



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Airwave-friendly CD is not a hit with all DJs

OMPACT DISC may be fast becoming the format of choice at all levels of the broadcasting industry, but it seems Radio One could be stickit seems Radio One could be stick-ing with seven-inch vinyl for some time to come. Some of the station's top DJs say they simply prefer it. This could have enormous sig-nificance in the still-raging formals war if major labels find themselves pressing seven inch singles to cater for a handful of Radio One jocks rather than for any clear public de-

WHEN THE Blue Nile walked on to London's Dominion Theatre stage to preform their concert, the sense of occasion seemed to overwhelm both the audience and the band. 
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Sofa — so good

T MAY seem decidedly odd to suggest the music industry ought to count its blessings after one of the dullest summers of recent years — but as most of us approach the key autumn selling season with hope and some prophasic

opprehension, I believe we should do just that.
Not so long along I used to work in the furniture business. Contrary to expectations, if turned
out to be a fairly exciting business; unfortunately, however, that was only because if lurched
from one newsworthy crisis to another.

Furniture is almost uniquely reactive to the state of the economy — and sure enough right

now it is in a pretty rotten state. Look at the disaster that was the collapse of Lowndes Queensway.

Queensway.

But as the music business confronts fears that it, too, will finally suffer the recession which has already laid low everybody from housebuilders to carmakers to advertising agencies, it is noticeable that many

of the factors which dog durables industries like furniture provide definite pluses for music.

Furniture is typically a high price/low interest pruchase. Few people buy furniture because they want to; an the contrary, more often than not, it's the classic distress purchase. The average person buys a bed only once every 10 to 15 years, And when they do, they tend to 15 years, And when they do, they tend to that most people spend a third of their lives in tem, beds have a very low perceived volue. Music, on the other hand, is high interest/low cost, Despite the idiocies of the Consumer's As.

Music, on the other hand, is high interessive cost. Despite the idiocies of the Consumers' Association on CD pricing, recorded music still provides one of the best value for money purchases around. And with cinema tickets in central London now reaching £6.50 or even more, it also compares well with rivol entertainments.

As for inferest value, I can confirm that there are few true furniture fans out there. Sociologists have yet to discover such a thing as an assessive collector of upholstery. MFI finds it difficult to attract the same devotion from its customers as New Kids On The Block. And there is as yet no Sulmberland frazine.

It is this low cost/high value equation, I believe, which means that we can approach our key selling season in reasonably good cheer. Double-digit inflation or not, as we build up to the six most important days of 1990, the next three months are guaranteed to be the busiest of the year.

In 1989, as shown by the graph below, 1.6m singles were sold in the week before Christmas, more than twice as much as "narmal". A huge 7.2m albums were sold in the same week—around three-and-a-half times as much as "susual. And that was no anomaly; there has

It only remains for me to wish you an early Merry Christmas — and most definitely a prosperous one.





Hart of the matter

by Dave Laing CHARLES HART, composer, lyricist and songwriter, is tasting the prob-

lems of success.

In 1985 he was playing synthesizer in the pit band of The Diary Of Adrian Mole. Then he was second place in the Vivian Ellis Prize competition for musical theatre and caught the eye of one of the judges. As a result Hart collaborated with Andrew Lloyd Webber on first Plantam Of The Opera

orated with Andrew Lloyd Webber on first Phontom Of The Opera and then Aspects Of Love.

Now, he stops, "I have a whole sheet of ideas, some more developed than others". They range from one-off songs in search of a publisher and covers to a ong-cycle lest for broadcast an Radio Livel and "South Health and the Covers to a long-cycle lest for broadcast an Radio musica". series, Watching and Split Ends. Hart's first (and abiding) inspira-tion was the new Oxford University professor of music theatre, Stephen Sondheim. In 1976 his grand-mother, the actress Angela Baddeley, was appearing in A Little Night Music. "I found it a total revelation and surprise", Hart re-calls. "As a teenager I listened to

all his other shows obsessively."

A national competition on the theme of litter was the unlikely inspiration for Hart's own first song written while he was a schoolboy. He went on to study music at Cam bridge, where he worked on the adaptation of the eighteenth cen-tury novel Moll Flanders that was to win him the Ellis prize. He also participated in student theatrical life: "I was in the Footlights ponto-mime, but in the charus. The stors were Hugh Laurie, Stephen Fry and Emma Thompson."



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

We are a fantastically brave investor. We break successful artists in any part of the world."

The BYI argues that it costs more to break an artist in the UK. Development costs are higher and the risks greater than the rest of Europe. European companies differ from the UK, because they license a great deal of material, don't have to make large investments in new acts, the BPI argues. "If mechanicals go up, record com-panies will be forced to cut invest-ment in artists," predicts Terry Ellis. The UK industry's income from

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

This is because, he reckons, successful songwriters have lawyers who negatiate deals "on the back of his" leaving no room for small publishers to operate, let alone develop tolent.

