

QUEEN'S COPTEN

AS YOU can see, Queen swept the boards this year and picked up 10 awards. You certainly voted for them in a convincing way and even the group were surprised by the overwhelming support they received.

Bass player John Deacon was fairly taken

aback as the list of nominations was read to him: "We've had a very successful year," he said. "And the end of it, with 'Bohemian Rhapsody' staying at the top so long, that surprised us all.

"We're not sure when someone stayed at the top so long. In the past year, the Bay City Rollers were there for five or six weeks with 'Bye Bye Baby'. I certainly didn't expect it to do so

The single, and the album, 'Night At The Opera', was the result of months of hard work. It months of hard work. It took Queen four months, through the Summer, to complete the album. Having set themselves such an astounding record, the problem will be to find a follow up.

They will be out of the country for three months, touring the States, Australia and Japan. When they come back, they will begin recording a new album.

album

'Hopefully it won't take "Hopefully it won't take as long the next time," smiled John. "But we don't have any songs ready for it at all yet. We're not specifically singles orientated." It has been generally mooted that 'Bohemian Rhapsody' was one of the most perfect singles heard in many years. Did Queen look for perfection in all their work?

Trouble

"I think we are perfectionists. We take a lot of trouble over our recording."

lot of trouble over our recording."

To many people, it must seem as if Queen suddenly came up from nowhere and had a smash hit with "Killer Queen."
There was no gradual shifting up the ranks for them. They went straight in at the top.

"It didn't seem to come quickly to us," said John. "The first album was three years ago, so it wasn't an instant success. And the single "Keep Yourself Alive" didn't do well. We did a lot of groundwork, building up a hard core following on the tours. We didn't rush anything, that was the secret."

John, who is the most recent member of the band, is also known as the quietest. What gives John the most satisfaction about the strong position Queen are now in?
"Obviously I'm pleased about the position the band is in at the moment. Success gives the group an independence they've never had before. When you start out, you don't have any power at all, It's nice to become more independent and make your own decisions."

As one of the top groups in Britain, Queen are certainly in a position to demand and get the terms they want. How did it feel to be at the pinnacle? "You ought to ask the others really." said John. This modesty is unusual in Rock "n' Roll.
"Possibly." smiled John. "But when you're at the top you don't realise you're there. You keep on having to kick yourself. I don't even have a flash car, I've got an oid banger."

John and Roger are

both Leos, so you'd expect ebullient personalities.
"We're not alike at all," said John 'Roger is a much more typical Leo."
With such a mixture of personalities in one band, it makes you wonder if they get on well. After all, you hear all these stories about the bands who never see each other outside working hours.

exile — not yet anyway. We'll have to see what happens. I wouldn't like to leave because I like England. I'd miss my cups of tea.

"Bands have to protect themselves, being in that high earnings bracket. We'll have to decide whether it's worth it or not to stay here. It's all very well talking about high earnings, but it's usually only over two or three years and we have worked four or five years building it up and starving!"

John is fond of England so he doesn't usually go abroad for holidays. He and his wife Veronica like staying at their home in South London.

Being the quiet one of the group, didn't it worry him that the others get all the limelight?

the limelight?
"In a way I suppose, but I don't mind. I'm not that way inclined."
The only other country that might tempt John to pack up (with Veronica) pack up (with Veronica) and leave old England, is

and leave old England, is Japan.

"They are so enthusiastic over there," he said.
"It's a big temptation. We didn't know what to expect when we first went, but we were completely won over."
However, as there are no immediate plans to leave, Britain can fook forward to quite a few more Queen performances — possibly even a couple of outdoor events this Summer.

"If the right festival came up we'd do it. They're always risky, what with the sound and things. We haven't done one in Britain, it's just having the confidence I suppose. But we'd have to do the last set in the evening, for the lights."

"It was a good grounding," said John. "It was great that we could go out under someone else swing." Touring, however, isn't the sum total of their careers. Freddie is busy looking after a singer / song writer called Eddie Howell and has been doing some recording with him. John's plans are rather more in the future. What did he see himself doing when Queen settled down to a less hectic pace?

"I can see myself being behind the scenes a bit more. Possibly, to have my own studio. But that's when we have more time. I can see we'll have to slow down soon. We'd get bored if we weren't doing much, but there's no point in being overworked."

"It's very nice of you all. We're very flattered and glad that you like us so much."

BEST FEMALE SINGER De~Pauls up de ~poll

THIS IS the third year running that Lynsey De Paul has been voted Britain's Best Female Singer. "The last two years I won it in Disc's Readers' Poll and this time it's Record Mirror & Disc. Tell your readers", she instructs with a grin, "that they've got very good taste."

Lynsey has just returned from MIDEM, the annual big music biz do in the South of France. "It was a part business, part pleasure trip," she explains. "my pleasure and none of your business!"

Last year saw less output from Lynsey than usual. "Partly," she says, "because of publishing hassles. I think it's a shame," she continues, "because my songs are so important to me. After all, songs are the whole basis of the music business. You can put all the sweetening in the world on a record but

put all the sweetening in the world on a record, but if the song's no good it won't get anywhere.

won't get anywhere.

