SUDDENLY IT all seems to be happening for Elkie Brooks — another single in the charts, 'Sunshine After The Rain', following on from 'Pearl's A Singer', a widely-acclaimed album and an upcoming headlining British tour citmaxing at the Royal Albert Hall on September 26.

Thursday afternoon, the telephone rings. 'Hello, 's Elkie Brooks here. I've been all over the world rying to get through to you.

About the last album, Elkie. It got what you might call a rapturous welcome. Would you say it's the best thing you've ever done? "It's hard to say. It was great to work with Leber and Stoller. They don't really have to work any more. They've sold millions of albums and they blew out two other projects to method millions. ork on mine

You've taken two singles from the album already. Is this trend likely to continue? Don't you think singles should be recorded as such, not ripped off from albums? "It's difficult. But when you do an album with Leiber and Stoller, eight out of ten tracks are potential hits. They go for songs that lend themselves to singles as well as albums."

The single 'Pearl's A Singer' got to number one. That must have been the highlight of your career to date, or, was it one of the most satisfying things you've achieved.

It was picked up by people on radio stations, people who recognised a good song and it took off. But I'm not sure about satisfaction and enjoyment. After Vinegar split it took me a long time to make up my mind to go solo. It's difficult to get into the frame of mind after being in a group for so long ''

HEY, WAIT a minute. This isn't how it's supposed to be at all. I'm the one that's doing the interview, scribbl. ing down the notes. The artist isn't sup posed to be taping it. Does not compute . .

Why is Tom Robinson taking a record of everything that's said? The tiny sophisticated tape machine sits between us like a lie between lovers, sliently reminding us that anything we say is being taken down and may be used in evidence.

taken down and may be used in evidence. "The machine's not mine, it's EMI's," says Tom. "I couldn't afford it. Two just come off f18 a week Social Security to f30 - minus f2 for the stamp." Tom Robinson has scored his bit of temporary security at EMI after six months in the cold, six months since he left Cafe Society and Ray Davles' label amid much hoo-ha. Ray's loss is EMI's gain and I think they're feeling pretty pleased with themselves for getting Tom before anyone eise. Or at least coming up with the right inswers. The right figures?

answers. The right figures? "We want to make records and they want to sell records, it's as simple as that," re-marks Tom. Or was it guitarist Danny Kus-tow? They've got the tape, they'll know. "In





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Benny knows where he's going

"IF MY music is suggestive, it's a coincidence," says Benny Latimore with a silken smooth voice. "I don't aim to be too explicit.

"I like listeners to be able to think when they hear one of my songs. One reaction may be to identify with the sit-uation. Another may be to read a double meaning into the lyrics

FIGS "My songs depict actual situations. Sex is the strongest drive, isn't it? So you can speak directly about it in a song or the individual may see it thereindirectly. But after a while the whole argu-ment becomes redun-dant. You see what you want to see." want to see

Latimore's late-night approach to soul has takn over quietly where ear If over quietly where ear-ly Isaac Hayes' efforts left off. He may not be number one in the LP charts with his 'II Ain't Where You're Goln', but his name is firmly etched in the prinds of true blue in the minds of true blue

In the minds of true blue soul fans. The album slipped out relatively unnoticed in this country. But have no fear, Latimore is alive and kicking, if a little hard to track down. We speke in the middle of this spoke in the middle of this two-week club engage-ment in Detroit.

Latimore is part of that minority of soul artists who write their own mate-

tentionally risque.

"When I write a song I people I know

try to tell a story that someone will appreciate. I make the music commu-nicate and to express my-self. Maybe if I made music just to sell records I'd do better chart-wise. But it's essential my records say something. I don't want to capitalise on public guilibility. It's too easy to underestimate the public and release junk. If you have a hit with junk the joke's on you. People equate you with junk. Af-ter that it's hard to be taken seriously." taken seriously.

Does he mean Barry White? "I'm not namin" names. But you could think of dozens who fall into that category."

Truth

Much of Latimore's mu-sic appeals to men, the silent majority of soul fans. It's a notion Lati-more is aware of. My songs have to con-

My songs have to con-tain an element of truth. Obviously I tend to see a situation from a man's viewpoint. So I tell the truth whether it's a song about cheatin', a man leaving his woman, a woman leaving her man or whatever. But a lot of people," he says in a childlike voice, "are not ready for the truth. A lot of men don't like to hear the truth. the truth.

More homespun philos-phy shows on Latimore's ophysnows on Laumore's albums and in his stage act Latimore, in a re-verse Millie Jackson role, raps a lot onstage. He firmly believes women's lib is the best thing that ever happened to men.

"We men brought it on ourselves by taking wom-en for granted too long." He has a romantic mind but a practical heart. "I don't believe that absence makes the heart grow fonder. I'm away from home too much to know better, If you don't keep your home fires burning before you leave home, there'll be nothing but cold ashes waiting for you "We men brought it on cold ashes waiting for you when you get back."

After extensive work in the mid-west and on the west coast Latimore will return to studios in Miami with producer Steve Alaimo. Alaimo loves to do analogy songs like 'Clean Up Woman' while Latimore loves to write phrases like the title of

phrases like the title of that last album. What happens when these two wils get together? "We collaborate fine to-gether," says Latimore, still in that smoother -than - describable voice. "I usually have an Idea "I usually have an idea and he helps me round it off. We get together be-cause we're friends anycause we're friends any-way. In the studio we pull terrible pranks on each other We work at night when the atmosphere is usually laid back. We rely on spontaneity to keep things going. Once we get in a groove we're fine If things start to fall into a rut you see some pretty wild senses of hu-mour.

Latimore's future, like Jerry Butler's, is about to split between performing and business. Butler and his brother-in-law run a beer distribution com-

'Men have got to learn not to turn their backs on the truth' pany. Latimore and his brother are sticking a little closer to the music business. They've bought an old school in Tennessee and are going to convert it

and are going to convert it into a disco. "T also want to use the place to work out new bands," he continues. "Td like younger artists to be able to take advan-tage of my experience. And that helps me too. I don't want to be trav-elling like this when I'm 50 No, I'm not givin' up. I'm just taking a step to the side for every step I take forward. I want to keep moving and try to keep moving and try to reach my goals.

Complacent


"I don't mind when things are going a little slower for me than for others. I'll still be hungry when a lot of them have when a lot of them have become complacent. 
