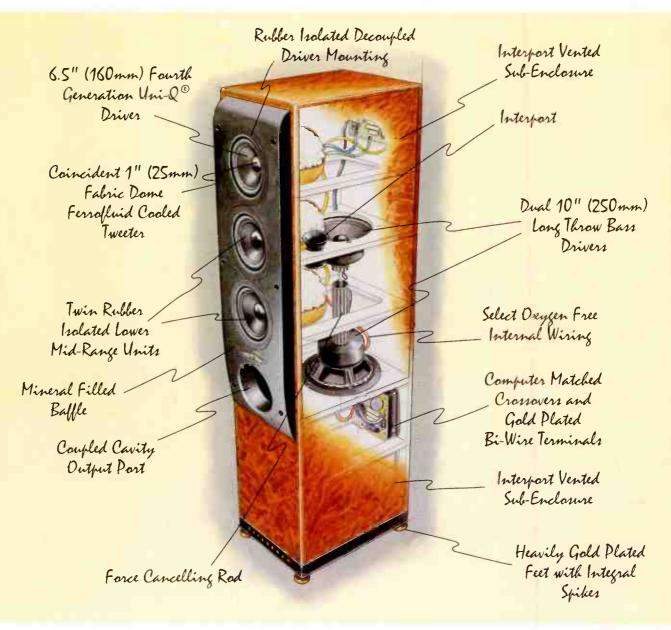

t's strange how two such different technologies can run parallel in hi-fi. I was reminded of this by Sonic Frontiers' CD transport and convertor reviewed this month on page 50. It uses Pacific Microsonics' HDCD filter to get superb sound off CD, but has valves in its output stage. Here are two technologies with nearly 70 years between them working in harmony towards one common goal - a better sound.

I'm sure valve amplifiers are partly responsible for fuelling the demand for a higher resolution CD too, which incidentally is still commonly benchmarked against LP. The valve is making a come-back in all areas of audio, many preferring its smoother, more musical sound - quite the opposite of CD. But are the valve and the LP old technologies waiting to be put to rest by digital, or in our race for something new have we left behind better technologies before they were fully explored?

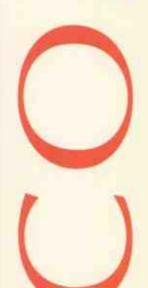

At a press conference held in Dublin at the beginning of June, both Tannoy and Marantz, who now share distribution, announced new ranges of equipment. We were there to report.

TANNOY'S NEW LOUDSPEAKERS

Both of Tannoy's key domestic ranges, the Profile and Definition series loudspeakers, have seen new models and upgrades. The Definition series gets two new hi-fi models, the D300s and D900s, while the D500s get an improved crossover. The D300 uses the same 6.5" dual-concentric driver as the existing D100, but in a floorstanding cabinet, the price may fall just below £1,000. Using a 12" dual-concentric midrange and treble alongside a 12" bass driver, the D900s sit at the top of the range. Price has yet to be announced.

In line with the 631SEs we reviewed recently, all of the trapezium shaped Profile series,

now known as Profile Plus, come with MDF cabinet tops. This is said to improve cabinet rigidity and lower coloration. A new addition to the range is the £450 Profile Plus 635 using a single 8" dual-concentric driver in a floorstanding cabinet. There is also a new active subwoofer, the 625 ALFie, based on the £599.90 625 ALF. This benefits from improved electronics (hence the 'ie') and a price of £499.90.

Tannoy are also working on a new model for their Prestige range. Using their newly developed Super Dual, a dual-concentric driver with massive power handling and high efficiency, expect it to come in at around £20,000. There are no other details yet, but we'll keep you posted.

NEW ELECTRONICS FROM MARANTZ

Audiophiles will be pleased to know that there are new additions to Marantz's SE range, including an amplifier to join the CD-63 MkII KI-Signature.

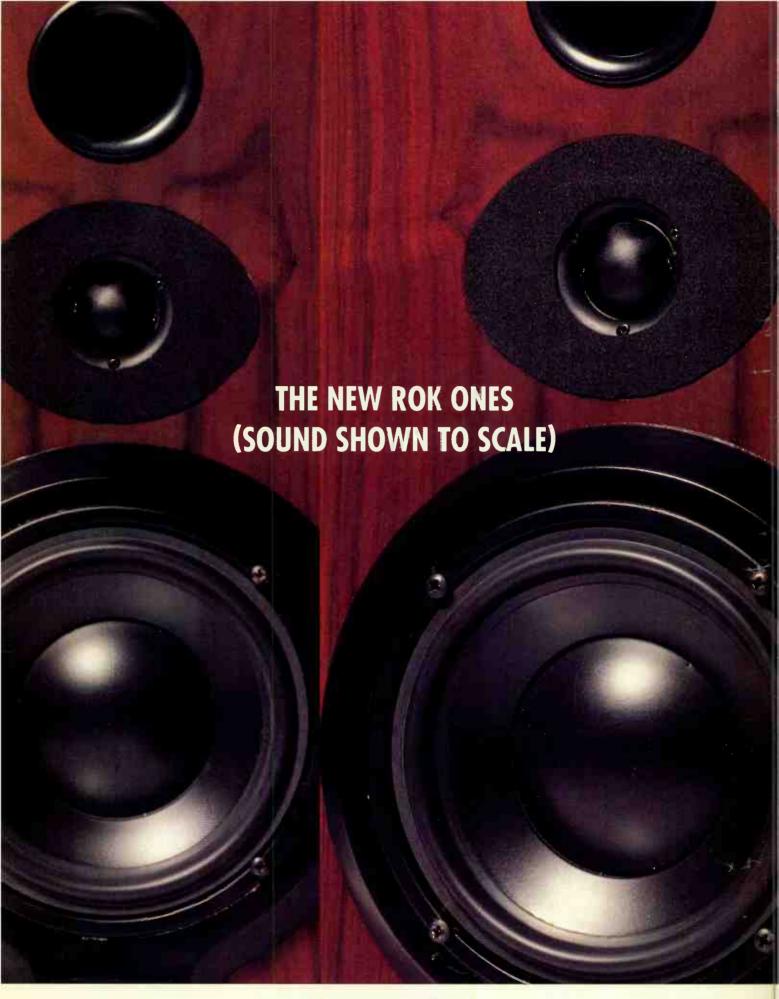
The PM-66SE amplifier is a minimalist design with no tone controls, an up-rated power supply and customised components. The CD-67SE has a copper-plated chassis and copper-shielded HDAM output stage, a larger transformer, OFC wiring and an additional bottom plate to improve rigidity. A CD-17SE and a Kl-Signature amplifier are due shortly as well, but at present no further details are available.

Also on display were The Legends, based on original Marantz valve models. The Model 7 pre-amplifier and Model 8B power amplifier were demonstrated with a pair of Tannoy Canterbury 15s, and a single Model 9 monoblock was also on show. Again, prices have yet to be determined.

Hi-fi additions to the standard range are: PM-47 and PM-57 amplifiers, SR-47 receiver, ST-57 tuner, CD-67 CD player, DR-12 CD recorder and SD555 cassette deck.

MISSION 754 FREEDOM 5 LOUDSPEAKER

Our man in the States, Andrew Keen, was on hand in New York to see the talk of the Hi-Fi '96 Home Theater and Specialty Show.

Unveiled by Henry Azima, Mission's chief designer, the 754
Freedom 5 loudspeaker is a floorstanding three-way design with a
healthy sensitivity of 90dB. The bi-wireable driver line-up features a
silk-dome tweeter, Aerogel midrange unit and 8" treated
polypropylene woofer. The enclosure is a hybrid design, using a
sealed chamber for midrange and tweeter and tuned bass reflex
loading for the woofer.

The clarity and poise of the \$3000 754s, driven by a small army of Cyrus electronics, turned all heads at the Waldorf-Astoria, proving once again that relatively affordable British hi-fi can indeed compete at the highest international level.

BAG END SUBWOOFER SYSTEM

Aimed towards the home cinema/theatre market as well as owners of Quad ESL and similar ribbon/panel loudspeakers, the new Bag End Subwoofer System is being imported from the US by the De-Regle Group.

The S18E subwoofer features an 18" driver housed in a 22" x 22" x 19" box and can handle up to 400 watts of power with a claimed 90Hz to 8Hz flat response. Stereo operation is available with the addition of the ELF1 outboard electronic crossover which also offers 90 independently selectable switches (45 per channel) to

control settings for gain and crossover frequencies. System prices range from £1500 to £4500.

The £2350 Sculpture One is fitted with a 142mm bass driver and a 28mm soft dome tweeter giving a claimed overall

frequency response of 60Hz to 20kHz and a power handling of 120 watts.

At £2938 the Sculpture Two has a hand treated tweeter and a larger 180mm bass driver to cope with 150 watts and a response down to 40Hz. Slate stands are also available.

GOODBYE TO THE JITTERS



In an effort to rid digital reproduction of the problems associated with jitter, Meridian have provided their latest DAC, the 566, with a twin Phase-Lock Loop.

This PLL system, which was first aired in the 263, has been further developed in the 566 to give the 20-bit convertor accurately clocked digits to work with. The Delta-Sigma DAC chip itself is based on work carried out by Crystal Semiconductor in consultation with Meridian, who claim that the use of this chip allied to the 566's low jitter levels produce better transparency, dynamics and soundstaging.

All this and Comms capability (allowing the DAC to be remotely controlled in a wholly Meridian system) can be yours for £995.

ATTENTION SEEKING ADONIS

Guaranteed to charm the life of any jaded soldering iron is the new Adonis valve amplifier kit from Northern Ireland based manufacturer Arion. This 20 watt Class A integrated amplifier has five line stages and a tape facility and



boasts the use of military spec valves. These include the input's 5814s, the 6SN7s in the driver stage and the Russian 5881s at its output. 4 and 8 ohm 'speaker taps are provided and the sockets and 'speaker terminals themselves are gold-plated.

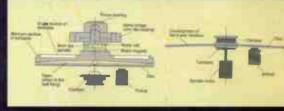

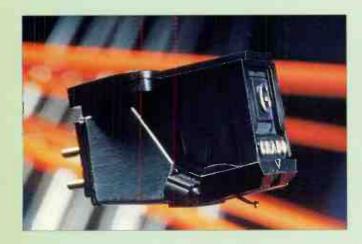

MAKING THE GRADO



Good news for all those impecunious audiophiles who continue to carry a torch for the good old black stuff.
Goldring Products, Grado's UK distributor, have just launched the £49 Prestige Black moving magnet cartridge.

This claims to produce a better soundstage and more detail than its competitors through the use of Optimised Transmission Line Technology. This consists of reducing the resonances at the junctions between the stylus, cantilever, magnet and coils. The low mass tip uses a specially designed elliptical diamond to give a high output of 5mV up to a claimed 50kHz, so any neighbouring bats will also be able to listen in.

A NEW REFERENCE

June 1996 sees the launch of the new AEI and AE2 Reference Series II loudspeakers from Acoustic Energy.

Replacing the original 'speakers which were launched in 1988, these latest models have been acoustically re-engineered to provide a 3dB increase in bass efficiency and improved bass response. Further developments have also been made to the crossovers and internal wiring to improve dynamics and power handling. Available in a choice of Black Satin, Rosewood or Piano Black, these new versions are priced at £795 and £1095 respectively.

Also due for release is the new £329.95
AE109, a slimline three-way floorstander which can be bi-wired. The 18mm MDF cabinet (finished in either Black Ash or Rosewood) is fitted with two magnetically shielded 110mm mid/bass units and a 25mm soft dome tweeter. The upper mid/bass driver fires through twin front ports, while the lower bass-only driver fires through a high power flared port to the rear.

World Radio History

PRO-ACTIVE



Delving into the professional world of audio always provides an interesting insight into how things are done on the 'other side'. I spotted the AMS8s springing up in proliferation across a wide range of professional audio magazines just a month or so back and was intrigued. They are a compact design aimed towards active studio monitoring. There's a more thorough technical description on page 17 and in our measured performance section starting on page 103.

Because they are active, all you need to get the AMS8s up and running is a source and a pre-amplifier. Oh, and a length of interconnect with XLR connectors at one end. They'll take a balanced or single-ended input signal, and input sensitivity is variable. In fact, at maximum sensitivity they could be

HF contour. LF contour extends bass from 47Hz to 38Hz, but with low bass below 30Hz rolling off faster so that power handling isn't compromised. HF contour provides up to 3dB of treble boost or cut, allowing you to take the AMS8s from very bright to very dull. Driven from a Sugden AU51 preamplifier and in a medium size listening room I found the best balance with the bass contour on and treble contour just a smidgen above flat.

This set-up was arrived at after a few hours' experimentation. The AMS8s were a touch too dry without the bass contour on, but had a tinge of richness otherwise. Normally I'd have gone for the drier bass, which usually seems to give better definition and quality. But here the Tannoys didn't seem to compromise, staying taut and tuneful.

The power amplifier and active electronics are housed behind the metal back-plate. There are controls for treble cut and boost, bass boost and sensitivity.

used with a passive pre-amplifier, but because of the long lengths of interconnect you are likely to use to separate the loudspeakers, the high frequency roll-off caused by cable capacitance makes this inadvisable.

Also 'round the back is a switch for LF contour and a variable control for

And the richness was a pleasant one, fruity and fulsome. So treble was boosted very slightly, perhaps 0.25dB or so, to balance the bottom end and give me the extra detail and insight I wanted. That did it nicely.

One of the things I found most gratifying about the AMS8s was their

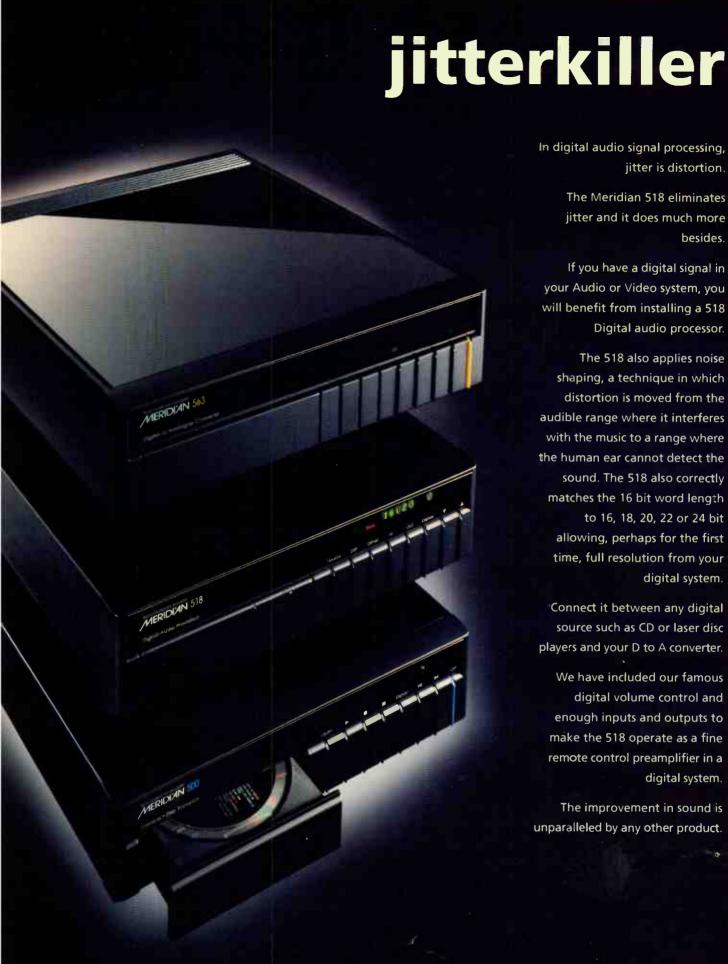
boldness with all types of music. Bjork's 'Hyper-ballad' was forcefully portrayed, vocals strong and forward with bass thumping along below. It was fast and dynamic, with a hard crack to transients that placed the notes resolutely in the soundstage. Bjork's 'Crying' placed keyboards firmly as well, with seismic weight behind the electronic punch of each note. The AMS8s were also exacting at the top end. There's little splashiness to confuse or muddle cymbals which had a sharply metallic edge and cut cleanly.

Something that's been interesting me recently is the inability of the majority of hi-fi loudspeakers to play more up-beat, hardcore dance music. The powerful electronic bass lines and high bpms seem to leave most in tatters, struggling to stay in one piece, let alone keep a grip on the tempo. 'Nautilus' on the Blue Room Released label, a spin off of Blue Room loudspeakers and B&W, showed that these professional boxes don't fall into the same trap. As bass lines swelled and tempo increased, the AMS8s held their own. It may be electronic, but this is serious stuff for a loudspeaker to cope with. Treble extends right up and is full and strong, while bass is deep and loud. All this happens at a ferocious pace, but the AMS8s stayed clean and uncompressed at high levels.

But these are areas that you'd expect a professional monitor loudspeaker to cope with - it's their job. But what of fidelity and the finer points of hi-fi? With real instruments in a natural acoustic, Teenage Fanclub's Grand Prix album set the next test. Passing with distinction, the AMS8s had little problem delivering the wide open and spacious sound I'd hoped for.

More impressively though, from woody resonance of cello to the lighter timbre of viola and on through crisply detailed violins, the Tannoys displayed fine tonal accuracy. I'm sure their sturdily built professional cabinets helped here, keeping coloration under wraps. The plasticy coloration of the dual-concentric cone too seems better under control than in previous guises.

Also improved considerably from previous Dual-Concentrics I've heard



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was treble quality. In a conventional loudspeaker, strong transients in the bass produce amplifier harmonics that are reproduced by the tweeter. In an active system, because the amplifiers are separate, this effect is eliminated, giving cleaner treble. From P. J. Harvey's album To Bring You My Love, 'C'mon Billy' showed how crisp and sweet the AMS8s could be in the higher registers. Polly's vocal had a large stage to play upon, above which strings echoed deliciously, rich with clear harmonics.

A quick spin on the turntable, a Pink Triangle Anniversary complete with Graham 1.5 tonearm and Ortofon MC3000, further confirmed my feelings. On Massive Attack's 'Better Things', Tracey Thorn's vocal was tonally pure and expressive in its delivery.

Percussion was sharply defined, but smooth with it. Imaging, as with every quality recording I played, was first rate, a characteristic of the dual-concentric arrangement.

