The viewer is asked to listen to and interpret three different sounds at once, band music, narrator's voice and conversation, and bird songs and calls. As this is impossible there is only one thing for the viewer to do, turn off the television in utter disgust and bitter disappointment.

AROUND CBC . . .

THE FEATURE on *Telescope* Thursday, February 24th, was produced by a new Winnipeg film company that has an international award to its credit after only 15 months of existence.

The Flying Lambs, about a family of bush pilots based at The Pas, Manitoba, came from the studios of Western Films Limited. One of the earlier productions of this company, a color film about Winnipeg produced for the Manitoba industry and commerce department tourist branch, was entitled *City of Rivers*. It won the Chris Award at the Columbus Film Festival in the U.S.A. last autumn.

Producer and writer of the upcoming *Telescope* feature and of *City of Rivers* is Lyal Brown, a partner in Western Films with Gunter Hennig and Werner Franz. Brown, at one time executive assistant to the general manager of CBC's English language networks, has been responsible for many other features on CBC television and radio. Included are *The Brewsters of Banff* (*Telescope*), *Ballet to Jamaica* (*20/20*), and four features under the *Diary* subtitle for *20/20*—*Diary of a School Teacher*, *Proud Regiment*, *Maverick*, and *Mountaineer*. For CBC radio, he wrote and taped the feature *In the Shadow of the Mountains* (*Venture*) and many other programs.

The core of Dostoevsky's *CRIME AND PUNISHMENT* is dramatized

on CBC-TV's *FESTIVAL*, Wednesday, February 23rd at 9:30 p.m.

IT'S EXACTLY 100 years since the publication of the book that is generally considered to be the greatest tragedy about a murderer since *Macbeth*: Feodor Dostoevsky's *Crime and Punishment*. But, despite its age, it has a strangely contemporary flavor in its intimate understanding of the relation between good and evil in the hidden recesses of the human mind, and it contains one of the most gripping psychological chases in literature.

It's a shattering study of a proud young Superman, above the convention and morality

student who considers himself an invincible of what he calls the louse-in-the-street, and who feels forced to put his theory to the test by killing an old woman and then posing as injured innocence when the light of suspicion falls on him. But he's not satisfied with the deed as proof of his genius and superiority. He's compelled to re-visit the scene of the crime, to experience the whole thing over again in his mind, to torture himself and feel the thrill and the horror of having gotten away with it. He plays a cat-and-mouse game with the police, tantalizing both himself and them by edging almost to the brink of confession, then drawing back in the nick of time. But eventually his instinct for self-preservation fights a losing battle with a pressing need to confess. He finds he is not the Napoleon he thought himself; he is not strong enough to bear the responsibility of his horrific act of defiance, nor has he the courage to kill himself. He has underestimated the power of his conscience, and in the end it is both his

A family of bush pilots based at The Pas, Manitoba, is subject of TELESCOPE, Thursday, February 24th at 9:30 p.m.

"OH, THERE'S lots of airplanes in the bush. I've flown out lots of dead men, lost men. Every summer there's a pilot or two disappear. For these last three consecutive years, north of Yellowknife there has been one every year go down and there's absolutely no trace of them at all."

That's Tom Lamb speaking, describing the hazards of bush-flying in the territory he covers. Lamb operates a fleet of 15 passenger/cargo aircraft plus one helicopter from a base at The Pas, Manitoba, to such distant points as the Eskimo settlement at Repulse Bay, about 1,000 miles northeast. It's a family business in which Tom has the help of six bush-pilot sons, among them a set of twins. He also has three daughters and several daughters-in-law.

Mrs. Lamb is used to the kind of life Tom and his sons lead, so she doesn't worry too much now, but, "It's a little hard on my daughters-in-law. They haven't had quite as much of it as I've had. It takes a while

The Strollin' Twenties

SHOW OF THE WEEK presents
an outstanding array of
talent Monday, February 21st.

