EMI cracks down on Devon dealer's renta-disc operation

EMI HAS succeeded in the High Court Bellpipe Ltd, and an associated comin banning a record retailer from hiring out EMI albums in his 'Rent-a-Disc' business

Other record companies will certainly take note of this first successful legal move by a major against a High Street record lending library.

Renting has already become big business overseas. The BPI is determined to nip it in the bud before it gains the kind of hold it has in Japan.

Last year EMI added a clause into its terms of trading with retailers specifically banning traders from renting out its product. Other companies followd suit.

A year ago a collective attempt by the BPI to obtain a court order against a record renting business failed. But last Wednesday, EMI acting on its own, obtained a High Court injunction banning the hiring out of records from Record Wise run by Alexander Dart in South Street, Braunton, Devon.

Mr. Justice Harman made the order against the shop's holding company,

pany, Wishfenn Ltd. The companies were not represented in court.

EMI's counsel, Mr Peter Prescott, said Mr Dart's customers paid a £5 annual subscription for the Library service, known as "Rent-a-Disc." Records were loaned at 60p for three days. Mr Prescott referred to a particular record, "Still Life," by the Rolling Stones, which was hired out in July. There was a danger that some members of the public might rent records and then tape them at home.

"This practice is very damaging to EMI," he said. The judge also ordered an inquiry into damages suffered by EMI through breach of contract.

An EMI spokesman said later that if other retailers wre found to be hiring out their records court orders would be sought against them.

"This is something which could become very harmful, to us indeed. We are determined to stamp it out," he said.

MAM shares slip after record and show losses

YEAR-END trading figures from the publicly-quoted MAM company revealed that Tom Jones and Englebert Humperdinck have made their last major contributions to the firm's cof-

The singers generated around £250,000 for MAM in 1981-82, but their contracts run out at the end of the year and from then on, their contributions will be through existing copyright royal-

MAM is pulling out of the record business for the time being. Losses in the division were £240,000 last year but these have been cut to £100,000 in the past 12 months under greatly reduced

High hopes for big profits from the revival of The Sound Of Music starring Petula Clark did not materialise and actually made a small loss, while diversification into fast food franchises has yet to pay off.

The company is also still awaiting the hearing of an appeal against this year's Gilbert O'Sullivan judgement in which the singer-writer was awarded return of his copyrights and disc masters as well as all the profits that had been made from them. If the result goes against MAM, the company could be paying out well over £1 million.

MAM's main source of income is now from fruit machines, juke boxes and video games.

In the year ended July 31, MAM turned in a pretax profit of £2.01 million on an increased turnover of £25.19 million. Shares weakened to 128p on news of the profits slip-back.

Promotional records are gifts, says Judge

RECORDS SENT out to the media as promotional copies or for review are gifts and can be sold to secondhand shops or disposed of in any way the recipient sees fit.

That was the verdict of a Crown Court Judge who formally cleared the owners of two London second hand record shops - Cheapo Cheapo Records and Vinyl Scrapyard - of dishonestly handling 8,500 promotional records knowing or believing them to be

At the close of the prosecution evidence against Philip Cording, owner of Cheapo Cheapo, Robert Spicer, co-owner with Cording of Vinyl Scrapyard and salesmen John Thorpe and Rodney Cinq-Mars, the Judge directed the jury to return verdicts of not guilty. The trial had been taking place at Snaresbrook Crown Court and had been expected to last five weeks. Judge George McHale said: "The

prosecution case was that all the defendants had received promotional records belonging to record companies, and were therefore stolen. "But the legal analysis of the situa-


tion that arose from the evidence was that these records were parted with to DJs, journalists and the media as gifts. In these circumstances, they can be sold or disposed of in any way they choose. The question of them being stolen does not arise."

The charts, the hypers and the record industry's death wish

THE RECORD industry seems obsessed with a peculiar self-inflicted death-wish. The latest manifestation of its unique ability to damage its own public image is, as has sadly been the case far too often before, yet another example of chart hyping. This time, the alleged offence has been committed within the British Market Research Bureau itself.

In an outburst of pious indignation - safe enough on the eve of the transfer of the contract to Gallup the BPI announces its intention to sue BMRB for damages and additionally hands over details of its investigation to the police.

The outcome could be a prosecution involving a BMRB employee and a BPI member company. Guilt may in due course be proven, and penalties imposed. But in the end is

seeking to secure an advantage by rigging chart positions at source any more blameworthy than trying to achieve precisely the same effect by supplying free records and other promotional inducements to chart return dealers? The aim is the same. The only difference is the kind of financial resources and manpower available to record companies. The big ones can utilise their impact marketing teams. The small ones presumably have to find other ways of maximising their a&r investments. Can any member of the BPI Council put hand on heart and honestly say that his company has never sought to persuade dealers to show favours where chart returns are concerned? Why is it then that one method of hyping is allegedly illegal, while another is accepted as a basic example of marketing activity?