Like the IBL S2600s I reviewed a couple of months back, the Tannoy AMS8s stand out as something quite special, both sonically and in engineering ability. They are a top quality monitor with a clean and refined sound. The active electronics allow a useful amount of control over their performance while keeping system wiring neat. And if you like your music loud, there are few domestic loudspeakers that will match their uncompressed and natural sound at high levels. Search 'em out, they're worth it.

SOUND ACTIVITY

Tannoy's AMS8s are an active loudspeaker. Dominic Baker explains how an active loudspeaker works and what its advantages are.

Jannoy's AMS8s are an active monitor loudspeaker primarily designed for near-field studio monitoring. For this specific task there are many design considerations that need to be addressed, which Tannoy have done especially well in the AMS8s. Here's what they're about.

A MONITOR LOUDSPEAKER

A loudspeaker like the Tannoy AMS8 is used for monitoring in a recording studio. It is what the recording engineer will listen to as the balance of a track is set. It is, therefore, of great importance that the monitor used is accurate. It needs to have a very flat frequency response, good phase characteristics,

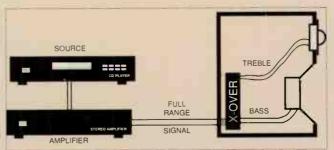
wide bandwidth, low colouration, or in other words, be as near to transparent as possible.

WHAT IS AN ACTIVE LOUDSPEAKER!

Before I describe what an active loudspeaker is, it is perhaps best to first

describe how a conventional loudspeaker works. In a hi-fi system, the signal from your CD player is boosted by the amplifier to drive the loudspeakers. This signal covers the whole audio bandwidth, or in simpler terms runs all the way from the lowest bass up to the highest treble.

Making up the loudspeaker there are normally two different sized cones housed in drive units that turn this electrical signal into sound. This size difference is necessary for accurate reproduction of the music - bass sounds need a large cone that can move a lot of air, whereas treble sounds need a



In a conventional system, a fullrange signal is fed to the loudspeakers. Inside, a passive crossover divides hass and treble frequencies.



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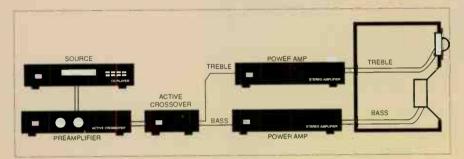
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lighter, smaller and faster cone for good reproduction. So, the full range signal from the amplifier has to be divided up so that the bass part goes to the bass wider tolerance - for example a typical capacitor used in a passive crossover will have a 20% tolerance. Because the components used in an active crossover



In an active system, bass and treble frequencies are divided electronically, then fed to separate power amplifiers. Each power amplifier only drives one dedicated drive unit.

TANNOY'S DUAL CONCENTRIC

Tannoy's AMS8s were designed for near-field monitoring. They would typically be placed by the control desk in a recording studio within a few metres of the engineer. Because of this they need to have a coherent and focused sound close up; Tannoy's Dual-Concentric drive unit is ideally suited.

In the AMS8s a 6" Dual-Concentric driver is used. Pioneered by Tannoy in the early 50s, the Dual-Concentric driver is a bass cone with a centrally mounted tweeter. This means that all of the sound it produces originates from a single central point, providing stable imaging and focus, ideal for near-field monitoring

unit and treble part to the treble unit.

This dividing of the signal is done with a simple electrical circuit housed within the loudspeaker. This is called a crossover because it directs the relevant part of the signal to the correct cone and controls the point where the response of the bass cone crosses over to that of the treble.

In an active system the crossover comes before the amplifier instead of after it. The signal is divided up into bass and treble parts by an active crossover and then sent to separate bass and treble amplifiers which feed the loudspeaker drive units directly. Of course twice as many amplifiers are needed, but it does have its advantages.

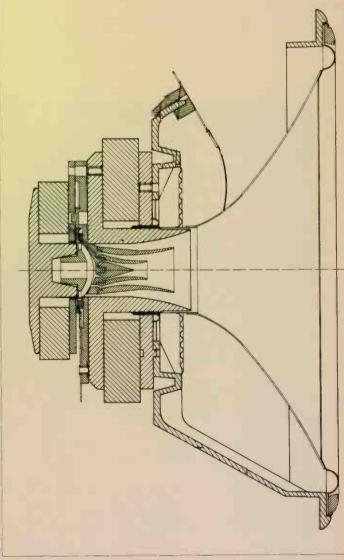
WHY ACTIVE!

The easiest way to explain why an active system is used is to outline a few of its advantages. Here goes:

- I. In an active system the power amplifiers are connected directly to their respective drive units, giving them greater control over cone movement. Having a dedicated amplifier for each driver also means that it has an easier time driving that particular cone.
- 2. In a passive system, because the crossover is driven by the power amplifier, the components need to be large to handle the high levels of power. Larger components tend to have a

only have to handle tiny amounts of power they are smaller and of higher precision (they can be as tightly toleranced as 0.1%). This means that an active crossover can be much more accurately designed than a passive one.

- 3. Frequency response, phase and other aspects of a loudspeaker drive unit's performance can be more easily compensated for in an active crossover. In other words the signal can be equalised to give a better response.
- 4. Because the power amplifier is connected directly to the drive unit in an active system, it is more efficient. In a conventional passive crossover each of the components absorbs a little power, so the more components used the less efficient the system becomes and the more power is needed from the amplifier.

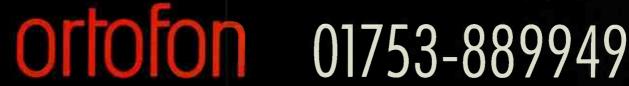
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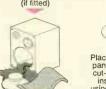
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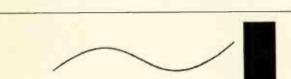
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t's not often nowadays
that we see a new arrival in
the turntable market, but that's
not to say that there isn't any demand.
Following the introduction of CD there

after the initial crash, we're now left

These remaining followers of the black disc have a strong passion for their LPs, developed over years of collecting music. They are a discerning bunch, driven on by the quest for quality rather than convenience. This shows in the marketplace too; CD may be king in the

high street chains, but vinyl is still strongly represented further up-market. Echoing this, Systemdek's latest turntable joins the top end of their range at £499.95.

Systemdek's 2X2 is essentially very similar to their IIX, but with a differently arranged drive system. In the 2X2 the motor is now mounted in isolation from the sub-chassis and plinth, and drive hub and sub-platter use a different geometry. It is these improvements, Systemdek claims, that

and an Ortofon Rohmann MC.

Roger Waters' Radio Kaos album provided the initial impression of the 2X2. Its dry, analytical midband clearly highlighted the harshness in Waters' vocal and the sharp crash of snare drum on 'Who Needs Information'. The brassy honk of trumpet also pushed hard; forward in the sound stage it dominated proceedings. This is exactly as it should be and as recorded on these first few tracks. result in lower motor noise and associated vibration, which in turn allow more detail to be dug from the grooves. A machined acrylic platter has been chosen too, which from past experience seems to be the most neutral material to use.

Setting up the Systemdek 2X2 is a fairly straight-forward task. Once the transit bolt is out, the arm-board can be removed making it easy to bolt the tonearm, in this case an SME 309, in place. With the arm-board loosely fitted, tonearm wires dressed and the platter on, the suspension is levelled with three top-mounting hex-bolts to leave a 5mm clearance all around. The arm-board can then be straightened within its cut-out to complete the job.

I had to swap over to the stiffer springs supplied by Systemdek for the 309 arm, but I suspect that most will live with an RB300, which the existing springs are intended for. The 309 is a useful tool when auditioning a deck; with a couple of spare head-shells handy, cartridges can be very quickly swapped. I used an Ortofon MC25 FL for the majority of my listening, which tuned itself well to this set-up, but also had on hand a Goldring 1022GX MM

It has a steely clarity, but on a turntable there is no unecessary emphasis. The 2X2 sailed through unhindered, staying clear and focused throughout.

The last track on the album, 'The Tide is Turning', showed off the 2X2's agility in the bass. Although not as deep as a Roksan, or as taut as a Gyrodec, it was certainly not a long way off in quality. It possesses a super upper bass punch that comes across with real conviction. Driving the rhythm along in Jamiroquai's 'Mr Moon', plucked bass guitar too had a deep, powerful thud, with the characteristic hardness of this style of bass strongly described.

Rhythmically, the 2X2 is impressively sure-footed. It doesn't dig the lowest notes out of the grooves with quite the same authority as more up-market decks, but it leaves the path clear for the upper bass to show its form. Its dynamic agility as it scales basslines helps it keep a tight grip on proceedings.

The acrylic platter, in a similar vein

to Pinks, Voyds and Michells, seems to bring the 2X2 a natural smoothness of tone along with great treble resolution, aided by the smoother drive system. Gracefully sweeping along with the string sections in Vivaldi's Four Seasons, a fone recording on 180gm virgin vinyl, the air and space around the performance created a real sense of atmosphere. Violins played effortlessly and notes decayed gently as the harmonics petered out.

At the end of a week's listening I must say that I could find little to fault in the 2X2's midrange and treble. Its fine resolution creates a wide acoustic within which imagery is pin-sharp, especially with a good MC like the MC25 FL. Perhaps a little more presence in the midrange and a more incisive treble could be sought after, but only by those looking several leagues higher in price.

Bass doesn't quite plumb the depths the way a similarly priced Thorens can, but at the end of the day this is more than compensated for in its upper bass speed and dexterity. So, I feel the Systemdek 2X2 is a welcome addition to the world of vinyl. It is well aimed, falling into an area that LP12s, Roksans, Pinks and Gyros have slowly priced themselves out of over the years. CD may be developing fast, but that doesn't mean the turntable's world has stopped turning.

hink Danish, and apart from pastries, the country means loudspeakers from Jamo or Dali. he Chord Company, however, has iscovered a name new to us: System udio. The 1005 could come from a ludspeaker design textbook. Rated at 0dB it is a £299 two-way, with a soft ome tweeter and 95mm paper bass one, in a vinyl-wrapped Medite box.

not quite as holographic as it could have been, but it had a believable timbre free of boxy colorations.

The asymmetric tweeter layout meant that vocals were well placed in the centre of the stage and possessed fine body and realism. The downside, was a lack of the kind of ultimate width which something like an Epos ETT or IPL M2 can create. A simple classical

piece from Johann Pachelbel proved pleasantly 'open' and 'breezy' sounding. Again, the System Audios simply hinted at the lower bass notes rather than imbuing them with real impact, but the overall balance was still involving and showed

fine insight into the structure of the music.

What struck me listening to Sheryl Crow's Tuesday Night Music Club album was how articulate and transparent the vocals were. Even the TDL RT2s sounded cloudy by comparison. The percussion was layered and orderly without becoming brash or forward. Although 'We Do What We Can' demonstrated a lack of deep bass, it went as low as could be expected for a 'speaker of this size. What bass there was never overhung or compromised the overall coherence

of the sound, seamlessly blending with the mid-range and extending enough to underpin the rhythm.

Used with a Pioneer A-400 and on 24in stands a foot from the rear wall, bi-wiring made the sound of the 1005s a little less cohesive and engaging. Single-wired, it suited the A-400 well on a wide range of music. Just the fact that is free from any major foibles iis grounds for recommendation at this price.

However, if organ or bass-dominated dance music is your main musical diet, then the System Audio 1005's aren't really up to it. Both the TDL RTL2 and Tannoy 633 do better for this sort of money. With large orchestral pieces, like most small 'speakers, they didn't have the scale to accurately convey the dynamics of the music as effectively as a bigger box. All the same, within its limitations, the 1005 is a cracking good little loudspeaker for the money.

TWEAKING TAPED

Tweaked up, Denon's new DRM-650S cassette deck did a great job with Noel Keywood's tapes. Will it do as well in the shops?

hey may not be super-fi, but tapes like The Beatles' Revolver, Ashkenazy playing Chopin and Orbison singing Elvis Costello demand to be played. I've collected them at airports and railway stations for my Walkman. But for my trusty Nakamichi ZX-9, I'd stand little chance of hearing these tapes properly, since most recorders carelessly muffle their sound and bend their pitch. Standing out from the crowd in this respect, Denon's new DRM-650S cassette deck got off to a fine

start, sounding clear and dynamic with prerecordeds. Its transport, although a humble single-capstan type, held impressively steady even on the long sustains within a Chopin Nocturne. But this was the second sample; the first was less of a success. It had been misadjusted by Denon, more of which later.

Denon are obviously aiming to give good value with this deck. It's priced at just £229.99 but comes fitted with Dolby 'S' noise reduction, which eliminates hiss completely, even with ferrics. It also has a built-in head/tape overload prevention scheme (peak companding) that works right across the audio band, giving cleaner high-level treble and bass. Otherwise, the new 650S is fairly conventional, but it has some nice touches. Two tune systems are included: automatic for non-technical users and manual for better control of the final sound balance. There's music search, timer start, automatic tape type selection and automatic zero-stop.

Although it can't boast a powered door, it does have a neat fluorescent record level display and a nicely ergonomic set of logic controls. With a headphone outlet and volume control, plus a timer and even a remote control sensor (the handset is extra) this deck appears to offer whatever facility might be required.

The transport is a simple single-capstan type, but I used two samples and both held speed very well, even with critical piano recordings. Denon finish their products well and the DRM-650S was easy enough to use.

Measurement showed our first sample was unbalanced in its replay frequency response, one channel having more high frequency gain than the other. This affected prerecorded tapes and recordings, pulling the stereo stage to one side.

We asked for a second sample and this, surprisingly, had treble lift on both left and right replay channels. This in itself would be a good thing. However, all recordings showed treble lift too, so

it was adversely affecting recording quality.

Denon were adjusting the replay frequency response to get good results with prerecorded tapes, taking little notice of the affect this has on recordings. Quite obviously, the deck had not been designed to give the performance we were getting. Metal tape in particular was made to sound very bright, but ferrics and chromes could be tuned to give a normal balance and they worked very well. I just hope Denon adjust all DRM-650Ss to give similar results, otherwise those reaching the high street will sound considerably more dull and muffled with prerecorded tapes than ours did.

I wasn't surprised to find that both

tune systems, automatic and manual, had no affect on metal tape frequency response. With a steep treble peak (+4dB at 10kHz) it was inevitable that recordings would sound bright. Luckily, they were also agreeably smooth and quite clean on cymbals, hi-hats and other percussion. Albums like Songhai 2, with its Latin American rhythms embellished by a lot of percussion, came across as a little thin, rather than sharp. Metal tape was usable, although I suspect few would bother, since chromes and ferrics give similar or better results at less cost when used with Dolby S.

I wasn't so happy with the sound from TDK SA chrome bias tape - it sounded a bit vague and muggy across the top end. The real star was TDK AD ferric tape. After tuning in this gave strong bass and well etched treble. The synth stabbed hard around Betty Boop, in 'Hey DJ, I Can't Dance To That Music You're Playing', and the bass beat

punched out well. When a cassette deck has a weak head, one that cannot handle high magnetic flux levels, it's best to use a good ferric tape. That's why the DRM-650S produced excellent recordings with TDK AD. No matter what I recorded, from Rock through to Classical the DRM-650S sounded clean, clear and stable.

With prerecorded tapes the Denon produced plentiful bass. Our second sample in particular possessed a clarity that few decks could match, other than NADs and Yamahas equipped with Play Trim. These attributes came together nicely to give great results from all my prerecordeds. The bass wasn't as tight and well defined as that of my Nakamichi ZX-9 (used as a reference), but it was plenty good enough considering the price. The Nak was more precise in its rendition of high treble too, through accurate Dolby (B) tracking, but again most people would not consider differences between it and the Denon embarrassingly great. And not once did I hear either of our two samples waver with piano.

For the price, Denon's new DRM-650S gave great results, or, at least, our second sample did. I hope Denon tweak the decks they send to the shops equally well

HEAVYWEIGHT BOXER

aving almost suffered a hernia on lifting TEAC's VRDS-25 CD player out of its box, I knew at least that in terms of build quality alone it should see off a lot of its biscuit box competitors. What was popping my vertebrae was a 15mm thick aluminium fascia on an 11Kg chassis.

Strengthening the chassis internally are three aluminum panels which also minimise electrical interference between the DAC, the transport and the main power supply. The final vibration reducing touch is added by four upward facing conical feet which locate in cups at each corner of the player. In combination with TEAC's proprietary Vibration-free Rigid Disc-clamping System transport, this all adds up to quite an impressive attempt to provide the DAC with the cleanest possible signal.

For £1299.95 that's a lot of metal and in material terms the VRDS-25 looks like very good value for money. The addition of a remote control really is the icing on the cake (the remote is even available in Gold to match the Gold front plate that an extra £50 buys).

In electronic terms the VRDS-25 features four Analog Devices 20-Bit DACs which feed their signals to a 25-Bit 8-times oversampling digital filter before the final third-order Butterworth filtering. Analogue outputs are via standard RCA sockets as well as XLRs while digital is catered for with an electrical co-axial and optical TOS-Link.

It was time to get reacquainted with a favourite old silver disc of mine, Yazoo's You And Me Both. Alison Moyet's voice was as powerfully expressive and plaintive as ever. It emerged clearly above the drum machine which loped through 'Nobody's Diary' in an engagingly loose manner - not loose as in uncontrolled but loose as in rhythmically expressive, allowing the bass line room to breathe. Imaging was rather fuzzy around the edges though, and soundstaging a little restricted.

'Softly Over' showed up a veiling in the midrange which denied Alison Moyet's voice its proper projection and the synth lines failed to make it past the plane across the front of the speakers. Switching amplification from the Audiolab 8000S to the 8000Q pre and 8000M monoblocs helped to tease some extra space out of the TEAC's presentation, but it was still rather unforthcoming.

Hoping to find a more airy feel I changed Yazoo for a Country corker entitled Live From Robert's which showcases the inspiringly named BR5-49. This is five dodgy geezers, who sound a bit like a cross between the Stray Cats and every ropy country tune ever produced, strutting their stuff at Robert's Western World in Nashville. The second track, 'Hillbilly Thang' flew along with real vivacity through the TEAC. The soundstaging benefited somewhat from the clean bar room recording, with the murmur of background conversation and clinking beer glasses coming across loud and

The hilarious '18 Wheels and a Crowbar', the tale of an insomniac trucker's revenge on a roller-skate driving nerd, didn't fare quite as well as the previous track. Here the slower pace of the bass line seemed to cause problems for the VRDS-25 rhythmically, producing a slightly dragging effect. The midrange and bass, while they matched

each other reasonably well with a warm and slightly thick feel, didn't seem to fit comfortably with a rather brighter and more incisive treble. The energetic climax to this song had the TEAC rather confused in the bass while percussion and the audience's applause sounded divorced from the rest of the mix.