THE MOST formidable line-up of Negro star performers ever assembled for a television show will appear in *The Strollin' Twenties*, an hour-long spectacular to be seen on CBC television's *Show of the Week*, Monday, February 21st, at 9:00 p.m.

Produced by Harry Belafonte, who acts as host, the show is Belafonte's tribute to the bygone days of the Harlem in which he spent the first eight years of his life—the days “when every Sunday was Easter Sunday.”

Sidney Poitier acts as guide as the tempo, feeling and spirit of a Harlem Sunday 40 years ago which are evoked by Sammy Davis, Diahann Carroll, Duke Ellington and his Orchestra, comics George Kirby and Nipsey Russell, singers Joe Williams and Gloria Lynn, and dancer Paula Kelly.

To recreate the atmosphere of *The Strollin' Twenties*, Belafonte asked Langston Hughes,

the distinguished Negro poet-playwright-journalist, to write the script. The result is a panorama of an untold chapter of Americana.

Hughes, who was a vital part of the old Harlem scene himself, recalls the great figures of the era—Paul Robeson, Roland Hayes, Ethel Waters, Florence Mills, Rose McClendon, Bessie Smith, Louis Armstrong, Gladys Bentley and Josephine Baker.

“I can still hear their laughter in my ears,” he says of the Harlem after-hours parties, “hear the soft slow music, and feel the floor shaking as the dancers danced.”

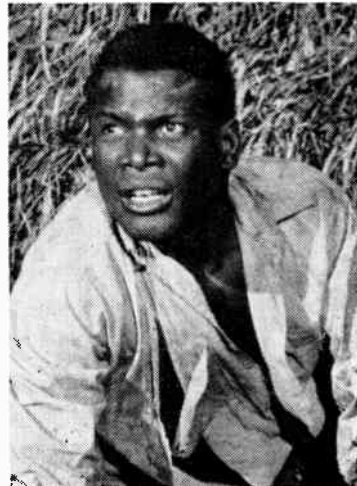

THE KIND of music America was listening to in the days described on the opposite page was essentially a Negro expression—jazz. Musicologist Winthrop Sargeant places the first important wave of Negro musical influence, which produced the art of ragtime, around the end of the 19th century. After ragtime came the “blues,” the next important development. More than anyone else, it was the Negro composer W. C. Handy who popularized the blues, and in the half-century since he started it all there have been few white performers who could capture the true feeling of this musical form.

Some of the best veteran exponents of the blues will be seen in concert this week on

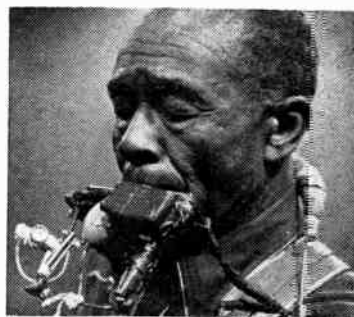
CBC-TV's *Festival* production, *The Blues* (Wednesday, February 23rd, at 8:30 p.m.). This one-hour program brings together for the first time in the same television studio Brownie McGhee and Sonny Terry (guitar and harmonica); Willie Dixon (bass); Jesse Fuller (one-man band); Mable Hillery (singer); Sunnyland Slim (pianist-vocalist); Big Joe Williams (guitarist-singer); and Muddy Waters and his aggregation, including pianist Otis Spann.

Between numbers, Barry Callaghan interviews the performers about the blues and its meaning to them as jazz men and as individuals. *The Blues* is produced and directed by Paddy Sampson.

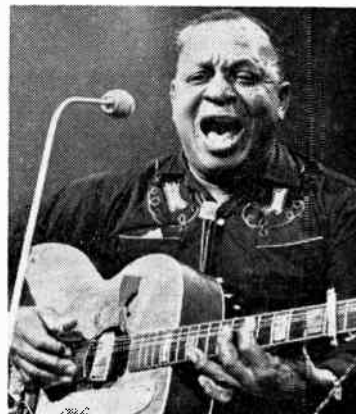

to get used to their husbands being away so much and being called all hours of the day and the phones ringing half the night, people wanting trips, all these emergencies. You have to get going early and travel late. But they'll get used to it after a while."

