The future of one of the UK's most prolific songwriting and production teams is in doubt following reports that Mike Stock wants to end his 11-year partnership with PWL chairman Pete Waterman.

Together the pair have helped create more than 90 Top 40 hits, including 13 number ones, as part of the hugely successful Stock, Aitken and Waterman partnership, SAW. Since Matt Aitken left the team for personal reasons in August 1991, Stock and Waterman have continued to work together.

PWL last week refused to confirm or deny reports that Stock and Waterman are to split. PWL managing director David Howells declines to comment. while Waterman himself was said to be in meetings all week and Stock was also unavailable.

A spokeswoman for Sharp End Promotions, which handles PWL acts such as 2 Unlimited, reported that the official PWL line was "no comment".

If the reports are true, the separation would mean the end of one of the most successful partnerships in UK

pop music over the past decade.

SAW formed after Stock and Aitken approached Waterman for business advice on a demo they were putting together in 1984. A year earlier Waterman had ended his partnership with producer Peter Collins, with whom he co-produced hits for Nik Kershaw, Musical Youth and Alvin Stardust

Stock and Waterman's first SAW hit was Divine's You Think You're A Man which reached number 16 in 1984, while their first number one came in December that year with Dead Or Alive's You Spin Me Round.

This year their Top 75 hits for PWL include Sybil's When I'm Good And Ready, Beyond Your Wildest Dreams and Stronger Together, Bill Tarmey's One Voice, Slamm's Energize, The WWF Superstars' Wrestlemania and West End and Sybil's The Love I Lost.

Third place in the singles distributor league goes to EMI, boosted by the addition of Virgin product in August. EMI increased its share to 18.6% compared with 11.1% for the same period last year

Overall, PolyGram retains its position as top singles and albums company and albums distributor.

Sony and Warner back digital radio

A US digital radio service backed by Sony and Warner Music and broadcasting over 30 channels directly into the home is due to reach the UK early next year.

The 24-hour Music Choice Europe service will launch in Birmingham in early January as part of the European launch for the system, which operates as Digital Cable Radio in the US.

To be transmitted initially from a US satellite up-link and delivered via cable, the service will offer 34 channels specialising in music as diverse as classical, soul, country, indie and blues. Around five of the launch channels will be specifically programmed for the UK.

Subscribers will receive a tuner link-

ing their television and stereo, and a remote control, which reveals the name of the track being played. Tracks will not be advertised in advance, and albums will never be played in full to discourage digital home copying. The charge for existing cable homes will be £8 a month and £12 for others.

The system, similar to the Digital Music Express service launched earlier this year in Bradford, is being headed by former Time Warner International managing director Stuart Graber. Working with him at MC Europe's new London base are director of business development Simon Bazalgette, formerly of KPMG Peat Marwick, and director of programming Stefan Heller, previ-

ously director of music for Time-Life.

Heller says MC Europe will supplement with existing radio services and could boost record sales. "This gives people the chance to listen to something they may otherwise never hear," he says.

MC Europe's backers Warner Music (with a 54% stake), Sony Software (26%), General Instrument (10%) and the US DCR consortium (10%), plan to invest up to \$80m (£54m) over five years. Talks are currently underway with potential investors both inside and outside the record industry.

The company stresses it intends to pay all applicable PPL and PRS licence fees and has already gained interim broadcasting licences.

Virgin shifts LP chart

Virgin 1215's flagship album chart show is moving from Sunday afternoon to Saturdays as part of the station's new policy of targeting the music it plays at specific audiences throughout the day.

The move, effective from this Saturday (October 23), comes less than a month after Virgin decided to "refocus" its playlist policy, essentially reducing the amount of new music played during its most popular daytime programmes.

Joint programme controller Richard Skinner says shows such as the breakfast and drive-time slots now feature predominantly classic tracks from the station's A list while bands on the new D list, such as Bjork and Nirvana, will be played almost exclusively at night.

"We were playing everything all of the time but now we want to be more specific," he says, adding that the changes still satisfy the promise of performance made by Virgin 1215 when it was awarded its licence 18 months ago.

The albums chart, sponsored by Canadian brewer Labatts, will be broadcast on Saturday afternoons between 1 pm and 4 pm.

Joint director of programmes John Revell says the timeshift could boost the show's audience by as much as 20%.

Rights bodies meet over EMI deal row

The future of EMI's mechanical rights arrangements in Europe could be decided in two weeks time at a meeting between MCPS and German society Gema.

EMI is understood to have opted for a deal with Gema for all Europe, but MCPS suggests it will not licence UK repertoire unless Gema offers full transparency and no record company rebate.

The two societies are set to meet on October 29 to discuss the situation. MCPS chief executive Frans de Wit says the current position is "unclear to everyone concerned", adding that MCPS's fundamental opposition to rebates remains unchanged.

Woollcott takes European role

Sony Music UK deputy chairman Tony Woollcott has been promoted to senior vice president of the company's European division.