Tori Amos' superbly recorded Boys
For Pele album found the TEAC
producing a reasonable soundstage,
although it still seemed below par for
the asking price. Harpsichord on 'Talula'
possessed a fresh and dynamic edge as
did mandolin and the guitars used in this
song. Electric bass too was nicely
pungent in its upper register.
Unfortunately, the lower bass notes
were a bit of a let down, with the tomtom on the intro booming and electric
bass sounding amorphous.

I have to say that after the initial impression created by the TEAC's build quality, sonically it was rather disappointing. There was a lack of integration between the rather full midrange and bass and the more dynamic treble; soundstaging and imaging also left a little to be desired. Audition with care

ON HUNGARIAN HI-FI ET AL

Haider Bahrani listens to Hungarian manufacturer Etalon's Exception loudspeakers along with their Integral I and Exampli amplifiers.



randed Etalon, this equipment hails from the capital of goulash, apple strudel and many good restaurants - Budapest in Hungary. The £2,590 Exception loudspeakers are three way floorstanders made from cherry wood (granite version also available), and the £1,965 Integral 1 amplifier is a 50watt per channel class A solid state machine. This has two inputs (one line, the other for an optional phono stage that wasn't supplied for review) and one record out. Other options available, including more inputs and a better power supply, are extra.

In looks, and in some ways sound, this Etalon pair are a re-telling of Beauty and the Beast. The beauty is the speakers, which should complement most living rooms and have compliments paid by many a guest. On the other hand the Integral, although an improvement on another one of their amplifiers I had waiting in the wings (the Exampli), had little to say for itself in the way of looks. The phrase, 'blends in' would be more apt.

Soundwise, there was much to be admired with this set up. Bass and lower midrange reproduction were amongst the most natural I have ever heard. Imaging, if not excellent, was very good indeed, with my reservations aimed mainly at the top end.

Boys For Pele, Tori Amos' most recent CD, was sitting in the Audiolab 8000CDM transport in our listening

room so I selected 'Mr Zebra'. The pedals on her piano, as with the tunes from her fingers, were clear. 'Father Lucifer' was much the same, her voice sparkling, although perhaps sparkling a little too much and showing off an upper midrange that could at times become a touch too hard and forward.

Changing CD to listen to the Christians' 'Forgotten Town', the first impression was of an open and lively sound, with bass allowed as much room to express itself as the lead vocalist. Truthful reproduction of all the parts of a piece of music is one thing; getting them in the right order is another. The Integral with the Exceptions passed on nearly all counts. I say nearly because although I found the bass and lower mid band behaviour exceptional, crash and ride cymbals were not so clearly defined and there was still some vocal 'shout' at

times. I needed to find out if this was down to the speakers or the amplifier, so my next job was to switch over to the Audiolab 8000M monoblocs I'm used to.

Here, the story began to rewrite itself. Tori and her playing sank right into the background. The top end though was tamed down, evening out with just about everything else. The soundstage, to say the least, was retarded compared to the Integral 1.

Having kept Etalon's cheaper (£1475) Exampli amplifier in the wings long enough, I felt it was now time to bring it out on stage. Rated at 40watts per channel, its behaviour didn't differ much from the Audiolabs. The sound was dry, very good with dynamics, giving an equal say to all parts of the sonic spectrum. Compared to anything other than its big brother, its marriage with the Exceptions is a good one, giving a faithful if not awe inspiring reproduction of

everything coming out in the correct order. But compared with the Integral I, despite its little top end niggles, both the Audiolabs and the Exampli came a poor second when played through the Exception loudspeakers.

To be able to excite me to the point where I'm actually referring to the Audiolabs in such ordinary terms says more for the quality of the Exampli, and especially the Integral I, than just about anything else. Our Hungarian friends seem to be showing us a thing or two about how it's done.

Reverting to my original line-up, I set out to try some more music. Paul Young's No Parlez album is as much an icon of the early eighties as red braces and the Filofax. 'Wherever I Lay My Hat' was his biggest hit in those days and it was with me today too. The control in the bass was near exemplary, whilst the instruments showed fine separation. OK, so the



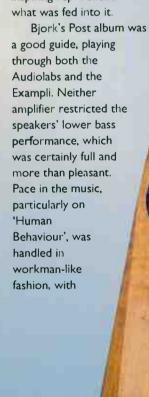

treble shouted a bit, but this was partially remedied by having the speakers toed-in to cross in front of me, rather than firing straight at me.

Any gripes I have about this equipment are as much due to price as anything else. When all is said and done, the Exception loudspeakers are very good indeed, and both amplifiers have their merits. A little less shouting and the Integral I would really be something to shout about

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Jon Marks takes on Castle's Harlech loudspeakers and gets bombarded with deep, powerful bass. Did he survive?

ccording to Castle, the Harlechs represent an innovative step forward for their loudspeaker range. Apparently, they were designed to produce a performance similar to that offered by the Howard loudspeakers (reviewed in the March '96 issue) in a smaller cabinet and at a lower price. However, where the Howards use the same quarter-wave horn to load both the forward and upward firing mid/bass units, the Harlechs use an individual quarter-wave horn for each driver. There's more detail on this in the feature on page 37.

One aspect of these loudspeakers that's going to give each and every owner that warm satisfied feeling of £799 well spent (or £949 if they splash out on Rosewood or Yew) is the construction quality. Castle have never been ones to stint in this area and their cabinetry expertise is obvious here. The enclosures have an impressive hewn-from-solid feel to them that is complemented by the luxurious veneer - they even smell good. Matching the enclosures are the wooden plinths which take the spikes



and allow the mouths of the horns an air gap to vent through.

Having screwed these into the bottoms of the Harlechs I set about positioning them for the best sound quality. This actually turned out to be quite a lengthy process. I started with the cabinets about six feet apart, but this spacing produced a rather diffuse soundstage. Bringing them in to about four and a half feet produced a more coherent soundstage, although this showed up a slight upper midrange emphasis which was only partly ameliorated by firing the speakers almost straight down the room. The grilles also came in for some attention; in the end I settled on removing those on the front while the upper drivers stayed be-grilled.

'Wombo Lombo' was the first track to show what the Harlechs are capable of when it comes to bass. This was good 'no prisoners' stuff, noteworthy for its depth, speed, control and tautness. All of this added up to an impressive rhythmic drive which carried along the whole of Angelique Kidjo's Fifa album.

Next up on the roster was Joni Mitchell with her Turbulent Indigo album. Things got off to a good start with clear and clean guitar on the intro to 'Borderline' showing good detailing on the metallic resonance of the strings. Her vocals were realistically powerful without any danger of becoming overbearing which made the lyrics easily comprehensible. 'Yvette In English' had a soprano sax that sounded smooth, but an uneven midrange meant that high notes came forward in the soundstage while low notes took a back seat. The same was also true for the synthesiser and a slight sibilance made its presence felt on vocals. Dynamically, though, the Harlechs managed well, capturing the scale and apocalyptic feel of 'The Sire of Sorrow (Job's Sad Song)' without difficulty.

Alanis Morissette continued the fairer sex's domination of the listening session with her Jagged Little Pill. I started off with some easy listening provided by 'You Oughta Know'. The same vocal delivery that had been in

evidence with Joni Mitchell was obvious here too, giving the song's vitriolic lyrics the power they needed to really thrive. The walking bass line was well catered for too, striding through the track rhythmically, although 'Not The Doctor' showed that it had a rather unsubtle, inorganic feel to it

As I discovered with all of the various CDs that were making their way from our Pink Triangle/Audiolab digital combination through the 8000S, soundstaging is not the Harlechs' forté.

Even after a great deal of positional shuffling and a change to the 80000Q/8000Ms they were still producing a comparatively narrow stage and vocals especially lacked the kind of projection that can bring a feeling of space to a loudspeaker's presentation.

Vivaldi's Four Seasons suffered from a dry lower midrange and upper mid emphasis which conspired to produce a rather thin and insubstantial sound on the first movement.

The inorganic feel of the bass came through as an artificial thrum on cellos, and strings, whether solo or en masse, sounded constrained. The harpsichord in the fifth movement fared rather better, given the Harlechs' dynamic ability and bass weight, but the rendition as a whole lacked the natural

ease and integration needed for the performance to gel properly.

As a bit of a bass fan myself, I can see that a lot of people might be drawn to the Harlechs just because they possess both an impressive kick and speed. I suspect that others might find their presentation a little too uneven and unnatural in a 'hi-fi' kind of way, and would be disappointed by the soundstage they produce

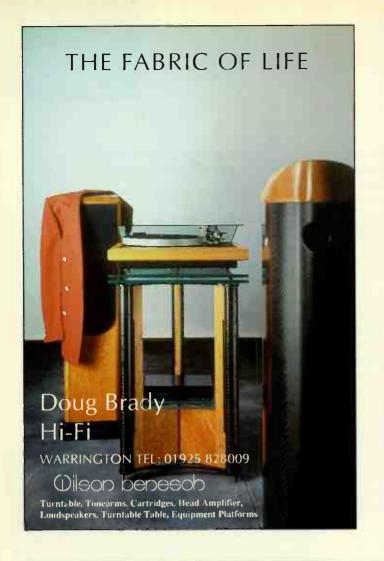

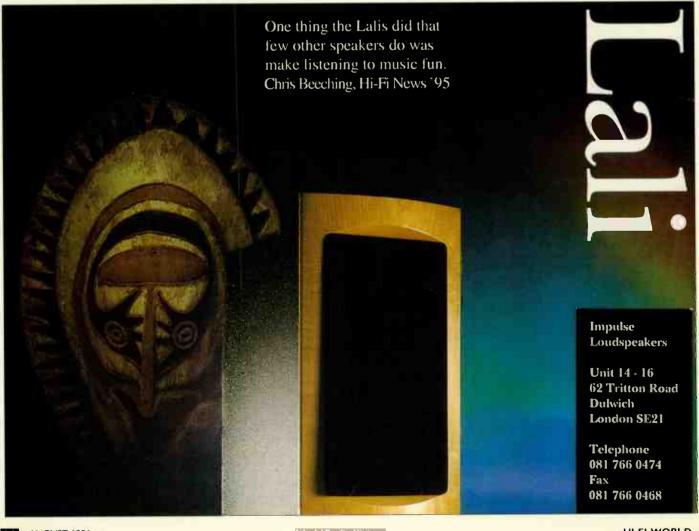

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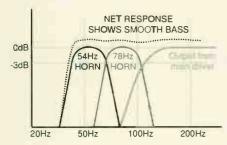
CASTLE'S HARLECH DESIGN

Dominic Baker takes a closer look at some of the design principles behind the Castle Harlechs.

astle's Harlechs embody several interesting design features that make them quite different from the majority of loudspeakers. Here's an outline of them and their effect on performance.

HANDED TWEETERS

Underneath the swept curves of the grilles lie a 4" bass/midrange driver and a metal dome tweeter. It's no accident that the tweeter is closer to one edge of the front baffle than the other: it improves stereo imaging.



Sound from the tweeter radiates from every point of its domed surface. Although strongest and most accurate directly in front, there is still a significant amount of side energy, including the acoustic surface wave that propagates across the face plate and baffle. Some of this energy is reflected from features on the baffle and refracted from sharp edges, confusing the forward signal. This causes a loss in image focus and accuracy.

By handing the tweeters close to one side of the baffle so that both sit on the inside edge as the 'speakers face you, the effect of these reflections is reduced for the listener. The half of the tweeter's

dome that faces you only sees a very narrow baffle because it is close to the edge of the 'speaker, so the reflections are reduced. Obviously, the reflections from the other side of the dome are stronger, but these tend to direct themselves towards the side walls of the listening room. These reflections reach the listener a few milliseconds later than the main signal to create the impression of a spacious acoustic.

1/4 WAVE BASS

Like the bigger Howards, the new Harlechs use 1/4 wave bass loading. This comprises a 1/4 wave horn running from the drivers at the top of the cabinet to an opening at the bottom where it vents downward against a wooden plinth held away from the cabinet by small plastic spacers. This resistively loads the horn to give tight and tuneful bass.

The system has proved to be a success for Castle. The Howard SIIs we reviewed recently had one of the best bass qualities we've come across - it goes deep with plenty of power, but manages to maintain a strong sense of control.

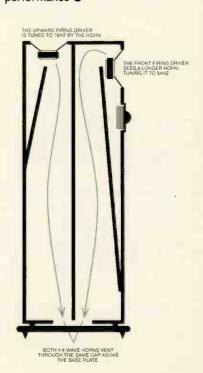
TWIN TUNING

There are two 1/4 wave pipes in the Castle Harlechs, one feeding off the forward firing bass driver and one from the upward firing driver in the top panel. But rather than tuning both of them to the same frequency, which would boost only a limited range of bass notes, Castle have stagger tuned them. The 1/4 wave horn behind the front driver is tuned to 54Hz, and that behind the top driver to

Stagger tuning the 1/4 wave horns in the Castles means that not only is bass response flatter, but also that the Harlechs should be able to play a bass line in a more even handed and tuneful manner. It should also ensure that they suit a wider range of rooms; the flatter, wider boost is less likely to excite a room's resonant modes and cause boom than a system strongly tuned to just one frequency. This characteristic tends to deliver 'one note' bass lines, something that reflex designs are often criticised for.

CONCLUSION

It is always refreshing to see manufacturers trying new ideas and putting more thought and effort into the design of a product, especially in the now stagnant world of loudspeakers. Castle's 1/4 wave horn twin-tuning scheme is certainly interesting, and it seems to produce extremely high levels of performance



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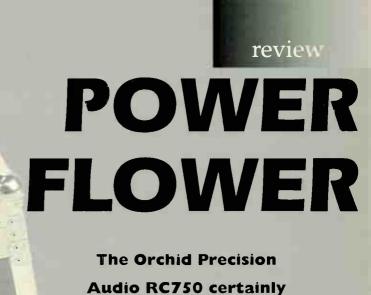

The difference between the good and the great is the difference between merely hearing the notes and hearing them while instinctively knowing how and why they are being played and who is playing them. Not much hi-fi can really do that. The Orchid also had a startling ability to give a listener the feeling that the notes are in an inevitable sequence, not just a series. Tricky concept, that, but it's a serious high-end goal.

Achieving it means that an amplifier has to be both tight and lucio rhythmically and the Orchid scored highly here, too. Playing Birtwistle's Chronometer - a piece of taperecorded clock tickings that sounds at first trance-like, but is infinitely more

complex - was for once very rewarding. Subtle shifts in tempo, rhythm and speed often make this sound more like an extended version of the alarm clocks on Pink Floyd's Dark Side of the Moon, instead of a piece that both fascinates and grips for twenty minutes.

A healthy proportion of other serious hi-fi attributes were present, too. From the tiny finger cymbals in a bar of a Dave Grusin track to a thoroughly authentic and near-live Fischer-Dieskau singing Erlkonig, images hung in the air between, in front of and behind the 'speakers. The Schubert Lieder, with Gerald Moore accompanying was instantly accessible, just like being in the Wigmore Hall, and utterly attention-grabbing despite an obviously aged recording. Attentiongrabbing, because Lieder without the words in front of you is normally a bit of a turn-off unless the hi-fi is thoroughly attentive to the tiniest vocal nuance or the coincidence of singer and accompanist when even the slightest imperfection upsets the balance.

The Orchid gripped every note and the space between them in a way that would probably have satisfied even that arch-perfectionist of recorded sound Walter Legge. It's not a bass-machine, for its bass is strong and tough but more perfectly proportioned than, well, Trish Goff for example. The one single

fault to be found with it was simply that this listener at least would have preferred a wider soundstage to compete with, say, that of the top-range conrad-johnson examples, or, come to that, the Michell Alectos.

From the outside it may be more reminiscent of Giant Haystacks than Trish Goff, but clumsy it most definitely is not. Under the huge casing beats a heart of Swiss jewel precision and delicacy allied with the muscle of Big Ren.

Looking Forward To Ramada 1996

It doesn't seem that long ago that I attended Ramada 1995, but it will soon be upon us again! One of the highlights of the 1995 show was undoubtedly the new Electrocompaniet units including the E.C.I.-2 amp and the small Qube speaker. Expected to be shown at the 1996 show are an improved version of the Qube using a Scan Speak tweeter instead of the Seas, with a price increase to £1390, while the present Qube design, but in MDF instead of solid wood cabinet, will retail at £1178 (in black only) and will be called the Qubette. Another new versatile product is the EC-4.5 infra red remote control unit, with the ability to adjust volume, balance and instant mute. It can be used with any pre-amplifier and has both single ended (RCA) and balanced (XLR) input and output. At £980 this promises to be a useful preamp for the CD based systems. The above could be available before Ramada so do ring if interested.

The EC-4.5 will of course provide yet another preamp option to drive our ever popular ATC 50A's, with their balanced input. ATC's own SCA-2 (reviewed in the Aug issue of Gramophone) preamp of course sounds superb, but does cost £2500 + £200 (R/C) + £299 (Phono Stage), while the fully balanced E/C EC-4 and EC-3MC cost £1466 and £1953 respectively, and of course the new AVI Passive/Active preamp costs a mere £850. Do come and hear what you get for your money.

CD Players

We don't stock a vast range of CD players, and generally have a model in specific price ranges, which we feel sounds superior to those generally highly praised but overrated units recommended by magazines. But last month Hi-Fi World did praise a unit we stock and with which we whole heatedly agree. This was the Trichord Genesis which at £550 suits a lot of systems. It is intriguing to see how sometimes CD players which are meant to sound pretty similar, can sound so different in different systems. The Genesis for example sounds better than the AVI player on the Heybrook Quartets, but equally the AVI sound much better on the Alon II's. Choosing the right CD player is as difficult as choosing the right amp and speakers, so make sure you listen wholeheartedly first.