The Flying Lambs travel nearly a quarter of a million miles a year, flying mail and supplies or passengers throughout the northland, and in that wild terrain they have to be prepared for almost any emergency. "There are various ways to get out of the bush if you have accidents," explains Tom. "You just have to try these unorthodox things. If you hit an ice chisel in a lake with your propeller and damage a blade, which you sometimes do, don't be afraid to saw the end of the other blade off and make them even. You may have a little vibration but this will get you home rather than spending time in the bush. Then, for raising airplanes when they're sunk you use tubes—inner tubes, and a little compressor. Someone dives down and wraps those inner tubes around the cross struts of the floats and you pump them up."

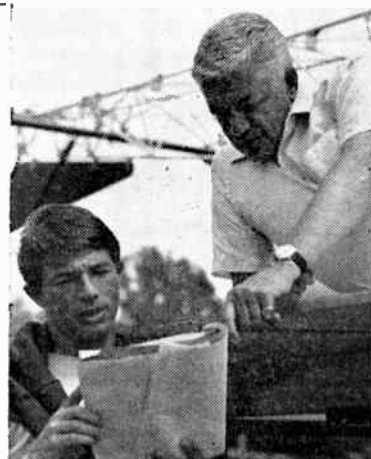

Act 3. In the Castle. Raimondo is telling the guests of terrible events. On hearing cries, he had gone to the bridal chamber where he found Arthur dead and Lucia, now quite mad, waving aloft his sword. Lucia enters, a victim of wild and pathetic hallucinations (The famous Mad Scene).

Dr. Stern has devoted much of his life to a spiritual search, both for himself as an individual, and as a man concerned with the deepest problems of society. He has written numerous essays and books, many of which concern the inter-dependence of psychiatry and religion.

PROJECT '66

A Conversation with Psychiatrist Dr. Karl Stern, Sunday at 10:30 p.m.

DR. KARL STERN, psychiatrist-in-chief at St. Mary's Hospital, Montreal, was born a Jew in Germany and converted to the Roman Catholic faith in his adoptive country, Canada, at the age of 37. To satisfy the curious, he published, in 1951, his autobiography *The Pillar of Fire*, in which he attempted to explain why he became a Christian. Writing the book also helped to clarify in his mind not only his religious development but the whole fabric of his life, which began in the decade before the First World War in a Bavarian village and which was shaped by the rise of Hitler and the persecution of the Jews, escape to England, and refuge in Canada.

Since *The Pillar of Fire*, he has written *The Third Revolution* (1954); *Through Dooms of Love* (1960); and *The Flight from Woman* (1965), as well as dozens of articles for Canadian, American, British, French, and German periodicals. His most recent book deals with the rejection of the feminine—the intuitive—element in the psychological make-up of both men and women.

We are all bi-sexual, he says, and when we consciously or otherwise destroy this peculiarity by suppressing the elements of one trait or cultivating to excess the other, it results in such types as the "phallic woman" and the "workaholic" man. The latter, frequently found in the executive group, is the type whose life is so work-oriented that he deliberately turns away from the sensitive (the feminine) part of his nature and escapes from passivity and tenderness into the frenzied activity of work. "We find at the bottom of it all," says Dr. Stern, "a maternal conflict and a rejection of the feminine."

The "phallic woman," who is best personified by the Ibsen character Hedda Gabler, is one who develops the masculine traits, re-

jecting her own femininity, and for whom the only kind of relationship with men is one based on competition, rivalry, and envy. In a conversation with Ronald Hambleton on *Project '66*, Sunday at 10:30 p.m. on radio, Dr. Stern elaborates on this, and puts forward some of his recent opinions on the causes resulting in this type of woman.

