Hello Girls

Are You Staying?

Over the past few weeks most of the musical papers and many of the national and evening newspapers have been joyfully welcoming the girls back to the charts. Sandie Shaw, Mary Wells, Dionne Warwick, Marianne Faithfull, Dusty Springfield, Cilla Black, Lulu, and others. Indeed I too, would like to say "Welcome" to the charts to the femme set. But let's be honest as well. Most of the articles that I've read have gone rabbiting on about the fact that are the girls here to stay (as regards the charts)? Usually ending up with the answer "Yes."

The answer is, and will be for a long time, "No." Girls who make hit records are few and far between. The fact that for one or two months of the year we get a few girls in the charts doesn't mean a thing. It doesn't mean that any of them are ever likely to continue as long term hit parade prospects.

The reasons I thought so obvious that I personally can't see why everyone else can't see them. Simply that (a) ninety per cent of pop records and pop magazines are bought by girls. Which for a start eliminates most of the girl singers. After all how many girl record-buyers buy girls' records? Not many, in my experience. (b) The fact that girls do get in the charts is borne out by a simple solution. That they are good enough, or their songs are good enough, to create interest in that one record only. After that their only chance of getting in the charts remains exactly, or almost exactly, the same as that of any new-comer to records. There are one or two exceptions. There is Dusty Springfield, who hasn't made that number of single records, but who in my opinion has the best chance of all of lasting.

She, I think, would be the first to admit, or maybe she wouldn't, that she has two things in her favour. She can pick good songs, and most important she has a voice and experience and talent enough to make a good song sound great. Any girl singer will reach the charts with a catchy good number. But they have no chance at all of hitting the charts with a bad number. Even the fabulous Dusty knows the strength

of a good song. Start recording bad songs, and you immediately lose the chance of getting into the Top Twenty. Boys, on the other hand, are luckier. If they have the image, just the fact that their first record got into the Top Ten is enough to put their second into the Top Twenty.

But this talk of girls lasting is, to put it plainly, nuts. Given the right songs. yes. Given the wrong songs, or just an image, forget it. They wouldn't last ten minutes.





Marianne Faithfu

talks to Peter McGill

McGill. "Marianne, your second disc Blowin' In The Wind has been released before as a single in Great Britain by at least two other artistes and released on LP's by many more. Why did you record such a number?"

"Because I am a folk fan. Marianne. My recording manager, Andrew Oldham is a pop fan, and we both saw how well this was going down on tour, so we decided to do something about it. I'd rather release a record I liked than one I didn't like.'

McGill. "A lot of people say you can't sing. What do you say?"

Marianne. "I can sing. I may not be as good as Joan Baez or someone like that, but then no one is, are they?"

McGill. "When you first got into the charts you said that you didn't want to stay in show business. Why have you changed your mind?"

Marianne. "Well, you see, I lived a different life from most teenage girls. I was brought up in a convent outside Reading and had a very quiet life. But now that I've got used to it I think I'll stay as a singer. It's exciting."

McGill. "How long do you think you will last as a singer?

Marianne. "Oh, I don't know. Maybe a year, maybe eighteen months, maybe longer, maybe not as much as that.

McGill. "Your record is just beginning to break in the United States of America. Does this please you?"

Marianne. "Yes, of course. hope I don't have to do too many tours. This last one I've just done with The Hollies in Great Britain just about whacked me out."

McGill. "What do you think of The Beatles?"

Marianne. "Well, they're great in their own way. But I'm more of a folk fan."

McGill. "I've heard that you really do stand outside theatres and sign autographs for hours. Is that true?"

Marianne. "Yes, but I don't like boasting about it. I just can't stand artistes who say they sign autographs and they don't.

McGill. "What's this as well about you letting girl fans cut bits off your hair?"

Marianne. "Oh dear did that get out? Yes, that's true as well, but don't make everyone think I'm going to do it every time."

McGill. "What don't you like about being in show business?"

