fourth week. The first *Red Skelton Show* of the new season is scheduled Monday night, September 30.

For most of his life, Skelton has been not only a clown, but the traditional clown of classic literature—enormously cheerful on the outside, a web of tortured suffering

within. His idiosyncrasies have provided rich ground for the probings of armchair psychologists. In the 27-room mansion where he used to live, all the lights could be turned on by a single switch, and they often stayed on all night because of Skelton's fear of the dark; he kept a small house-trailer at the back of his estate and would lock himself away in it for days at a time; he had such a phobia about phones that he refused to use them; he wouldn't get into a bathtub filled with water, and it took him an hour to build up enough courage to ease himself into his swimming pool (traumas that resulted, he said, from an attempt by his relatives to drown him in a gravel pit as a child).

In the last few years, perhaps on an upswing from the depths of personal tragedy and near-fatal illness in which he was plunged between 1958 and 1960, Skelton seems to have shaken off many of his psychological problems. "I've learned to understand myself and my behaviour, to look into my childhood and not run away from things I previously blocked out."

One characteristic that has remained unchanged is his deep Christian faith, and his sense of mission in life. At the end of an appearance, after convulsing spectators with wild and sometimes ribald mummery, he may become suddenly shy, almost embarrassingly serious. His closing remark often goes something like this: "We are put on earth for some purpose, and mine was to make people laugh. If, when you're sad, something I've said or done brings a smile or a chuckle, my purpose has been served."

Festival: Season Opens With *The Mikado*

THANKS TO Norman Campbell, Gilbert and Sullivan never had it so good. The energetic and versatile CBC Television producer has presented the famous Englishmen's lilting operettas to an immeasurably larger audience than G. and S. ever attracted to the theatre throughout their creative lives.

This week, *Festival*, the CBC's sophisticated showcase of television art, returns to the fall schedule with Campbell's production of *The Mikado*. This is the latest in more than 14 hours of Gilbert and Sullivan productions that Campbell has offered to North American TV audiences, a record unsurpassed by anyone.

This production, with cast, orchestra and sets from the stage offering (also directed by Campbell) at the 1963 Stratford Festival, again takes viewers into a theatre setting for the performance. The TV production, as in a number of previous G. and S. showings on CBC, is set on a stage behind a typical theatrical proscenium arch. The actors perform before a live audience in the studio, with the effect that home TV audiences will feel they are watching less a television film than a real stage production.

Headlining the cast are Eric House (as Ko-Ko, the Lord High Executioner), Andrew Downie (Naki-Poo), Irene Byatt (Katisha), and Howell Glynne (Pooh-Bah).

Featured in the role of Yum-Yum, the principal "little maid from

EINSTEIN

A documentary about this century's greatest mathematical genius and physicist is heard Sunday, Sept. 29, 5:00 p.m. The following three weeks at that time, the Princeton Institute for Advanced Studies is featured

BEHIND THE GENIUS of Dr. Albert Einstein was a shy little man who endeared himself to students and colleagues for his warmth and simplicity as much as for his luminous intellect. He was a soft touch for a hard-luck story, and went to endless pains to help promising young people. The only trouble was that he was too willing to write a testimonial, and heads of firms were sometimes confused by receiving as many as four letters from Einstein glowingly recommending four different prospective employees for the same job, but for quite different reasons, which seemed perfectly logical to Einstein.

He was neither personally ambitious nor jealous of his colleagues, and in spite of his air of detachment he took immense delight in human relationships, seeming unaware of his great charm. His face was deeply furrowed and he had beautiful, dreamy eyes which could darken suddenly and crinkle as he guffawed loudly at some sally—usually his own. Friends said that the atmosphere in his home was completely relaxing.

When there were visitors to tea he'd emerge from his study looking bewildered, so his wife would bring him down to earth gradually with casual remarks until, by his second cup, he'd be completely aware of who was present and what he was eating. Though, sometimes, if the company were dull, he'd drift off mentally down some scientific byway, a dazed look in his eyes.

One of his well-remembered qualities was his infinite patience, even with men who would sneak up on the verandah of his home in Princeton, New Jersey, and have their wives photograph them as if they were just coming out of the famous scientist's house. He loathed photographers, and once stuck his tongue out at one who was annoyingly persistent. He disliked large gatherings, too, and fled hastily from a house where he was to be a special dinner guest, when he saw a number of coats in the hall of his hostess's home. His wife had to dash after him and call down the street that there were really only four or five coats in all, and entice a reluctant genius back to his social obligations.