Dr. Stern is a man of broad cultural development, whose interests spread far beyond the field of medicine. Both he and his wife, and their children are accomplished musicians who, in the Continental manner, perform chamber music at home as a family recreation. "For me," he says, "music is Bach and Mozart. Schubert, I would say, goes closer to the heart than Beethoven, very much warmer." In poetry he enjoys especially the English poets Donne, Blake, and Gerard Manley Hopkins.

Pierre Boulez: '... All composition other than 12-tone is useless.'

"IT IS NOT devilry but only the most ordinary common sense which makes me say that, since the discoveries made by the Viennese, all composition other than 12-tone is useless." A dramatic statement guaranteed to delight the dodecaphonists and raise the hackles on nearly everybody else, but typical of Pierre Boulez. He's an ebullient, freedom-loving Frenchman who is one of the most important of the younger European composer-conductors, and who thinks that the tradition-bound are not only artistically shackled but are imbeciles to boot.

He has tried to introduce into Western music the rhythms and subtleties of the Far East, and to demonstrate the great elasticity and sweep possible in serial technique. Boulez is highly regarded in modern music circles, and although his emotions are frequently violent, he appreciates the importance of self-restraint and discipline in composing as much as, or more than, the conservatives whose blood pressure he escalates.

"At the present stage of history," he says, "the composer's situation demands that he should play the game with the most rational dice and according to the strictest rules he can imagine — yet never forget that, in Mallarmé's phrase, 'A throw of dice will never abolish chance'."

This talented musical trail-blazer is the subject of a radio documentary this week on *CBC Tuesday Night*, February 22nd, at 10:35. Prepared by Canadian composer John Beckwith and producer Irving Glick, it features Boulez discussing his work and his musical ideas in a long conversation with Beckwith, recorded during a visit to Toronto last year to conduct a program of French music for the radio series *Concerts From Two Worlds*. Boulez is heard rehearsing and conducting complete performances of

two of his works; and the program also includes comments on Boulez by eminent French, U.S. and Canadian personalities, such as Jean-Louis Barrault, the actor in whose theatre Boulez has been musical director since he was 22; Robert Craft, the American conductor and musical associate of Igor Stravinsky, who is noted particularly for his interpretations of modern composers' works; Serge Garant of Montreal, a long-time friend of Boulez, whose music Boulez has conducted on many occasions; and Olivier Messaien, one of the composer-teachers who influenced Boulez most. (Messaien's remarks were made in French. Maurice Kurtz, writer and critic, presents the English translation.)

The two Boulez works to be heard (on recordings issued by the CBC International Service) are *Le Soleil des Eaux* and *Doubles*. Some of his most important work is for the voice, such as *Le Soleil des Eaux* (River in the Sun), a cantata for soprano, tenor, men's chorus and orchestra, written in the late 1940s. It's a setting of two poems by surrealist poet René Char, several of whose works he has used as the basis for vocal compositions. *Doubles* (1958) is an interesting example of the clear differentiation between timbres which he makes in his orchestral music. For this particular piece he insists that the performers sit in a new arrangement. "No one will contradict me," he says, "if I state that when tone-colors follow each other rapidly they should not be laboriously delayed because of the obstacle of distance. The ear of our time demands stereophonic listening in its desire for clarity and movement." Although *Doubles* has been performed many times, Boulez says it is unfinished, and he hopes to add more movements to it sometime.

