When we went to the Bahamas to record 'True', it was really quiet. We thought we'd get away from everything but it was too quiet – it was like you didn't see a girl for ages.


The best thing though was one night me, John and Steve went to this casino over on Paradise Island. We hadn't spent any money all week so we each took £60 and we were

I take quite a lot of pictures on holiday, but I haven't really done much photography recently as the last thing I wanted to do after the tour was shut myself away in a darkroom!



'I love England, I couldn't go back to LA because people don't do anything but throw parties and go to Disneyland.


'I've done more here in a year than I did for six in LA - Paul's movie, this show, and I've written material for Alf Moyet's new album."

Kajagoogoo's first ever single 'Too Shy' was not too bashful to storm to No.1 in the charts. Another big hit and an album followed and the five pretty boys became 1983's first teen sensation.

Then things went wrong.

'Hang On Now' was a comparative flop and lead singer Limahl was sacked by the rest of the band, who wanted to "delve deeper musically".

With staunch Christian Nick Beggs on vocals, they stormed back with the more mature 'Big Apple'.

With their second post-Limahl effort 'The Lion's Mouth' just released and an album 'Islands' out in April, I took Steve Askew, Nick Beggs, Stuart Neale and Jez Strode away individually and questioned them on Limahl, Life and Everything.



In what way(s) do you think the band has changed since Limahi's departure?

Do you think you're any less teen idols now?

Is the Kajagoogoo of 'Big Apple' and 'The Lion's Mouth' a sort of Kajagoogoo Mark Two? "It is in a way, but I think it's gonna be quite interesting when people hear the *next* single – 'Turn Your Back On Me' – because that's *not* the same big sound."

So is Limahi's career perhaps the continuation of Kajagoogoo Mark One?

Do you think perhaps you've moved out of one shadow – Limahl – into another – Nick Beggs and his Christian beliefs?

nportant is Kajagoogoo to your	"Well it's where I am at the moment. That is it. It takes 100 per cent of what I do but if it all ended tomorrow I wouldn't be totally you know 'no go'. Lack of vocabulary! Pass the dictionary! No, I wouldn't be totally devastated, put it that way."	
nportant are Kajagoogoo in pop ?	"I think we're very good for pop music, very good. We feel we put out the best we possibly can. We put out another little original stamp in pop music."



At photo sessions now we're not bothering to bung make-up on, we're just wearing the clothes that we normally wear. There's no big deal anymore."	"Yes. I think other people have taken over where we left off now – Culture Club, Duran Duran. I see us apart from those bands now. I bear them no malice – but I think there's gonna be a revolution in music soon; a big pop."	"I think, within ourselves, yes we are. But it's gonna take a little while before it's conveyed to the fans. "Basically we want to lose some of the stigma attached to the name – like people calling us the Kajapoopoos or something."
"Yeah, definitely Mark Two. I think the only similarity we have with Kajagoogoo Mark One is that we have the same name. The music's totally different."	"I think 'Big Apple' was Kajagoogoo Mark Two I think 'The Lion's Mouth' is Kajagoogoo Mark <i>Three!</i> And a lot of tracks on the album are different again."	"Yeah, you could say that. I couldn't say whether 'The Lion's Mouth' is gonna be typical of future material, but it does herald a move to actually <i>saying</i> something."
"Possibly. I think he'll do very well. In a commercial format I think he'll probably have more success than us, because his music is more geared towards the teen thing."	"Definitely. I mean that's what /feel. Will he have more success than us? I don't really want to answer that question cos it might seem a little unfair."	"Yes, it probably is. If he <i>does</i> make a success, good luck to him, but my personal feelings are that the sort of music he's continued in doing is not going to have a long-lasting success."







Helen McCookerybook isn't someone who believes in blowing her own trumpet. She gets someone else to do it for her. And the sax. And the trombone.

Dave, Paul, Marc and Helen call themselves Helen And The Horns. They play jazzy country and western with a touch of hillbilly thrown in for good measure.

On their debut single 'Freight Train', Helen's singing is pure Doris Day, and the effect is as wholesome as apple pie.