Marianne. "When I have a day off, and someone tells me that I've got to do a TV show. I had that last week, and cried for a long time about it. I was so tired. Anyway, the crying must have worked, because I've got some more days off."

HEINZ HITS BACK

One of Britain's most dynamic stage performers, Heinz who is currently dodging between the Top Thirty and the Top Forty with Questions I Can't Answer, a weird sounding title, but a smash commercial record, should be due back in Great Britain shortly in time to deliver a few more resounding whacks at the charts with some more new discs. Currently he's wowing more teenagers, but this time in Australia, but I'm sure that this will give Heinz yet another outlet for his fantastic record sales. Heinz incidentally, told me before he went to Australia that he wanted to visit as many places as he could in Britain when he gets back.

"It's time I met more of my fans" he told me. Certainly for one who has appeared on countless tours with The Tornados before he turned solo this is an interesting remark. Heinz in fact, intends to not only prove that he is one of Britain's most dynamic record sellers and stage artistes, but also one of the up and coming film stars. After months of wondering whether he is good enough to act, he appeared in three films in

quick succession.

Now he is all set to go ahead with yet another smash hit. The latest disc Questions I Can't Answer started off very well, and then slipped from the charts. In fact, all that's holding the golden boy back from the Top Ten hits he was smashing the charts with nine months ago is some really good song material. It's not impossible, but very difficult to hit the charts with ordinary material, and that is what Heinz has

been trying to do.

Give him a strong record and he would be No. 1 in no time at all, that's my opinion. He has, in fact, displayed a fantastic knowledge of new styles and has some great ideas for record perfection. If he has to work all week on one number he will do so. He is likely to prove that hitting the charts isn't only the groups' prerogative. Certainly it would be possible for the blond bomber. as he is known, to continue for years without a hit, as he is in great demand in ballrooms etc., but obviously hit records are the thing that matter. Heinz has long bemoaned the fact that getting the right kind of songs to suit him is all he needs and I believe him too.

So come on Heinz fans, give him that extra push needed to get him into the Top Twenty. Then perhaps he'll get the opportunity of more hit songs. He has the talent and the technique, all he needs is a fairly good song, and then leave the rest to him.

But even without a good song, reach out for Heinz. The minute he gets back from Australia, he is going all out to prove that three hits are nothing. He is after a big spate of Top Ten hits and he's going to get them. He's a very determined lad, I believe he could do it.





SANDIE TOPS CHARTS

The girl who has created more surprises than anyone and has shot into the charts with her first record, (There's) Always Something There To Remind Me, Sandie Shaw looks all set to prove that 1965 is not going to be the year of the groups but the year of the GIRLS! With Cilla Black, Dusty Springfield, Brenda Lee, and Kathy Kirby really challenging hard, and hits with every new release, the title of Queen Of Pop really is vacant. Who is going to emerge as the heart-throb of the teenagers? Who is going to rack up more hits in the year? Will it be Cilla, who hasn't missed with five records? Or will it be Dusty, also no misses and a very hot prospect? Could be that Kathy Kirby will find her form and hit back with some more big Secret Love-type platters.

But two girls seem to be really hot, and they are Lulu, who missed on her disc success second time round, and also sandie Shaw. Admittedly Sandie had a good record to start off with, but her voice is a marvellous combination of Dionne Warwick, another girl I forgot to mention, and also Dusty Springfield. A better combination one couldn't wish for. Still in the running of course is Mary Wells. That makes eight girls with a strong knowledge of what is right for the British and American market. At least three of them will be certain to hit the charts.

Pretty certain that Sandie Shaw, if

she can continue to turn out gems like Always Something There To Remind Me, will be taking a lot of the chart honours. This is a beautifully commercial number, yet power-packed with that hesitant kind of emotion one only finds in real hit numbers. This is a number that Cilla or Dusty would have

jumped at. Had either of those recorded it I'm sure it would have been only two weeks in reaching the No. I slot. New girl Sandie Shaw has already hit the top here with it, and there's no reason why this one shouldn't hit the charts in America and the rest of Europe.