There's another aspect to this latest piece of record industry indiscretion - the position of the BBC. For a peppercorn payment the Corporation has access to a chart on which one of its most highly-watched programmes is based. But as one revelation of misbehaviour has followed another over the years, the BBC sails serenely on, uttering no words of condemnation, imposing no deterrent penalties, choosing to ignore what is fundamentally clear to so many, that without the BBC's endorsement there would be no need to manipulate chart returns in the hope, ultimately, that sales will develop and lead to a TOTP appearance.

As The Editor well remembers from his years on Music Week, there was a time when the industry chart

was a trendsetter which could be shown with pride to the rest of the world. It was a fine, honest, expertly compiled and largely accurate guide to sales. And now look at it: discredited, treated with contempt by its main financiers, who put up the money to pay for it, spend further money to manipulate it, pay again to investigate it and then impose 'fines' on those caught out.

A new era of chart compilation is about to start with Gallup now the official contractors. Is it too much to hope that this time the BPI membership will allow the chart to fairly reflect what the public is buying? Or is the death-wish now so deeply ingrained that Gallup will fare no better than its predecessor? Hyping, it must be reluctantly concluded, may now have become an accepted part of hit-making.

Dealers win court fight against BPI

Top children's titles in rash of new Xmas albums

ENID BLYTON tales, plus stories Salespeople/CBS. Previous Mr. Men from the 'Mr Men' TV series and Angela Rippon's Victoria Plum books are among the specialist albums recently released in a late rush for the seasonal childrens market.

The two Mr. Men albums have been put out by a newly formed company, Ingot Records, distributed through LPs have been released through BBC Records and Ingot's Ride Again (INGL 0001) and Return Of Mr. Men (002) will be narrated by the late Arthur Lowe. Ingot has acquired the rights from the author Roger Hargreaves, whose other children's stories Little Miss are due to be featured in a BBC series in February.

Final release aimed at the very young is The Adventures of Victoria Plum, released by Multiple Sound Distributors on the £2.99 Super Tempo label. Get fightingfit with WEA

WEA RECORDS has entered the crowded 'keep fit to music' market with an album with a new slant.

December 17 sees release of Get Fighting Fit (X0068) in which the record company has joined forces with the 2nd Battalion Parachute Regiment - the hard-fighting '2 Para' which featured prominently in the Falklands campaign.

It is the first Get Fit title aimed primarily at men, although it provides a challenge for women too, and is designed to develop speed, skill, stamina, strength and suppleness. There is detailed coaching through a series of routines and a constant musical accompaniment provided by the band and drums of the Battalion. It comes complete with a wall poster detailing exercise positions.

Videoshopinto records shock

AGAINST ALL the recent trends a video dealer in the Alexandra Park area of North London is planning to diversify - into the record business.

LDK Video, in Palace Gate Road, is reacting to local demand and the view that it is safer not to keep all their eggs in one basket.
"We haven't made a firm decision yet

but the idea does appeal. We deal with Lightning for videos and computer games and have talked to them about records," said director Derek Armstrong.

In view of the much vaunted view that video would be the saviour of the record industry - which has never materialised - the decision is questionable but Armstrong has clear views and objectives.

"Our aim would be a small specialist shop which knew the demands of customers. From what I have seen we are gradually working back to the day of the specialist," he said.

This specialised local service might even be available only to video library members but at the moment LDK is finding out the needs of customers. There are big shops in Wood Green but nothing within two miles of LDK.

Tears For Fears in court row

A DISPUTE between Mr & Mrs Music and Tears For Fears hitmakers Roland Orzabal and Curt Smith resulted in the publisher obtaining an injunction against the writers in the High Court.

Mr & Mrs Music claim to be copyright owners of 44 songs written by Orzabal and Smith, whose 'Mad World' on Mercury has been a recent Top Ten hit. The writers have disputed this

Following the court hearing, it was agreed that until the dispute has been resolved, 'copyright control' will appear on future recordings of the copyright.

MULLINGS

HI THERE guys 'n' gals - it's time for Top Of The Freebies. Straight in at Number One is Polydor's monogrammed cashmere sweater, a really in demand item at this time of the year, and the best piece of yuletide schmutter since A&M's similar hot entry four years ago. Moving off the top spot, after a strong run of several weeks, is **RCA's** pack of David Bowie picture discs, now down to Number Three. Phonogram's Randy Edelman tour jacket shows signs of wear at Number Two and is unlikely to make the summit. Also running out of steam in the popularity listing at Number Six are MCA's complimentary tickets for ET now that the previews are over. CBS is also having difficulty in maintaining extra-terrestrial interest in Neil Diamond's ET Doll, now dropping fast and down to Number Eight. Indeed, CBS releases at the moment are generally having a tough time. Expected to be a 'sleeper' the Marvin Gaye pillowcase made a fast entry, but quickly slipped back to Number Nine, while the Julio Iglesias calendar is now propping up the Freebie Top Ten. Looking strong at Number Four and a clear contender for a Christmas Number One is the Madness doormat from Stiff. The same company's Lene Lovich legwarmers failed to crossover into the young male market, ballet dancers excepted of course, and stays at Number Seven. A&M's Elvis Costello plonk is being well appreciated at Number Five, but is not expected to improve with age. No surprise that WEA's Chicago mug has dropped out of the Top Ten, it rather lacked the style and quality necessary for chart longevity. A surprise tip for forthcoming chart status is the comparatively modest Maisonettes plastic keyring - reportedly already in demand among rock-journalists, but rumours abound that Capitol may be making a limited edition jacket available just in time to capture a significant section of the festive market. And until next year's Top Of The Freebies, lads 'n' lasses, stay bright, alright. Or as one industry captain remarked; "Why don't we give away the records and sell the freebies," – you know it makes sense. . .