'Me, as an artist... I
think I'm trash, but I
think my songs are bloody
marvellous.'

not a great performer people recognise it. I'm not a great performer either. I just sit at the piano and sing my songs. But I'd rather go on believing that I'm terrible and have people quite liking me than me thinking I'm great and finding out that other people think I'm lousy."

It all conforms with Miss De Paul's 'nice girl' public imagine. "People look at me and think I'm all small and nice and want to protect me, but really I'm a little Hitler underneath it all. It only comes out though when I'm provoked."

This year looks like being a very much more productive year for Lynsey than 1975. On Friday (13!) she has a new single out, called new single out, called 'Love Bomb' taken from

the album of the same name.

"We put the album out before Christmas to see if there would be any Christmas sales, but I'm only now beginning to detelly work to promote it. Love Bomb' is more abstract than the album before "Taste Me Don't Waste Me'. It's head music rather than heart music but the next one will be about men again. I've already written a song which will hopefully be the next single after 'Love Bomb. It's called 'If I Don't Get You The Next One Will.'

Apart from her own work, * Lynsey has cowitten (with Barry Blue) and produced a single for

written (with Barry Blue) and produced a single for Dame Vera Lynn, called 'Don't You Remember When.' "I was doing an appearance on one of her shows when she asked me for a song suitable for her. I hadn't got one so I said I would write one specially." specially

Was it difficult? "No

singing all day, which helped. She's mar-vellous. When I sing without a track I get so close to the microphone that you can hear a whole lot of leakage from the headphones, but with her she has the microphone two feet away and still sounds very strong. She can hold a note forever, so we wrote the song with lots of long notes. At the end, there's one note she holds for five bars — and they're long, slow bars.

Produce

Lynsey wrote another song to go on the B - side of Vera's record: "But it turned out so well that it'll go out afterwards as

go out afterwards as another A - side."

Now Lynsey's going to produce a whole LP for Vera with songs specially written by a whole lot of top flight modern composers – like Eiton John, to name but one. "I'm really very honoured that really very honoured that she's trusting me with her music. After all, the lady

is a Dame I only hope

is a Dame. . I only hope I don't let her down."
One slight nigglement in Lynsey's life stems from the world of television and the programme 'Yes Honestley', which is the follow up to 'No Honestly.' They didn't ask me to write the theme for the 'Yes Honestly' series and I must admit I was slightly offended. It's not as If my song was a failure. I mean I got an Ivor Novello Award for it."

There are several promising plans taking shape for Lynsey currently including the possibility of doing some film music. "I don't want to say anything about that or some other things at the moment, because I'm not one for counting my chickens before they've hatched."

And finally has she any

And finally, has she any long term ambitions?

"Well", she says lightly, "I think I'll have a kid in about three years"



IT APPEALS some 13 million viewers and almost everyone in the pop biz would give half a larynx to be seen on it for a brief three minutes. What is it?

Answer: Top Of The Pops, Britain's top pop show and Record Mirror & Disc poll winner of this year's (and last year's) best TV programme.

Top Of The Pops literally sprinted away with the title. It's baby counterpart, the several month old Supersonic, came second. But there's no element of competition between the two, as the



astute TOTPs producer Robin Nash pointed out.

"The two programmes cannot be compared. Top of The Pops is a reflection of the Top 30 charts, whereas Supersonic is a pop show."

"The show used to be 40

minutes long", said Robin, "But now it's been cut to a 30 minute slot. We have very little hope of getting a lot of new material shown, for the show is mainly taken up chart material, so what we now need is some

other pop show, like Juke Box Jury, where new talent can get a lot more exposure."

exposure."

The programme has been running 13 years, and its basic formula hasn't changed much

ince it began.

"The idea is to include as much Top 30 material as possible. In the past as possible. In the past there have been LP spots but were not too successful. "But that doesn't mean to say Top Of The Pops

stays the same week in week out because the style of the music changes all the time. There's

all the time. There's never two programmes alike."
Robin has often been hailed a Messiah because of his powerful status in the pop field, but he modestly admitted: "I don't think I'm the most coverful man in pon it's powerful man in pop, it's the public that are most powerful. They spend their money on singles their money on singles and albums and they

dictate who's going to get

dictate who's going to get to number one."

However, Robin does hold a very high and mighty position in pop music. Inadvertently or otherwise he can make or break a newly released single for it is he who has the final say on who appears on the show.
"I think if a new band

"I think if a new band appears and they have had a certain amount of radio and TV exposure it's of greater value than showing a complete unknown.

"So many times in the past we've had groups on who have had a record in the bottom half of the charts, and because of the programme the record has zoomed up."

Robin enjoys the programme, and loves working on it "I've been producing Top Of The Pops for three years and I love the excitement. I don't actually bet, but I have to try and guess

what next week's number

one is.

"I also love the immediacy of it all. The work starts on Tuesday, on Wednesday we record the show, we edit it on Thursday morning and it's out by that evening. In 48 hours we've done the whole thing. That's exciting in itself.

"We get rather a lot of

whole thing. That's exciting in itself.
"We get rather a lot of compliments. We get messages from all sorts of people congratulating us on a good show. Other times we get phone calls saying how good Pans People were."

