





One of them, briefly, is that for the next British tour he hopes to include a 20 minute film instead of having a support band: "I'm working on a film project now for the act, but it's all a bit puzzling so I oughtn't not explain because I'm not too sure myself."

Talking of England brings a touch of meloncholia to his voice I think he's a little home-sick.

voice. I think he's a little home-sick.
"We've been here now for over five weeks and there's just about two weeks to go, and yes, I was a little home - sick," he confirms, "until my young lady came outhere. But really we've been working so hard time's just shot by; we haven't even had a chance to relax properly." I ask if being in the Great

I ask if being in the Great Americas had inspired him to write any new material.

"Yea, actually it has, which is unusual because I never write when I'm on the road. But this time I've written the odd line in



my note book, reflections of things that have happened."

He describes what the next album is going to be like: "As soon as we get back home I'm starting work on it and this one is going to be much more mellow, very simple."

mellow, very simple."

This mellower, dreamler phase, is it happening to him in reality? "Well I am more content within myself, more content than I have been for a long time, so yes it is. But I've always fancied doing a finely textured, melodic album. Every album we do is different and I thought this time it would be nice to experiment with the gentler side of things, but naturally there'll be one or two heavy things as well."

Don't suppose he's had time to check - out the American studio situation?

"No, not really," he admits,

But no, Johnny Moore, aged 41, is very happy with his lot, as was revealed by a visit to his London flat, where he was having a quick breather between his heetic tour schedule.

He sits cool and reserved, enjoying a drink while watching TV and supporting a wide grin.

TV and supporting a wide grin.
"I'm always smiling", he says. "That's my nature."
You can see what he has got to smile about, since. The Drifters popularity has been unsurpassed throughout their lengthy history.

Roots

They have a seemingly endless string of hits to their name, dating back to the name dating back to the sixties, including 'Under The Boardwalk' and 'Save The Last Dance For Me', then there are all those recent chart successes such as 'Kissin' in the Back Row', which made it to number 2 in July, '74, Down On The Beach Tonight', 'Can 1 Take You Home Little Girl', and currently with 'Hello Happiness'.

"We did a few of those Rock 'n' Roll revival shows and some of the artists were certainly


out of touch.

"Our Mecca is over here", he says. "We do two tours a year over here now. In America we do some cabaret, but this is the place for us.

of coming to London I hated the idea, being away from home so long, but now it's like a home from home. We have played prestige gigs like the Talk Of The Town, in London but much of our work is in the Northern clubs.

"People down here think they're all hicks up there, but you should see them when they get

dressed up and go out. We've got a heck of a following up there.

"I'm amazed at our popularity after all these years, and because of our history we attract audiences of all ages. We never have to alter our act to suit one particular group, they all seem to enjoy themselves."

back later in the year.

"When we first had our success in the States way back, all the top songwriters of the day wanted to write for the Drifters because they were the big group Now we are working with Roger Cook and Roger Greenaway, and that seems to work too, I've never been a songwriter myself."

Break

After the tour Johnny is looking forward to a break at home and visiting his mother in Cleveland.

"I'll take it steady for a while, drink a little Bacardi, perhaps go tenpin bowling, but I'll be ready for work again within weeks", he said.

Bowling is one of his favourite pastimes and one of his contemporaries and bowling companions is guitar king B. B. King.

He said he would have liked to have gone bowling in his spare time in London, but was worried people would think he was carrying a bomb!

"Mind you", he says.
"It's not as bad as New
York yet, you can
hardly go out for a walk
there. It's the deadlest
city, but I love it
because it's my home
One night we were
backstage and I
watched this junkie put
this length of pipe in a
rolled - up newspaper,
This guy pulled up
outside the theatre,
stood on the kerb
brushing himself down,
and started walking
towards the door
Anyway, this guy
creeps up behind him
and raised the paper
behind his head and the
pipe falls out behind him

and he just hits him on the head with the paper!"

At one time there were several bogus groups calling themselves the Drifters, cashing in on their success, but this has now sorted itself

"We were playing in one town and there were two other bands playing in another town using our name. Our manager got to hear of it, rang the places concerned and told them to stop the show. A little later that night there was this phone call from one of the bands asking if they could continue for a few days till they made their fares home. We said no."

What did Johnny have in mind after the Drifters?

Advice

"Well, I can't go on singing forever", he replied "But I shall do so as long as my health allows me to. With 23 years in the business I expect to continue in showbiz, perhaps as a manager, giving advice, using my experience.

"I'm sure I could help someone along. But I'll tell you something, if I was just starting out now I wouldn't want to go on that 'New Faces' programme — they really rip acts to pieces. That must be one of the hardest shows to do."

For the time being Johnny is happy to go on being a Drifter, and keeping their sound alive. He certainly is not looking forward to the day he ceases to be a member.

He says: "It's rather like a house, you don't like selling it when you've built it yourself."



Rodger plums for versatility



THERE'S MORE to Rodger Collins than you'd think. He looks and sings like a moulded R&B singer who eventually made it good. But oh, this boy has more going for him than just that. His act isn't just a stand · up · pump · out · the · blues

and -add -the -rhythm gig.