Woollcott, who joined CBS in 1969 and has held a range of posts at the company, will report to Sony Music Entertainment Europe president Paul Russell.

One of his first priorities will be coordinating a European strategic marketing plan covering areas such as special marketing, pricing and direct mail.

Woollcott will also help develop European links between the different Sony divisions including hardware, games and film.

Russell, who took on his own Euro-

pean role in January, says that the move has been planned for nine months but could not be executed until Tony Clark joined Sony's commercial division from A&M.

"When I first started thinking about this job in 1992 it was always in my mind that Tony (Woollcott) would come into the European office." he says.

BPI loses communications director

The BPI has made director of communications Jeff Clark-Meads redundant. Insisting the parting is amicable, BPI director general John Deacon says: "In the present climate our view is that the BPI needs someone perhaps more closely attuned to public affairs as well as public relations." He adds that the organisation will continue to use external consultants Luther Pendragon and Hydra, while Fiona Haycock will handle routine press enquiries.

US CD probe shakes UK shares

Thorn EMI's share value suffered the jitters last week after a flurry of articles in the American press highlighting the US Federal Trade Commission investigation into CD pricing panicked the City. EMI's shares fell 19p to 933p following the publication of articles in the *LA Times* and *The Wall Street Journal* confirming that the FTC was broadening its investigation beyond used CDs to include new CDs. The deadline for record company submissions to the US inquiry is today (Monday).

NFT to screen rock film classics

The National Film Theatre is to screen a programme of 25 classic rock films and videos under the banner Rocking and Reeling from November 22 to December 31. Focusing particularly on films made between 1968 and 1973, the selection includes Performance, Fresh Cream Live, Clash On Broadway and Medicine Ball Caravan.

Island shuffles staff

Neil Ashby has joined Island Records from Virgin Records as radio promotions manager, reporting to head of promotions Andy Taylor. Island has also promoted Christina Atkins from production manager in the international department to head of production, and hired Darcus Beese from Tug Records to be 4th & Broadway's A&R manager.

Dome chain to promote new releases

Virgin Records has teamed up with Dome Brasseries to promote its new releases across the 15-strong chain. The deal includes point-of-sale material, in-store promotions and special offers for Dome customers. Artists featured in the promotion include Lenny Kravitz, Neneh Cherry, Julia Fordham and Kiss Of Life.

Conifer reorganises

Conifer has split its company operations into four new divisions. The new marketing department is headed by Richard Dinnadge, who has just joined Conifer from Warner Classics, while Brian Hopkins becomes head of sales and operations and John Kehoe handles the company's in-house labels. A head of finance and administration has yet to be appointed.

London soul station Choice FM is launching a city-wide poster campaign from today as part of an initiative to relaunch its image and attract more listeners.

Anniversary disc features new bands

Olympic bid chairman joins Piccadilly

Piccadilly Radio has appointed Bob Scott, chairman of the failed Manchester Olympic Bid Committee, as chairman. With a lengthy list of directorships including the Manchester Opera House, the Manchester Arts Festival and the Halle Concert society, Scott will help steer the development of Piccadilly Radio in the run-up to its licence renewal in 1996.

Retailers need not fear digital radio

Retailers will be understandably concerned by Sony and Warner's decision to launch a digital cable radio service in the UK early next year.

Now record companies have the means to deliver music digitally direct into the home they also increasingly have the potential to supplant retailers and take their margin for themselves.

When the time comes, as it surely will, when every home has the capacity to record music digitally – be it on DCC or MiniDisc or something else – then the circle will be complete and, the pessimist might say, music retailing will be redundant

Unfortunately for the technophile, but fortunately for the rest of us who actually like record shops, the reality is unlikely to be anything like that.

The truth is that however much record companies would like to snaffle up the £2 or £3 or £4 from every CD sold which goes to the retailer, life isn't that straightforward.

Record companies would be mad to give up the access to the consumer which the presence of a record shop on virtually every High Street in the land gives them. Shopping is not merely the purchase of a product which can as easily be done over the phone as by going into a shop – it is a social activity, a leisure pursuit and a tactile experience.

Digital cable radio will certainly have its fans, but the restrictions that the need to minimise piracy will place on it means it is unlikely to be a mass-market product. Ultimately, far from being a threat to music retailers, digital radio could yet provide them with a business

For what better place to buy your subscription to a digital music service than a record shop?

Here come the turkeys

It may sound strange, but I dread the arrival of the big name releases over the next two months.

Traditionally, these mega-records are meant to boost sales in the pre-Christmas rush, providing retailers with an explosion of till-rattling goodies that will multiply their profits and send them to their turkey sandwiches with smug grins on their faces.

But, more often than not, the reality these days is that tracks by established stars appeal only to their core

These releases have little or no mass appeal. The result is that the charts will be jammed with ordinary sounds with famous names on the labels. This is fine if we are prepared to limit our sales of music to the converted.