In fact, the girls' battle amongst themselves is developing into quite a race. Obviously Cilla and Dusty are way out in front, also the dynamic Brenda Lee, but Sandie Shaw has the image, the looks, and I'm sure the talent, to smash the charts first time out. Can she continue to do so in 1965? Keep an eye on this girl, not that one needs telling to keep an eye on someone as anice as Sandie Shaw, and let's see what happens. I'm banking on Saudie. I reckon she's Shaw of success!!

Palladium was one of the best for years from a pop artiste, and an American at that. I think Roy must be the only pop singer who doesn't jump about on-stage, make controversial statements or wear "different" clothes. He simply stands on-stage, sings and has the "House Full" notices wherever he appears. A fantastic person certainly and one who deserves to really hit the charts with every record.



Way up in the clouds again is CLIFF RICHARD. With his British tour drawing full houses wherever he goes, not bad for someone who has been in

the business six years, and his record Twelfth Of Never absolutely betting up the charts, his cup must be full to overflowing. You can talk of your Beatles and your Rolling Stones, but Cliff has been hitting the charts for six years, and judging by the way he keeps turning them out, there's no indication that he's slowing down at all. In fact, he appears to be getting stronger and stronger every day. Also the fact that when The Beatles really started to get going he had a terrific rise in his Fan Club, must prove something.



DAVE BERRY the boy tipped to hit the charts hard and fast with his new single *One Between Two Hearts* is anxiously waiting for a smash success in

America. He is one of Britain's few artistes who has continued to hit the charts even while beat boom has been going strong. A No. I hit has been forecast by those who have already heard the disc. Dave himself is never optimistic. His only comment is "I hope it does well." It's pretty certain it will do, for the demand for Dave has now reached tremendous proportions. This disc is one of the best to hit the market and should do much better than the Crying Game. It could also see Dave lined up for a big American tour.



That fab group, **THE ANIMALS**, who deserve
more publicity than they
get, are doing a grand job
with their recordings. After
their American tour, they

relaxed a lot more and found that it was easier for them to record. At the moment recording is farthest from their mind as they smash the charts and the theater ratings with their current British tour. Animal lovers will be able to get a basinful of The Animals as this tour goes all over the country.



That golden girl **DUSTY SPRINGFIELD** who has had fantastic success all over the world (and she richly deserves it, even if she does tell me off on the

phone) is being thrown back to work in a big frenzy. After her illness which caused her to stop her American tour, she is now almost certain to go back to American next year, where she is one of, if not the biggest chart contender in the female line. On November 16th Dusty goes out with Brian Poole and The Tremeloes on a three-week tour. In the meantime she must be working hard buying up a few banks to store her royalty money in from her latest record, Losing You.

record in Nashville whilst they are in America. They are off to America just before Christmas for a three-week tour, and also for TV and radio promotion. The Nashville Teens are almost certain to be going to America with plenty of theatres sold out before they get there. Since their Tobacco Road hit the charts just about everyone wants to meet them.



TOMMY QUICKLY one of the few artistes that Brian Epstein manages who hasn't hit the charts first time out, or at all yet, could make it with

yet, could make it with its Wild Side Of Life. It's a swinging number and advance sales have been heavy. At the moment he's pretty busy doing TV shows and touring. He also has some American TV shows on tape that should give him a good head start in America. He flies out to the States later this year for some TV spots. Being the only British Epstein artiste that hasn't hit the charts must be a bit of a blow really, and certainly Tommy is the only one who's not too worried about it.



TV's dashing Doctor Kildare, or better known to many as RICHARD CHAMBERLAIN, could hit the charts with his new silky smooth single

Rome Will Never Leave You. I suggest that when it comes to Britain they should release the record straight away. Everyone is watching it with special interest simply because it is a Hal David, Burt Bacharach composition. Plus of course that Richard has already hit the charts here before with his version of Elvis's Love Me Tender. This definitely should be one to watch. The handsome hero of the TV screen could be in England soon if film plans are settled before Christmas.