So how did the one-time singer with "the worst punk band in Brighton", and more recently popsters The Chefs, get into a brass band?

"I just got in touch with a few people I knew, and decided to keep a horn section. It's nice not having drums or bass because I haven't got a rock'n'roll star's voice, and now I can hear myself singing.

"I like the sound of brass because it makes people want to listen. It's like car horns tooting away — you can't ignore it."

Of the clothes, Helen says: "I've always worn checked shirts because they're cheap — if you look carefully you can get them for 99p. The band wear suits because they're comfortable and make them *look* like a horn section.

"Really, it's just a laugh though. It's a cheerful image — it makes a change from people walfing around in black all the time."

Helen's a self-confessed fan of C&W bombshell Dolly Parton, and of course, Doris Day in the film *Calamity Jane*. As for 'Freight Train', Helen explains that

As for "Freight Train, Helen explains that it's her most extreme song — "people either really like or absolutely detest it."

"The western style is something I came across by myself, but if it fits in with what's happening now then I'm not complaining. "It's the right thing at the right time, and you don't often do that, do you?"



WARREN CANN (Drummer)

Canadian Warren Cann has one very important musical interest outside Ultravox, an experimental group called Helden which he put together with German electronics wizard Hans Zimmer.

They've played in some unusual venues, including the London Planetarium, and they'll be releasing an album soon.

Warren owns a Harley Davidson Electricglide motorcycle and a Jaguar XKE sportscar. He prefers the bike because he "hates travelling at a crawi in London". His big two passions, though, are shooting and watching movies.

In America he keeps a large gun collection. He's not allowed to here because he's a pop star!

"People make all the wrong connections," he says bitterly. "They just think it's all sex, drugs and hooliganism. The shooting establishment and the police over here consider you not to be a responsible person."

Warren still gets to shoot, though. His mother has houses in Hollywood and Los Angeles and he'll often go out into the desert firing at targets. "I enjoy hunting," he confesses, "but it takes too much time to set up."

Other hobbies include flying, and he would like to go into acting.

"At the level Ultravox work at," he says, "the pressure can kill you. You have to do other things. Finding the time is the difficult thing."

BILLY CURRIE (Keyboards)

If you walked into Billy Currie's home you probably wouldn't know what decade had hit you. His house is full of a mixture of Art Deco furniture (very high tech and futuristic) and old '50s antiques.

"I like the silliness of the Art Deco," he declares. "I've got some stupid little round chairs which I particularly like and some beautifully coloured wood. Art Deco's all about bright, brilliant colours.

"What I like about the '50s stuff is their craziness. It was such a defined period for design. It adds to their appeal. I've got '50s carpets, lamps, chairs and tables. There are some very interesting people in London who you can do a little dealing with."

Billy got to know Midge when the two of them helped form Visage in 1979.

"It wasn't well-produced music," he says, "and it was patchily done. There was a lack of commitment and money, but I enjoyed it. It was the chance to get on and write some good pop music. Uitravox was going through a lean patch and there was less weight on my shoulders."

With Billy writing most of the music and Midge contributing lyrics and production, it's easy to see why Visage haven't done too much since Billy and Midge fell out with Rusty Egan last year.

Ultravox fans need not worry, though. His commitment to that band is strong.

"I still get off on what we come up with," he says. "I still enjoy the music. Maybe I work too hard, but I find that it has to be like that."



Chris and Midge are perhaps the two closest friends in the group. They share a lot of interests: photography, videos, and now skling.

"We've just been to Austria," says Chris, "which was fun. I don't like other sports because I'm too lazy, but I think that it's just being on top of that mountain with that element of danger — will I get down or not?

"The only thing I don't like about it are the people that do it. The slopes are full of rich German twits and Austrians wearing jeans because they know they won't fail over."


Chris has accumulated a bit of a menagerie at his Reading home. But don't expect any llamas.

"I've got a few animals. Four cats, five geese, four ducks and seven chickens."

As we talk, he unwraps a present from a Japanese fan, a cuddly toy for his cats to play with.

Chris still finds Ultravox fulfilling. What keeps it together for him is the fact that all the group have different personalities.