AS WE brace ourselves for a burst of seasonal ET madness, MCA is girding its loins to grab a slice of the music action with its soundtrack album, available in picdisc form as well, and has notched advance orders worth a silver disc. By the end of January up to five million people (seven million if you include those who have seen the pirate tape?) will have seen the film, which should ensure a few wanting the John Williams music . . . Red Rose Radio breakfast dj Dave Lincoln heard the other morning appealing for help on behalf of a lady who had searched in vain for the Magnificent Men In Their Flying Machines LP. Any listeners with copies were asked to allow her to borrow one so that she could tape it – ho hum! . . veteran showbiz photographer Dezo Hoffman, whose command of the English language is legendary, was heard the other day on Richard Baker's Start The Week radio show plugging his book on the Beatles and telling the world that the "boys knocked me for seven" . . . at the Hope and Anchor, Islington on December 17, Doll By Doll are playing a benefit concert in aid of Ron Smith's legal costs. .

CONGRATULATION TO Simon Lait of Radialchoice whose 'Mickey' single by Toni Basil has gone to Number One in America, where it is released on Chrysalis. Lait is definitely enjoying having the last laugh after failing three times to interest American labels direct. And to think that it was only a year ago, before 'Mickey' took off here, that Radialchoice was on the verge of going broke, partly because of Lait's decision to invest in the Toni Basil videoalbum . . . with 'Beat Surrender', the Jam join the select trio of acts who have made three successive first-week number ones. By coincidence the last act to do so was Slade, also at the time on Polydor, and before that, inevitably, the Beatles . . . talking of Polydor, last week's brouhaha over chart hyping suggested the company might be involved, thus implicating md Tony Morris, chairman of the BPI chart committee. An amused Morris subsequently issued a statement saying: "I am able to sleep easy at night" . . . what a difference a successful tour can make – Elton John who only a few months ago was giving rockets to his record label staff has been able to splash out by gift-wrapping the Hammersmith Odeon for his 14 Christmas shows . . .



RETAILING

FOR SOME while now, I've read the various explanations from within the record business on how and why it's all collapsing. The most contentious points concern home taping, lost sales, pirate video, lost sales, increased costs and overheads, lost sales, chart hyping, lost sales and so on. Yet no one within the industry, whether retailing or manufacturing, seems to want to admit that they just might be at fault, that they might have got it wrong, that the illness presently afflicting the business might be, to a degree, of their own making and closer to home than was realised. Heretic thought for the day? Well . .

millions unemployed there's precious little spare cash around to squander on luxury goods such as records and video tapes. The business had best get used to the idea that records and tapes are nice to have, but you can live without them . . and the longer the buying public live without them, the more they get used to the idea, which will make it that much harder to win back the custom.

Of late, home taping has been cast as the villain of the piece, the single Sin that will, alone and unaided, bring the record industry to its collective knees. How did the industry prove it? Was there a house-to-house survey, the length and breadth of the country? Did retailers ask everyone who bought a blank tape what it would be used for? No and no: the logic applied is: if more blank tapes are being sold but less records, then the cassettes are being used to tape the records! Gosh, simple, wasn't it. And we'll ignore the fact that pre-recorded tape sales are on the up. Obviously, home taping has increased and it's probably rampant among the least well-off. I don't think I know a tape-only collector/fan, but I know plenty who buy records and blank cassettes, for use in the car, or at parties or at home.

I cannot accept the industry's idea of a massive, national blank tape conspiracy that is effectively killing off the record business. The guilty don't necessarily prefer taping, they just can't afford the records! Weigh perhaps £5.50 against say £1.75 - no contest.

Mistrust

Are records too expensive then? Hardly-from 1962 to date, albums have little more than doubled in selling price, an incredible performance (or perhaps, lack of) gauged against any other commodity you might care to name. The actual profitability performance of records as consumer goods could only be described as sluggish, the swingeing increases in such as rents, rates, wages and general overheads in the two decades, have made independent record retailing today an occupation fit only for the brave, foolhardy or altruistic. Out there, on The Street as it were, we've reached the point where the dealer can ill-afford a decent or representative stock (and forget back catalogue).