KARDON BLEU?

ot really being much of an athlete myself, I have to say I appreciated the inclusion of a remote with Harman Kardon's new bitstream CD player, the HD 730, although the lack of gold-plating on the rear sockets came as a bit of a surprise with a machine of this price. Remote in hand, I settled back for a musical audience with the inimitable Bonnie Raitt, courtesy of her Luck of the

Draw CD. The first track to emerge from the Mission 752s, driven by an Aura VA 80 was the boppy, 'Good Man, Good Woman'. It harman kardon was obvious from the way the 730 kept the rhythm tripping along that upper bass had attractive punch and speed to it. Lower down the register. there was good weight and extension in the bass, which was sufficiently well controlled that individual bass guitar notes could do their own thing, even though there was a slight amorphousness to the notes themselves. The leading edges on Raitt's slide guitar and Curt Bisquera's drums were convincingly realistic, but ride cymbals and Delbert McClinton's harmonica showed up a rather lifeless trebie.

Bonnie Raitt retired to be replaced by Carter USM and their adrenallyoverloaded 101 Damnations CD. 'Good Grief Charlie Brown' in particular showed the same fleet-of-foot rhythm and detailing in the upper registers that the previous CD had. There was also plenty of bass weight, but the HD 730 Jon Marks finds that in the HD 730 harman/kardon have cooked up an interesting

speed with dynamic and rhythmic ability proves to be quite a tasty dish in the HD 730. It's just a shame that the recipe doesn't add up to something a little more lively and involving.

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LETTER OF THE MONTH

COMING TO A STICKY END

I read with interest the column by Dominic Baker in the June issue concerning the problem of 'sticky' tapes.

This problem has been with the recording industry for some years and everybody shares your concern on this issue. However, in response to the concern over copying to RDAT maybe I can shed some light for you. At present RDAT represents the only format capable of being played in most studios around the world. It would be of no value to copy stereo masters to a format that is not really playable anywhere.

Sony's professional .1630 format on Umatic is slightly more robust, but is not found in all studios or post production facilities. It is also reaching the end of its life as a format for mastering or archive use in favour of hard disk workstations coupled to tape drives, Exabyte being the favoured approach. At present there is no professional format that replaces RDAT and analogue 1/4 or 1/2 tape that we can use to archive and exchange masters with other facilities.

I would welcome a reliable tape or disk based 24-bit digital format which could be used within the industry, but unless it was adopted by the majority of users its use would be limited. Many different hard disk systems offer the ability to archive to Magneto Optical disk. However the format of the files used are often incompatible with other systems, and standards for interchange are yet to be adopted by all manufacturers and users.

So, RDAT is used and yes, it does have problems. In fact, I have recently decided to remaster some of our tapes to analogue 1/4 to avoid digital altogether. Using well aligned Studer machines the results are excellent and it has extended the life of the material for as long as this format continues. I will be interested to see what the future will bring to the recording industry, but I fear that without a cost effective, future proof, standard format that is available to all users this problem is not going away.

Sony have recently developed Direct Stream Digital (DSD) - a high quality digital format - to archive the huge music catalogue they acquired from Columbia/Epic. It has been proposed as a digital audio format for DVD discs, but there is little information about what format would be used for masters. Although initial demonstrations have been made using a hard disk based set-up, it looks like the most likely format will be Digital Betacam, a magnetic tape format a bit like a large VHS videotape - same sticky problems as analogue and DAT tapes?

It appears that DSD was developed because Sony were unhappy with the sonic performance of existing systems and wanted to archive material without quality loss. There is another high quality system that has been proposed for digital audio DVD, the ARA's HQAD. This is a 24-bit 96kHz sampling system, which I get the impression most recording engineers feel offers greater resolution. Again though, there is little information at present regarding what format or standard the professional industry may adopt.

So, we're all holding our breath at the moment, on both domestic and professional sides of the market. We'll keep you updated on any new developments coming from either side of the industry as and when they happen. DB

With a room of this size I could make each 'speaker room' 9ft wide, 7ft deep and 8ft high and still have a listening room 20ft x 18ft.

This project excites me, being completely free of any domestic considerations. The mind boggles with the possibilities. I could consider some large horns built into the fabric of the house; or how about NK's Quad ESL-63 plus subwoofer solution? Where do we stop?

Once you start building in, then it is easy to come up with so called ideal solutions. But watch out; there's more to a loudspeaker than just constructing a perfect infinite baffle. Engineers get carried away with this sort of thing. Just remember that cabinets and baffles relate to bass performance. Getting a pure and revealing midband and sweet treble can be every bit as important. Then you are talking cone materials, motor behaviour, materials technology (especially) and phase performance, rather than house construction.

You could, perhaps, have a double outer wall with a 12in cavity. This wouldn't consume much floor area, but it would give you a good infinite baffle if you mount bass units in it. Tannoy dualconcentrics are a common choice here, but these days KEF Uni-Qs would also do. Both avoid the need for separate tweeters and both have great imaging, being coherent sources.

Also, don't forget designs like our own KLS6.

This, especially, was based around some of the most advanced drive units currently available. Few loudspeakers in this world have tweeters that cost £220 each!

CD as currently specified cannot provide amazing sound quality advances. The 16bit/44.1kHz system is tightly constrained in bandwidth and dynamic range. Digital systems have ceiling limits, unlike analogue systems. The only way CD can be upgraded, in effect, is by ensuring it works properly right up to the limits of its (1970s) specification - and that's all we've been doing since it was launched in 1983, believe it or not. So gob-smacking improvements aren't easy to come by. The most dramatic sound I've come across was from DPA's Renaissance CD player. NK.

Ideally, I would like a sound with a little more space around the instruments and a cleaner top end. Is it possible to get this without compromising on rhythm and timing? Most of all, I want my music to play with feeling and passion. Would the following be suitable: Sumiko BPS, Audio Technica OC9, Ortofon MC20 and MC30 Supreme? Musical taste covers vocal, soul, rock and jazz.

MC 10 Supreme has a sweeter treble than the AT OC9 and suits rock well.

I'm acquainted with all these cartridges, except the Sumiko. Subjective timing usually sharpens up when leading edges are better reproduced and this is why the AT OC9 has, in the past, been a firm favourite with those who want real grip with Rock. However, these cartridges did peak up a little in the treble and, for my taste, they sounded a little too chrome-plated. The best alternative is Ortofon's MC 10 Supreme, which has impressively

powerful bass, but also well projected treble. Don't go for the MC 30 Supreme, because it is too smooth for your tastes, whilst the MC 20 is fine but less sweet, being a budget coil. NK

LOOKING FOR SPACIOUSNESS

My present system consists of Meridian 207 CD, LP12/Lingo/Cirkus/lttok/K9, LK280/LK1, old Saras (Canon connects), and Linn cable and stands.

Some years ago I owned a

pair of Quad ELS speakers, and always loved the clear open sound, but due to width and house move they had to go.

I find my present system is unable to let the musical performance come out of the boxes, despite upgrades to the LP12. Having moved house again and gained a large lounge, I am considering replacing speakers and possibly amps.

Are there any speakers that would give the spacious sound of the Quads with a little more bass than that of my present system, but within an average width of cabinet, say up to approx.

I have a varied musical taste, but I listen mainly to light rock - i.e. Simply Red, Phil Collins and female vocal.

Your suggestions on speakers/matching amps would be greatly appreciated. M. McKitten Chester-le-Street, Co. Durham.



Quad's electrostatic loudspeakers are renowned for their open and spacious qualities which few, if any, box loudspeakers approach. That is not to say that all box loudspeakers have a closed in sound though - many are extremely good, but don't expect them to sound like the Quads do.

One of the best in terms of being able to create an open and spacious sound is ProAc's Studio 100 loudspeaker. It is a very clear and detailed monitor and the high quality drivers - custom made vaver bass driver and fabric dome tweeter - have a neutral tone that will suit your preference for light rock and female vocals well. Their bass is fast, tight and punchy, but not the deepest, so I'd recommend you add a REL Strata powered subwoofer to give you the extra depth you're after. They work well as a combination - it's a system I've had many hours of enjoyment out of in the vast.

If you go for this set-up, I'd recommend the following. Against ProAc's better judgement, I'd use the Studio 100s on open frame stands, like Heybrook's HSB1s, and pull them well out into the room. You are not worried about getting the last ounce of bass extension out of them because the Strata is more

For great soundstaging from a stand mount speaker try ProAc's Studio 100

than capable here, and pulling the 100s out into the room will give you a clearer, more open midrange and

treble. Give it a go, I'm sure you'll enjoy it. DB

Anyway, these two should be available in the major record shops, while Reference Recordings' CDs can be obtained from Audiophile International, who advertise in this magazine. EB

TWEETER TROUBLE

I have enjoyed your excellent magazine for the past three years and decided to ask for your help for the third time.

The last two times I didn't get any answer through the pages of Hi-Fi World, so I really hope I get one this time!

My system consists of a Linn LP12/Circus/Trampolin (soon Lingo)/Ittok and van den Hul MC One Super. Pre is the Luxman CD3 and power the harman/kardon Citation 24, driving Spendor SP2/2s and SD Acoustics OBS loudspeakers. CD is the Arcam Alpha. Cables are all from vdH

I need to change the CD and amps, not only to improve the quality of the system, but also because for some reason, nobody understands why, I have to change the tweeters every month (even if I get everything serviced).

My pocket limitations are for the CD, up to £2200 and for amps (pre/power), up to £3000. I listen mostly to Jazz, Acid, Latin, Soul, Funk, acoustic Pop, small orchestras and music with a lot of vocals.

I'm looking forward to a detailed and musical sound, balanced with control and neutrality (as much as it can be for this money or a few hundred more). I really hope that this time you'll answer me, helping solve my problem.

In my short-list I have the following pre/powers: the Clessa-Bryston PS-7NRB, Conrad Johnson PF2-

MF2300, Audio Research LS7-D200 and Linn Kairn-LK100.

> For CD Teac VRDS 10 with same transport and Linn Karik III with Numerik.

First and foremost, I think you need to sort

out the problem with having to replace your tweeters every month. This is not right. You don't say which loudspeakers' tweeters are the problem, or whether you have both pairs connected at the same time. Either way, contact the manufacturer concerned or talk to a good local dealer who is prepared to fix this problem for you.

Once this problem is solved, are you sure you'll still want to change your amplifiers and CD player? If this problem is the only reason for the change, you could be about to waste a lot of money. If, however you are looking to improve your system, I would suggest the following path.

Your turntable system is excellent so I presume you have a lot of vinyl. In this case, it is extremely important to get an amplifier with a top quality phono stage. Here the Linn Kairn you mention is ideal; Linn make some of the best MC stages going to match their own high quality MCs. The Kairn is very detailed, but can be a touch dry and cold sounding, so I'd temper this from either end with a smooth and full sounding CD player and power amplifier.

First, the CD player.
Try auditioning the
Marantz CD-16. This has
a very stable and
consistent sound, free from
any grain or harshness, so
should give a pleasant
balance with the Kairn
pre-amplifier. It is
detailed too, but not in a
showy or forceful manner.

Finding a matching power amplifier will depend on your loudspeakers. Once the CD-16 and Kairn are in place alongside your existing LP12 set-up, I feel that your loudspeakers will then be your weakest link. I'd recommend

upgrading your loudspeakers at the same time as auditioning power amplifiers, so that you can find a good synergistic match.

You don't say what size room you have, but I suspect it's reasonably large to fit the OBS loudspeakers in, so I will base my recommendations on this. Try these combinations with your system: Michell Alecto Stereo power amplifier with ProAc Studio 200 or Spendor SP7/1 loudspeakers for great soundstaging and imaging, Naim NAP 180 with KEF Reference Series 2s for sheer detail and insight. It is difficult to be more specific without more information about your room etc., but I hope this at least provides you with some useful advice. DB

replacing the current cartridge, a Rega Elys. My question is: should I consider any other makes or types as an alternative? I must point out that the Elys is very satisfactory and not being an absolute turntable fanatic and just enjoying the sound for what it is, I don't wish to spend a fortune on a change just for the sake of it.

I have read many times in your magazine reports about MC cartridges but I understand the Alpha 6 amp only has an MM phono stage. Can you advise me if there is a solution or indeed any advantage to using MC cartridges on a Planar 3? I look forward to your comments with interest.

Just to add a small tip that may have arisen with other users of Planar 3s, when I first purchased the turntable which is mounted on a wall bracket, I noticed a hum through the speakers. It was suggested to me by a friend to shield the cables with silver foil. To my amazement the hum is almost unnoticeable unless listening at loud volumes with no actual music playing. John Appleford Avon.

It's impossible for us to say whether you'd find the improvement offered by a moving coil cartridge significant. People have told me they are happy

enough with their midisystem, have upgraded to just the simplest set of separates and suddenly become ecstatic about the difference. I suspect you'd be best keeping your feet on the ground by buying a Goldring 1012GX, a cartridge which is smooth, warm but dynamically adept. You can upgrade this by changing just the stylus assembly.

The Planar 3 will accept a moving coil cartridge and Ortofon's MC 20 Super would be a good proposition, working through an Ortofon matching transformer. Generally speaking, moving coils are more detailed, forward and concise in their imaging than moving magnets. NK

NAIM IS THE GAME

I am looking towards my next system upgrade, and would appreciate your advice. My present system is: Meridian 200 transport with Trichord Clock 2, Audiolab DAC (MKI with DAC7 upgrade), Naim NAC 72, NAP 180, HI-CAP, Epos ES 11 speakers and stands. The turntable (rarely used) is a Systemdek Ilxe with Moth arm and Rega Elys cartridge. The equipment is on a Target stand, with DAC and transport on Seismic Sinks, and the preamp on a Mana Sound Frame. The system is supplied by a

dedicated mains spur. My musical tastes include: Mary Black, Van Morrison, REM, Eric Clapton, etc. My room is 13' x 11'9" x 7'9".

I like a fast, detailed sound with good presence and midrange clarity. I would particularly like to improve and extend bass performance, but am concerned that the small room size and shape may cause problems such as overblown bass and slowing the music down. I would also like to improve imagery and treble quality without this becoming too 'splashy'.

I want to exploit the qualities of the Naim amps as much as possible, but Naim SBL speakers would probably be out of my price range at present. I am therefore considering either adding an active REL subwoofer or changing to floorstanding speakers up to about £1000 eg Monitor Audio Studio 12, Mission 753, Castle Howard, (any others?). Or should I wait longer for the SBLs? Would these be OK in my listening room? Or should I leave the speakers and change the DAC instead? Also, what future changes should I consider?

I would also like to increase the scale of the sound, which at times sounds a bit too small. Is this due to the small speakers?

Personally, I'd audition the Castle Chesters. I prefer them to the Howards; they have a more cohesive and stable soundstage and imaging in my experience, if not quite the same depth of bass. The Chesters are a medium size floorstander using 1/4 wave bass tuning, which means they will not only go low, but are tight and tuneful with it. Another option, although

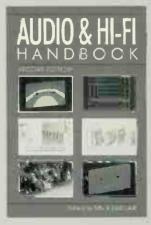

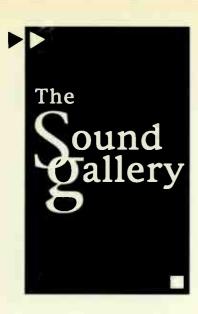
one I've never tried, and one that may well be frowned upon by Naim followers, is Technics' SB-M500s. These have the fast, detailed and crisp sound you are looking for, with excellent bass depth. They are quite dry in the bass too, so shouldn't boom.

For once, I would advise against a REL subwoofer with your ES11s. They have a very full and rounded upper bass, which may well become too rich or thick with a sub. DB

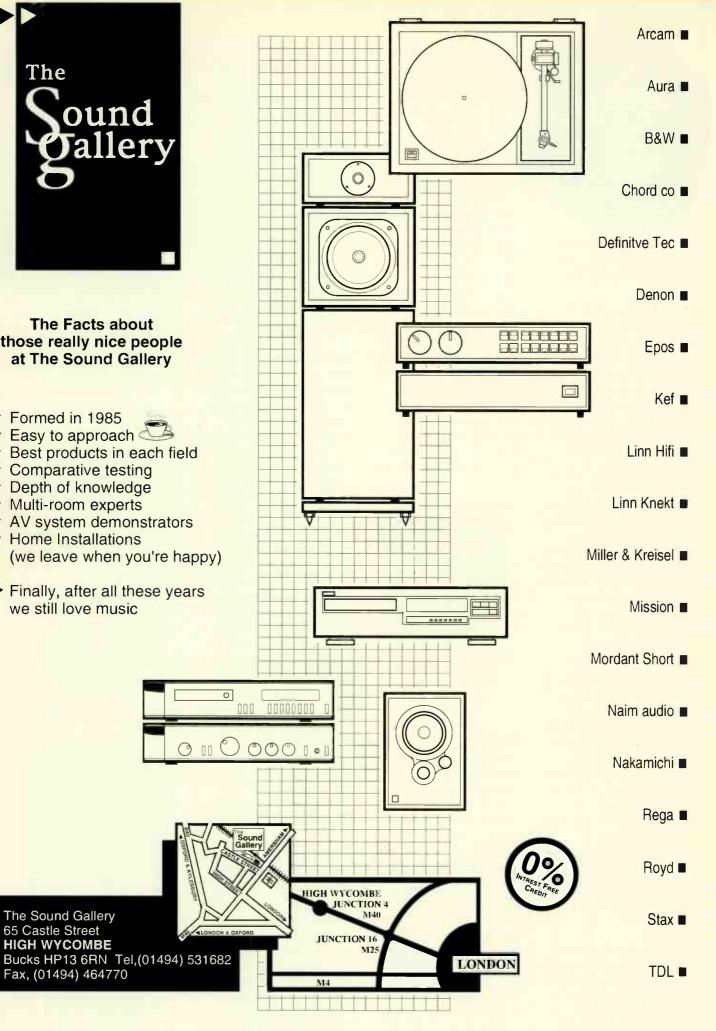
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NATIONAL VINTAGE COMMUNICATIONS FAIR 1996

Dominic Baker visits a show for enthusiasts and collectors of vintage wireless and audio.

A relaxed drive to the NEC in Birmingham on Sunday 5th May saw me at the National Vintage Communications Fair. In its third year now, the NVCF caters for collectors of vintage sound and vision equipment. There was a wide range of audio on offer at the NVCF, but for those who are looking to buy, it's well worth getting there early; most of the best equipment goes within an hour of the doors opening.



The hall was packed with enthusiasts hunting for bargains; if you intend to do the same, get there early.



A mono Tannoy valve integrated, probably an AP30, which was a 30watt professional amplifier built during the late 50s.



A pair of prime condition Leak TL12+ monoblocks, modified with flying phono leads. This pair were on offer at £350.