"You know, I still can't believe Billy when he tells us what he's been up to the night before at a party!"



Midge had already tasted fame with Slik, The Rich Kids and Visage before he joined Ultravox, and now he's interested in projects around the group, like video.

"Chris and I discovered that we had a flair for it," he says. "We enjoy putting the storyboards together — it's like a feeling of power."

Midge has also formed his own label, Music Fest, with a studio at the bottom of his garden. Its first release was the one-off 'After A Fashion' single he did with Mick Karn.

"The label's proceeding slowly," he admits. "I want to be 90 per cent in control of what goes on. I want to have it aimed more at the artist than the record company, and there aren't too many companies prepared to give me that leeway."

Mr Ure is well known for his love of cars, but it's not something he enjoys talking about. "It sounds flash talking about how many cars you've got."

He has got a World War II jeep, a Jaguar sports model, a vintage Vauxhall and an old Porsche. It's their design he likes.

"I love the way some of the old ones have got real wood and leather inside them," he says. "They're more like furniture than


anything else. I don't particularly like fast cars, I drive quite slowly." Midge's interests lie in all

things visual. It is designs and lines that strike his eye. For the last couple of years he and Chris have taken tens of thousands of photographs, taking advantage of their unique position to photograph the band on tour.

Midge seems to feel more strongly than the others that Ultravox is *the* major part of the group members' lives, and it's only the fact that they've all got such active minds that keeps them all doing other things.

"A band can only be working together for nine months of the year at the most.

"The other three months you can either spend sitting around on beaches or doing something more important. The fact that we all do other things is, I think, a credit to the group."



A VERY GOOD GROUP FROM GERMANY

That's what Nena wants to be in. Paul Bursche reckons she already is.

Continental pop has certainly taken a bit of a bashing in the last couple of years. Oh how we smiled as Trio, F.R. David, Plastic Bertrand and a host of others muffed their way through their songs.

Nena don't intend to become a similar laughing stock – even though they did re-record '99 Red Balloons' in English.

"We made a mistake there," admits Uwe Fahrenkrog-Peterson, who writes the music. "I think the song loses something in the translation – sounds silly even. It's not something we'll rush to do again."

Nena do feel strongly about the song. Uwe and lyricist Carlo Karjes both come from Berlin, the city divided by the infamous Wall.

"The balloons are symbolic," says Carlo. "I was wondering what would happen if some were released in Berlin. Some would go West, to free lands, but others would go East over the Wall . . ."

Despite the partition, the group love Berlin with open pride.

"It's like a mini New York," says Rolf the drummer. "People go there to train for the real thing. And it's a very exciting place. There aren't very many clubs in Berlin but there are literally thousands of young bands around. It's very healthy for music."

"The best," agrees Uwe. "In Berlin the music scene is very diverse. We have a little bit of everything. In Stuttgart there is what you call mainly the New Wave and in Munich they have the trendy people, the Rolex watch people."

Whatever the merits of Berlin, however, Carlo doesn't feel there are many good groups in Germany.

"Too many of our bands are influenced by the old American bands. They all sound old. There are very few groups making good new music."

Two groups that Carlo does think are good are Nena (amazing, that) and Spliff – who just happen to produce Nena! He does feel that you don't need to speak English to have a hit anymore – as Nena proved with '99 Luftballoons' in America. In fact you don't need to speak *any* particular language.

"It doesn't matter what language you sing a song in," he says. "People are more interested in the music, which is good. I believe language is beginning to become less important altogether. I think that soon Europe will speak one language only. I believe that one day the ants will invade. That's my secret worry."

That's Carlo's way of letting us know that the conversation is getting a little heavy, but there's no denying it: Nena are more than just a bunch of faceless boys behind a gretty girl.




Nena herself seems to go along with the boy's views. She's happy to enjoy her new stardom while letting them explain the position of the band.

What do the stars think of sex in 1984? How does it help to sell their records? Do they know anything that Elvis Presley and Mick Jagger didn't?

ANDREW RIDGELEY



Andy Ridgeley is only 21 years old but his dark good looks and come-to-bed eyes have made him one of Britain's top pin-ups.