But if we all believe - and I do - that the best hits are the ones which drag in those customers who would not normally dream of going into record shops, then we should hope for Christmas hits like Tease Me, Dreams, It Keeps Rainin', All That She Wants, What Is Love... yes, those giants of '93 that were by unknown, new talent. The danger with big name releases is that so much money is spent in order to cram them into the chart that there is no promotional budget left for the little guys. So there are fewer chart slots available and the stupid, deaf majority of radio - especially on ILR, the great tragedy of the British airwaves – and TV programmers still insist on playing sounds because of their chart positions.

So remember, U2, when you play the formatting game to get your Christmas release to number one, that your artificially acquired hit may be taking a deserved one away from a new artist like Lena Fiaghe.

Publishers have granted record companies a 20% discount on the mechanical royalties payable for sales of DCC and MiniDisc until the end of 1995.

The royalty break is part of the sliding scale of discounts negotiated by the BPI and MCPS. Under the settlement, the discount falls to 15% for 1996, 10% for 1997, 5% for 1998 and 2.5% for 1999, after which it ceases.

Significantly, the discount ends if software penetration fails to reach 8% for DCC and MiniDisc by the end of 1997, or if it reaches 20% for either format - or a combined 30% - after January 1 1996. The deal is understood to have no implications for the launch of other formats

Publishers set 20% new formats break Pirates' fingers burnt in swoop

Police in Glasgow and Nottingham have both raided pirate tape factories accidently discovered as they attended nearby fires.

Nottingham police unearthed an illegal factory on October 5 when an onlooker at a fire in the city's Mapperley district inadvertently told an officer about the contents of his nearby garage.

After seizing two duplicating machines, mastertapes and blank cassettes from the garage, the police were

led to a house where several thousand more cassettes, 253 mastertapes and an estimated 500,000 tape in-lay cards were discovered.

The case comes just a month after police attending a fire on a Glasgow industrial estate seized £35,000 worth of cassettes and counterfeiting equipment after a routine check on an adjoining building.

Thorn EMI unveils 3-D sound system

Thorn EMI hopes to revolutionise sound recording with the launch of a system it claims enables listeners to hear three-dimensional sound from a standard two-speaker hi fi.

The Sensaura "audio reality" recording system is based on the natural hearing process, allowing a listener to identify the direction, height and distance of sound.

The first commercial release to use the technology is Frank Sinatra's Duets album, released this week on EMI's Capitol label.


Several tracks were recorded using Sensaura, but the system's launch will be deliberately low-key, with no in-store promotion.

Thorn EMI subsidiary Central Research Laboratories, which has taken three years to perfect the system and whose initials appear on the Sinatra packaging, claims it is the most significant breakthrough in sound recording since it produced the first stereo system in 1933.

Sensaura records the source from different directions and angles with microphones fixed around a mock up of a human head and torso (see below).

Independent experts who have tested the system say it does produce better recordings. Stephen Tayler, a sound engineer at London's Metropolis Studios, who tested the system on an album for US singer Milla Jovovich, says, "We used Sensaura to record the backing vocals, with the singers moving around the dummy to create a more natural sense of sound. It is impressive because you get a greater feel of width and depth.

EMI plans at least 10 releases using Sensaura next year, although details are not yet available. The system will initially be exclusive to EMI artists, but the company hopes to license it to other labels and studios.

'Horizontal' QC delays Michael High Court case

George Michael's High Court battle against Sony Music is due to start today (Monday) after being delayed a week so the record company's top lawyer could recover from a back injury.

Justice Jonathan adjourned the case, due to start last Monday, after Sony applied for a delay. David Unwin, junior counsel for Sony, said Gordon Pollock QC had hurt his back over the weekend and was "physically, but not mentally, incapacitated and horizontal" at

his Hertfordshire farmhouse.

Mark Cran QC, representing Michael, asked for a formal undertaking from Sony's solicitors that no further adjournment would be sought.

He added that the case should go ahead today regardless, in Pollock's absence if necessary.

The judge rejected the bid to obtain a pledge from Sony not to apply for a further delay, but said he would need "a great deal of persuading" that the case should not now proceed as planned.

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Music axed for R5 rolling news

Music publicists have reacted angrily to the loss of hours of music programming in BBC Radio's radical reorganisation of Radio Five.

Youth shows featuring music such as Fabulous, Vibe!, The Way Out and Across the Line will disappear when Radio Five gives way to a 24-hour rolling news and sport network next April.

Nick Fiveash, head of promotions for Columbia, condemns the move, announced last week, as "another nail in the coffin" for record companies struggling to win exposure for their acts. "The loss of Radio Five is alarming and unfair," he says.

Other labels are reeling from the disappearance of an estimated 5,500 hours of youth and music programming a year. "The changes are a great shame because Radio Five picked up on a wide spectrum of artists," says Anton Partridge, radio promotion manager for MCA. "There was always room for grunge, dance, hip hop and indie music."