A selection of equipment: Leak Varislope pre-amplifier at £50, a Scott valve integrated probably dating from the mid to late 60s at £195, and a pair of nice condition Quad IIs at £230.



Rarely seen, the Rogers Ravensbourne tuner.



A pair of Dynatron LF5/9 9watt triode monoblocks using PP3/250 output valves was going for £1,200.



And a pair of Dynatron LF20s, which were based on the Mullard 5-20 circuit, could have been yours for £750.



Known for their sweet and open sound, these 25watt PYE HF25 monoblocks set someone back £800.



A beautiful pair of McIntosh 60s. The price was hurriedly removed as I approached, but it wasn't far off what you'd pay for a modern McIntosh power amplifier.

best available. With
AT&T optical, electrical balanced XLR
and both phono and BNC S/PDIF
digital outputs, it will liaise with just

about any CD convertor you choose. No Tos-link optical is provided though, Sonic Frontiers believing it inferior to any of the other four forms of connection.

Like the transport, the SFD-2 MkII convertor is a beautifully built piece of kit, both inside and out. Sonic Frontiers' sister company, The Parts Connection, specialises in supplying very high grade audio parts to DIY hi-fi enthusiasts, so it was no surprise to find MIT Multicap, Solen and Wima polypropylene capacitors, Vishay, Holco and Caddock resistors, Kimber silver wiring and a myriad other high quality components and hardware. It was also little surprise to find that all this doesn't come for nothing: the pairing will set you back just over £7,500.

Sonic's SFD-2 MkII uses Analog Devices' DAC20400A convertor chip, a high quality device that I haven't come across before. In the output stage there are two 6922 double triode valves, which, along with the digital circuitry, are powered up all of the time in standby mode. Switching to operate slowly brings their heaters up to temperature over a period of 45 seconds, indicated by the flashing power indicator. As if that wasn't enough, the SFD-2 MkII also comes fitted with Pacific Microsonics' **HDCD** decoder chip. High Definition Compatible Digital (HDCD) is a recording process that corrects for sources of distortion in CD. When a CD that has been HDCD encoded (there are now aver 50 titles available) the HDCD decode. recognises it and can take advantage of this process. Pacific

Microsonics also claim that their

decoder is sonically superior even

when playing back standard CDs.

Although musical and enjoyable to listen to, I certainly wouldn't describe the Sonic Frontiers SFT-I transport and SFD-2 MkII CD convertor combination as neutral. There was a richness to their texture of sound that adds a warmth and colour throughout the spectrum. From a full and rounded bottom end up to a soft and sweetened treble, the Sonic Frontiers is definitely coloured by everyday standards.

This colour though, is painted in by a master artist, the brush strokes gently highlighting and building a deeper image on the canvas. Take Counting Crows' August and Everything album, recorded with plenty of natural acoustic and a rich array of instruments and styles. It grew in proportion through the Sonic combination, filling the room to its boundaries. Acoustic strings had a syrupy tone to them and slightly foreshortened decay, but still cut crisply on transients. It was an interesting blend, eminently forgiving to listen to but still retaining enough of an edge on transients to grab my attention and hold it.

Trawling through a wide range of musical styles, the Sonic's finer qualities started to reveal themselves. Capturing the analogue quality of Lou Reed's Transformer, much of the normally hidden low level detail was resolved, giving this album a natural air that only McIntosh's CDM7009 has hinted at before. Nirvana's Unplugged album also shared similar properties, the music free and unconstrained,

creating a convincingly life-like feel.

Bjork's powerful vocals can show up even some of the best CD players. Here the Sonic Frontiers refused to compromise, conveying power and emotion effortlessly without even the slightest inclination to grain or edginess. Again, the warm nature of its coloration was noticeable, but the artist in the Sonic Frontiers managed to carry it off, adding to, rather than subtracting from, my enjoyment.

With HDCD encoded discs, the Sonic combination displayed still more of its qualities. I found two in our local Tower Records: Jimi Hendrix - The Ultimate Experience and Mozart's piano concerto, K467. As I found when listening to Pink Triangle's HDCD-equipped Da Capo convertor, HDCD encoded discs acquired a greater sense of stage depth and space, bringing an even more natural feel to the acoustic. Instruments too seemed better spaced making it easier to place individual performers, again adding to realism.

Among the few who possess a wallet big enough, I suspect the Sonic transport and convertor will find great favour. They combine an ease of delivery so smooth you could be forgiven for thinking you were listening to an analogue source but with all the transient dynamics and cleanliness of sound of a top CD player

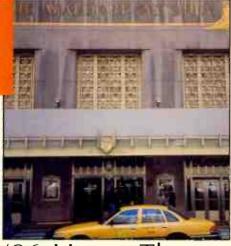
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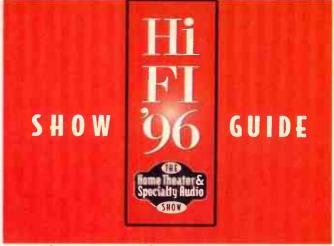

Hi-Fi '96 Home Theater and Specialty Audio Show

Andrew Keen was in New York to bring us this report on the Stereophile show held at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel.

he Hi-Fi '96 Home Theater and Specialty Audio Show was held between May 31st and June 2nd at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel in New York City. Organised by Santa Fe based publishing company Stereophile Inc., the show incorporated hi-fi, home theatre and high-end recordings. There were also two Show trade days (May 29-30) organised by the Academy for the Advancement of High-End Audio. This was the tenth annual Stereophile Show and according to John Atkinson, editor of Stereophile magazine, it was double the size of last year's Los Angeles event. Certainly, for the thousands of lucky hi-fi enthusiasts packing Waldorf-Astoria's corridors, Hi-Fi '96 was quite an event.



Bryston B-60 integrated amplifier

New from Canadian manufacturer Bryston is this solid state 60watt integrated amplifier. Hand assembled in a cost-no-object manner, the B-60 is Bryston's first ever integrated amplifier. It has four line inputs, a tape loop and pre-out\main-in feature. US price is \$1,495. An optional remote control is available at \$300 and for vinyl addicts there's also an add-on BP-1 phonostage (\$800).



Melos Triode SE 75 single-ended amplifier

Melos' SE 75 Triode is a new 75 watts per channel single-ended pair of power amplifiers. Part of Melos' 'Gold Series', the SE 75's vacuum tubes promise both solid-state power and vacuum tube sweetness. Melos claim that the SE 75s can drive even medium efficiency loudspeakers to 'pleasing levels' without clipping. US price for the pair is \$8,895.



Mission 754 freedom5 loudspeakers

Mission's chief designer Henry Azima came to New York City to unveil the first of a brand new range of 75 Series loudspeakers. The 754 freedom5 is a floor-standing three-way design with a High Definition Aerogel midrange driver, silk-dome tweeter and an 8-inch treated polypropylene woofer. Its enclosure is a hybrid design, using a sealed chamber for midrange and tweeter and tuned bass reflex loading for the woofer. Bi-wireable with a healthy sensitivity of 90dB, the 754's suggested retail price is \$3,000.



conrad-johnson Anniversary Reference Triode (ART) pre-amplifier

Built to celebrate conrad-johnson's twentieth anniversary, their ART preamplifier is, indeed, a work of art. It is a vacuum tube, line stage pre-amp in dualmono configuration. Conrad-johnson will produce 250 of these aesthetically striking units. US suggested retail price is \$14,995.



Totem Acoustic TABU loudspeaker

This beautifully finished monitor from Canadian loudspeaker company Totem is designer Vincent Bruzzese's latest biwireable model. With internal and external wood veneering, multi-layered borosilicate damping, full plane cross braces, lock mitre cabinet joints and a weight of 10kg apiece, it has an unusually rigid cabinet. Hungry for power, the Tabu's sensitivity is 85.5 dB. Expected retail price is \$2,995.



Music Labs ML-8 MkII pre-amplifier/ML-815 MkII power amplifier

From Melbourne, Australia, comes the newly designed and upgraded Music Labs pre/power combination. The ML-8 MkII is a four input, line level preamplifier with remote control. It partners the ML-815 MkII transistor power amplifier which has a healthy output of 150watts. They're well priced too - the ML-8 MkII costs \$1,699 and the ML-815 MkII \$2,399.



Sony DTC-ZASES DAT Recorder

DAT is still very much alive. The newly released Sony DTC-ZA5ES recorder can record at all three DAT sampling rates: 32kHz, 48kHz and the CD rate of 44.1kHz. It records with Sony's Super Bit Mapping technology and plays back with their SCORE Digital Filter. For live recording, it has front-panel microphone inputs. The retail price of \$1,600 makes this professional DAT machine an affordable recording option for consumers.



Marantz Monaural Project T-I amplifier

Marantz's Project T-I combines the benefits of classic tube design with the advantages of modern technology. Rated at 50watts, this vacuum tube amplifier uses two 845 high-power triodes in push-pull configuration for its output stage. Constructed on 'bodyon-frame' automobile principles, the T-I is built like a proverbial tank. State-of-the-art in every way; the T-I will cost \$25,000.



Sphinx Project 10 integrated amplifier

The Sphinx range of electronics from Holland, all hand-assembled in a gorgeous black acrylic, are visually quite a treat. Their Sphinx shaped Project 12 integrated amplifier is a particularly fabulous beast. Rated at 160W into 20hms, the Project 10 has separate on-board power supplies for pre and power amplifier sections, Siltech pure silver internal cabling, a separate headphone output, motor driven Alps volume and remote control. Retail price in the US is \$3,500.



German Physiks Windspiel loudspeaker

This strikingly distinctive looking loudspeaker is German Physiks' latest and smallest to date - the Windspiel. Distinguished by Physiks' freely mounted DDD Bending Wave Converter, the Windspiel is supposed to directly excite soundwaves using 'bending waves radiated over an angle of a full 360 degrees with constant phase'. With a sensitivity of 85dB and an impedance of 40hms, the Windspiel has an export price tag from Germany of \$7,850.



Sonic Frontiers Anthem Amp-I

Due to be released in July, this Anthem Amp-I is an all-tube 40watt power amplifier from the innovative Canadian company Sonic Frontiers. Part of their more affordable Anthem series, the Amp-I has an ultra-linear output configuration, giving the sonic advantage of triode operation with the power of pentodes. Expected US retail price is a very competitive \$1,195.

SHOW IN BRIEF

Hi-Fi '96 was particularly distinguished for its new loudspeakers and amplifiers. On the digital front, however, there was less to report. True, Pacific Microsonics introduced their new Model One HDCD processor, Cello their Reference DAC and JVC their XRCD X-tended Resolution CD. Overall, though, my guess is that the industry is waiting for the potential DVD explosion due some time at the end of the year. At that point, the future of HDCD and indeed, of the compact disc medium itself, should become much more obvious.

The most exciting new products I heard at the show were both loudspeakers. Firstly, the Totem Tabu, driven fabulously by the Sphinx Project 8 pre-amp, Project 24 power amp and fed by the Sphinx Project 9 CD player sounded gorgeously rich and focused. Secondly, the clarity and poise of Henry Azima's Cyrus 754 loudspeakers, driven by a small army of Cyrus electronics, were the talk of the Waldorf-Astoria. This proves once again that relatively affordable British hi-fi can indeed compete at the highest international level.

there's a side to audio engineering that's rarely discussed in hi-fi magazines - the economics. Some of it is eye opening and quite the reverse of what you might believe. For example, digital has always been sold on the basis of quality. These days it's becoming increasingly obvious that low manufacturing cost and consistent and reliable performance count for more. To manufacturers, the wonder of digital is as much economic as anything else.

Digital Compact Cassette was a masterpiece of production engineering, very much in keeping with Philips' expertise in this field. Whilst to the public it was presented as a digital wonder, to manufacturers it was relatively undemanding in cost terms. For example, to suppress speed variations the high cost of a precision dual-capstan transport was exchanged for the low cost of a digital 'bucket-brigade' silicon chip. This reads in digital data affected by

(transport) plus £20 (heads), totalling £60. When multiplied by 4 this results in a whopping £240 contribution to the retail price - and that's before other expensive mechanical items like the case, circuit boards and mains transformer are included.

Obviously, this deck will retail at £500 minimum when you consider that it must be designed, prototyped, turning cassette digital costs £20-£30, in terms of retail price, for the chips needed to eliminate speed instability, as well as those to effect digital to analogue conversion. Consequently, the digital deck will sell for at least £100 less than the analogue deck. Unfortunately for Philips, DCC ran into a brick wall looking for a market. But it still remains the case that digital product gets cheaper to make every day, whilst analogue only gets more expensive.

In the same vein, I'm fascinated to see how Japanese manufacturers are significantly downgrading cassette head quality upon fitting Dolby 'S' to their decks. Here again we are junking metal in favour of silicon because it makes economic sense. Dolby 'S' has overload prevention so, the thinking goes, high performance heads are unnecessary. Dolby then, although analogue, now finds itself in a similar role, displacing expensive mechanical components.

Extrapolate this situation forward and you reach a future which is stationary, silicon and mostly digital. We are already expecting to see this soon, perhaps in the next decade or so, when solid-state memory becomes capacious enough to hold an hour or so of music in digital form. Then the all-solid state recorder will have arrived.

The memory it will use may be expensive in the early days, but large scale production should bring cost down fairly rapidly. With less mechanical casework than a cassette deck, no head and no transport, it will almost certainly be far less expensive to make and more consistent and reliable in performance too.

This situation has some interesting side issues. Research into a technology like DCC doesn't come cheap. However, it is a one-off cost that can be 'amortised' (i.e. spread) over a production run. Japanese manufacturers supply a global market, as do Philips, so they spread these costs over hundreds of thousands of units, resulting in a comparatively low cost per item for research

I suspect big companies have traditionally seen this as a way of clearing and keeping competitors from the field. Not only are high technology items impossible for small companies to research and manufacture, they should also carry a market premium. But just when the high technology giants were about to enter these new golden uplands, the great general public decided they'd had enough of such products and stopped buying! Nowadays, you're better off selling low-tech., handbuilt valve amps. It's a cruel world.

timing errors and clocks it back out error free, allowing DCC to use a relatively cheap singlecapstan transport. In effect, mechanical complexity was exchanged for electrical complexity.

This is happening because mechanical parts are becoming dearer while the price of silicon chips is dropping. Just look at the figures: a Sankyo Seiki dual-capstan transport costs around £40-£60 according to how many you order, and a Canon head around £10 (two or three are needed, so it all adds up).

The industry uses a ratio of about x4 to determine retail price with cassette deck manufacture, which is traditionally a competitive, high volume sector. So a dual-capstan transport with three heads will translate into, say, £40

tested, have a wealth of service and sales data produced to support it, advertised, packed and shipped (and have VAT or import charges slapped on top).

With DCC, Philips cobbled up an interesting hybrid device, part mechanical, part electrical. Its single-capstan transport probably costs around £18 to buy on the open market (although it's likely that Philips and Matsushita pay less than this). The head, I'd guess, costs around £8 at present (it would cost less if DCC had ever been a volume selling item). That's £26 in all, or a £104 contribution to the selling cost - £136 less than our dual-capstan/three-head

Silicon chips cost 30p-£5, unless they are large scale or short run specialised devices. So



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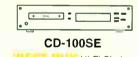
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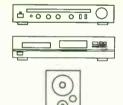
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The Roynon's phono stage can also be bought as a stand alone unit. This second flower, the PSD-1, was supplied for review and will set you back a reasonable enough £320. Like that found in the Roynon, it's switchable for either MM or MC, the only slight quirk being that the phono leads are captive and very short (51cm) removing the possibility of experimentation with different leads and having the phono stage anywhere other than right next to your main amplifier.

I'll start with the best bit first. Through the Roynon SIA-1 integrated, and PSD-1 external phono amplifier feeding our regular Audiolab set-up, both MM and MC stages had fine imaging qualities. REM's 'Radio Song' off their Out of Time LP showed off a well controlled and nicely relaxed bass line with a rich mid band. The Roynon's top end though was less natural and slightly too energetic, but I would attribute this aspect of its behaviour to the power amplifier section. More about that later.

Texas' 'So Called Friend' revealed more. With this record the MC stage reproduced most of the breadth and depth that are in the recording. Vocals were up-front and dominant with the guitar sweetly grunging in the background. Aga n through the Roynon, drums and in particular snares and cymbals were too crisp and decayed a little too tightly while, in contrast, reverberations off both vocals and percussion instruments were allowed to linger too long. The PSD-1 was richer in

The MM stage lacked most of this emphasis at the top balancing better with the Roynon, but then it had a much thinner sound all round in comparison; something also confirmed with the external stage. Image quality was retained on ZZ-Top's 'Jesus Just Left Chicago', but the bass was toned down and nearly everything else was pushed into the background. Regardless of these niggles the reproduction was very clean and did not detract from the pleasure of blues melody and cheese grater vocals.

Switching over from LP to CD on the Roynon integrated brought about a tightening up in all aspects of the sound. This, I regret, chased away the openness of the soundstage experienced with LP. Sade's seductive vocals on the mellow, bass rich 'No Ordinary Love' off Love Deluxe were passionless. True, the general sound was clean and crisp with some good dynamics, but hardly overwhelming.

Shakespeare's Sister's 'I Don't Care' retained many of these properties. Both Siobahn Fahey and Marcella Detroit's vocals seemed breathless whilst instrumentalists plodded along like they were watching the clock, wishing it was time to go home.

Having said all of the above, the excellent, huge production on Martika's 'Love. . . Thy Will Be Done' was in the most part reproduced quite well. The bass was big and overwhelming with a clean if slightly thinned mid band. Martika's vocal dominated centre stage with the typically Paisley Park processed backing chorus giving our listening room an ecclesiastical atmosphere. As the crescendo gathered momentum there was some loss of coherence with the guitars becoming jangley at the very top.

'Drive' from REM's Automatic For The People started off well with Michael Stipe's melancholy vocal echoing between the 'speakers. But when lead guitar came in about two thirds of the way through, the music, including vocals, took a jump back stage with the guitar left up-front. GOL's 'Soma Holiday' jamboree of ambient sounds lost some of its spatial effects with the image confining itself more to centre stage. Otherwise the output from the 'speakers was dynamic with plenty of energy in the top end.