Versatility, claims Rodger, is what it's all about. After all his first major break came in Las Vegas and that's where you need variety to get by. It all started when Rodger was playing with Ike and Tina Turner and Ike encouraged him to go on

alone.
"He wanted me to get the feel of Vegas," recalls
Rodger, "and for the first couple of days I didn't like
it at all but then I met Louis Armstrong, who became
a close friend of mine, and he told me to go on up
there and do my thing."

Rodger, "thing."

Rodger's "thing" consists of impersonations, dancing, country and western singing and yodelling, "Oh yes," he adds almost as an afterthought, "I sung a little R&B and soul as well." Collins learnt that the only way to succeed was to diversify early on, in a career which started at high school. consists of impersonations,

school.
"I used to mime to records and I won a talent show I guess it all started from there."
One day, he remembers, he sneaked into Brook Benton's hotel room and started doing his

Benton's noter room and started doing his pantomime act.

"Brook said to me, 'Man you ve got to sing,' and so I thought I'd give it a try,' 'he adds.

"Although I play guitar in my act I'm not really a guitar player at all,' he says. "I just pick at a few instruments."

"You Sexy Sugar Plum' may be the first of his picking" we've heard in Britain but he's already stablished himself as a songwriter and producer in the States

Rodeo Star

First time around it happened with a song he wrote called 'She's Looking Good' back in 1966. After he had the original hit with it a friend of his Aretha Franklin – notice how many big names he knows) introduced him to Jerry Wexler at Atlantic Records who said the song was right for Otis Redding.

But Otis didn't get the chance to record it because it had already been picked up by the Falcons whose lead singer was Wilson Pickett.

Although raised up in the Baptist church, like so many other black R&B singers, Rodger didn't have his eyes set on a recording career right from the

His versatility showed early. "Being born in Santa Anna, Texas, the first thing I wanted to be was a rodeo star and I used to rope and ride broncos. I guess that's where my love of country music comes from.

music comes from.

"Anyway I didn't get any money at it because was such a strange thing for blacks to be doing a he time. I even used to ride buils you know.

"Then one day I decided to give the whole thing u because I saw the champion of the world and was he a state. When I saw how mutilated and broken hi nody was I thought 'no more for me."

Now the versatile entertainer is planning to cross he Atlantic and perform in Britain where his 197 eccorded song is still going up the charts.

"It's been a hit in Britain before its made it in the tates and I'd like to thank the people over there for uying it," he concludes, giving a wild yodel over a bronce.

David Brown talks to two leading security

SECURITY AT pop concerts has always meant one thing in the past - bouncers.

The word reeks of physical contact and brute force and as any veteran of the rock era will tell you, bouncers usually lived up to the image.

With the development of larger concerts in bigger venues, the need for a more stable form of security has become essential to protect the artists from over enthusiastic fans and often protect the fans from themselves during a temporary spell of frenzy.

Tragically, we have seen what can happen if things go wrong. Two years ago at a David Cassidy concert at White City a teenage girl died and many were injured when the crowd got out of

control.

After this incident people began
to re think their ideas about
organisation, to make sure it never
happened again.
The Greater London Council

The Greater London Council introduced new measures to improve safety including recom-mendations for more stewards for crowd control. Stewards and backstage security staff often have a thankless task.

as determined fans will go to any lengths to get to the stars. And they must always keep their cool must always keep their cool — heavy handed treatment no longer rules.

Violence

There are always the trouble makers of course and these have to be handled firmly and quickly. Staff who get too beavy with the fans have been criticised by the musicians themselves and rightly so. I spoke to bay of the big London based artists' security firms and while some of their views naturally contradict each other, they agree on the important matters.

Both were eager to insist they did not use violence, that safety came first and that the suprofessional outfits should be replaced by people who really knew what they were doing, not just out to make a quick buck.

emerged from the interviews is a
gradual changeover from the big
tough guy image to a more sensible

Fat Freddy and Gerald Hooker work for Artistes Security and will be familiar to many concert goers.

Fred Bassett started in security

Pred Bassett started in security nine years ago.

"I was thrown in at the deep end," he says. "It was with the Monkees when they were in their heyday. I had to cope with all that, stood the pace and have been doing it ever since."

Gerald Booker is a pipe fitter during the day and works as a security manat night.

"I first got into it when someone said to me how would I like to earn some money and when they went on to say it included staying in a hotel and seeing some of the best bands in the world I thought they were winding me up. I didn't

believe it till we took off for

Fred and Gerald have the difficult job of keeping over-enthusiastic fans from getting

enthusiastic fans from getting backstage.

"When I was with Zeppelin in Germany there was this bunch of guys who were causing some trouble, so we put them out, but there was no heaviness on our part," said Fred.

"After the show we got the band out of the place and these guys rushed us. I was stabbed in the back. Luckily I was very fat at the time, about 22 stone, and it mainly just shit my back, but I had to have 13 stitches. But I was back to work after three days.