There's always someone to swoon over during the 30 minute pop-in (even Mum sometimes gets a look in when old swingers like Bing Crosby and

like Bing Crosby and Roger Whittaker make an

appearance).







We've had to fight hard to be accepted as writers — especially after that piece in the national press; that took a lot of stuffing out of us.

"We're very happy because we've just heard that." Money Honey' went into the American charts at number 51 — and that's our song. 'Saturday Night' only went in at 101. That was the Martin Coulter song."

It shows from the poll that the Rollers are really a force to be reckoned with after all they were second to Queen in the World Best Group section, and Queen are no slouches.

"Yes, Queen have more time in the studios than we have. We hardly get any time at all. Sometimes it's a bit of a rush."

But the main thing that all Rollers fans want to know, is when are they going to get a chance to see the band play in Britain again?

"Well, we're just dying to do British gigs. It's just that we don't have that much of a say when we'll be doing them. Japan wants us to go there, Australia wants us back and we've got to play Italy and Germany."

Was there any truth in the rumours that the

Rollers might be playing a couple of outdoor gigs in the UK this Summer?

"We're not sure how many venues we'll be doing, or where they are. Obviously we would like to play everywhere. I'm personally not too keen on outdoor concerts. The weather generally isn't good enough — and it's not a good idea for security reasons. We like to play indoors because then the fans don't run around and get hurt. We think about things like that carefully. Security is one of our biggest worries."

It's good to know that the Rollers have your interests at heart. Did Woody have a final message for all the readers who voted for the band?

"Yes. I'd love to thank all the British fans that

"Yes. I'd love to thank all the British fans that started us off. If it hadn't been for them we would never have got to America. I'd tike to give them a big thanks and a big kiss!"

Exhibitors wary of Disco '76

DISCO '76, the recent Billboard - organised Disco Forum in New York, failed to come up with many new ideas during its formal panel sessions thanks to poor stage management and bad PA equipment supplied by the Roosevelt Hotel - the sessions never ran to time and were usually all but inaudible!

British equipment man-ufacturers and suppliers would have benefited by attending or exhibiting at the Forum. Had Roger Squire turned up for the panel that he was due to sit on, he would have done an immense amount of business. This being only the first Forum to be held in the States, exhibitors

the first Forum to be held in the States, exhibitors were wary (as they were before our own NADJ events became estab-lished).

Of the 30 manufac-turers' exhibits on show, few items of equipment were as well designed as their UK counterparts, although as part of the apparent "bigger is

better" belief that is widespread amongst US disco operators, there were indeed some ex-tremely powerful speaker horns and amplifiers on display.

One of the gimmicks of the New York DJ style is to use vast bass horns, separately amplified, to

to use vast bass horns, separately amplified, to emhasise certain passages of music, and likewise to bring out the sizzling cymbals through clusters of radiating miniature tweeters suspended over the dance floor.

The most eye - catching exhibits were the three competing video projection systems, all of which

transmit three invisible beams of red, blue and green onto screens of up to 15 feet in size, on which they superimpose to produce full colour giant TV pictures. Video produce full colour glant TV pictures. Video cassettes available in-clude packaged soul shows from TV, specially created disco music programmes, and star performances including David Bowie.



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
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

Sound Of Soul

JUST ONE glance at the pop charts over past decade is sufficient to indicate the domination of black music in general and soul music in particular. In any one week at a third and least sometimes as much as half the Top 20 has comprised soul heavily soul influenced records.

The album charts give a somewhat different picture though recently soul albums have started picture soul albums have started seiling very big. A recent Drifters' compilation topped the half-million mark here, a figure achieved by very few acts black or white. The heavy emphasis on singles in the soul field reflects the fact that black Americans still lend to be

Americans still tend to be in the lower income bracket, and concentrate their attentions on sin-gles. Two or three years ago most soul albums were collections of sin-gles, rather than con-ceived as an entity.

Reluctance

The British media's reluctance to give ex-posure to black artists doesn't help the situation either.

Just look through the average pop paper and you'll find the number of interviews with black artists is miniscule compared with their chartimpact.

Today, the Drifters are the biggest drawing cabaret act in the country and their singles hits mean they have a big teen following too, yet it is rare that more than half a page is devoted to them.


Record Mirror & Disc is, of course, a notable exception, giving cov-erage to those whose achievements deserve recognition, regardless of their musical direction.

So what if Auntie Beeb refuses to give them the same coverage accorded to the latest pimply pop hero? There's always the discos to fall back on and these have made soul a vibrant force in Britain

However, this depend However, this dependence on the discos holds inherent dangers. With the constant search for a danceable beat and nothing more, the disco jocks have swung the emphasis too strongly on a very narrow spectrum of black music.

of black music.

If you smoke 20 cigarettes a day, it costs you about £150 a year to make yourself thoroughly unattractive to half the girls in the country. And what do you get for your money? Lung cancer, perhaps, or emphysema, heart disease, bronchitis.

No wonder more and more young people have decided that cigarettes just aren't worth a light. The Health Education Council