Alison Vernon-Smith, producer of Liz Kershaw's weekly programme Vibe!, says Radio Five has been a champion of new music and unsigned artists.

"Vibe! featured bands including Apache Indian, Arrested Development and the Disposable Heroes Of Hiphoprisy before One FM," she claims. "We played music that wouldn't have been heard on other stations, choosing tracks because we liked them, not because they were chart bound."

A spokeswoman for One FM, currently in the middle of its own reorganisation, says some programmes may find their way onto the station. But she says it is unlikely that all Radio Five's youth output, more than 300 hours of which are produced by independent companies, will find a home.

Since its launch in 1990, Radio Five has steadily increased market share from 1.3% to 1.9%, according to Rajar figures, with a weekly reach of just over 4m listeners

Morrissey signs new manager

Morrissey has taken on Arnold Stiefel of Los Angelesbased Stiefel/Phillips Entertainment as worldwide manager. His former manager Nigel Thomas died earlier this year.

Sole ILR applicant denied

The Radio Authority has decided not to award a local ILR licence for the Dunfermline area of Scotland after the only applicant, Canmore Radio, failed to meet the criteria set for licencees by the Broadcasting Act. The Radio Authority says it may re-advertise the licence in the future.

Emap launch gets industry support

The launch issue of *Mojo*, Emap Metro's new monthly magazine for older music buyers, has won approval from potentially its harshest critics – members of the record industry.

A cross section of industry executives polled by *Music Week* welcomed *Mojo*'s contents, design and photography. Andrew Lauder, managing director of This Way Up, praises "the look, the name and the format."

Launched last Friday, the first 132-page November issue contains gossipy snippets, interviews, reviews and features.

"It makes a nice change to have a magazine carrying longer and more in-depth articles," says Steve Tallamy, albums planning manager for Our

Bob Fisher, managing director of Sequel Records, says the broad mix of artists works well, but he advises some writers to curb their cynicism. "People in their thirties and forties aren't interested in smartarse comments that say nothing about the music," he says.

But Martin Jones, client services director for the London Media Group questions whether there are enough serious music buffs to make up Mojo's projected 40-45,000 circulation.

Mean Fiddler not liable for Phoenix 'breaches'

The Mean Fiddler Organisation is not liable for prosecution over possible breaches in noise and safety controls at this year's Phoenix Festival because the entertainments licence for the event was not held in its name.

Environmental health officers at Stratford District Council have been instructed to take legal proceedings against the licence holder where there is sufficient evidence to prove breaches of the 45 conditions it set when the licence was granted.

But they say the Mean Fiddler cannot be prosecuted because legal responsibility lies with Golfreed, the company set up by the owners of the Long Marston airfield specifically to apply for licenses on behalf of event organisers.

During a meeting last Wednesday the council's environmental services commitee criticised lapses in crowd safety and noise levels at this summer's festival.

An earlier police report slammed the security company hired by the Mean Fiddler to oversee the event. The council will consider Golfreed's application for 1994's event, planned for July 15 to 17, before Christmas.

No one from the Mean Fiddler Organisation was willing to comment on this year's problems.

NTV bought out by management

The management of music publisher NTV Music UK, the London office of Japanese media conglomerate Nippon Television Music Corporation, has bought out the company just three years after it was founded.

The company, now Headstrong Music Publishing, publishes Paul Weller, Utah Saints, Tom Robinson and Captain Sensible among others.

Headstrong chairman Andy McQueen, who founded NTV Music UK, will run the company with managing director Dave Loader.

NTV Music Corporation remains Headstrong's sub-publisher for Japan and the company's sub-publishing net-



McLaren blasts the ivory tower' execs

Musical impresario Malcolm McLaren has lambasted the music industry as a "laughing stock", out of touch with both young people and new technologies.

Speaking last week at a Guild of Recording Producers, Directors and Engineers forum on the marketing of music, McLaren outlined a chilling scenario for the record executives present.

He said children are more interested in technology than music, and have no interest in visiting "antique" record stores.

"The music industry is in decline and it's unlikely you can do much about it but tag along with a new kind of artist computer," he told the Repro forum.

Traditional methods of making music available to consumers whether across the airwaves or in shops - are becoming obsolete, he continued.

"Some record stores are like museums, whether they're specialist or moronic supermarkets – they're all pathetic antiques. A young kid would much rather use a credit card and buy it direct," McLaren said.

And, responding to a claim made by fellow panellist and manager Tom Watkins that youth culture is still about "tight trousers and pin-ups", he added, "The industry in the future won't just be about signing young boys

in tight trousers but signing CD designers who will design a new format."

Earlier, panellist and former Ensign chief Nigel Grainge warned that one of the problems facing the UK industry is its lack of training for A&R people. This has resulted in a tier of successful 40 to 45-year-old heads of department, with few young staff below capable of taking over, he said.