The inter-reaction between retailer and record company or label is little short of abysmal, is based on mistrust on both sides and is effectively non-existent. By and large, retailers think that record companies operate on some other commercial plane, divorced from the

real world, and for their part the labels consider retailing to be a mystic art, distinct and separate from their own day-to-day toil.

In fact, the only shared ground is the company rep who is, at least, suffered by Mr. Retailer, at most, despised, and At the risk of stating the obvious, with whose only reason for being is The Monthly Figures/Target. From time to time, an Area or National Manager will come down from the foothills of Olympus to accompany this unfortunate on his daily round, the idea being to instil confidence in the retailer and assauge any feelings of antipathy felt towards the label or its product; more likely to hustle some devious deal. After the introductions, the sales pitch and emphasis, a cup of coffee and farewells, each party is left with the same disregard, one for the other, the problems still remain, life goes on. This shattering lack of

mited-choice, expensive, snob value, difficult-to-assimilate range to gether dust on and in the custom built shelves and racks. Is this really the right time to unload CD on the retail trade?

Nail in coffin

If CD (or indeed, any alternative form of record playing system) is to be in with any sort of a chance, it must have massive advertising, promotion and product, preferably supported by the entire record business on all counts. It's no good wallying around with a few titles here, a page ad. there - the entire record buying population must be left in no doubt that eventually CD is going to sweep the planet and they must be able to buy the product at almost every record shop or appointed outlet in the land.

Even if only moderately successful CD will be another nail in the record

bleak prospect of a not-too-distant future: independent dealers will have become an endangered species, all but vanished from their natural habitat. Record retailing will be mainly in the hands of a few major chainstore outlets, operating only in the larger towns and

Endangered indies

All ordering will be carried out from the chains' particular central buying and warehousing facility, much use being made of telephone and computer, which has the advantage of keeping staff levels down. For example, in the case of record companies, a few telephone persons could cover the country in a day or two, particularly useful in the matter of hot new issues, thus releasing all those maligned reps for duty . . . elsewhere? Those pockets of resistance, the foul independents, would have to phone the company or distributor - perhaps they buy from the chainstore? - and as long as the order is of the required minimum and they're able to pay COD, they get the goods.

So the situation develops – as I see it – until the happy day when the chains realise they've got the labels and distributors by the proverbial orchestras, having by now cornered an overwhelming major percentage of the retail market. At this point, in a remarkable show of unity, they start dictating in style: what they want released, when and for how much. The labels baulk, refuse to co-operate, shout loud and long. The chains retaliate by pruning orders, finding lots more faulties, 'forgetting' to make chart entries, losing invoices, taking 60 days to pay (even at the cost of the 15 percent settlement discount) and similar action. Worried record company bosses are seen buying pints for independent dealers (independent dealer: anyone who manages or owns from one-to-three record shops and is certifiably insane); but it's too little, too late. After the smallest of the three major labels goes into liquidation and one of the two distributors calls in the receiver, the companies bow to pressure, the bloodless coup d'état is complete.

You think I'm joking, don't you? Perhaps a little extreme, but spare a thought for the computer technology available now and that which is planned for the very near future. Look at the hardware and software, remember that your kids are using this sort of stuff at school and think how easily it could mesh with the record business, far more so that it does already. Now check on what and how many record shops have closed, have a chat with that company rep. Why did they close? Were they bought out? Who by? Who is fool enough to open the only new record shop in your immediate area??????

Well, time enough to worry about it internecine warfare and while Rome all later, got to worry about the Christmas rush right now and anyway, if things get tougher . . . yeah, grant you, they might . . . there's always video, or CD, or these computer game thingys, or decaphonic, or direct-cerebral input tapes, or . . . the dole?

TONY MARTIN, Tonal Records,

In an Orwellian article, Sussex retailer TONY MARTIN analyses the head-in-the-sand attitudes which have brought the record industry to its present parlous state

communication between the two vital and essential bases of a multi-million pound industry is alarming, frightening and unique and is contributing mightily to the withering of the trade.

But the release blitz continues, with weekly schedules of 100 or more titles each on 45 and LP not at all unusual, laced with a few direct-selling TVadvertised albums, all of which will get even more out of control as the frenzy-of Christmas approaches.

This year, I suspect that Christmas will be notable for the demand for video equipment and tapes, which will please more than a few people. We lead the world in ownership of videos per head of population, a situation I think to be far more damaging to the record business than any threat, imagined or otherwise, that the cursed blank cassette may offer. Video is the new family toy, the most convenient to use for maximum audiovisual impact and Christmas is the perfect time to sell or rent to the public. Consider a new video customer. On the meanest calculation of VCR deposit, of club membership fee, rental payments, blank tapes, a little over £100 could have been paid out. A fat chance of the customer checking the boogie down at the record store!