CONCLUSION

So vinyl lovers have a prospective sunflower to play with here in the PSD-1. At £320 it is an extremely good stand alone phono stage, one worth seeking out. People looking for an allround integrated with £680 to spend may not be as happy, with a few too many weeds shadowing this seedling from the sunlight. They should spend some time auditioning the Benchmark Roynon alongside the competition before parting with their cash

s a Gyrodec-owning Michell aficionado, my next turntable just had to be the Orbe. This sumptuous confection of delicious Danish acrylic, mirror-polished brass and space-age aluminium had weighed heavy in my imagination since its debut at last year's Bristol show and was getting harder to ignore. Now when it comes to purchasing hi-fi, I'm as enthusiastic as my bank balance permits, meaning I've little interest in most stuff I come across. But the laying of ears and eyes on this beauty put my common-sense in momentary remission just long enough to write the cheque.

Relieved of my money, I grinned like an idiot who'd yet to realise the consequences of his actions. I'd regret it in the morning, I told myself half-heartedly. So there it was, in a box the size of a dining table, a collection of beautifully machined gubbins just waiting to be assembled. In effect, the Orbe is a great big Mecano kit. Like Caterham Super Sevens, Michells don't come screwed together, you have to do it yourself. This way, says John Michell, more of your money goes on high quality materials and less on labour costs, and seeing this deck in the flesh, you can't argue. As I wielded the hex-key around various parts of the Orbe's circumference in an attempt to unite it

with my SME V, I mused over how it would sound in my system. After leaving it on overnight, bedding-in both myself and the deck's main bearing, I clamped the nearest available record on, cued it up and off I went.

How did it sound? It was more a case of how it didn't. John Michell's latest has a distinctive lack of sound. It's almost conspicuous by its absence. You don't really expect 'not to hear' your prized vinyl as it spins in

Columbo, more pedantic than Paxman, 'that's your LP, that is', says the Orbe as it scythes through to the deepest recesses of the groove

Curiously, the Orbe is at its most convincing when it's criticising the work of lesser front ends. It shows the Gyrodec's compressed spatial perspective, and how it adds a mechanical air to rhythms. It shows up the LP12 as the tonally coloured creature that it really is. It makes Pinks

front of you, but you do, if you see what I mean. Where's the surface noise? There is none. Where's the rumble? It's the province of lesser machinery. Where's the colouration, the euphony, that 'vinyl warmth' that Sunday colour supplement hacks mistakenly attribute to black plastic, rather than the turntable where it really lies? Gone, all of it. In its place is a mastertape-like clarity and surefootedness; the Orbe is almost surly in the way it hides its tracks. More analytical than Mr. Spock, more forensic than

sound euphonic, Xerxes wooden and Garrards coarse. But that's not the end of it, because although the Orbe is a devastatingly capable allrounder, I still have the slightest of reservations. The problem is that sometimes you can't forget you're listening to hi-fi. There I was, sitting listening to an adrenalinefuelled rendition of 'Teenage Kicks', toes atapping, and then suddenly my attention was drawn to how the guitar tracks were positioned in the mix, and how tightly the snare was tensioned,

and how the dead acoustics of the studio dulled Feargal's voice. Dammit, hi-fi again.

That's the problem it's so glass-clear you almost hear too much of what's going on. Highs slice your head off, harmonics ring, the bass gets the flares flapping and the soundstaging has you hallucinating like you're in the Green Field at Glastonbury. On lesser decks all this detail disappears into the ether, on CD it gets distorted to bits (pun intended). The Orbe makes music sound like one big firework display - you just have to sit up and listen. And if you go back looking for solace in less accurate vinyl-spinners, all you can think of is their failings in relation to the Orbe. Still, I guess this rather goes with the territory as far as super-decks are concerned. So it's a bit churlish to complain, like moaning that your McLaren F1 goes too fast.

In the good old days, analogue vinyl had a big fat lazy sound and digital the opposite. Both formats have been developed in different directions turntables require everbetter mechanical engineering solutions, CD players digital electronic ones - and yet both move ever closer sonically. It's a paradox isn't it, but what really surprises me is that subjectively at least, hi-fi manufacturing is still most impressive outside the digital domain. The Orbe shows how good old mechanical engineering done proper can still prevail over the latest and greatest in digital design and manufacturing. No lasers, no computers, no error correction, no robot circuit board stuffers, just craftsmen with lathes, milling and polishing machines making a device that drags a tiny lump of coal through the groove in some solid hydrocarbon polymer. If only my bank manager shared my admiration for the old ways

The demise of any hi-fi company is a sad loss to the industry. Even more so when it is legendary and its products represent the very best in their field. Nakamichi is one such company, whose decision to pull the plug on its range of hi-fi equipment came as a severe blow to those within the industry and enthusiasts alike.

Unlike other companies who've made the decision to cease hi-fi production, Nakamichi's day of judgement has come not through bankruptcy or foul play, but a simple change of emphasis. All Nakamichi's production is to be concentrated in the field of computers where, no doubt, they will become extremely profitable plying the Super Highway.

Nakamichi was best known, of course, for its truly legendary range of cassette decks. And in this case the term "legendary" isn't to be taken lightly. Over the years, they have produced cassette decks that, against all odds, managed to squeeze the most out of a fairly low-fi format, the analogue cassette.

The 1000ZXL, ZX-9, CR-7 and Dragon are all names that have been synonymous with the highest quality cassette performance over the past two decades. To this day, if it's a decent quality cassette deck over £400 you want, Nakamichi is still the first place to look with their exceptional DR range.

However, you had better be quick. Stocks have already just about dried up at UK distributor B&W This, combined with the fact that they are promising to maintain Nakamichi's exceptional service and spares back up, means that second hand prices are already beginning to strengthen. It's the ultimate testimony to Nakamichi's image that while most 'deathbed' companies' products immediately depreciate with the speed of a ton of bricks falling, quite the reverse is true of

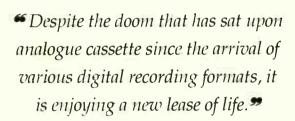

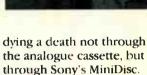


'S' noise reduction system has had much to do with this. New decks this season from Denon, Aiwa, Technics, Yamaha and Pioneer all illustrate this point with the widespread availability of Dolby S. Yet it's not just the latest Dolby circuitry that's leading the analogue cassette deck out of the doldrums.

Manufacturers are developing their own technology to further the cause of the cassette as a genuine hi-fi format. Pioneer have sophisticated automatic playback, record equalisation and biasing systems in their latest cassette decks. Technics' top decks have a new "thin film" head developed from DCC technology. So it would seem that despite the doom that has sat upon analogue cassette since the arrival of various digital

capture other manufacturers' and the public's attention. It seems to have found itself between a rock and a hard place. On the one hand, DAT (Digital Audio Tape) is making something of a comeback within the semiprofessional and home recording market. This has been helped by the falling cost (relative to inflation) of DAT tapes, and advances in hardware shown by companies such as Pioneer with their Super DAT system.

On another front, DCC faces stiff resistance from conventional analogue cassette. The latest cassette decks from Pioneer and Technics are, I believe, the final nail in DCC's coffin in this country. I say "this country" because in Japan, the States and even continental Europe, DCC is



Although MiniDisc is still viewed over here as a bit of a non-starter, it is becoming a serious contender elsewhere. Most of the larger companies have a single model or even several in their product catalogues. Whether or not the same will happen here remains to be seen. But I wouldn't be surprised to see more MiniDisc players coming to our shores during the hi-fi season of 1997.

Bearing this in mind, perhaps the resurgence of analogue cassette we are seeing now is to be short lived. With MiniDisc gaining increasing popularity overseas and recordable Compact Disc (CDR) technology becoming ever cheaper, perhaps analogue cassette does seem doomed after all.

And this is discounting the greatest threat of all. The Internet, and the advent of music that is simply 'on line' at the touch of a button, casts a dark shadow over the fate of all hi-fi sources. Although this won't mean much for loudspeakers and amplifiers, source manufacturers (CDs, tuners, cassette decks etc.) are bound to feel some effect. But what does the user record such 'on line' music on, when there's no access to the 'net? Why, computer driven recordable CD of course! Perhaps Nakamichi were wise to hedge their bets after all

new turntable mat isn't usually the most exciting launch in the world of hi-fi. One bearing the legend 'Ringmat', however, is a different story. Regular readers may remember my review of the 330Mkll, in which I proclaimed it to be by far the best accessory under £40 for (most) turntables.

The Ringmat was originally designed for DNM's no-compromise Reson Rotor turntable to offer minimum distortion and the best possible contact between record and platter. This was achieved by coupling an impregnated paper disc with a series of precisely spaced cork rings, placed on

both sides.

Improvements brought about at the end of 1994 gave us the 330Mkll. Now the design has been further refined to bring us the 330Mkll XLR. The improvements focus around a slightly wider outside ring and lower inside ring on the top of the mat. Underneath, the rings have also been realigned to suit. It doesn't seem a lot, especially as the price has risen in the process to £47.50. But as always, the proof is in the listening.

The main test for the XLR was a comparison against the original MKII, using my Roksan Xerxes. With a Van Morrison album, recorded at Ronnie

Scott's, vocals had a touch more body to them, and seemed to be slightly better projected. The saxophone had a more natural timbre and, again, seemed better separated from the rest of the mix. There was also an improvement in the decay of cymbals. The scale of the music was heightened, helped by a more focused bass line.

Turning to a Mary Black album did unearth an increased sibilance, highlighted especially with vocals. It was only slight though, and otherwise all was well. The soundstage was sharper and less diffuse than with the older design. The guitar had more texture, and a more natural timbre emanated from piano. Overall, the new Ringmat produced a slightly more natural, better-defined sound. Having said that, the word is slight. Although the differences are there, you do have to listen carefully for them.

Compared with rubber or felt mats, the Ringmat is far more 'open' and dynamic in its presentation. With most turntables, the bass line seems to drop an octave, whilst also improving in definition. There is more 'space' around instruments and increased depth to the soundstage. Above all the Ringmat brings a heightened sense of realism to individual instruments and vocals.

Another advantage of the newer Ringmats is that they seem to suit a wider range of turntables than before. And owners of the MkII can exchange their old one for the latest specification for £27.50, which I'd say is probably worth it.

Even though the XLR doesn't advance the cause quite as much as I'd hoped, in my opinion the Ringmat is still the best turntable accessory under £50 •

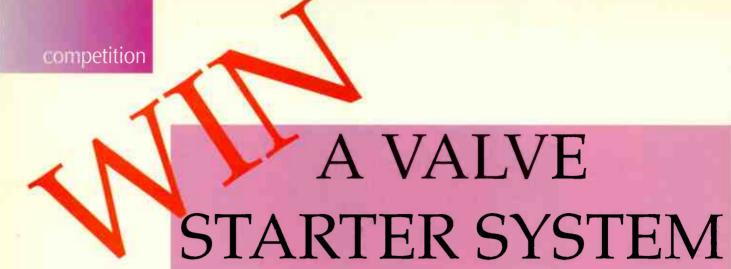

The musicality and involvement of the AMC's CDM 7 CD player won over Dominic Baker in our June Issue. It displayed impressive dynamics, from hi-hats right down to bass guitar notes. A delightful openness and clarity made listening to album after album easy.

Not only does this player score highly in the sonic stakes, it is also upgradeable. The CDM 7 supplied for the competition has a valve output stage; there is also an optical output module which allows the player to be used solely as a transport for those who want to use a different digital convertor.

To partner the AMC CDM7 we

chose the Sterling ETSE valve amplifier

from Audion which Haider Bahrani reviewed back in May. He found the combination of a £600 price tag and the clear, open and sweet sound of a pair of EL34 valves in single-ended configuration easy to fall for. With its dry, well controlled bass and excellent rendition with vocals, the Sterling was as convincing with older recordings like Hendrix's as it was with Bjork's more modern Post CD.

The final link in the hi-fi chain is

Wharfedale's Valdus 300 loudspeaker, scrutinised by Jon Marks in July. These 'speakers possess a smoother response than most, and good rendition of detail; they gave gripping performances with John Lee Hooker and Rimsky-Korsakov.

Another feature which sets the Valdus 300s apart is their relatively high sensitivity (89dB) and overall impedance(13ohms). They are one of

the very few budget loudspeakers that will suit valve amplifiers.

I remember seeing them in the Spring of '93, and was in awe of the black-bobbed Dolores and the sheer force of the passion she exuded with each word on songs like 'Dreams' and 'Linger'. Playing to a crowd of 200 for only a couple of hundred pounds, Dolores and the band were grateful for the reaction they got, and even a little shy. Of course, that's all changed in the last three years, and their third album, To The Faithful Departed is the result.

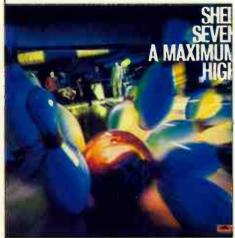
No more bobbed hair, no trace of shyness, The Cranberries grab the world by its throat - as ever Dolores has something she'd like to say. Unfortunately, this involves several more tracks of the likes of 'Zombie', winner of MTV's Best Single of the Year award. OK, it was a great song apart from those lyrics, 'and the guns and the bombs...' At the same time, I let it slide, thinking it was a one-off mistake aimed at the American market, trying to be all serious about Northern Ireland and spiralling into self-mockery.

But this third album confirms my deepest fears. There's a song called 'I Just Shot John Lennon', and another titled 'Hollywood', and worst of all a couple of songs about

When a cut hits you like a train at Mach I (that's the speed of sound if you never paid attention in Science class, more fool you), you know there's talent on the loose.

Anyway, trifling show-offy asides aside, let us proceed to the matter in hand, namely the second and breathtakingly sparkling new (second) long player from Shed 7, who are, at very least, the best Who-influenced group

this side of the Jam. I mean this with the utmost respect - the Who (at least until they started growing their

chest hair and writing 'pop operas') were the Pistols of Preachers of their time.

No small surprise that a third of this LP is former singles. And why not? That's how it used to be in the glory days and any worthwhile daze between. Take 'Going For Gold' with its truculent horn fills and out-of-breath-death guitar coda, or the hard-assed 'On Standby' with its wry 'Could you say it was tragedy/Because you saw it on the BBC?' Mozzer and Marr cry yourselves dry - your successors just took the crown.

Of course there's an inevitable downside to this, and on this disc it's 'This Day Was Ours' which is far more Smithsonian than any but the most cotton-eared could bear. Sadly the succeeding 'Ladyman' only compounds things by (a) being Smithier still, and (b) lacking any sort of irony. Witness only the line 'Should you prove to yourself you're nobody else/It throws me every time'. I know the feeling.

I could learn to love this record. But I haven't the slightest reason for it - as with early Echobelly - if it isn't simply that I find these men so, well, charming. war, including 'War Child' on which Dolores laments the plight of Bosnian children.

There are plenty of great tunes here, don't get me wrong, but it's becoming ever-increasingly difficult to stomach Dolores' righteous, 'let's change the world' lyrics. Maybe I'm just an old cynic.

UP, BUSTLE AND OUT
ONE COLOUR JUST

'Music should never be written for people to understand but to feel,' said Spain's Manuel De Falla. Despite failing to inform us who exactly Mr De Falla is, his quotation seems spot on for the sleeve notes of Bristol's latest odd-bod outfit Up, Bustle and Out.

While One Colour Just Reflects Another looks on the surface to be a load of pretentious artiness - better left for students and bead-wearers - it is easily, in fact, one of the best albums of the year so far.

The four-piece band's sleeve notes talk of 'riding horseback with Quechua Indians in the Andes' and the Peruvian flute representing the revolutionary woman's 'sentiments of solitude, sorrow and passion'. Laughable, yes indeed. But the way the talented foursome knit their strong South American influences with slices of accomplished funk, jazz,

soul and rap is pure class.

Hailing from the continuing Trip Hop adventure that is the little-known Ninja Tune Records, Up, Bustle and Out formed while at University and have taken their fusion to among other places Glastonbury Festival in 1992.

After extensive travels in Latin America and Turkey - where band leader Senor Roody recorded a series of impromptu musical sessions of East meets West - the band retired to the studio to splice up the 16 varied album tracks on One Colour.

Adding plenty of jazzy riffs and solos, most of the album works exceptionally well, particularly the excellent second track 'Revolutionary Woman of the Windmill'. With its driving rhythm, trippy synth and haunting flute melody it is one of this year's top vibes.

The rest of the album takes a great deal from England's current obsession with flamenco as well as other aspects of Spanish and South American culture. It is best characterised by the fragmented but fascinating 'Unmarked Grave', a tune in memory of Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid. There is even a feel of the Indian sub-continent on the brilliantly groovy 'Hand of Contraband'.

And where next? Well, according to the sleeve notes, an eight-month jaunt on the Iberian peninsula with a band of Spanish gypsies.

Anyone who has a soft spot for modern or Acid Jazz, the Young Disciples or Galliano should have no problem enjoying Up, Bustle and Out. A real talent has been born. Make sure you witness it.

EVERYTHING BUT THE GIRL WALKING WOUNDED VIRGIN CDV 2803



Walking Wounded is a coming of age. It is EBTG's masterpiece. And quite rightly. With this, their eighth studio album, the duo have at last hit the mainstream by cleverly fusing their melodic, moody and, OK, a touch depressing past with this year's vogue for Drum 'n' Bass and Jungle beats. The news is it works well.

It is easy to knock the oncedarlings of Indie Pop - as has been done in all the so-called trendsetter monthlies - for pinching the current underground club sounds. But EBTG are simply entering the modern era and have in quality and musical competence what five of the current fashionable flash-in-the-pan bands have in energy and style.

That Tracey Thorn and Ben Watt even got this album out is a testament to a great working (and emotional) partnership. Ben almost died recently of a mystery illness and having recovered, Walking Wounded is therefore an appropriate album title.

EBTG were always 'that sad band that every student seems to like', the other Smiths. Through the 1980s and 90s they brought out dozens of depressing but catchy records that always got into the top 10 of the Indie charts.

Then all of a sudden, Tracey was drafted for a major part on 1994's second Massive album, Protection, where she was put in charge of the vocals on both the single and title tracks and on the spooky 'Better Things'. All in all it heralded a rise in fortunes for the stalwart singer, who was in dire need of a lift.

The Massive effect rubbed off on her and next came last year's hugely successful Missing single, which was remixed with a Drum 'n' Bass sound off the Amplified Heart album of the previous year.

With Walking Wounded EBTG have essentially put together an album of singles and all its 11 tracks sound like film anthems with their deliciously crisp production.