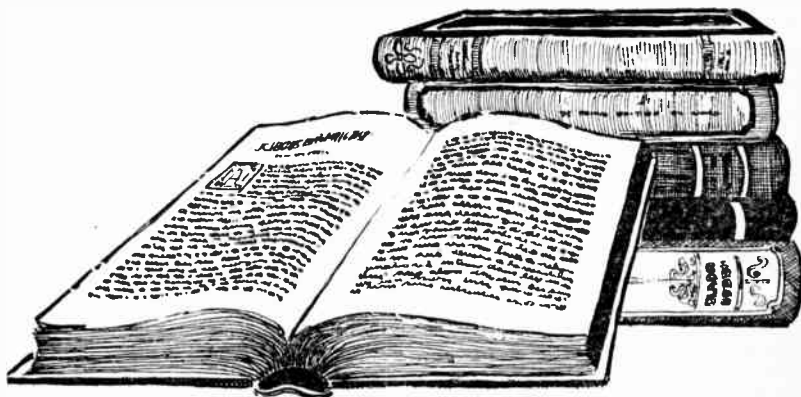

TO THE AVERAGE person of limited means the thought of taking up book-collecting as a hobby may seem like a good idea, but one to be rejected as being too expensive. Three of Canada's noted book-collectors and dealers will be heard on *CBC Tuesday Night* this week discussing their field and offering suggestions for the novice who would like to pursue book-collecting as a hobby, but is daunted by the thought of having to spend thousand or perhaps just hundreds of dollars for rare books.

Louis Melzack, who owns nine book-stores and collects rare books and manuscripts for pleasure, says that you don't have to collect rare imprints and first editions to enjoy the subtle pleasures of collecting. "The point we must realize," he says, "is that the commonplace books of today, those that we look on as commonplace and readily available, are going to become the rare books of tomorrow." He suggests that one area for the beginner that might be especially rewarding is in the field of children's school-books. Such books can be picked up for 25 cents or so. Later, someone who is specializing in a collection of school books may offer quite a lot of money for these books. W. E. Gale, of Vancouver, and Dr. Frank Matheson, of Winnipeg, suggest such subjects as immigration in the Western provinces

in the 18th-19th centuries or the development of wheat farming. There are literally hundreds of books and catalogues which beginners could pick up cheaply now and develop into valuable collections as books on these and similar subjects gradually become harder and harder to find.

Melzack, Gale, and Matheson are, of course, primarily interested in the collection of the more valuable books. Dr. Matheson took up collecting in the late '40s and early '50s as a result of an interest in Western Canada itself, and gradually found himself drawn to the pursuit of books on this subject. He now has a collection of about 2,000. Book collectors are fiercely jealous of their possessions. Gale says that a collector values his books more than his wife—"books are more durable, I guess." Melzack does not permit his maid even to dust them and has a horror of anyone handling them. He says that once deeply committed to rare books, a collector will go to almost any lengths to get what he wants. Matheson sees book-collecting as a manifestation of an inborn human trait, the desire to acquire. Reading can sometimes be only secondary, so that the collector will buy two versions of the same book—the first edition for his collection and a cheap, later publication for reading.

conscience, and in the end it is both his undoing and his salvation. Instead of having conquered morality, he has been vanquished by it.

To adapt even the core of this long and famous exploration of human frailty for television was a monumental task, but it has been skilfully done by George Salverson, for presentation on TV's *Festival* this Wednesday night, February 23rd, at 9:30. Titled *The Murderer*, the 90-minute drama is produced and directed by Paul Almond, with sets by Nikolai Soloviov and costumes by Horst Dantz. They spent a year planning and working on details of this production. The result is a true but decidedly original interpretation of Dostoevsky's mood and period to gladden the heart of any devotee of old Russian literature and life. Some of the sets, representing streets in St. Petersburg, which were built in the parking lot behind the CBC's Sumach Street rehearsal studios in Toronto, were shown in last week's edition of CBC TIMES. St. Peter must have looked kindly upon this evocation of his namesake, because the snow and cold weather which were so necessary for filming the outdoor scenes, arrived in abundance on the eve of the first shooting, after a period of dry, warm weather had threatened to spoil the effects.

The play introduces Paul Koslo, a graduate of the National Theatre School, in his first starring role, as Raskolnikov, the murderer. Also starring are Douglas Rain as Porfir, the police inspector who suspects that the young student is guilty, and who leads him—with flattery, flat statements of fact—and discussions of the theories of crime and guilt—closer and closer to confession. This is Rain's only TV appearance this season; he's devoting his time to stage work, and Almond feels fortunate to have secured his services for this occasion.