Bearing in mind the time of year, let us not forget the televisual games so heavily advertised, home computers and these clever toys (toys?) crammed full with chips that every tiny tot seems to want. It's going to cost doting parents an arm and a leg this year! Just look at the time, effort and money involved in the purchase and operation of these gizmos and ask yourself: is it really any wonder the record business is in the dumps? And this is the time chosen to launch the compact disc. Just what the record retailer needs, another specialist, li-

business's coffin. Some would have you think that every home is fitted as a matter of course with a hi-fi system (incorporating tape player), plus videotape and videodisc systems, to which we are now expected to add CD. Apart from the fact that this is gross overkill on the home entertainment front, do you know anyone who's the proud owner of the first three items? If so, is he or she likely to add CD? Even for the modest (!) outlay of £250 for the basic unit? All this audio and audio-visual emphasis only serves to fragment trade, each aspect winning and losing, in varying combinations, one against the other . . . directcut, digitally encoded, picture disc, coloured vinyl, home computers and games, video disc and tape, CD.

The record business of today, including all its peripheries, is in great danger of disappearing off its own runoff groove. It is self-indulgent, self-important, over-staffed, unwieldy, unyielding, isolated, insulated and polarised. Virtually all its income is derived from and at the whim of a fickle and nowadays impoverished public. Speculative from Day One, the business can only operate on a hit-or-miss basis, unleashing thousands of titles, in all formats, in the frantic hope that a miniscule percentage will prove popular enough to garner substantial sales, become hits and subsidise the dross. Labels, distributors and retailers share no common ground, other than indulging in vicious and burns, the industry fiddles around and dabbles in new formats and concepts that are not wanted, too expensive, too late or too complicated. We've had the fat years, the 60s and 70s and history should have taught us that all great empires eventually fold.

As I'm in Orwellian mood, I offer this Horsham.







UK the major source of Five albums talent, say Americans

THE DIFFERENCE between the the conclusion that the UK is a better American and British music markets has years. The strict format of American radio has ensured that many areas of that great continent remain locked into certain types of familiar music for years with change creeping in very slowly now

and then from the two coasts.

A measure of the difference was demonstrated recently when Tommy Mattola and Randy Hoffman were in the UK. The two run the Champion Entertainment Organisation in America, a huge umbrella company whose activities cover TV and film production, cable TV and the management of Hall & Oates and Kid Creole And The Coconuts.

Mattola and Hoffman are only too aware of the coming opportunities to relate music to video and cable TV, hence the wide spread of their company's interests. And they have come to

breaking ground for adventurous acts rarely been more marked than in recent like Kid Creole. "Because of the uniqueness of what August Darnell was involved in, it was difficult to get his music played on radio in America." said Mattola. "The press helped a lot. We had press reaction in America but radio doesn't automatically follow. New York is not America, it's like an island."

If you market and merchandise right in the UK, they say, you can sell records without airplay. It is this conviction with the British market that has persuaded them to open an office here. Their trip on this occasion was partly to look after Hall & Oates on their tour, and partly to plan the launching of their UK arm. Randy Hoffman, who is vice-president of Champion's international affairs, already spends time in Britain but a full-time head for the UK office is now being sought.

Mattola has known August Darnell for seven years. He came across him in a New York rehearsal studio. "He was then in Dr Buzzard's Original Savannah Band and I heard this strange, strange music coming out of the studio.'

The Kid Creole show was always a vision of Darnell's even back in the Dr Buzzard days. Then, he had a makeshift band performing with a makeshift set.

"We spent one-and-a-half years getting it to the current line-up, honing everything, getting in new members, new girls. We knew that the visual power was the asset."

Video is therefore the next step for Kid Creole. "It's the most important vehicle for Kid Creole in the future. They've only done promo videos so far, but a video LP is the next step, a mini-movie."

After this it seems that Darnell may well get involved with theatre. He comes from a theatrical family background and is currently considering offers to write a Broadway play plus several score offers for films.

This multi-media building of careers is the road down which Mattola, and Hoffman intend to travel with their acts. The potential of cable TV is particularly relevant to music acts. "In one evening you could generate four or five million people watching your artist."

"In America there's a new wave of fans pushing out now. They look rather like the kids in the UK - dressing up a lot, and they go to the Ritz in New York, which is the in-club at the moment. And one or two stations in New York and Los Angeles have a new programming format.'

"Management is not a one-person job these days," they say. "It's taking an act and broadening it out into a whole

This, their company seems eminently suited to do. And in future they will be looking especially to this side of the Atlantic for their A&R ventures. "The UK is now the major source of new music and talent," they stress.

then Clannad hitjackpot

AFTER A decade on the music scene, Clannad the inter-related - family group, are enjoying international chart status with their debut release on RCA Records 'The Theme from Harry's Game'. The group consists of Maire Brennan and her two brothers Cairan and Pol, together with their uncles the twins Padraig and Noel Duggan.