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






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
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

For CFP success story read new recordings

IN MW's Mid-Price/Budget Chart last month, Music for Pleasure's classical labels filled no fewer than 16 of the 20 places — a remark-able domination of a highly com-

As MFP celebrates its 25th anniversary year, it is a significant re-minder that Classics for Pleasure and its sister label EMI Eminence romain honohmarke Its campaigning at the bottom of

the price bracket has won ne audiences for classical as well as contributing handsomely to com-pany profits: last year the classical element of MFP was 26 per cent. Most record companies see the mid-price/budget area as second ary exploitation and although an important area for CEP and Eminence, some of its largest sales

come from the new recordings.

In fact, from the start of Classics for Pleasure in 1970 and EMI Emi-nence in 1983, new recordings were regarded as an intrinsic el

were regarded as an intrinsic el-ement, and certainly a major part of the CFP success story. One of the aims of both labels was to provide a platform for young artists on the threshold of their careers — and this has been achieved throughout the two dec-ades. Nigel Kennedy came to international notice with his awardwinning recording of Elgar's Violin Concerto on EMI Eminence. The pianist Stephen Hough similarly began with EMI Eminence and

began with EMI Eminence and now records with Virgin Classics. Among recent conducting talent, Franz Welser-Most and Andrew Litton both have contracts with fullprice international labels — but they began with MFP.
Patricia Byrne is general manager of the classical labels, follow-

ing a notably successful line start-ing with John Boyden and including Simon Foster. She has been eager to follow the tradition of in traducing young performers and feels that CFP has a new star in Tasmin Little, the young English vi-olinist who featured in violin concertos by Dvorak and Bruch to ood reviews earlier this year. "I nink she has a great future," says

PWL'S GRIPE over the relative strengths of multiple and indepen-dent retailers at high and low posi-tions in the chart (MW, last week)

The Chart Panel aims to repre sent the UK retail market in every way, and the share of sales through independents at the top of the chart (around one third for po-sitions one-10) or at the bottom of the chart (around two thirds in the 61-70 positions) is representative

of what is going on in the market Clearly, the issue is not whether the current chart is fair to every one, but whether it should be the record industry's marketing tool, to be manipulated in different way to suit different repert

For my money, and GIN is stum-ping up the money, the chart must be an accurate representation of what is going on in the market order to retain its deserved credi-PWL, or anyone else, can bring

to bear all its marketing expertise and sells in a way which will give it the highest chart position, and that position should be a true re-flection of sales in the market.

I understand that PWL's lack of insight is not for the want of invita-tions in the past from BPI to become a chart subscriber and from Gallup to have a full guided tour of the system. If Record Mirror publishes information on the Chart, publishes information on the Chart, it is because this information is in the public domain. Both CIN and Gallup can supply chapter and verse on the structure of the chart and on rules affecting eligibility to anyone who wants to listen.

For those who don't like the way the chart is structured for whatever reason, there is a Charts Supervis reason, there is a Charis supervis-ory Committee, set up to consider the views of all parties involved in the use of the Charts. If the consensus is for changes,

then changes will be instituted.

BMG offers reps' counter point to dealer gripes

FOLLOWING YOUR story last week "We Never See Reps Say Dealers", I feel that, for the first time in my 25 years in the bu must respond.

The main thrust of the article was

to highlight coverage by record company representatives pre-sell-ing albums and it gives a percen-tage breakdown for weekly. tage breakdown for weekly, monthly or never visited, and for BMG you say we cover six per cent on a weekly basis. I can assure you

BMG currently call on approxi-mately 600 dealers on a fortnightly call-cycle. This figure is made up in the main of independent dealers, HMV stores and Virgin

In addition to the 600 dealers who receive a face-to-face visit there are approximately 170 dealers who receive a mail-out and follow-up phone call by our telesales department based in

West Bromwich, and we have re cently expanded our classica coverage by the employment of a specialist classical telesales apering approximately 140 classical specialists or outlets with a classical

multiple breakdown. As I am sure you are aware, at the multiples' own valition we are unable to call at a local level (Smiths, Our Price, Woolworths, Boots, Menzies, etc). These are all covered either at head office level or are supplied by a rack jobber.

I cannot see how you came to your conclusion that we call on six per cent on a weekly basis, when weekly basis. There could be some confusion with retailers regarding motion team who do not call on a weekly basis and do accasionally pre-sell singles, but they have no been responsible for the sell-in a albums for the last 12 months.

My sales management team are regularly reviewing the dealer base in an effort to ensure the maximum number of dealers are covered in the most economically viable manner, and I would wel-come any retailer contacting me who feels they should be receiving a regular call, and I will endeavour to give the request my best attenfollowing the criti set out in the contents of this letter Dave Harmer Sales director BMG Records