Einstein refused to adapt to the public picture of a famous man. He hated to wear socks. "I've discovered that one can easily wear shoes without socks," he confided delightfully to a friend. "Socks, you know, get holes in them. My wife does nothing but mend them. I'll never wear any again." He loved old clothes and his wife had to hide his shabbiest suit or he'd have worn it everywhere. In cool weather he donned an old knitted cap but refused to cover his head when it rained—he pointed out that his hair would dry so much faster than a hat.

He carried his world around in his head. He needed no laboratory. All he asked was to be left alone with a pencil and paper in a corner to explore his theories, and if material for making calculations weren't handy, he simply wrote them on an imaginary blackboard. He didn't keep a notebook in his pocket. "Ideas are rare things, you know," he explained.

Acclaim bewildered him. "I really don't know why it is," he muttered to a friend, "that, having written a few papers that only a handful of people in the whole world are able to understand, I have apparently acquired such fame."

He preferred to travel third class. This was fortunate, for he usually gave away nearly all the money he'd had at the start of his journey. So well-known was his generosity that queues would form at his door, and his wife would say: "But Albert, you've given some money to that crook again, the one who has fooled you several times." "I know," he'd reply quietly, "but he must be in need of money, all the same. One does not beg for pleasure."

He became a good friend of the Queen of Belgium, and they would play duets together every time he went through Brussels. Einstein was a better-than-average violinist and enjoyed piano improvising. Once, on arriving in Brussels, he found he had given away all but a few francs, so he scouted around for a cheap lodging, and found it in a slum. In the bar of the hotel he asked to use the telephone. Imagine the customers' surprise when they overheard the disheveled old man demanding to speak to the Queen—and finally doing so with extreme informality!

"I don't crowd my memory with facts that I can easily find in an encyclopedia," he would surprise people by saying. Uncluttered mentally, he could discover what other great minds had looked at for thousands of years without seeing. But he couldn't do the simplest sums in his head.

He never looked down on intellects less than his, and would go to great pains to explain a complicated scientific theory to an addled young friend, using such simple terms and references that it all seemed completely understandable.

Like many other great thinkers, he showed no signs of genius as a child—hated studying, failed exams. He disliked school and never lost his feeling of contempt for what he called the educational machine which, he felt, was destroying the desire to learn.

German-born and widely travelled, he considered himself a citizen of the world until the Nazis made him think of himself as a Jew, and then he took up the cause of the Jews all over the world. He used the word "God" more than most scientists. One of his favourite remarks, "God is subtle, but he is not malicious," is now etched in stone at the Princeton Institute of Advanced Studies, with which he was associated for over 20 years.

His religion was simple and closely tied in with his science, but it had nothing to do with the Jewish faith or any other orthodox religion. He called it "cosmic religion." He was convinced of the harmony of the universe, and from this conviction derived his theory of relativity. The battle between the humanities and science worried him deeply and constantly. "Science without religion is lame, religion without science is blind," he used to say.

Before he died in 1955, Einstein said he felt he had been allotted a great share of grace and had attained more happiness than one man could bear. One of the most appealing things about this retiring, good little man was that he never fully realized what

Nation's Conscience, 'Inquiry', Returns

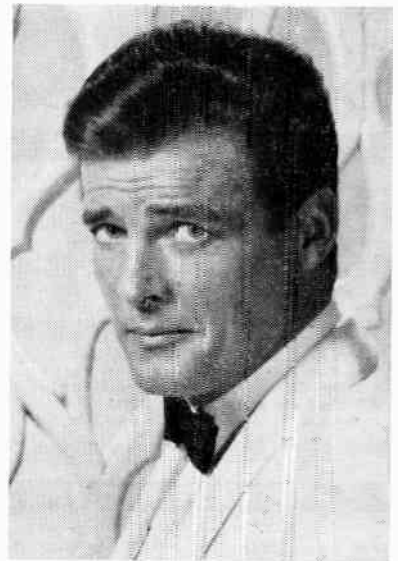
LAST SEASON CBC-TV's *Inquiry* took a controversial (and serious) look at our defence policy — and "blew up" the Peace Tower. This season the series will be equally controversial, and sometimes satiric.