The Repro forum, held at PRS, was chaired by Virgin Records managing director Paul Conroy. Other panellists included Conroy's joint deputy Ray Cooper, Paul Robinson and Richard Park, programming chiefs at Radio One FM and Capital Radio respectively.

Heart FM sets Chrysalis on course

making commercial radio its third core business after winning the newly created West Midlands regional ILR licence with its Heart FM bid.

Development director Richard Huntingford says £1.25m will be invested in Heart FM over the next two years as the group attempts to gain a foothold in independent broadcasting.

Chrysalis already has an 18.7%

group in the North-east, but Heart FM is its first wholly-owned station to win an ILR permit. It made unsuccessful bids for a North-west licence and for AM and FM frequencies in London.

The group has also applied for a Greater Manchester licence, to be announced in December, and intends to apply for one of the two new London FM frequencies to be advertised by the

Radio Authority in the spring.

Heart FM - set to come on air in September 1994 - is targeting 2.2m 25to 44-year-olds with an adult contemporary music policy.

week of turbulence chartwise, with 17 new entries to the Top 40 singles chart and all but one of the top five albums likewise being a newcomer.

The singles chart has only ever been more volatile once, that in the post-Christmas shakedown which brought 18 new entries to the Top 40 on January 11 1992. And never before have there been four new entries in the top five albums.

You may think all this activity, and hot new releases, would make for a boom week. In fact album sales were up only 1% on the previous week, while singles sales actually dipped by 12%.

Even so, **Take That's** album Everything Changes gives them an emphatic number one, after selling upwards of 100,000 copies in the week.

It becomes the third album in five weeks to push Meat Loaf's Bat Out Of Hell II – Back Into Hell out of pole position. But, in an act of sweet revenge, Meat's I'd Do Anything For Love (But I Won't Do That) takes over from Take That & Lulu's Relight My Fire at the top of the singles chart.

I'd Do Anything For Love (But I Won't Do That) is Meat's first number one single and, though severely truncated from its near 12-minute album version to just short of eight minutes, it becomes the lengthiest single ever to reach number one, replacing The Beatles' Hey Jude.



Though her record as a jobbing songwriter is patchy – recent efforts for Richard Darbyshire and Charlotte both peaked narrowly short of the Top 75 - Lisa Stansfield has an impeccable chart career in her own right. This week she registers her 12th consecutive Top 40 hit with the title track from her forthcoming album So Natural. Lisa helped to pen all her hits too, and that's something no other woman with more hits - not Madonna, nor even Kate Bush - can claim. Her writing partners have ranged from Coldcut to veteran John Barry, though her latest single was written with her usual sidekicks Andy Morris and lan Devaney, with whom she previously comprised Blue Zone.

Meat's uncredited partner on the latter part of the single is the splendidly-named Mrs Loud, and the single was produced and written by Jim Steinman, who previously fulfilled the same roles on Bonnie Tyler's similarly flamboyant 1983 chart-topper Total Eclipse Of The Heart.

The highest new entry this week comes from Italy's Cappella, who follow up their number six hit U Got 2 Know with the similarly-titled U Got 2 Let The Music, which debuts at

Meanwhile, fellow Eurodance act The Goodmen, who hail from Holland, regain Top 40 status with Give It Up.

A number 23 hit in August, it has continued to sell well ever since, and returned to the chart at number 56 a fortnight ago. Last week it was number 45, and it now surges to number 27.

Brazil meanwhile produces its biggest UK albums success this week, via thrash metal act Sepultura, whose controversial Chaos A.D. debuts at number 11.

Putting together a string of four Top 40 hits in a year requires consistency both in quality and quantity of output, but already this year it's been done by four acts. Jamiroquai were first off the mark, followed by D:Ream and Bon Jovi.

The latest addition to this elite group is an act who didn't have a Top 40 hit to their name before this year: Alice In Chains

After peaking at number 19 with Would, number 26 with Them Bones and number 33 with Angry Chair, they return for a fourth outing this week as Down In A Hole debuts at number 36.

PJ HARVEY: 4 Track
Demos (Island IMCD 170).
Given that PJ Harvey's
limited-edition demo selection
for last year's Dry album got
the punters in a lather, and
that these typically raw
renditions of this year's followup have got a proper release, 4
Track Demos should win a lot
of attention. The six
unreleased tracks included
here should ensure that all
who bought Rid Of Me will
snap this up too.

10,000 MANIACS:
Unplugged (Elektra
755961569-2/4). The
popularity of MTV's
Unplugged and the fact that
10,000 Maniacs have just split
should ensure some healthy
sales for this album. Thirteen
tracks long, principally drawn
from Our Time In Eden, it is a
fitting coda to the Maniacs'
career. Expect heavy night
time radio play.

RED HOUSE PAINTERS: Red House Painters (4AD CAD 3016). The Californians' third album, and their second this year, shares a title with its predecessor, so be warned. The second album reached the Top 50 with just one UK date, so with a coinciding tour in place, the Painters' poignant ballads might make the Top 40 this time.