Along with partner George Michael, he has his picture plastered over bedroom walls all over the country.

Wham's Club Fantastic tour gave them their first real glimpse of the fans who buy their records. They played up to the teenage girls in a way that got them a lot of criticism from those who couldn't see the humour in the show.

When they appeared in shorts they had the audience screaming and swooning in the aisles, but Wham don't take their sex symbol image very seriously.

Do you consciously project a sexy image?

When I perform onstage I do, and for some photographs, but not as a person away from performing.

Do you think it's healthy for young girls to lust after pop stars?

How did you feel on the Club Fantastic tour with all those girls screaming at you? Just brilliant, because it was an instant reaction to all that we'd achieved over the past year. I never



Is it hard to keep a steady relationship going in this business?

What's the first sexy passage you remember finding in a book?

It was a James Bond one, I think it was *Thunderball*. There was quite a steamy scene in a beach hut.

It's all down to personal attitudes. I can understand why some women dislike it, but as a man it doesn't really affect me. The sort of people who buy *The Sun* for the Page Three girls have a basic attitude to women anyway which won't change.

TONY BLACKBURN



He may be everyone's favourite uncle on his Radio One Junior Choice show, but in the week **Tony Blackburn** adopts a slightly different, and decidedly ruder, approach.

His morning show on Radio London has listeners phoning in with requests, and Tony uses the opportunity to get them to talk about their love and sex lives. On air.

The calls can get increasingly dirty, but it's done jokingly rather than to offend.

Tony obviously enjoys his new role after years at the BBC pretending sex doesn't exist. And it has the added bonus of turning him into a cult figure at this late stage of his career!

Why is your album called 'Manpower'?

I think the whole thing with Mike Read and Frankie Goes To Hollywood has been blown out of all proportion. It was

something he said off the top of his head and it backfired. Radio One reacted stupidly.

As for the girl in The Sun-I hope he enjoyed it!

If there was a pill for men,

would you take it? Yes. I don't see why it should just be women who have to put up with it.

Do you think money adds sex appeal?

Yes, it helps. I suppose it can make you more of an interesting proposition if you turn up in a Porsche rather than a Mini-Minor.

But given the choice, my attitude would be that it's the nicest character that's most important.

DO YOU THINK THERE'S **PRESSURE ON POP** PERFORMERS SUCH AS YOURSELF TO CONFORM TO SEXUAL STEREOTYPES? Yes. I think the way Kajagoogoo look has given people the opportunity to do that.

It's just the ideal, the pop ideal, you know? This sexual thing. Personally I think it's totally out of proportion.

There's magazines in Germany which are aimed at 11-year-olds that promote contraceptives. I think that's

totally disgusting; it's really bad and I think it should be done away with.

Really it's very tricky to know what to say about the subject because I don't want to make myself out to be some sort of arbiter of good taste, like Mary Whitehouse. I just believe there are certain rules. . .

Sex has become an indulgence, a release, just like eating or sleeping. Sex should have nothing to do with an unmarried person's day-to-day life. I really believe that.

I'm not saying that's the way I am all the time, 'cos I'm not, but that's the way I think it should be.

For it to be discussed so openly I think is a bit of a shame. It takes away the importance. It's a very personal thing between two people who love each other and it is wrong in any other context.

DO YOU THINK OF YOURSELF AS A SEX SYMBOL? Definitely not.

COULD YOU LIVE WITHOUT SEX? Yes.

WHO DO YOU THINK OF AS A SEXY PERSON? My girlfriend.

DO YOU TAKE NOTICE OF THE CHURCH'S VIEWS ON SEX? Yes. Very much so.

RIGHT ALONG THE LINE? Not right along the line, no.

WHERE WOULD YOU DRAW THE LINE? THEY HAVE A FAIRLY STERN VIEW FOR INSTANCE ON THINGS LIKE HOMOSEXUALITY. I don't think I should answer these questions because they're like . . . very personal things.

And I think a lot of people would be offended by what I would say, and I'd prefer people to make their own decisions.