Plans for the season, which begins September 30, include *The Glass Case*, a profile of a troubled Manitoba Indian reservation; *The Quitters*, a story about young people who leave school early; a survey of the vanishing railroads that asks: Are they really obsolete? and finds some surprising answers; and another look at our defence and foreign policies, almost a year after the last one.

"We have another show under wraps that we can't talk about yet," says producer Patrick Watson. "It deals with some assumptions we tend to make about our rights as individuals in this country, and about certain threats said to be confronting Confederation."

Watson can't pin any dates on these programs—world and national events move too fast and he says he wants "to continue paying sharp attention to those events as they happen." But viewers can expect facts, insight, and a measure of the unexpected — remember last year when *Inquiry* asked Jayne Mansfield for a national assessment?

At press time the new host for *Inquiry* had not been selected.

Last year's host, A. Davidson Dunton, has begun work as joint chairman of the inquiry into biculturalism.

Two newcomers join Watson behind the camera: Roy Faibish, formerly a special assistant to the Leader of the Opposition, the Right Honourable John Diefenbaker; and Jean Pouliot, formerly national news director for CTV (and before that, originator, in 1952, of CBC-TV's *News magazine*). Faibish and Pouliot, along with Warner Troyer, now in his third season with *Inquiry*, bring to the series wide experience and knowledge of Canadian affairs, plus technical abilities in writing, directing, interviewing and editing which will provide the *Inquiry* unit with considerable flexibility of approach. Freelancer Munro Scott will continue to work with the unit.

Impertinent Lamponers Of 'The Establishment'

Be prepared to see the traditional teeter on its foundations as Britain's corps of young satirists introduce a new season of QUEST

THE ESTABLISHMENT—in the sense that the phrase was used up to three years ago—implied that discreet coterie of powerful British families who were said to control the destinies of millions, and about whom little was known and still less published.

Today, the same phrase conjures up a picture of five perspicacious young people who have established themselves throughout the English-speaking world by lampooning, among other things, *The Establishment*.

It all began as a club, of that title, in London in 1961—but a club with a difference: it had a resident satirical revue, produced, directed and acted by the owners; took deadly aim at the cherished institutions and concepts of generations. The attack was bitter—and the customers loved it.

Today, *The Establishment*, the English coffee bar, that is, still exists and flourishes; the owners have carried their satire to North America and have established another *Establishment* in New York City. And before the original five return to Britain this winter, after having established a second company in New York, they pay a return visit to CBC Television, on *Quest*, Tuesday, October 1.

The five—John Bird, Eleanor Bron, John Fortune, Jeremy Geidt, and Carole Simpson—will be seen in another series of sketches, designed to shock, cause second thoughts, and generally leave an impression on the smooth surface of conformity.

'Ben Cartwright' On TELESCOPE

THE WEST is full of bonanza towns where young men found their eldorados in the '90s. There are still a few lucky ones, like Lorne Greene, who struck bonanza literally and figuratively. The Greene fame, first as CBC news announcer and later as dignified dramatic actor playing opposite stars like Katharine Cornell, had been associated with sophisticated settings and situations, with fine tweeds rather than jeans. Then suddenly the picture changed.

As Ben Cartwright, patriarchal western ranch-owner who trips up for an hour on television each week to reinstate the American father as a warm, compassionate, respected man of authority, Greene has hit the jackpot in both income and popularity, and with such ease that he looks as if he'd lived his life in the saddle and cut his teeth on a cactus. (A new *Bonanza* series began on CBC-TV Sunday, September 22). He's also a frequent rodeo star, and his RCA Victor recordings of western songs are selling like griddle cakes.

Why the about-turn and how does he like it? The big, grey-haired Canadian with the bass

IT WASN'T TOO long ago that Winnipeg Blue Bombers and Ed-

monton Eskimos dominated the western conference. This week, when the pair meet on another CBC Television Saturday night game, they'll be fighting each other for a playoff berth.

Edmonton, winners of three straight Grey Cups in the 1950's and the Bombers, winners of four of five Grey Cups since 1958, have fallen on dismal days. Neither club seems able to recapture the spark that kept them on top.