THE BREEDERS: Divine Hammer (4AD BADD 3017). A re-recorded version of a track from their recent album, Divine Hammer finds the Breeders at their most commercial, with a chorus-led breeziness that could make it a respectable hit if daytime radio jumps on it. Coming just after their triumphant UK tour, now is the time.

THE OTHER TWO: Selfish (London TWO 1). Now that New Order's album and live commitments are over, Gillian Gilbert and Stephen Morris's The Other Two project can finally emerge, after a year's delay. Selfish mines the usual electronically-enhanced melancholy in which New Order specialise, but has enough individuality to make it count. Quite probably a hit, with the album to follow.

ELASTICA: Stutter (Deceptive BLUFF 003). The debut single from the most eagerly anticipated new band of 1993 is only a limited edition release of 1,500, so they may already have gone. At least the rarity of this release, which sounds like a recharged version of late Seventies power pop, will ensure the follow-up is even more in demand.

PICK OF THE WEEK

COCTEAU TWINS: Four Calendar Cafe (Fontana 518259). After a few weeks' delay, The Cocteau Twins' first album in three years is upon us. While it may not be as essential as some of their previous releases, Four Calendar Cafe still oozes the usual Cocteau Twins attributes: angelic melody, ethereal grace, Liz Fraser's extraordinary voice and plenty of widespread appeal.

It also introduces a busy autumn of opera from Philips, led this month by Te Kanawa in La Traviata, Hvorostovsky in Eugene Onegin and Sir Colin Davis conducting Hansel And Gretel.

VARIOUS: Favourite TV Classics 2. (Classics For Pleasure/EMI CFP 4626). The 161 best-selling titles in CFP's Favourite series are joined by six new ones including these 15 TV commercial-themed tracks, at a dealer price of £3.57/£2.38. 

PM DAWN: Norwegian Wood/When Midnight Sighs (Gee Street GEET 51). When Midnight Sighs is targeted at dance fans and is less melodic than we have come to expect from PM Dawn, while Norwegian Wood is indeed the Beatles' song blissed-out in a strange psychedelic style. BITTY McLEAN: Pass It On (Brilliant CDBRIL 2). A gentle, sophisticated, chiming and soulful shuffle written by Peter Tosh and originally recorded by Bob Marley & The Wailers. Sweet and accessible and undoubtedly a decent-sized hit.

DAVID BOWIE: Miracle Goodnight (Arista 74321162262). This is one of Black Tie White Noise's more attractive tracks, an offbeat and intimate affair with flashes of the old Bowie in the counter harmonies. I really feel for XFM. If they'd been granted their licence at the first attempt they could have started up and got on with the job without the current level of hype both they and their supporters (Letters, Oct 16) now seem to feel is necessary.

Despite the very effective propaganda XFM and Sammy Jacobs have managed to generate, I fear they are not the answer to the decline of the British music scene. After all, in the type of music which XFM champions, misleadingly called "indie", the current cutting edge is mostly American.

Lack of radio and touring opportunities doesn't just affect "indie" guitar bands: all independent labels suffer from lack of exposure for their particular music. I would love to see a move towards "no format" radio, or what has become known in the US as Triple A (adult album alternative). Is it really true that people only want to listen to one kind of music, or is that a myth to appeal to advertisers? Surely the yardstick should be quality, not type?

The longest lasting programme on Radio One (John Peel) has worked on this basis, and continues to be successful. Is it possible to run an entire radio station this way?

By all means give XFM a licence, but let's not kid ourselves that we have heard the future of the British music industry. The industry is currently governed by quantity (how many units, how high a chart place, how much market share, how big a return on investment). Until we see a return to quality (ie just how good is it?), neither XFM nor any radio station or gig circuit will be able to save us.

Joe - clubgoer

'Clubs need to have dress codes because clubs reflect what their promotors want to see. At the end of the day they want people who relate to what the club's doing. It makes for a better club. People are what they wear and nowadays all clubs have a certain look and style.

I used to vet the doors myself after all people are what they wear

Admiral Pure - Club Pure, Edinburgh

'Bollocks. After all it's not what people are wearing, anybody can buy and wear hip clothes If we think they're right for the club - they're in. We talk to people at the door and if they look like they're there to have a good time and not spoil it for anyone else, that's good enough for us.

Sarah - club goer 'Girls usually get in anyway but it's harder for guys. There is never a specific dress code but you can usually tell what ••••••••••••••••••

'look' will get you in. I was at a club the other night and my friend was dressed smartly but wearing trainers and the doorman told her to make more of an effort and dress up next time. You never can tell.

Jason - Ministry of Sound `I wouldn't want to pinpoint it as a dress code - it's not so much what you wear but how you wear it. It's a combination of how you come across when you come through the front door and your general appearance. There's no strict rule. You never know who

might get turned away! If people have the right attitude and are coming for the right reasons, it doesn't really matter what they're wearing.