Since formation they have issued five albums for labels such as Polydor, Gael-Linn, Ogma and Tara Records, before they signed with RCA. The

group were touring Europe when they were informed that the composition composed by Pol 'Theme from Harry's Game' had zoomed into the charts and they were booked on a flight to London to record a guest spot for Top of the Pops. An Clannad, who hail from the Gweedore Gaeltacht in Co. Donegal, spend six months yearly on European tours playing a varied repertoire embracing traditional, folk, classical and jazz.

SALES OF 'You've Said Enough' by Central Line, at number 30 in this week's RB Disco Top 50, will be boosted by an American Mercury import 12-inch of the track, accompanied on the 'A' side by an instrumental remix, and flipped by a new version of the Nat 'King' Cole standard, 'Nature Boy', which is exciting everybody who hears it. This 'B' side, in fact, will probably generate most of the sales on the import, and will presumably have Phonogram looking at 'Nature Boy' for the official UK follow-up.

There has been a notable upsurge of interest in dance instrumentals over the last couple of months, bringing big disco chart hits - initially on import to the Montana Sextet with 'Heavy Vibes', Greg Henderson's 'Dreamin' and Tyrone Brunson's 'The Smurf'. All are now available on British 12inchers, and have seen sales bursts in the specialist area, but it remains to be seen whether the market as a whole is wide open for purely instrumental dances. Virgin is working its socks off to break 'Heavy Vibes' across the board, but its essentially jazzy nature seems likely to keep it off the airwaves particularly Radio-1 - and consequently out of the pop charts too. Brunson has the most likely potential pop crossover, although until they actually hear it, people tend to gasp in horror at the title of the disc, presuming that the dreaded Father Abraham and his hordes of blue-skinned squeaking cohorts have reached America at last and are now striking back at Europe.

It may be worth checking your copies of the Michelle Wallace 12incher 'Jazzy Rhythm', on the recently issued British pressing on System, through PRT. There are apparently copies around with Brenda Watts' 'Who Needs A Love Like That' (a recent import mover in its own right) on the flip, and still more featuring 'Tee's Happy' by Northend. This column understands that the latter track is now the official coupling, which may mean that System will now grant Brenda Watts an 'A' side release in her own right.

YOKO ONO: It's Alright (Polydor POLD 5073) Prod: Yoko Ono The slight vocal prowess, the trite melodic structures and the simplistic lyrical content notwithstanding, this remains an engagingly intriguing album. It's special appeal is obviously her very personal message of lost love and coming to terms with a new existence which combine to make a strong emotional statement. But in the end, it is her imaginative production that succeeds in welding together the parts and giving the album an overall dimension that is never less than impressive.

SLADE: Slade On Stage (RCA RCALP 3107) Prod: Slade Possibly because of previous teenybop allegiances, Slade remainless of a record selling force than many of their HM contemporaries, who can't match Noddy Holder's raw vocal power, or the band's ability to



come up with discernible hook-laden songs. This is a particularly volcanic performance recorded before a highly receptive audience at Newcastle City Hall during which many of their good old good ones like 'Take Me Bak 'Ome', 'We'll Bring The House Down' and 'Gudbuy T'Jane' are trotted out with immense gusto.

MINIPOPS: We're The Minipops (K-tel ONE 1187) Prod: Bright Records After last year's exploratory effort with a bunch of weenies attempting soundalike versions of chart hits, this new album is an altogether more worthwhile and listenable compilation. The impersonations of Bucks Fizz, Toyah, Fame, Supremes, Kim Carnes, McCartney-Jackson, Adam Ant et al are delivered with assurance and enthusiasm. It may make a dent pre-Christmas, but with a C4 series pending, there will be plenty of 1983 mileage to be achieved on the back of K-tel's TV promotion.

THE ASSOCIATES: The Affectionate Punch (Fiction) Prod: The Associates/Mark Arthurworrey A remix of their first album from 1980 indicates that Billy Mackenzie's vocal approach was a degree or two less over-the-top than displayed in his more recent work. In its latest form, the album comes across as a lively uncluttered example of contemporary synthesizer-based dance music which makes it an attractive proposition for this time of the year. However, the band's profile has been a bit on the low side of late and Mackenzie's solo effort was unremarkable, so a chartbased-45 will be needed to generate maximum consumer attention.

BEST OF THE REST

JONATHAN KING: King Size King (PRT NCP 1007) Prod: Jonathan King
No less than 16 prime cuts from pop's king of schlock. Lest we forget, he was responsible
for great moments in hit parade history like 'Loop Di Love' by Shag, 'Johnny Reggae' by
The Piglets and 'Chic-A-Boom (Don't Ya Jes Love It)' by 53rd and 3rd as well as other
opportunist smashes under his own name. How much mileage is left in these tracks is
open to question, but it's all good clean fun.

THE ROSE OF ROMANCE ORCHESTRA: The Rose Of Romance Orchestra, Volume One (Rose Records RR 1001) Prod: Len Beadle

A lush, late-night sound conducted by Jack Dorsey, this well-publicised LP features several real old favourites – 'Days Of Wine And Roses', 'September Song' and 'Shadow Of Your Smile', but spliced in with some more recent hits like 'Cavatina' and 'All By Myself'.