Old age crept in and destroyed the Eskimos, and Coach Eagle Keys has been unable to fill in the weak spots adequately. When the Eskimos were winning, the most popular names in Canadian football were Parker, Bright, Miles, Nelson, Kwong, Tully, Lindley, etc. Only Bright remains and he is a shadow of his former self.

Edmonton has gone through dozens of players to match the winners, but the hunting has not been good.

Winnipeg is reaching Edmonton's problem — and fast. Already gone is such championship material as Gar Warren, Gerry James, Buddy Tinsley, Charlie Shepard, Ed Kotowich and Mike Wright. Coming to the end of the line are Roger Savoie, Steve Patrick, Gordie Rowland and Dave Burkholder.

It's no wonder then, that the fresh blood in places like Vancouver and Calgary and Regina is making life miserable for the teams that were in 10 finals in 12 years.

Both coaches, Bud Grant and Eagle Keys, will be doing their utmost to win this Saturday's telecast game. Winnipeg will be playing its 11th game of the season. The five remaining should be even tougher — one against Hamilton, one against Saskatchewan, one against Calgary and a home and home series with the B.C. Lions.

Edmonton, after finishing this game with Winnipeg, still has to make a trip east to Ottawa and Hamilton — and there are other games, against Calgary and British Columbia.

The old guard may be facing a long, cold winter.

Baseball's classic play-off, the World Series, begins Wednesday, October 2 in New York's Yankee Stadium. The Yankees' opponent, still undecided, will probably be the pitcher-potent Los Angeles Dodgers, although the high-scoring St. Louis Cardinals still have an outside chance.

The second Series game will be October 3 in New York. Then there'll be a day off for travel and the competition will continue in the National League city with

school" about whom so much of the plot revolves, is Canadian Opera Company soprano Heather Thomson. Maurice Brown plays the title role, with Arthur Sclater as Pish-Tush, Kathryn Newman as Pitti-Sing, and Anne Linden as Peep-Bo.

Producing *The Mikado* for TV posed a number of special problems. The stage performance ran for two hours and four minutes; *Festival* demands less than 90 minutes—and some of the first act had to be cut, as were a number of choruses from songs in other acts.

The performance, sponsored on this occasion by The Trans-Canada Telephone System, has been made noteworthy by the sponsor's outstanding co-operation. The difficulties of breaking the performance to allow for sponsor's messages has been overcome by the System agreeing to use less than half their paid time, and only four minutes of commercial matter will be used. "The sponsor was most anxious that the program be as little interrupted as possible. We are most grateful for their understanding," said Campbell.

The stage sets from Stratford, designed by Brian Jackson, have been adapted to the TV produc-

Three Ways of Life

Canada, Brazil and Nigeria are compared in a series starting Monday on EXPLORATIONS, CBC-TV

BY LOOKING at others, sometimes we get a clearer view of ourselves. Some of the customs, habits, traditions that we accept as natural and inevitable turn out to be quite arbitrary, even artificial, when viewed with an objective eye, and we find out that our way isn't the only way. At the same time, observing the ways of life of other peoples often stimulates our interest in re-assessing our own way of life. And sometimes surprising

similarities are found among widely different cultures.

The program series starting this week allows us to look at the ways of life of two countries, and reflects our own image. Presented as the opening series of CBC-TV's *Explorations* (Monday nights) beginning September 30, it is a National Film Board series entitled *Comparisons*.

In five programs, Canada, Nigeria, and Brazil are contrasted and compared, from the following standpoints: (this week) a day in the lives of three grandmothers, all widows in their late 60s; three apprentices, each learning a trade; three young artists, all of whom have received some recognition, but are not yet famous; three elected leaders of small towns; and three wedding days.

tion by Robert Lawson, "adding textures and giving more of the three-dimensional quality needed in television's close work." Costumes for both the TV and stage performances were designed by Suzanne Mess, with staging of musical numbers in both media by Alan Lund. The orchestra for both occasions was conducted by Louis Applebaum.

"One advantage of having a live audience for this TV production is the necessity for the performers to play to the audience, to use more energy and to project in a more realistic way," said Campbell, who now has transferred four G. and S. works from the stage of the Avon Theatre in Stratford to CBC Television.