Sean McLusky - Club UK 'Of course - people shouldn't even bother attempting to get in unless they've made some effort or are hip and happening. They'll get a really hard time. We've got a team of lads who are very rude to people! You can usually tell if someone's a bastard - it's in the eyes. If people turn up in a tie, they're not going to get in.'

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Buyer's view: "There are not as many whites around as there were, people can't just bash them out now. It's got to be quality. On the hardcore scene everything is more original - not just breakbeats and speeded up vocals. Now people are more interested - it's not just something for the ravers. k-klass: 'let me show you' (deconstruction)

Back after a long lay-off, K-Klass offer another stonking, typical piano-led house tune topped off with wailing female vocals. Along with the raucous instrumental dub, there's an 11-minute Sabres Of Paradise mix of `1,2,3' with lots of industrial-type noises held together by a deep techno beat. Altogether a commercially-appealing and quite compelling mix. bb



SHEEP ON DRUGS: From A To H And Back Again' (Island). Hanging out on the borders of techno and indie, this experimental duo are certainly not one for the mainstream crowd but the limited edition 'Disco 2000' mix is weird and dubby enough for the more adventurous techno/trance DJs to play around with.

TO BE CONTINUED: 'One On One' (US East West). From En Vogue's songwriting/production team, a promising new urban soul group enters the arena. Elements of the En Vogue sound can be found in the original mix of this walking paced dancer, the melody hinting ever so slightly at Smokey's 'Tracks Of My Tears' in the verse and girlie vocals complimented by some male rap injections. In a selection of alternative mixes, the flavouring is much more earthy, with funk, jazz and hip hop elements playing more dominant roles.

THE OVERLORDS 'Wow Mr Yogi' (Arista). This

first appeared as a cheesy Culture Beat type Euro house track but these Justin Robertson remixes have transformed it Into a much more credible storming underground groove. The gentle intro builds into a hypnotic rhythm with big waves of synth carrying the track along. Very long and very

UNATION: 'Dreaming' (MCA). Yet another mainstream pop act gets the remix treatment. But on this one, Roger Sanchez manages to make the most of the original's finer points (in this case, just the female chorus!). The 'Deep Down Dub' is exactly that while the 'Bassman' mix adds a little swing. Stripped down and sparse, this is one for a tranced-out crowd.

SOUND OF ONE: 'As I Am' (Cooltempo promo). The increasingly prolific Roger Sanchez crops up once more, this time with his own pet project. It is a big garage production with the Upliffing mix bearing his latest trademark - that slightly oddsounding plano. The strong female vocal really comes into its own with the Gospel style reply in the chorus. Farley and Heller house things up in their own fine style on the bumping Fire Land vocal mix and their Junior Style Dub.

K LONDON PRODUCTION CLUB: 'Who's Gonna Love Me'

(K4B). Sounds initially like a run-of-the-mill US Masters At Work copy vocal track but with one flick through the mixes it becomes clear that this is a

strong house vocal tune that stands up on its own. The vocals by Gina Bright are diva style wails and the chorus hooks infectious. Worth checking out.

POSITIVE SCIENCE: 'The Non Stop EP

(Ascension). Having given up the glorious name Orson Karte, techno experimentalists Lex Blackmore and Julian Dembinski return with a wildlyvaried four-tracker, 'Non Stop' drifts nicely from its techno intro into a wonderful Hammond-style trancer. 'I Need You' throws some cool beats and vocal samples into the mix and is definitely the stand out track

CARLEEN ANDERSON: 'Dusky Sappho EP' (Circa). Vocally, Anderson is as impressive on this debut solo outing as any of her previous work. But musically the five tracks - barring the soulful but tough swing of the lead track 'Mama Said' - are a little disappointing. 'By Any Means' is more a vocal range tester than a song, 'Pick Up The Pieces' a half-cover halforiginal oddity and 'Ain't Givin' Up On You' a standard ballad. Bring on the album! bb

SERENADE: 'Friend Not A Lover (Mission Records). The second single from this Jill swing outfit features another cool vocal performance but, for all its sub-hip hop frills, musically it lacks a bit of beef. Eric Powell's house mixes might seem a little unnecessary but whip the track into a 125bpm chugger that is definitely worth checking out.

THE SHAMEN: 'Make It Mine/Possible Worlds -Mixes' (One Little Indian) and 'Comin' On' (Rough Trade import). The Beatmasters provide a typically tough but sharp dub to 'Make It Mine' while Moby contributes beautiful meandering and sparse interpretations. Pro-Gress add some guitar wallop to 'Possible Worlds' with The Shamen adding their own original mixes too. The band may not be fans of Culture Beat's 'Comin' On' mixes but the single will be massive across Europe.