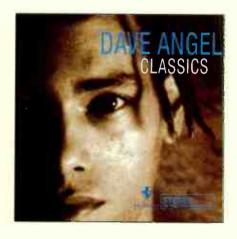
The title track is the classic example, with its fantastic hard core break beats and tune. It doesn't matter that this is EBTG - it still sounds as good on a packed, sweaty dancefloor as any of the latest fad 12 inch remixes.

Thus we have the old feeling and soulful ballads, moved up tempo with the schooling of the UK's finest ever dance band Massive. It will no doubt prove to be EBTG's meal ticket to success.

If you spend all your time reading dance reviews as I do (and I hope you don't) then you'll find a certain three numbers cropping up time and time again. From acid and trance to techno and house, the 303 has got its leads plugged in everywhere.

Unlike many techno artists Dave Angel knows what to do with his Roland TB-303. Its squeaks, squeals and swells underpin many of the cuts on this selection of his early work. Brooding atmospherics envelop the listener, allowing the tracks to flesh themselves out while still giving them enough room to breathe.

Of course there are those techno artists who slap on as many samples and loops as they can fit on a track and let the 303s run amok, knocking you to the floor with a barrage of warbles and wibbles. When this is successful you've got some of the most heads down music around.

However, Dave Angel demonstrates that the real talent is in mesmerising your audience with minimalist perfection - just enough but not too much of anything.

Time sheed hunab ku

When 1994's debut Crystal Oscillations hit the shops it seemed to promise so much. With (hopefully) tongue in cheek titles like 'Cosmic Carrot' and 'Voodoo Chronometer' I expected full-on trancey psychedelia. Fortunately this was in abundance. Unfortunately, many tracks seemed stuck in their own time-space continuum, lowering them into the ranks of the noodlesome wig-out.

So has two years been long enough for Timeshard to expand their universe

and live up to their potential? Well they've certainly made an effort. Hunab Ku stretches their musical boundaries to include elements of drum 'n' bass and folk (?!) into the equation. There's even guitar from indie-hippies Spiritualised not to mention eastern sounding instruments.

The title track is billed as "Earth forces are aligned through the pulses of consciousness sent from universal centre - Hunab Ku". Er, quite. What it sounds like is a towering inferno of raging 303s and burnt beats, the Eat Static-esque builds and crescendos mounting in fervour.

'Expand Forever' is drum 'n' bass with a psychedelic flavour, the 180bpm rhythm metallic and sharp-edged, in contrast to the playfully wistful melody.

Many cuts are spaced-out gems, some softly spoken while others rip through you. Timeshard have shown what they can do when they put their minds to it, but I still can't help thinking that there's something missing. Judging by the tripped-out sleeve notes I think Timeshard have that feeling too.

This is the first album by Speed Jack, after the release of a couple of promising 12 inches. In case you're wondering, Speed lack is Mark Bell, one half of LFO, who managed to create a mythology all of their own by first producing one of the worst albums ever and then going on to amaze everyone with an ageless classic. LFO, that infamous debut LP, prompted Radio | DJ Steve Wright to dub it, 'The worst album in the world'. Made by two 17-year-olds with a £30 toy Casio sampler and a Speak and Spell machine, it really was terrible. Strangely though, it became Warp Records' first Top 20 hit. But Jez and Mark's second offering was pure inspiration, meandering between old skool electro and lush Detroit techno. Deep and sparse and incredibly gorgeous.

So how does Surge fare? Probably somewhere between classic and cack so it would seem from LFO's history. The singles are proudly displayed here. 'Storm' is a beefy robo-techno adventure, and the sound continues to loop inside your mind long after the last note has faded. 'CTC' however is more accessible, luring you in as the track builds to dizzying heights.

Towards the end of the album it loses the plot in wispy samples declaring 'On fairground rides he's busy' and

'Dame Edna Everedge, Ken Dodd and Sean Maguire'?! This strange ambience certainly holds your attention. It's no classic, but it's far from 'LFO'. This is weirdest techno for the more discerning customer. I can't wait to see how the story unfolds.

The Ministry of Sound does appear to be living up to its name at the moment. London's best-known club has gone from strength to strength: 2 record labels have

been set up, they've released more records of late than you can shake a stick at... They even sell their own lighters with red and green flashing lights on them. It seems that everything they touch turns to gold.

With an ear for a good tune and a fat wad of cash the MOS's 'underground' offshoot label has released a first CD of seriously funky music. In the wake of MOS's 'Late Night Sessions' release earlier this year, 'An Open Minded Collection' continues in the same vein, a sort of prequel album to the laid back jazzyness of 'Late Night Sessions'.

This 2 CD set is as cool as anything on 'LNS' but there are also tracks on the experimental/techno tip from the likes of Francois K, Progression and Carl Craig's Paperclip People project.

There are the classics - DJ Food's 'Peace', MD X-Spress' 'God Made Me Phunky' - the exclusives and the weird. And collected together they are wonderful.

The ethos is all about collecting great music that people want to hear rather than looking for the all-elusive 'next big tune'. House music at its most eclectic, most soulful and most soothing. If I'm not careful I'll be buying one of those flashing lighters next. Oh well, I guess there's no use fighting it.

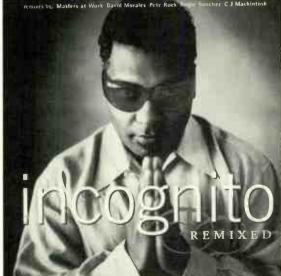

Sometimes you buy a remix album for its accessibility, sometimes for its obscurity. Sometimes you buy a remix album for the big name reworkings, and sometimes just to make sure your trainspotter-like collection is complete. None of these are good reasons to get your hands on a copy of Incognito Remixed.

You might be forgiven for thinking that Talkin Loud thought this was a simple way to milk the Incognito back catalogue. But one listen to the 12 tracks should wipe the slate clean if not completely dispel any cynicism.

True, a wide range of sub-genres is catered for here, from David



Maunick's drum 'n' bass mix of 'Barumba' to Roger's Ultimate Anthem Mix of 'I Hear Your Name' (the mix title speaks for itself). But this is more than a something for everyone, take your pick CD.

Old school mixes nestle next to fresh cuts (compare the David Morales classic version of 'Always There' with the Master At Work 96 mix, complete with sweeping strings and rich, rich bass.)

Never having been the biggest Incognito fan, or the biggest Talkin Loud fan for that matter, this is one album that definitely plucks the right strings. Crisp brass sections, seriously funky bass lines and those luscious, soulful vocals feel completely at ease together whether the mix treatment is Latin percussion, hip hop or hands-in-the-air

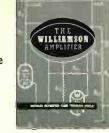
anthem.

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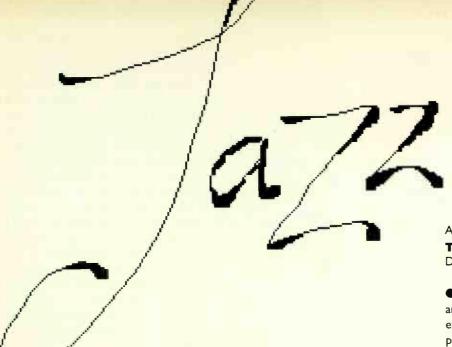

THE DAY OF THE ROBOT SUB META SM9804

● The Day of the Robot is the long-awaited follow up to Californian avantmetal guitar player Buckethead's solo debut Bucketheadland, now at least two years old. For the uninitiated (you lucky people!) it's beyond all rational doubt that Buckethead is just about the most exhilarating Heavy Metal guitar virtuoso to have done anything beyond all the standard HM pyrotechnic cliches, well, for a long, long time.

Then again, how many HM guitar players can you think of who've appeared in live improv shows with the likes of Derek Bailey and John Zorn; who are more obviously influenced by say, Parliament's Eddie Hazel than by, er, Eddie van Halen or whoever; who create albums about theme parks based on their own bizarre life (theme parks

which enjoy subsequent invasions by sundry monsters and giant robots, of course); and who consciously ally themselves with the cream of the New York avant garde jazz and new music scene (Bill Laswell, Zorn, Anton Fier...)?

And, for that matter, largely abandon guitar for their second album, instead producing almost an hour of fullon junglist rhythms, dub bass and ambient soundscapes? The Day of the Robot, for this alone, is a radical departure. Sure, it's very obviously the work of the same wired mind, but it's a huge leap into unknown territory. Yet one which works.

The album opens with two tracks which could quite easily be from its predecessor: some fiery metal riffing and inspired Maggot Brain-style grandstanding solos, but it's the junglist stuff which is really inspired.

Keyboardist and programmer Ninj has created a bunch of hair-raising Drum 'n' Bass rhythm tracks to which he, Buckethead and Laswell have added dazzling, breakneck guitar solos, deep, deep bass, scattering jazz piano, eerie drones... It's amazing stuff and, with a fair wind, could find a new audience for this amazing musician.

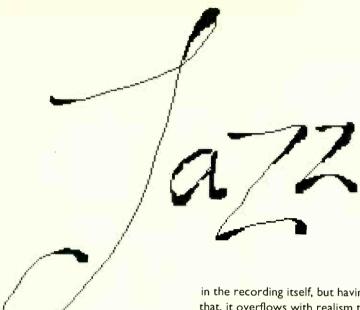

 Bill Laswell participates in this, another session featuring an extraordinary guitar talent. Arcana is potentially a most unlikely power trio: Laswell, known for his stellar productions, his awesome, part-Bootsy, part-dub bass, and forays into the polar extremes of noisy Free Improv and glacial ambient; superstar jazz drummer Tony Williams, just about the most virtuosic - and radically free - to have graced the music in the last thirty years; and improvising guitar player Derek Bailey, godfather of the British Free Music scene, a man dedicated to the creation of a cross-idiomatic, crosscultural improvised music (or spontaneous composition), who happens - along the way - to have developed the most original and personal electric guitar styles, and in any intelligent "100 Greatest Guitarists of All Time" (thank you, Mojo) would easily be up there with Charlie Christian and Jimi Hendrix.

Still, these may be three extraordinary musicians, but they are from very different disciplines: so does it work? Well, The Last Wave is easily the finest jazz album to have been released this year. Yes, we could expect astounding playing, but the communication as these players move through six long group improvisations is phenomenal.

Bailey's certainly undergoing something of a renaissance at the moment - witness his blazing contributions to the Harras collaboration with Zorn and William Parker and his teaming up with Japanese HM subversives Ruins - but his playing here is as brilliant as it's ever been in his long career. His sense of rhythmic freedom sits perfectly with Williams' dazzling polyrhythms, while Laswell, always a superb timekeeper, here adds a dexterous, elusive line that somehow underpins this music's chimaeric, yet awesome power. Essential.

THE PHIL WOODS QUINTET

THE PHIL WOODS QUINTET PLAYS THE MUSIC OF JIM MCNEELY

 In this CD we have an example of good straighthead jazz, in seven tracks written by the pianist of the quintet, lim McNeely. Despite McNeely's presence here, the main men are definitely Phil Woods on alto sax and Brian Lynch on trumpet, with fourth and fifth places going to bassist Steve Gilmore and Bill Goodwin on drums.

The 'main men' are where the main problem with this CD lies, since they seem to have this marvellous knack of springing around the soundstage with the alacrity of a cricket on a trampoline. Not that this is their fault, since they judging from the cover shot - are spry but not athletic gentlemen. I can only assume that there was something amiss

in the recording itself, but having said that, it overflows with realism to such an extent that at times it seems positively surreal.

If you have a system that sometimes sounds lifeless, it should combine well with this occasionally over-exuberant

CD, but owners of bright-sounding systems should pass up this opportunity in the interests of maintaining a believable soundstage. Nevertheless, it's almost enough to make you long for a woolly one-box system.



BARBARA THOMPSON'S **PARAPHERNALIA**

LADY SAXOPHONE

 Backed by slightly less paraphernalia than when I reviewed her 'Everlasting Flame' (the band is a quartet for this release) Barbara Thompson takes on Stevie Wonder ('All in Love is Fair'), Paul Simon ('I Do It for Your Love') and Duke Ellington ('What Am I Here For') along with five of her own tunes and two by Paraphernalia keyboardist Peter Lemer. The notes state that the ballads have been placed in settings 'created by my imaginative rhythm section', meaning Paul Westwood on bass and Jon

Hiseman on drums, It's no idle boast; Thompson's saxes and Lemer's keyboards weave around the bass and drum lines, creating a sweet and gentle if not always balladic - album which is by turns mellow, sumptuous and exciting.

The quality of the recording is more than acceptable, rendering the players accurately in tone and space without quite pinning down the very last nuances of the atmosphere of the session. It is, if anything, the counterpoint to the Phil Woods CD reviewed above; just as well played but a shade too firmly laid out, so that there appears to be little movement here as opposed to too much in the Phil Woods CD. This could well be academic since your decision to buy will be made on stylistic grounds, since they are both adequate recordings.



HEAVY SHIFT THE LAST PICTURE SHOW **ZEN 010**

 Here's one to be avoided if you have trouble understanding the younger generation. It's a confusing yet interesting amalgam of synthesized rhythms and samples in eight original - if you'll be so generous - tracks.

Heavy Shift consists of John Wallace and Willie South, who appear to have a penchant for sound bites, synthed bass and the ubiquitous children's choruses, without which an album just isn't complete.

It is far too processed to deliver sparkling sound quality and the overlaid samples come from so many sources and are all so differently recorded that any attempt to establish a soundstage would be risible. So forget the Zimmer frame and exercise those hip prostheses on the dance floor because this album delivers visceral enjoyment by the truckload once you forget mere intellectual deconstruction. But keep an eye on that blood pressure Pops. . .

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Kenneth Gilbert, harpsichord DG Archiv Masters 447 297-2

● Canadian-born Kenneth Gilbert plays an instrument from his own collection in this highly recommendable Bach recital, a glorious-sounding harpsichord built in 1671 by the Antwerp-based Jan Couchet. The instrument, with its rich, bejewelled sound, was later enlarged by Blanchet in Paris around 1759, and then by Taskin - in the same city - in 1778.

Its most recent restoration was under the guidance of Hubert Bedard in 1980 and, given care in the volume setting, this recording will allow the full range of colours and dynamics, as well as the finer nuances of the sound, to be truthfully projected. There is none of the brittleness or 'fizz' so often associated with recordings of the harpsichord and, although the sound is pleasantly enhanced by the acoustic, the

focus is unwavering and the detail unclouded.

The six works in the programme have been collated from sessions which took place in 1990 and 1992 at the Salle Italienne of the Musee de Cloitre in Chartres. Each displays the blend of scholarship and sensitivity which has always characterised Kenneth Gilbert's playing. There is virtuosity, of course, but never for its own sake, and refinement, but the lasting impression is of intensely personal, deeply questing performances. By any measure, this is Bach playing of the highest order.

Apart from the famous Chromatic Fantasia and Fugue in D minor, Kenneth Gilbert's recital eschews the usual keyboard warhorses for some refreshingly less familiar pieces, including the delightful 'Variations in the Italian Style', the last such set Bach was to write until the monumental Goldberg Variations of some forty years later.

All the compositions here, incidentally, date from around 1703 to 1717, Bach's so-called 'apprentice years'. Various influences are apparent, including that of Diderik Buxtehude in the two elaborate Toccatas, and the Italian concerto style in the Prelude BWV894. Above all, though, it is the flowering genius of Johann Sebastian Bach which Kenneth Gilbert, ably assisted by the Archiv engineers, so effectively conveys here.

● This is a timely reissue by DG, given that Haydn's great oratorio has been chosen - for the first time - to inaugurate the Proms season on July 19. The work that - literally - begins at the beginning appears a most appropriate choice to launch the Promenade concerts into their second century.

It is said that a glimpse of the starlit heavens through a telescope belonging to his friend, the astronomer Herschel, gave Haydn impetus to create a work celebrating Creation itself and the result, first performed in 1798, is certainly one of the grandest works of the eighteenth century. However, the inspiration for that grandeur came during one of Haydn's visits to London, when he attended a Handel concert in Westminster Abbey. The sound made by some four hundred voices in the anthem Zadok the Priest left its mark.

The Creation has been a lucky work in the recording studio: Antal Dorati's Decca version is memorable for its intensity and sheer exhilaration, and remains in the front rank. Haydn's oratorio also inspired Karajan, and his 1966 interpretation with Gundula Janowitz and Fritz Wunderlich remains mightily impressive. There is also a revelatory period instrument performance from Christopher Hogwood on L'Oiseau-Lyre.

Levine's 1991 Berlin version, now reissued in DG's Masters series, also impresses with its scale and drama,

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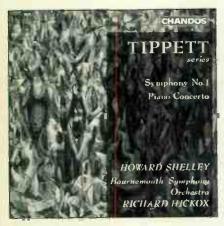
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although I miss some of the warmth that Dorati, especially, brings to the score. However, aided by sumptuous playing from the Berlin Philharmonic and fine choral singing from the Stockholm forces, Levine manages the great choruses, such as that which concludes Part One ('The heavens relate the glory of God') supremely well, and I appreciated his fluent and finely-judged handling of the arias. The soloists are eminently satisfying, with Kathleen Battle in delightful voice.

With a spacious, well-balanced recording made in Berlin's Jesus-Christus Kirche, Levine's Creation is well worth considering in its new midprice incarnation.

 With this recording, the seemingly indefatigable Richard Hickox completes his cycle of the Tippett symphonies for Chandos. Hickox's commitment to British music in recent years has been unequalled, with a particular emphasis on Elgar, Britten, Delius and - of course - Tippett. Whatever the programme, he seems to relish the challenge and brings to it a questing enthusiasm. This recording is a case in point, with every detail and nuance of the scores illuminated, but not at the expense of structure or flow. Hickox's firm grasp and understanding of these works is evident throughout, and he draws superlative playing from the

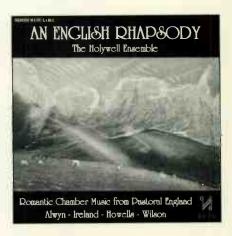
Bournemouth orchestra.