I mean it's such a personal thing for me, sex, and it's not something you should even think about discussing in a magazine, really.

You see the people who are gonna read your magazine are young people and I heard a certain musician, a certain lead figure in a band, say 'I'm a great lover'. And I thought 'Wow, that's really great - so what?"

It's just a completely wrong way of looking at things. People get themselves screwed up, you get unmarried mothers, you get abortions happening, you get rape-unloving situations. And really that's where it should begin-with a loving situation.





CULTURE CLUB It's A Miracle (Virgin)

Of late, Culture Club's singles seem to have been somewhat less sharp than George's tongue. But where 'Victims' was laboured and 'Karma' just plain silly, 'It's A Miracle' is sprightly and charming.

Helen Terry scats, the horns toot and everyone sounds full of the joys of spring. And George's recent revelation that the band are moving towards a harder, more raunchy sound is refreshing for all us ABC fans.

LAURA PALLAS Emergency (Record Shack)

Laura Pallas is apparently "big, bad and beautiful" — a sassy rival to The Weather Girls in the Boystown stakes who has already recorded two singles with Edwin Starr and worked with Wham.

Ms Pallas has a formidable growl of a voice but the banal chorus of 'Emergency' lets her down. A name to watch though — and you can catch her at the Palace (where else?) later this month.

SIMPLE MINDS Up On The Catwalk (Virgin)

More rattling, battering drums from Simple Minds, but this time Jim Kerr's cries to the four winds lack the melody and rhythm that made 'Waterfront' so persuasive.

You get the feeling old Jim's not too keen to be up on the catwalk with all these wicked capitalists but lyrically the high points are a name-check for Nastassia Kinski and (yet another!) for Mr de Niro.

Don't say they want to meet him too!

SIOUXSIE AND THE BANSHEES Swimming Horses (Polydor)

Here is the opportunity for Mike Read to prove he's quite a liberal sort of guy after all. "He gives birth to swimming horses," sings Siouxsie, and you don't have to be too imaginative to realise we're talking about Frankie's little come hither.

Musically this is a much lighter touch for the Banshees. None of those psychedelic guitars — just a simple, lilting refrain. So go on, Mike, give it a go!

YES Leave It (WEA)

'Owner Of A Lonely Heart' was one of 1983's few welcome surprises — sprayed with Trevor Horn's Art Of Noise and some very raunchy guitars, it really did get me going.

My flatmate thought I was quite loopy, so he'll be glad to hear this is back to the wet and weedy Yes we all ignore. Believe it ... leave it!

THE QUICK It's An International Thing (Epic)

A couple of years back The Quick packed dance floors with their Creole-style 'Rhythm Of The Jungle' and the McFarlane part of their songwriting partnership was recently responsible for Blue Rondo's excellent 'Slipping Into Daylight'.

Although this is a lot less subtle than the Rondo song, it does grow with a few plays.

ROCK GODDESS I Didn't Know I Loved You (Till I Saw You Rock And Roll) (A&M)

There is barely a group in the country who has not at one time or other covered a Gary Glitter song (or at least sung it in the bath). But apart from our Gaz, no one has yet come up with a decent excuse for doing it.

This is another pale shadow of the original.

CHAKA KHAN AND RUFUS Ain't Nobody (WEA)

Spandau's Gary Kemp listed this as one of his favourites from '83 in your Xmas *No.1* and now, finally, this slinky soul record has found its way over here.

Perhaps too understated to be a big hit this side of the Atlantic, 'Ain't Nobody' deserves to be enormous.

And I still think Rufus sounds like a dog.

BIZET Intermezzo (Polydor)

Taken from the new film version of the opera *Carmen*, this should at least distract people from the wretchedly wellworn 'Bolero'.

Apparently the film's great — "makes you want to rush out and join a dance class," said one critic. Somehow I think we're talking about something a little more up-market than *Flashdance*.

ALIEN SEX FIEND R.I.P. (Blue Crumb Truck) (Anagram)

Having seen *Scarface* four times, I reckon I can take as much blood and guts as the next depraved lad — but all this wailing and gnashing of teeth simply amounts to one unholy racket. A compliment, perhaps?