The stage production, which was one of the highlights of the Stratford season this year, played to almost entirely full houses during its 45 performances, and one of the newest Canadian talents to successfully emerge was Heather Thomson. It was the first major, on-stage role for the 22-year-old, auburn-haired soprano from Vancouver.

Although Heather has been seen and heard by Canadian audiences through her participation in and winning of both the CBC's national talent-spotting programs, *Talent Festival* and *Talent Caravan*, on

radio and television respectively, and in a number of Pacific coast appearances on the CBC, it is only following her Stratford debut that she has sprung into the forefront of the Canadian opera scene.

Soon to tour with the Canadian Opera Company, on the east and west coasts, with lead roles in *Die Fledermaus* and *Così Fan Tutte*, she also sings the star-making part of Mimi in the COC's resident Toronto production of *La Bohème*. This was the same role, also with the COC, which helped catapult Teresa Stratas into international acclaim, to whom Heather is now being compared.

Heather won the North American semi-finals of the Metropolitan Opera auditions and with it, the Lenning award scholarship, two years ago at the age of 20. Since that time she has been studying at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto.

Today, a show *may* "live forever" through the existence of videotape or film. Occasionally a performance or an entire production can fulfill both shades of meaning of that phrase; Gilbert and Sullivan fans are likely to find the durability of *The Mikado* nothing surprising. Newcomers to the Victorian musical theatre may be pleasantly surprised with the *Festival* production on October 2.

After 12 million feet of tape, another year starts for CBC Radio's interview show, 7:35 p.m. weekdays

CBC RADIO'S *Assignment*, the week-night "news magazine of the air," will begin its eighth year of broadcasts on Tuesday, October 1, at 7:35 p.m. In its seven years of existence, the program has piled up some impressive statistics. More than 15,000 separate stories have been broadcast in 1,800 programs, and 700 reporters from 70 countries have contributed these stories to the program.

Since *Assignment* is essentially a taped program, these stories represent almost four million feet of audio-tape. Editing and shortening of stories usually eliminates two-thirds of the tape received, so it can be estimated that about 12 million feet of tape were submitted.

In addition to the stories sent in by correspondents, the program it-

self has often moved far from its home base in Toronto: to Brussels for the World's Fair of 1958; to Calgary for the Stampede; to Florida, the British Isles, France, Germany, and many points within Canada's borders. A mobile *Assignment* caravan once took a full year going from coast to coast to gather stories and local folklore, much of which has found its way into the National Archives of Canada.

Assignment has preserved the voices of literally hundreds of Canadians, some of whom have since passed away, telling in their own words of the contributions they made to this country's development. The program has investigated social evils like drug addiction, alcoholism and race preju-

dices. It has presented the stories of kings and commoners, celebrities and bums, and above all it has provided thousand of listeners with new insights into the world around them.

Conceived by Harry J. Boyle, who was also responsible for the devising of *CBC Wednesday Night, Project*, and *Venture, Assignment* first went on the air October 1, 1956. In the early days, the main problem was in getting enough material to fill a nightly program; now, with a large group of regular contributors, one of the major problems is in selecting material from the enormous amount that pours in.

Host Bill McNeil is the only original staff member left (it's his voice that's heard every night with the familiar echo-chambered "Assignment-t-t") and he now serves as the program's sole host. McNeil worked with Boyle on the initial planning of the show and over the years, in addition to his regular duties as on-air "voice" of the program, he has from time to time performed almost every task associated with the presentation of the nightly magazine—planning, editing tape, juxtaposing the various segments of the show, and writing the script. "The only thing I haven't done," he says, "is sweep the floor. And there I draw the line."

On the October 1 anniversary program, says McNeil, "we're go-

ing back over the full seven years to get snippets from stories that especially took our fancy. In a way, it will be a test for our listeners — to see how many they can remember."

'Classics To Midnight'

THE TERM "classics" has the wider, popular connotation in the title of a new record review series starting Thursday, October 3, on CBW and CBK. *Classics to Midnight* will include the music of the renaissance, the baroque, the classics (generic definition) and the early, middle and late romantics.

The musical dilettantes' interest should be particularly whetted by some interesting works that represent the two main streams of tonality—the modal tonalities of the renaissance and the tertian (triad) tonalities of the baroque, the classics and the romantics. The works selected will be limited to the accepted traditions of tonality as described and represents in general, the kind of music the layman is pleased to call "classical!"