TWO NEW PLAYS by Montreal writers, one a comedy about boredom and suspicion, with threatening overtones and a surprise ending, the other an unusual study of crime and guilt, will be presented on CBC radio this week. On Sunday, February 20th, at 1:00 p.m., *CBC Stage* presents *Can I Speak to Shirley?* by David Windsor, with production in the Toronto studios by Esse W. Ljungh, and special background music composed and conducted by Morris Surdin. And on Wednesday night, February 23rd, at 9:00, *Midweek Theatre* presents *A Study in Black and White and Other Colors* by Mac Shoub. It will be produced in the Montreal studios by Rupert Caplan. The original musical score is composed and conducted by Neil Chotem.

The situation in *A Study in Black and White and Other Colors* is this: a young Negro lawyer is summoned to the home of a white millionaire, where he hears an amazing confession of a shocking crime committed by the white man, and an even more astonishing and sinister proposition whereby the Negro would be given one million dollars if he could assuage the other man's terrible sense of guilt.

The lawyer, Noah Goway, is played by Percy Rodriguez; his wife, Easter, by Eileen Clifford; and J. B. Weatherby, the guilty millionaire, by Henry Ramer.

Mac Shoub is a well-known playwright who was last heard from on radio when *Midweek Theatre* presented his drama *The Old Man Says No* on December 1st. Besides writing plays, he works for a large advertising agency. He says, "*A Study in Black and White and Other Colors* is simply my own reaction to the violence manifested in the recent race riots in Watts, California. A feeling seems to exist in the minds of many people that

violence, and violence alone, will bring the ultimate solution of the race problem which now exists on this continent.

Can I Speak to Shirley? is set in New York, where David Windsor lived for two years. It concerns a young couple—she goes out to work, he is trying to write—who move into a new flat where their dissatisfaction with themselves and each other gradually involves other tenants, and comes to a tragic end in a cloud of gossip and suspicion. Tied in with their discord is the problem of a new telephone and a mysterious caller who keeps ringing up and asking for someone they don't know.

David Windsor was born in London, England, in 1930. At 14 he got a job as a messenger-boy with the *New York Times* agency there. Three years later he won a scholarship to the Royal College of Music, where he studied piano for three years and became an Associate. He made a round-the-world trip as a crew member on a passenger liner, then, in 1955, decided to settle in Montreal.

He has been writing for several years. His first script for the CBC was a talk, broadcast from Halifax, on his experiences as a film "extra" in England. He broadcast several piano recitals from Ottawa on CBC radio. He's a great admirer of the writing of Kafka and Proust, and of the plays of Ionesco. Besides several radio plays he has written a novel, short stories, and three stage plays, is working on another novel and on a stage play.

Windsor has many interests outside writing and music. He collects modern paintings and antique furniture—16th- and 17th-century English oak for his Montreal apartment, and early Canadian pine for the 100-year-old log house he is restoring on his Ontario farm.

21 Years of Showing Canada to the World

THIS YEAR the CBC's International Service comes of age — the 21st anniversary of the Service's inauguration occurs this month. Officially launched on February 25th, 1945, the Service began with these aims: to provide members of the Canadian armed services abroad with news and entertainment from home; to project a "picture" of Canada to listeners unfamiliar with our country; to help stimulate trade between Canada and other countries; and to facilitate the international exchange of radio programs.

The anniversary will be marked this week with two special radio programs, both to be heard on Friday evening, February 25th. The first, scheduled for 8:00 p.m., is entitled *Transmission from Tantramar*, a title derived from the fact that CBC International Service transmitters are located in the Tantramar marsh area near Sackville, N.B. This documentary will trace the history of the Service, in many cases using the voices of I.S.

personnel, including the heads of the various language sections. The program will be produced by Robert Brazil; the writer-researcher is Ralph Marven. It will include comment on the value of the Service to Canadians, in such matters as the promotion of immigration and tourism, the strengthening of trade ties, the provision of factual international news for listeners behind the Iron Curtain, and other ways in which the Service benefits the whole of Canada.