This is Tippett at his most tautly abstract and 'purely' classical, music of quicksilver invention and inspired development - witness the six themes that flow one to another, fantasia-like, throughout the restlessly energetic first movement of the symphony. This appeared in 1945, an earlier attempt having been withdrawn, and it suggests a command both of the form and of the musical devices available to the composer. The adagio, for example, reflecting Tippett's admiration for Purcell, is underpinned by a set of variations over a ground bass, with at its heart a haunting dance-like sequence for three flutes. The movement's structure is symmetrical, the music of the first half being mirrored by the

After a brilliant, Beethoven-esque scherzo, the finale brings a summation of Tippett's contrapuntal skills with a superbly-wrought double-fugue, the rugged nature of the first subject in sharp contrast with the gentler outlines of the second. With this fugue, Tippett attains the climax of both the movement and the symphony as a whole, but there is no triumphant conclusion. Instead, the music vaporizes into a series of trills and a thunderous E in the bass. That same note is then repeated, but this time pianissimo, to supply an enigmatic ending to the work.

Tippett was inspired to write a piano concerto by hearing the great Walter Gieseking play the first movement of Beethoven's Fourth Concerto, and the poetry which suffuses that work is much in evidence here. There is also more than a passing nod to the equally rhapsodic Third Piano Concerto of Bela Bartok. There is much magical writing here, not just for the piano, but for flutes, viola, horns and even celesta. The slow movement echoes the 'darkness-to-light' transition of the Beethoven, with its heart-easing reconciliation between the angry strings and benign piano, and the finale is pure ebullience. Howard Shelley, whose lyrical playing has previously graced several outstanding Rachmaninov recordings for Chandos, is an ideal soloist in the Tippett, finding the fantasy and delicacy in the solo writing as well as its virtuosity. With imaginative accompaniment from Hickox, it is difficult to imagine a more persuasive

performance of this concerto. And, like the symphony, it is given a satisfyingly spacious, airy and well-balanced sound by Chandos, one that allows all the richly-coloured strands of Tippett's writing to shine through.



AN ENGLISH RHAPSODY

Chamber music by William Alwyn, Herbert Howells, John Ireland and Jeffrey Wilson

• Romantic chamber music from pastoral England' reads the subtitle on the cover of the CD insert and, while there are moments of wistful, folksy contemplation, the description doesn't do full justice to the intensity and invention that underpins all of the works here.

The range is broad, from John Ireland's finely-wrought Phantasie Piano Trio of 1906, to Jeffrey Wilson's moving Elegy of 1988, and all six works are played with engrossing commitment by the five members of the Holywell Ensemble.

The CD cover reminds me that I made their earlier recording of chamber music by Frank Bridge and Herbert Howells, also on the British Music Label (BML003), 'Record of the Month' back in December 1993 and this new collection would easily merit a similar accolade. And, as before, the recording, engineered by Mike Skeet, seduces with its natural balance, openness and presence. It is certainly an object lesson in how to record that notoriously difficult combination of piano and strings.

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 With the technical standard of quartet playing now so high, so much so that even a work such as the Bartok Fourth Quartet holds no terrors for most ensembles, clearly the success or failure of a recording must reside in factors other than an accurate rendering of the notes of the score. That the members of the Tokyo Quartet are accomplished players goes without saying, and they tackle the most demanding passages with an assurance and confidence that is breathtaking. This is the kind of idiomatic playing you would expect from one of the Hungarian quartets which has Bartok's music in its blood.

However, there is more, much more, to these performances. The players have got 'under the skin' of these scores and developed an understanding which translates into interpretations which are not only fresh and involving, but frequently revelatory. I revelled in the subtle colourings in, for example, the first movement of Bartok's Second

Quartet, and the quicksilver response to the rhythmic gymnastics of the finale of the Fourth.

I cannot imagine that a work such as the latter, or the Third and Fifth Quartets for that matter, will ever come to be regarded as 'easy' music, but when the essential spirit of the music is communicated as well as it is here, then the only barriers to understanding and appreciation will lie within the listener. The Tokyo Quartet pull no punches when it

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comes to Bartok's most vinegary dissonances, or his most spiky contrapuntal creations, and the playing in the slow movements, such as the mysterious adagio of the Fifth Quartet exudes a palpable tension.

It was an inspired idea on someone's part to combine the

Bartok cycle with the two string quartets of his Czech contemporary, Leos Janacek. However, where the six quartets of the former span virtually his entire creative life (from 1908 to 1939), Janacek's compositions both belong to his last years. This was the period when the elderly composer had become passionately and obsessively attached to Kamila Stossova, the young wife of an antique. Although it is doubtful whether this devotion was

reciprocated other than in a platonic friendship, Janacek nonetheless poured his feelings into these quartets with undisguised intensity. Hence the subtitle of the Second Quartet ('Intimate Letters') and the First Quartet's allusion, not to Beethoven's 'Kreutzer' violin sonata, but to Tolstoy's novel of the same name, a tale of jealousy and vengeance.

As with Bartok, the Tokyo Quartet penetrates the heart of Janacek's scores. If ever a string quartet could be described as 'operatic' it is surely here, as the listener is swept along on a tide of violently contrasting

emotions.

The recordings, I should add, complement the playing wonderfully well, with clean, natural balances and a warm, rich tonal quality. It is difficult to conceive of a more truthful representation of this endlessly enriching music.

Music by John Ireland dominates the programme: as well as the Phantasie Piano Trio, there is the Rhapsody for solo piano of 1915, a piece that pays overt homage to Debussy and Ravel (and is superbly played here by Margaret Ozanne). The third Ireland work is his Fantasy-Sonata for Clarinet and Piano of 1943, written for the great Frederick Thurston and with Peter Nichols the hardly less-accomplished

clarinettist here. A generously-timed recital is completed with Herbert Howells's sumptuously melodic and rhapsodic Sonata for Violin and Piano of 1917 and William Alwyn's Rhapsody for Piano Quartet of 1938, a work of compelling drama and energy, unfolding at its heart a viola tune of magical, limpid beauty. And, although written five decades after the Alwyn composition, Jeffrey Wilson's Elegy - written on the

death of the composer's father - shares a similar lyrical and emotional charge, and is equally accessible and enriching.

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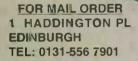

In keeping with the Etalon range, the Exampli amplifier was found to be very healthy on the test bench. Power output wise it delivered a good 38watts into an 8Ω load. Its frequency response of 5Hz to 100kHz is wide.

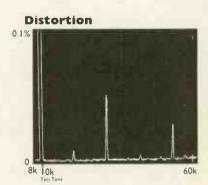
Separation and noise figures shown are more akin to those leaving Far Eastern shores than European ones, strutting alongside a sensitivity of 180mV that should have it functioning with ease with most signal sources.

Harmonic distortion results were also good, dipping as low as 0.009% (1kHz at lwatt) for normal listening levels.

This is a well engineered piece of machinery. **HB**

Just carrying this not-so-little integrated amplifier on to the test bench was a feat matched only by the amplifier's own performance. Churning out 50watts into an 8Ω resistive load and a very healthy 85watts into a 4Ω load the Integral 1 should be happy driving most speaker systems.

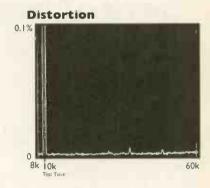
Frequency response was verging on the wideband, with 1dB roll off points at 7Hz and 150kHz respectively. Distortion figures were excellent compared to most other animals of its breed, dipping as low as 0.006% at normal listening levels and barely exceeding 0.3% at full power and at high frequencies.

Combine the above with a high sensitivity of 130mV and good noise and separation results, this is one well engineered, if back breaking, amplifier. HB

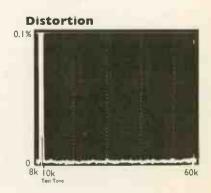
Having the RC750 on the test bench was, in measurement terms, quite a pleasurable experience. It managed to deliver 338watts into an 8Ω load and 342watts into 4Ω . This power limitation with heavier loads is a deliberate safety design feature I have been informed. Either way its power capability is way beyond the requirements of the average sized living room.

The frequency response at the -1dB roll off point starts at 3Hz and stays flat well beyond the 100kHz point. With an 83dB channel separation and a virtually undetectable noise trace (-122.4dB) there really is little bad to say here.

Distortion figures were much in line with specification with highest measurable level being 0.007% - a very low figure. **HB**

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AMPLIFIERS

BENCHMARK ROYNON AMP/PHONO STAGE

The Roynon amplifier was found capable of delivering 72watts into an 8Ω load and a healthy 121 watts into 4Ω . Speaker driving problems will be few with this animal.

Sine wave sweep frequency response spans from 8Hz to 92kHz. Distortion figures were very good too, going as low as 0.003% at normal listening levels and remained low throughout the audioband and at higher output levels. Line sensitivity was higher than usual at 150mV.

The Benchmark also has both MM and MC phono stages. The former gave a frequency response of 55Hz to 83kHz whilst the latter tailed off at 28kHz (-1dB). This curtailing of the lower frequencies points to some warp filtering being employed.

Both stages were found to have very high sensitivity with MM at 0.65mV and MC at 40µV. High output cartridges may overload this system. Noise figures were also rather low, which would be related to the

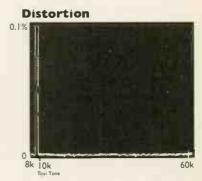

DENON DRM-650S CASSETTE

Equalisation in the replay amplifier differed between the channels, but overall there was some treble lift, an unusual characteristic. This will helpfully brighten up prerecorded tapes, by maintaining treble energy and Dolby B tracking accuracy. A 5dB level difference between channels may slew the stereo image a little though.

Hiss in the replay amps was a little higher than usual, attributable to this extra high frequency gain, but it was still lower than tape hiss (bias noise). Hum was low enough too. The Denon will play prerecordeds well, and also make recordings that will transfer well into a car player or personal stereo.

The single-capstan transport worked well, displaying balanced results with well contained drift (low rate speed variations), wow (medium rate) and flutter (high rate). I'd expect a reasonably clean, stable sound in consequence.

Variable bias (tape tuning) affected only chromes and ferrics. Metals have strong treble lift and will sound bright, possibly coarse. Since the head overloaded early with metals, reaching IEC 0dB reference level (250nWB/m), they are not the best choice. With Dolby S however, which not only suppresses hiss but also ameliorates the effects of overload, right across the audio band, quality ferrics are a sensible choice. The DRM-650S offers flat frequency

response with them, from 22Hz right up to 20kHz.

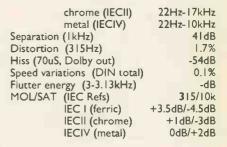

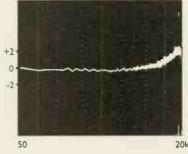

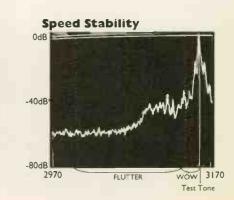

CD PLAYERS

HARMAN/KARDON HD-730

Although this player's treble roll off point (-IdB) was a respectable 20.3kHz there was an obvious lift, as can be seen on the plot, at the low frequency end. I would expect the machine to have some sonic emphasis at the bottom end.

Distortion wise the 730 is lost in the crowd, although the perceived distortion was found to be predominantly even harmonic. This, alongside gently rolled off treble and accentuated bass, should contribute to a warmer than usual sound.

Separation figures were good, but not evenly matched in the left and right channels, which follows on from a notable difference in the distortion figures too.

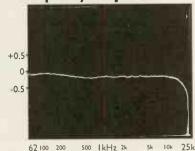
Output was found to be higher than the 2volt standard at 2.3volts displaying good, IEC A weighted noise and dynamic range figures too. The measured performance was good, if a little characterful in places. HB

SONIC FRONTIERS SFT-1/SFD-2 MkII

This Sonic Frontiers combination measured surprisingly well; surprising, because there's often little to choose between CD players. It had a very smooth frequency response, gently rolling off at the top end and below 60Hz. which I'd expect to result in a warmish sound, but one with good projection.

Distortion too was well mannered, harmonics hardly visible at -30dB, a level picked to represent a typical music signal. At -60dB, distortion was just 0.4%, one of the lowest we've measured and correlating to 110dB dynamic range (EIAJ test)

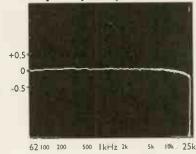
Channel separation showed some discrepancy, there being around 20dB difference between the results for the two channels, but this could be to do with the valve output stage. The only other area of slight concern was the low output figure of 1.58V. Philips set the standard at 2V, and personally 1 prefer to see players on the high side which allows more headroom when using a passive preamplifier. But you can't have everything, and the Sonic gets it right in all the most important areas. DB

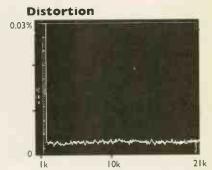

TEAC VRDS-25

With a treble lift starting at 5kHz, reaching +0.2dB at 15kHz before starting to roll-off, the TEAC is going to have quite a bright and insightful sound. Just +0.2dB may not sound like much, but from past experience I've found that it is more than enough to colour the sound with CD. Other than this though, the frequency response of the VRDS-25 is flat and well mannered.

Its distortion characteristic is interesting too. Although harmonics are clearly visible in our -30dB plot, picked to represent a typical music signal, they are even-order in structure, which is generally innocuous. At lower signal levels distortion stayed low, a good sign.

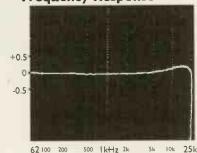
Elsewhere performance was normal enough. Echoing the low distortion, dynamic range was a healthy 110dB and output just a fraction over the Philips standard at 2.2V.

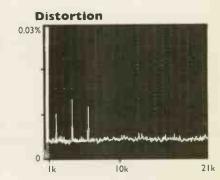

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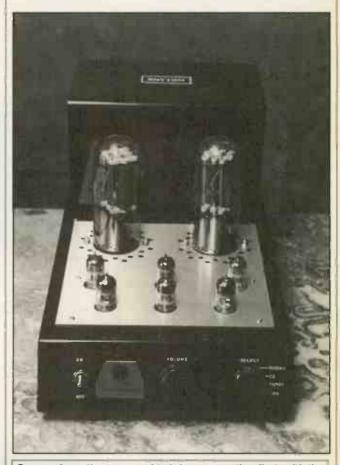
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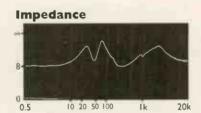
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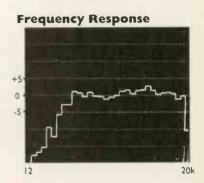
CASTLE HARLECH

Castle's Harlech loudspeakers have a very smooth frequency response. There is a little lift around 4kHz, but this should only serve to aid projection and insight rather than colour the sound. Bass extends low, and it's flat, so I'd expect deep but not overblown bass from Castle's twin 1/4 wave horn loading.

The Harlechs aren't that sensitive though, measuring 84.5dB at 1m when supplied by a nominal watt pink noise signal. Overall impedance is high at 11.4 Ω , which is typical of British loudspeakers. It means the speakers will not demand high drive current. The impedance curve is reasonably smooth too, suggesting that they are not too reactive a load. I'd recommend amplifiers capable of

30watts or more for best results. DB





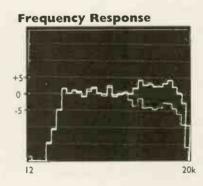
TANNOY AMS8

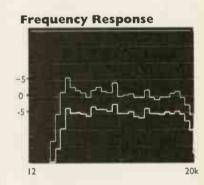
Tannoy's AMS8s are an active loudspeaker; that is, they have built-in power amplifiers. The active crossover employed allows a number of settings to be chosen, where treble boost and cut can be applied as well as bass equalisation.

The effect of the treble contour can be seen in the plot. It is a continuously variable control, allowing 3dB of boost or cut. This is a lot of range and starting from around 1kHz will have a strong effect on treble energy, allowing you to take the balance from very bright to very dull. The 'Flat' position on the control panel was accurately marked though, giving the very smooth response shown at the bottom of the far plot.

The far plot also shows the effect of the bass contour control. The upper response trace shows the extra boost applied, causing a peak around 60Hz to add extra weight and the impression of extension. In fact, with the contour on low bass (30Hz) is cut to maintain power handling because of the extra energy boost above.

With a smooth response and the facility to tailor the sound to individual tastes, the AMS8s certainly look an interesting prospect.



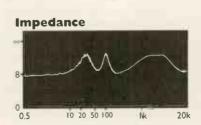


SYSTEM AUDIO 1005

The System Audio 1005's gave their flattest and best balanced response with the grilles off. They are typical of many bookshelf loudspeakers, with low frequencies peaked up to give the impression of strong bass and a corresponding rise in the treble to balance it. There is a lift in the midrange too, so expect good projection. All this means that I'd expect a balanced and lively sound from the 1005s.

Producing a lowly 83dB at 1m for a nominal watt pink noise signal, the 1005s are going to need a bit of power to go loud. But a high overall impedance of 10Ω means they won't demand high current, and the impedance curve is smooth too so they present a mainly resistive load - easy for amplifiers to deal with. Considering they are

likely to find themselves in smallish rooms, around 30-50watts should be adequate. DB

ORCHID PRECISION AUDIO

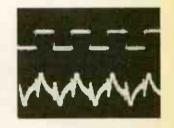
It was 1822 when Jean Baptiste Joseph Baron De Fourier invented the Fourier transform, the powerful and elegant mathematics which can describe a complex signal such as music in terms of a collection of simple sine waves, and in so doing laid the foundations for the way we now measure the fidelity of a hi-fi component in terms of its "frequency response".

But there was always more to the Baron's theory than that, there is the phase response, the forgotten part. And leaving out the phase response provides just half a description. Perhaps nowhere more so than with loudspeakers.

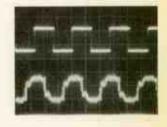


ORCHID PRECISION AUDIO - THE PHASE LINKED LOUDSPEAKER

So here's the test that nobody shows you, the square wave test. A square wave contains a very rich spectrum of harmonics. If a loudspeaker can reproduce these harmonics without altering either their amplitude or phase, a square wave will be obtained at the microphone. The first photograph is the response of a respected American loudspeaker trying to reproduce a 300 Hz square wave. You could be forgiven for remarking that the output (on the lower trace) looks nothing like the input (on the upper trace). This is phase distortion. If this measurement was of an amplifier, it wouldn't even merit a review.



Surprisingly, some manufacturers actually state that loudspeakers are generally incapable of reproducing a square wave, due to all sorts of reasons. We don't feel that way, as the lower photograph shows. With enough care, which we have, this higher level of fidelity can be obtained.



But what does it all mean? It means that these loudspeakers reproduce music on a grand scale and preserve all the subtle nuances that contribute