BONEY M: Mary's Boy Child (The Christmas Album) (Hansa/Atlantic K50923) Prod: Frank Farian

Bouncy selection of Christmas hits from 'Jingle Bells' to the title track – delivered with varying treatments: disco, reggae or the occasional slowie. Archetypal Boney M sound but obviously only a seller this next couple of weeks.

CULTURE: Lion Rock (Cultural Foundation CULT 001) Prod: Joseph Hill Now billed as 'Culture featuring Joseph Hill', the band has gone through many changes and emerges on a band-owned label through Rough Trade. The outstanding reggae release of the week, the LP is carried through by dense rhythmic arrangements and the gospel-tinged vocals of Hill, who sounds best on declamatory stuff like 'The Rasta Man' and 'Disobedient Children'.

THE GLADIATORS: Back To Roots (L'Escargot ESC 419)

First UK album from this rated vocal group since 1980 when they were on Virgin's Front Line label. It's very much mainstream reggae of late-70s type, free from dub, lover's rock or any other refinements but is all the more refreshing for that and will be welcomed by all fans of this musicianly outfit. Distribution through IDS.

VARIOUS: Laser Reggae Hits (Blue Moon BMLP 003) Prod: Various Second album from the successful pop-reggae Laser catalogue from Magnum Force spin-off Blue Moon. With a £2.99 dealer price, the LP is good value for money, carrying Althia and Donna's 'Up Town Top Ranking', Dennis Brown's 'Money In My Pocket' and 'You Never Know What You've Got' by Me and You. Also here is the influential Culture's 'Two Sevens Clash' and Prince Mohammid's clever 'Bubbling Love'.

GEORGE DUKE: The 1976 Solo Keyboard Album (Epic EPC 25021)

The prolific Mr. Duke now brings us an LP made at the end of his days with MPS Records. He performs on piano, synthesizers and even drums on a series of classy light jazz tunes and improvisations. His future funk direction is forecast on 'Spock Gets Funky', and he admits on the sleeve notes to have enhanced the original mix with some modern polyphonic synth work, presumably to bring the sound a bit more up to date.

AL GREEN: Precious Lord (Hi-Cream HLP 6007) Prod: Al Green

Now a Reverend of the Full Gospel Tabernacle in Memphis, Green has devoted his exquisite vocal prowess to serving his religion, and this is a committed gospel album. However, recent dearth of product could spark more interest than normal in this kind of release, while the material is above average and Green is singing in handsome style.

Noddy Has An Adventure (Golden Wand CMCR 800)

Enid Blyton's enduringly popular children's stories are entertainingly interpreted, with Noddy sounding rather like Dick Emery's juvenile delinquent and Big Ears a dead ringer for a country bumpkin from The Archers. Mr. Plod, the policeman, Katie Kitten and the rest, plus some catchy songs will all help keep the toddlers quiet while grownups slumber in a festive haze. Distributed through Lugton:

POISON GIRLS: Where's The Pleasure (XNTRIX 2006) Prod: Skolfield/James/Poison Girls

The Poison Girls' measured interplay between the 'personal' and the 'political' has made the group arguably the most intelligent and listenable punk band around. In fact, the range of sound and depth of comment within this, their third album, dismisses such superficial categorising. Tracks like 'Soft Touch' and 'Fear Of Freedom' are ready proof of their obvious sincerity. A sizeable Indie hit but worthy of greater exposure.

CHIC: Tongue In Chic (78.0031-1) Prod: Rodgers & Edwards

Unfortunately a new Chic album doesn't appear to be such a dance/disco event as before. Nile Rodgers and Bernard Edwards' wickedly effective 'Chic Sound' breaks no new ground although as ever the results are superbly produced and played. 'Chic (Everybody Say)' is another chant anthem whilst the remainder is solid and funky, albeit rather run-of-the-mill.

VARIOUS ARTISTS: Pillows And Prayers (Cherry Red 1982-1983 (Cherry Red Z RED 41)

Cherry Ŕed's much vaunted cheapo sampler (99p retail) which leads with tracks from Eyeless In Gaza, Monochrome Set, Attila The Stockbroker and Kevin Coyne and takes the opportunity to give exposure to other worthwhile Cherry Red acts like Tracey Thorn and The Nightingales. All cuts are current releases or from recent albums.

STIX HOOPER: Touch The Feeling (MCA NCF 3149) Prod: Hooper-Felder-Sample Crisp, tidy and impeccably played dance music from the Crusaders' drummer which like so much of current jazz-funk leaves little scope for individual expression of feeling. But look out for the re-emergence of veteran soul singer Jerry Butler on 'Let's Talk It Out'—that's rather special.

JOHN DANKWORTH: Fair Oak Fusios (Sepia (RSR 1007) Prod: John Dankworth Adventurous, but not so far out that anybody in either camp need be daunted, collaboration between John Dankworth and cellist Julian Lloyd Webber, with the Myrha Saxophone Quartet also contributing importantly. A most attractive and intriguing album.