Following the documentary program, an *International Service Variety Hour* will be presented at 9:00.

Daily shortwave broadcasts by I.S. are transmitted in 11 languages, beamed from its three 50-kilowatt transmitters at Sackville to Europe, Africa, Latin America, the Caribbean, and Australasia. (Some of the broadcasts to Eastern Europe are re-broadcast by transmitters closer to the countries to which the programs are directed.)

The broadcasts comprise newscasts covering Canada, North America, and the international scene; talks and commentaries; actuality reports; interviews; press reviews; sports coverage; and features on industrial and cultural developments in Canada.

As a program exchange "broker," the I.S. provides CBC's national networks with music of all types from abroad, including recordings made at European music festivals and special concerts. In turn, the Service makes available to foreign broadcasters a good deal of Canadian music on transcriptions.

Although it is primarily a shortwave radio service, the I.S. has in recent years supplied other countries with filmed items for television, as well. More than 20 organizations throughout the world regularly receive a film series entitled *Canadian Magazine*, with a multilingual sound-track.

Comedy hasn't changed much over the years: one of today's most successful jokers takes his style from a Hollywood pioneer.

DICK VAN DYKE, 40, is a trouper in the old tradition. He can play pathos or comedy, he can sing, dance and do pratfalls—the hallmark of the classic comedian.

He uses the full range of his talents in his role as television comedy writer Rob Petrie in *The Dick Van Dyke Show*, seen Tuesdays, at 9:30 p.m. on CBC television.

Van Dyke's idol has always been Stan Laurel, whom he knew personally. He has seen all his films and makes no bones about patterning his style after the late comedian. "I'm very big as a Stan Laurel impressionist," he says. "I've been doing his things all my life."

Van Dyke, who never trained as an actor, now studies the style of Cary Grant, "the wonderful way he underplays."

Dick was born in West Plains, Missouri, and raised in Danville, Illinois. Even as a child he was a comedian, appearing in high school plays, civic theatre productions—anywhere he could get an audience.

After two years in the air force during the Second World War, Van Dyke returned home and, with a friend, opened an advertising agency. The agency lasted one year.

In 1947, he teamed up with an old friend named Philip Ericson in a comedy-pantomime act, and for six years toured the country as a night club duo called The Merry Mutes.

In late 1953 Van Dyke took his family to Atlanta, Georgia, and became host of his own daytime TV program, *The Merry Mute Show* and *The Music Shop*. Two years later, he moved to New Orleans, where he was host of, and performed in, a variety program called *The Dick Van Dyke Show*.

In 1956, Van Dyke got his first TV network break as master of ceremonies on *Cartoon Theatre*. Subsequently, he appeared on such programs as *The Garry Moore Show*, *Ed Sullivan* and *To Tell the Truth*.

In his first Broadway production, *The Girls Against the Boys*, Van Dyke won critical approval. Later he took time off from his starring role in the Broadway hit, *Bye Bye Birdie*, to

make the pilot film for *The Dick Van Dyke Show*. After its success he moved to California.

In his first feature film, *Bye Bye Birdie*, Van Dyke repeated the role he played so successfully on Broadway. His second feature was *Mary Poppins*, in which he starred with Julie Andrews.

His other motion pictures include *What a Way to Go*, *The Art of Love* and most recently, *Lieutenant Robinson Crusoe*.

For Dick Van Dyke, life is larger than art. The once-a-week world he experiences on *The Dick Van Dyke Show* looms small against the background of the everyday world he knows at home in Encino, Los Angeles, California.

The TV Van Dyke has a wife, a son and one adventure every Tuesday evening. The Encino Van Dyke has a wife, childhood sweetheart Marjorie Willett of Danville; and four exuberant children, Christian, 15, Barry, 14, Stacy, 10, and Carrie Beth, 4.
