PAUL FENOULHET LEADS GREAT PHOENIX STRAW MUSICIANS TO GRACIE FIELDS AT THE EMPRESS HALL

AUGMENTED FOR A MAMMOTH WEEK AT THE EMPRESS HALL (MUSICAL EXPRESS STAFF REPORTER)

IN SPITE OF THE FACT THAT PAUL FENOULHET IS STILL IN PROCESS OF ORGANISING HIS NEW BAND THE SENSATIONAL NEWS BREAKS THIS WEEK THAT HE HAS SIGNED A CONTRACT TO APPEAR WITH HIS NEW ORCHESTRA AND ALSO TO ACCOMPANY THAT GREAT ARTISTE GRACIE FIELDS FOR HER EIGHT CONCERTS TO BE HELD AT THE EMPRESS HALL, EARLS COURT. THE CONCERTS WILL COMMENCE ON MAY 15 AND WILL BE HELD NIGHTLY UNTIL MAY 22.

The Fenoulhet Show, which will include comedy acts, is being produced by Paul's own manager and agent, Harold Davison.

The orchestra will accompany Gracie Fields for her entire appearance at the Empress. It will be revealed that this is not the first time Fenoulhet has conducted for Miss Fields as he was conducting the "Skyrockets" Orchestra at the London Palladium when she appeared on a Royal Command Performance.

Asked to comment on the engagement, Fenoulhet said: "I feel very very happy about the wonderful good my new band is going to get, and I am looking forward to playing with Gracie again. She is the greatest artist of them all, and a grand person. At the moment she is in Florida, but her husband Murry Hankle will be coming over in a week or so to help with the advance arrangements. I know Gracie will give a wonderful show, and I shall personally pull everything out of the bag to provide her with an orchestra to match."

The wedding has not been so low to respond, and Toppino is now in line for television work, having already been fixed for a new radio series, "Without Another Word," on April 5, 20 and 21. He also has a number of cabaret dates booked in the near future, and is hoping to form his own quartet soon, of which only Len Morgan (bass) is as far fixed.

PAUL ROBESON AT THE ALBERT HALL

ON Friday, March 18, Paul Robeson, in the first London concert of his present tour of Britain, packed the Albert Hall. His set programme was varied enough, including such items as "O Isle and O Isle" and "Monsieur's 'Nort Gidon'"; old English and Italian songs, Beethoven's "Cradle Song," a Tiddah Folk Song and Negro Spirituals. He also sang some new other pieces, some at the request of the audience, including "Loch Lomond" and the inevitable "O! Man River". Robeson's great range, his variety of expression, his tone and local control and his consummate showmanship were shown off to great advantage by this programme.

The most satisfactory songs were those intended to be sung with orchestra, and in the case of "O Isle and O Isle" as well. The piano is incapable of realising the qualities of such a piece. Nevertheless, Robeson's singing of it made one long to see him in the part of Saratoga. Leaveva Brown, who has been with Robeson for twenty-five years is a fine accompanist. He also partnered Robeson in vocal duets.

Robeson will again appear at the Albert Hall on Thursday, April 7, and on Easter Sunday and Monday (April 17 and 18) he will give recitals at the Harrogate and Leeds. At Harrogate, he will be accompanied by the Light Fro-

THE VOICE THE GREAT HYPOTHESIS

When a broadcaster or an artiste does a broadcast his feelings are mixed. Preconceived is a tendency to visualize his audience in terms of millions. All kinds and all types of listener are to the broadcaster, the great homogeneous whole. Yet a broadcaster, for instance, cannot appeal to his entire listening public. He can only interest a part of them. With this in mind I wonder just what percentage of his listeners have made a deal with their radio specially to hear him; what percentage are listening by pure accident; what percentage are listening without consciously knowing what percentage are listening to him because of his voice. This brings me to the matter of audience appeal. It is not a question of voice but of voice and content. There are very definite and noticeable signs that there are different types of appreciation from varying strata of society and temperament. One must have in common. We all pay that price for the broadcast we choose what we like to hear, we criticize it ruthlessly and accept the whole set-up of radio as we do central heating. But never do we express gratitude for this entertainment—or so I thought until this week.

Several visits to a big general hospital this week have drawn from all sections of the community. The patients are not only of all ages but are actually grateful for radio. HOSPITAL BROADCASTS. Never before did I realize the full significance of those short broadcasts to hospitals that Charles Chester does in "Stand Easy". You must witness the audience reaction at the recording end to understand their importance. Try and visualize the patient at the end of the long weary day, now at his bedside, far from home and loved ones. Can you imagine the excitement it causes, not only for him but for all his companions in the ward? It bears his name and his choice of a song broadcast? A gesture that lifts him from the realm of a great state.

EVERYBODY'S ENTERTAINMENT. Fortunately the patients in hospitals are a minority of the population. Some might think hospital broadcasts would appeal only to hospital inmates. This is hardly true. In fact, we have had broadcasts from hospitals and to hospitals. Wilfred Pickles, good music and long-range handling of extreme situations, has stored some of his greatest personal successes from hospitals. These transmissions never fail to interest the listening public.

A GREAT BLESSING. Perhaps radio's greatest beneficence is conferred upon those who are blind. It is difficult to understand what life would be like for the blind without radio. This is such an important radio in the world that I believe I should say a few words for providing radio sets to those afflicted.