THE GAP BAND Someday (Total Experience)

A guest appearance by 'Little' Stevie Wonder on backing vocals and harmonica may finally grant the Gaps the hit that's eluded them for so long in Britain.

But this is nowhere near as sophisticated as 'Outstanding' and lacks the balls of 'Burn Rubber On Me' — the one that should have set them up as chart regulars two years back.

DOLLY PARTON Here You Come Again (RCA)

A timely re-release of this hit from '77, as Dolly popped up on TV only last Saturday in the excellent *9 To 5*.

There's something remarkably attractive about Dolly's confident Tennessee voice and this is as good a time to get to know it as any.


RICK SPRINGFIELD Jessie's Girl (RCA)

This starts out very like Thin Lizzy but I know it's not because I've met Rick and he's shorter than Phil Lynott.

'Human Touch' was a majorminor hit for Rick over here and I imagine this typical piece of American 'rack' will do the same sort of business.

WHODINI Whodini EP (Jive)

A considerate move by Jive, this, since Whodini have made

THE PALE FOUNTAINS (Don't Let Your Love) Start A War (Virgin)

More pop for pop's sake - this time from Liverpool. But despite nicking the guitar from The Bluebells' 'Čath' and chucking in a few muted horns, this is still nothing special. Awful title too.

CAPTAIN SENSIBLE Glad It's All Over (A&M)

A trifle early for the Captain to thank the Lord for a bit of peace in our time, but the innocent's hatred of other people's wars is wrapped in heart-warming regret. And a good toon to boot.

DEPECHE MODE

People Are People (Mute) Depeche Mode singles are often their own worst enemies.

On first hearing, their simple synthesised tunes and Dave Gahan's stiffnecked vocals can seem plain and familiar. It's only after a few plays that the subtle melodies and rhythms begin to come through.

'People Are People' is not as cynical as 'Everthing Counts', but it's just as worldly-wise – the killer being the sub-chorus: "/ can't understand. . .'

A good one for the next time we take to the terraces in Paris.

JAKKO

Who's Fooling Who (Stiff) Jakko looks like a rather

unattractive showroom dummy, so it's something of a surprise to find that this record is not a series of video games put to music but in fact a quite likeable little pop song.

A bit Hall and Oates, a bit Kershaw and Jones, this is this week's winner of the quiet man of pop award.

SHALAMAR **Deadline USA (MCA)**

Limp disco from pre-split Shalamar - surprisingly weak when you realise it's Giorgio 'I Feel Love' Moroder in the production seat.

Taken from the film Street Fleet starring 1983 Mastermind winner Mr T, both record and movie will probably disappear very quickly.

FRIENDS AGAIN Honey At The Core (Phonogram)

Seems like the whole of the office loves this one to death except me that is. Friends Again plunder mid-'70s Bowie for their vocals - but nice though that may sound, I can't see why they bother.

If you want some intelligent pop plagiarism, try Roddy Frame or The Bluebells.

DR JOHN

Jet Set (Beggars Banquet) "Tap of the morning to you! says Dr John as he jets around the world, and despite his appalling impersonation I'm

sure it couldn't happen to a nicer guy. This hip-top travelogue is a

good deal more laid-back than anything you're likely to get from label-mate John 'Freeez' Rocca, and with its subtle, slinky melodies it works.

KENNY LOGGINS Footloose (CBS)

The theme to yet another freewheeling, Levi-wearing, pant-staining American teen movie. If you don't see another film all year, see Hitchcock's Vertigo-the movie which, when I saw it on Friday, had the misfortune to have this load of old tosh as a trailer before it.

DAVID ESSEX **Fishing For The Moon** (Phonogram)

Fishing for the moon? A ridiculous occupation for a grown man. How sad to see Our Dave fall from 'Rock On' and 'Stardust' to weedy ballads like this

I know it's not my plaice to say so, but this is a load of old cod. Strictly for the hard of herring.

TONI BASIL Do You Wanna Dance (Virgin)

please!



(Island) Most comedy records don't bear repeated listening; this one requires stamina to make it to the end first time round.


ROBERT GORL



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
