

Does this commercial success mean a change in the band's policy, and how much of it is due to the clever publicity sur-rounding Mr. Bilk and his Paramount Jazz Band?



I'm not sure. I have got used to watching the MM charts. What really hits me is walking along the street and seeing my own face staring at me from sheet music.

DID you record "Summer Set"

No. It was part of our 12 inch LP. "The Seven Ages of Acker."



WAS it a deliberate attempt to follow Barber's " Petite Fleur. " ?

No. In fact we first recorded it six years ago for a private label in Bristol. The tune was written some time before that by Dave Collett, from Bristol, and myself.

WOULD you like to go to the States?

Yes, very much. If "Summer Set" does well there, it may lead to something.

Do you agree that the future of traditional jazz seems to lie wholly in Europe?

Yes. I agree that when the older Americans finally go, there seems to be no one left to take their place. I think that, musically, we can already hold our own with the Americans. Where they score over us every time is in sense of rhythm and

Rhythm

To me, in most British trad groups It seems that the front line is swinging the rhythm section instead of vice versa. Is that fair comment?

I think it is. There is nothing worse than laying back and finding the rhythm section slowing down with you. I don't think that applies to my own

S there anything you particularly scene in Britain?

I don't like the pigeon-holing of jazz. You find it in Britain than anywhere else. more There is plenty of fine jazz played in all the different schools. Although New Orleans has everything I want in music, it doesn't follow that I think there is nothing worthwhile in other styles.

WHAT do you listen to for your own pleasure?

Most of my records are of hrough the clubs and we never year uniforms there.

How do you feel about bowler hats?

I can't get away from them.

Most of my records are of clarinettists. People like Edmond Hall. George Lewis, Johnny Dodds, Omer Simeon and Albert Nicholas—all subtle players. I try to study not so much what they play as where they play it—the timing of it.

You have to do them. I don't like going away from my family. I have a small son and my wife is expecting another child next month. The drag is, I shall be in Germany.

Do you think many of a typical jazz club audience really know what the music is all about?

I think appreciation is growing. I notice now that if you play a good solo you get applause. If it's a bad one nothing happens. In the ballrooms, too, we find a much bigger crowd just standing in front of the band and listening.

Does the future look bright for British trad?



POP SINGER

A fateful day in September, 1957, decided the careers of two of these backroom boys: Monty Norman and David Hencker-their present careers, that is, because neither of them started out as songwriters.

By the time they first met, Monty Norman had already built an enviable reputation as a pop singer. As "resident" vocalist with half a dozen local gig bands, he managed to get a couple of radio spots—and was promptly signed on with

Cyril Stapleton

Eighteen months later, he made his TV debut in "Hit Parade." This was followed by a period with Stanley Black, and record sessions for Polygon and the EMI group.

OWN SONGS

It was at this time that he began to compose his own songs. But he soon found that his singing left him with little time for songwriting and, in October, 1953, he opened in Variety, at the old Chelsea Palace, in his

first solo venture. This appearance brought him many bookings and, after top-ping the bill all over the country, he decided to try cabaret.

lt was this decision that brought him into contact with David Heneker, who—son of General Sir William Heneker (at one time GOC, British Army of the Rhine)—was intended for a military except. military career. After Sand-hurst, he joined the 17th Lancers and saw 12 years' service in the regular army.

He quit the army shortly before the war, but rejoined in 1939 and gained a War Office position. Every spare moment was spent at the piano, however, and, at heart, he was more of a musician than a soldier.

When Monty Norman began his quest for cabaret material, it was David Heneker—then a private citizen again—who was brought in to supply it. And so began a highly profitable part-

"As a boy. I played violin for a start." said Stewart, "but I wasn't too interested in the squeak-box. After I decided to make the bass my instrument. I studied for a year at Boston Conservatoire.

"At that time, I was playing in combos around Boston, and in one of them was an alto doubling fiddle. When he took a solo on violin he would sing along with it in unison—an effect he'd dreamed up.

. . . bass

"If he can do that with a little violin, I thought, why shouldn't I do the same idea on bass? Pretty soon I was trying it out, but singing an octave above the bass. I started to humming with one of the local groups before I left Boston. The boys didn't think too much of it."

think too much of it."

I asked if the "singing violinist" was anyone I might know. He was Ray Perry, whose amplified fiddle was feetured by I would be was feetured by I would by I would be was feetured by I would be was feetured by I wo featured by Lionel Hampton on a few records—"Fiddle Dee Dee" among them. "In 1936, I heard that Pea-

"I was developing my bow-ing, whenever they gave me a solo, and I tried it out when the Bob Crosby band passed through Buffalo and came by the place. Afterwards I upped and asked Bob Haggart what he thought of my solo style.
"He told me directly that he didn't think it was practi-cal. But it didn't stop me. That's when I went back to

New Jersey, where I was born, and started jamming and seeking something around the New York clubs.

"Before long, at one of the uptown places, I ran into Slim Gaillard. He had a radio programme on WNEW playing gramme on WNEW, playing guitar and singing, and he invited me to do a show with

"It was the first time we had played together, but we fell into it with each other. He played lead and I played rhythm bass, then one or two solos with that new singingand-bowing style.

The name

"It was just the two of us, going at it by ear, but disc jockey Martin Block was so impressed he signed us up. "We decided then and there

to team up and began looking for a name. Seeing that I was slammin' around on the bass, and that it went nicely with Slim, Slam was produced. Before that I was generally know as 'Bassy.' I never heard of another Slam, did

you?

"All this was the beginning of the 'Flat Foot Floogie,' which was a big record success in 1938. We didn't do too well out of it, though. Slim and Slam went on until Slim joined the Army, in 1942. We never made it together again.

joined the Army, in 1942. We never made it together again.

"Shortly afterwards. I got close to Art Tatum and joined the Trio in '43. Later I was with Benny Goodman, then formed my own trio. I rejoined Art in the 'fiftles, and have now been working with Rose for nearly four years.

"How did I feel about working with Tatum? At first it was hard, and I felt a little leary of it. But it turned out to be one of the great experiences of my life.





Before long, however, one realises that he is a musician of great emotional range, fine technique and a subtlety combined with occasional under statement which justifies his increasing influence on modern creasing influence on modern

His chief fault, I find, is a lack of tonal variation which occa-sionally brings a feeling of mono-

tony to his more lengthy solos.

The new Esquire album is as good an example of Coltrane's capabilities as we have had.

He shows his ability on good unhackneyed material including the little-heard ballad "I Want to Talk." which was written, and recorded, by Billy Eckstine.—Bob Dawbarn.

DESPITE the many years since he was first noticed on Claude Hopkins records, Ed-mond Hall's clarinet remains virile, nimble and strikingly hot

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
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