Those fantastic girls, **THE SUPREMES**, now have another stab at the charts with their *Baby Love* which could well be another Top Five entry for them. *Where*

Did Our Love Go? is already doing very well all over the world, and indeed is still selling like hot cakes in Great Britain. If they continue to release more records as fast as this they could well find themselves turning out six new singles a year. In Britain they are regarded as one of the best American groups, and not only by the teenagers either. The Beatles too, I hear, flip over their music.

So watch out America.




With all the other girl singers doing so well, it seems terrible to me that my favourite little girl, HELEN SHAPIRO, is still out in the cold where



Pretty Fantastic Things ...

One group that has been causing considerable interest are The Pretty Things. They are in fact, tipped in show business to take over from The Rolling Stones. They have a drive on-stage that makes Britain's latest super jet, the TSR 2 look like a slow caterpillar on a Sunday outing. Seriously, these boys can turn out a fantastic sound on-stage, plus of course, they don't have to look for screams, they already have plenty of those from their many thousands of fans that they have made throughout the country. In a few weeks' time The Pretty Things will be on the road and heading for more success when they appear on the P. J. Proby tour.

This could mean that The Pretty
Prings will also start to hit the charts
really hard the second time out. Their
first record, Rosalyn which made the
Top Forty, established the fact that the
boys were certainly popular. Their
latest platter, a hefty chunk of wax

destined to keep your feet tapping and your head shaking, is called *Don't Bring Me Down* which is a very strong beater, rather Stoneish, but containing enough of The Pretty Things' individual appeal to show that they are a group apart.

Proof of their popularity can be seen by the way the promoters of dance halls and tours are rushing to sign the group up. Already after only a few days of sale, their record is heading towards the Top Twenty. It seems a fairly even bet that the disc will be one of the best and longest sellers from one of Britain's very capable and well-liked groups. Certainly, judging by the sales of Rosalyn, which was released over four months ago, the group are pretty certain to hit the charts with this one.

I doubt whether the end of this year will see the group hitting the charts strongly enough to put in a bid against The Stones, but certainly in popularity they are fast becoming one of the best and biggest groups of the year. Everyone in show business is watching them with an eagle eye, and watching to see whether the fact that they are worth a few hundred pounds a night means anything. Certainly, things are going to be popping with the group scene for a long time whilst we have groups like The Pretty Things happening. I say they're going to happen big. They're already doing so, with this new disc, which isn't even a brilliant song. But it's going to be a hit. Just wait and see.

Plus too, they have the image, rather like The Stones unfortunately. After all we can't have two groups with the same image as The Rolling Stones, and they could make this image stretch to hits across the seas into the American charts. We'll just have to wait and see.

DISCussion

Hello then—it's another "mixed bag" week with very little chart shattering importance about it; but there are some interesting discs, nevertheless. First, though, a poser. I have always wondered why record companies release versions of songs already in the hit parade by other artistes; if two discs of the same song are issued almost simultaneously, then may the better disc win! But there are three examples of cover versions of current or very recent hits this week. The first is:

"Um, Um, Um, Um, Um, Um, from Major Lance, on Columbia. This might well be the original version but this much delayed release won't stand much chance of success with Wayne Fontana's disc already in the charts. There is very little difference between these two performances; it's not as though Major Lance has anything strikingly ear-catching over and above Wayne. By itself, a very pleasant, catchy disc—but it's already been caught, as you might say!

The second cover of a very recent hit is C.B.S's "Seven Daffodis" from The Brothers Four. Here is a very straight reading of the old and loved melody. Much appeal in the vocal, and the guitar backing is gently effective but I doubt whether this one has sufficient bite or added interest for a "pop" success. It will be liked very much by those who like this kind of song performed without any frills.