"I'll always remember that. I was caught unaware. But most of

was caught unaware. But most of the time things run quite smoothly."

He remembers another hair raising incident at two Bay City Roller concerts in Glasgow when thousands of fans waited after the thousands of fans waited after the show. With a nifty piece of driving and police co - operation they got away safely. "In another second the van would have been annihilated," he said, "These kids show no fear. "At the Cassidy concert where

the young girl died you could see all these people pushing, girls tearing hair out and you just could not get to them.

There were about 700 people lying about afterwards and we

had to carry them out. "

had to carry themout."
They said that some promoters were skimping their responsibilities by employing cutprice firms to do the job to save money.
"Say we get a tenner for a night, some of these smaller places only give 'em about three quid,' said Fred. "You can't expect them to do a job properly unless they are



ASHFORD& SIMPSON: PERFECT

A COUPLE of years ago the names Ashford and Simpson meant little more to British soul fans than credits in the small print on Diana Ross records. Now the one-time Motown writer / producer team are intent on making it here as artists in their own right and, to be honest, they've got one hell of a lot going for them.

"We're con-scious that while most British music aware of the work we did with Diana Ross and others, very few of them have really heard of us by name," said the delightful Valerie Simpson. "We're hoping to put that right with a British tour in the near future if the album gets any kind of action over there.

Even in their Motown days the duo had hopes of making it as stars in their own right and they recorded sporadically as solo artists; Nick Ashford for ABC and Valerie Simpson for Valerie Simp Tamla Motown.

Today, though, their association is very much a permanent thing: "I guess our having a baby really put the seal on the deal between us!" laughed Valerie.

"Actually it was Nicole's birth which put us into temporary retirement for a year before the release of this new album but now we're back in full flight."

They first met in church and were soon singing together in gospel choirs: "We weren't getting very far though so we decided to concentrate on writing songs together."

Many months of trudging round music publishers' offices followed until they struck acky and got a deal with Florence Greenberg's Scepter Records and came up with material for Chuck Jackson and Maxine Brown.

"In 1965 we notched our first major hit when we wrote 'Let's Go Get Stoned' for Ray

Charles," said Valerie. Charles," said Valerie "It's funny how that one came about. We'd been trying to get our heads together all day and couldn't come up with anything worthwhile so I said to Nick: 'Oh let's go get stoned', I just wanted to go out and get tipsy, forget our troubles, but the phrase stuck, and within a couple of hours we'd come up with the song!"

The duo's time with the Motown Sound was filled with producing other artists but the idea other artists but the idea of a career of their own was never far from their minds. "In fact, Diana Ross kept encouraging us to do our own thing and eventually the company issued Valerie's 'Exposed' album," chipped in Nick Ashford. "They also have enough cuts in the can on the both of us together to put out another album should they want to." Unlike some other acts, Ashford and Simpson left Motown without any bitterness: "In fact we still do some work for the company. It's just that Warners came up with a really good deal and, at the time, seemed better equipped to promote us as artists."

Initially, Ashford and

Initially, Ashford and Simpson were a little worried about on stage appearances but they appearances but they quickly managed to develop a warm and exciting act which has won them rave reviews wherever they've appeared — as well as a coveted Image Award from the National Association For The Advancement Of Coloured People.

"I suppose we're

oured People.

"I suppose we're super lucky," enthused Valerie. "Writing comes naturally to us, it's just a reflection of what happens in our own lives, we get plenty of production work. offered to us and now we offered to us and now we are making it as performing artists. Then, just to complete we've got a fine home life and a beautiful baby. Yes, there are a lot of good things in our lives."

In short, they seem to have the perfect part-nership.

"In that situation you have to be


"In that situation you have to be very cool. It's a hell of pressure to be in the middle of thousands of screaming and crying fans."



SOLID GOLD PLATTERS

WHEREVER the Platters appear these days, an old wheeler dealer named Buck Ram stands up and takes a quick bow.

It's not just because he discovered the and managed them, and wrote the group, songs that took them into any short list of rock's all -time vocal teams. It's because his

is a kind of face guarantee that you're seeing the REAL Platters.

Since the early days when various members of the old group split to find solo fame and fortune, there were many phoney groups hitting the road calling themselves the Platters

groups hitting the road calling themselves the Platters.

But the real thing, the one group entitled by law to use the name, is the one which has Buck Ram's lived, in features cropping up somewhere in the background.

Say's Ram: "What happened was that one or two of the original guys figured they could do better by running their own shows. That was okay by me. But when they started using the group name, which i invented, it was kinda annoying. In the end I took legal action to copyright the group But the pirate teams are still around."

He once told me that he knew of eleven different outfits ''cashing in'' on the Platters' fame - somewhat less, surprisingly, that in the case of the Drifters, for Ben E. King told me there were 17 Drifter - slanted groups touring the U.S. alone.

But then the Drifters didn't have a Buck Ram available in the wings to stand up, take a bow and certify that audiences were seeing the real thing.

Most of their previously released singles also get an airing which means that if you've already got them at home you won be wanting them again.