The programs are all-inclusive in terms of the symphonies, chamber works, choral literature and operatic scores available on records. The performances include world famous orchestras, choral groups and instrumental and vocal soloists.

Historically, the series represents

voice tells the story of his spectacular success as a gun-totin' westerner on CBC-TV Friday night, October 4, when *Telescope* begins a new season with a biography-on-horseback on *Bonanza's* Ben Cartwright. It was directed by Robert Barclay.

Greene talks to host Fletcher Markle about himself and his career while driving in a convertible along a highway in Los Angeles on the way to work; on the patio of his city home there; and on the set of *Bonanza* during filming. The cameras follow him to a rodeo in Missouri, where he rides and sings for a wildly enthusiastic crowd. And his wife, Nancy, shows Markle around The Ponderosa, the *Bonanza* ranch home of Ben Cartwright. The Greens built and furnished a home for themselves exactly like it, but, Nancy confides, at a fraction of the cost of the original.

Greene's conversation with Markle ranges colourfully and in-

formally all over his career. He offers advice to young people thinking of embarking on an acting career; analyzes what happiness means to him; describes a typical day in his busy life; tells why he thinks writers and producers really don't like or trust actors; and outlines plans for the future, which include a night-club act and perhaps a Broadway musical. It's a revealing picture of a TV cowboy who changed his horse in mid-stream and galloped off with booty from a source he had never dreamed of mining. But he gives the impression that, underneath his Stetson, as one of his newest recordings insists, *It's the Same Old Me*.

a gradual democratization of music as represented by the music in the renaissance under the exclusive patronage of the church; the divided music of the baroque under the dual patronage of the church and the princely court, the divided music of the classics under the dual

patronage of the aristocracy, and the first promoters of the concert hall performances—and ultimately the music of the romantics as music of the people and the full democratic implication of the "choral" Ninth of Beethoven in "Alle Menschen Werden Brüder (All Peoples Shall Become Brothers)"—Schiller.

For the listener to whom music is an aural-visual experience, the music of the baroque may recall the marvellous details of 17th century carvings in architecture, that of the classics will recall the marvellous balance and proportion (form) of Greek architecture and that of the romantics, the warmth and feeling of poetry like that demonstrated by Bobby Burns.

Nothing of what is being said here will be a matter of discussion in the scripts. It is hoped that this brief outline of music to be programmed will suggest a number of reasons for listening to the series.

Classics to Midnight will be heard every Thursday at 11:00 p.m. and is produced by Benjamin Horch. Thursday, October 3, it will be pre-empted on CBX.

Regardless of who represents the National League, the Yankees will be strongly favoured as a result of their runaway victory in the American League. Even without the services of Mantle and Maris, the Yankees have shown great home-run power and backed it up with a tight defence and superior pitching, especially by youngsters like fire-balling Al Downing and Jim Bouton.

The Dodgers very likely have baseball's best pitching staff but are uncertain defensively and light-hitting. They hit neither frequently nor for distance and have to depend very largely on the left arms of Sandy Koufax, Johnny Podres, Ron Perranoski and Pete Richert and the right arms of Don Drysdale and Bob Miller.

The Cards undoubtedly have the game's best infield in Bill White, Julian Javier, Dick Groat

and Ken Boyer (all of whom played for this year's National League All-Star team) but their pitching staff is not deep, and they are betrayed frequently by lack of bench and relief pitching strength.

(I'll be on CBWT Tuesday and Friday evenings at 11:30 p.m. with Terry Hind for 10-minute World Series Warm-Ups.)

In the National Football League telecast Sunday, fans will get the opportunity to see the Los Angeles Rams, who aren't involved in these games too often. The Rams, who like the Bombers and Eskimos, at one time were the power of the National League, will meet the Cleveland Browns, who appear to be on the way back after a few dismal seasons.

Baseball's Game of the Week features the American League champion New York Yankees hosting the Minnesota Twins.

Films of sporting events around the world will be shown on Sports International Sunday, and Saturday afternoon on CBC Radio there will be a direct report from the Canadian Grand Prix at Mosport.

Flashback is produced by Don Brown.

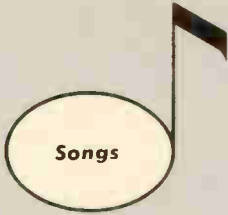