Don Henley - Dirty Laundry (Asylum E9894) Producers - Don Henley, Danny Kortchmar and Greg L. Adanyi

Funky chickens are old hat, 'coz here's the funky eagle! Henley has left behind the close harmonies of yore, declaring his independence with an irresistable dance track. 'Dirty Laundry' boasts an organ riff which never

lets up, a heavy backbeat and a doodling bass plus, of course, Mr. Henley's emotion-drenched vocals. For good measure there's a blistering guitar solo which would do justice to the Skunk. If radio gets behind it Henley could become the first Eagle to make a successful solo flight in the UK. Discos will love it regardless.

CHART CERTS

FUN BOY THREE - The More I See (The Less I Believe) (Chrysalis CHS 2664) Producers - Fun Boy Three The Fun Boy Three add their views to the never-ending Northern Ireland debate. In so doing, they forego the over-riding rhythms which typified their previous 45s, substituting a menacing, repetitive backcloth for their wordy outburst. Obviously heartfelt, but social commentary is not the flavour of the month, and the disc could suffer accordingly. Radio may baulk as it did when Lennon, Boney M and McCartney made their views on Ulster public.

BEST OF THE REST

PSYCHIC TV - Just Drifting (Some Bizzare PTV 1) Producers - Psychic TV and Ken Thomas

Some Bizzare supremo Stevo can justifiably claim to have brought the talents of Soft Cell, The The, Blancmange, B. Movie and Depeche Mode to the notice of the Great British Public, so anything on his label deserves careful analysis. His latest discovery is Psychic TV, who emerged from the ashes of Throbbing Gristle. The latter purveyed a particularly minimalist brand of music which incorporated sound collages few would consider disc fodder. It is, therefore, something of a surprise to find that 'Just Drifting' is. laid-back and string-laden. The song construction recalls Leonard Cohen's doomy ballads. Is this the real Psychic TV? Perhaps not, but the flip, 'Breakthrough', probably is. It's a much looser construction with typewriters, dogs, sheep and other assorted noises drifting across the speakers:

MIKE ANTHONY - Why Can't We Live Together (Ariola ARO 293) Producer - Mike Anthony

Brummie Mike lives in Belgium and has already enjoyed substantial success on the Continent with this slow rapping and singing rehash of Timmy Thomas's 1973 hit. Previously popular in the clubs as an import, its belated UK release should now see it into the disco chart.

YOKO ONO - My Man (Polydor POSP 541) Producer - Yoko Ono

Yoko has written (for her) an accessible piece of music employing up-todate synth techniques with suitably sparse accompaniment. The song is also blessed with a quickly assimilated chorus, but its chart chances must be severely limited by Yoko's own restrictions as a vocalist which are all too evident when she leaves the safety of the chorus to tackle the verses.

PLANET HA HA - Home (EMI 5358) Producer - Tony Mansfield

An odd record with E.T.-related lyrics half-spoken by Lee Mansfield, kid brother of producer Tony. Naked Eyes' Rob Fisher lends a hand on bass synth and there's a synthesized drumbeat keeping everything in time. Could be a little too offbeat for the chart, but worth carrying as it will get airplay and response now E.T. is blitzing the nation's cinemas.

GUAMARY - Floreo De Llamas (Dance Of The Flames) (BBC RESL

Incantation are already climbing the chart with their British-recorded interpretation of a traditional Peruvian song. Here we get the genuine article as used in the BBC's excellent The Flight Of The Condor documentaries. It's a haunting blend of pipes, drums and the charanga, a fascinating instrument made from the shell of an armadillo. Unlikely to chart whilst Incantation are cornering the radio market for Peruvian music, but Michael Bentine would love it.

KELTS & KILTS - Reel To Reel (Polydor POSP 544) Producers - J. Worth and R. Sellars

Aargh! The return of disco bagpipes last heard on Voyage's 'Scots Machine'. Pitch to drunks wearing Tam O' Shanters, drinking scotch and shouting "Hey, Jimmy!"

LISA STANSFIELD - The Only Way (Polydor POSP 521) Producer Dave Pickerill

16-year-old Lisa makes a convincing vocal debut on a technopop song with a very strong and oft-repeated chorus with little in-between. No hit this time, but watch this girl.

WEAPON OF PEACE - Hit & Run (Safari SAFE 54) Producers - Andy Lyden and Weapon Of Peace

Weapon Of Peace have developed a seamless reggae/soul hybrid of which 'Hit & Run' may just be commercial enough to put them on the road to greater appreciation.

PAT BENATAR - Shadows Of The Night (Chrysalis CHS 2662) Producers - Neil Geraldo and Peter Coleman.

Superb over-the-top production from Geraldo and Coleman keeps Benatar straining at the leash throughout. She's a vastly under-rated artist, at least in Britain, and must surely come through eventually. This may be the one to do it.

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
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