MARY PEARCE: 'Legacy' (EC1 promo). Mary Pearce is a particularly fine UK soul singer who over the last few years has made some outstanding recordings on the independent scene. Here she once again teams up with Mr. 'Dark Knights' T. Agbetu, for a haunting soul tune with a crispy two-step rhythm and another superb vocal performance likely to increase

Mary's ever expanding

audience.

HELICOPTER: 'Helicopter EP' (Helicopter). Another hot four track EP from this outfit full of funky house rhythms and excellent melodies. All four tracks follow the same driving style with riffs, sampled vocals and

FLUKE: 'Six Wheels On My Wagon' (Circa). What first hits you about this, Fluke's third full album, is the spectacular packaging particularly with the triple vinyl set (the group's debut album is also included). It naturally heightens expectations for the tracks themselves and things get off to a great start with the bubbling 'Groovy Feeling'. And for the first two sides of the album, the tempo remains about the same with the singles 'Electric Guitar' and 'Slid' making them sound like continuous pulsing movements. The next two sides slow things down a little and take on a more experimental feel. While it all flows nicely, it's hard to find any particularly remarkable moments. Indeed, it often sounds like Fluke have settled for mood over individual

songs. That's not necessarily a bad thing, it's just that you can't help wishing there were a few more highs.

VARIOUS: 'Feed Your Head' (Ultimate). Coming all the way from Planet Dog, this 74minute trippy collection brings together the first fruits of the Dog label. Established names like System 7, The Drum Club and Eat Static rub shoulders with new age trancers Astralasia, Banco De Gaia and The Knights Of The Occasional Table, among other Megadog favourites. Ambient trance with a little world music influence is the basic vibe and the set provides a neat bridge between the totally spaced-out and the more progressive styles. Not only that, it shows great promise for one of the UK's newest experimental dance labels. This is very much a case of feed your head indeed.

VARIOUS: 'NovaMute: Version 1.1' (NovaMute). This is the first compilation following the first year in the life of Mute's moré experimental dance label. The diversity and quality of the 12 tracks is a mark



VARIOUS: Guerilla In Dub (Guerilla). It has to be said that the word "dub" has become a rather overused and certainly much abused term in dance circles in recent years. Which is why it is so good to find that Guerilla In Dub is exactly what it says it

is: a true dub LP that takes the original article, stretches it out, strips away the unwanted layers, creates a real sense of space, introduces elements of surprise and does all the other things that real dub should do. The Nottingham-based D-Fex production team of Taxman and John Crossley have taken a range of Guerilla favourites from the likes of DOP, Spooky, and Drum Club and manipulated them into complete new sonic landscapes. Their reggae roots shine through with tracks like Schmoo and Intoxication transported way off into King Tubby territory, while the melodica themes of 'Alchemy evoke memories of Augustus Pablo's Rockers releases. While the LP will stand up to club play (Rhythm Is Life and Schmoo in particular), for best enjoyment a fully prone position is strongly recommended.

His choice Better Days mix boasts great squelchy synth sounds, while the Acidisco version is a footstomping hooligan of a house track.

RITMO RIVALS 'Americano Slide'

(Planet Four). Created by DJs Parks & Wilson this has been buzzing on white label for some time. The heavy synth patterns dominate this house track as they develop into an orchestra of intertwining melodies that climaxes and then launches back into its deep driving rhythm.

MOTIF feat. POSITIVE K: 'You Told Me' (US **Payday).** Payday is a new American label through ffrr/London which is getting extremely funky these days

This song comes from the guys' album 'More Than Magic!', from which 'Please Tell Me Tonight' is the huge American ballad and 'You Told Me' the one killer midtempo swing tune, Positive K provides the attitude, Motif the splendid vocals and harmonies, while the production is sharp for the dancefloor without being too heavy for urban radio support. A real grower, too.

WHITNEY HOUSTON: 'Queen Of The Night'

(Arista). Megastar Houston returns to the pure house sound with this wonderful CJ Mackintosh collaboration. Houston is in as full vocal form as ever and the gospelled vocal harmonies are sweet and strong. A surprising release with no ballad MOR versions for commercial acceptability but the mixes are certainly stronger than any dance release for several weeks

GOLDEN GIRLS: 'Kinetic Remixes' (R&S promo).

Third time around for this track which began life in March 1992 as an Orbital remix of a single by The Pied Piper on Absolute 2. Now Cubic 22 beef things up with their charging remix featuring "Come on and get you some more" vocal samples. This is the one that will fill dancefloors.

CREATIVE FORCE: 'It's So Good' (Centrestage). Double pack single hot on

the heels of a previous limited edition single of the same track. Produced by prolific and increasingly popular Victor Simonelli, he mixes four versions while Dave Lee's sidekick Andrew Livingston mixes the other four.

JOMANDA 'Never' (Big Beat). This has been hanging around waiting for a release for a year so the story goes but quite why a record company should have waited to unleash this superb track is mystifying. A double pack of mixes covers all the bases with Sasha's being the standout - a long intro with the emphasis on percussion arrangements gradually builds