The third cover of a recent hit is "HI Heel Sneakers," on Philips, which brings back rocking Jerry Lee Lewis. Commencing with an infectious, rather restrained handclapping rhythm, the disc gradually builds up a frenzied atmosphere towards the end and there is a striking piano break at half-way house. Jerry is in fine style but I am wondering whether Tommy Tucker's recent hit will take the edge off any hit success this one might enjoy?

On the London label Lou Johnson gives us the slow and attractive Kentucky Bluebird. The shuffling rhythm is admirably suited to today's trends and Lou's voice has a warm, wistful charm. There is nothing strikingly individual about the composition itself but the treatment and rhythm could well catch the general imagination.

On H.M.V., The U.K's say "I Will Never Let You Go." A strong clean beat is the main point of this disc. There is little distinctive melody and the vocal has no new identifying quality to make the disc stand out. A well-performed, competent piece of work even so.

Pye and Johnny Sandon revive the melody of the old folk song "500 Miles" and give it a completely new lyric. Now called "The Blizzard," it tells the sad story of a romantic journey through a raging storm to see a girl called Mary Ann. There is much heart-

warming sentiment here; the lyric is well written and Johnny Sandon gives a sincere and telling performance—but, at times, doesn't he sound a lot like Jim Reeves?

+++ BOUQUET ++++ Just about the most exciting disc in this week's selection is Decca's Here Comes The Night which gives us the opportunity to hear Lulu in a hitherto (on disc) completely new guise. Gone tis the brash shouting which brought her to intial fame and, instead, we have a dramatic beat ballad Lulu's voice has many qualities and this "voyage of discovery" holds many interesting tones. She has warmth, control and perception which all go towards commanding the attention throughout the disc. The orchestral backing is just right for this disc, building up to a strong climax *
from a plain rhythmic start and * Lulu is more than up to the occasion. It is always an exciting pleasure to hear of any disc artiste ringing the changes—but doubly so when the changes are so extreme, revealing previously unknown facets of talent. This is an exciting disc because of all this and, I feel sure, one which will be generally applauded on its way to the higher brackets of chartdom. It is deserving of those higher things! *******

The husky whisper of The Caravelles makes a return to us on Fontana/Ritz, and the girls give us a revival of "I Don't Care If The Sun Don't Shine." It moves along quite crisply with a pronounced rhythm but the girls sound like so many other "sister" acts of years gone by; this results in a rather "old-fashioned" atmosphere with only the husky whisper to give it any individual personality. In its own idiom it is well-performed, cleanly produced but I doubt its general attraction at the present time.

I would say that Pye's "Down Town" is Petula Clark's most "commercial" pop potential for quite some time. It is a striking disc, with a lively, driving treatment full of atmosphere. Pet is in fine form and gives a performance which could well catch the general ear. In addition to that, the arrangement brings

the composition into today's pop focus and there is a particularly attractive title phrase which could quite well be infectious! A well conceived platter, this, and totally effective.

That old faithful "Skinny Minnie" servival which introduces us to The Beat Chies. Here is a straightforward reading of the music with added vocal "Heys!"; these triumphant ejaculations tend to get a bit monotonous half way through the disc. Tagged on to the now so-well-known instrumental phrase, they also appear to be rather pointless embellishments. The group's performance is competent but, for my own taste, I could have done with a little more life and drive.

R.C.A. Victor's "Tears And Kisses" is a pretty powerful offering from Frankie Randall. A big beat with all the qualities of today's popular rhythms. I find the lyric gets a bit tedious but, on a disc like this, the words are of secondary importance. The strong points here are the exciting beat of the Marty Paich orchestra and the striking tones of Frankie Randall himself.

The Beni Sisters give a fascinating new twist to the theme of She'll Be Coming Round The Mountain on "She'll Be Coming Round Mount Fujiyama." And as the title suggests, the lyric has many Japanese references. The slowish, shuffling rhythm is very infectious and the variations on the theme throughout hold the attention. An unusual platter with lots of charm.

And now it's time for me to say Sayonara-for-now! I'll be coming round this page again next week and hope to meet up with you again.
